Improvements Planned for the Community Clubhouse and District **Playgrounds**

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - The Measure J Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) met on September 3 to hear updates about some upcoming Fair Oaks Recreation and Park District park improvement projects.

District Administrator Mike Aho explained that the District hopes to replace the front door of the Community Clubhouse with one that is ADA (American's with Disabilities Act) compliant. They also plan to set up an independent Wi-Fi system for the building that the public can access while using the parks. The Wi-Fi, new ADAcompliant door, and other aesthetic improvements to the front entrance are planned as part of the larger Village Park, Plaza Park, and Amphitheatre improvement project, which will hopefully be funded by both Measure J and Prop. 68 funds.

Other enhancements and renovations to the interior of the Community Clubhouse are planned as a separate project to be funded entirely by Measure J funds. Aho explained that most of the proposed improvements to the Community Clubhouse will take place at the same time as the Village Park, Plaza Park, and Amphitheatre project: Aho said, "We don't want to impact that area twice.'

Aho shared the District's 'working list" of priority improvements for the Community Clubhouse: remodel restrooms in the downstairs meeting room, install new energy-efficient windows, upgrade the HVAC system and ducts, replace ceiling tiles and paint the ceiling, and replace the antiquated lighting in the main room. Other possible improvements include replacing the stage curtain, improving the face of the stage and the under-stage storage area, renovating the back stairway, replacing trim and floorboards, remodeling the Fireside Room off the foyer, purchasing assisted-hearing devices to be available for those with hearing impairments, upgrading the audiovisual equipment used for presentations and events, and increasing the size of the storage room door so it's easier to get the equipment

History Takes Its Place in The Village

A Local Monument Honors Fair Oaks Early Beginnings

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - An Historic achievement was accomplished this week in Fair Oaks, one that took the kind of leadership between neighbors that will live on for many years to come.

A team of community members pulled together to complete the Fair Oaks Founder's Monument project with a dedication ceremony held on September 20 in the Fair Oaks Village.

The project was the original brainchild of Karyn Barthmore, then Honorary Mayor with the Fair Oaks Chamber of Commerce. She helped raise the initial funding through her campaign efforts in 2015 and 2016 to build the local monument to the history of Fair Oaks for visitors and locals to enjoy.

Over the many early months, and then years, the project hit a number of challenges to the design and implementation, pushing it back and requiring the help of local government and agencies to accommodate the monument's location. But everyone involved saw

Volunteers Assemble Care Packages on 9/11

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - On Wednesday, September 11, Move America Forward (with support from the Rancho Cordova Chamber of Commerce) held its second annual Packathon to commemorate the 18th anniversary of the terror attack on September 11, 2001. The event was held at Move America Forward's Rancho Cordova headquarters, where volunteers worked together with veterans, activeduty military members, and Gold Star parents to assemble care packages for soldiers serving on the front lines in Afghanistan and Iraq.

The organization shipped 911 care packages — which include letters of support along with food and personal care items — and volunteers packed approximately 500 additional boxes. Danny Gonzalez, director of communications for Move America Forward, said, "I ask that everyone do something nice for a soldier, even if it's just thanking them for their service. ... Let's make 9/11 a day when Americans come together and really unify as one people and make it a day of service."

12, 2001, and chose to ship out just 72 hours later. After getting through basic training, Sergeant Raver was deployed on his first tour in Afghanistan. "I was able and willing, and I decided to make that commitment."

Williams, Commander of the 940th Air Refueling Wing at Beale Air Force Base. Colonel Williams is a veteran of Operation Enduring Freedom

Al Udeid Air Base, Qatar. On the morning of September 11, 2001, Colonel Williams was an active-duty international guard pilot starting "a normal day, I thought." After watching news footage of the airplanes crashing into the towers, she experienced "disbelief, shock. ... Ultimately seeing the towers collapse ... was very, very surreal. Even having served in active duty in the military for 10 years, it was surreal to see something like that."

At the time of the 9/11 attack, Colonel Williams said many members of the military had "served through mostly a peaceful period, but 9/11 was the start of something new to us. Think about the soldiers, sailors, marines, and airmen today.

... The vast majority joined after September 11, 2001." Colonel Williams said that our nation responded to the terror attack with "strength, honor, resilience, dedication, (and) focus."

To the Gold Star Families, Colonel Williams expressed gratitude: "[I'm] grateful to those who gave all to defend our freedom. ... Thank you for your family's sacrifice and service to our nation. ... Thank you for raising a hero."

Colonel Williams also thanked Move America Forward for hosting the event: "Having been deployed myself, it meant a lot to know that fellow Americans at home were thinking about me and were behind me and my teammates in what we were doing to defend freedom worldwide. ... Thank you for your tireless support of our military members."

Continued from page 1 in and out. The District is also interested in collaborating with the Historical Society to set up a permanent display showcasing Fair Oaks history.

All these improvements are still subject to approval by the Board and are dependent on available Measure J funding. Aho said, "It's not a done deal." The District plans to get pricing for all the proposed improvements by the end of the year and then present those prices to the Board. "It's unlikely everything will get done," said Aho. "This list will get pared down due to the budget and District priorities."

The replacement of the (PIP) material in District playgrounds is scheduled to start sometime in October, with an estimated completion by the end of November. Aho said the District is just waiting for some paperwork from their contractor and expressed concern about rial.

then work will commence. (Upgrades to the playground at Village Park will be done later, as part of the Village Park, Plaza Park, and Amphitheatre project.)

Three playgrounds in the District - at Village Park, Fair Oaks Park, and Phoenix Park — currently have sand play area, but the Board has decided to remove the sand areas during the PIP replacement process. Aho explained that the sand gets on kids' shoes and clothes and is then tracked all over the playground. Over time, the sand grinds into the PIP material, cutting its life in

Aho said he anticipates "tremendous pushback" rubberized poured-in-place from the community on this issue, knowing that the sand areas are frequently utilized amenities at the playgrounds. "I expect some outrage, so we'll see how that plays out moving

this decision because the sand play areas are well loved and well used. When asked about the possibility of replacing the PIP material with an alternative that wouldn't be negatively affected by the sand, Aho explained that the PIP material is the most costeffective option.

If there's a lot of community pushback, Aho said the Board could decide to keep the sand, but it would not be the staff recommendation based on the damage it will cause to the new playground material. "But the Board works for the public, and we work for the Board," said Aho.

Once the District finalizes the timeframe for the work, Aho said they plan to send out notifications to Fair Oaks locals.

Aho also mentioned the possibility of eventually creating a new sand play area at another park in the District that doesn't have the rubberized PIP mate-


"Friday night's Blues and Brews will

According to Mike Galli, head professional at North Ridge: "While we have a love of golf, our members also believe young people should have more in their lives than just golf. That's









SAC SPCA Will Close Adoptable Goods Thrift Store

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento SPCA announced plans to commence a wind-down of its Adoptable Goods SPCA Thrift Store operations, including the closure of the store at 1517 E Street by year's end.

Sacramento SPCA CEO, Kenn Altine, said, "Since 1977, the Adoptable Goods SPCA Thrift Store has played an integral role in furthering the Sacramento SPCA's mission to help animals and people in our community, contributing more than \$3.2 million towards shelter programs, building improvements and most importantly, the building and remodeling of the Sacramento SPCA's Spay/Neuter Clinic, which performs more than 18,000 life-changing surgeries every year. Unfortunately, the sharp decline in the overall retail environment coupled with rising operating costs and an aging building has made it increasingly challenging to operate a profitable store."

Adoptable Goods will remain open for the rest of the year; however, they will no longer be accepting donations of goods, stating they have more than enough items given by the community to keep the store stocked through the coming months.

The Sacramento SPCA will also continue to accept book donations and items needed at the shelter. A complete list of ongoing shelter needs and other ways to give can be accessed at sspca.org/giving. The Sacramento SPCA asks that all items be brought to the shelter facility at 6201 Florin Perkins Rd., not to the thrift store.

"I am so grateful to the volunteers of the Sacramento SPCA Women's Guild, who many years ago recognized an opportunity to collect and sell gentlyused goods donated by the community to help animals in need", said Altine. "We recognize that Adoptable Goods has provided a meaningful channel for members of our community to support the Sacramento SPCA and we are incredibly thankful for their contributions and commitment. We will continue to explore other opportunities for our caring supporters to donate their treasured goods to benefit the animals."

In addition to the Sacramento SPCA's annual book sale - also started by the Women's Guild – the organization plans to hold other annual events such as online auctions like the recent one hosted by Witherell's, where 62 donated collectibles raised more than \$10,000 for the

We have a moral obligation to be compassionate to one another. That includes not just our family or neighbors, but everyone including the homeless. There are those who, through their efforts to aid the homeless, have created unintended consequences for the very populations they seek to help. We can't shy away from hard truths in this matter and we need to be able to support solutions that provide the most public good.

The hard truth here is that the enforcement of anticamping ordinances benefit our entire community, even the homeless. That is why I am pleased that Sacramento County is joining with Boise Court stripped our ability to to support their Supreme be a little tough and we were Court appeal of the recent court decision that forbids local enforcement of anticamping ordinances and prevents us from clearing up homeless settlements—and I am urging all cities and counties in our region to join with us by doing the same.

In September of last year, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals issued a decision in Martin v. Boise which ruled or arrest anyone for sleeping

adequate shelter beds are unavailable. Because of that ruling, Sacramento County Parks Rangers stopped enforcing our anti-camping ordinance, and as we all have seen, the problems associated with homelessness have increasingly spiraled out of control: aggressive panhandlers are chasing customers from businesses, used needles are being discarded in about matters affecting the our parks, human feces is contaminating our water, and fire hazards in open fields are threatening our homes.

One of the first actions I took when I got elected to the Board of Supervisors was to approve a set of four homeless initiatives designed to provide shelter and re-housing services. This was in line with the approach that many of my constituents indicated was the best way to go about the homeless crisis, balanced between compassion with toughness. Our social service programs such as mental/physical health care, addiction treatment, job training, and housing provided a compassionate approach. The anti-camping ordinance allows us to be a little tough.

Last year, the Ninth Circuit left with fewer ways to push people toward services, making our overall situation much worse. An imbalance was created because Sacramento County geographically has a lot to offer to those living outside with our warm weather and acres upon acres of beautiful parkway to camp in. That hospitable environment is then combined with government services local governments cannot cite and efforts by non-profits. So without the ability to be

on public property when tough and enforce the anticamping ordinance, there is no real incentive for those living in the parks to stop and that creates a dangerous environment.

The anti-camping ordinance has always been a positive tool. It helps keep our parks and other public areas for everyone to benefit from and enjoy. Homeless advocates have accused of using it as a punishment, a way of depriving homeless individuals of their rights. That has never been true and if the appeal is successful, that will remain to be the case. The ability to enforce the ordinance better enables us to connect the homeless to medical treatment, mental health and drug treatment and even job training. Through the ordinance, we are better serving our community as a whole.

The official homeless count found 5,570 homeless people living in our County in 2019, which is a shocking increase from 3,665 in 2017. I have confidence that if our anti-camping ordinance continues to get restricted, this number will continue to skyrocket when the next count is done in 2021, regardless of how many services we add or how many millions we spend.

Volunteer Drivers Needed Road Money Rip-Off for Meals on Wheels

RANCHO CORDOVA, CA (MPG) - Starting out from Neal Orchard Senior Activities Center, volunteer Meals on Wheels driver Patrick Quinn picked up his hot pack and his cold pack for the nine senior participants to whom he would deliver that day. While the senior center serves hot meals on weekdays every week, patrons using Meals on Wheels are generally homebound. "I've worked a lot of volunteer places," Quinn said. "It's worth doing."

Most of Quinn's stops are fairly uneventful, but each is important. He gets out the individual hot meal and takes it along with a few grocery items to the door of the home. There he hands over the meal or takes it to the table for the participant. "For many of the seniors who rely on Meals on Wheels," said marketing and outreach coordinator Angela Roberts, "receiving their lunch from a volunteer is their only social contact for the whole day." Meals on Wheels participants in Carmichael are served out of the Rosemont facility, with the same standard of excellence. Participation is not income based, but primarily based on a person's home and health needs.

Roberts joined Quinn at the home of Meals on Wheels participant Thelma Wiltscire, who reached 100 years of age on September 13. Wiltscire looks forward to receiving her main meal every week day. She knows each of the drivers who come to deliver. "We have flowers and a card signed by all of us at Meals on Wheels for her," Roberts said. After accepting the birthday greetings, Wiltscire sat down with her dachshund, Dixie, on her lap.

Oldest of three siblings, Wiltscire passes the time by reading and doing puzzles. She attributes reaching 100 to taking care of herself, and to genetics. "Both our parents were almost 100 years old when they passed away," Wiltscire said. "And I have Dixie, my baby. She's a good little one." Meals on Wheels also may provide food, called Ani-Meals, for participants' pets. This ensures that participants will not need to feed pets from their own meals.

Another of Quinn's deliveries was been receiving the hot meals for considerably more than a year. "That way I don't have to cook it myself, they bring it to me," Merowitz said. "I sit down and eat it and that's my main meal for the day. The food is delightful, the people who serve it are delightful, so I have nothing but compliments for it."

For seniors who are able to travel to senior centers, the All Seasons Café is open for lunch at 11:30 a.m., Monday through Friday, at the Neil Orchard Senior Center, 3480 Routier Rd. in Sacramento – phone (916) 366-3133. The Mission Oaks Community Center, 4701 Gibbons Dr., Carmichael, also has a café with weekday meals at 11:40 a.m.; phone (916) 359-1192. Everyone over 60 can receive a hot lunch at no fee, but must call in advance to ensure there will be enough meals.

"We always need volunteer driv-June Merowitz, 92. She said she has ers, especially since many volunteer drivers only drive once a week." Roberts said. "They are the direct contact between isolated seniors and the program. In addition to delivering nutritious meals, they can meet and socialize with seniors, brightening their day and helping them feel connected to their communities." Volunteer drivers drive their own vehicles and receive mileage reimbursement.
