SACRAMENTO REGION What they're selling can't explode according to state law, but that's not stopping local nonprofits from hoping for booming business starting June 28, the day fireworks can be sold in Citrus Heights, Orangevale and Fair Oaks

If fingers are crossed a bit tighter this season, it's because America's 236th birthday falls on a Wednesday, the first Fourth of July on "hump day" since 2007. Consumer fireworks leaders suggest a 10 percent drop in sales when Independence Day is smack in the middle of the week, but at least one industry leader believes that every smoke cloud has a silver lining.

"Because many people won't be able to make a 3-day or 4-day weekend out of holiday, they'll probably stay home, and that's a good thing for our non-profit groups," said Cathy Castilone, vice president of TNT Fireworks' Northern California region. "We've seen that when families don't go out of town they often light fireworks the weekend before the fourth and on the fourth itself."

The competition agrees. "Sales are strong on the fourth no matter what day of the week it is, and we're actually expecting better sales than usual on the 29th and 30th with people wanting to celebrate early on a weekend," said Linda Hass, Phantom Fireworks' Sacramento-based regional manager. "Sales should be brisk as well because the weather is cooperating, the economy seems to be moving in the right direction and Californians are eager to celebrate our great Independence Day with fireworks."

That should be patriotic music to the ears of dozens of cash-

strapped area charities, athletic two sons pitching next seagroups, youth organizations and service clubs.

Hoping to hit a home run with its fireworks fundraiser is Bella Vista High's Baseball Boosters, which last year was able to pay for new uniforms with proceeds made at its TNT stand next to McDonald's at Madison and Hazel avenues in Fair Oaks. Sharing the wealth, and ensuring adequate staffing, the boosters are offering \$10-20 an hour to supporters of other Bella Vista High clubs.

"It's a way to help other BV groups while the baseball boosters earn money toward operating costs, field maintenance, equipment, umpires – well, everything, since we get no funding from the school," said first-year fireworks co-chair Joanna Lee, a Fair Oaks resident who is expected to have son for the Broncos; Gavin as a returning senior and Aaron as a freshman.

With TNT Fireworks carrying a fountain named Home Run, the Bronco baseball team might push that 2-year-old item a bit harder than other groups. Same can be said for TNT's best-selling Piccolo Pete by Bella Vista High's Band Boosters, which will be banking on heavy sales at its own TNT stand.

For the volunteers supporting the school's music groups and drill team, the week-long fundraiser means that every Big Timer assortment, Delirium fountain and ground bloom flower sold gets the musically inclined Broncos to more competitions and closer to new uniforms and equipment. The group's TNT stand in Citrus Heights, adjacent

to Olive Garden at 5425 Sunrise Blvd., raised \$4,000 in net profits a year ago, and first-year fireworks coordinator Tami Miller is looking to make a grand more this go-around.

Triple-dipping with TNT stands in Fair Oaks, Orangevale and Rocklin is Retro Teen Center of The Family Church in Roseville. Multiple locations will enable the church's rock club-teen center to share profits with two public schools and a food bank.

"This is the first year that the Retro Teen Center is donating some of the proceeds to other non-profits throughout the region," said the church's executive pastor Matthew Oliver. "Our goal has always been to give back to the community, and this year we plan to do just that."

SMUD Goes Mobile

SACRAMENTO REGION - Electric utility's user-friendly website is now available on smart phonesSMUD has a new way for customers to view their account, see their energy usage, pay their bill and check on power outages via their mobile phone.

SMUD's new mobile website, SMUD Mobile, is optimized for use with iPhone and Android smart phones and is compatible with many other browser-enabled phones as well. The application was also designed to minimize impact to mobile phones that have data plan caps.

SMUD Mobile is very easy to navigate. It features a single menu button in the upper right section of the screen that is available from any page. It flips or fades the screen to display a full-screen option that presents the user with all available navigation options in one place. When a user logs in, the logout button is available in the menu as well as from any page.

Since smart phones make up about 50 percent of the mobile market nationwide, they are an important way for SMUD to connect with customers.

The My Account section of the site offers those with a login the ability to view the outage status at their specific location, see their energy usage, view their bill and pay their bill-all online from their phone. The mobile site accepts Visa or Mastercard or users can pay with a bank account.

To make it easier for customers to pay their bill, SMUD Mobile also provides alternative ways to pay such as showing users where local pay stations are and allowing them to display a map of their location or call the pay stations. It also allows a user who does not have a My Account login to make a one-time payment.

The outage map lets users see the entire SMUD service territory and gives them the same data available on the current website.

Already, about 10 percent of SMUD customers are using SMUD Mobile, which can be accessed by typing smud.org in your mobile phone's web browser.

Recent cases of interest

CASE: SSD Deputy Kelly Smith (06/25/12)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Michael Blazina

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that 43-year-old Kelly Curran Smith pled no contest to felony charges of unlawful possession of a controlled substance and identity theft.

While a deputy with the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department, Smith befriended the 90-year-old victim. Smith ordered and acquired Hydrocodone (Vicodin) using the victim's prescription information she obtained during a visit. Under the plea agreement, Smith will be referred to a drug diversion program on the unlawful possession

of a controlled substance charge. She will be placed on probation and ordered to serve 120 days on the identity theft charge. Sentencing is set for August 6, 2012 in Department 8 before the Honorable Kevin McCormick.

CASE: Company Nurse, LLC (06/22/12)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Dale Kitching

District Attorney Jan Scully joins Monterey County District Attorney Dean D. Flippo and the District Attorneys of Amador, San Joaquin and Yolo counties in announcing the settlement in a civil law enforcement action against Company Nurse LLC, an Arizona company, and its parent company Comptivity, Inc., a Delaware corporation. The civil action was filed in Monterey County Superior Court, and the settlement resolves allegations of unlawful business practices.

Company Nurse provides telephone medical advice services for employees of numerous businesses and public entities throughout California. An investigation found that Company Nurse had failed to register with the California Department of Consumer Affairs' Telephone Medical Advice Services Bureau, and also failed to ensure that all persons providing telephone medical advice services were California licensed registered nurses as required by law. After the investigation began, Company Nurse came into compliance by registering with the Telephone Medical Services Bureau and working to ensure that it uses California licensed nurses when providing telephone medical advice services.

Company Nurse cooperated with the investigation, and without admitting or denying any wrongdoing, agreed to pay a total of \$200,000. These payments include \$150,000 in civil penalties and \$50,000 for the costs of the enforcement. The terms of the settlement also provide for a permanent injunction. Sacramento County will receive \$9,000 in costs and penalties.

CASE: Saul Isidoro-Ausencio & Francisco Delgado (06/22/12) PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Donell A. Slivka

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that the Honorable Judge Helena Gweon sentenced Saul Isidoro-Ausencio and Francisco Delgado to three terms of life in prison without the possibility of parole for the first degree murders of 15-year-old Jamir Miller, 16-year-old Richard Ward and 20-year-old Robert Corpos. Isidoro-Ausencio was sentenced to an additional term of 75 years to life and 16 years, 8 months in prison for the personal and intentional discharge of a firearm for each murder and for committing the crimes for the benefit of the Sureno Street Gang.

In February 2011, the victims were shot as they were riding their bikes on Malaga Way in Rancho Cordova because Isidoro-Ausencio was seeking revenge for a beating he suffered at the hands of rival gang members. When he was unable to find the gang members who had assaulted him, he and Delgado drove up behind the victims and shot them instead. They believed that the victims were gang members, even though they had nothing to do with the assault on Isidoro-Ausencio.

CASE: Emery Allen (06/15/12)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Michael Blazina

Sacramento County District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Emery Allen was sentenced by the Honorable David De Alba to 40 years to life in prison. In April, Allen was convicted by jury for the attempted murder of his co-defendant and rival gang member, Junius Winters. The jury also found true arming and

gang allegations connected to that charge.

On September 15 2009, Allen, a Gunz-Up gang member, instigated a conflict and engaged in a mutual combat shooting against several members of the rival gang G-Mobb/Guttah Boy in south Sacramento. It is believed that as many as six Gunz-Up gang members and seven G-Mobb/Guttah Boyz gang members participated or were present during the shooting. This was one of 26 shootings that took place between 2008 and 2010 as a result of a gang conflict between G-Mobb/Guttah Boyz and the Oak Park/4th Ave Bloods and Gunz-Up street gangs.



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

When that little group of Separatists left England for the New World in a little boat called the Mayflower, they landed at Plymouth Rock in a territory that would eventually become known as the Massachusetts Bay Colony. The Colony became, obviously, the seedbed for the nation whose birthday we celebrate this week.

These Pilgrims had been oppressed and persecuted by the state church and, looking for relief, set out to create a type of religious retreat and sanctuary. The Pilgrims were not very successful and a decade later, under a new charter, they were replaced by the Puritans.

The Puritans were governed by a man who continues to have influence on the New World, Governor John Winthrop. Winthrop claimed that God had given the Puritans this new land in order to purify Christianity, to save this continent from being wasted, and to serve as an example to the Old World for building

a model society. John Winthrop delivered his most famous sermon to this end, before he even set foot on North American soil. Just off of the beach on the boat that had brought the Puritans to their new home, he preached a sermon entitled, "A Model of Christian

Charity," delivered in 1630.

A portion of that sermon reads: "The Lord will be our God and will command a blessing upon us in all our ways...He shall make us a praise and glory...We shall be as a City upon a Hill, the eyes of all people are upon us. Keep his commandments and his laws that the Lord our God may bless us in the land we go to possess."

This high idealism that a human nation, united with religious fervor, can serve the grand and glorious intentions of God has been written into this nation's history and psyche. That phrase, "city on a hill" or "shining light" has been used to describe the hopes and dreams for America by everyone from John Adams and Abraham Lincoln to John Kennedy and Ronald Reagan – but these words have been terribly misappropriated.

"City on a hill" language is verbiage that belongs in the realm of faith, to followers of Jesus, to disciples who are on the path into the Kingdom of God. No government, country, or Empire can ever serve as the light of the world. Any earthly nation claiming otherwise has plagiarized the words of Jesus, attempting to use human power to birth what can only come into the world by the power of God.

Many Christians in the United States have been operating under the illusion, from John Winthrop forward, that this is a Christian nation. No such entity exists. Just because we live in a nation that treats people of faith with some respect and allows us to pursue our personal ambitions, does not mean that the power-protecting

Empire and the self-sacrificing way of Jesus are compatible.

Eugene Peterson makes this point eloquently clear. He says the North American church conspicuously embraces the way of the Empire while living "in Jesus' name." The church "replaces the Jesus way with the American way. Yes, the American way works, sometimes magnificently, in achieving grandly conceived ends. Wars are fought, wealth is accumulated, elections are won, and victories posted. But the means by which those ends are achieved leaves a lot to be desired."

So with apologies to John Winthrop, do not expect government – any government – to be the light of the world, shining as a City on a Hill. Do not expect this from your employer, a corporation into which you invest, a social service organization to which you belong, or a charity to which you give. Expect great and noble things from these other organizations – even demand it - but do not expect more than these can give.

We might wish things were different, that nation states were our partner in advancing the Kingdom of God, but they are not. They can't be. All Empires belong to this dog-eat-dog world of power and power-seeking, even the Empire begun with a sermon off the Massachusetts

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

Taking this stance isn't mean, and it doesn't indicate that you don't love your family. It means you're loving them well and want what's best for them.



Village Green Park Friday Free Summer Movies and Concerts


RANCHO CORDOVA - Grab some lawn chairs and the family and head to Village Green Park Friday for free summer movie nights presented by the Cordova Community Council.

While Orangevale Food Closet and yet-named elementary schools will get a cut, the lion's share will help keep Retro open and operating.

"Thousands of young people are helped every month," said Oliver, now in his 10th year as fireworks chairman. "Retro is a place teens can call their own. Throughout the year we provide tutoring, counseling, secular and Christian nightly events and so much more.'

Retro's two most local stands are in Orangevale, next to Save Mart Supermarket at 8839 Greenback Lane and in the Walmart parking lot at 8961 Greenback Lane.

Supplementing funds raised through its annual crab and spaghetti feeds, Faith Lutheran Church in Fair Oaks is putting faith in fireworks with a TNT stand on its premises at 4000 San Juan Ave.

With a goal of \$10,000-\$12,000, according to fundraiser chairwoman Alice Beltran, a retired Faith teacher, proceeds are earmarked for capital improvements to its preschool, which currently serves nearly 40 children.

Also praying for bang-up business is New Life Community

stands for a third straight year. A portion of the proceeds from its dual Fair Oaks locations, at the church at 8101 Sunset Ave. and near Carl's Jr. at 8121 Madison Ave., will help send youths to church camp, noted Kathy Garcia, who is chairing her fifth fireworks fundraiser.

Rancho CordoVan Shuttle **Modifies Service to Anatolia**

Rancho CordoVan shuttle service will change its existing route and add a new route starting Monday, July 2, 2012 to improve service to residents and business commuters.

The existing shuttle route will be modified to maintain a 15-minute loop designed to serve business commuters in the morning and afternoon. The largest change is the relocation of the route start. The shuttle will no longer pick up from Cordova Town Centre Light Rail Station, near Koreana Plaza. The shuttle will now pick up from Zinfandel Plaza, next to the Zinfandel Light Rail Station. By relocating to Zinfandel Plaza, the CordoVan improves drive time efficiencies by avoiding Folsom Boulevard and Olson Drive traffic.

To maintain the expediency of the loop, the service will no longer make stops at Quality Drive and Data Drive, or Quality Drive and White Rock Road. Additionally, the shuttle service will run in opposite directions in the morning and afternoon. Morning

RANCHO CORDOVA - The operations will run clockwise while afternoon service will run counter-clockwise, meaning the morning and afternoon stops will be on opposite sides of the street.

A new route has also been added to serve the Anatolia neighborhood at the south end of the City. This service will be a 45-minute loop (22-minutes from Anatolia to Zinfandel Plaza) aimed at providing access to light rail for residents in the Anatolia neighborhood. Those residents pay a special assessment tax specifically for this service, a model that can be implemented in additional neighborhoods whose residents are willing to pay a special assessment tax.
