Sacramento **Employment Trends Rise** 

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Hiring in the Sacramento region has exploded. Seventy-six percent, or just over three quarters of all companies surveyed in direct contacts by phone report, have opened doors for applicants, raising the demand a full six percentage points over this same time last year. Just twenty-four percent (24%) of top regional employers surveyed between August 17th and September 17th say they are not hiring in in the upcoming months.

When asked about motivation for hiring in October, November, and December, Pacific Staffing learned more than half-54%of Sacramento regional hiring related to workforce growth or expansion of payrolls. However, a larger number—61%—say part of their hiring is required for replacements or attrition among existing employees.

Pacific Staffing also discovered a shortage of qualified applicants and growing worry about retention in keeping those already on the payrolls. Going back to 1992 when the Employment Trends Survey began among top Sacramento regional employers, an unprecedented number of companies report difficulty in finding people with skills to do the work. When asked what challenges they face in hiring, 26% of Sacramento regional companies polled report concerns about finding qualified applicants.

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - A new name will soon join those inscribed on the Wall of Honor at Patriots Park. November 7th remembrances will induct Sheriff's Deputy Danny P. Oliver to the ranks of treasured local heroes.

Oliver died during a 2014 criminal incident that spread from Arcade to Placer County. The 47-year-old father of two was slain as he and another officer investigated activity in an Arden Way motel parking lot. The shooter and a female companion then fled to Auburn. En route, they carjacked two vehicles, shooting officers. One investigator, Michael Davis, died from his wounds.

At the time of his death, 15-year Sheriff's Department veteran Oliver worked with Problem-Oriented Policing in the North Area Division. "We hold Danny Oliver in a place of honor and distinction in the department and in the community," said Sacramento Sheriff Scott Jones. "He will never be forgotten."

Situated near the Carmichael and Fair Oaks border, Patriots Park is dedicated to Carmichael and Fair Oaks heroes. Their Wall of Honor bears plaques naming local legends vice since the Carmichael Park District began.

November 7th ceremonies. Remembrances begin with a flag-raising at 10 a.m. A strong representation of law enforcement agencies is expected at this year's event. Police and armed service veterans are welcome.

Shortages of skills include construction trades, route and delivery drivers, RNs with obstetrics experience, sales and accounting, or finance backgrounds. Skills also in-demand include customer service, warehouse, shipping, manufacturing, product assembly, and general office experience.

#### Special Report: **Degrees** in Hiring

When asked, "If you were a student, what specific degree, major, or course of study would be most beneficial to getting a job after graduation?" Sacramento employers overwhelmingly said a business administration degree is your best choice. Many also suggested that the degree should include an important minor, such as communications, English, finance/accounting, or economics. Fifty percent of all sectors in service, manufacturing, construction, and retail contacts recommended business.

Seven percent suggested English, while another 7% cited information technology as a

# Local and National Experts Discuss Sacramento Cohousing Opportunities

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -The second annual Sacramento Cohousing Forum will be held Saturday, October 10th from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Unitarian Universalist Church at 2425 Sierra Blvd in Sacramento.

The event will provide an opportunity to learn more about cohousing and whether it is right for you. Local and national experts, planners, and residents will talk about concept and design, as well as what it is like to live day-to-day in the "new, old-fashioned neighborhoods" of cohousing. These modernday villages are comprised of about 30 individual private homes surrounding a common house where residents can gather for meals and other activities. Cohousing is unique in that the residents design, own, and govern the community.

The featured speaker at the event will be architect Kathryn McCamant, one of the nation's experts on cohousing. McCamant has designed and developed dozens of communities throughout the US and Canada. She and her husband Charles Durrett introduced cohousing to North America in the 1980s. They are the authors of the book *Creating* Cohousing: Building Sustainable Communities.

Following McCamant's remarks, several local experts will discuss "Opportunities for Cohousing in Sacramento."

Presenters will include:

- Architect Erin Reschke of the firm Mogavero Notestine Architects, which is planning a cohousing community in Oak Park.
- Marty Maskall, project manager and future resident of Fair Oaks EcoHousing. Fair Oaks EcoHousing is slated to start construction in the spring of 2016.
- Bob Miller, resident of Wolf Creek Lodge in Grass Valley, a senior cohousing community.
- Anne Geraghty, former city planner and proponent of Renaissance Village Homes, a senior cohousing community envisioned for downtown Sacramento.

"What It's Really Like" will be the subject of a panel of current residents from local cohousing communities who will take questions from the audience. The communities represented on this panel will include:

- Southside Park Cohousing (5th & T Streets, Sacramento)
- Wolf Creek Lodge (a senior cohousing community in Grass Valley)
- Nevada City Cohousing (Nevada City)
- Muir Commons (in Davis, the first in the nation)
- N Street Cohousing (Davis)

After the forum adjourns at 5 p.m., the discussion will continue with refreshments and an informal Q and A. The event will be hosted by Fair Oaks EcoHousing, Renaissance Village Homes, Oak Park Cohousing, and Wolf Creek Lodge. The cost is \$10 at the door. ## Fair Oaks Neighborhood Watch **Group Seeks Solutions to Crime**

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - "If a burglar wants to enter your home, he'll use the weakest point of entry. You know what that is?" asked Scott Colvin, owner of First Solutions Incorporated, which installs home monitor alarm systems throughout the wider Sacramento area. The west Fair Oaks residents in the audience shook their heads curiously. "It's the side garage door. Most people don't think to secure it.'

Colvin is a big man who has done a lot of big security jobs. "Biggest job I've ever done is the nuclear reactor at U.C. Davis. Most people don't know that they have one there." With over 20 years of experience in his field, he is a personable and reliable guy who knows his trade well. On Thursday, September 24th, members of the West Fair Oaks Neighborhood Watch Association, Zone 4, gathered at the Living Hope Community Church to hear what their guest speaker had to say about keeping their homes secure. Colvin was friendly but blunt when he said, "In my opinion, you won't get a good return on your investment if you install a camera system, unless it's a small unit like the Alro from Netgear meant for

home use."

Colvin spoke for about 45 minutes. His talk was useful and sometimes disturbing. "Bad guys case neighborhoods by first getting jobs as door-to-door salesmen. They find out who's home, and when they quit the sales job, they go to work robbing people's home equipped with what they've learned about neighborhood. Colvin also mentioned that you should put thorny plants like holly in front of lowlying windows, that side gates should have locks, and that installing a security screen door at your home's front entrance will put one more layer of protection between you and surprise callers who can gain forced entry simply by getting you to open your front door.

The National Burglar and Fire Alarm Association says that about 2 million American homes

are burgled every year. West Fair Oaks alone tracked more than 20 reported incidents within a recent one-month period. So, the residents in Neighborhood Watch Association Zone 4 are right to be wary and prepared. The Association even publishes a free monthly newsletter, "West Side Stories," in order to create, "a community voice to improve the quality of life in our neighborhood through communication and education on crime prevention."

Another thing that the Association was right about: enlisting Scott Colvin, who knows his business and who obviously relishes imparting that knowledge to interested residents of Sacramento and Placer counties. "The number one rule that I want you to take away from this talk," said Colvin, "is to lock your door when you leave the house."



#### No Campfires in the Parkway

Since May, more than 50 wildfires have ignited in Sacramento County Regional Parks with a majority occurring in the American River Parkway. In response to the increasing fire danger, the Board of Supervisors approved an urgency ordinance granting additional authority to the Regional Parks Department to restrict the use of barbeques and other incendiary devices in Regional Parks except in designated picnic areas. In addition, the ordinance makes it a misdemeanor crime to ignite, maintain, or use a fire in any Regional Park facility without a permit from the director.

Fires in the American River Parkway are an immediate threat to public safety. The goal of this ordinance is to protect everyone who uses the Parkway, the neighborhoods surrounding it, and the public safety personnel who respond to the fires.

These stronger rules and enforcement measures give our park rangers another tool to stop fires before they start.

**Dare to Live** Without Limits What Kind of Day Will You Have?

The alarm clock blares, summoning the start of another long week. You drag yourself out of bedand start your routine. You're still tired, facing a long, monotonous day. It's only Monday.Friday seems so far in the future. What kind of day will you have?

You wake up before the alarm goes off. Filled with excitement about the brand new day ahead, you jump out of bed. You're glad it's Monday. There's a whole week in front of you filled with new opportunities. Energized with enthusiasm, you can't wait to get started. What kind of day will you have?

The kind of day you will have depends on your outlook. Expect your day to be torturous, and it will be. Have an upbeat attitude and your day will be much more pleasant. This approach works. Your perception is based on your mindset. Your reality is based on your perception. Therefore, your mindset determines your reality.

Don't wait for a good day to make you happy. When you are happy, you will have many more good days than those who aren't. When asked how are you doing, what's your answer? Your response offers real insight into your frame of mind.

Is your answer something along the lines of, "same stuff, different day"? Or do you reply with, "I'm doing well, thanks for asking"? Your response is shaped by your perception.

Of course everyone has off

days or times when they're feeling down. No one is emphatically upbeat 100% of the time. But with the right attitude, you can be in a positive mood a vast majority of the time.

The only thing you have total control over is your thoughts. Your thoughts control your attitude. So by directing your thoughts in a positive direction, your attitude will be boosted. Without conscious intent, thoughts have a tendency to drift into negative territory. This is due to the influence of all of the negativity we are exposed to from other people, news reports, and society in general.

It requires a conscious effort to guide your thoughts to the positive. Part of this process is connecting with positive influences such as other positive people, motivational books, tapes, and videos. A great source of inspiration is reading about the accomplishments of others and how they solve problems.

You have to be proactive. Waiting for your attitude to improve doesn't work. Start by limiting your exposure to negative influences. Minimize the time you spend with negative people along with any activities that bring you down.

Next, monitor and correct your self-talk. Replace negative phrases with positive ones. For example say, "I can," instead of "I can't," "I will," rather than "I'll try," and "I'll figure it out," in place of "It won't work."

Cultivate an attitude of gratitude. Start your day by reviewing a mental checklist of all the things in your life you have to be grateful for. List every positive element regardless of how small.

This process alone does wonders to boost your morale. It puts things into perspective and gives you a realization that circumstances are better than you thought. Repeat this process as often as necessary throughout each day to keep your attitude positive.

## **Governor Gets Request to Declare Tree Mortality Disaster**

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Senator Tom Berryhill (R-Twain Harte) submitted a request to Governor Jerry Brown and California Office of Emergency Services Director, Mark Ghilarducci, to declare a State of Emergency because of the threat presented by the increasing number of dead and dying trees in rural areas.

Drought, invasive species, and the history of mismanaged federal, state, and other forestlands have placed California in a situation where high numbers of dead or dying trees are providing fuel that is escalating the intensity of wildfires throughout the state. This situation threatens our ability to conserve water, jeopardizes air quality and carbon reduction as well.

While the Governor's office has recognized the drought as contributing to wildfire danger,

the administration has only the disaster would continue due recently begun to acknowledge the implication of tree mortality. Local resources are no longer enough to address the overwhelming increase in dead or dying trees throughout the state.

A U.S. Forest Service survey, of about 3.6 million acres of land covering the lower western foothills of the central and southern Sierra—from the Sacramento area south to Visalia, found more than 6 million dead trees across roughly 526,000 acres.

Tree mortality has reached endemic levels in many areas. Approximately 54% of all trees in Mariposa County are dead or in decayed state, with an expected increase to 72% of all trees this year.

Even if California experiences normal or higher-than-normal levels of precipitation this winter,

to the high number of dead trees that would fall. Falling trees pose a problem for power lines and are a public safety risk to communities and people who visit California's forests.

Mariposa, Madera, and Fresno County Boards of Supervisors are just a few of the recent counties in the area, covering the Sierra and Sequoia National Forests, issuing resolutions stating that the level of tree mortality "has created extraordinary threats to public safety," and "exceeds their functional capabilities."

State recognition of the disaster would draw much needed attention to the problem and begin the process of getting resources, both state and federal to the affected counties.

## **Colleges Need to Sync-Up Student Skills with Modern Employer Demands**

Many of today's college students are stunningly ill-prepared for the professional world. What's worse, they don't even realize it.

A new survey from the Association of American Colleges and Universities finds that about 70% of college students think they possess the critical thinking skills needed to succeed in the workplace. But less than a third of employers think recent college grads are ready for the real world.

There's good reason for this divide. Employers increasingly value skills that often aren't taught on the average college campus. And most students are completely unaware of employer demands because they don't plan for life outside the academic bubble.

Colleges need to repair this disconnect. Faculty and administrators must ensure students develop the aptitudes that can actually secure them long-term, satisfying employment.

Consider skills like teamwork and collaboration. While 60% of college students think they excel here, just 40% of employers agree. When it comes to the quality and speed of their decision-making, student confidence is double that of employers'.

At the same time, many employers have stopped assessing academic achievements alone. Indeed, only 2% of employers consider GPA the most important factor when evaluating job

**Commentary by John Hyde** applications, according to a survey from the research firm Millennial Branding.

These discrepancies are exacerbated because many students don't take advantage of the opportunities provided by school administrators to acquire professional skills.

Fortunately, there are ways to improve student career readiness.

First, colleges can adjust their curricula to better simulate realworld working conditions. Most jobs don't require the sort of sustained, independent work it takes to finish a paper; collaboration is more common. That's why Purdue University lends some of its business students out to local small businesses to act as consultants. Professors in all academic programs should look for similar opportunities.

Leadership matters, too. Only micromanagers provide employees with minute-by-minute orders. Often, workers are expected to identify employer needs, adapt accordingly, and guide colleagues when appropriate. Given that, American University has launched a public affairs leadership program, which challenges students to identify a social ill and try to resolve it.

Career service programs also have an important role in prepping students for life after college. Administrators should focus on increasing the number of internships available, expanding the variety of participating employers, and allowing students to accrue credit from part-time professional opportunities.

Notably, Alma College in Michigan has installed a careers services program that provides students \$2,500 grants toward offcampus internships, fellowships, or research.

Here at New York Institute of Technology, we provide extensive professional development opportunities. The skills our students acquire translate into real job opportunities. Fully 87% of our graduates are employed in their chosen field within six months of commencement. Nationally, only 55% of college grads secure fulltime jobs before the six-month mark.

Most recently, we started an urban administration course that introduces students to the innerworkings of city governments and non-profits through traditional classroom instruction-and then empowers them participate firsthand with a community service project. This program isn't simply aimed at exposing students to these fields. It also cultivates the problem-solving skills employers demand.

American institutions of higher education must narrow the gap between what the average student learns and what the average employer demands. If not, future generations of graduates will find themselves locked out of the job market and deprived of the chance to find fulfilling work.

## **Parents and Teachers Examine Homework**

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - Now that school is underway and schedules are being set, one particular subject comes to the forefront for many students, teachers, and parents: homework

The topic has become controversial in recent years. Books like The Case Against Homework (2007, Sara Bennett and Nancy Kalish), The Homework Myth (2007, Alfie Kohn), Rethinking Homework: Best Practices that Support Diverse Needs (2009, Cathy Vatterott), and documentaries like Race to Nowhere (2010) explore the educational policies in our country and within our school districts and how they compare to other countries that are performing the highest in the world, despite many of them having little to no homework for their students. Even NPR featured the subject in an article titled "Homework: A New User's Guide."

There are many conflicting claims on how much of an increase we have had in homework loads on children in the last 20-30 years. Some claims say it has doubled, others argue that it has stayed pretty much the same. When the communication manager of Sacramento Unified School District was asked if there had been any recent changes in homework policies, she said not at the district level, but that schools handle it on a case-by-case basis. But when researching the subject, personal findings are that there are certain factors that should be considered when a parent or a teacher is deciding if homework helps or hinders their students.

How long does homework take per subject? When should students get a break from doing homework? Is homework interfering in other activities or family time? When a group of

mothers of students in a K-8 school within the San Juan district were approached with these questions, they had much to say. "Homework works well for our family," said Melissa Tachiera, mother of a first grader, a third grader, and a high schooler. "It creates both a routine and helps my kids learn responsibility. But my kids actually like doing homework and finish it quickly, and I know this is not the case for everyone."

Another mother chimed in. "I had my son at a very militanttype school before this school year, where the homework load was large, and he began to quickly dislike going to school," she said. "The daily battle even

to get him to go to school was getting unbearable, so his father and I decided to switch. Since changing, his whole attitude is improved, and he once again is liking school and coming home happy."

When the group was asked about their opinions of weekend or holiday break homework, all of them shook their heads in unison. "Weekends and holidays are *our* time, family time," one said. "It's also a time when we get to relax as a family, do sports, and let our kids be kids," replied another. When asked about homework overload, a mother said, "We have never had a problem with the teachers here overloading our kids, and if there have ever been any issues, it is easy to contact the teacher and work it out, whether it be homework or any other problem." One of the mothers also added, "Homework can also be an important part of recognizing if there is a learning disability present in your child and getting early intervention."

Although homework was not a sore subject among this group of parents, there are plenty with conflicting experiences. Many educators in districts all over the country are beginning to examine homework within the classrooms, particularly at the high school level, where so many students are feeling increased pressure that results in stress, depression, and even performance-enhancing drug use. One teacher featured in the *Race to Nowhere* documentary noted that when he cut his homework load in half as an experiment, the scores from students actually went up a significant amount. Other teachers around the nation are doing this same experiment with similar findings.

Is the homework that is being assigned conducive to learning and retaining, or is it just "busy work?" Is it something that is being currently taught in class, or are students expected to learn it at home on their own or with instruction from parents? This was the case for another parent that was interviewed, Heidi Kellerman, who has both a

student in San Juan Unified and Sacramento Unified. Kellerman said, "The problem I have had with homework are the assignments that my kids have yet to be instructed on, and so I end up being the teacher for them. I am a single parent, and after a full work day, I don't have time and patience to be my kids' teacher as well." Kellerman also went on to say that many times a parent actually completes work for their child. When she has helped her kids with projects for display and later gone to see the other children's projects, it seems obvious to her that most of them where completed by the parents and not the kids, as they are very advanced. "So what's the point of it if the parents are just going to do it for them? What do the kids learn?" she asked.

This is a complaint of many of the parents' groups that have begun petitions to ban homework in their districts. They say the nightly battle with kids, the emotional impact on both the whole family, and the amount of help on their part (when they have housework, cooking, errands, and more) is not worth it when their child's assignment so often does nothing to further them academically or improve their life skills. The National PTA has even been quoted as saying, "Homework that cannot be completed without help from the parent is not good homework."

So where do we go from here? Homework seems to be a subject that is individual to the family and the teacher. But the one word that seems to sum up how most people feel about it is moderation. Just like anything else, too much of it hurts not helps—a developing mind. When a student experiences high stress, burnout, and develops a "who cares, just get it done" attitude, we all lose. ★

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** -A nonprofit umbrella group for the Sacramento region's community bands has lost virtually all its funds in an apparent case of embezzlement. Many local bands now face turning off the music and shutting down entirely due to this tragic loss. The incident has damaged musical groups from Auburn to Elk Grove.

The loss is an emotional blow to musicians around the region, who have for decades, poured their time and talent into making music for the public. They are asking the public to help them continue playing music and bounce back from this unfortunate hit.

Board members of the Sacramento Valley Symphonic Band Association discovered the loss of funds in late August. The officer in charge of finances has resigned and has not responded to questions from members. Sacramento County Sheriff's detectives are investigating the case. The loss exceeds \$50,000, though an exact accounting is still to be determined.

In the meantime, the association is scrambling to find funds to cover its obligations. The association pays for liability insurance, covers the American Society of Composers (ASCAP) fees, and maintains a band music library for the Amador County Concert Band, Auburn Concert Band, Capitol Pops Concert Band, Elk Grove Community Band, Pittsburg Community Band, River City Concert Band, Roseville Community Concert Band, Sacramento Concert Band, Sacramento Symphonic Winds, 3 Note Band, Yolo Community Band, and Winds Of Faith Concert Band.

The association also serves as treasurer for some member

bands, which now have no money as a result of the loss. These include the Sacramento Symphonic Winds of Carmichael and the River City Concert Band of Sacramento. These bands have been entertaining the public and providing an outlet for local amateur musicians for decades. Without help, they may be forced to terminate operations.
