

CA Water Bond Won't Create New Water

- Food & Water Watch is disappointed with the \$7.5 billion water bond passed by the State Legislature and Governor Brown,

now slated for the November ballot. While this bond will not solve California's water problems, it will stick taxpayers with serious debt. The bond prioritizes \$2.7 billion of taxpayer dollars on wasteful dam projects: spending money to pour more concrete won't create a drop of new water

An investment in dams is an investment in private interests, not in the public interest.

"In addition, the bond would funnel taxpayer money to purchase more water for big agriculture interests on the west side of the San Joaquin Valley where corporations are exporting water-intensive crops grown on toxic soil. Meanwhile, the Brown administration has yet to take serious action to promote water

pumping of our groundwater.

This bond measure fails to respond to the current drought and relies on solutions from the last century.x

Senator Nielsen Issues Statement on Governor's Open Letter on Water Bond

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- Governor Brown distributed a letter Tuesday stating his inflexible position on the water bond. Ignoring the needs of farm workers, ranchers, businesses and average Californians, the Governor drew a line in the sand to propose a \$6 billion bond that will essentially reduce water storage to a fraction of what's needed.

State Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber) issued the following statement in response to Governor Brown's rigid proposal:

"Under Brown's plan, fund-

ing for surface water storage - essential to California's longterm water needs - and other key water projects will be slashed.

"The Governor's



uncompromising position is puzzling.

"He continues to focus on the high-speed rail that no one needs and few people want. At

an estimated cost of nearly \$100 billion, the train has not broken ground and the state has already

spent \$500 million. "Investing in critical water storage for generations of Californians is of far greater

significance than a train across

California."

Legislature Passes First Water Storage Bond in 50 Years

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)

- With the drought still drying up the state, the California Legislature and Gov. Jerry Brown Wednesday poured out a \$7.5 billion water bond that includes \$2.7 billion for water storage. If voters give their approval this November, this will be the first bond in 50 years to include water

The storage is significant because, from 1971 to 2014, California voters passed 21 water bonds totaling \$35.9 billion without any water storage. Paraphrasing poet Samuel T. Coleridge, California had "bonds, bonds, water bonds, but not a drop of water to drink."

The new bond passed in the Assembly by a vote of 77 to 2 and

from willing sellers for the benefit of migratory birds and wildlife refuges. But Restore the Delta believes the same water to be bought for wildlife eventually could be pumped through the proposed Twin Tunnels.

Said Restore the Delta Executive Director Barbara Barrigan-Parrilla, "It contains false protections for the Delta, and we call upon legislators, especially those representing the Delta, to vote against it. We are not fooled, and this bond will become a referendum for the tunnels. That is not going to advance the water solutions we need."

All that remains to be seen is if the voters can gulp down a \$7.5 billion water bond with water storage in it for the first time in almost 50 years.



You may know someone or maybe personally you are really struggling with depression. There are so many things happening in your life. Some days you don't even feel like getting out of bed. Some days you feel like you can't make any decisions; it's just too difficult. You can't decide on anything. Some days you just feel trapped in a hopeless situation. It's like you're in a room with no doors or windows and you're locked inside. You're constantly tired. You don't have any energy. You're fatigued. Some of you may even feel like running away. You want to drop it all, leave, split. Get out of the situation.

I've got good news for you: Jesus Christ wants to answer your depression. He will help you. He will change you. You're not alone. You matter to God. There are people around you who care about you. God says, "I can help you change."

You don't have to go through life being manipulated by your emotions. Your emotions are controlled by your thoughts. You cannot control your emotions but you can control what you think about. Choose to change your thoughts and choose to let God change the misconceptions; misconceptions like, "If somebody

criticizes me, that must mean I'm worthless". Misconceptions like, "I have to be loved and accepted by everybody to be happy." Misconceptions like, "I cannot admit any area of weakness. I have to be perfect, otherwise I'm a failure". Those are the kind of thoughts that cause depression.

Jesus said, "I am the truth." (John 14:6) He said, "You will know the truth and the truth will set you free." (John 8:32) The more you know Jesus, the freer you are. You can change.

You start by establishing a personal relationship to Christ. You become what the Bible calls 'born again'. That doesn't solve all your depression, but without Christ in your life, you won't have the power to change. He wants to be a part of your life and if you give Him control, He will help you. Then once He's in your life, you ask Him to give you a new purpose and a new meaning to your life. What we need is something greater than ourselves that draws us out of ourselves so we won't be depressed. You need something greater to live for than just your own self. People who live for themselves are guaranteed to get depressed. You need something greater that draws you out of yourself. That is a relationship to Christ and His purpose that takes you out of depression.

Maybe you're depressed because you feel guilty. God says, "I want to forgive you. I want to clear your conscious. I want to set you free from regrets." Maybe you feel depressed because you think, "I don't even like myself. I don't

like myself at all!" Jesus said, "I didn't create you for nothing. You are worthwhile, significant. You're special. There's value to your life." When you start basing your value on the opinions of other people, then anytime anybody criticizes you, condemns you, puts you down, disapproves of you, or simply doesn't express appreciation, you're going to get depressed. Also, when you base your self-worth on your achievements you're going to get depressed. You're always going to find people who have done more than you. You're always going to find people who are doing a better job than you are right now. You're going to compare yourself and say, "Why shouldn't I be like that?" And you'll get down.

What do we base our feelings about ourselves on, then? Something that can never be taken away. You matter to God and He has a plan for your life. That's a fact that cannot be taken away from you. You may lose everything else, but nobody can take that away from you. You are child of God, you are significant. With God in your life, He can help you make the changes in your thoughts so that you don't think like the world does, but you think on the Truth and the Truth will set you free.



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Yesteryear Rests Peacefully in Fair Oaks Cemetery

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Picturesque Fair Oaks cemetery was founded on October 21, 1902 on a halfacre of land. Ornate headstones commemorating patriarchs lie in close proximity to simple, unnamed grave markers. The list of interments is unique; the first official resident of the grounds was Sarah Vail, a Folsom native who died in a fire and was buried in 1903. There are two other women who were buried in 1898, but Miss Vail is the first authenticated burial at Fair Oaks Cemetery



Other gravesites include a dozen Civil War veterans from both the Union and Confederate Armies who now share a common ground. Another notable resident is Myrna Opsahl, a 42 year old mother of four who died in 1975 during an early morning bank robbery in Carmichael. She was shot by the infamous Symbionese Liberation Army. (The radical group also kidnapped and brainwashed heiress Patty Hearst during their reign of terror.) Alongside these graves are the plots of early 20th century people who are memorialized with small stone markers listing only last name and year of death. One in particular is a tiny headstone cradled amongst the roots of a large oak tree bearing the inscription: Bishop Baby - 1907. One hundred and seven years later, this little monument still brings on a melancholic

Fair Oaks Cemetery manager of 17 years, Ray Young, takes great pride in the many years of service the cemetery has provided to the community. "We are one of the oldest cemeteries in the region." His staff includes office manager Terri Perrin, clerk Theresa Day, and lead groundskeeper Guillermo Barron; they help Young maintain the tradition of honoring loved ones in a placid and serene setting. The cemetery facilities now cover 12 acres and over 100 years of local history.

Fair Oaks The Way it Was (1976) recounts: "In the early 1890s, a man, a representative of


the Howard & Wilson Publishing Co., which was seeking land for a colony, rode up a trail along the American River and was greatly impressed with the beauty of the land, especially a stand of mossdraped oaks along the north shore of the river. He had found his site. It was known as 'Sunset Colony' and was later named Fair Oaks because it looked like Fair Oaks, Virginia." The publishing company purchased 9,000 acres and helped settle the area known today as Fair Oaks, California.

Pioneers from the Midwest and East with names such as Slocum, Straith, and McClatchy were families that helped establish Fair Oaks and the surrounding expanse. The Fair Oaks Bridge and the arrival of the railroad spurred growth, and Fair Oaks became known as the crown of the Sacramento Valley in the heart of California. A local publication of the period, The Tattler quipped: "Now that we have two M.D.s, the people have concluded that we need a cemetery." Two and one half acres at Olive Street and New York Avenue were purchased for the sum of \$250.00 from S.E. Keifer for use as a cemetery. Bylaws were drawn up and lots were apportioned to the stockholders. Fair Oaks Cemetery Association President C. H. Slocum allocated the remaining plots for future sale.

The Fair Oaks Cemetery District (FODC) oversees the day to day operations of the facility and serves Fair Oaks, and parts of Carmichael and Rancho Cordova. Various community organizations, such as the Fair Oaks and Carmichael Chambers of Commerce, the Fair Oaks Rotary, and the Orangevale Grange, partner with the FOCD and help to maintain this resting place.

Fair Oaks Cemetery is an all-inclusive memorial park serving the various regional communities. Interments include an array of plans ranging from the moderately priced Oak Knoll Niches to specially placed and designated plots available throughout the grounds. 
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

RIDING IN THE CAR?

I grew up with a lot of religious rules. To violate these rules was to subject oneself to the judgment of God. If you had a fundamentalist upbringing, you may be familiar with some of these restrictions. No drinking, no smoking, no dancing, no playing cards or going to the movies, no mixed-bathing (a prospect that intrigued my teenage mind), no Sabbath-breaking (though we did not actually gather on the Sabbath), and absolutely no questioning of religious authority.

Religious authority was bound up in "The Preacher." The big Baptist downtown had a pastor. The Methodists had a seminary trained Reverend. The Presbyterians had a collection of elders. The one fledgling Catholic parish on the edge of town had a priest. I didn't meet a Jew until high school, so I didn't even know what a rabbi was, but it would not have mattered anyway.

In my narrow ecclesiastical world, we had The Preacher, the Alpha and Omega of religious instruction; the united concoction of fiery prophet, hardened inquisitor, moral policeman, and God's anointed spokesman. I was certain that he cut his grass in a pinstripe suit and wingtips,

and all his children were probably adopted because to have sex with his wife was certainly too worldly, too carnal to consider.

See, the world in which the preacher lived was black and white with no shades of gray, no mystery, no ambiguities. There were only hard and fast certainties. You were in or you were out. If you wanted to know which you were, just ask him. He would tell you, and he used the pulpit to do exactly that.

On Sundays he became an inferno of Puritan proportions. Animated, wringing with sweat, discarding his suit coat and loosening his tie, he implored and coerced us sinners down the isle to the mourner's bench. It usually worked. Someone "repented" most every service, even if it took thirty verses of "Just as I Am" to force the issue. Those altar calls were nerve rattling wars of attrition, and sometimes I felt compelled to go forward so the whole thing would mercifully end.

It was The Preacher who arrived at the hospital on a spring afternoon to visit my family. My younger brother was enduring a lengthy hospitalization with a faulty heart valve and a growing laundry list of complications. Not yet a year old, he had already faced more health challenges than most of us will ever see. His life hung by the proverbial thread.

My parents certainly needed emotional and spiritual support, a pastoral presence, but The Preacher was anything but comforting. I heard him say the most

didn't know a single curse word, horrible thing to my parents. In paraphrase he said, "Surely you have committed some terrible sin for God to visit this kind of judgment on you and your family." Even as a child I was flabbergasted, and to this day those words still burn my ears.

> Is this the God of Christianity? Is this the kind of God behind our faith? Is this vindictive deity even worthy of our worship? I think not. While this might be the god of The Preacher, it is not the God revealed to us in the person of Jesus the Christ. For in Christ we find truth and grace, not this kind of crass judgmentalism. Jesus doesn't walk into hospital rooms, his gluttonous belly pushing against the buttons of his tailored suit vest, handing out indictments of guilt to the

> No, this Jesus sits down and weeps with the suffering. He opens his arms to the brutalized and confused. And while he doesn't always provide us with the tidy solutions we long for, he always walks with us in the mystery of life and death.

> I never accepted those words spoken in that hospital room. Maybe I've spent these decades of my life trying to disprove them. I hope you won't accept them either. The love of Christ always trumps the hardness of men's hearts - even those men who claim to have all the

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

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

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Fire Chief Kurt Henke Announces Retirement

Subsequent to Henke's announcement, the Board approved a recommendation from its Executive Committee to conduct an internal search process among the ranks of Deputy Chief to select the next Fire Chief.

"I would like to thank Fire Chief Henke for his strong leadership during a period of significant challenges and

transition for Metro Fire," said Board Vice President Grant Goold. "Chief Henke and his management team have assisted this Board in enacting many innovative reforms to weather the worst impacts of the recession. While the steep decline in property tax revenue forced the closure of six engine companies, the reforms made to reduce our labor costs and long-term liabilities have allowed Metro Fire to emerge stronger in some respects than before the recession. Because there is more work to do to reduce costs and operate more

efficiently, we will look for the next Fire Chief from the ranks

of the Deputy Chief."
Henke joined Metro Fire in 2009 and has served as its Fire Chief since 2011. He began his career in the fire service as a volunteer with the Napa County Fire Department in 1981.
