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CSLB Nabs Unlicensed Contractors



Unlicensed contractors pose huge financial risks for homeowners who hire people who have not been qualified to perform the work, or undergone a criminal background check.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) Three people who knew better than to perform contracting work without a state license turned up at a Contractors State License Board (CSLB) undercover sting operation in Rancho Cordova on

Unlicensed contractors pose huge financial risks for homeowners who hire people who have not been qualified to perform the work, or undergone a criminal background check, and who don't carry workers' compensation or general liability insurance if injury or damage occurs on the property. Unlicensed operators operate in the underground economy and create unfair business competition for law-abiding contractors.

CSLB's Statewide Investigative Fraud Team (SWIFT), along with investigators from the Department of Consumer Affairs' Division of Investigation and Sacramento County District Attorney's Office, cited seven individuals who illegally bid for landscaping, concrete, painting, fencing, tree, and plumbing work at a one-story residence.

"Contractors who have lost their license are fully aware that they are contracting illegally," said CSLB Registrar Steve Sands. "If you disregard contracting laws, you'll be caught and held to answer in Superior Court."

One of the former licensees, Anthony Eugene Bodiford of Woodland, doing business as Planet Rock Landscape, was arrested on misdemeanor charges of contracting without a license and illegal advertising after he submitted a bid for more than \$8,000 to do fencing and landscape work. Contractors can only request a down payment of 10% of the total estimate, or \$1,000, whichever is less.

Bodiford's contractor license expired in 2011. Two others with revoked licenses went to the sting house but did not submit bids, and will receive administrative citations for illegal contracting and advertising violations.

Undercover CSLB investigators mostly used the online bulletin board craigslist.org to identify potential suspects. Property owners considering improvement projects should always consult CSLB's online instant license check to ensure that the contractor license is in good standing before hiring anyhome In California CSLBlicensed contractors are required for all home improvement jobs totaling \$500 or more in combined labor and material costs.

The seven people who received Notices to Appear in Superior Court all face misdemeanor charges of contracting without a license (Business and Professions Code Section 7028). First-conviction penalties for contracting without a license include up to six months in jail and/or up to \$5,000 in fines; subsequent convictions bring harsher penalties.

Six were cited for illegal advertising (Business and Professions Code Section 7027.1). State law requires that contractors include their license number in all advertisements, including online ads. Those without a license can advertise as long as the ad states they are not a state-licensed contractor, and the combined total of a project's labor and materials costs is under \$500.

Suspects must appear in Sacramento County Superior Court, 720 Ninth St., Sacramento one to work in or around their (MAP). A court date has not been determined

State's Debt Not **Addressed With New Budget**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The Legislature passed the 2013-14 state budget on June 14th - a budget that was negotiated among Democrats and with limited public review. The main budget measure - Assembly Bill 110 – passed with only partisan support by a vote of 28 to 10.

"The biggest goal of the Legislature should be to get control of the budget," said State Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Gerber). "But that has not happened. There are built-in cost increases that have not been addressed."

Negotiated behind closed doors, the total state budget spends approximately \$108 billion in general fund monies, which are spent at the discretion of the Legislature.

Despite its lack of transparency, the budget did dedicate \$2 billion to partially pay down the state's debt, restored the Adult Dental program and child care services, and provided some funding for trial courts.

This budget, unfortunately, prioritized new spending over a more fiscally prudent approach that pays off state debt and unfunded retirement liabilities. The Governor's own Department of Finance estimated that the state's unfunded liability on employee retirement pensions is at a cost of \$180 billion to taxpayers.

It did not address many of the problems with the Governor's public safety realignment plan, also known as AB 109. It allowed prisoners more good time credit than they

ever had nor will ever earn. "Without changes realignment, criminals be more emboldened by no consequences for their continued criminality and will only prey upon more of us. The time to fix

AB 109 is now," said Nielsen. Assembly Bill 110 is the main budget bill that must be accompanied by 21 trailer bills which implements the budget.

Also during the concert, a complimentary hot dog reception featuring the "Rancho Cordova Dog" will be served to attendees.



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Stop Sign Changes on the American River Bike Trail



SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Beginning this week, 9 out of the 12 vehicle/bicycle intersections on the American River Bike Trail will change from four-way to two-way stops with vehicles

required to give right of way to bicycle riders, runners, joggers and walkers.

During the past four months, Regional Parks' officials met change. "We received positive feedback from our stakeholders, such as the Recreation and Park Commission, the Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates and the Save the American River Association, to name three," stated Stan Lumsden, Chief Ranger. "The reason to alter the traffic flow is simple and about safety. We have more bicycle traffic through the Parkway than vehicles and it makes sense to give the bikes the right of way. On the safety side, bikes can roll through the intersection allowing cyclists to keep up their momentum and avoid rear-end

collisions." The signage and pavement painting changes will take place this week and will go the length of the bike trail from Hazel Avenue downstream to

supporters to announce the Discovery Park. The three intersections that will continue being four-way stops are: Nimbus Hatchery at Hazel Avenue; Lower Sunrise Recreation Area at the PCA Bridge; and Del Paso

> Motorists and riders are urged to be observant of these changes and to obey the rules of the road including the 15 mile per hour speed limit on the bike trail. Regional Park visitors are reminded that all children under 13 years of age, in or around waterways, must wear a life jacket. It is a law in Sacramento County. 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

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Here Comes the Final Wave of Cell Phone and Texting Enforcement



To reduce the number of distracted drivers on Sacramento area roadways, and to test our enforcement tactics, law enforcement agencies in the Sacramento region will be conducting the final wave of three high-visibility enforcement efforts that will last through June 30.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Drivers in the greater Sacramento region who are observed texting or talking on a hand-held cell phone will be targeted in a special enforcement operation that will last through June 30. Thirty-seven local police departments and the California Highway Patrol (CHP) will participate in the enforcement effort.

This is the third and final highvisibility enforcement period that was developed to test tactics that may be employed nationally in the future. In 2012, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) awarded the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) \$600,000 to fund three waves of enforcement along with the message "Phone in One Hand, Ticket in the Other," designed to educate drivers about the dangers of distracted driving.

A total of 3,008 citations were

issued during the first wave last December, increasing to 4,750 during the second wave in February. The special enforcement region stretches from Modesto to Marysville and from Vallejo to South Lake Tahoe.

"Distracted driving is a dangerous problem," said OTS Director Christopher J. Murphy. "For everyone's safety, drivers need to focus on the road and refrain from talking or texting on a cell phone. California has strict mobile device laws in place and this "Phone in One Hand. Ticket in the Other" campaign offers a constant reminder to drivers to do the right thing and practice safe driving.'

Drivers caught talking or texting on a hand-held cell phone will receive a first-time ticket costing a minimum of \$162, with a second offense costing \$285. However, the goal of the special enforcement operation is not to issue tickets, but to raise

awareness about the dangers of distracted driving.

The California Office of Traffic Safety offers these simple tips to keep you or someone you know from being a victim of distracted driving:

- While talking on a cell phone, up to 37 percent of the brain function needed for driving is used toward that conversation, rather than driving.
- Turn off your phone, and/or put it out of reach while driving.
- Include in your outgoing message that you can't answer while you're driving.
- Don't call or text anyone at a time when you think they may be driving.
- Remember: Phone in One Hand. Ticket in the Other.

SACRAMENTO REGION. CA (MPG) – With instruments in tow at the CSUS Hornet Stadium, Drum & Bugle Corps teams from around the country will compete at the 34th Annual Moonlight Classic on Sunday, June 23, 6-10 PM.

For the uninitiated, this nonprofit event with thousands in attendance is the longest running of its kind in the western United States, and is a visual extravaganza of sight and sound. It's often described as "marching bands on steroids."

Competing corps can each include up to 150 youths, ages 8-21, comprised of marching percussion and brass, front ensemble (vibraphones, marimbas, and other percussion instruments), and color guard. The color guard component has evolved from merely carrying the flag to now including dance and props such as rifles, sabers, and other specialty items.

Each 11-minute performance - which can span the entire football field - will include all of these elements in a meticulously choreographed presentation. In one competition, a "field of mirrors" gave the illusion of doubling the size of the corps, turning it into a fullon Spartacus-inspired gladiator match.

Other sense-dazzling performances have included a presentation of The Who's rock opera Tommy, a James Bond theme with the corps in tuxes, and a horse race - complete with track, accompanied by (of course) the William Tell

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

I borrowed \$30,000 from my aunt to buy a condo eight years ago. We had a deal that she would get her money back, plus a piece of the profits, when it sold. If there were no profits, she would get back her original \$30,000. Recently the condo sold and I lost the money I put into it, plus my aunt's money as well. I make good money and don't have any other debt, but I'm a little resentful now that she wants me to pay her back. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Christine, I don't want to be mean, but

you have no right to be resentful toward your aunt. This is the deal you signed up for, and she did nothing wrong. Wanting her money back now isn't greedy or malicious on her part, and it's definitely not worth putting a family relationship at risk. I know what you're thinking,

because it's just human nature. You just went through a lot, and the situation didn't work out as planned. Plus, it doesn't sound like your aunt is hurting financially if she put \$30,000 toward helping you in the deal. Part of

you is thinking she has plenty of money, so why doesn't she just forgive the debt and forget about everything?

If you were barely scraping by, I might suggest that you sit down and talk with her over a cup of coffee, explain the situation and ask her to forgive the debt. Right now, the little girl part of you is whining, "Oh, come on. Just let me go!" But the grown-up Christine knows better. That part of you is whispering, "You know what to do...'

Pay her back as quickly as possible, and get this bad deal behind you for good. You said you make good money, so just take care of your responsibility. It'll hurt some, but it's better than taking a chance on ruining the relationship with a very generous and loving aunt.

Watch What You Give Them!

I'm working on my debt snowball, and I'm trying to settle with a pushy collector. I don't have the \$9,000 I owe, but I have \$3,000 I'd like to offer as a settlement. Recently the collector has started asking for a lot

of information I don't feel comfortable providing. What should I do?



Dear Daniel,

Lots of times in these kinds of situations collectors are trying to gather up as much information as possible in order to sue you. Even if that's not the case here, there's no reason for you to be supplying them with a bunch of extra info. Just offer them the \$3,000, and make it clear that your financial coach—which is me—told you not to answer any more of their nosy questions.

Make sure they understand that your offer of \$3,000 stands as a settlement of the debt today. If they're willing to accept the offer, get a statement in writing saying that the \$3,000 represents payment in full before you cut the check. If they choose not to accept your offer, and they keep asking questions that are none of their business, just tell them to call back when they're willing to discuss terms. Then, hang up!

He offered inane advice on everything from money and education to automobiles and the opposite sex. He set ridiculous boundaries in regard to my time, work, school, and friends. A few times he even dared to critique or forbid my well-made decisions. What an idiot.

But hopefully, after a decade or so on the dark side, my mental capacities will improve as my own father's did. Maybe then I won't be such a bonehead, and my children will find me worth listening to again.

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
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Red, White and Ooh! Celebrating the Fourth with Fireworks

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) – America's 237th birthday will soon be celebrated with fireworks that shimmer in the sky and gleam from the ground. Where you ooh and aah on the Fourth of July depends on whether you go public to watch an aerial display or private since local laws allow the sale and use of state-approved consumer fireworks in Sacramento County from June 28 through July 4.

That's good news for local youth groups, service clubs, churches and other cash-strapped area non-profits hoping for booming business from a temporary wooden stand over seven toasty days.

Sunrise Little League, for one, plans to improve its ball field at C-Bar-C Park in Citrus Heights with proceeds raised from its TNT Fireworks stand at 7601 Sunrise Blvd. next to Safe Credit Union. Also in Citrus Heights, a new batting cage and fencing for its backstop are what Mesa Verde High School Softball Boosters is planning to buy with money earned from its TNT stand at 8477 Auburn Blvd. next to California Burgers. Out of its Phantom Fireworks stand next to Pastor Auto Care at 7920 Old Auburn Road, volunteers of American Legion Post #637 will raise funds for a local Boy Scout troop. In the next city over, the Antelope Community Tennis Association will raise funds to resurface courts and keep membership dues low with a Phantom stand next to Rite-Aid at 4300 Elverta Road.

In Carmichael, Glen Oaks Swim Club will help keep kids afloat as members with a Phantom Fireworks location near Quicker Stop Market at 6725 Winding Way. Over in Orangevale, food and other resources for needy local families will spawn from sales at the Assist Local Foundation's Phantom stand adjacent to Dairy Queen at 9295 Greenback Lane. Meanwhile, Fair Oaks Presbyterian Church, which will run a TNT stand on its own turf at 11427 Fair Oaks Blvd., has earmarked proceeds for its youth, starting with summer camp scholarships. Bella Vista High School Band Boosters will offset competition fees, uniforms, insurance and other costs with funds raised at its TNT stand near the Olive Garden Restaurant at 5445 Sunrise Blvd.



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A Little Carnival Inspiration Can Help Cruise Hold-Outs

"Too expensive." "Sounds boring." "I get seasick." "I'll be claustrophobic." Nearly 80 percent of American adults have never been on a luxury cruise, according to the Cruise Lines International Association, citing these and other reasons for snubbing the chance to live the high life on the high seas. A lingering sour economy and sporadic news reports of norovirus outbreaks and ships losing power, sometimes running adrift for days, don't help the cause.

Even with all this baggage, what a shame that so many people are missing the boat. Once the \$23 billion cruising industry gets away from the front page and back to the travel section where it belongs, this avid cruiser hopes the most ardent of holdouts can join the club of converts as I did a decade ago with an unforgettable Alaskan cruise. Cruise No. 12 is just weeks away for this former land-only traveler.

As for concerns over claustrophobia, seasickness or boredom that are preventing some of the resistant from stretching their inner sea legs - true, a cabin can feel cramped, but the hope is to spend little time there. True, nausea caused by rocking on water has been named the leading reason people don't cruise. Actually, the vast majority of cruises experience smooth sailing, but if the motion of the ocean is of great concern, consider spending a few dollars more for a stateroom located mid-ship and over-thecounter remedies exist. As for boredom, if people suffer from that while aboard these floating resorts, it's their own fault. Entertainment is omnipresent practically around the clock.

Not convinced? Then here's a suggestion for the uninitiated: Consider taking a short, easy and affordable cruise out of Long Beach or, starting in September, San Pedro. If you hate it, you've squandered only 3 or 4 days and a few hundred discretionary dollars. Like it, and the bug that bites you may cause serious swelling -- to your travel budget, that is.

But first things first for a firsttimer. After all, a fare of several thousands of dollars and being on water for too long a spell right out of the gate -- make that port -- might be too much, too soon. For about \$400, less or more depending on such factors as the location of the cabin and date of the sail, nautical novices can take a 3- or 4-day introductory course to cruising in a classroom called the Carnival Inspiration. Through at least April 2015, the 2,052-passenger liner sets sail on Fridays for 3-day cruises to Ensenada and Mondays for 4-day voyages that make an additional call at Avalon on Catalina Island.

Take the shortest of the cruises, which I recently did with an old college buddy while the wives stayed home. These 3-day escapes pack pretty much all the on-ship activities of a longer Carnival sail, right down to the one formal night in the dining room. It's lobster and prime rib for everyone, and don't feel guilty asking for seconds. Or thirds. Really, it's OK. The food, thanks to Chef Jorg and his 100 cooks humming in the *Inspiration*'s galley, was better than what I've

eaten on many longer cruises. Quickie cruises can serve as a parent's getaway as adult time is guaranteed with Camp Carnival, which offers organized fun for children by age group. While the supervised kidlets are swooshing

down the 4-story, 300-foot-long Twister Water Slide, grown-ups can work up a sweat at the gym while basking in a panoramic view off the bow. All that and unlimited food 24/7 is included in the price of the cruise, as is prac-

the spa, casino, bars and shops. Here's what a typical 3-dayer looks like aboard the *Inspiration*, which since October 2011 has sailed under the command of personable Capt. Pierluigi Lanaro, an Italian-born Southern California transplant who has been with Carnival for 37 years.

tically everything else outside

Friday is embarkation, a usually painless process, and upon boarding most people head to Deck 10 for a lavish multi-cultural buffet. Newbies are encouraged to take the guided tour of the ship to help get their bearings. After the mandatory safety briefing, the ship and the more fun-seeking passengers -- the ones who give "booze cruises" their name -- truly come alive. Hang out with the party animals in the bars and nightclub. Or don't. Roll the dice with excited gamblers when the casino is open. Or don't. The Inspiration is by no means the largest ship in Carnival's fleet, but there's always lesser degrees of merriment at hand if that's more your speed. Other sail day highlights include karaoke, trivia, rum cake sampling, a dance lesson, singalong piano music, bingo and a

teaser show on the main stage. Saturday is mostly spent docked in Baja's third-largest city. As destinations go, Ensenada isn't all that inviting or exciting. It's known for one super grande Mexican flag waving atop a 500-foot-high pole, shops carrying real Cuban cigars, a waterspout and a couple of popular cantinas. Strolling up and

down touristy Ave Lopez Mateos treated to more stand-up comedy is generally meh and so are the cruise-organized shore excursions. Several tours are built around a visit to La Bufadora, a natural blowhole. There are advantages to staying on a ship or returning early on port days, especially when a port is blah. Swimming, soaking and sunbathing during these off-peak hours are idyllic for those looking to relax, and the spa often runs port day specials. Evening entertainment includes stand-up comedy and a production show called "Fiesta Latina." First-timers are often surprised by the use of pyrotechnics and a live band, at least for the time being (read on).

As the only full day at sea, Sunday has a jam-packed schedule. The 1 o'clock hour, alone, has five activities going on in different parts of the ship, presenting a serious dilemma for art-loving men with hairy chests who know their classic rock trivia and have a child dreaming of building his or her own teddy bear while doing Pilates. Opting for the art auction gets you free glasses of champagne and an education in art appreciation. Booze cruises don't usually bring out deep-pocketed serious buyers, but good deals can be found with a timely bid and a quality art auctioneer. The hand-embellished Duave giclee I won with Charles Warren's bang of the gavel arrived in perfect shape from Park West Gallery. Before passengers pack for the next morning's disembarkation (wait until sunup and you could miss out on breakfast), they are and "Shout," the quintessential cruise ship revue. A mish-mash of choreography, music covering country, rock, gospel, surf, Motown, '50s do-wop and '60s psychedelic, an audience-participatory "Macarena," fireworks -- the only thing missing from this musical smorgasbord are tunes recorded after 1996.

Because everything is so new and exciting, first-time cruisers may not notice what's tired and dated about the *Inspiration*, one of the oldest ships in Carnival's fleet, but much of that is already being addressed by the cruise line. The Inspiration, which had its maiden voyage in 1996 and hasn't been refurbished since 2007, will be in dry dock for two weeks in November to receive "Fun Ship 2.0" upgrades. After tapping toes for nearly seven years, both "Shout" and "Fiesta Latina" are retiring in favor of new revues from Playlist Productions. Fresh shows are welcome, though we'll see if show-savvy LA audiences embrace the smaller cast and canned music that are part of the fleet-wide retooling of the main stage productions. Upgrades to the Punchliner Comedy Club include TV personality and comedian George Lopez welcoming audiences with pre-recorded voice and video messages as part of his responsibilities as Carnival's new "curator of comedy." Also coming is "Hasbro, The Game Show," an audience-participatory stage version of six popular games from the toymaker, including "Monopoly," "Yahtzee" and

"Sorry." Aesthetic and mechanical repairs that can only be done in dry dock also are scheduled.

The first sailing of the newly renovated Inspiration is set for Nov. 22. Two months later the ship will be joined in Long Beach by her year-older Fantasy Class sister. Starting in late January, several months after being dry docked for Fun Ship 2.0 upgrades, the Carnival Imagination will make identical three- and four-day roundtrip runs on Thursdays and Sundays, respectively. Not to be shut out on the SoCal booze cruise market, Carnival's slightly pricier brand, Princess Cruises, is sending the Golden Princess to San Pedro from late September through early December for 3-day trips to Ensenada and a four-day that adds stopovers to either Santa Barbara or Avalon depending on the sail.

The cruise industry is making the graduation to more extensive cruises easy for Southern Californians. The 2,124-passenger Carnival Miracle, a 9-year-old ship that will undergo Fun Ship 2.0 upgrades in 2015, will operate seven-day Mexican Riviera and 15-day Hawaii programs seasonally out of Long Beach from October through April 2014. From San Pedro, a dozen other cruise lines offer an array of voyages lasting a week and longer. The most extravagant currently being booked is a 116-day world cruise on the ultra-luxury Seabourn Sojourn. Brochure price: \$196,799. A booze cruise this ain't.
