November is National **Adoption** Month

SACRAMENTO COUNTY. CA (MPG) - In California, there are more than 62,000 youth living in foster care and more than 34,000 waiting for a permanent family. In Sacramento County alone, there are 1,690 children and youth in out-ofhome care with about 350 of them needing a loving and affirming forever family.

Each November during National Adoption Month, Sacramento County wants to remind the community that you can make a difference in the life of a child by becoming a resource parent/family. These resource parents, once known as foster parents, provide love, parental care, guidance and stability to children until they can either return to their parents or provide a permanent home through adoption or legal guardianship.

Whether you are married or single, gay or straight, a homeowner or a renter, an aunt, teacher or simply a loving person that wants to positively impact the life of a child, Sacramento County Department of Child, Family and Adult Services hopes you will consider fostering a child.

We have a particular need for new resource families that can help us move children from a group home setting to a family-based setting. The more families who can open their doors to our children and youth, the better. We are looking for resource families who are able to foster all ages, but particularly, teenagers, LGBTQ youth, African-American children. children with medical needs, emergency/last-minute placements and homes for sibling

Sacramento County supports, trains and offers guidance, support and assistance to resource families to make sure the journey is a positive transition. While reuniting children with their biological families is the primary goal, staff can help resource parents adopt or take legal guardianship when reunification is not possible. There is now only one approval process, which creates a continuous care experience for children, as they will not have to switch homes at the point of adoption.

On November 6, we pause our busy lives long enough to speak the names of thousands of California children who are waiting in foster care for the love and support of a permanent family. Sacramento County and several adoption agencies are hosting the 31st Annual Calling Out of Names at the State Capitol in Room 112 from 9:00 a.m. - 1:00

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) -Northridge Elementary School in Fair Oaks has a high concentration of lowincome students, many of whom don't have proper winter clothes to keep them warm. To help address this issue, Lyon Real Estate of Fair Oaks recently donated 90 brand-new coats to Northridge Elementary School for students in need. The racks of coats were added to the other clothing items and shoes available at the school.

The clothing donations began last spring after Northridge Principal Petra Luhrsen spoke to the Fair Oaks Rotary Club about the work being done by Kitty Flannagan, the school's community neighborhood liaison. Flannagan builds bonds of trust with the students and advocates for their needs, making sure

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The Gift of Time Together

A Son's Story of the Journey through His Father's Terminal Illness

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The relationship between a son and his dying father is beautifully chronicled in Russ Woody's new book, Tuesdays with Ted. The memoir is equal parts heartwarming and heartbreaking as it details the final months of Claude Woody's life and the lasting impact that time had on his son.

Claude, who was always known as Woody, served as a Marine in WWII and then worked for PG&E, a iob which required the family to move to a new area of California every couple years. Russ spent his teenage years in Fair Oaks, attending Bella Vista High School and then interning at a Sacramento TV station during college.


An Emmy and Golden Globe winning TV writer and producer, Russ has worked in television for more than 30 years on shows including Murphy Brown, Cybill, Mad About You, The Drew Carey Show, and The Middle. But it was the time he spent writing and producing Becker that would turn out to be his most significant project.

In 2001, after Becker had finished its third season, Russ learned that Woody had been diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) — a terminal neurodegenerative disease that affects nerve cells in the brain and the spinal cord, leading to gradual loss of motor function as the muscles in the body atrophy.

Russ wrote the book to both remember the precious time he spent with his father and to help his sons understand, since they were so young at the time. "I think by the time my father died, they were both 4 and

really understand what was going on," said Russ. The boys, Henry and Joe, have some memories of that time with their grandfather: bunk beds and pancake breakfasts, backyard forts and indoor racetracks. Russ said his main objective was "to put the story in perspective for them."

"In the last week of my dad's life, I had a conversation with him; I asked him about his regrets," said Russ. "He thought about it and he said he wished he'd spent more time with me when I was little." At that time, Russ was working long hours in the writers room at Becker, and he then made the decision that he would stop writing for sitcoms so he could have a more flexible schedule: "I wanted to spend that time with my boys, and I got to do that."

The experience with his father had a significant impact on how he relates to his own sons: "I'm so glad that both he and they got to spend that time together. ... I think about my memories of him, and conversations I had, and the conversations I had with the boys. ... It does affect you."

Woody "had a great capacity for taking what was and living with it," said Russ, grateful for every moment he was able to share with his father. In the book, Russ wrote that "with the ticking clock of ALS, the time I did spend with him was all the more intense. It forced me to recognize everything, to say everything, and that was a

Kidz, which provides tutoring services, and the Orangevale-Fair Oaks Food Bank, which provides snacks for kids while at school as well as a monthly donation of food to working families. Broad said the clothing and food are vital because kids "don't learn as well when they're hungry and wet and cold."

"The school is good at educating children but we're trying to help support that learning by providing food, clothing, shoes, coats, such a tremendous support

and a staff person that connects to the children," said Broad.

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

After their first bleak winter, half of their company died.

Did you dress up as a Pilgrim for Halloween shoes and buckled hats? Well, they didn't even wear black. But I bet you looked great! So when was the modern day Thanksgiving born? It was first celebrated as an

Presidents routinely proclaimed the day but the custom died out at the beginning of the 19 th century. But 1837 came around and so did Sarah Joseph Hale (She wrote the poem "Mary Had A Little Lamb") and initiated a campaign to reinstate the holiday. Lincoln finally proclaimed a national holiday in 1863. Suffice to day, our day of indulging, watching games and shopping came lots later and remains to this day. Let's just remember that we might go back to the beginning with a prayer for all we have to be thankful for. Reach out to someone alone or hurting and share. Does the amount you advise saving for a beginner emergency fund in Baby Step 1 double for a couple, or does it stay the same?

Whether you're single or married, Baby Step 1 of my plan is to save \$1,000 as quickly as possible for a starter emergency fund. This may not sound like a lot of cash to have on-hand in the event of an emergency, but you need to remember the \$1,000 figure is a temporary

Baby Step 1 is saving up \$1,000 for a beginner emergency fund. Baby Step 2 is paying off all debt, except your home. The vast majority of folks working my plan are debt-free, except for their mortgage, in two years or less. Then, you move to Baby Step 3, which is increasing your emergency

fund from \$1,000 to threeto-six months of household

In reality, we're talking about a pretty short period of time where you'd have just \$1,000 in emergency savings. Plus, it serves as an exercise in financial discipline. A lot of people have nothing saved before beginning the Baby Steps.

If that makes things seem a little scary at the start, it's not necessarily a bad thing. A healthy level of fear can be a fantastic motivator. I don't want anyone constantly living their lives in fear, but that added push that sense of urgency - can make you work harder to get out of debt, and move on the Baby Step 3, as quickly as possible!

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

Through the generosity of the Gold River Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Gold River.

I voted against the proposed emergency ordinance that would have blocked landlords from legally evicting tenants - and I wanted you to know why.

I voted against the ban on "no fault eviction" because it's a false promise that does nothing to address the core problem and actually might make it worse.

The problem is simple - we don't have enough housing, and scarcity drives up costs and reduces options.

The situation has received a lot of media attention about the emotion involved - and I do not diminish the stress a person who needs to find a new place to live must feel. But the coverage hasn't done an outstanding job of explaining the facts.

What they are terming "no fault eviction" is actually when a property owner doesn't offer a renewal at the end of a tenant's lease. Typically the property owners give tenants two months' notice - and most of the time, the tenant chooses to leave and find a new place to live. But sometimes they refuse to move out, and the owner is forced to evict them.

So why is there so much fervor? Because one apartment complex decided not to renew lessees for a large group of tenants that were on month-to-month leases.

I have great sympathy and compassion for the renters who were impacted by this isolated situation,

actions of this particu- that build multifamily houslar apartment owner. After this incident happened, financial assistance was negotiated for the tenants who received termination notices. These tenants will receive \$2,500 in relocation or rent assistance plus the return of their full security deposit from the current owners. In addition, several tenants with Housing Choice Vouchers may be able to stay at the property after its sale to the new owners.

This proposal, as well as state-wide Rent Control that is coming January 1st, both suffer from the same misguided notion that renters will be better off with government controls on rent. Nothing is further from the truth.

Economists across the world, as well as everyone with basic knowledge of economics, understand that this is simply not the case. While price controls do hold down costs in the short-run for current tenants, in the long-run, it decreases rent inventory and affordability and creates blight in the surrounding neighborhood. In short, it increases housing costs, discourages construction of more affordable units, and reduces housing options.

Laws like rent control and bans on "no-fault evictions" are barriers to building the housing and apartments we desperately need. They create economic pressure for landlords to convert their properties to different uses entirely.

My supervisorial colleague, who has been so publicly critical of my vote, should review the results of similar policies in areas like San Francisco and Los nities of Citrus Heights, Angeles. Then he needs Folsom, Orangevale, to ask himself if he would Antelope, Rio Linda, consider either of those cit- Elverta, Gold River, ies affordable.

ing. The results showed that the Sacramento metropolitan area is one of the hardest places to build multifamily housing in the entire country. Nationally, our region ranked 56 out of 58 for the most barriers to building multifamily housing. Meaning it is more difficult to build apartments in the Sacramento area than the surrounding areas of Honolulu, New York, or San Diego.

This is unacceptable to me - and for anyone who honestly wants to deal with the housing shortage and price inflation. We have to do better. That's why I will hold a series of meetings with county staff, apartment owners, builders, and tenants' rights groups. Together, we will find out what can actually be done to solve the problem and reduce barriers preventing us from building new multifamily and affordable

housing in our County. I want real solutions, like offering tax incentives to property owners who keep rent low and build new units. Or allowing housing projects to get the same incentives and environmental exemptions sports facilities get.

I do not have all the answers; however, it is clear to me that we cannot continue to pass half-baked policies that feel good but in reality, make the sit-


