State Officials **Announce** Latest COVID-19 **Stats**

CDPH Press Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) released the most recent statistics on COVID-19 and updates on the state's pandemic response. The most up to date data is available on the state's COVID-19 data dashboard.

Update on ICU Capacity

While statewide case rates continue to drop and hospitalization rates are stabilizing, ICUs in the San Joaquin Valley are at or near capacity activating surge protocols which allows flexibility to transfer patients to hospitals with additional ICU capacity. Counties within the region include: Calaveras, Fresno, Kern, Kings, Madera, Mariposa, Merced, San Benito, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Tulare, and Tuolumne.

More information about the surge protocols can be found here. These surge protocols have been in place since August 2021 to ensure hospitals can provide all Californians the care they need.

"California has measures in place to respond to the surge and changing dynamics of the pandemic," said Dr. Mark Ghaly, Secretary of the California Health & Human Services Agency. "ICUs in the San Joaquin Valley, where vaccination rates are lower, are nearing capacity. Californians will get through this latest surge by continuing to follow the science, including by getting vaccinated and boosted, which is the safest way to protect yourself from the virus."

Statewide COVID-19 Data

Rates of cases, hospitalizations and deaths are highest among unvaccinated individuals and lowest among boosted individuals. This is true for all age groups. See additional data for unvaccinated and vaccinated cases, hospitalizations and deaths.

Vaccinations

69,152,754 total vaccines administered; 81.7% of the eligible population (5+) has been vaccinated with at least one dose; 122,422 people a day are receiving COVID-19 vaccination (average daily dose count over 7 days).

Celebrating 10 Years of the Mental Illness Project

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - It has been 10 years since the launch of the Sacramento County Department of Health Services Division of Behavioral Health Services "Mental Illness: It's Not Always What You think" project, and in that time, the project has made significant progress in creating partnerships to reduce stigma and discrimination surrounding mental illness.

Funded by Mental Health Services Act, the project aims to reduce stigma and discrimination by providing mental health information, resources and support to individuals and families in Sacramento County. By educating the community, the project aims to eliminate barriers for people living with mental illness and provide

mental health.

When the project launched in 2012, only four community members were willing to be spokespeople. Fast forward to today, the Stop Stigma Speakers Bureau has almost 200 members who share their experiences living with mental illness, and countless community

a deeper understanding of members have volunteered to be the public face of the campaign on billboards, in media interviews or at events.

The project has more than 11,000 followers on its social media channels and more than 120 community-based organizations have collaborated with the project since it launched.

"We estimate that nearly 355,000 Sacramento County residents live with a mental illness, but only a third will seek professional help due to stigma and discrimination," said Ryan Quist, Ph.D., Director of Behavioral Health Services. "Mental illness is a treatable and manageable

4H Member Readies for State Fair **Horse Competition**





New Chapter Begins for Citrus Heights' Old Schoolhouse

citrus Heights, CA (MPG) - It is appropriate that the latest transformation of the old Citrus Heights one-room schoolhouse built in 1862 take place the year of its 160th anniversary. It has been the home to the Citrus Heights Veterans Community Center since 2013.

A new chapter in its long history began this year, in 2022. This date also continues the legacy of Jim Rounsevell who purchased the property at 6921 Sylvan Road with his wife Jeanne in 2013 to create a safe place for veterans. Rounsavell passed away March 4, 2021. At his Celebration of Life at the Center on July 17, then Mayor Steve Miller said of him, "If these walls could talk, they would say, "thank you Jim for mending us, and creating a welcoming place for our veterans. Jim has joined a long, esteemed and notable line of city pioneers, and will be missed by all; his impact on our community will be eternal." This chapter continues with his dream.



reopening mid-January. This latest renovation created a much more open, brighter and inviting feeling in the large the east. According to the history of Citrus Heights on its website, "Gold Rush seekers had poured into California seeking fortune, but by the late 1850s many were raising families and working the land. As more families put down roots in the fertile soil, the need for a schoolhouse soon arose. The original location the schoolhouse was on five acres of land on the northwest portion of Sylvan Corners," before it became Citrus Heights.

A much older city pioneer, John Cross, of the Crosswood's neighborhood, was a carpenter who helped build the first schoolhouse. His wife, Sarah, served as the first teacher. He called the center a "temple of learning." Cross's daughter Lilian describes the history of the school in a 1943 document titled "Sylvan Recollections." She says, "It had become the civic, social and religious center," as there was no television or radio, and residents had to

create their own entertainment. In its day the one room met the needs of the community. However, Center Vice President Michelle Grant explained in an email that despite community interest in renting the building for functions, it's use will remain private. Its purpose is outlined in their Articles of Incorporation as a nonprofit which prohibits rentals or other uses.

Improvements to the original schoolhouse were made over the years, with pillars and a cupola added in 1903. A second building was added in the early 1920s to accommodate the growing student population When a third building was added in 1927, the old schoolhouse was sold as surplus property and purchased by the Citrus Heights Community Club, which moved the building a quarter-mile south from its original location onto land owned by the Van Maren family on Sylvan Road. As costs

to maintain the aging building became prohibitive, it was put up for sale. When the Rounsevells saw the 'For Sale' sign, they knew this was the answer to Jim's dream of creating a home away from home "for our veterans." One of the walls in the Center contains Cross family memorabilia, including the creation of the Crossword communities on Auburn Boulevard near Sylvan Road.

The next decade in the history of the schoolhouse began in 2013 as the Citrus Heights Veterans Community Center was created. With it came a "village" of community members, businesses and many others eager to donate their time, energy and expertise to see Jim's dream come to fruition. Many improvements including new bathrooms and major outdoor improvements have been made since then.

Vet Center board member Vince Robles thanks Hewlett Packard Enterprises for referring the Center to the Sacramento Veterans Employer Resource Group (SacVERG). SacVERG board members Liliana Bernal and Justin Iodence, a veteran, worked together with Bullard Construction to provide the services of BM Painting, Inc., Sacramento, Valley Electric, and Pat Baird Acoustics Inc. (Rocklin) at no cost to the Center. IDD Flooring replaced all the flooring in the main hall and kitchen. Bernal also made a generous financial contribution

The bright modern look is also thanks to the new Community Relations director Betty Jo (BJ) Miyashiro who coordinated the interior design and front and back landscaping. She donated her time and the supplies for the project.

Although the 2022 legislative session has just begun, it already has high-profile battles underway over whether public school students should be required to have COVID-19 vaccinations and whether the state should embrace single-payer medical care.

We sometimes forget that there are dozens of other, less public, venues where conflicts over important policy issues play out — like state regulatory agencies. With all of them directly or indirectly controlled by the governor or other political figures, they make decisions that can have multi-billion-dollar consequences and affect the lives of millions of Californians.

The California Public Utilities Commission, whose members are appointed by the governor, is arguably the state's most influential regulatory agency. Originally created more than a century ago to regulate railroad freight rates, the PUC's portfolio expanded to include utilities supplying electric power,

natural gas and water.

With that broad franchise, PUC decrees affect the finances of virtually every household and business in the state. It now faces one of the most heated conflicts in its history — a utility-backed proposal to reduce the financial incentives for installing rooftop solar panels, primarily the right to sell excess solar energy back to utilities, dubbed Net Energy Metering or NEM.

In December, the PUC released a 204-page proposal to reduce the payments to solar panel owners, largely embracing what the utilities and their unions had been seeking, but angering advocates of rooftop generation. The factions have been waging a fierce battle, mostly in the media, ever since.

The utilities contend that NEM amounts to a subsidy for Californians affluent enough to afford solar arrays that manifests itself in higher power rates for everyone else, particularly the poor, and has assembled a coalition of politicians, consumer advocates and environmentalists.

The opposition, funded mostly by solar panel manufacturers and sellers, contends that it's a grab by utilities that will retard the growth of solar power and make it more difficult for the state to meet its greenhouse gas reduction goals.

Fundamentally, it's an existential issue for both. Utilities fear that widespread self-generation will damage their financial viability while the solar industry sees reducing NEM's incentives as discouraging potential

The PUC's draft was a big tactical win for the utility faction, but its rival redoubled its effort to maintain the status quo, gaining support from such high-profile figures as Sen. Dianne Feinstein and former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger.

As with so many big issues these days, Gov. Gavin Newsom is the man in the middle. The opposition was buoyed, therefore, when Newsom indicated this month that he wants changes in the PUC's draft.

Asked about NEM at his budget news conference, Newsom replied: "That draft plan that was recently released, I just had a chance to review, and I'll say this about the plan: We still have some work to do,"

When asked again later in the news conference about the PUC proposal, Newsom said, "Do I think changes need to be made? Yes I do."

The PUC got the message and delayed a vote on whether to adopt the draft, moving everything behind closed doors. Newsom hasn't specified the changes he seeks but presumably wants to make the NEM overhaul at least marginally acceptable to the solar faction without alienating the utilities or, more importantly, their influential

Whatever happens, it is another reminder about the important role played by regulatory agencies and about the power that politicians have over what those agencies decree.



SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - What if every person in the United States, about 333,000,000 people had tried to hack into Sacramento County government information systems in 2021?

The reality is that the amount would still be shy by roughly 27 million. Last year, there were a whopping 360 million unauthorized attempts to connect to Sacramento County information systems, and each of them was successfully blocked by network filters. At the same time, email filters were successfully blocking 145 million malicious email messages.

Attempts Network and email filters are just two of the ways Sacramento County's Department of Technology (DTech) is working vigorously to protect the confidentiality, integrity and accessibility of the County's information systems and the data within them.

Some other ways:

Every day, cybercriminals try to trick Sacramento County employees into clicking malicious links. Thanks to DTech's ongoing Security Awareness training required for the entire workforce, employees are becoming more sophisticated about these persistent "phishing" attempts. In the fourth quarter of 2021, employee and contractor phishing susceptibility was only 6.6 percent, compared to 17.6 percent in the fourth quarter of 2020, and compared to the overall government susceptibility rate of 26 percent.

To prevent cybercriminal takeovers of County accounts, DTech has implemented two-factor authentication, which requires users to verify their sign-in to County systems, webmail, and other external-facing

Whenever a vulnerability is discovered in systems or workstations, DTech takes quick and thorough action to implement a software patch. Today, 99 percent of critical and important security patching is being completed within 30 days.

"The fact is, we are so focused on cybersecurity that most of our 14,000+ Sacramento County employees have no idea of the millions of malicious attacks we are blocking and intercepting on our network and email systems every single day. It is now our reality that all U.S. government agencies, big or small, are a target for cybercriminals from all over the globe. We make every effort to be one step ahead of the millions who try to break in," said, CIO and DTech Director

Each workday, County workforce members go about their tasks knowing that although there is an army of cybercriminals constantly seeking to steal County data or disrupt operations, only a very tiny fraction of these attempts will succeed. DTech's mission is to keep shrinking that tiny fraction.

Self Employed with Retiree Benefits... Why Do I Need Part B??

We saw your answer about Medicare Part B in an article online and our situation is different. My wife and I will turn 65 me in March and Carol in May. I have signed up

for Medicare Part A only and Carol will enroll for Part A soon.

I retired 2 years ago with fantastic retiree benefits for both me and my wife. Currently, I am self-employed and paid as a 1099 contract worker, but I do not have health benefits from that company.

We do not see a need to sign up for Medicare Part B because we are covered under an existing employer retiree plan. Are we correct in this assumption of not enrolling in Part B? Neither the HR department nor Medicare can give us a straight answer.

When do you advise us to sign up for Part B? Thanks,

Great Medicare question ... I would advise you to enroll in Part B NOW because both you and Carol are in your Medicare Initial Enrollment period. Not enrolling in Medicare Part B can cause you to experience a "Medicare nightmare."

I did a Medicare consultation for a person that is also self-employed, but was given wrong advice from a well-meaning friend about delaying his Part B. His Medicare nightmare is now starting...

Medicare recognizes "true" company and union health plans with the Medicare recipient working full- time for that **company** for the working employee and non-working covered spouse to be able delay Part B without receiving the famous Medicare Part B penalty.

The Medicare and You Handbook states "COBRA and retiree health coverage does not count as current info@tonisays.com

employer coverage." Individual health plans also are not considered a current employer coverage for those that are self-employed.

The self-employed person that I consulted with is now 66 and will receive a 10% penalty for each year due to not enrolling in Part B at the right time.
