New Area **Code Overlay** Creating Big Headache



Beginning February 10, 2018, callers in our area must use 1 + 916 + 7-digit dialing procedure for all

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - In the 916 area code, the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) will add a new 279 area code for new phone lines starting March 10. However, before that new area code goes into effect, beginning February 10, 2018, callers in our area must use 1 + 916 + 7-digit dialing procedure for all local calls. Callers that do not use the new dialing procedure will find that their calls cannot be completed and a recording will instruct them to hang up and dial again.

The CPUC says dialing 1 + 916 + 7-digit telephone number does not change what a call costs and does not mean that a call is a toll or long distance call. Calling areas and rates will not change - what is a local call now will remain a local call. Calls to 911, as well as 211 and 311 will not be affected, and will continue to be dialed with 3 digits.

The area code overlay will primarily affect the greater Sacramento area, which includes parts of El Dorado, Solano, Sutter, Yolo, Placer, and Sacramento Counties. For more information, please visit the CPUC website. ★

A Retail Revolution?

Fair Oaks Developer Plans Large Village Retail and Foodie Complex

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - If all goes according to plan, the empty parking lot and existing buildings (some vacant for years) at the east entrance into Fair Oaks Village at Winding Way, will showcase a multi-faceted food and retail complex by mid-to-late-summer.

Leon Corcos, resident and vice president of the Fair Oaks Village Enhancement Committee (FOVEC), now developer, said he purchased the buildings and adjacent parking lot that wrap the corner of Winding Way and Fair Oaks Boulevard in April of 2016 for \$1.35 million. His intention is to do for The Village what FOVEC and others have been simultaneously pushing for all

along: Create a destination location for Fair Oaks, with a fresh menu of food, entertainment and retail choices to draw visitors from all corners of the region.

Corcos is planning a large eat, shop and play project that encompasses six separate and existing buildings, including the former Russ Monroe's funeral home, a 4,700-foot space he's leased to prominent restauranteur, Sommer Peterson. Peterson is co-owner of the wildly popular Mission Bowling Club in San Francisco. According to Corcos, she intends to open a "Palm Springs" style restaurant in the space, with an outdoor patio and fire places, a bocce ball court and an open-air bar.

"She's an absolutely amazing restauranteur and what she's planning here is

Getting Work Ready

Foster Youth Job Shadow Day Prepares Students for the Real Thing

CARMICHAEL, CA (MPG) - For a foster youth in high school, nothing can create a clearer pathway to success as they exit school and the foster care system than having some form of preparation for life on their

At the top of the list of areas that could arguably be deemed the most important is workreadiness, including some form of direct, hands-on exposure to various potential career opportunities.

To that end, the San Juan Unified School District's Foster Youth Services program will be holding is annual Foster Youth Job Shadow Day Friday, February 9th. This year, 16 participating employers across the Sacramento region, including CBS Radio, SMUD, Nissan of Sacramento and Carmichaelbased Mateo's Pizza & Bistro, will host 56 youth for a day of job-readiness education, up close and personal.

"This is a great way for students who are in foster care to obtain knowledge and information about various possible careers as they prepare for their final days in school and, ultimately, exiting out of the foster care system," said Kamika Hebbert, SJUSD's Foster Youth Services Youth Employment and Independent Living Coordinator.

SJUSD Foster Youth Services in Carmichael is one of the four original "Core District Foster Youth Programs" in California. It works in collaboration with Twin Rivers USD, Sac City USD, Elk Grove USD and the Sacramento County Independent Living Program (ILP), a federally funded entity, which assists current and former foster youth between the ages of 16 and 21 with their goals to achieve self-sufficiency prior to and after exiting the foster care

This is the fifth year SJUSD Foster Youth Services has offered foster youth students across the district the opportunity to shadow working professionals in a range of careers from tech to back-ofhouse culinary operations.

The Foster Youth Program, explains Hebbert, was launched in 1973. In addition to the Job Shadow Day and work-readiness programs, the Foster Youth Services of SJUSD also provides foster youth with support through advocacy, academic counseling, tutoring, educational assessment, mentoring and links to community services, as well as crisis counseling.

Youth in foster care homes between 16 and 18 are eligible for the SJUSD programs and services and programs during the time they are in foster care placement and after emancipation from the system.

Most participants in the Job Shadow Day program and others are referred by social workers, probation officers, foster parents, other county ILP coordinators or by self-referral. A social worker is assigned to each participant in ILP for case management and works with youth to craft and develop a Transitional Independent Living Skill plan.

Services available to help foster youth prepare for adulthood include independent life skill classes, education resources, assistance with applications for student financial aid, housing resources, training on money management, decision making, building self-esteem and advocacy.

The vocational training piece offered through the Job Shadow Day, and other programs at SJUSD, serves to support the goal of ensuring the district's foster youth is provided with

the skills needed to become an independent, productive member of their community.

Whether a student has a goal to pursue a career in public policy or policing, baking or banking, the best way for them to get a sense of whether a career is something they'd enjoy is to watch or, in this case, shadow someone who is already doing the job.



through the San Juan Unified Foster Youth Services are multifocused, but they all serve to help foster youth prepare themselves living independently and finding success in their career and educational goals," said Hebbert.

Matteo's Pizza and Bistro has been participating in the Job Shadow Day since 2014, that's four years running now that the Carmichael eatery has been supporting foster youth in preparation for their future. This year will be Tytnisha M.'s second year participating in the job shadow day event and her second time at Matteo's, where she



is getting hands-on exposure to back-of-house operations in a real restaurant.

"It's the amazing businesses like Matteo's who are helping students like Tytnisha, who has designs on pursuing the culinary field, find a way to break in and plan ahead for their futures," said Hebbert.

On Feb. 9, all 56 students enrolled in the Job Shadow day will begin the adventure by convening for a kick-off breakfast where they will be given the details of their work site responsibilities. Then, they will each spend roughly three hours of onsite job shadowing time at various employers' locations. After "work," there's a lunch and then the day will culminate in a slide show and group reflection on the day and future goals.

For participants like Tytnisha, having the experience of learning the ins and outs of a particular business operation before she starts actually heading in that career direction ensures an optimal chance of

"The purpose of the shadowing is to give them first-hand experience to see may or may not be a good fit," Hebbert said. "In Tytnisha's case, it's already pretty clear she's in her element at Matteo's."

What the Legalization of Marijuana **Means for You**

As of January 1, 2018 the recreational use, sale and cultivation of marijuana is legal in California. Prior to the passing of Prop 64, marijuana was only legal to those who obtained a medical marijuana license approved by a licensed medical professional. Although California has legalized pot, counties and cities have the ability to opt out. We've provided some help information below for your convenience.

5 Things YOU Need to Know About Prop 64

- 1. You must be 21 or over to purchase marijuana.
- 2. You cannot smoke marijuana within 1,000 feet of a school, day care center or youth center while children are present.
- 3. CA prohibits the sale of non-medical marijuana users under age 21. Although medical marijuana can still be used by people under
- 4. A state license issued by the Bureau of Marijuana Control is required to sell and grow in which strict rules and regulations will have to be abided by.
- 5. Selling pot without a license can result in a misdemeanor charge and up to 6 months in jail and a \$500 fine.

The Lion in Winter

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - American River Nature watchers recently beheld hungry sea lions swimming

through Arcade, Carmichael and Fair Oaks. Winter visits by the species are not uncommon but the recent sightings were considered rare for the distances the mammals had traveled inland.

In the space of two weeks, there were two separate sightings - thought to be the same individual - at Nimbus Dam. The 90ft high concrete wall stopped his migration and hours of happy hunting followed. "You could hear him before you saw him," said a transfixed angler. "He was roaring like an elephant. I saw him surface with a fish trashing in his mouth. He swallowed it whole - head-first."

Battling against the dam's white-water outflow, the muscular visitor gorged. When

exhaustion took over, he slipped briefly back toward the Nimbus Fish Hatchery, only to return to the floodgate again and again. After a day, he vanished downstream but likely spread the word among fellows nearer Sacramento. Last Friday, not one but three of his species were seen laboring upstream near Watt Avenue. The trailblazer alone returned to feast at Nimbus. Here, angler Jason Nicholas put down his rod to watch a large steelhead being devoured. "In 30 years that I've fished here," he observed, "I've never seen anything like this."

Around 6ft long (weighing perhaps 400 pounds) this adult had journeyed more than 130 river miles from the Pacific Ocean. Though quite a feat, his trek is not a record. Another sea lion reached the Woodbridge Dam near Lodi in 1997. "They're salt-water animals but they follow the fish," explained California Department of Fish and

Wildlife spokesman Andrew Hughan. "They come inland from the (San Francisco) Bay for late salmon and steelhead. They like the fish that are rich in meat and fat."

The mammals frustrate anglers and have occasionally provoked violence from some who regard them as poachers. "They're the dogs of the ocean," says Hughan. "They're curious and friendly; they'll steal fish, but they won't hurt anvone.

"We don't monitor sea lions or do anything about them unless they're distressed. A marine mammal inland is a naturally-occurring phenomenon. If you see one, don't feed it. They need to be left alone to catch fish. It's a cool sight. People should just stand back and enjoy the moment."

Footnote: sea lions are Federally protected. Anyone seeing harassment or injury toward the species should call the police or a park ranger.

going to be unbelievably popular," said Corcos. "She blows it out of the water."

FOVEC is running up against a May deadline for gathering support for creation of a Public **Business Improvement District** for the Village to help fight blight, homelessness and crime, but also to attract a new mix of retail and food options to invigorate the area. But FOVEC needs 51 percent approval from local business and property owners to get a PBID in place. With a May deadline for doing so, coupled with a rather recalcitrant collection of business operators who oppose the idea, as well as a number of absentee property owners who can't be reached, Corcos says there's no time to sit and wait for a PBID's viability. The Village is crying out for more and he's ready to make it

"I moved to Fair Oaks in 1995 and I've watched over the years as The Village has struggled to get traction on trying to become more of a destination, a place to hang out and enjoy decent food and enjoy long after the sun goes down," said Corcos. "While I support the PBID 100 percent, I am not sure it's going to ever happen. So I bought the property with intention of seeing that this spot is earmarked for a revitalization. My goal is to be the person that steps up and does something to make this happen

Next door to the funeral home is a 1,800-square foot building Corcos has leased to a boutique marketing firm, currently operating in Sacramento. On the opposite side of the lot is a twostory building, formerly home to the RE: Boutique. Corcos has leased the 1,800 square foot space downstairs to a team of new restauranteurs who have pulled permits to bring in a bar and grill offering artisan burgers, sandwiches and craft brews.

come alive.

The upstairs "loft" space, roughly the same size footprint as the lower space, says Corcos, could potentially be leased to a "Hacker Lab," or communal work space for start-ups.

Corcos also owns the buildings around the corner on Fair Oaks Boulevard that currently house Sherwood Florist, under new ownership, and Carisma Salon, which he said will be closing at the end of February. He is hoping to bring a new coffee house into that space.

Capping the project, said Corcos, will be multiple outdoor seating areas at both eateries on the main lot, with lighting and "destination" features that will draw customers in. Also, plenty of parking.

"When this is all said and done, it will be a huge draw and we will see this entire area completely transformed," Corcos said.

Meanwhile, Corcos is not the only game in town working to expand food and drink options in the Village. Gary Juels, who opened up the Fair Oaks Brew Pub across from the park in 2015, has purchased the building next door that housed the Regent Street Salon. He is not confirming whether it will be a restaurant or perhaps a shop

offering supplies for home brewers, nor would he discuss an opening date. He is currently in a construction phase.

Juels confirmed he also has purchased the storied but shuttered Slocum House, which has been a through a few iterations over the last several years. He said it was too soon to discuss his plans for the property, largely because of the myriad uncertainties that can and usually do go hand-in-hand with the county and local permitting

"I wish I could say more but right now it's just too soon," Juels said.

Two doors down in the space formerly home to Village Bistro is the Wild Rooster Bistro, an upscale Mexican eatery that opened in fall of 2017. West on Fair Oaks is O Café, which opened in early January, by French-born Chef Christophe Jusseaume. O Café occupies the space formerly home to Dianda's Italian Bakery and

While permitting issues are bound to play a role in Corcos' project, he says he's ready to do battle with the red tape. He admits to having lost money on his development already, due to the fact most of the buildings on the lot have been sitting vacant for some time. But with or without a PBID in place, he's banking on The Village's future and has taken his time pinning down just the right mix of retail and restaurant operations needed to elevate its status from a quaint "shopping" hamlet to an essential food and retail mecca.

"While they are popular, we don't need any more antique stores," said Corcos. "I know what will work and, while I've taken a hit with my buildings remaining empty for a while, I'm playing the long shot and I think that by summer people are going to see this part of the Village absolutely come alive."





Boss says get a credit card

Dear Dave,

I recently got a new job that requires monthly expenses of almost \$5,000 that are reimbursed. I can't swing that kind of money right now, and my company told me to get a credit card to cover things. I'm trying to get out of debt, and I don't like this idea. What should I do?

-John

Dear John.

Your company should be fronting the money for these expenses. When you talk about the cost of doing business, it's the responsibility of the company — not the employee — to pay expenses.

If I send someone on the road to make money for my company, I pay the bills. It doesn't matter if you're talking about hotel rooms, airfare, or rental cars, those are my expenses. If it's someone who travels a lot, we give them a company debit card. If it's just an occasional thing, we'll give them money out of petty cash. But a company

shouldn't treat its employees this way. That's just plain wrong.

It's a mystery to me how some segments of Corporate America have sold their employees on the idea of being the company bank. Ultimately, the decision is yours. If you don't mind covering your company's expenses and getting reimbursed, but you don't want to go into debt, you'll have to save and build up a \$5,000 business expense fund in a separate checking account. This should be used only for business expenses, and what's spent should be replenished immediately when they reimburse you.

You're in an unusual spot, John. Personally, I think this is an unprofessional way to run a business. But if you like your job, and want to stay without taking on any more debt, the good news is you'll only have to fill up your expense account one time.

Oversight Needed of Delta Tunnel, High Speed Rail

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Tucked away in a

book in my Capitol office is a letter addressed to Kenneth

William Cooley whose return address is stated simply as The White House. A 4 cent stamp on the envelope shows a Mercury space capsule floating above a luminous Earth with the words "US Man in Space." Its cancellation mark shows it was mailed on May 4th 1962 in Washington, D.C. I had written President John F. Kennedy at the age of seven, and received that response shortly after I turned eight.

As a child, I was inspired that President Kennedy dreamed big dreams and was bold-minded as an innovator. As an adult, I now know the ensuing US space program reflects his willingness to ask "what might be?"

In my adult life, both as a founder of the City of Rancho Cordova, with 10 years on its City Council and two terms as Mayor, and now as a State Assemblyman, I find another John Kennedy quote relevant almost every day.

"Our responsibility," Kennedy said, "is one of decision, for to govern is to choose."

While I still agree that "to govern is to choose," my Ken Cooley corollary is that we must always know the available choices.

To strengthen public confidence in government, we in government need to make good choices that use tax dollars wisely. Public stewardship is more than well-managed programs, however. Programs themselves must tackle the right priorities. It is the State Legislature's job, as a co-equal branch of government, to conduct vigorous oversight and monitoring of state agencies so billion dollar state projects don't balloon out of control or get spent on the wrong goals.

Recent news makes me very pleased with my early opposition to two expensive projects which use

dollars I believe would be put to better use to strengthen our schools, early childhood education and other critical social and physical infrastructure needs of our state.

These are the High Speed Rail (HSR/Bullet Train) project that I opposed when a key vote came up in 2013 to allocate one quarter of cap and trade dollars to it in a continuing appropriation and also the twin tunnels proposal. Concerning the tunnels, I believe they place at risk the waters of San Francisco Bay, which is the greatest estuary system on the west coast of North and South America. Teeming with millions of fish and all the waterfowl which use the Pacific Flyway depend on those waters, just as you and I, and our children and grandchildren do.

Diverting scarce public dollars to the bullet train and the twin delta tunnels is a bad choice.

When passed by the voters in 2008 before the severity of the most recent recession became plain, the entire High Speed Rail project was promised to cost \$40 billion. By 2016 it had climbed to \$64 billion and now the latest cost estimate for the first segment has jumped nearly 80%, up to \$10.6 billion. "The worst-case scenario," a financial consultant recently said "has happened."

In addition, because the project has yet to tackle reaching the more populous Bay Area and Los Angeles, the financial estimates will likely worsen.

Given our state's challenges, I will continue my opposition to giving a big new blank check to the consistently over-budget bullet train. That would be putting good money after bad and will actually prevent the state's ability to address other key needs. Like my original 2013 "NO vote" on the HSR continuing appropriation, I will not support major new funding now.

The second state initiative fraught with problems and in swift need of additional oversight is the "Water Fix" project, which includes the construction of twin tunnels (40 feet in diameter and 35 miles long) underneath the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta and estuary.

Much of California's water supply passes through the Delta's "gateway" into the waters of San Francisco Bay. Decades of pumping water from this critical estuary to southern California has significantly contributed to its declining ecosystem, placing many species at risk of extinction. Many environmentalists say the tunnels would bring even more harm.

Environmental issues aside, the project is on shaky ground economically. The estimated \$17 billion project was slated to be funded by water agencies that would benefit from Delta sourced water supplies. However, not a single member of the federal water management Central Valley Project has agreed to support or contribute to WaterFix. Further, a 2017 federal audit said \$50 million in taxpayer funds were used improperly to subsidize the San Joaquin Irrigation District for their part in helping plan WaterFix.

The administration reportedly is considering scaling the twin tunnels down to a single tunnel, a dramatic change that will require more dollars for redesign and environmental studies and I continue to oppose spending that money at this time.

It is still very much true, as John F. Kennedy stated, that to govern is to choose, and I believe we need to focus on choices that will bring better benefits to all California children, communities, and our future.

In the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus is talking about worry at one point and he gives us six reasons why we shouldn't worry. Then he summarizes it, Matthew 6:31 "What I'm trying to do here is get you to relax. To not be so preoccupied with getting so you can respond to God's giving." (Mess) He's saying that sometimes we get preoccupied with the wrong things and we lose focus on what God has already done for us. Everything in your life you have because of God's mercy and grace.

We begin our relationship with God because of His mercy and it's His mercy that keeps us going; especially when times get tough. The Bible says, "Since through God's mercy we have this ministry, we do not lose heart." 2 Cor.

Encouraging Words

Relax in God's Mercy

4:1. He says because we know that everything God does in our lives is by mercy and because of his mercy we don't give up.

Why is that important? Because so much of the time Satan is whispering in your ear "You're not good enough." He says it to you over and over and over. "Not good enough!" You get this idea that God is some unpleasable parent and that God is ticked off at you because you just don't measure up. But those thoughts are not coming from God.

Mercy is the fact that God

knows every dumb thing that you've ever done in life and He still chose you. He still loves you. He still wants you in his family. You're never going to last in the Christian life in following Christ or in ministry if you don't understand His mercy - that his love for you is unconditional. And not only does he love you, but did you know that God likes you? Actually he's quite fond of you. You may have never realized that. Maybe you've never really thought about that. You think God is mad at you all the

time. But if you have accepted his Son, Jesus Christ, all your sins have been wiped out by His mercy and grace. You can relax knowing that God loves you unconditionally.

Understanding God's mercy helps you relax because now you don't have to try to prove your worth any more. You do your best and forget the rest. You realize that God loves you and accepts you even in your imperfection. And if God accepts you and someone else doesn't accept you – who's got the problem? They do! Your worth and value has nothing to do with what others think of you. That's important. Second, you don't have to wallow in your failures and guilt. Because of His mercy you begin your relationship with Him and it's through His mercy that you continue in your relationship. Everything that God does in you and through you and for you is all because of His mercy.



Paying it Forward

Express Employment Hiring Drive Generates Funding for Sacramento's Women's Empowerment

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

Express Employment Professionals (EMP) NE Sacramento has again put women in need at the top of their philanthropic agenda, which means more homeless women across the Sacramento region will have an opportunity to create a pathway to change this year.

Since 2015, EMP has donated \$10 to a nonprofit of its choosing for every first-time job placement booked through its agency during Annual Pay It Forward Holiday Hiring Drive, which runs from November to December. EMP has more than 750 franchised locations across the country and each conduct their own individual philanthropic programs.

In 2015, Express Employment staff voted to support Women's Empowerment of Sacramento (WEP) through as part of its giving back campaign. The 2016 drive, the sixth annual campaign, generated 62 firsttime job placements, culminating in a total of \$620.00 for WEP. On January 29, the agency's General Manager, Kristen Garl, and Kathryn Ontiveros, EMP accounting specialist, presented WEP with their donation before a backdrop of photo stories of hundreds of just some of the women who have been helped via the programs offered at WEP since its inception in 2001.

"We are very proud to support Women's Empowerment Sacramento," said Garl. "We have worked with a handful of nonprofit organizations over the last six years and they are all wonderful organizations. But three years ago, as reviewed our goals for the campaign, our staff voted and WEP was selected hands-down by the majority of our team."

The money will go to support WEP programs, which include a comprehensive, nine-week job-readiness

education and emotional empowerment workshop for area homeless women. That includes, resume preparation classes, mock interviewing, Internet job search training, budgeting, access to the agency's dress for success clothing closet, transportation and even free, onsite childcare.

In addition, women enrolled in WEP programs are paired with an employment specialist, social worker and a volunteer career mentor to help them identify their skills and interests and realize their career goals. Getting off the street and into a job, experts agree, is the sure-fire way for homeless individuals to create a pathway to a new life and end the cycle of

poverty.

To date EMP has donated a total of \$1,640 to WEP via its Pay It Forward campaign.

"We have an amazing relationship with Express Employment," said WEP's Development Manager, Holly Byrom.

"The support we receive each year is significant, and their mission is very closely aligned with our goal to help women get out of poverty and into a job, a home and a new life."

More than 1,500 women with a combined total of some 3,500 children have benefited from the classes and services offered through WEP, 521 in 2017 alone. Roughly 80

percent of those served, including the 157 in 2017, have successfully secured a job or enrolled in school or vocational training upon completion of their WEP program.

WEP was named Nonprofit of the Year by the Nonprofit Resource Center in 2009, one of the most prestigious honors a nonprofit can receive in the Sacramento region. And, in 2014, WEP was chosen as the Organization of the Year at the inaugural Women's Appreciation Awards by Congresswoman Doris Matsui, then Senate President pro Tem Darrell Steinberg and Assemblyman, Roger Dickinson.

WEP is a private organization and

does not receive any federal funding. Its social enterprise program generates roughly \$54,000 in income annually. Grants and family foundations account for roughly \$400,000 toward its annual \$1.1 million budget. Remaining funds are generated through a combination of individual gifts, the United Way and Special Events.

"We know the pathway to breaking the cycle of homelessness is through employment," said WEP Executive Director Lisa Culp, formerly on staff at Sacramento's Loaves and Fishes. "Our participants are 100 percent homeless women. So we promise them that if they come in and complete our program, we will help them find a job, a home and a new life."

It takes money to offer all of the services made available to local homeless women in need. Programming costs for WEP account for \$723,000 alone. As such Garl said her agency's support for WEP is ongoing. As her team connects with existing and potential employers, schools and other entities, it networks for homeless women and WEP, encouraging employers to believe in second chances and supporting WEP's social enterprise, the Get a Job Kit.

The kit, which sells for \$15.99, is a colorfully printed "tool box" for job seekers, which includes a comprehensive packet of job readiness guide sheets and resources. It was created for WEP clients initially, but it is adding value to the community at large, especially wherever there are students or other job seekers trying to secure long-term employment.

"We are always pushing for support for Women's Empowerment everywhere we can," said Garl. "We could not be more thrilled to be connected with WEP and its mission, and intend to keep supporting them for as long as we can, in as many ways possible." ★





Citrus Heights Police Target Human Trafficking in Multi-Agency Operation

CITRUS HEIGHTS, CA (MPG) -The Citrus Heights Police Department's Special Investigations Unit conducted multiple sting operations last week as part of the 4th Annual Reclaim and Rebuild Enforcement Operation. This operation was in coordination with the Los Angeles Regional Human Trafficking Task Force in an effort to identify and rescue commercially, sexually exploited victims of human trafficking and to disrupt the demand of prostitution by targeting the people who seek to victimize others through either soliciting or requesting services of prostitution.

Our efforts were focused on identifying and arresting the "Pimps" (those who were coordinating the services of victims) and "Johns" (those seeking to take advantage of those victims) and rescuing the victims of human trafficking. Using the internet and various other tactics including undercover operations, the Citrus Heights Police Department made (10) arrests. These arrests included prostitution, probation violations, as well as felony and misdemeanor warrant arrests.

The City of Citrus Heights and the community of Citrus Heights

do not tolerate human trafficking and will continue to detect, deter, and hold those accountable for their involvement in prostitution and victimizing others. If you or someone you know needs help or you suspect human trafficking may be occurring, please contact the Citrus Heights Police Department to help us stop human trafficking and rescue those who are victimized.
