# Reimagining Education Students Chart Their Own Course at New UnSchool



The UnSchool aims to give students the freedom to break down barriers to learning

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) -Hacking an education sounds like something you'd get in deep trouble for. But that's not the case at UnSchool, now roughly two months into its inaugural semester in Fair Oaks, where students are blowing up traditional educational standards and, instead, charting their own course through a passion-based learning model.

UnSchool, which opened its doors August 10, is currently giving 85 freshman and sophomore transfer students from schools across the district an alternative high school education experience that, in every way possible, attempts to allow them, as well as their teachers, to reinvent academic norms via a passion-based learning philosophy, not one that marks success rates by the number of students in seats or standardized test

scores. The concept of independent learning is not a new one, but UnSchool is carving out new territory, stripping the learning process down to a barebones list of required core learning requirements in science, history, language arts and math, to create open space for students to identify and lock on to an area of interest and run with it.

lots of students we knew what we wanted for them and we knew what they wanted," says Gabriel Cooper, the former principal at Will Rogers Middle School in Fair Oaks who now identifies himself as "Chief Educational Deviant Principal. "We are here to hack an education, giving students and educators a way to circumvent the system they know, blowing it up and creating something completely new."

This is super messy, and super scary. We are talking about breaking up 200 years of educational design.

Here's how it works. Students take part in the process of setting goals and expectations for learning by working with their "deviant advisors," also known as teachers. They plot a course for themselves using journals, computers and other forms of instruction, even including long stretches of contemplation if needed, and craft a project for the year that

"After interviewing is completely their own with one exception: they are charged with finding a way to tie in core subject learning.

Take freshman Ellarose Colburn, 14, for example. Colburn transferred to UnSchool from Will Rogers Middle School. She has a strong interest in photojournalism. She's working with her advisor Jon Leister, a teacher in the district for 22 years, on a first-year project that will incorporate photos and storytelling from

an upcoming family trip to Thailand. If she pulls all the pieces into place, her project will include enough work in core subjects to give her the required credits for history, arts and even science.

"I love it here," says Colburn. "When Gabriel came to my school last January to tell us about the plans for the UnSchool, I walked outside and immediately called my parents and said 'I have to go there.' It's

been amazing so far for me. I'm meeting new students from other parts of the district and exposing myself to ideas that I hadn't before. I feel like we are one big family."

Leister, her advisor, said he's pleased to be able to teach high schoolers outside the walls of formal academia and give students the freedom to fold a passion for something into their educational experience

before they get to college. "I always loved learning and teaching, but I never really did like the one-size-fits all system," says Leister. "I didn't like that you had to wait until you got into grad school before you were asked what your passion was and then be told to go ahead and go study that for your project. Why not let students begin this way at the lower levels, where they are ready for something new and out-of-the-box?"

By no means are students allowed to sit around and surf the Internet all day. On the contrary, they are accountable to the class, their advisor and themselves. But the standardized, cookie-cutter academic scaffolding of the past is consistently being broken down and rebuilt to suit the new model. "We work in aca-

demic excellence," says Leister. "We are iterating

# **CDPH Taking Action to Increase Hepatitis A Vaccine Supplies**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) California Governor Edmund G Brown Jr., on October 13th, declared a state of emergency to help control the state's hepatitis A outbreak and increase the supply of adult hepatitis A vaccines to meet current needs.

"Vaccinating people at risk of exposure is the most effective tool we have to prevent the spread of hepatitis A infection during an outbreak," said California Department of Public Health (CDPH) Director and State Public Health Officer Dr. Karen Smith.

To help combat the outbreak, CDPH has already distributed nearly 80,000 doses of the vaccine that were obtained through the federal vaccine program, but those supplies must be increased to continue to address the outbreak. The declaration allows CDPH to immediately purchase additional vaccines directly from manufacturers and coordinate distribution to people at greatest risk in affected areas.

The adult hepatitis A vaccine is different than the one given to children, of which there is ample supply.

The risk of hepatitis A infection is associated with poor sanitation and hygiene and is transmitted through ingestion of contaminated food and drink or through direct contact with an infectious person. The current outbreak has largely impacted people experiencing homelessness and some illicit drug users. The virus can live for months in a contaminated environment, particularly in the absence of good sanitation.

To control this outbreak and prevent further spread, CDPH recommends the vaccination of people in affected areas who are homeless or using illicit drugs. CDPH also recommends vaccination of people who have frequent, close contact with at-risk populations in affected areas. CDPH is working with impacted counties to monitor the outbreak and implement vaccination efforts and is also providing guidance on improving sanitation, including access to handwashing facilities and toilets, to lessen the spread of the virus.

"Local public health officials are working hard to offer vaccines to people who are at the most at risk of infection, including homeless Californians," said Dr. Smith. "Today's order will help ensure communities can continue to deliver the vaccines where they are needed most."

Hepatitis A infection typically causes fever, a general ill feeling with lack of appetite and nausea, and, later in the course of the infection, yellowness of the skin and eyes. Severe hepatitis A infection is rare but does occur in people with underlying liver disease and can cause the liver to fail, potentially leading to death.

# Nearly 4,000 Volunteers Celebrate Five Years of Caring

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Metropolitan Fire District (Metro Fire) kicked month with the debut of one of its Pierce manufactured fire trucks decked out in a pink wrap, ribbon and a touch of blue Oct 5, part of its twomonth campaign to raise funds and awareness for breast and other forms of cancer.

The big pink truck made its debut at Metro Fire headquarters in Mather as part of the centerpiece of the campaign "All Cancers All People." Metro Fire has partnered with the Albie Aware Breast Cancer Foundation to promote Breast Cancer Awareness Month in October, and the Movember Foundation to put the focus on men's health and cancer awareness in November.

"The centerpiece of its multi-month campaign was the transformation of one of our Pierce Manufactured fire trucks from fire engine red to "October Pink" and just a touch of blue ombre," says Christopher Vestal, Metro Fire captain/paramedic and public information officer."

Albie Aware Breast Cancer Foundation Executive Director Cindy Love, alongside cancer survivors from Metro Fire and others who have been impacted by cancer attended the roll out for the campaign. Albie Aware, founded in 2007, offers assistance for life-saving diagnostic testing, patient

advocacy, prevention education and compassionate support to individuals battling breast

In addition to the debut of the pink and pale blue truck, Vestal said Metro Fire was teaming up with the Sacramento Kings to conduct "surprise visits" to patients across the region and deliver free tickets to the Kings' Oct. 9 game against the Portland Trailblazers, during which Albie Aware breast cancer survivors will be participating in the half-time ceremony.

This is the fourth year Metro Fire has been involved in promoting cancer awareness in the county. The way Metro Fire sees it, the outreach goes handin-hand with its normal duties.

"We view this as something off Breast Cancer Awareness was founded in 2003 in that extends our mission to providing services to our community throughout the region, not just emergency situations, but also preventative outreach," Vestal said. "We have a duty to let people know about how early detection helps save lives and about the services available to those who are diagnoses with cancer."



### **Violent Crime Down in** Unincorporated Area

The FBI recently released its 2016 crime statistics showing violent crime rose about 5% in California overall last year and when added to the spike in 2015 Sheriff Scott Jones says violent crime went up statewide 15% in the last two years. But that does not reflect results in the unincorporated area of Sacramento County served by our Sheriff's Department.

In the unincorporated area, violent crime last year went down 10%. Also year-to-date in 2017 our violent crime is down an additional 7%. And when Sheriff Jones crunched the numbers the City of Sacramento showed less than a 2% reduction in violent crime and Citrus Heights and Folsom's violent crime rate actually went up.

While Sheriff Jones attributes the success to his department's internal efficiencies and reorganizations, he says a large portion is due to the department's transition over the last several years toward Intelligence Led Policing. Three years ago he came before the Board of Supervisors and explained to us his desire to move to Intelligence Led Policing as well as asked for budgetary resources to implement that approach - and we committed to support that effort at that time plus we have been

sequent budget years. It is an investment that is generating a public safety dividend.

### Law Enforcement at Community Coffee Meeting



# **Virtual Tour Explains Challenges of Dementia**

- Dementia is not a disease. It is a broad term used to describe a slow, severe decline in memory and reasoning skills that impact and interfere with daily life. Even though the prevalence rate of dementia has fallen dramatically in recent years, there are still over 7 million American seniors today that have some form of dementia.

There are a large number of recognized diseases associated with dementia—Huntington's disease, Parkinson's, Wernicke-Korsakoff Syndrome, Lewy bodies to name just a few. Alzheimer's disease is by far the most prevalent and recognized form of dementia. There are presently 5.5 million Americans with Alzheimer's. Someone in the United States develops Alzheimer's disease every 66 seconds (American Alzheimer's Association). That is 500,000 additional Americans every year. By 2050, that number of Americans with Alzheimer's disease is expected to increase to 16 million.

Alzheimer's disease results in the loss of brain cells and cognitive functioning abilities. Even though it is a progressively degenerative and ultimately fatal disease, Alzheimer's can be managed with treatment, care and changes to in daily environment and living conditions.

Alzheimer's disease is not a normal part of the aging process. However, increasing age is the number one risk factor involving the disease-with the vast majority of afflictions occurring in people 65 and older.

Family histories and genetics are not a major factor in the development of Alzheimer's. Some rare forms of dementia (such as Huntington's disease) are inherited, but having a parent or grandparent with Alzheimer's does not increase your overall risks compared to the rest of the population. Less than 1% of all Alzheimer's cases are thought to be linked genetically (Dr. Nick Fox, Institute of Neurology in London).

There are ten generally recognized warning signs of Alzheimer's, that range from daily memory losses to decreased difficulties completing familiar tasks, to dramatic changes in moods and personalities. Typical and normal age related changes, such as occasionally forgetting some names or appointment or misplacing items from time to time are not considered markers for Alzheimer's. A normal age related question would be: "Where are my car keys?" An Alzheimer's warning sign might be: "What are these keys for?"

There are a number of educational programs and seminars relating to Alzheimer's research, care and development. One such program is the Virtual Dementia Tour (developed by Second Wind Dreams), which briefly simulates dementia on a user in a controlled environment. This tour is

approximately 20 minutes long and consists of a 5 minute guided tour segment where the user is instructed to perform simple, household tasks while having simulated dementia characteristics, followed by an overview, cool down and debriefing period that explains what they had just experienced. This program is intended to help provide understanding and empathy towards those afflicted with Alzheimer's.

Carlie Beasley, of Summerset Assisted Living in Rancho Cordova, has been effectively using this program and finding immediate results, commenting: "Our staff and family members have had dramatic experiences after going through this tour. It has made a noticeable difference on how our staff interacts with memory care residents and how much more tolerant and empathetic family members are in dealing with their loved ones." Beasley is so impressed by the initial results of the tour, that she has offered to have her Summerset team provide this tour to anyone interested within the general public, adding: "This is a compelling and possibly life-changing event that anyone remotely associated or touched by the effects of dementia should experience". 



# Sacramento County DA Reports



### Defendant Sentenced for **Apartment Complex Shooting**

**DATE:** September 29, 2017 CASE: Bryant Fields (Case #16FE007858) **PROSECUTOR:** Deputy District Attorney Kristen Andersen, Targeting Armed Recidivist Gang Enforcement Team (TARGET)

The Honorable Michael Bowman sentenced Bryant Fields to 51 years in prison. On August 2, 2017, a jury convicted Fields of attempted murder, two counts of assault with a semi-automatic firearm, two counts of shooting into an occupied vehicle and felon in possession of a gun. The jury also found true multiple allegations that Fields personally used a gun and that he intentionally discharged a firearm.

On April 18, 2016, Sacramento police officers responded to a shot spotter notification at an apartment complex, where they found 10 spent shell casings. Video of the shooting and witness interviews revealed that Bryant Fields got into a short verbal altercation with the victim. When the victim got into his car to leave, Fields followed him out of the complex on foot and shot at the victim's car 10 times. One round hit another vehicle as it passed by the scene. On April 23, 2016, officers located Fields at a residence along with items that connected him to the crime, including the gun used in the shooting. The Court found that Fields had suffered a prior strike conviction for felony assault with a firearm on November 19, 2009.

### Three Gang Members Convicted of Attempted Murder

DATE: September 29, 2017 CASE: Joseph Castaneda,

Manuel Labrasca & Ray Ramirez

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Satnam Rattu, Gang & Hate Crimes Unit

Joseph Castaneda, Manuel Labrasca, and Ray Ramirez were convicted of two counts of attempted murder and enhancements for causing great bodily injury and participating in a criminal street gang.

On March 17, 2016, Castaneda, Labrasca and Ramirez were in the parking lot of an apartment complex in the Lemon Hill area. All three are validated Norteno gang members. The two victims were in a car that entered the parking lot. When the passenger got out of that car he was immediately attacked. The driver attempted to intervene in the assault and was also attacked. Both victims suffered extensive stab wounds but they were able to get into their car and driver was able to drive to a local hospital.

Castaneda and Labrasca face a potential prison sentence of up to 30 years. Ramirez has a prior strike conviction for robbery and participating in a criminal street gang and faces a minimum sentence of 50 years to life. Sentencing is set for November 3, 2017 10:00 a.m. in Department 22 before the Honorable Russell Hom.

### **Defendant Convicted of** Child Sexual Assault

**DATE:** October 3, 2017

CASE: Jose Contreras (Case #16FE011439) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney

TeriAnn Grimes, Special Assault & Child Abuse Unit Jose Contreras was convicted by a jury of two counts of committing a sex act with a child under 10 years of age and two count of committing a lewd act upon a child.

On June 8, 2016, the victim's parents left their 6-year-old daughter in the care of Contreras, who is a family member. When the victim's parents returned home, they found Contreras naked from the waist down in their daughter's room. The victim was crying and had thrown up and urinated on herself. The victim's father immediately called 911 to report the crime. The victim later told the police how Contreras sexually assaulted her.

Contreras faces a maximum sentence of 50 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for November 17, 2017 at 1:30 p.m. in Department 29 before the Honorable Timothy Frawley.

### Defendant Convicted for Murder of 13-Month-Old Girl

DATE: October 6, 2017

**CASE:** Guyland Washington (Case #14F04826) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Dawn Bladet, Homicide Unit

Guyland Washington was convicted by a jury for the second-degree murder of 13-month-old Leila Shehadeh, and child assault causing death.

On the morning of July 11, 2014, Guyland Washington's then girlfriend left her 13-month-old daughter, Leila Shehadeh, in Washington's care. When the girlfriend returned that afternoon, she discovered her daughter was not breathing and unresponsive. Paramedics brought Leila to the UC Davis Medical Center, where she was pronounced dead shortly after her arrival. When doctors observed bruising and multiple injuries to Leila's head, body and anal areas, they reported suspected child abuse to law enforcement. An autopsy showed Leila suffered a skull fracture with associated brain swelling, rib fractures and significant bruising on various parts of her body. Her cause of death was determined to be intentionally inflicted blunt force injuries.

Washington faces a maximum sentence of 25 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for December 8, 2017, at 9:00 a.m. in Department 12 before the Honorable Maryanne Gilliard.

# Jerry Brown Signs Transsexual Takeover Bill

long-term care facilities -- senior homes, convalescent homes, skilled nursing facilities, developmentally disabled, pediatric day health, respite care, etc. -- to fully support transsexuality and crossdressing, including all types of "sex" unless sexual relations are forbidden for all residents. The bill lacks a religious exemption for residents, employees, managers, or owners.

When SB 219 becomes law on January 1, 2018, it will be unlawful and criminal for any private care facility to:

- 1. Not call a transsexual's desire pronoun "he" or "she" or the transsexual's new 'male" or "female" name.
- resident for acting out their transsexual behavior, even if other residents are disturbed by it.

2. Move or evict a transsexual

tions for all residents.

9. Despite all the above, private care centers could not "deny or restrict medical or nonmedical care that is appropriate to a resident's organs and bodily needs." # **Reimagining Education**

Students Chart Their Own Course at New UnSchool

and evolving every day here. And we have accountability to stay within the realm of that excellence."

Grades are based on the students' current goals after high school. If they are working under college-based learning requirements, they follow an A-G grading system. Otherwise, says Cooper, they follow a mastery grading plan, which records subject competency without a formal grade. Whichever system students are graded on, they do need to show their work.

"They are accountable," says Cooper. "We have a policy here that goes 'If it isn't on paper, it didn't happen."

Over the course of the next few years, if all goes as planned, UnSchool could grow to include as many as 250 students in grades seven through 12. For now, keeping the class-sizes small is making it easier to navigate the new territory, work out bugs and make changes where needed, which students and staff will handle collaboratively.

"It's small, but we did that on purpose," says Cooper. "Kids are coming in from every corner of the district and we want to make sure we start out with the ability to stay focused on them and not be immediately overwhelmed by trying to grow too, big too fast."

The UnSchool has already challenged itself as a contender for recognition. Although it did not win, making it to the final rounds in The ReinventEd contest at Sacramento State College, vying for a \$5,000 prize, showed the school's determination to take itself seriously.

"We are doing exactly what the goal of the competition was, which is to reimagine education," says Cooper. "We were super excited to compete." The school, he added, also is pushing for its accreditation with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), one of

six official academic bodies responsible for the accreditation of public and private schools in the country.

For many parents, this concept of independent study brings up all kinds of fears. Will my son or daughter learn anything? How do you know they are doing the work? What will their grades be like and can get what they need to go on to a good collage?

All normal questions, says Cooper, who adds that, so far, the feedback from parents has been positive. But he admits, for some, the process of putting their children in a prototype for a new way of learning doesn't come without a lot of potential for anxiety.

"This is super messy, and super scary," says Cooper. "We are talking about breaking up 200 years of educational design. So, it is really scary for them too. They are also used to following society's ways, norms and cultural expectations. But many of them have been wanting something different for so long and they are telling us that kids report they are no longer being bullied, they feel safer and they

seem more engaged." UnSchool currently shares space with La Entrada Continuation High School for 16-18 year-olds, as well as the El Serena Independent High School, also a performancebased campus.

In addition to individualized projects, students can also incorporate community-based experiences, as well as internships and online courses into their program of learning. If a student wants to write a novel, a book of poetry or a play as a project, he or she can attend readings and performances, study writers across history from the pastoral poets of England on down to the works of Hemingway, Faulkner or Steinbeck, whatever works, provided they bring in core subject study components.

Essentially, the UnSchool aims to give students the freedom to break down barriers to learning and conventional teaching models through a self-directed but carefully thought-out process. It's not an experiment. It's a challenge. And the framework for its future is unfolding.

"We are blowing up the old system," says Cooper, who has been brewing a passion for this project for years. "I was always looking for ways to deviate from the system as principal in the district. It's my dream to give kids a way to hack an education, not be seated in class where they are judged on their grade so much, driven by class numbers and formalized testing. This is where they can be excellent. And they get to have a huge say in what that looks like."
