Protecting Sacramento County Seniors

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - COVID-19 has profoundly impacted all of our lives. As we isolate from those closest to us family, friends, neighbors and colleagues – for older people living in the community or in long-term care settings, the trials are even greater. Social isolation is one of the greatest risk factors for elder abuse.

In California, elder abuse is significantly underreported. For every case of elder or dependent adult abuse known to agencies, 24 are unknown. June is observed as National Elder and Dependent Adult Abuse Awareness Month, a statewide effort to increase awareness of elder and dependent adult abuse and to increase reporting of suspected abuse, not only in the month of June but all year long.

There are numerous forms of maltreatment and abuse, such as: physical, sexual, emotional and financial abuse, as well as neglect and abandonment. Elder and dependent adult abuse does not discriminate. Any adult 65 years and older or an adult between the ages of 18 to 65 that requires extra care due to physical or mental limitations can be a victim.

"Social isolation can be difficult for seniors even in the best of times," said Ruth MacKenzie. "We have to help our seniors feel connected especially during COVID-19 and make sure they have access to available local services so they can stay healthy and safe. Staying connected, phoning older adults, checking on an older neighbor, writing a card or letter, can all be positive steps to ensure public safety and social justice."

Seniors are in the highest risk for severe complications from COVID-19, during this challenging time, Sacramento County APS wants to emphasize that there are resources that are available in this time of

companies are rolling out a record 24 new fireworks in the Golden State this season nearly double the previous mark. The 2020 freshman class also includes one new limitedmore buy one get one free and mix and match deals to woo buyers.

That's a lot of shapes, sizes, colors and prices among the rookie lineup, and while variety usually bodes well for fundraising non-profits running the stands, perplexed consumers will ponder the obvious questions: What's new? What's loud? What's unique?

How long does it last? What gives me the most bang for my buck?

Help has arrived. Our annual and unbiased fireworks buyers guide has reviews of the new items and the very best of the returning rest. For the 19th year, new fireworks are graded on a 5-star scale, judged on performance, duration, distinctiveness and value.

Promotions are noted where applicable. Every Phantom firework this season is a buy one get one; the freebie can be the same item or any firework of like or lesser price. TNT is countering with its own mix and match deals

plus limited-edition items in commemoration of the company's centennial anniversary of selling fireworks. DFS, which TNT took over in California last year, save for a handful of locations up in the Redwood Coast, tends to have lower prices overall and a wider range of brands.

A star-spangled shoutout to the Sacramento Fire Department for cooperation with this season's test. Special thanks to Fire Marshal Jason Lee and Capt. Keith Wade.

FOUNTAIN XL (TNT), \$60 - Burn time is shorter than most 500-gram finales at this price point, but this special-

edition fountain proves that duration is sometimes overrated. Wows with a mesmerizing mélange of effects and medley of transitions - droplets to fish to crackle to birthday cake to a shock-andawe eruption. Here for this season only. 80 seconds. ★★★★

COLORAMA (DFS), \$52.99 – Pretty droplets of gold, orange, green and red, and a strong crackling finish aren't enough to compensate for slow tube-to-tube transitions and an uneven performance. 110 seconds. **

CAPTAIN NUCLEAR FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$49.99 FOR TWO - Decent crackling sparks mixed with pearls, chrysanthemums, multi-colored glitter and flowers build to a less than satisfying climax. 80 seconds. **

FIERY MEADOW FLOWER FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$49.99 FOR TWO - Proving that hybrid fireworks often make for big crowd pleasers is this combo fountain-wheel featuring titanium crackles and spinning finale. On a smooth surface, the centrifugal force makes this unique rookie rotate, 68 seconds, ***

FLOWER PATCH KIDS (TNT), \$40 FOR TWO -The first few seconds are absolutely gorgeous with deep red droplets that produce the prettiest start of any California firework. The rest of the

flowers in this patch aren't nearly as beautiful.

77 seconds. ** TAKE A HIT (TNT), \$40 FOR TWO - Love the rarely seen lavender droplets and nice palms, but this batter got two bases on a bloop single and error. 75 seconds.★★

JUNGLE FLOWER (TNT), \$39.99 - The intense crackle and vivid colors are pleasing. Just wished it had a more exciting overall and longer performance for the price. 49 seconds.

PINK ICE (TNT), \$30 FOR TWO - Nice to see pink, but blink and you miss it. And what's with the 10-second delay between tubes? 26

COSMIC VELOCITY FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99

FOR TWO - Intense crackling fountain with pretty reds and greens, but needs BOGO promo to offset fleeting duration. 52 seconds. ★★★

GALACTIC RADIANCE FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - Sub-minute burn time isn't cool, but rest of this colorful crackle-crazy fountain is. 46 seconds. ★★★

ELECTRIC MANIPULATION FOUNTAIN (PHANTOM), \$21.99 FOR TWO - What's dubbed as a "silky blue explosion" in the second half makes up for an unimpressive opening of standard crackles and colors. 53 seconds. ★★★

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

countless other firefighting and rescue

Captain Harris noted that "all these things are simple in concept, but they are very difficult to execute, especially when you are at the limits of mental and physical endurance... and all under time constraints."

Physical fitness and overall health was also emphasized to reinforce proper physical training for the rigors of firefighting and the healthy lifestyle and nutrition choices required to ensure a long and healthy career.

Many fire service traditions were on display. Graduating Firefighters received their badges, took their oaths to serve the public, and received their probationary station and shift assignments. Chief Harms told the recruits, "You've each earned your badge; the challenge now is to live up to the traditions and standards that go along with that badge that will go along with you."

Chief Harms said to the 20-1 class passing on the advice of Metro Fire retirees, "Thirty years comes and goes by really quickly. Enjoy the good times, and know that there is going to be bad times along the way."

Due to restrictions on large gatherings the event was celebrated without families of the graduates and only District staff essential to the graduation ceremony was in attendance.

toxic materials are cut up and their fields separated. No longer considered a flag, the pieces may now be disposed of in other ways.

In 2013, Scoutmaster Josh Baker, former Vice Commander of Fair Oaks AL Post 383, saw the need for new sponsorship of a Folsom scout troop. The post agreed to fill the need and Folsom Boy Scout Troop 134 was chartered in 2013.

Baker noted that Americanism is one of the "cultures and pinnacles" of scouting. This relationship between the scouts and members of the post gives both the opportunity to come together and pay respect to the flag. Post members also serve as teachers to help scouts earn their badges towards becoming an Eagle Scout.

Flags are collected by both boy and girl scouts throughout the year and at different events. Flags that are worn and need to be retired can be given to scouting organizations or dropped off at a Veteran of Foreign Wars (VFW) or American Legion post. ★

Sac County Public Health **Order Amended Again**

Sacramento County Press Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -Sacramento County has an amended Public Health Order that will allow the relaxation of restrictions on low-risk businesses consistent from the direction of the State of California, to move further into Stage 3 of the state's Resilience Roadmap. The new Public Health Order became effective at 11:59 a.m. June 12.

Sacramento County is able to move further into Stage 3 because its Variance Attestation was approved by the state on

The following activities and venues are now allowable in the amended Public Health Order as listed in Appendix B of the Order, provided they have implemented the required health and safety protocols outlined in Appendix A of the

Bars and wineries; Hotels, lodging and short-term rentals; Campgrounds, RV parks and Outdoor Recreation; Gyms and fitness facilities; Pools; Museums, galleries, zoos and aquariums; Family entertainment centers; Movie theaters; Day camps; Tribal casinos; Cardrooms, satellite wagering facilities and racetracks

Additionally, businesses must include a policy for face coverings in their protocol and provide face coverings to staff when six feet of social distance is not possible.

"In spite of recent re-openings, the virus risk is still here," said Dr. Peter Beilenson, director of Health Services. "We have seen an increase in COVID cases and hospitalizations recently, in large part due to social gatherings, and to keep these cases down we need to remember to be sensible while we're being sociable.

"Continue to maintain social distancing requirements of six feet or more, practice good hand hygiene, stay home as much as possible and remember that gatherings of people not from the same household inside houses are prohibited."

The Health Order supersedes previous orders and is in effect until it is rescinded or amended by the Sacramento County Health Officer.

The best defense against COVID-19 continues to be: Staying at home and physical distancing; Wearing a face covering wherever possible; Washing hands frequently; Avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands; Avoiding being around people with COVID-19 symptoms

USE ONLY SAFE & SANE FIREWORKS

Because of risk of fire danger, please only use those fireworks that have been certified as "safe and sane" when celebrating this year's Independence

Dangerous illegal fireworks like aerial shells and other flying devices pose a significant fire hazard, potentially allowing sparks to fall onto roofs and dry brush. If you are aware about illegal fireworks being used, please call the Sheriff via restored decorum beginthe non-emergency number 916-874-5115 or if Day weekend and the an emergency situation ban is also applicable for

exists dial 911.

Penalties for possessing

illegal fireworks start with five days in county jail and the sanctions increase if the fireworks were actually used, or if child endangerment occurred.

Even "safe and sane" fireworks can pose a hazard if abused or not exercised with good judgment. Fire officials advise that you should set off fireworks far from dry grass or vegetation, and soak used fireworks in water.

PARKWAY ALCOHOL BAN

This Fourth of July there will be a complete ban on alcohol consumption and possession both on land and in the water within the American River Parkway between Hazel and Watt avenues. An exception exists for Ancil Hoffman Golf Course.

Sadly, the volume of missing pets significantly increases during the Fourth of July holiday. Leaving a pet outside unattended even in a fenced yard or on a chain can lead to disastrous consequences. In their fear, pets who normally would not leave the yard may escape and become lost, or become entangled in their chain, risking injury or death.

And please make sure your pets are wearing identification tags so if they become lost, they can be returned home promptly.

According to the latest data, in 2018, it is conservatively estimated that more than \$5 million annually is lost to financial abuse annually within Sacramento County. At least 40 percent of this is due to scams. Therefore, it is important to know the signs of fraud scams making their way through Sacramento

IRS: Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it can be paid through a wire transfer; Grandparent Scam: Caller claims to be the victim's grandchild traveling in a foreign country who has been arrested and needs money; Sweepstakes/Lottery Scams: Caller says the victim is a winner and needs to make

a payment to unlock the supposed prize; Sacramento County has a 24-hour hotline for reporting abuse of older adults and disabled adults who may be physically or financially abused, neglected or exploited. The local APS number is (916) 874-9377. To report suspected abuse of an elder in a nursing home, residential care facility for the elderly or assisted living facility, contact the State CRISIS line: 1-800-231-4024. To report abuse in all long-term care facilities, call: Ombudsman Services of Northern California at (916) 376-8910.

Public or Private, July 4th Fireworks will be Different

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

This is the first in a two-part series covering how the Sacramento Valley will celebrate Independence Day with traditional fireworks in an untraditional year. Watch for our annual fireworks buyers guide in the next issue.

Between California's monthslong shelter-in-place order and other "don'ts" issued by governments of all levels during the coronavirus pandemic, citizens might feel that they're living in the home of the brave, but not so much the land of the free

That sentiment could make this coming Independence Day the most important one since the first.

"I don't disagree with that," said John Kelly, vice president of TNT Fireworks, the nation's largest reseller of perhaps the most recognizable symbol of the Fourth of July after Old Glory. "People are feeling constrained in response to the coronavirus crisis. Social distancing has gone on since winter, and for those who have suffered through the loss of loved ones and jobs, this ordeal has been an especially painful journey."

One way humans cope through crisis is by sharing happy and entertaining physical experiences, even in the era of social distancing. It's no surprise, then, that Kelly, part of a consumer industry hoping to salvage a season, proclaimed that "celebrating America's birthday with fireworks is about as happy and entertaining as it gets."

Bought for therapeutic or patriotic purposes, consumer fireworks sold by non-profit organizations out of temporary stands in Sacramento County and other areas where legal will be how many Americans get their bang-boom on for the nation's 244th birthday. The reason is scant few of the 16,000 public fireworks displays typically staged in country on the Fourth of July are expected to go forward, according to the American Pyrotechnics Association.

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Cash-strapped non-profits are hoping for brisk business with so few professional displays being staged this season.

parades, concerts and fireworks displays nationwide," said APA Executive Director Julie Heckman. "Due to social distancing mandates related to COVID-19, the skies will be dark above the vast majority of cities, towns and municipalities."

Giving a rare green light to skies of red, white and blue are the cities of Yuba City and Elk Grove, and the Folsom Chamber of Commerce. The Bi-County Fireworks Show will wow residents of Yuba City and Marysville on the Fourth. The Folsom display, taking place on July 3 above Folsom Ranch, makes up for the cancellation of a fireworkssparked pro rodeo held every Fourth of July weekend. Further south, Elk Grove has approved an aerial show for July 4. Instead of setting off fireworks over Elk Grove Regional Park and the 22,000 or so gathered there, the staging area will be at an undisclosed location so that residents can watch from their homes.

Yuba City, Folsom and Elk Grove are lighting up, but from Rancho Cordova and Sacramento to South Lake Tahoe and Davis, aerial displays have been grounded to the disappointment of pyro fans and the detriment of pyro producers.

"All the more reason for the general public to stock up on consumer fireworks and plan a backyard or neighborhood celebration - of course, abiding by social distancing guidelines," said the APA's

Many of the nearly 33 jurisdictions in Sacramento, Placer, Yolo and Yuba counties warm to consumer fireworks had left existing laws as-is at press time, while others may enact a one-year moratorium on sales that has no impact on use. Best to check with your local fire department before lighting. A list of "open" communities can be found at http://ca-fireworks.presskit247.com.

For most of the state including Sacramento County, June 28 starts a potentially big week for non-profits that could be more cash-strapped than usual

Whereas residents of other states can also let the sparks fly on New Year's, if not year-round, celebrating the anniversary of our country's fervent declaration of independence from Great Britain in 1776 is the occasion for which California consumers can legally light fireworks, and only the state-approved "safe and sane" variety.

Depending on ordinances in effect at the time, law-abiding revelers and sellers may need to wear masks and separate households by at least six feet during the show. Except for rules around personal protection equipment and distancing, buying fireworks may not be all that different from non-pandemic years.

said Kelly of TNT, which has its Northern California regional offices in Sacramento. "We're already selling out of stands where the volunteer salespeople and customers are separated by wood panels and chicken wire. Buyers don't touch product until purchase."

Phantom Fireworks, the state's second-largest fireworks reseller, is confident that patriotism, community support, a hunger for outdoor family amusement and the most favorable day of the week for a Fourth of July will outweigh any inconveniences associated with compliance.

"A weekend Independence Day is always great for fundraising, but with the fourth falling on a Saturday, that's even better," said Linda Hass-Kreman, Phantom's West Coast operations manager based in Sacramento. "A Saturday July Fourth means many among the workforce have that Friday off as a corporate holiday and the next day off as well being a Sunday. I think society is so ready to have fun outside the home, enjoying something separately, but together, that we're going to have one of the most special and successful fireworks seasons ever."

It's not as if the country doesn't have experience dealing with pandemics at this time of year. Smallpox, measles and other diseases had wary colonists shutting themselves in their houses at the time future president John Adams correctly predicted that the first Independence Day would be celebrated with "bonfires and illuminations."

Two and a half centuries later, American history will repeat itself when patriotic citizens ooh and aah to star-spangled fireworks under pandemic conditions.

"Fireworks are the most widely anticipated tradition of celebrating our nation's independence," Heckman said. "Americans are ready to celebrate and looking for something to do after being cooped up for so long, and many of us still are in parts of the country."

Through the generosity of the Gold River Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Gold River.

The killing of George Floyd was horrific - and the officers responsible have been arrested and will stand trial. But now politicians and activists are blaming everyone in a uniform. "Defund the police" has become the rallying call for protesters.

Activists want to strip money from law-enforcement, disband police, close jails and prisons, then divert public funds to community groups, counselors, and social workers for "community empowerment." What does that mean? It means instead of police and sheriffs enforcing the law, taxpayer funds will go to private nonprofits run by activists and programs like "Advance Peace" which pays gang members \$500 a month not to shoot each other.

How will reducing the number of police officers make the community safer? In 2018, police officers arrested 11,970 murderers, 495,900 violent criminals, and more than 1 million drunk drivers. In February of this year, a months-long investigation resulted in 518 arrests when police smashed a human trafficking ring and rescued hundreds of children who were being sold into prostitution. Do activists think that councilors and community groups are going to detain violent gang members, break human trafficking rings, or get drunk drivers off

an organized, well-funded, and well-trained police force offers enforcement ability on such a high level.

In Los Angeles, Mayor Eric Garcetti recently announced that he was going to "defund police" by cutting \$150 million from the LAPD budget. Cities like San Francisco, Portland, Minneapolis, and Baltimore have announced that they will pursue efforts to "defund police." Political "leaders" in Congress and State Houses have echoed the call and introduced legislation to cut funding for law enforcement - or punish jurisdictions who refuse to do so.

The vast majority of police budgets go to personnel, so the budget cut means one thing: firing police officers. Which officers will be fired? A common practice for addressing mass budget reductions through layoffs and that has been used by the LAPD in the past is LIFO (last in, first out). That means that Garcetti's "defund" policy will result in firing recent recruits - young black, Asian and Latino officers who were recruited from, and reflect, the very neighborhoods who are underrepresented and suffer themost from crime.

Sadly, this movement is not new. In 2015 Camden New Jersey pushed a "defund police" measure. They dismantled their department and disbanded the police officers' union. They placed some activists in oversight positions and hired most the police back - at a lower salary. Some believe the effort was really more about breaking the union than reforming the system. Today, many of the same complaints have returned.

Eliminating law enforcement is the opposite of a

our roads? No alternative to solution - we cannot abandon our communities to the whims of gangs and criminals who prey on neighborhoods. We do need to encourage investment in poor neighborhoods where crime is rampant, schools are failing, and hope is abandoned. Empowerment zones, school choice, and incentives for investment have seen tremendous success.

Communities that partner with police, rather than fight with them, have seen a marked improvement in crime reduction, complaints against police, and more recruitment of people from the community into law enforcement - community members who have relationships and earnestly want to make lives better - and have the training to enforce the law.

This rush to respond to "defund police" activists is not reform - it is retribution and appeasement. And it is dangerous. The result will be every community and every resident will be less safe.

We need more community engagement and understanding, not less. We should be investing in more training, recruiting, and community engagement, not eliminating prisons and defunding police.

SMUD Clearing Trees and Brush Near High-voltage Lines

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - SMUD vegetation management crews are busy clearing large areas of trees with high fuel loads and elevated fire risk in the Sierra foothills under and near highvoltage transmission lines. With the 2020 fire season approaching, tree and brush work is essential to SMUD's efforts to mitigate wildfire danger during the hot summer

months. Crews working in the Rescue area east of El Dorado Hills are conducting the latest in planned vegetation management work in El Dorado County that's been going on for several years. SMUD owns rights-of-way in its transmission line corridors that span forested areas all the way to Loon Lake in the Crystal Basin

The transmission lines move electricity from SMUD's hydroelectric plants in the Upper American River Project (UARP), which produce about 700 megawatts of electricity or about 20 percent of SMUD's customer demand. This carbon-free resource is especially valuable in the hot summer months when air conditioning load in SMUD's service territory can push demand to near peak levels.

Though SMUD doesn't serve El Dorado County, the community-owned electric company works directly with property owners to plan the work, which in some cases crosses private property near homes and businesses including orchards and vineyards. In many cases, property owners request the removal of trees and brush on their properties

as wildfire danger has become reflected pulse – like SONAR considerably more threatening in recent years.

"Managing this vegetation near our transmission lines that feed the SMUD grid is critical to keeping our system reliable," said SMUD Chief Energy Delivery Officer Frankie McDermott. "This exhaustive planning and work execution also go a long way in mitigating potential wildfire danger."

In fact, SMUD's comprehensive approach to vegetation management using industry best practices has delivered life- and property-saving results. The work aided firefighters in gaining control of the King Fire in 2014, which impacted SMUD's transmission lines near Camino. A key turning point came as SMUD's already-managed transmission line rights-of-way provided critical fire breaks for firefighters to stop the fire's spread. CAL FIRE officials even publicly acknowledged SMUD's vegetation management programs as critical factors in protecting the foothill communities of Camino, Pollock Pines and Apple Hill from the catastrophic King Fire.

SMUD patrols these lines annually, by truck, on foot and by helicopter. To identify trees proven to be historically associated with causing power outages. SMUD uses Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR) technology and a helicopter to efficiently and strategically pinpoint those trees for pruning or removal that are within defined clearance limits of SMUD's power poles, towers and lines. LiDAR measures distance to a target by illuminating it with an FAA-approved pulsed

laser light and measuring the

but with light instead of sound - producing digital 3D pictures of the target. The imaging technology is even capable of identifying chlorophyll, which makes plants green and is an accurate measurement of plant health, which is utilized to identify potential hazards from weak, dying or dead trees, the result of recent drought years.

SMUD also manages trees and brush below and near clearances in the neighborhoods with overhead lines in the SMUD service territory at least every 36 months. Some trees grow faster, and any potential situation that can cause an outage or safety issue is prioritized and addressed to ensure public safety and reliability.

Trees are beautiful and provide excellent natural benefits including comfort and energy savings from the shading canopy, but their growth needs to be managed in an environmentally friendly way. The elected SMUD Board of Directors makes Environmental Stewardship a Core Value. SMUD's "Do No Harm" edict coincides with public safety and electric reliability.

SMUD has also been recognized by the Right-of-Way Stewardship Council (ROWSC) for demonstrated excellence in managing the vegetation growth near the SMUD electrical system.





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
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
