# "Convoy of Hope" to Help Those in Need

Sacramento Region-In the United States, approximately one in five children live at or below the poverty line, and in Sacramento, about 18 percent of families and 22 percent of individuals are living below the poverty level.

To help these individuals, the Sacramento "Convoy of Hope" organization will be hosting a one-day, event, on Saturday, November 5, 2011, at Cal Expo, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. The event is free to the public and parking is free. No ID is required.

The Sacramento Convoy of Hope is a local, non-profit organization, providing food for the hungry and relief for people in crisis. Their mission is to feed people in the United States and around the world.

According to SCOH coordinator Robin Smith, "We are trying to bring a day of hope to our city, especially since the last few years have been hard on the majority of

This local event will aid the growing number of underprivileged, unemployed/underemployed and homeless families and

individuals living in the greater Sacramento area, and provide necessary goods and services to meet their most basic needs.

All interested parties will be provided goods and services, free of charge. The services include on-site hot meals, free social services /educational assistance, free medical screening, free job fair, free entertainment for the entire family, free "Kid's" Carnival, free hair cuts, free clothing, free groceries.

The SCOH is a neighborhood partnership between local area businesses, churches, social

services, educational and medical professionals, and more.

"We want to show that our community can come together and help take care of our less fortunate citizens," said Smith.

Since its inception in 1994, the COH has helped more than 60 million people in more than 100 countries. In that time, nearly \$200 million worth of food and supplies has been dispensed to people in need.

The SCOH will distribute between 400,000-500,000 lbs. of goods to the approximately 15,000-20,000 individuals expected at the event this year.

This all-volunteer event brings together hundreds of area residents, businesses, community agencies, service organizations, professionals and churches to put on this sizeable event.

During this economic downturn, with both national and state unemployment at record highs, critical needs are not being met through traditional means. More than 37 million people are living in poverty in our country, and over six million are in California alone. Families with children make up 40 percent of the US homeless population.

Lumsden recently retired from the Roseville Police Department as a captain, serving 29 years on the force. During his career, he served as a member of SWAT, K-9 duty, narcotics and vice, youth services,

and retired as the patrol division commander. He is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and holds a Masters Degree from Saint Mary's College of California.

The Rangers are full peace officers, have the same level of authority as a County Sheriff deputy or a City Police Officer and have completed extensive training at the Sheriff's Academy. They enforce the laws applicable to Regional

Parks, specific County ordinances and California Vehicle, Penal and Health & Safety Codes within all

County Regional Parks. Rangers enforce infractions, misdemeanors and felonies that occur within the Park system. They also protect the wildlife and environment and patrol all of the parks to deter vandalism and promote safety.

# Sand Into Pearls: Perla Warren's Life Story

"Perla Warren has done more to promote quality vocal jazz than anyone in the region." **Donald Kendrick**

Music massages the soul and stimulates the senses. It unifies diverse cultures and beliefs of faith.

If you're lucky, a special teacher or mentor will appear, whose passion for you to excel will forever impact your life. To the music students of American River College, that person was Perla Warren.

Perla L. Zulueta was born and raised in Quezon City, Philippines, where her home was filled with music. "On my mother's side, everybody sang and played the piano. I grew up in a home with two grandfathers. 'Grandfather'

is a little different than here. A great-uncle is a 'grandfather' in the Philippines. One of them was an avid musician, who just loved music, so he would crank up the Victrola, and play John Philips Sousa in the morning to get everybody going. In the evening, there was always an opera. On my father's side, nobody knew music. It was all business. My father made up a couple of lullabies that he sang to me, putting me to sleep."

Perla's first piano teacher was very strict. "I used to just shake before the finals. But, she had so much compassion. I knew she was interested in me and my development."

Pianos aren't part of an orchestra, so she took up cello. "I always liked the sound. I didn't like the violin, because it would make a mark on my chin."

She graduated from the



University of the Philippines Conservatory of Music in 1957, with a degree in Piano Performance.

Traveling to the United States sounded like fun. "My father said, 'If you're going to go to the United States, you must have a purpose." Her aunt was teaching at Indiana University, so Perla lived with her while attending Butler University, continuing her studies in music.

"At the time, music education was not offered in the Philippines. It was very European. You received a Bachelor of Music in Piano, Violin, Vocal Performance, etc. - always a performance degree. I thought, well, I'll be one of the first graduates in Music Education. I was enjoying it so much, I decided to go into conducting."

She practiced the piano in the lobby of the student union building everyday from midnight until 4:00 a.m.. "The security guard always watched out for me. In the lobby was an office that was open 24 hrs a day so I was very safe."

One night, the light on her piano went out. "I watched a medical student go to the box and fix it. I didn't say anything to him." When a friend of hers later introduced her to Gene Warren, she thanked him for fixing the light. Perla and Gene married, raised two daughters, and celebrated their 51st anniversary.

For a child experiencing grief, medical stress, trauma or other challenging situations, a homemade blanket offers more than warmth. It provides emotional comfort.

In 1995, Karen Loucks read an article in Parade in which a security blanket helped a young girl endure painful chemotherapy treatments. That article inspired her to donate homemade security blankets to a cancer center in Denver, which, in turn, led her to create Project Linus. "Providing Security Through Blankets," gifts of homemade blankets and afghans for children in need have escalated.

As of January 2011, Project Linus has inspired the creation of 371 chapters around the country, one of which began in 1996 by Claire Cliddon, serving Sacramento, Placer and El Dorado

"We delivered 35 blankets that first year," says Cliddon. "We started out with hospital pediatrics, telling them, 'If you can use them, let us know." Today, service organization recipients are now rotated from a lengthy list. Law enforcement, U.S. Forest Service, hospital pediatric units, elementary schools, shelters and hospice are just a few examples of those who can now offer blankets to children in need. "Last year, we delivered over 6,000 blankets.

They're for kids even just going through a difficult time, like their parents are in Afghanistan and they miss them, or they lost a sibling. We do it from natal infants up to 18 year olds."

Although many chapters across the country keep an extra supply of 200 blankets, Cliddon doesn't agree with that policy. "If the blankets come in, they need to go out. Someone needs them now."

Who makes the blankets? The diversity of volunteers range from a six year old Daisy Girl Scout who made a no-sew fleece blanket, to a 105-year-old woman who sews infant blankets.

Geraldine Dillon is turning 101 at the end of the month, and enjoys being a part of Project Linus, even though her peripheral vision limits her crocheting to a single pattern, which she can stitch by feel. "I've done almost 300," declares Dillon.

She encourages others to volunteer their sewing time. "If they don't know how, I can show them. It's good for people, even if you're sick for awhile. I can't stand to just sit and do nothing, even when I look at television. I like to do something with my hands. I think Project Linus is wonderful."

Cliddon says, "I have one lady who has made two blankets every single month since 2000. We had a woman in an assisted living home who said, 'Project Linus gives me a reason to get up in the morning."

Although donated homemade blankets are distributed locally, Cliddon makes a point of assisting with global disaster relief efforts. Hundreds of blankets were donated

to Katrina, 9/11, Texas, Haiti and Japan. "We had people pouring out of the woodwork for those causes. It was amazing."

Project Linus is looking for volunteers who crochet, knit, quilt and no-sew:

· Mothers can sew while they watch the kids' games

Cliddon says, "I write a thank you letter to everybody who makes a blanket, and tell them where they're going that month."

Donations of washable yarn, 100% cotton fabric and batting can always be used for volunteers who can't afford sewing supplies. Dillon's grandson and others pick up yarn for her from the thrift store and yard sales. "The Sacramento Book of

Dreams gave us a lot of yarn and office supplies. In general, we have no funding and we have to depend on outside sources or I just buy it, which can add up."

"I can't think of a better thing to do. It's just the neatest thing for me to give blankets to kids, but to have all of these women say, 'Oh, I finally feel like I've done something worthwhile,' is wonderful."





Carmichael - Though large felines once ranged freely in the Sacramento Valley, mountain lion sightings don't happen every day in the suburbs. As part of a returnto-nature theme for an Effie Yeaw fundraiser on Sunday October 23rd, one such Felis concolor will come

to Carmichael. Firmly leashed, seven year old Shoshone will educate visitors about these much maligned felines. "All wild cats are endangered," says Shoshone's co-owner Barbara Dicely. She helps run the Wild Cat Education and Conservation Fund in the Russian River area. "Another of our cats — a snow leopard – is the fourth most endangered species on the planet," Barbara adds. "Man just doesn't want them around."

The Dicelys will transport and handle the wild cat exhibit at the fundraiser. Bred in captivity, the 100 pound mountain lioness will spend 20 minutes on, 20 minutes off her display table. She will be caged on breaks and spelled by a smaller but equally fascinating Canada lynx. This species is a close cousin to the bobcat – once common in these parts but now almost extinct.

Licensed by the Federal and State Government to keep and exhibit their animals, the Dicelys care for 19 wild cats on a 22-acre ranch near Occidental. Shoshone and fellow felines thrive on a raw red meat diet especially produced for zoos.

"We've presented over 100 educational programs a year for 20 years," says Dicely. "By meeting these amazing creatures, we hope people will learn to care about them and help their species from becoming extinct."

Live raptors, snakes and bats will also be on show at the October 23rd Effie Yeaw "Nature Fest." The event runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Admission is free but there is a \$5 fee for parking. Donations toward the Nature Center are encouraged.



## Sacramento County DA Reports

Recent cases of interest

CASE: Orlando Williams (10/3/11)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Michelle Becker

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that prison inmate Orlando Williams was convicted by jury for possessing heroin and ecstasy at Folsom State Prison.

Williams had 22 tablets of ecstasy and 3 grams of heroin in his possession at Folsom State Prison at Old

Williams faces a sentence of up to 10 additional years in prison. Sentencing is set for October 27, 2011 at 9:00 a.m. in Department 37 in front of the Honorable Judge Davidian.

### CASE: Demarcus Mason (10/7/11)

### PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Kevin Greene

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Demarcus Mason pled guilty to voluntary manslaughter in the death of Christopher Thompson.

In January 1999, Kennedy High School student Christopher Thompson was assaulted by Mason and another student. Thompson sustained serious injuries, but did not die. However, he experienced complications from the assault and died on February 4, 2010.

Mason was 16 years old at the time of the attack, but he was tried as an adult. In June 1999, he pled guilty to attempted robbery with a great bodily injury enhancement and was sentenced to 5 years in prison.

Mason will be sentenced to 11 years in prison. Sentencing is set for November 18, 2011 in Department 25 in front of the Honorable Kevin McCormick.

### CASE: Devin Merritt (10/8/11)

## PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Michelle Becker

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Devin Merritt was sentenced by the Honorable Judge Oros to 30 years to life in prison after being convicted by jury for assault on an inmate at California State Prison, Sacramento.

Merritt and co-defendant Travis Britt attacked another inmate on the yard, punching him in the head and upper torso area. The victim was transported to UCD Medical Center with serious injuries, including multiple facial fractures, a broken nose, and a laceration on his left eyebrow.

Merritt is serving time in prison for multiple counts of violent conduct. In 2005, he was convicted of car-jacking, assault with a gun, and five counts of armed robbery. During one of those robberies, Merritt shot the victim.

Deputy District Attorney Michelle Becker stated, "The outcome of this case demonstrates how the Three Strikes Law is keeping violent recidivist criminals off the streets.'

## CASE: Orlando Camacho, Christopher Hernandez & James Riggins (10/8/11)

PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Donell Slivka

District Attorney Jan Scully announced that the Honorable Judge Lloyd Connelly sentenced James Riggins to two life terms in prison without the possibility of parole plus 135 years to life for the first degree murders of Rigoberto Aguirre and Isidro Cedillo, and for the premeditated and deliberated attempted murder of Victor

Co-defendants, Orlando Camacho and Christopher Hernandez, were each sentenced to 30 years, 8 months in prison for voluntary manslaughter in the deaths of Rigoberto Aguirre and Isidro Cedillo, and the attempted voluntary manslaughter of Victor Cedillo.

All three defendants were validated Varrio Diamond Norteno gang members. The victims were shot by Riggins because they had reported previous assaults, including a drive by shooting at their house by members of the Varrio Diamonds. These reports resulted in the conviction of some gang members and an increased number of police contacts with other Varrio Diamond gang members, which led to probation and parole violation arrests. In addition, the victims were living in a neighborhood claimed by the Varrio Diamonds and were identified by that gang as Surenos, a rival gang.

## CASE: Juan Gonzalez (10/13/11)

## PROSECUTOR: Deputy District Attorney Sean Laird

District Attorney Jan Scully announced today that Juan Gonzalez was convicted by jury of first degree murder and gang enhancements for the 2009 killing of 16 year-old Francisco Medina-Tomas at the Bowling Green Village Apartments.

Gonzalez was one of four Barrio Sur Trece (BST) Sureno gang members who approached the victim, confronted him about where he was from, then shot and killed him after a brief exchange of words.

Gonzalez faces a sentence of 50 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for November 19, 2011 at 9:00 a.m. in front of the Honorable Kevin J. McCormick.







She ultimately received degrees in Music History, Literature and Choral Conducting at the Jordan Conservatory of Music, Butler University, and was appointed to its faculty, teaching in the Piano Department. She also served as Choral Director at Pike High School.

"If were a troublemaker, the threat was, 'I'm sending you to Mrs. Warren's study hall.' To this day, I don't know why, but in my study hall, you could hear a pin drop. I was so tiny; 98 pounds with long hair, ponytail."

Her chamber group, The High Tones, was so popular a nursery owner provided a gardenia for each singer, for every performance.

Perla and her family moved to Sacramento in 1965. In 1974, she entered the American River College faculty as a choral conductor, voice teacher and piano instructor. She conducted both the American River College Chamber Singers (a classical repertoire ensemble) and the American River College Jazz Choir, both of which received numerous awards and invitations to prestigious music festivals in Ireland, England, the Philippines, Austria, Germany and France. Her Jazz Choir performed at the Montreux International Jazz Festival.

They opened for Ray Charles at the North Sea International Jazz Festival in Holland. "The people would not let us leave the stage. They were clapping their hands and stomping. It was almost embarrassing. We were stepping on his time. In Switzerland, we sang every song we knew. It was 4:00 in the morning and the people wouldn't let us get off the stage.

I think it's the honesty of the music. The students found that the music was better than they are. That's when you really see artistry."

In May 1994, she made her Carnegie Hall debut, guest conducting massed choirs. As a teacher, she had spent as much time as needed with the students. At Carnegie, the situation was quite different. "You are definitely with professionals and they're unionized. Union says at 9:00 you're finished. At 9:01 there's no one in the room. I had to really prepare and I had never met these people before. They know the music, but they don't know the way I would like to have it played. It was very frightening.

The day came, and they put you in a room upstairs, alone. You have a huge television so you know what's going on. There's a security guard at your door. Nobody bothers you. The choir, orchestra, the two soloists, podium is there waiting there. You're the last to walk out.

I was shaking like a leaf. My knees were shaking, my stomach I cannot feel it. I was so cold. I just knew there was no way in the world that I could walk in my heels, in my gown, all the way to the middle, get up to the podium. I thought I was going to faint. But, I knew I had to go. When I walked onto the podium all I could see was my score, and I knew the downbeat and the tempo. I found something about me; that I could be that focused."

Her former students remember that focus and energy, and a few of them shared fond memories of Perla as teacher, mentor and friend.

"It's more than learning notes and rhythms," says Jenny Guemmer. "She cares about her students on a spiritual level. She really invested in all of us. After a choir tour, we discussed choirs we had visited and she asked, 'How will people out there know how to experience what you've heard?' It just sort of hit me like a lightning bolt - we have to teach them! And I cried. Because of her, I discovered my calling as a music teacher." In fact, she now teaches piano lessons to Perla's granddaughter, Celeste.

"Trying to get into her choirs was very prestigious," says Eric Rosander. "It was an audition process. There was such a high pressure of staying there. It was a growing up experience for a lot of people. One time, back when I was playing bass, I didn't have my stuff down when it was time for rehearsal. I got called up on it; a lecture in front of everybody. What I didn't do affected the entire group; affected everything she had planned for that day. I learned to be disciplined, to work as a team; learned about musicality and performance. It's not just notes and text; the text actually has a story or an emotion that you're trying to convey. She drove you to meet a challenge of high standards."

"The first word that comes to mind is passionate; passionate about music, teaching," recalls Julie Adams. "She was demanding, but in a way that made you want to be better. You knew she wanted the best for you, and cared about you, and that's why she was expecting so much out of you. We stood a little taller, felt better about ourselves and expected more out of ourselves. I think I was on her first European tour. I sat next to her on the plane

and she taught me the entire flight. I remember learning things about the Philippines, the language. She's always sharing ideas, concepts and knowledge. The quality of the music she prepared was always high quality, so we were so proud to perform with her." Following Perla's lead, Adams also became a music teacher, and conductor of R.S.V.P. and the Sacramento Children's Chorus.

"She was very warm; made

everybody feel welcome," says John Lofgren. "She never accepted less than excellence. She was focused and energetic. She didn't just give you notes; she'd shape the music. She was very, very creative. She was very inclusive with a lot of her students as far as discussing things other than music; what she learned from her life. I got to know her family very well. I saw the interaction between her and her husband with their children; the trust they had in each other. We have that with our daughter. Part of that comes from Perla." Lofgren has sung with the Sacramento Master Singers for over 20 years.

In the past three decades, Perla has conducted all-state honor choirs in local, state and national arenas, managed choral workshops at several

universities and music conferences throughout the United States and the Philippines.

"One of my students said there are times when they're in the class that it's so intense they feel like they need to scream and run away, but they don't. They are so willing to fail. 'But, you, Mrs. Warren, are so unwilling for us to fail.' It is one of the most beautiful compliments I received. I'll never forget that."





"Keeping the Faith"

"Love others as much as you love yourself," Jesus told his followers. These words are considerably more than a sugary Sunday School story. For those who take these words to heart, "love others" has profound, life-altering implications, not all of which are warm and fuzzy. Consider the life of Bernard Lichtenberg, arrested seventy years ago this month. His crime: He loved.

Lichtenberg was a Catholic priest serving in Berlin before the outbreak of World War 2. When Adolf Hitler and the Nazi Party came to power, he recognized the coming terror better than most, and made it his ambition to help the Jewish people and other persecuted groups.

Lichtenberg spoke and acted boldly in defense of the Jews, and his repeated protests quickly landed on the ears of government officials. Then, as he knew would be the case, these protests landed him in the crosshairs of a Gestapo investigation. After years of tension, Lichtenberg was finally imprisoned for his opposition.

During his interrogation Lichtenberg was given the opportunity to recant his words and change his ways. He would not. Rather, he said: "I reject with my innermost the [deportation of the Jews] with all its side effects, because it is directed against the most important commandment Christianity, 'You shall

your neighbor as much as you love yourself'.

"However, since I cannot prevent this governmental measure, I have made up my mind to accompany the deported Jews and Christian Jews into exile, in order to give them spiritual aid. I wish to ask the Gestapo to give me this opportunity."

Considered irredeemable by the Third Reich, Lichtenberg's appeal was granted. He was condemned and consigned to the concentration camp at Dachau. Aged, frail, and in a weakened state, Bernard Lichtenberg died while waiting to be deported in November of 1943.

It is hard to say that Father Lichtenberg, almost single-handedly opposing the Nazi war machine, was acting in a reasonable or sensible manner. How could he, as one man, ever hope to achieve "justice" for the oppressed? What could one pulpit minister do to dismantle or otherwise deter such a system of death? Not much, except to be persecuted, imprisoned, or executed.

No, Bernard Lichtenberg was not being practical. He was being love. Such love can appear like madness, leading the follower of Jesus into all manner of impracticality. Loving our neighbors as ourselves means we turn the other cheek when we are assaulted, we abandon the selfishness and power-grubbing ways of this world, we refuse to repay evil with evil, and we forgive others rather than retaliate against them.

The problem is obvious: Loving and living like this will put us in vulnerable, seemingly defenseless positions. To willingly behave this way, in the "real world," will only get us abused, maligned, taken advantage of, or worse. These "opportunities," as Lichtenberg called them, clearly aren't very pragmatic. Yet, pragmatism doesn't seem to be Christ's principal

We are instructed to love, following Jesus' own example, not because it is practical, reasonable, logical, or the safest way to live in the world. We actively participate in this way of Jesus because it gives witness to the good and loving God of heaven.

Not for a minute should we think that unselfishly loving our neighbors will save the world from all hate and violence. It won't make our membership rolls at the church grow, get more people into the pews on Sunday, or achieve justice for all society. None of these are the point. We love our neighbors as ourselves not because it always "works," but because it witnesses. Love for others is a clear reflection of the love of God - and that is the point.

Pope John Paul recognized this decades later when he honored the martyrdom of Bernard Lichtenberg with these words. He said, "It is not the world's applause but the faithful confession of Jesus Christ that is the sign of an authentic disciple of Christ." This confession may not always "succeed," but it will always shine as a light in the darkness.



# A Focus on Breast Cancer In October

Breast cancer is the second most common cause of cancer deaths among women in the US. It's not surprising that a diagnosis of this disease is a fear many women share. However, being informed about the risk factors, detection, and treatment of breast cancer can help empower women to move beyond fear and into action.

The two main risk factors for breast cancer are being a woman and getting older. Family history, personal history of certain cancers, no pregnancies or first pregnancy later in life, starting periods before age 12 or menopause at age 55 or after, obesity, alcohol intake, and use of some types of hormone therapy can also increase a woman's risk.

While some risk factors including age and family history are beyond your control, others such as weight and the amount of alcohol you drink, can be improved. You can learn more about your risk of breast and other cancers at understandingrisk.cancer.gov.

Women with breast cancer have up to a 98% survival rate when it is caught at an early stage. Earlier detection and advances in treatment have led to the gradual decrease in breast cancer deaths. Mammography screening remains the best available method to detect breast cancer early. Regular mammograms are crucial to identifying tumors when they are most treatable, but unfortunately, many women skip being screened.

ACOG recommends that all women ages 40 and older should have a mammogram annually. If you have certain risk factors, such as being a carrier of the BRCA1 or BRCA2 gene, your doctor may suggest mammography screening at a younger age. Highrisk women should discuss their prevention options with their doctors. For information on where you can find free or low-cost mammography screenings, go to cdc.gov/cancer/nbccedp.

Women ages 40 and older should also have their breasts examined by their doctor annually. Women ages 20–39 should have this done every one to three years. Additionally, all women ages 20 and older should become familiar with the normal appearance and feel of their breasts and tell their doctor if they notice any changes.

There are currently a number of effective treatment options available for breast cancer. Ultimately, a woman and her doctor will choose the treatment that is right for her, based on the location and extent of the cancer, her age and preferences, and the risks and benefits of each

Though a comparison to "Transformers" is inevitable, the action-packed "Real Steel" is so much more than robots engaged in full-on, brutal destruction of each

"Real Steel" is more like the original "Rocky," focused on a boxing competition where the underdog hero makes a comeback and gives

The setting is the near distant future, where the public's thirst for violence and carnage is greater than what mere mortal athletes can give.

The boxing world has evolved, if you will, to the point where robots have replaced the pugilists and the boxing ring has no limits in regards to personal safety.

Hugh Jackman's Charlie Denton is a washed-up boxer who is forced, by circumstances, to hustle as a small-time robot fight promoter.

Traveling the back roads of rural America in his truck hauling a broken-down robot, Charlie tries to stay a few steps ahead of debt collectors and other unseemly characters.

The seamy underground boxing venues include a traveling carnival where Charlie's second-rate robot is even no match for livestock.

Though he is constantly on the run, Charlie finds his life more complicated by the sudden death of his ex-wife; he discovers that he has a 12-year-old son.

The boy's aunt (Hope Davis) wants custody of the boy, but first Charlie strikes a cash deal so that he'll babysit his estranged son Max (a winsome Dakota Goyo) for the

At this point, "Real Steel" is no

longer just the story of a peripatetic fight promoter looking for his next payday at a venue not sanctioned by World Robot Boxing.

The underdog boxing story involves an alienated father-son duo reluctantly teaming up to rebuild and train a scrap-heap robot and turning it into a boxing contender.

At another level, the storytelling is grounded in a tale of redemption for the lost and forgotten souls of the father, his son and the abandoned machine they intend to revive.

Max names his junkyard robot "Atom," which needs serious repair work. Charlie finds suitable help at the boxing gym where he once

The gym is now run by the deceased owner's daughter, Bailey (Evangeline Lilly), Charlie's longtime friend and apparent possible love interest.

Appearing undersized and physically vulnerable, Atom does not look like the type of robot to survive a bout with machines larger and more imposing.

But cunning and guile may prove more important. The robots are operated by humans using computers and remote control devices.

The father-son team debut Atom at an underground site. To their surprise, he wins the fight and then keeps winning other bouts, and in the process establishing a

Soon enough, Atom enters the ring against established contenders at sanctioned robot boxing venues. He keeps on winning.

Meanwhile, the world champion robot is an enormous machine aptly named Zeus, a fearsome black robot that is described as "The Death

Not only has Zeus never been beaten, but also, no other robot has even survived beyond the first round with him. Does it take much to envision the Zeus-Atom showdown?

Zeus' owners are the villains. Tak Mashido (Karl Yune is the calculating robot engineer. The striking beauty Farra Lemkova (Olga Fonda) is cold and merciless; she also looks like a Kardashian sister.

As to be expected, the big fight day comes, with challenger Atom, against all odds, going up against the formidable, undefeated Zeus. The result may be more surprising and satisfying than you would expect.

"Real Steel" has nicely choreographed fight scenes, thanks in part to Sugar Ray Leonard's role as the film's boxing consultant.

To be sure, "Real Steel" has plenty of hard-core action, but in the end it is a gratifying, warmhearted story that is ultimately about salvation. It's a much better film than I had anticipated.



potatoes, add it to chiles and curries for authentic flavor, create a zero carb flavorful refreshing drink by adding a cinnamon stick to your glass or bottled water. One stick lasts two days. You can transfer it from glass to glass, and then use a new stick.



Most of the talk after the San Francisco 49ers' 25-19 win Sunday at Detroit has been about the post-game hubbub between Lions coach Jim Schwartz and the Niners' Jim Harbaugh.

After smacking one another around for four hours, I'll bet a lot of the players (some captured on the videos) were having a pretty good laugh over the coaches' confrontation.

Manager Tony LaRussa's St. Louis Cardinals clinched the NLCS Sunday, 12-6 over Milwaukee, to reach the Series from their wild card spot. The Card's scored 43 runs in six games against the Brewers' respectable staff (and lousy defense). There should be plenty of slugfests ahead.



Sacramento Region - Average retail gasoline prices in Sacramento have risen 2.3 cents per gallon in the past week, averaging \$3.74/g last week. This compares with the national average that has increased 6.3 cents per gallon in the last week to \$3.49/g, according to gasoline price website SactoGasPrices.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Sacramento during the past week, prices were 64.6 gallon during the last month and stands 66.3 cents per gallon higher than this day one year ago.
