Reverend is Just a Regular Joe

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - If you want to get formal about it, the name of the Priest in Charge of the Saint Francis Church Center on Fair Oaks Boulevard in Fair Oaks is the Reverend Doctor Joseph F. Duggan. But there's not much that's formal about the tall, easy-going man who is better known as "Reverend Joe."

For the past five years, Reverend Joe has overseen the many activities at the church. The complex is also host to three other churches: The Valley Redemptive Church; The Living Church of God and The Christian Community—all sharing space. "We are multi-religious, racial, and generational," the priest said. Indeed, the makeup of those who come there for their many reasons reflect the community they are a part of.

One of those reasons is that every Tuesday morning between 10 a.m. and 11 a.m. Saint Francis holds the Senior Produce Market. It is a kind of mini farmers' market, primarily for senior citizens, although it is open to all. People come primarily from Fair Oaks, but many of the regulars are from Citrus Heights, Carmichael, Rancho Cordova, and other nearby communities.

Regulars and new visitors alike are greeted at the door by smiling volunteers who treat everyone like an old friend.

The produce market "offers low-cost, high quality food," Reverend Joe said. The object is to make available not only nutritional benefits, but a social opportunity, as well. "And they can buy a single stalk of celery rather than an entire bulb."

While bargain foodstuff is the initial attraction, dozens of seniors are seated at tables around the big room, enjoying the social interaction as much as the low cost groceries they will take home with them. Small baskets on tables around the room contain fresh, crisp produce of all kinds.

The weekly gathering reflects what the priest says is "Saint Francis's history of the food and fellowship essential of the early

"We are in partnership with the non-profit Episcopal Senior Communities of Walnut Creek," Reverend Joe said. "They operate 20 senior produce markets, this being the

first one in Sacramento."

'Giovanni's **Bucket List Vacation' Fund**

Local Man Kicks off GoFundMe Account for Boy and Family Laughed off Airplane

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Like most people who read

their story, Keith Anthony doesn't know the Phoenix family—7-year-old Giovanni, his mom, Christina Fabian, and dad, Jorge Alvarado-personally, but he was deeply moved by their recent plight when they were removed from an Allegiant Airlines flight after Giovanni began to experience an allergic reaction to a dog that was on the airplane. As many stories reported, passengers applauded as the family—who was attempting a "bucket list" trip due to Jorge's stage-4 terminal throat cancer—exited the

Anthony, a father of two who lives in Roseville, wanted to make right what he saw as a major lack of compassionand to help this family take their trips before Alvarado can no longer do so, and launched a GoFundMe page: "Giovanni's Bucket List Vacation" at https:// www.gofundme.com/zqr7vc9k.

"I want to raise as much money for this family as possible," explained Anthony, who plans to send the money directly to the family. "They need to continue to create memories with their young son as long as they possibly can."

Anthony has been in contact with the Texas television station, NBC affiliate KCEN, which was



Sharing the Love of Photography

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Ask San Juan High School's former photography teacher, Don Taggart, anything about photography, from its early history to the genesis of modern photography, how each of his aged cameras work, or how he and his students developed photos in the "old days," and he will have a detailed answer for you.

Taggart, 90, is an icon at San Juan High School (SJHS) where he taught photography to both students and adults from 1958 to 1991. Though long-retired he continues to be a presence at the school and is continually volunteering his time and talents in the community.

Augmenting Taggart's 30 years of teaching the art of photography to hundreds of San Juan students, was the recent donation of dozens of antique cameras and video cameras spanning the 1950s to 1970s to

On February 25th, Taggart and SJHS principal, Vanessa Adolphson, accepted the generous donation from Lupe Barraza, a local photographer and long-time friend of Taggart's. Adolphson said of the gift, "We are so fortunate to have received such rich history in our San Juan Legacy Room!"

Barraza was ready to downsize his large personal collection of cameras. Many had been a gift from a good friend who he knew like himself, would want the donation to go somewhere it would be appreciated. Barraza had hosted many of Taggart's classes at Barraza's studio in Fair Oaks, giving students a real-world hands-on experience in a professional studio environment. This was the perfect place.

At SJHS students in the Digital Media Pathway program are learning not only digital photography but also video production, how to develop websites, plus media arts, and T.V. and theatre production.

Barraza and Taggart saw the need for students to learn about life before the digital world; to understand how today's highly technical products developed from their prototypes: before pixels and thumb drives there was the box camera and the dark room.

Legacy Exhibit co-chairs Louise Brown, Elthia Hannum, and Jerry Still gratefully accepted the donation to their collection of school history.

Taggart worked his students hard and expected a lot from them but decades of instilling his love for taking pictures and creating memories led many to not only earning extra money but to build successful careers for themselves.

Taggart's work ethics have taken him into his 90th year, and he shows no signs of slowing down. He continues to teach adults digital photography and has been volunteering at Kaiser helping patients navigate the campus and making them smile for over 20 years. His secret for a long life is, "Just keep moving, get out, and volunteer and

FAIR OAKS COMMUNITY UPDATE

-Through the generosity of the American River Messenger, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the unincorporated community of Fair Oaks.

Hazel Avenue Widening Project in Progress

Phase 2 of the Hazel Avenue Widening Project from Curragh Down Drive to Sunset Avenue is now in progress.

This current project is part of a comprehensive three phase effort to improve Hazel Avenue from US-50 to Madison Avenue. The overall purpose of Hazel Avenue improvements is to reduce congestion and increase safety and mobility for all modes of transportation in this corridor. The first phase of the project was completed in September 2011.

The Phase 2 project includes: Widening Hazel Avenue from four to six lanes within the project limits.

•Constructing bicycle lanes, landscaped medians, and separated sidewalks with

landscaping along Hazel Avenue from Curragh Downs Drive to just north of Sunset Avenue.

 Modifying existing traffic signals at the following intersections: Hazel Avenue @ Curragh Downs Drive; Hazel Avenue @ Winding Way; Hazel Avenue @ La Serena Drive; Hazel Avenue @ Sunset Avenue

Installing new traffic signal interconnect to ease traffic congestion.

Replacing overhead utilities with underground facilities on Hazel Avenue within project limits (69kV lines will remain overhead).

Replacing Fair Oaks Water District's aging and undersized existing water main with a new 12" pipeline.

•Constructing sound walls to minimize noise impacts from Hazel Avenue on residential neighborhoods.

•Planting more than 270 new trees to beautify the corridor. The \$19.5 million Phase 2 project is being funded with revenue from Federal Transportation funds, the Measure A Sales Tax, and Development Fees. SMUD is a significant partner for the utility undergrounding component of the project. In addition, the Fair Oaks Water District is partnering on replacement of the 12" water main along Hazel Avenue.

Receive Traffic Lane **Closure Notices**

Traffic obstacles can make driving frustrating. Make sure you have up to date information when planning your travel route so as to avoid lane closures when driving to your desired destination.

Sacramento County's Department of Transportation can send you electronic updates regarding lane closures for streets and roads located within the unincorporated area. These notices do not include state highways (e.g., Jackson, Hwy 50 and I-80) nor are they all-inclusive of every county roadway but you will be advised about those closures most affecting the traveling public. Criteria considered include time of day (peak traffic hours), duration, location, number of lanes, and scope of work or event.

This month there are a number of closures occurring on Arden Way, El Camino Avenue, Fair Oaks Boulevard, Hazel Avenue, and Watt Avenue. For more details about these current lane closures as well as to sign up for future notices, please visit sacdot.com.


The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) recently announced that it is holding \$950 million in unclaimed refunds for tax year 2012. Maybe... This is not the first time the IRS has used a large estimated refund figure hoping to entice the public to file their missing tax returns. Last year's estimated refund figure for tax year 2011 was more than a billion dollars.

If you are enticed by the large refund figure, unfortunately the IRS doesn't have a large stack of \$950 million designated for taxpayers to just pick up. However, if you are owed a refund for tax year 2012 and you fail to file your 2012 tax return by April 18th, 2016, then your refund is forever gone. That's not an exaggeration.

Unfortunately, there is a

three-year window by which 1,037,600 returns that need you can claim a tax refund from the IRS. If the IRS really cared about the estimated \$950 million being not refunded to the public, I'm sure it would have promoted the deadline sooner than just more than a month before the looming deadline.



According t o Commissioner John Koskinen as quoted in the IRS press release, "We especially encourage students and others who didn't earn much money to look into this situation because they may still be entitled to a refund. Don't forget, there's no penalty for filing a late return if you're due a refund.'

The large estimated refund amount that was publicized was calculated by an estimated median refund potential of \$718 and an estimated

to be filed. The IRS estimates 94,900 IRS returns in California returns need to be filed with a median estimated refund of \$656.

If you are not due a refund, the IRS has a process for that scenario too, even if you don't file your tax returns. If you don't file a tax return, the IRS may file a tax return for you, assess a balance against you, and pursue you for the assessed balance. This is called a substitute for return. Additionally, collections on the substituted balance may continue against you even if you eventually file your missing tax return.

So, even if you were tricked into eventually filing your tax return by a likely exaggerated estimated refund figure, filing your missing tax return is still likely a good idea.

Recent cases of interest



CASE: Sean Kelly

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Shauna Franklin, Homicide Unit

The Honorable Matthew Gary sentenced 20-year-old Sean Kelly to 72 years to life in prison. On December 3, 2015, a jury convicted Kelly of second-degree murder and attempted murder. The jury also found true that Kelly personally used a firearm in the commission of those crimes.

In April 2014, Kelly and the victim, Romainia Tyson, were involved in a verbal altercation where firearms were displayed on both sides. On the morning of April 23, 2014, Kelly was hanging out at a barbershop operated out of the garage of a Natomas residence. Mr. Tyson and his friend drove by, turned around and parked in front of the driveway of the home. Mr. Tyson got out of the car and headed up the driveway toward where Kelly was seated. Kelly removed his firearm from his waistband and began firing, striking Mr. Tyson a number of times, killing him. Mr. Tyson's friend who was driving the car was also struck in the arm. Kelly fled the scene and was arrested the next day.

CASE: Salvador Martinez, James Wallace & Tana Dania

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Casey Newton, Gangs & Hate Crimes Unit

The Honorable Delbert Oros sentenced Salvador Martinez to 40 years to life in prison. On December 3, 2015, a jury convicted Martinez of murder. The jury also found true the allegation that Martinez personally used a firearm causing death. James Wallace was convicted of being a felon in possession of a firearm and sentenced to 4 years in prison on January 8, 2016. Tana Dania was acquitted of all

Close to midnight on July 12, 2014, Tyrell Hall went to the Hookah Lounge on Fulton Avenue with several friends, including Martinez. Outside the lounge, a verbal dispute escalated into a fistfight and then a gunfight among several people,

including Martinez, Dania, and Wallace. Martinez was one of the shooters, setting off the gunfight. Mr. Hall was hit by gunfire, killing him.

CASE: Ryan Roberts

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Eric Kindall, Homicide Unit

The Honorable Gerrit Wood sentenced Ryan Roberts to 26 years to life in prison. On September 21, 2015, a jury convicted Roberts of first-degree murder. The jury also found true a use of knife enhancement.

Thirteen-year-old Jessica Funk-Haslam was murdered in a dugout of a baseball field in the Rosemont Community Park in March 2012. DNA consistent with Roberts' genetic profile was found on eight cigarette butts found near Jessica's body and on her belt.

CASE: David Earl Billoups

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Nicholas Johnson, Felony

The Honorable Matthew Gary sentenced David Earl Billoups to 5 years in county jail prison. On February 18, 2016, a jury convicted Billoups of felony animal cruelty. Billoups has a prior 2006 conviction for evading police officers and a prior 2009 conviction for burglary.

Billoups and Lynda Witherspoon were in a romantic relationship. On February 19, 2015, Billoups went to Ms. Witherspoon's residence and the two argued in her bedroom. When Ms. Witherspoon told Billoups she wanted to end the relationship, Billoups walked out of the room. Ms. Witherspoon then heard Billoups curse at her two-month-old Pit Bull puppy "Baby" followed by a thumping noise. When she ran out of her bedroom, she saw Baby twitching. The dog died at the residence.

Sacramento Animal Care Services performed a necropsy of Baby and determined the dog had two broken vertebra, a fractured skull, and bruising on the skull.

Eye Screenings for Free Cataract Surgeries

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Kaiser Permanente physicians and staff in Sacramento will offer screenings for area residents who may be eligible for free cataract surgeries that will be performed this spring.

The screenings, by appointment only, will be on Saturday, April 16th, at the Kaiser Permanente Point West Medical Offices, 1650 Response Road, Sacramento.

The surgeries are part of Mission Cataract USA, an annual program in which participating doctors provide the sight-restoring procedure to hundreds of people across the nation who have no health insurance and can't afford the operation. This is Kaiser Permanente's 21st year in the program. Kaiser Permanente physicians and staff will perform as many as 20 free cataract surgeries on eligible individuals in early May.







If you have ever experienced moving from one house to another, you know this can be a stressful time in your life. If you are someone with dementia, it only adds to the stress. I spoke about this with Carrin Jankowski, owner of Silver Lining Transitions, a company that assists families in moving older people from their homes to a new living environment. Often these senior citizens are moving from a home they have lived in for decades, and now, because of circumstances beyond their control (e.g. dementia, a loss of spouse, or the upkeep of residence that is too daunting), these seniors must move.

Carrin started Silver Lining Transitions in 2014 and is currently a student in the Gerontology Department at American River College. 
