

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) is determined to help drivers age 65 and older maintain their driving independence through the support of a yearlong federal grant, Keeping Everyone Safe (KEYS) XIII. The CHP will continue to offer this in-person and virtual traffic safety program emphasizing roadway safety and mobility for California's senior drivers.

The Age Well, Drive Smart class is an education program specifically designed to help seniors tune up their driving skills, refresh their knowledge of the rules of the road, and discuss normal age-related physical changes and how they affect driving ability. Since 2015, the CHP has conducted over 1,800 senior driver traffic safety presentations, reaching more than 100,000 people.

"The CHP is committed to helping seniors drive safer," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "This course is designed to assist the state's most experienced drivers in refreshing their driving skills and ultimately

saving lives." The CHP invites California's older drivers to attend a free two-hour Age Well, Drive Smart class that provides senior drivers the tools to driving safer and driving longer. The class is offered at local CHP Area offices as well as many community centers. It is a great way for seniors to educate themselves, evaluate their driving abilities, and improve their driving skills.

To attend a class, either in person or virtually, contact a CHP Area office near you for available dates and times.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Fly to the Slopes with SMF

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento region had its first major rainstorm of 2021 in October, which brought huge amounts of snow to the Sierra. So much in fact, several Tahoe ski resorts opened weeks earlier than planned which could be a sign of an incredible ski season to come! Whether you're heading to Lake Tahoe's spectacular slopes or to the Rocky Mountains and beyond, Sacramento International Airport (SMF) can get you to the snow quickly. SMF offers direct flights and easy connections to many major ski destinations.

Locally, Lake Tahoe is home to 15 ski resorts, 477 miles of slopes, 146 lifts and views you won't find anywhere else in the world. Ski racing began in North Lake Tahoe in the 1860s, when gold miners decided to attach boards to their feet and skim down the slopes, and the first resort was built in 1924. Today, there's a resort for every kind of snow junkie – skiers, snowboarders, beginners and experts. SMF is approximately 100 miles from Tahoe and offers numerous nonstop flights from major U.S. hubs. Making both the north and south shores easily accessible.

For Northern Californians who are venturing outside of the state, flights from SMF can get you to some of the country's best ski resorts in no time.

The Rocky Mountains stretch from British Columbia south to New Mexico, with dramatic mountain vistas, breathtaking ski terrain and as much as 33-feet of snow per year. SMF has nonstop flights to Denver (DEN) on United Airlines, Southwest Airlines and Frontier Airlines, allowing you easy access to some of the Rockies' best ski resorts. Echo Mountain and Loveland Ski Area are about an hour away

from DEN, while Breckenridge and Copper Mountain are about a 90-minute drive.

Aspen is a spectacular year-round destination, but it is best known for its winter sports. Not into downhill, but still want to play in the snow? Aspen's four mountains offer cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and winter hiking trails. Off the slopes, Aspen has a vibrant dining with diverse culinary options both off and on the mountain. A bit further south, the old west vibe of downtown Telluride compliments the glamour of Aspen. The rustic town has been called the #1 Ski Resort in North America. Tucked into a canyon surrounded by 14,000-foot peaks, Telluride was designated a National Historic Landmark District in 1964, preserving the feel of Colorado's 1870s silver rush-era. The town is also home to a vibrant arts district, with galleries, performance spaces and

Salt Lake City (SLC) is also a short hop from SMF on both Delta Airlines and Southwest Airlines. Mother Nature delivers an average of 500 inches of snow to Utah's mountains every year and many of the best resorts are within an hour's drive from SLC. Park City, home of the Sundance Film Festival in January, has fabulous shopping and dining options as well as snow biking, snowshoeing, tubing, ice skating and sleigh rides nearby.

Western Canada's renowned Whistler Blackcomb Resort can be accessed via several nonstop flights to Seattle (SEA) on Alaska Airlines, Southwest and Delta. Once you land, drive into beautiful British Columbia to one of the largest ski resorts in North America with a lift that can take you to an elevation of 7,350 feet.

Proven to Decrease DUI Crashes, ACCESS Launches Nationwide Program

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The Honorable Richard A. Vlavianos, in front of the California state capitol and surrounded by other Public Safety and Law Enforcement Officials. announced the launch of a new, nationwide non-profit organization designed to treat high risk and repeat DUI offenders. The new non-profit, ACCESS, launches with a foundation of learnings and track record of saving lives as proven through a pilot that's been active in

"After nearly 15 years and more than 5,000 participants, we've seen firsthand the difference this approach can make in changing behaviors and saving lives," said Chair of ACCESS and California Superior Court Judge Richard A. Vlavianos. "Each day, roughly 28 people die in drunk driving related car crashes and it's only fitting we make this announcement today as we kick off National Impaired Driving Prevention Month."

Current DUI and Drug Courts make an undeniable impact treating a smaller, more targeted population in need of

more significant support. ACCESS extends a similar approach to the remaining 70% of repeat DUI offenders that don't qualify for traditional DUI court. A recent study of the 5,200 participants indicates the concept is significantly changing behaviors with an 80% completion rate and most encouraging, a 19% decrease in DUI crashes. The six-year longitudinal study also found that participants did not revert to the norm upon completion of the program, indicating signs of long-term behavioral change.

"Existing special courts work with high-risk offenders who have high treatment needs, while ACCESS fills the gap by

focusing on offenders who may be high risk, but don't require the same level of treatment," said Judge Vlavianos. "To make an impact, we needed to ensure the ACCESS program was scalable and affordable. I'm excited that we can provide monitoring, education and training to repeat DUI offenders at a fraction of the cost of typical treatment programs, at about \$10,000 less per participant."

Discussions with multiple state law enforcement and judicial officials interested in launching ACCESS are currently underway. Those with questions or interested in learning more are encouraged to visit chooseaccess.org.

Sacramento Men Convicted of Stealing Catalytic Converters

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - Dao Xiong, 44, and Shaneel Lal, 38, of Sacramento were convicted of conspiracy to commit a felony and grand theft for stealing catalytic converters in Yolo, Sacramento, Placer, El Dorado, Napa, Butte, Alameda, and Contra Costa Counties.

A catalytic converter is part of a vehicle's exhaust system. They often contain precious metals such as platinum, gold, rhodium, and palladium that have high value in the metal recycling market and make them an item of choice among thieves and crime rings. Replacement costs for catalytic converters range from \$1,000 to \$3,000 and often it can take weeks or months for an automotive repair shop to get the right catalytic

The investigation began in September 2020 after a Davis resident reported to police that his catalytic converter had been stolen from his Toyota Prius. Detectives with the Davis Police Department's Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving (COPPS) Unit launched an investigation and were able to obtain a surveillance video from a nearby car that helped identify the suspect's vehicle. Through surveillance and the assistance of the Folsom

Police Department, detectives were able to identify Xiong and Lal. Detectives monitored their activities as they traveled to multiple counties, with Xiong as the driver and Lal as the passenger. They appeared to be "scouting" neighborhoods. "Scouting" is searching or casing an area to engage in criminal activity. Electronic surveillance revealed that Xiong and Lal scouted neighborhoods during the daytime or early evening hours and then returned to the same locations later in the night or early morning hours. Official theft reports were made to local law enforcement agencies and the surveillance data matched the location and timeframe for catalytic converter thefts.

On October 23, 2020, Xiong and Lal were stopped by Davis Police officers and found with catalytic converters in their possession. Based on surveillance data and theft reports, these catalytic converters were believed to have been stolen out of Napa County. Charges were filed against Xiong and Lal; however, due to the judicial "zero bail" policy at the time, Xiong and Lal were released from custody. While out of custody, they continued to steal catalytic converters until they were arrested again by Davis Police detectives on February 2, 2021, at the Thunder Valley Casino in Placer County. Between September 17, 2020, and February 2, 2021, Xiong and Lal were believed to have stolen 64 catalytic converters from eight counties. The total loss amount is still being determined; however, it is expected to be approximately \$100,000.

District Attorney Jeff Reisig stated, "Catalytic converter theft is not victimless and is not just another 'property crime.' It impacts the livelihood and financial stability of many individuals. People are unable to drive their cars, get to work, or pick up their kids because of these thieves. These crimes will not be tolerated and this plea sends a message that law enforcement takes these thefts seriously."

Yolo County Deputy District Attorney Matt DeMoura, who prosecuted this case for Yolo and seven other counties stated, "this prosecution would not have been possible without the dedicated efforts of the Davis Police Department's Community Oriented Policing and Problem Solving (COPPS) Unit and the Folsom Police Department."

Xiong and Lal will be sentenced on January 10, 2022, in front of the Honorable Timothy Fall, who presided over the plea. Each is expected to receive 6 years in jail pursuant to a plea agreement.

Sacramento County Grand Jury Recruiting for 2022-23

Sacramento County Superior Court Press Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento County's Superior Court announced today that it has officially opened its application process seeking new jurors to serve on the 2022-23 Sacramento County Grand Jury. Nineteen Sacramento County residents, and 11 alternates, will be selected from among the qualified applicants to volunteer for the term which runs from July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023.

The Grand Jury is the independent watchdog over the county's government agencies and services. Jurors investigate the performance of county, city, and local governing entities ranging from school districts to the criminal justice system to health and welfare agencies. Additionally, the Sacramento County Grand Jury is authorized to hear criminal indictments, and jurors have the rare opportunity to visit detention facilities throughout the region.

"The Grand Jury is entrusted by the public to investigate and report on local government operations and to ensure responsibilities are

being fulfilled honestly and with integrity," explains Grand Jury Foreperson Deanna Hanson. "It is also our duty to make certain the public understands our work and has the opportunity to be involved."

The current Grand Jury recently issued a report on COVID-19 vaccine mandates for K-12 public schools. It also received significant news media coverage earlier this month on its report regarding the serious safety concerns facing the Del Paso Manor Water District. Anyone may file a complaint against a county government entity with the Grand Jury for review and investigative consideration. All Grand Jury activities are conducted in secrecy.

Jurors act as volunteers and receive a small stipend for their work. To be considered as a Grand Juror, applications must be received by January 28, 2022. Anyone applying must be a Sacramento

County resident over the age of 18. Further qualification requirements are available on the Grand Jury website. Those who initially qualify will be interviewed, with the final Grand Jury empanelment taking place on June 3, 2022. To apply, visit the Grand Jury website at: www.sacgrandjury.org.

Village Improvements Go to Bid Next Month

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - The Measure J Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) met on December 7 to hear updates about planned improvement projects in the Fair Oaks Recreation and Park District

In addition to the \$29.5 million in Measure J funds, FORPD has applied for various county, state, and federal grants to supplement the amount of funding available for District improvement projects. In total, over \$1 million in additional grant funding has been approved, with \$10.1 million in requests still pending.

FORPD is eligible to apply for California's Prop. 68 Grant Program (California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018) to increase park space. The District's \$5.9 million application in Round 3 was rejected, but they have reapplied for the same amount for Round 4 funding, and that application is still pending. And the District was approved for \$250,000 in Prop. 68 Recreational Infrastructure Revenue Enhancement (RIRE) funding and \$172,952 in Prop. 68 Per Capita funding. Another \$560,929 was approved through the federal House Community Project Funding. Still pending is another application for \$4.2 million in Congressionally Directed

Spending. A recent local application for funding through Sacramento County's Electric Vehicle Incentive Project was approved, and the District will be awarded \$85,000 as reimbursement for the cost of installing charging stations for electric vehicles in seven parking spaces in the Village. Those charging stations are required by the County, and the parking spaces will be exclusively for use by electric vehicles. The District is still determining the guidelines for those spaces, but Aho said it is likely that the District will decide to put a time limit on the spaces, and that additional time will incur a fee paid to the District.

BOC member Barbara Sestito pointed out that there are limited parking spaces available in the Village and asked how the time limits would impact theatre attendees, because shows would likely run beyond the free parking limit. FORPD Administrative Assistant Paula Lucas explained that the District can impose whatever guidelines they choose, so they could pause the fee collection on show dates.

The BOC also heard an overview of the permit fees paid to Sacramento County during the design review process for the Village improvement projects, with an approximate total of almost \$95,000 in fees. "Those keep piling up," said Aho, "and they just keep coming and keep coming and keep coming."

Aho said that they have reached out to District 3 County Supervisor Rich Desmond about how costly these fees are, but Aho explained that the County Board of Supervisors votes to approve these fee schedules, so it's not possible to get any special treatment for the District. "We can share our frustrations with this, which we have, and they may or may not address it over time," said Aho. "We're keeping a fair record of things, and we'll eventually go compile all this back and give it to Rich and say, 'Hey this is a substantial amount of money that we've paid for fees."

But he explained that in a way, the

review process and associated fees can save the District some money in the long run, because the process can uncover errors that cost them more to fix later. For example, in the fire district plan review, they found that the planned water pressure for overhead sprinklers on the amphitheatre stage was lower than required for that location. "If plan review had not caught that, then we wouldn't have gotten an occupancy permit, and the cost to re-do that after we'd put it in would have been much higher," said Aho. "So, did we get anything out of it? Yes and no.'

When issues are discovered, the District's architects have to make adjustments to the plan, which is an additional cost to the District, and then the plan has to be resubmitted to the County for another review, which incurs another fee. To plan for these costs, 33% is added for soft costs on top of the total project cost, but Aho said they are currently a little above that percentage.

BOC Member Keith Walter said, "Obviously surprises occur, unexpected discoveries occur, but we hired a set of professionals who have done these kinds of projects before, built in a certain amount of contingency - if we're running above those, is it because there's something unique about Sacramento County, something unique about the project? Where did the process break down?"

Aho said, "It really comes down to our project." He gave examples of a retaining wall and a sink hole above the Community Clubhouse and an unknown septic tank under the salon building. "We have a park that was built without plans, without design, that was built by volunteers and just kind of a hodge-podge type of group for the last 75 years. It has never gone through this kind of renovation before, so you're finding all kinds of things in there," said Aho. "When you've got a park like that, I don't know what to do. We're not done yet." They are increasing the contingency for contractors from 15% to 20%, because Aho believes many more issues will be discovered once they start digging.

The project may end up taking longer than expected, but 18 months from the start of construction is still the approximate timeline right now. Aho said he can't offer a better answer until the construction crews actually get in there and start the work, because who knows what they will find. With the scale of the project and the age of the buildings, Aho said, "Honestly, this is one of the most frustrating projects in my career. ... I think it's just that sheer volume, to me, is what makes it harder than anything else. It's not a small project, it's an \$18 million dollar project" and there are a lot of unknowns.

Construction bids for the Village improvements will be requested in January, and the District plans to offer an extended deadline of 45 days to allow more contractors time to submit. Aho estimates the contract will be awarded sometime in March.

During this last meeting of 2021, BOC members submitted their expenditure reviews, fulfilling that annual requirement to oversee the Measure J funds spent in the last year. And they closed the meeting with a vote to continue holding virtual meetings through the winter. They plan to revisit the question of in-person meetings in the spring. The next meeting is scheduled for January 4, 2022.

If you set a financial goal, a good accountability partner isn't going to be the friend who always asks you to go shopping. Studies have shown that having

partner increases the likelihood of achieving a goal dramatically.

And finally, make sure you reward yourself along the way. It's tough to stay motivated when hitting your goal takes a while. Lots of folks start out at full speed, only to see the momentum disappear over time. You might treat yourself to a night at the movies when you've paid off the first \$1,000 on your credit cards, or maybe a nice, new shirt when you've paid off half the card.

Sometimes life doesn't work out the way we think it will, Isaac. Our priorities can change, and our goals may change, too. If that's why you didn't make your resolutions happen this year, that's fine. Just don't make the mistake of thinking it's too late to change and improve your life!

Bera Votes to Strengthen **U.S. National Security**

Office of Representative Ami Bera, M.D.

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) -Representative Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-07) voted for the Fiscal Year 2022 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). The NDAA, which passed the House of Representatives with strong bipartisan support and provides the annual budget for the Department of Defense, includes three key amendments authored by Bera.

"Our service members are among the most hardworking and dedicated people our country has to offer, and they deserve our full and unwavering support," said Representative Bera, who serves as Chair of the House of Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Asia, the Pacific, Central Asia, and Nonproliferation. "That's why I proudly voted to provide a much needed pay raise for our brave men and women in uniform, while equipping

them with all the necessary tools to do their jobs safely and effectively. This defense authorization bill also strengthens U.S. national security and our abilities to confront growing threats facing our country at home and abroad, including by addressing strategic challenges posed by China, combatting climate change, improving deterrence against cyberattacks, and reinvigorating our global alliances and partnerships."

The Bera-supported legislation includes several critical provisions, including:

Providing a 2.7 percent pay increase for U.S. service members; and, making historic changes to the Uniform Code of Military Justice to better combat sexual assault in the military.

The bipartisan defense bill includes multiple Beraled amendments, including:

Authorizing U.S. participation in the Coalition

for Epidemic Preparedness Innovations (CEPI), a public-private partnership developing vaccines for COVID-19 and other highly infectious pathogens (The House passed in July Rep. Bera's Securing America's From Epidemics Act, authorizing U.S. participation in CEPI);

Supporting Taiwan's ability to defend against PRC military provocations by further assisting Taiwan's defensive asymmetric capabilities; and

Requiring Department of State and Department of Defense to report on the utilization of the Synchronized Predeployment and Operational Tracker (SPOT) data base to help expedite Special Immigrant Visa processing for our Afghan partners and allies.

Since arriving in Congress, Representative Bera has been a strong advocate for our military, service members, and veterans.

Suspect Arrested for Serial Sexual Assaults

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office and the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office announce the arrest of JD Wallace Simien (40) of Sacramento County for a series of violent sexual assaults. The assaults occurred between 2013 and 2014 in northern Sacramento County.

Despite investigative efforts at the time of the sexual assaults, no suspects were ever identified and the cases went cold. The suspect was referred to as the "Cloverleaf Rapist" over the years due to the proximity of the crime scenes to freeway entrances and exits, which resemble a cloverleaf pattern.

The cases remained unsolved until recently. Investigators from the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office and detectives from the Sacramento County Sheriff's

Office used Investigative Genetic Genealogy (IGG) to develop fact-finding leads which led them to JD Wallace Simien. This is the same investigative tool used to identify Joseph James DeAngelo (Golden State Killer and East Area Rapist) and Roy Waller (Nor Cal Rapist), who were both prosecuted for their crimes in Sacramento County. The arrest of Simien marks the sixth IGG case prosecuted in Sacramento County.

JD Wallace Simien is currently being held in the Sacramento County Main Jail without bail. He will be arraigned on Monday, November 8, 2021, in Sacramento County Superior Court. No further arrests are anticipated in this case. No additional information or booking photo is available at this time.
