IRS Seeks Volunteers for Taxpayer **Advocacy Panel**

WASHINGTON, DC, (MPG) - The Internal Revenue Service seeks civic-minded volunteers to serve on the Taxpayer Advocacy Panel (TAP), a federal advisory committee that listens to taxpayers, identifies major taxpayer concerns, and makes recommendations for improving IRS

The TAP provides a forum for taxpayers to raise concerns about IRS service and offer suggestions for improvement. The TAP reports annually to the Secretary of the Treasury, the IRS Commissioner and the National Taxpayer Advocate. The Office of the Taxpayer Advocate is an independent organization within the IRS and provides oversight of the TAP.

"In trying to comply with an increasingly complex tax system, taxpayers may find they need different services than the IRS is currently providing," said Nina E. Olson, National Taxpayer Advocate. "The TAP is vital because it provides the IRS with the taxpayers' perspective as well as recommendations for improvement. This helps the IRS deliver the best possible service to assist taxpayers in meeting their tax obligations."

The TAP includes members from all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. Each member is appointed to represent the interests of taxpayers in his or her geographic location

The TAP is also seeking to include at least one additional member to represent international taxpayers. For these purposes, "international taxpayers" are broadly defined to include U.S. citizens working, living, or doing business abroad or in a U.S. territory. The new international member will not be required to attend any face-to-face meetings.

To be a member of the TAP you must be a U.S. citizen, be current with your federal tax obligations, be able to commit 200 to 300 hours during the year and pass an FBI criminal background check. New TAP members will serve a threeyear term starting in December 2014. Applicants chosen as alternate members will be considered to fill any vacancies that open in their areas during the next three years.

The TAP is now seeking members in California.

Candidates from underrepresented groups, including but not limited to U.S. taxpayers living abroad, Native Americans, and non-tax practitioners, are encouraged to apply.

Applications for the TAP will be accepted through April 11, 2014. Applications are available online at www.improveirs.org. Fair Oaks Launches Co-housing Neighborhood

"Cohousing makes life more convenient, practical, and fun."

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Local residents have secured a 3.5-acre property in Fair Oaks for a 30-home cohousing neighborhood. The Fair Oaks property is located at 4025 New York Avenue and offers close proximity to the American River Parkway and its miles of bike paths, as well as Fair Oaks Village, Bannister Park, Sacramento Waldorf School, and Rudolph Steiner College. Cohousing provides social, environmental and economic benefits for a more sustainable lifestyle.

Cohousing combines privately owned homes with extensive community facilities to create neighborhoods that address the needs of working parents and seniors. Homes are clustered around shared open space and common facilities. A "common house" typically includes a dining room, kitchen, lounge, workshop space, kid's playroom, and guest rooms; it is the heart of the neighborhood for a variety of other activities. Cars are kept to the edge of the site making the neighborhood pedestrian-friendly and safe for children. Future residents are involved in the design and development so that it reflects their needs and priorities, creating a truly custom neighborhood. There are now more than 130 cohousing communities in the U.S. and Canada, including 40 in California.

The use of this unique housing concept has been the vision of Fair Oaks EcoHousing founder Marty Maskall since 2005. After searching for a suitable property in over 100 different locations, it was exciting to finally be able to begin making plans to build. Maskall says, "We are excited to have secured such a great property for our community, with its easy access to the American River Parkway and Fair Oaks Village. We look forward to designing a beautiful neighborhood that will fit in well with the surroundings."

The Fair Oaks community will be working with married couple Charles Durrett and Kathryn McCamant, both international cohousing experts and architects. They introduced cohousing to North America in the 1980s with their seminal book,

Cohousing: A Contemporary Approach to Housing Ourselves, after studying the movement in Denmark. Together McCamant and Durrett have worked on over 50 cohousing projects with their firms McCamant & Durrett Architects and Cohousing Partners. They now live in Nevada City Cohousing. Durrett grew up in Sacramento

As part of the kick off for the new community, Durrett--who will be the architect for the new community--will be giving a public presentation about these socially and environmentally sustainable neighborhoods. The presentation will provide an overview of the cohousing movement with examples of communities that have built around the country over the last two decades including Southside Park and Wolf Creek Lodge in Grass Valley, a recently completed community designed for pro-active adults. The presentation will be held on Saturday, March 29th at 7 pm at the Fair Oaks Library, 11601 Fair Oaks Blvd. Admission is free.

Environmental sustainability is a core value in these neighborhoods with smaller homes, green building attributes and renewable energy systems made possible by combined efforts and shared resources. On-site activities and companionship enable residents to socialize close to home

day-to-day activities.

McCamant and Durrett have won numerous awards for their cohousing designs and implementations including the Governor's Award for Environmental and Economic Leadership in 2011 for Wolf Creek Lodge, a 30-unit senior cohousing community located in Grass Valley, CA. www.wolfcreeklodge.org. 



Pennies for Patients "Your Small Change Can Make a Big Change in the Lives of Others"

citrus Heights, ca (MPG) - The motto, "Your small change can make a big change in the lives of others," was the incentive to encourage the 450 students of Northridge Elementary School in Fair Oaks to experience giving from the heart to help others.

The program, "Pennies for Patients," is run through the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. It encourages students to bring in their spare change to illustrate how small amounts of change can quickly add up to make a big difference in the lives of others.

Since 1994, millions of dollars have been raised in pennies and other spare change by more than 10 million elementary, middle and high school students throughout the country. The funds, collected during a three-week period, benefit The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. The Pennies for Patients campaign began in the society's North Carolina Chapter in 1995.

Each student in Northridge's 14 classrooms was given a small colorful donation box to take home and fill with coins. Students made posters to advertise the project, and classrooms used a large poster board thermometer to chart their progress for three weeks. Spare change came from students, family members, friends and relatives – anywhere it could be found. On Valentine's Day, February 14, coins from individual boxes were dumped into to the large classroom boxes to be counted. The grand total was announced to the students the next school day.

In 2013 the school's goal of \$500 was not only met, but nearly tripled, for a total of close to \$1,500. This year's goal was to match the \$1,500, but with additional donations from the

workplaces of teacher's spouses, that target was exceeded with slightly over \$1,800 raised!

The inspiration to bring this program to Northridge School came from 6th grade teacher Julie Garrett. Years earlier a chain of events had helped Garrett realize how one person can help many others. At age 15, Trevor, the son of a good friend had been diagnosed with cancer. He survived and at one point had told his mother he knew he had gotten cancer at such a young age, "so he could help someone else get through it." Little did the families know then that less than 15 months later Trevor would indeed be helping Garrett's husband and family deal with a brain tumor which would take his life a year later in May of 2011. This experience moved Garrett to introduce the Pennies for Patients program to the school.

While the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society provides small pennants to those classes that meet the \$100, \$200, and \$300 goals, Northridge did not provide additional incentives to raise this money, as Garrett felt that "it takes away from the whole idea of giving something for others that have less than you

Hertic, just to mention a few.



California Lottery Joins Problem Gambling Awareness Month Effort

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Lottery joins other state and national organizations to recognize the month of March as California Problem Gambling Awareness Month. The goal is to educate and raise public awareness that problem gambling affects people from all segments of society, and it can negatively influence the gambler's family, friends, employer and community.

The Lottery annually participates in National Problem Gambling Awareness Month in partnership with statewide communications efforts that promote the 1-800-GAMBLER Hotline. The Hotline is featured on all draw game tickets, Hot Spot monitors and electronic point of sale advertising display devices. Additionally, the Lottery website, www.calottery.com, and social media pages will have a special banner and messaging to connect visitors to the Office of Problem Gambling website.

In past years, the Lottery has produced and distributed a dozen television public service announcements in six languages promoting the 1-800-GAMBLER Hotline. Those PSAs are in the process of being updated once again. The PSAs, seen here and produced in coordination with the California Office of Problem Gambling,

will air throughout the state during Problem Gambling Awareness Month. The PSAs willcontinue airing throughout the year. The Lottery will also distribute responsible gaming guidelines to retail locations across the state.

Responsible gambling in California provides entertainment for many people, it's a source of revenue for state and local governments and it creates many jobs for our residents. Most Californians are able to gamble responsibly, however, almost four percent of the state's adult population experience significant difficulties as a result of their gambling addiction.

To combat the problem, the Lottery has joined forces with several state and private agencies to promote Problem Gambling Awareness Month. Agencies include the Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs, the California Gambling Control Commission, the Department of Justice's Bureau of Gambling Control, the California Council on Problem Gambling, and card rooms and tribal gaming organizations.

As always, the California Lottery would like to remind players that gambling should be fun. Borrowing money to play, spending above a person's budget or using money intended for other purposes can ultimately lead to

significant problems for players and their families. If a player recognizes that they have a gambling problem or if someone knows of someone who may have a problem, the Lottery recommends calling the Problem Gambling Helpline at 1-800-GAMBLER.

You cannot choose what is going to happen to you next week, next month, next year. But you can choose how you're going to respond, how you're going to react -- whether it's going to make you or break you, whether you're going to be bitter or better. I am confident of how God wants you to respond. "Dear brothers, is your life full of difficulties and temptations? Then be happy, for when the way is rough, your patience has a chance to grow. So let it grow, and don't try to squirm out of your problems. For when your patience is finally in full bloom, then you will be ready for anything, strong in character, full and complete." 

The year was 387. The place was Kilpatrick in ancient Scotland. Their names were Calpurnius and Conchessa, Roman citizens living at the edge of the Roman Empire. These young Britons were gifted with a new born son. They named him Maewyn.

Maewyn was a rambunctious, unruly boy who spurned his parents' instructions and their Christian faith. He romped the Scottish hills with other Brit, Scot, Pict, and Roman boys, and it was on one of these romps that young Maewyn ended up in the wrong place at the wrong time.

A roving band of Irish pirates was plundering the coast of Scotland, and in the process, captured

Maewyn and carried them back to Ireland. There Maewyn became a slave. And there, Maewyn's faith was reborn. He began to talk to God, and as the story goes, God began talking to him.

God instructed Maewyn to wander toward the coast. So he did, secretly, and found a boat bound for Scotland. He returned home and was reunited with his family after many years. Then God spoke again, coming to Maewyn in his dreams. God wanted him to return to Ireland.

Maewyn entered theological training, and at the conclusion of

his studies, was sent as the first

Christian missionary to Ireland. At his ordination he took the Latin name, Patricius; in Gaelic it was Padraig. In modern English we know him as Saint Patrick.

With Nicholas and Valentine, St. Patrick rounds out the trio of best known Christian saints outside of the Apostles. They are celebrated and venerated by the world – but none more so than

St. Patrick. He has found his way into our hearts, and while drinking Guinness or Jameson is part of his appeal, that is hardly the beginning. Patrick, more than most, meets people where they are – and that is his lasting contribution.

When Patrick arrived in Ireland as a Christian missionary he had a decision to make about how to do his work. This was the early 400s. The Roman Emperor Constantine had "converted" to Christianity 100 years earlier, and the cross was now used, not as the suffering sym-

Galilean carpenter, but as a crusading tool of conquest.

It was the custom of Christian missionaries – then and for the next 1500 years - not to introduce others to Jesus, but to make them citizens of the Empire. A culture was "Christianized" not when it conformed to the words and ways of Jesus, but when it submitted to the rule of the

Roman Caesar or the conquering king. The local culture was eradicated, replaced by that of the conquerors, and Christianity was used as an instrument in that

But rather than imposing an imperial faith on the Irish people, Patrick met them where they were and let faith erupt naturally. He did not overpower, he obliged. He did not impose, he

He did not attack, he adapted. He came in humility and simplicity, attempting to foster faith, not force it.

We still have much to learn from old Patrick, for his way of sharing faith could heal today's world. Vulnerability. Service. Humility. Meeting people where they are. Treating neighbors with dignity and respect. Honoring the lives and stories of those we encounter – plain civility – may be the only way to keep a society from devouring itself.

When we live with a no-compromise, never give-an-inch, militant attitude, and meet every person outside our circle with distrust, it creates a divisive, violent, negative, attack-based culture with an atmosphere of hateful rhetoric and suspicion. It destroys a community.

So we who are living today have a choice put before us: We will take the path of suspicion, violence, stubbornness, divisiveness, and imposition and we will witness the end of the world as we know it. Or we will we imitate Patrick by taking the way of peace, love for our neighbors, welcome and inclusion. Living this way will end of the world as we know it as well – but it might be the kind of end that gives rebirth to the world.



SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Irrational Games has been one of the most creative developers in the industry for the 17 years it's been in business. Irrational has transported us to worlds that not only immersed us in their stories and gameplay, but have delivered moral and political messages in a way rarely attempted by bigbudget developers. Most famous for its Bioshock and System Shock series, Irrational had a major success last year with its exquisite Bioshock Infinite.

So it came as a huge shock when, on February 18, Ken Levine, co-founder of Irrational Games, suddenly announced that he was shutting the studio

He said in an statement on the Irrational Games website that his motivations don't come from any financial or legal problems, rather that Levine, who is

also creative director of the studio, is simply done with that chapter in his life. He says that his "passion has turned to making a different type of game," one that is made with a smaller team for a more core gaming audience. Levine said that all but 15 Irrational employees will be laid off, and that Irrational's publisher, 2K Games, will try to find new positions for the ex-employees.

It's always sad to see a developer go, but this surprising turn could be for the best for the average game consumer. Ken Levine is an extremely creative person, who combines unexpected locations and motifs with unique gameplay (he's now writing the script for a new Logan's Run movie), and he'll be able to work more freely without the constant pressure to chase the dollar that comes from big-budget development. It's possible that this shift was partly motivated by Bioshock's success. If Levine seems done ees out of work for the moment, with the series, he doesn't want to be forced into making new entries just to generate revenue.

On the other hand, it's hard to justify laying off hundreds of people based on the desires of just one man (it seems almost "irrational"). Levine could have accomplished so much with the pool of talent, funds, and already-existing franchises available to Irrational Games, but will now have to start more or less from scratch. If he really wants to do smaller projects, he could have developed them as a side project to bigger games. It seems a shame to let so many talented people go. Even if Levine succeeds in finding new jobs for his employees, it's regrettable that he chose to turn their lives upside-down based only on his creative whims.

So what's going to happen to Irrational as we know it? Well, chances are we won't be hearing from Levine for a while. He said that he was going to "need a long period of design" for his next project, and, as of now, the Bioshock license has been turned over to 2K Games. Even though it's a shame to see so many Irrational employ-Levine's newfound freedom will allow him to explore his passion to bring us more surprising worlds that we love to experience. Hopefully, he knows what he's doing.

Environmental Leaders are Looking More Like Scam Artists these Days

It's getting tough to take environmentalists seriously. More and more, the leaders of the environmental movement -- the "Kings of Green" -- are emerging as a pathetic mix of liars, frauds, hucksters and hypocrites who are more concerned with lining their pockets off environmental hysteria than actually protecting Mother

Few would care if their dirty deeds didn't impact others, but unfortunately, they do.

Schemes and fibs by environmental extremists like Al Gore, Tom Steyer and leaders at Google are killing jobs, increasing the price of energy, devouring tax dollars and threatening America's energy independence -- all in an effort to make a quick buck.

It's hard to imagine that Al Gore, the most famous environmentalist of all, has any credibility left after many of his predictions have proven false and he has been unwilling to reduce his own carbon footprint. In his movie "An Inconvenient Truth," the

former Vice President erroneously warned that Arctic polar ice caps would disappear by 2013. This year, Arctic ice coverage spanned more than 2,000 cubic miles -- an increase of more than 50 percent from just a year ago.

Several years ago, I uncovered that Gore is more than happy to talk the talk when it comes to environmentalism, but appears unwilling to walk the walk. Public records proved that Gore devoured as much as 20 times more electricity at his Nashville estate than the average American household.

Despite his hypocrisy and poor record of environmental fortunetelling, Gore continues to push for a carbon tax, a sinister scheme that would cost tens of thousands of American jobs and squeeze the poorest Americans most as a result of price hikes to most every good and service imaginable.

Not that Gore is worried about the little people. He managed to cash in on the wave of global warming hysteria that he created, amassing a fortune of more than \$200 million.

Gore isn't alone in attempting

to exploit environmental concerns for selfish reasons.

Tom Steyer, a billionaire hedge fund manager who made much of his fortune by investing in fossil fuels, now spends his days attacking the Keystone XL pipeline in hopes of blocking its construction. While Steyer claims that his opposition to Keystone is environmentally related -- he has funded a series of dubious ads claiming as much - the reality is that the environmental charlatan is heavily invested in a competing pipeline and stands to make a mint if his pipeline doesn't face competition from Keystone XL.

There is one big difference between Keystone XL and the TransMountain oil sands pipeline in which Steyer is invested: Most of the petroleum produced as a result of Keystone would be utilized by the U.S. and Canada, while much of the oil sands carried by the Transmountain scheme would be shipped to China.

Allowing the completion of the Keystone XL pipeline would produce lower gas and energy prices for Americans, create tens of thousands of new jobs, generate millions in new tax dollars and reduce American petroleum imports from unstable and unfriendly nations by 40 percent -- not that Tom Steyer cares about any of that.

Another leading player in the environmental movement is Google. The search engine giant heavily lobbies government to encourage risky and irresponsible environmental ploys like cap and trade policies, and believes the federal government should take money from America's taxpayers to fund unproven gambles on green energy. Google has even authored an initiative hoping to shutter coal-powered electricity production facilities and dictate what types of cars Americans can drive.

Google is proud of its perceived environmental-friendliness. After all, it translates into dollars from customers who share the company's supposed concern for the environment. Beneath Google's green facade, however, the company's executives are hiding a dirty secret. Google maintains a fleet of fuel-devouring planes that company officials use to fly to farflung vacation hotspots such as Hawaii, Belize, Tahiti, Key West, Milan and Paris. Since the beginning of 2010, the planes owned by Google's executives have burned through an average of 100,000 gallons of jet fuel every month.

To make matters worse, the planes have been housed at a taxpayer-funded NASA hangar and filled up with governmentpurchased jet fuel, saving the company millions of dollars in the process.


Al Gore, Tom Stever and Google have all figured out how to exploit environmentalism for power and money, and they're not alone. Plenty of companies and individuals have figured out ways who manipulate the public's legitimate concern for the environment to make a quick buck, improve public perception, increase market share and lure lawmakers into passing legislation that benefits

The next time you find out that a business or individual professes to do something for environmental reasons, take a closer look; there's a good chance that what's best for the environment is the last thing on their mind.

A Man and His Faithful Dog Stranded, Then Rescued Together, on the Bluffs

Special Report By Sacramento Metro Fire

FAIR OAKS, CA (MPG) - Just before 4 pm on March 6, a man and his dog were walking along the river. While climbing from the river back up to the Bluffs, they found themselves stuck in wet, slippery terrain, unable to continue. Fearing that they would fall, the man began calling for help. Shortly after, Metro Fire units were dispatched for a vertical rescue at Riverfront and Central, in Fair Oaks.

In addition to an engine, Metro Fire's Heavy Rescue and Boat responded to this location on the Bluffs. They quickly made verbal contact with the man, who was stuck 15-20 feet down the cliff. His dog, Jenna, had continued to climb, and was about five feet higher than him. After confirming that the two were uninjured, and that the man was in a secure spot, crews began to set up for a rescue.

Metro Fire Captain Randy Wootton was in charge of the Rescue operation. His crew set up a rope system and lowered Firefighter Brad Dessert to the dog. "We were concerned that if we passed by Jenna to reach the man, she would follow us and possibly fall," Captain Wootton stated. "After verifying that the man had secure footing and was in no immediate danger

of falling, we decided that is was safer to rescue Jenna first." Firefighter Dessert was lowered to Jenna, placed a rescue harness on her, and the two were raised back to the top. Once Jenna was safe and secure, Firefighter Dessert was again lowered down the cliff, placed the man into a harness, and the two were lowered to the boat waiting below.

Fortunately for Jenna and her owner, the regular training by Rescue, Boat, and Engine crews prepared them to quickly set up a system that would ultimately save their lives. Because of this training, they walked away from a terrifying experience, completely unharmed.

Financial Literacy Makes Good "Cents" For Children, Teenagers

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Financial experts agree: Parents should teach their children to save money and invest when they are young. Unfortunately, not all parents consciously try to foster money skills in their children. In fact, a recent survey by TrueCredit.com found that about 20 percent of parents, nearly one

in five, had never spoken with

their kids between the ages of 4

and 18 about money basics.

Worse yet, only 38 percent of teens today can pass a basic financial literacy test and only 26 percent of individuals between the ages of 13 and 21 reported that their parents actively taught them how to manage money.

When you consider how much the average teen-ager spent last year, these percentages are alarming. According to the Jump\$tart Coalition for Personal Financial Literacy, teens spent about \$160 billion in 2012 with children ages 4-12 projected to spend \$51.8 billion this year.

In order for children and teens to develop good personal financial management skills and lifelong habits, teaching and developing financial literacy among young people is crucial.

Fortunately, there is good news in the fight to close the financial education gap. Teens do want to become more knowledgeable about money. According to Capital One's 2009 annual survey, 50 percent of teens surveyed expressed an interest in learning more about money. Seventy percent wanted to learn more about financing large purchases such as a car or home.



What Should Parents Do?

Even though some parents may not think they know much about money and finances, the basic concept of "living within your means" (a concept many adults have yet to conquer) is a good starting point. Children also need to understand the basic fundamentals of money, debt, setting goals and budgeting at an early age. Instilling solid financial skills now will prepare them for lifetime of important financial and money decisions.

The following are some ideas and ways to better educate your children and teens about finances and money:

- Teach them about the importance of creating and adhering to a budget and savings plan.
- Discuss with them the concept of goal setting and apply it to something they would like to buy
- Provide a weekly allowance. It will give your child the chance to budget for school lunches and special purchases.
- Explain and review your household budget system. Demonstrate what percentage of

income goes to fixed expenses (rent, utilities, food, insurance, etc.), what goes to savings (retirement and short-term, unexpected items), and what remains for discretionary and fun purchases.

• Explain what "borrowing" means, what debt can do, and the pros and cons of credit. This is a critical topic for teens who are looking forward to purchasing a car. They often don't realize what additional expenses besides the loan payment comes with the purchase of an automobile ride (insurance, gas, repairs and maintenance).

Money Really Doesn't Grow On Trees

In addition, it is important to talk about where money really comes from (not magically from the ATM or money tree), explaining the difference between "wants" and "needs," and illustrating that money is not just for spending.

To help parents in these discussions, there are a number of great resources available including "Money Smart for Young Adults (www.fdic.gov)," a program for young people ages 12–21, and Jump Start (www.jumpstart.org), a national coalition dedicated to improving financial literacy at all levels.

A solid understanding of how to handle money early on will be a lesson your children will rely upon and appreciate over their entire lifetime. Start building that financial foundation now. *

Wronged at Work!

Who Pays for the Uniform, the Boss or Me?

There's an entertaining Web site, Uni-Watch.com, that is devoted to making humorous comments about uniforms worn by sports teams. Uni-Watch's founder says his mission is to "deconstruct the finer points of sports uniforms in obsessive and excruciating detail."

Professional jocks aren't the only ones who wear uniforms on the job. People in the food service, transportation, hospitality and security industries typically wear uniforms at work.

So who pays for the uniform, the employee or the boss?

Here's the general rule in California: When employers require uniforms to be worn by workers as a condition of employment, the uniform must be provided by the employer.

What constitutes a uniform? Uniforms are defined as "wearing apparel or accessories of distinctive design and color." If clothing is specific to an employer, such as a particular color combination or bearing a logo, that qualifies as a uniform.

Sometimes the line gets blurry between what is a uniform and what is merely a preferred style of dressing. If the company asks the employee to wear a white shirt, dark pants and black shoes at work, is that a uniform?

The answer is no. If apparel can be worn in everyday life outside of work, then the clothing isn't a uniform. Similarly, the boss doesn't pay if the clothing is so generic to a type of job that it can be worn in different workplaces. For example, an employer wouldn't have to provide for a nurse's white uniform, because this is a basic wardrobe item that nurses can wear elsewhere in their occupation.

(Note: State employees have different rules. They are responsible for the purchase of

uniforms required for employment – but they get reimbursed by the State with an annual uniform allowance).

To illustrate how the rules can provoke disputes, here's an actual ruling from the Department of Labor Standards Enforcement (DLSE):

A restaurant in Southern California was created around a "tropical" theme. The waiters and waitresses were required to wear floral and colorful shirts, along with rugby-style shorts of any color. The restaurant's lawyer argued that this clothing was available at most department stores and was not made especially for the restaurant. "These shirts and shorts are very much in vogue in California fashion today," the lawyer said. Therefore, the restaurant shouldn't be responsible for purchasing the clothing for the service staff. Instead, the restaurant asked employees to either buy the clothing on their own, or to purchase it from the restaurant at wholesale cost.


DLSE disagreed, asserting that the required clothing couldn't be worn at the majority of jobs in the restaurant industry. "Most restaurants would look askance at waiters or waitresses who came to work in 'tropical attire' which included floral shirts and rugby pants," the agency Okay, but aren't tropical shirts and rugby shorts clothing of a generic nature, meaning that waiters and waitresses could wear the clothes in their everyday lives? This argument also failed. DLSE decided that, although tropical attire may be "in vogue" in the sense of California fashion, the legal question is whether *problem*.

the employee "could be expected to be able to use the outfit while working at his or her occupation with another employer." In other words, being fashionable at a given point in time doesn't make clothing sufficiently generic. In this case, the restaurant had to pay for the uniforms.

What about maintaining the uniform? The employer can either maintain the uniform by paying directly, or pay the employee a weekly maintenance allowance of an hour's pay at minimum wage. Employees are expected to maintain uniforms requiring minimal care, such as washing and tumble drying, without reimbursement. Special care, such as ironing, dry cleaning, or separate laundering because of heavy soiling or special color, must be reimbursed to employees.

For non-exempt workers, here's another key point regarding the minimum wage. An employer may never impose a financial burden on employees, with respect to purchasing or maintaining clothing, which would reduce the employees' wage rate below California's minimum wage.
