This misuse remains, but on Sept. 11, 2001, we found ourselves with a renewed respect and appreciation for our flag.

We saw our American flag on homes, on posters in businesses of every kind, and on numerous pieces of clothing—which was still inappropriate. I think we just did not know, but maybe for a moment it was all right.

our flag. Remember the photo taken of three firefighters raising the flag above the rubble of the World Trade Center—raising the Flag at Ground Zero? It was reminiscent of the famous 1945 WWII photo of six Marines raising Old Glory over Iwo Jima. Thomas E. Franklin, the photographer of the new photo, said of it, "This was an important shot. It told of more than just death and destruction. It said something to me about the strength of the American people and of these firemen having to

battle the unimaginable."

One of the three firemen in the photo, Dan McWilliams remembered that as the flag was being raised, other fire personnel yelled, "Good job" and "Way to go!" He said, "Every pair of eyes that saw that flag got a little brighter." I think this pretty much confirms what our flag means to us.

It has been over 10 years since 9-11, so why is this topic becoming important again? I believe it's because everywhere we look today in this country, we see on TV, hear on the radio, and read in print how our borders, our language, our American culture, and our way of life are being compromised in the name of political correctness. We are being led to believe that when we're too proud of our own way of life, of our freedom and uniqueness, we are insulting another's way of life. This is when it gets dangerous.

We still welcome all who desire to come to this country with integrity as they embrace our culture alongside their own. We welcome them as they learn our language, and come to appreciate and love the American way of life that already exists here as much as we do. We learn from each other.





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

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AVOIDING A FATAL HOSPITAL TRIP PART 2

When last we got together on POPPOFF, I quoted some just trying to be a cooperative incredible statistics about people dying each year of unintended medical harm like infections, wrong medications, missed diagnoses, etc Would you believe that as many as 440,000 people are in this category? . Unbelievable that it's the third leading cause of death in the United States. So what do we do? Pat Mastors, who has over 20 years as a News and Medical Reporter, advises patients, hospitals, and policy groups on improving the quality of medical care. She gave me some critical tips that spawned from her book "Design to Survive" 9 ways an IKEA Approach Can Fix Health Care and Save Lives. We covered about 6 of them in my last column, so I wanted to get the last three plus a bonus one to you this time.

WRITE DOWN DEVELOPMENTS. That includes medications administered, names of procedures, instructions given, and dates and times of the above (your advocate can do this for you too). Ask and record the names of caregivers, and understand the hierarchy so you know who's in charge and whom to speak to if there's a problem. Attitude is important—you're and collaborative partner.

8) WRITE A LETTER TO THE CEO. In fact, an advocate colleague suggests you keep an open notebook on the bed table and invite any clinician who enters the room to write down their name and title so they can be Included in the letter. What do you think that does to their performance level?

9) BE POLITE BUT ASSERIVE WHEN NECESSARY. Complaining too often or too aggressively about minor inconveniences can alienate the multi-tasking staff. But you should expect reasonable and timely responses to reasonable requests and questions. If you're being neglected, ask to speak to the hospital's patient advocate

10) BE NICE! Make friends

with your nurses, phlebotomists, (people who draw blood) and other hospital personnel. Ask about their job, their day, and their kids. Relationships count!

Pat comes at this from personal experience. Her own father died in the hospital due to a preventable infection.

That's why she has developed this major passion to help save other lives. She has also created the Patient Pod, a unique bedside multi-tool for patients, along with authoring "Design to Survive." She looks at how simplicity, efficiency, and shared responsibility with customers can help us all stay safer and healthier. You can also check out her website at www.designtosurvive.com. As Pat told me that on her hundredth birthday, she would simply like to collapse while picking tomatoes in her garden. Unfortunately, our parts wear out. About 25 percent of the money Medicare spends every year is for the last year of life, unchanged from twenty years ago. We seem to focus on illness rather than living. But that's a whole new article. That's why we need to know how to take care of ourselves every single day, and knowledge can changes lives. It's my POPPOFF motto!



What have you doubted lately? Maybe someone said something negative to you or the enemy's put a thought in your mind and it's held you back for years and years. Doubts are like seeds in our spirit. You have a choice. You can either listen to them, you can either dwell on them and by doing so, you'll water them and they'll grow and you'll become what they say.

Or you can cast them down and to not listen to them and focus on the things of God.

When Jesus was tempted to doubt in the desert, and Satan came to Him, you remember what Satan said? He said, "IF you be the Son of God." (see Matthew 4) Do you hear that seed of doubt? Jesus, are you even the Son of God? Do you remember how Jesus answered? It's a powerful principle. He answered with the Word of

How to Defeat Your Doubt

God's thoughts on the doubt rather than your thoughts.

To put God's thoughts on the doubt; you have to get the promises in the Bible into your heart. The Bible won't do you any good sitting on a coffee table. It's not just a book of history or moral lessons. No, the Bible is alive and powerful, and it's active in the heart. It will only do you good if you get it into your heart. They wandered around in the desert for 40 years, never even got to go to the Promise Land, yet they were camped right next door to it.

You must refute the voice of discouragement with the Word of God. Have it so strong in you, when somebody says something negative to you, it'll go off of you like water off of a duck's back. Today you may be right next to your greatest victory. But you've got a choice: Listen to the other voices that are going to try to tear you down or believe God's word and see God bring it to pass. ★

More than a decade ago, former Chief Justice Roy Moore of the Alabama Supreme Court installed a massive granite monument inscribed with the Ten Commandments in the rotunda of the Alabama State Judicial Building. Two years later it was removed by court order as a violation of the separation of church and state. Shortly thereafter, Justice Moore was also removed by court order from the Alabama State Judicial Building.

Not long after these events played themselves out across our cable television news shows, Roy Moore's Ten Commandments monument went on tour. Loaded onto the flatbed of a heavy-duty truck, it went town to town so onlookers could see for themselves this controversial work of stonemasonry.

I watched the monument make its first stop in Dayton, Tennessee. This was a calculated move for the organizers of the tour. Dayton was home of the 1925 Scopes Monkey Trial, where many feel Christian America was first besieged.

An atheist was there in Dayton (or "Monkey Town" as it's called) at that first stop, protesting the monument being placed on display. This man barely escaped with his life. Moore's supporters, about a hundred I guess, were screaming out for the death of this single protestor.

"Shoot him...hang him... put him before a firing squad!"

A Garden in the Wilderness

These were all yelled from the crowd. One man speaking of the "godless" protestor said, "I'm glad I didn't bring my gun. I'd be in jail right now."

The shady and twisted irony was not lost on me. Here were ardent supporters of the Ten Commandments – they had come out on a rainy day to see a stone rendering of them - wishing to violate those commandments as they called for the killing their

In spite of the threats like those made in Dayton, Tennessee that day, there has actually been less, not more, religiously motivated violence in United States history than in some other places. This has been due precisely because of court rulings like the one that evicted Moore's rock pillar from the Alabama State Judicial Building.

Because a commitment which requires government to remain as neutral as possible toward religion and not endorse any particular religious belief – even Christian belief – is the only environment where true faith can grow and flourish.

Roger Williams, theologian, founder of Rhode Island, America's first Baptist, and champion of religious and civil liberty a hundred years before the United States Constitution was penned, said communities of faith were like vulnerable, flowering gardens. Governments, on the other hand, were what he called the wilderness.

Williams believed that those churches and faith groups that choose to mingle their religion with political power were permitting the wilderness to intrude upon their gardens. As such,

they would be manipulated by politicians, policies, and the government, thus compromising on issues of love, justice, and

Or those same churches would become the manipulators themselves, using political power to force their beliefs on others. Either way, when church and state drank from the same cup, it would be the church that would be poisoned.

Roger Williams' counsel to the Christian church in his day is lasting: Learn to live in the world, but don't be a part of it. Or he might say, "You can plant a garden in a wilderness without having the wilderness in the garden."

As Christians, we have the right, privilege, and freedom to live out, practice, and share our faith in this country we love. But we do not have the right to force our faith on others or demand that society at large, endorse our particular religious view.

When we as Christians do make these kinds of demands, we violate the spirit of Christ. We lay down the instrument of love for the devices of manipulation, coercion, and force. We let the weeds and vines of the wilderness overtake the garden of

I hope we can continue to tolerate a variety of fruits and nuts in our religious garden; even those we have little taste for. It's the only way we can maintain a garden at all.

With such a wide variety of product out there, how can you ensure that your display will be a Yankee doodle dandy that doesn't have your money literally going up in smoke? 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
