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Sacramento Among Smoggiest **Regions in the Entire Nation**

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Sacramento Region – The city of Sacramento is ranked fifth smoggiest city in the nation, according to the American Lung Association's annual report on air quality, State of the Air 2011. The report shows people in Sacramento continue to breathe dangerous levels of air pollution, despite positive nationwide trends toward cleaner air. Reflecting the continued problems, this year's report showed that Sacramento's air quality stayed at the same level as 2010's State of the Air report, unlike the majority of American cities most-polluted by ozone (smog) or year-round particle pollution (soot). Sacramento's best opportunity for progress depends on locally raising awareness of the problem and the continued cleanup of

deadly pollution.

The State of the Air 2011 report grades cities and counties based. in part, on the color-coded Air Quality Index developed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to help alert the public to daily unhealthy air conditions. The 12th annual release of the Lung Association's report uses the most recent EPA data collected from 2007 through 2009 from official monitors for ozone and particle pollution, the two most widespread types of air pollution. Counties are graded for ozone, year-round particle pollution and short-term particle pollution levels. The report also uses EPA's calculations for year-round particle levels.

up most in El Dorado, Nevada, Placer, Sacramento, Sutter and Yolo counties that all received in "F" for ozone pollution. Ozone is the most widespread air pollutant, created by the reaction of sunlight on emissions from vehicles and other sources. When ozone is inhaled, it irritates the lungs. It can cause immediate health problems and continue days later. Ozone can cause wheezing, coughing, asthma attacks and even premature death. Despite getting a passing grade for year-round particle pollution, the city of Sacramento was ranked ninth as most polluted by short-term particle pollution which is considered unhealthy by the American Lung Association and other public health groups and medical societies.

Particle levels can spike dangerously for hours to weeks on end (short-term) or remain at unhealthy levels on average every day (yearround).

Independents are not Moderates

Sacramento Area – Pew Research Center released a survey last month which was encouragingly called "Beyond Red vs. Blue." Encouraging, that is, for the growing number of Americans eager to find a way out of the partisanship which has come to dominate public policy making at nearly every level of government.

The study-an 150 page analysis-was quickly digested by reporters eager to get a leg up on the latest political trends just as the Republicans held their first televised Presidential debate in South Carolina which, notably, holds both an early primary and an open primary in which independents are allowed to vote.

"Voters More Complex than Red/ Blue" wrote ABC political director Amy Walter. "The Misunderstood Independent," echoed Aaron Blake and Chris Cillizza of the Washington Post.

The fifth study of its kind conducted by Pew since 1987, the survey aims to give a broad overview of the character of electorate and sorts Americans into eight cohesive groups based on values, political beliefs, and party affiliation.

Three of the eight classifications that emerged from this year's study were dedicated to independent voters—up from 2 classifications in the 2005 survey. More importantly, the presence of independents was evident across all five of the remaining classifications including those meant to define Democratic and Republican voters. In those groups, independents comprised 15% - 34% of their total makeup. Independents are everywhere it seems.

Pew acknowledged this in their report stating, "In recent years, the public has become increasingly averse to partisan labels... There has been a sharp rise in the percentage of independents-from 30% in 2005 to 37% currently."

The survey also encouragingly pointed out that-contrary to much theorizing that independents comprise "the center" of American political life—they remain a diverse lot with strong opinions. "The growing rejection of partisan identification does not imply a trend toward political moderation, however. In fact, the number of people describing their political ideology

as moderate has, if anything, been dropping," wrote Pew, acknowledging that while independents have come to played a central role in the last three national elections-this does not a "center" make.

Pew's findings amplify our own, discovered not through polling, but through the activity of organizing independents over the course of two decades. Independents are not in the middle between Democrats and Republicans. Rather, they want to move beyond the confines of parties altogether.

Perhaps more so than any other group of American voters, independents are attuned to the fact that partisanship is not a behavioral issue-it is a structural one. Since partisanship is produced by the structure of politics, addressing the issue of partisanship meaningfully means changing the political structure. That's why reforms like open primaries and nonpartisan elections are so popular among independents.



A Case in Point The Case of the Stolen Stereos By David Graulich, Esg.

It's generally known that police must have a search warrant to legally enter a home to look for evidence. What's not widely known are the complex rules that control what police can and cannot do while conducting their search.

These intricate rules often cause problems for law enforcement officials, as illustrated by the case of Arizona v. Hicks, decided by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1987.

The controversy in Hicks concerned the doctrine of "plain view." Plain view permits police to gather evidence that is immediately apparent during a legal search.

For example, say police have a warrant to search X's house for evidence relating to a bank robbery. After X's girlfriend lets them in, the police walk through the kitchen. Around the sink, in plain view, are containers of bleach, Coleman fuel, plastic tubing, ammonia, and boxes of Sudafed pills. The police could gather these objects as evidence that X was operating a methamphetamine lab, even though drug paraphernalia was outside the scope of their search warrant.

In the Hicks case, a bullet was fired through the floor of Hicks' apartment. The bullet struck and injured a man in the apartment below. Police arrived and entered the Hicks apartment, where they found and seized three weapons, including a sawedoff rifle, as well as a stocking-cap mask.

Let's pause a moment. The police didn't have a search warrant. Were they in the apartment legally?

The answer is yes. When there are "exigent circumstances" — some

conduct an immediate search without taking time to obtain a warrant. A shooting qualifies as a life-threatening emergency. Back to our case. A policeman inside the apartment, Officer Nelson,

inside the apartment, Officer Nelson, noticed two sets of expensive stereo components. The high-end stereos seemed out of place in the filthy and run-down apartment. Suspecting that the stereos might be stolen, Officer Nelson moved some of the components, including a Bang and Olufsen turntable, a few inches in order to locate and write down their serial numbers.

When Officer Nelson called in the serial numbers to police headquarters, his suspicions were confirmed. The stereos had been stolen during an armed robbery. Officer Nelson seized the equipment, and Hicks was indicted for robbery.

Hicks sought to have the stereo equipment excluded as evidence against him. By moving the components, Hicks argued, Officer Nelson conducted an illegal search. The police were looking for a shooter, not a stereo. The serial numbers weren't in plain view, Hicks further argued, because Officer Nelson had to move the components to read the numbers.

Nonsense, replied the State of Arizona. Moving a turntable a few inches to read a serial number wasn't an illegal search. It was just a smart cop doing his job.

What did the Supreme Court decide?

By a 6-3 vote, the justices agreed with Hicks. The stereo equipment was excluded as evidence from the Officer Nelson's suspicion about

the stereo equipment was "separate and apart from the search for the shooter, victims, and weapons that was the lawful objective of entry into the apartment." The officer was required to have "probable cause" that the stereo equipment was stolen. Instead, Officer Nelson only had "reasonable suspicion" of theft, which was insufficient. Although the equipment was moved only a few inches to reveal the serial numbers, Officer Nelson's conduct still constituted an illegal search that violated Hicks's Constitutional rights.

If your reaction to this case is like mine, you think that alert, commendable work by Officer Nelson was trashed by the Supreme Court. Two of the dissenting opinions had similar beliefs. One dissenting justice, clearly disturbed by the court's decision, wrote: "It is fair to ask what Officer Nelson should have done in these circumstances...The Court's new rule could deter conscientious police officers from lawfully obtaining evidence necessary to convict guilty persons."

In response, the court's majority opinion was philosophical: "The Constitution sometimes insulates the criminality of a few in order to protect the privacy of all of us."

Groups Hope For "Booming" Sales

Christmas, Halloween and the Fourth of July share a commonality unique to California in that each holiday is represented by a symbol enjoyed aglow by people patronizing a parking lot.

Since it's too early in the year for Christmas tree lots and pumpkin patches, 'tis must be the season for fireworks stands. And for cash-strapped churches, athletic groups, youth organizations and service clubs, it couldn't come too soon. Unlike buying pumpkins that often become illuminated jack-o-lanterns and evergreens destined to be strewn with festive lights in certain homes, fireworks in the Golden State can only be sold by non-profit organizations. It's an ordinance extending statewide and one that adds an industry-estimated \$40 million to the treasuries of more than 3,000 501(c)s in California.

Locally, the opportunity to make green out of red, white and blue is being seized by groups hopeful for bang-up business from patriotic and/ or pyro-loving customers who snap, crackle and pop in honor of America's 235th birthday. They can do so because Carmichael, Citrus Heights, Fair Oaks, Gold River, Lincoln, Orangevale, Rocklin and Roseville are communities where state-approved fireworks are permissible from June 28 through July 4.

Fair Oaks: If the Bella Vista High School band is successful over 7 selling days, its music and the cocka-doodle-doos and clucks from Fair Oaks' famous free-range fowl will be drowned out by the whistles and crackles from all the fireworks sold at its TNT stand in the campus parking lot, 8301 Madison Ave. With zero funding from the school, proceeds from fireworks are critical, according to fundraiser chairman Curtis Hall.

"Fireworks sales allow the band to repair older instruments and purchase new ones, build props for the marching band's field show, travel to regional competitions and buy uniforms," he said, adding that without this fundraiser, the marching band, the last remaining one in the San Juan Unified School District, "would have to limit its activities and perhaps give up some of its performances or limit its size."

With last year's profits, the band repaired trailers used for competition travel, along with buying two new tubas "which were sorely needed," Hall said.

Citrus Heights: What's the Byers Roseville Gymnastics Club doing with a fireworks stand in Citrus Heights? Two reasons:

"Roseville has a limited number of stands and we opened up a smaller gym in Citrus Heights, where it's easier to get a booth," said Fair Oaks resident Veronica Alderman, who will chair the group's Phantom stand in the Grand Oaks Shopping Center, 7963 Auburn Blvd. For the first time the club will run a second Phantom stand, this one in Sacramento next to Marco Muffler, 5181 Auburn Blvd.

Dual locations are necessary due to the cost of tumbling, vaulting and all the other disciplines undertaken by the 100 gymnasts who represent the club. "Gymnastics is an expensive sport,"

"Gymnastics is an expensive sport," Alderman said. "Every competition has an entry fee, you need to pay for coaches, leotards, equipment – there's so much that goes into it."

Hoping for a sizable slice of the patriotic pie is San Juan High School Boosters, which supports more than 20 groups. Each will get a cut providing it's represented by volunteers working the booth or selling scrip.

"Last year the football team was able to offset camp cost by \$200 per teen and wrestling was able to get new uniforms," said boosters Vice President Rob Howell, who will run the boosters' TNT stand in the school's parking lot at 7551 Greenback Lane. "Drama was able to get stuff they needed and the class of 2011 was able to raise funds for end-of-year activities."

Asked if he's concerned that sales will be affected by the lingering sour economy, Howell said, "Fireworks are traditions and people will always buy to keep it going. It's something the whole family can do that's low cost."

Hoping for the lion's share of fireworks dollars is Lions Club of Citrus Heights, which will use the money to pay for such causes as year-round eye care and assistance to needy families during Thanksgiving and Christmas, and offering scholarships to students of Citrus Heights' high schools.

Despite the lingering economic downturn, the club's treasurer and fireworks chairman believes tradition will help spur sales.

"I believe that fireworks is one of those things that are looked forward to all year, and I feel most people will find a way to get fireworks even if they are struggling financially because it brings joy and enjoyment to the whole family," Phillip Olavarri said.

Throughout the 4th of July and Labor Day weekends, alcohol consumption and possession of open containers will be prohibited on the shore and river within the Parkway between Watt and Hazel Avenues Parking fees will be increased on the holiday weekends at County Parks from \$5 to \$8 per vehicle, \$10 to \$13 for vehicles towing watercraft.





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"Keeping the Faith" Ronnie McBrayer

I've got bad news and good news. The bad news is you probably won't win the lottery. The good news is you may be better off if you don't. Lottery winners, according to some studies, are no happier than when they were broke. Some, in fact, are worse off in the end than in the beginning.

Consider the story of Lakeland, Florida resident Abraham Shakespeare. When Shakespeare was 13, he was arrested for robbing a convenience store. For the next thirty years he was in and out of trouble, in and out of jail, job-to-job, and living hand-to-mouth.

Poverty, assault charges, drug abuse, restraining orders, back child support; fresh out of jail in November 2006, he was lucky to have an \$8-anhour job unloading boxes from a tractor-trailer. With two of the last five bucks in his wallet he bought two quick pick lottery tickets. Three days later he was a millionaire thirty times over.

Three years later, with most of his money already gone – spent frivolously and on all the some old habits as before – his body was found buried in a concrete slab, the alleged victim of an apparent con-artist.

You would think, that even for

the most troubled soul, winning \$30 million would set things right. We often think that getting what we want will solve all our problems, but not so. Sometimes what we want only increases our troubles. No, this isn't true in every case, but it is true enough times to give us pause.

Maybe we should view wealth, not as something evil, but certainly as something dangerous; because wealth can fool us into thinking that it is the source of our happiness, that it can give us satisfaction. Yes, having financial resources can make life easier, but it is a poor substitute for personal peace.

Like Abraham Shakespeare, if you have inner turmoil before holding the giant cardboard check for the cameras, you are sure to have that same turmoil afterwards, but with compounding interest.

There is a Hebrew proverb that says, "A meal of bread and water eaten in contentment is better than a banquet spiced with quarrels." The point is clear: Greater satisfaction is found in simplicity, especially if the banquets and winning lottery tickets bring nothing but trouble, ulcers, and conflict.

So when is enough, enough? Where is that line that marks simple contentment from complex materialism? I don't know. There is no formula for such a calculation. We must listen to our lives and become aware that all we can acquire and all we can earn may be appreciated blessings, or these things may rob us of the contentment of the simple life. For example, a person making minimum wage that chases after and eventually buys the newest and most expensive SUV on the market will be happy – until about the second payment – then her happiness quotient will decrease exponentially. A father who takes a high-paying job, but a job that takes him from home 300 days a year, may provide plenty of luxuries for his children, but may not have a very happy life.

Buying a house at the beach might be the greatest financial investment a couple could make, and such a venture might bring great happiness. But it might also become a terrible albatross around the couple's neck, cursing them with debt, conflict, and unnecessary economic burden.

No, I don't know when enough is enough for each and every situation, but I do know that when we lose the satisfaction that comes from simplicity, it is time to lose those other things. When the stuff we once sought to own begins to own us, it is time to let these go. It is time to simplify.

The great G. K. Chesterton said, "There are two ways to get enough. One is to continue to accumulate more and more. The other is to desire less." Let us be careful, that in the effort to grab more, we do not lose our grip on the simple and contented life we can have now.

I have a real spiritual word for that belief, "baloney". That's just not true. You're living proof of that and so am I. It's a fact of life that people will hurt you.

I think of a man named Job. He faced a lot of evil. One day he lost it all. He lost all of his possessions, his children were murdered, his wife turned against him and all of his friends accused him of doing wrong, yet he was innocent. If anybody had a reason to be devastated by evil, it was

JOD. But JOD, Instead of becoming devastated, instead of getting stuck in his pain, made a full recovery. The Bible says that God made the last part of Job's life greater than the first. Regardless of the pain you experience in life, regardless of how other people may have hurt you or may hurt you in the future, you can make a full recovery if you do what Job did.

Reveal your hurt. Don't try to hide it. "They didn't hurt me... I'm not angry..." Share your hurt. Don't minimize the offense. Job said, "Therefore I will not keep silent; I will speak out in the anguish of my spirit, I will complain in the bitterness of my soul." Job 7:11 (NIV) Job spills his guts to God. "God, I don't like it! Life's not fair! I'm ticked off! I'm angry!" He tells God how angry he is. This is the beginning of the healing. If you want to get over your hurts emotional hurts, you must reveal your feelings to God and also to a friend.

Release your offender. You're never going to have peace until you do. Job's friends hurt him badly. They were disloyal. They criticized him, they misunderstood him. Nothing hurts more than being misunderstood or falsely accused. It wasn't Job's fault at all. He was innocent. He had every right to be resentful. It's interesting to note that Job's healing began after he released his offenders. That's true, but one day God is going to settle the score. Forgive the person and let God even things up in the end.


There are times when each of us experiences a sense of loneliness. We generally relate loneliness to be without the companionship of others. I have heard that there are some people who even struggle with lone-

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

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



As sure as Betsy Ross could sew, a trip to a fireworks stand can be a puzzling pyrotechnic experience.

To help you get the most bang for your buck this Fourth of July, we present our 2011 fireworks buyers guide. Every new state-approved fountain was put to the test along with selected returning items. TNT and Phantom, which enjoy a duopoly in Northern California, have more than a dozen new items between the two.
