Clean Sweep for Creeks

Water Wisdom Shared by 1,800 Volunteers

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A party celebrating Creek Week recently caused a big splash—and vital lessons in water conservation—at Carmichael Park.

Displays and giveaways from many sponsoring agencies sent an unfiltered message: during California's worst drought, everyone must do their bit to save and protect water.

Earlier, almost 1,800 volunteers from youth and neighborhood groups formed a spring cleanup army. Teams scoured 70 creek locations from the Delta to Folsom and from Galt to Antelope. The 25-year-old community program aims to rejuvenate county waterways by removing garbage and invasive plants. The

project was this year aided by the Sacramento Regional Conservation

Corps. Thanks to a state grant,

the group is able to recycle dumped tires and, on the clean-up drive, corps members netted more than 100 of these water-polluting

Though garbage results are still being tabulated, the haul gleaned many tons of other stuff alien to healthy creeks. Sacramento Area Creeks Council President Alta Tura observed an increase in the trash count over last year's tally: "Because of recent rains, more garbage was washed down streams," she ventured.

"But our waterways always need cleaning. The volunteers did a stellar job."

Part of their reward was 1,800 hot dogs, dished up by Carmichael Chamber of Commerce volunteers. "The Carmichael party celebrates everyone's hard work," said Tura. "It also teaches people about nature, how to save water and be better stewards of our environment."

EcoHousing Project Unanimously Approved

EcoHousing, a new cohousing community of 30 homes, was unanimously approved by the Sacramento County Planning Commission on April 13th by a vote of 4-0. Not one individual showed up to object to the project. Commissioner Eric Guerra called it "a wonderful neighborhood that

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Fair Oaks will raise the quality of life in unanimous approval from the Sacramento County." This is the first time cohousing will be available in the Sacramento suburbs.

> This environmentally friendly infill project is sponsored by a group of 11 local households, who are all investors as well as future residents. The project had previously received

Fair Oaks Community Planning Council (CPAC) and "enthusiastic, unanimous approval" from the Sacramento County Design Review Advisory Committee (DRAC) in September 2014.

When completed, the 30 privately owned homes will be clustered on the 3.7-acre property

bordered by Fair Oaks Boulevard and New York Avenue near Fair Oaks Village and the American River Parkway. The group has been working with architect and international cohousing expert Charles Durrett on the design of the community.

At the hearing, several future residents spoke. Bob Oyafuso of Folsom added, "My wife has Alzheimer's and requires 24-hour care. Her cognitive skills are so diminished that she no longer is able to entertain herself. Her quality of life depends completely on the interactions with others. When I investigated Fair Oaks EcoHousing I asked, "If my wife was sitting on our front porch, would you come up to her

Senator Gaines' Privacy Package Moves Forward

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -Senator Ted Gaines announced that two of his California Privacy and Consumer Protection Act bills related to drone use—Senate Bills 170 and 271 passed the Senate Committee on Public Safety with unanimous, bi-partisan support.

"Privacy issues, especially in today's fast-paced internet and technology era, are among the most important policy issues facing Californians," said Senator Gaines. "We must protect the public's right to privacy and more importantly, their safety, from inappropriate drone use. These bills address this new reality and create harsh penalties for those who cross the line. I look forward to their continued support."

Senate Bill 170 mandates an increased sentence when a drone is used to deliver contraband into a prison or county jail. The bill also makes it a misdemeanor to fly a drone over a prison or county jail.

Keeping contraband out of prisons and county jails is critical to running safe and orderly facilities. With public access to drones increasing, this issue is becoming even more of a challenge. As drones become smaller and easier to operate, virtually anyone will be able to use the device to drop contraband into a prison or county jail. Drones can also be used to gather sensitive information from inside of prisons. This information can be used for a variety of dangerous exploits, including inmate escapes and prison riots. Placing restrictions on the use of drones over prisons and jails helps prevent these situations.

Senate Bill 271 safeguards children from kidnapping, harassment, stalking, or a host of other potential harm by making it illegal to fly drones over public schools grades K-12 during school hours. The bill also makes it illegal to capture images of the campus during school hours or during extracurricular activities.

This bill is intended to stay ahead of the technological curve by providing a safeguard for children while they are at school and provides an important layer of privacy to students at a place that should be a sanctuary.

"Drones are already helping our schools protect kids from harm. But in the wrong hands, they can be threats to safety in thousands of ways that we are only starting to imagine," said El Dorado County District Attorney Vern Pierson, who testified in support of the bill. "This legislation gets ahead of the issue and helps make our campuses safe."

Apartment Fire in Fair Oaks

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Just after 8:00 a.m. on April 30th, Metro Fire crews were dispatched to a two-story apartment complex at 10501 Fair Oaks Boulevard for a report of visible flames from a downstairs apartment. Crews arrived to a working fire and quickly initiated fire attack. Shortly after arrival, information was received that two children may be trapped inside the fire unit.

During firefighting operations, life safety is the top priority and every second counts. Generally, the first arriving crew begins fighting the fire while performing a hasty search for occupants. Next arriving firefighters conduct further searches for victims. When a report of trapped occupants is received, additional crews will enter the home from bedroom windows-without hoselinesto quickly search and rescue trapped occupants. Fortunately,


the report of children trapped was unfounded and the fire was

An aggressive fire attack allowed crews to contain the fire to the apartment of origin, saving all surrounding apartments from damage. The fire appears to have started in the kitchen, with the cause currently under investigation. Damage is estimated at \$50,000. Nobody was home at the time of the fire and no civilians or firefighter injuries were reported. One adult and two children were displaced; Red Cross assisted them.

and say hello?" The response was an enthusiastic, "yes"! I'm here because I know my neighbors will greet her with love."

The homes will range in size from two-bedroom flats to fourbedroom town homes, along with extensive community facilities and garden areas, using designs to promote the sense of a neighborly

village. The new community is unique in that it is being designed, funded, and built by future residents who seek to live in a more socially connected and sustainable neighborhood than traditional

suburban developments.

The Fair Oaks property offers close proximity to the American River Parkway and its miles of bike paths, as well as Fair Oaks Village, Banister Park, the Sacramento Waldorf School, and the Rudolph Steiner College.

Green Design

Through its use of environmentally friendly design and building practices, Fair Oaks EcoHousing is expected to be one of the most sustainable new housing environments in the area. A variety of "green" strategies and

technologies have been incorporated into the community's design. Among them are minimal paving, abundant natural lighting, and solar panels.

Fair Oaks EcoHousing will be the first cohousing community to be built in the suburbs of Sacramento. It takes inspiration from other regional cohousing neighborhoods, notably Southside Park Cohousing in downtown Sacramento, Wolf Creek Lodge in Grass Valley, Nevada City Cohousing, and several wellestablished communities in Davis.

Nationally, there are more than 130 cohousing communities, with many others in Europe and

Orangevale Karate Dojo Excels at US Open and International Junior Cup

ORANGEVALE, CA (MPG) - SASKA USA in Orangevale practices the Shotokan style of karate. Shotokan is a Japanese-based style of karate that was founded in 1922 by Gichin Funakoshi. The study of karate provides many benefits, including discipline, physical fitness, and teaching students to strive to excel. At SASKA, belts are earned and not given. Students must show focus, discipline, and meet the high standards established during training. These high standards establish a heightened sense of accomplishments in students. Participating in tournaments is optional; however, it is a beneficial activity in which many SASKA students are involved. Competing in tournaments rewards students for their hard work by allowing them to compare their skills to students from other dojos. The tournament environment also reveals an athlete's ability to function at a high level

while under stress. Over the last year, SASKA has competed in five tournaments, two of which were international-level events. Months of hard work and countless hours went into preparing for these tournaments and the dojo performed very well. The results are as follows:

2014 National Karate

2015 USA Karate Qualifier (April 2015, Yuba City, California)—Four athletes competed and won three gold, one silver, and four bronze. Mason Brown and Dylan Ek won gold


for kumite (sparring).

Recently, on a visit to my hometown, I took the time to drive by the house that had been my childhood home. It was the first time I had seen it in nearly two decades. It was largely unchanged except that it seemed so much smaller. Surely, the house, and what I thought had been a sprawling front yard, had shrunk over the years.

Not everything, however, was small and nostalgic. The neighborhood itself had gone to seed. Homes were completely abandoned. Once beautiful yards were overgrown. Everywhere I looked I saw the same thing: Dilapidated, deteriorating, rundown homes.

So what happened? It was a failure of vigilance more than anything else. Everyone moved out or moved on, and homes that aren't lived in break down. The same can be said for our hearts. By "heart," of course I'm not speaking of the cardiovascular system, but the mysterious, inner

Prioritizing your work ensures that the most important items are completed first. Work initially on those things that either can't wait or will generate the most measurable results. This

approach will appreciably boost your productivity. Your success is based on your accomplishments rather than how busy you

Continuously monitor your strategies for effectiveness. If you are not getting the results you are looking for, make adjustments. Success requires constant refining of procedures and techniques. In life, as in sports, the participants are constantly monitoring their performance and altering their tactics as needed to deal with changing conditions.

Focus on today while anticipating your needs and planning for tomorrow. Use your past experience as a guide for the future. There is a lot to be learned from endeavors that didn't work out as planned.

Success requires active participation in your life. You are responsible. You are in control. Don't wait for things to happen, go out and make them happen. Formulate goals, make plans, and take action. Learn from you past while always moving forward. Stay in it and you will



expressions of love and gentle communication. This is very important and necessary to any relationship.


- 4) ROMANTICE GESTURES: Send flowers, a card, jewelry, or a token of appreciation.

Essential Screening Tests for Colon Cancer

Dear Savvy Senior,

Are there any easier alternatives to a colonoscopy to check for colon cancer? I'm in my sixties and would like to be tested, but hate the idea of drinking all that laxative solution, and being sedated for the procedure.

- Squeamish Jim

Dear Jim,

It's a great question. While a colonoscopy is considered the gold standard screening test for detecting colon cancer and is widely recommended once adults reach age 50, only about half of Americans who've passed that milestone ever get tested.

Why? Because most people, like yourself, dread the all-day laxative prep and sedation, not to mention the procedure itself. Fortunately, there are some easier alternatives, but be aware that if these tests uncover any suspicious results, you'll still need to undergo a colonoscopy.

Take-Home Tests

There are two different types of tests on the market today that you can take in the privacy of your own home that requires no laxative-taking/bowel-cleansing preparation.

The best option is the new FDA approved Cologuard test (see cologuardtest.com), which has a 92 sensitivity rate for detecting colon cancers. With this test you simply take a sample of a bowel movement, and mail it in to the lab for analysis.

The lab looks for both blood and cancer-related DNA cells in your

The Cologuard test, which is recommended every three years, requires a prescription from your doctor, and costs \$599 but is covered by Medicare and many private insurers.

If, however, you find that the Cologuard test is not covered by your insurer, and you can't afford or don't want to pay the \$599 fee, the other option is the fecal occult blood test (FOBT) or the fecal immunochemical test (FIT), which detects 74 percent colon cancers.

These tests, which are also provided by your doctor, check for traces of blood in the stool that could indicate cancer or large polyps that can develop into cancer, but they don't look at the DNA. You simply send a stool sample to the lab.

Recommended annually, both of these fecal tests cost only around \$25 and are covered by Medicare and most insurers.

Less Invasive Tests

Two other tests to consider that are less invasive then a colonoscopy but more entailed than the take-home tests are the virtual colonoscopy and the sigmoidoscopy (both tests are recommended every five years).

A virtual colonoscopy uses a CT scan to view your colon instead of a scope in the rectum, so it's a less invasive procedure than a traditional colonoscopy

and doesn't require sedation. But, it still requires the same bowel-cleansing prep. It's also more expensive, typically costing between \$400 and \$800 and is not covered by Medicare or most insurers.

A sigmoidoscopy exam, which is covered by Medicare and most insurers, uses a short, flexible scope inserted in the rectum like a colonoscopy to look at the lower colon only. This is a much faster and less involved procedure than a colonoscopy and one that doesn't require sedation. You follow a clear liquid diet the day before the exam and take a laxative or enema the morning


Colon Cancer Numbers

Colon cancer, which develops slowly over several years without causing symptoms especially in the early stages of the disease, is the second largest cancer killer in the U.S., killing around 50,000 Americans a year.

The U.S. Preventive Services Task Force – an independent panel of medical experts that advises the government on health policies – recommends colon cancer screening to all adults, ages 50 to 75. Earlier screenings are recommended to people who have an increased risk due to family history or other factors.

Experts believe that as many as 20,000 lives could be saved each year, if the screening rate went up to 90 or 95 percent.



Hundreds Rally for AB 311, Bill Fails in Assembly


- On April 27th, multitudes of people gathered at the north steps of the Capitol to rally for the passage of Assembly Bill 311. Among the speakers were Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber) and Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Nicolaus), who is the author of AB 311.

Assemblyman Gallagher spoke of how important this bill is to many Californians. He also referenced the legislation that helped to expedite the building of the Kings arena. "There's a lot of talk about water being the lifeblood of California," said Gallagher. "Let's prove it by getting this vital funding allocated to Sites Reservoir and Temperance Flat and by passing AB 311 today and showing all Californians that we value water just as much as we do professional sports."

Assembly Republican Leader Kristin Olsen (Modesto) said, "If we want to prevent future dire situations related to drought that will inevitably hit California again, then we have to work together today to build the storage capacity that we so desperately need in order to increase water supply and provide it to all our communities."

An attendee of the rally, who wished to remain anonymous, said his concern about the lack of water in California is what made him support the bill. So what does he think will help the drought? "Building more dams, more reservoirs," he said. A common theme among attendees was that most wanted to see action as soon as possible.

However, just hours after the rally, the bill was rejected by the Assembly committee. On Twitter, people voiced their opinions about the bill. "As conservationist, raft guide & hunter, I support

conservation & river protection, but #CADems block sensible #Water infrastructure," tweeted Twitter user @tabberg. On the other end of the spectrum, Twitter user @krislevtwombly tweeted in response to Kristin Olsen's plea to pass the bill, "Thx4urEfforts #cawater supply but :(about #ab311 rush dam projects. All CA wild spaces r sacred. Don't drown them. Lost4evr."

The day after the bill's rejection, Governor Jerry Brown announced that his administration would authorize expediting environmental reviews of certain water projects. Gallagher responded to the

\$10,000 Fine for Water Infractions, says Brown

- Governor Brown, meeting with mayors from across the state, announced he will propose legislation to help local officials better enforce conservation requirements and will direct state agencies to streamline environmental review of local water supply projects.

"These measures will strengthen the ability of local officials to build new water projects and ensure that water is not wasted," said Governor Brown. "As this drought stretches on, we'll continue to do whatever is necessary to help communities save more water.

The proposed legislation will give new enforcement authority to local entities that don't currently have it and increase potential penalties against water wasters. Specifically, it will enable the following actions:

- Establish a new penalty of up to \$10,000 per violation, expanding on \$500 per day maximum infraction established in last year's drought legislation.
- Allow penalties to be issued administratively by wholesale and retail water agencies, as well as city and county governments. This change speeds up an infraction process involving courts that was established in last year's emergency drought legislation.
- Enable these entities to enforce local water restrictions against water waste, as well as conservation restrictions established by the State Water Resources Control Board.
- Allow local public agencies to deputize staff to issue water conservation-related warnings and citations.

This legislation will give all water agencies and local governments a consistent, minimum set of enforcement authorities to achieve required water conservation. Local water agencies with existing authorities to enforce mandatory water reductions against water waste can continue to use those authorities. Under the proposed legislation, any monetary penalties from this enforcement will be used for local conservation efforts.

Separately, to streamline environmental permitting for critical water supply projects, the Governor has directed his Office of Planning and Research and other state agencies to help local water agencies reduce the time required to comply with state-required environmental reviews. These permit streamlining efforts will focus on projects that can increase local water supplies with limited environmental impacts. The Governor's Office will also explore legislative changes that can speed up delivery of critical water supply projects.

In recent weeks, Governor Brown has convened top agricultural, environmental, urban water agency, and business leaders from across California to discuss the state's drought and conservation efforts.

In April, Governor Brown announced the first ever 25% statewide mandatory water reductions and a series of actions to help save water, increase enforcement to prevent wasteful water use, streamline the state's drought response, and invest in new technologies that will make California more drought resilient. This order included measures to help replace lawns with drought-tolerant landscaping and old appliances with more water and energy efficient models; cut water use at campuses, golf courses, cemeteries, and other large landscapes; prevent potable water irrigation at new developments unless waterefficient drip systems are used; and stop watering of ornamental grass on public street medians.

Within days of the Governor's order, the State Water Resources Control Board released its framework to achieve the

and the California Energy Commission approved new water appliance standards to save billions of gallons of water per year. The California Department of Water Resources also announced that due to the severe drought it will install an emergency temporary rock barrier across a Sacramento San Joaquin Delta channel to help prevent the saltwater contamination of water that 25 million Californians depend on.

These measures build on unprecedented action by the State Water Resources Control Board over the past year to prohibit other wasteful water use and encourage Californians to conserve, including strict limits on outdoor irrigation (two days a week in much of California) and bans on hosing down outdoor surfaces, decorative water fountains that don't recirculate water, and car washing without an automatic shut-off nozzle. Bars and restaurants are also now required to only serve water upon request and hotels must ask guests staying multiple nights whether linens and towels need to be washed.

Governor Brown proclaimed a drought state of emergency in January 2014, and for more than two years the state's experts have been managing water resources to deal with the effects of the drought, which include severely curtailed water supplies to agricultural producers, farmworker job losses due to fallowed fields, drinking water vulnerability in communities across California, heightened fire danger, and threats to endangered and threatened fish and wildlife.


