Community Input Leads to Revised Master Plan

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) -After completing the public outreach events for improvements to Village Park, Plaza Park, the Community Clubhouse, and Veterans Memorial Amphitheatre, the Fair Oaks Recreation and Park District's (FORPD) Master Plan has been updated to incorporate community feedback.

Melissa Ruth, an associate at landscape architecture firm Callander Associates, presented the revised Master Plan at the Measure J Bond Oversight Committee (BOC) meeting in August. "We got great input from the community," said Ruth. There was a lot of consensus among community members about their top priorities, including more parking, increased access to park areas, more restrooms, and playground enhancements.

The original Master Plan suggested diagonal parking in front of Plaza Park, but the updated plan shows straight parking so drivers coming from either direction can access the spaces. A small restroom will be installed on the outside of the Amphitheatre, and an additional restroom will be installed near the playground in Village Park. Community members suggested utilizing the hillside embankment slides, climbpods. Residents also proregarding the planned garden area in front of the Community Center: instead of the rose garden proposed in the original plan, the area will now be filled with drought-tolerant plants.

Walker said, "An important part of our role is the outreach and making sure that input is implemented. ... It's powerful to see the updates and changes to the Master Plan based on the community input."

District administrator Mike Aho said that

Nonprofit Operation Provides Backpacks for 7,800 Area **School Children**

County Board Approves Revised FY 2019-20 Budget

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted to revise the Approved Budget for the 2019-20 fis-

The Approved Budget in June totaled \$4.4 billion. With the completion of the County's FY 2018-19 year-end financial closing activities and updated information, an increase of \$138 million was proposed, bringing the Budget Recommended for Adoption to \$4.5 billion in appropriations. Most of this increase involved re-budgeting funds for capital projects due to shifts in timing for those projects.

In June, to close a general shortfall of \$55 million, Sacramento County made \$43 million in reductions in General Fund Departments and reduced \$12 million in General Fund reserves to bridge the gap.

General Fund departments identified a number of targeted program and position reductions. The reductions included the elimination of 181.3 FTE positions that were either vacant or, in a few cases, filled by employees who were shifted to other positions in the same class. No layoffs were necessary.

The June Approved Budget also

included budget increases in a number of areas, including:

\$21.7 million to make improvements to the County's jails as part of continuing efforts to resolve conditions of confinement concerns identified in a recent lawsuit:

\$2.3 million in state and federal revenue to add 25 FTE positions in Child Support Services;

\$1.2 million in 2011 Realignment Local Innovation funds to add seven positions in Probation to establish a Pre-Trial Assessment and Monitoring Pilot

\$1 million set aside for costs related to the Hardesty/Schneider lawsuit against the County;

\$3.5 million to add 29 FTE positions in Airports Department to handle the impact of increasing passenger and freight volume; and \$668,000 to cover the cost of post-

cards and postage for the March 2020 Primary Election, as required by state The Board is scheduled to formally

adopt the Budget Recommended for Adoption on Sep. 24. For details, read the Budget Letter to

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -September is Pedestrian Safety Month, and the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) is asking drivers and people walking to

look out for one another.

"Despite advances in vehicle technology that act as additional safety measures for drivers and passengers involved in a crash, pedestrians are still just as vulnerable as in years past," OTS Director Barbara Rooney said.

According to a report released this year by the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA), a projected 6,227 pedestrian deaths occurred nationwide last year, the highest number since 1990. In California, 858 pedestrians were killed in 2017, accounting for nearly 25 percent of all traffic

"Whether we are driving or with our safety partners, state and local agencies on educating the public about safe roadway habits, regardless of how you get

> "People should not be afraid of a car hitting them as they cross the street," Rooney said.

> "Having said that, it is important that pedestrians are aware of their surroundings and think about how they would want a pedestrian to act if they were the one driving."

The OTS offers the following

to help ensure we all get to where we need to go safely:

For pedestrians: Cross the street at crosswalks, preferably with a stop sign or signal. Do not cross the street midblock (no jaywalking); Make eye contact with drivers; Look for cars backing up. Avoid darting between parked cars; Wear bright color clothing during the day and use a flashlight at night; Do not use your cell phone or wear ear buds while walking.

For drivers: Avoid distractions such as a cell phone; Never drive

under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs; Watch for pedestrians when backing up; Follow the speed limit; Yield to pedestrians at crosswalks. Make sure the path is clear before making a turn at an intersection.

The OTS administers funding for traffic safety programs statewide with the goal of reducing crashes that result in deaths, injuries, and economic losses. The OTS is a department under the California State Transportation Agency

Continued from page 1 have been pushed back as the District waits to hear whether their Prop 68 application is accepted an announcement expected this December. Aho said, "It's definitely impactful, and I think it's worth waiting five months for \$5 million." The expected budget for the total project is \$6 million from Measure J funds and almost \$6 million from Prop 68 grant funds. The construction phase is expected to begin in September 2020.

While the District waits for the Prop 68 decision, other park renovation plans are moving to the forefront. The planning phase for Phoenix Field upgrades is already underway, and focused community outreach for residents in that area will begin in September. The upgrades will include playground area enhancements, a roundabout to improve traffic flow, additional parking lots, improvements to existing parking lots, and a berm to mitigate noise concerns of local residents.

In addition to Prop 68 funds, the District is also seeking Per Capita funds, Competitive Per Capita funds, and Recreation Infrastructure Revenue Enhancer grant funds at least 20% in matching funds (from Measure J). or PSPS is a precautionary safety measure that may proactively turn off power lines when extreme fire danger conditions are forecast. We will do this to reduce wildfire risks and keep our customers safe.

What criteria does PG&E consider when calling a PSPS?

No single factor will initiate a Public Safety Power Shutoff as each situation is unique. The factors we generally consider include:

- A Red Flag Warning declared by the National Weather Service
- Forecasts of strong winds and wind gusts
- Low humidity levels
- Critically dry vegetation that could fuel a wildfire
- And on-the-ground, real-time observations from PG&E field crews

In the interest of public safety, we continue to update and refine our criteria and protocols on an ongoing basis.

How will I know if a PSPS has been called in my neighborhood?

Because extreme weather threats can change quickly, our goal is to provide notice through phone calls, emails and text messages to customers 48 hours in advance, again at 24 hours and again just prior to turning off the power for safety. Updates will also be shared through social media, local news, radio and pge.com until the time power is restored. How can I prepare for a PSPS?

We advise you to think in advance about your family's needs and how you might be impacted in the event of a power shutoff — or for any emergency.

- Do you have a personal safety plan for all members of your family, including pets?

- Do you know how to open your garage door manually?
- Do you have cash and a full tank of gas, in the event ATMs and gas stations are unavailable?
- Are your mobile phones fully charged?

Why do I need a will if I'm still young and haven't acquired a lot of wealth? Laura

Dear Laura,

In a case like yours, you don't need a complicated will. But you do need an inexpensive, basic will. The larger and more complicated your estate is, the more you'd spend on estate planning and a will in order to ensure everything is properly addressed - and to keep the government's hands off everything.

Let's say you're in your early – to mid-twenties and single. You have a car and a bank account, and that's it. In this kind of scenario, it's going to be easy to work through your estate. But it's going to take your parents – or whoever's left – a whole lot longer to get those few simple transactions taken care of if you don't have a will in place.

The other thing you'll always want to have in your will package is a healthcare power of attorney directive. This includes things like who's going to make medical decisions for you if you're unable to make

decisions for yourself. As home in this situation. a part of this, you'd want to fill out the paperwork things aren't fun to think about, but doing it will take a huge burden off the people you love. 

'Green Lights Initiative': Seeing the Light on Bulb Disposal

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Recycling at home or work has become part of our daily routine, but one ubiquitous device that still raises questions over disposal is light bulbs. Do they go out with the normal trash? Get tossed in recycling containers? Do you save them for the next neighborhood e-waste event? The answers aren't easy, thanks in part to new technologies to Thomas Edison's illuminating invention along with society's growing environmental concerns.

A 60-day initiative to help raise awareness on how citizens and companies can properly recycle lighting devices launched on Aug. 20. The Green Lights Initiative is sponsored by LEDtronics, one of the largest U.S.-based manufacturers of LED products, and whose lighting has put a shine on Sacramento from a downtown comic book store to the passenger trains that roll through the downtown and Roseville stations.

Besides donating to Keep America Beautiful with a check purposely dated Nov. 15 to coincide with America Recycles Day, the Torrance, Calif.-based company is taking to social media, print and electronic media to get the word out. New and long-time supporters of proper lighting disposal will be urged to sign an online petition at Change.org.

burn out, where do I put them?' Being in the lighting business for nearly 40 years, we get that question a lot," said Shaan Lodhie, LEDtronics' chief operating officer. "Our company makes only LEDs, which are safe to dispose of in trash bins because they contain no hazardous chemicals. But that's not necessarily the right option for environmental, safety and other reasons. When it comes to CFL and fluorescent bulbs, both of which contain small amounts of mercury, chucking them in the trashcan or with the

When a real light bulb goes out, how great it would be if an imaginary light bulb appeared over your head to signal a bright idea for what to do next. With so many types of lighting on the market, even a single home or business

can have multiple ways to illuminate. Materials being shared through the Green Lights Initiative include a "how to" on properly disposing and recycling the most common types of light bulbs. Here's a summary of tips by lighting category:

CFL and fluorescent -Small amounts of the toxic chemical mercury make these bulbs harmful to your health and environment. Simply tossing them in the trash is unwise, and in some circumstances unlawful. Because broken CFL and fluorescent bulbs are damaging to the environment if they enter landfills or the

water supply, more stringent and rigorous steps are required to dispose. A local home improvement store or recycling center might be able to take this work – and the bulbs – off your hands;

LED – Safe as it is to dispose of LEDs in trash bins due to an absence of toxic chemicals, recycling them is still the best option from an environmental and safety perspective. Better than tossing them in your recycling container, locate a recycling center that accepts LEDs, which contain reusable components;

Incandescent and halogen - Like LEDs, these types

typically contain no toxic chemicals. Disposing them in a trashcan or recycling bin is one solution, but a better one is handing them over to a recycling center. Because glass in incandescents and halogens shatters easily, wrapping the bulbs in recyclable packaging materials is also smart.

"SacRT is moving forward with significant improvements that will and lead to economic growth," said Sacramento County Supervisor and SacRT Board Chair Patrick Kennedy. "The new bus network is just one of several historic improvements that SacRT has made over the last several years to make it easier for people to travel around the region."

SacRT began the process of redesigning the bus network nearly three years ago, with the support

"We are thrilled that SacRT is increasing frequency and service to where people are and where they want to go."

After 16 years of service to Sacramento County's District 3, months of rumors preceded her announcement. At least six hopefuls have thrown hats in the ring for her seat.

Peters has more than 14 months yet to serve. She'll sit long hours on the Board; attend town halls; give speeches and cut her quota of ribbons. Future ground-breakings include the beginning of Phase 3 of Fair Oaks corridor improvements in Carmichael this fall.

Bowing away was carefully considered. "Sixteen years is enough for anyone," she considers. "In this job, you should exit on a high note to avoid burning out - so residents still get the attention they deserve. I also want to leave District 3 in good hands. I brought several people onto commissions and watched to see who seemed capable and interested in doing the job." Former CHP officer Rich Desmond emerged as her pick. "When I first met Rich 18 months ago," says Peters, "I thought he might be the guy. He's proven it through his work on the Carmichael Community Planning Advisory Council.
