New Federal Law Benefits Non-resident Military Spouses

Qualified Spouses May Be Entitled to State Tax Refund for 2009

Sacramento - (BUSINESS WIRE) The Franchise Tax Board (FTB) today (Dec. 8, 2009) announced that a new federal law exempts some civilian spouses' income from state income tax.

The newly-signed Military Spouses Residency Relief Act exempts personal service income and wages earned by taxpayers who reside with their military spouses. The couple must have relocated to California under military orders for the income to be exempt from California taxes. They must also share the same "domicile" or true home outside California where they intend to return and locate permanently.

The act does not exempt nonmilitary income of military personnel. States cannot any military pay of nonresident military personnel.

The new law applies to all of calendar year 2009, allowing refunds of any taxes withheld this year on the now exempt income. The refund form, FTB Form 540NR, California Nonresident or Part-Year Resident Income Tax Return, will be available from FTB in January 2010.

For future tax purposes, the **Employment** Development Department advises qualified taxpayers to submit new forms payroll withholding prevent California tax

withholding on future income. FTB is updating its Publication 1032, Tax Information for Military

Personnel, with guidelines on the new federal law. The publication will be available in mid-December online at ftb.ca.gov, at military bases, and at all FTB Field Offices.

For military families who want help completing their tax forms, the Military Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (Military VITA) offers free tax help at many bases starting February 1. For information on VITA locations, visit FTB's website after February 1 or contact a Judge Advocate General's (JAG) office.

California Signs Deal with Broker to Sell \$2 Billion in Real Estate

CB Richard Ellis Group, Inc. to Market 8.7 Million Square Feet of Prime Office Space

Sacramento - (BUSINESS WIRE) (Dec. 11, 2009) The California Department of General Services (DGS) has awarded a contract to CB Richard Ellis Group, Inc. (NYSE:CBG) to sell 17 state office buildings to investors. In June, Governor Schwarzenegger directed the sale of the properties located in Los Angeles, Oakland Sacramento, San Francisco and Santa Rosa in order to raise more than \$660 million to offset cuts in the state budget.

"The Governor was clear that we must re-think how we manage the state's real estate. The awarding of this contract is a significant step forward in DGS' effort to carry out that mission," said Acting DGS Director Ron Diedrich. "We look forward to working with the talented and experienced team that CB Richard Ellis has assembled to seek out the investors worldwide that want to purchase these prime office buildings and allow the state to tap the needed equity."

CBRE has already begun marketing the properties to investors in the global capital markets. The 11 properties range from the 97,000 square foot Judge Joseph A. Rattigan Building in Santa Rosa, to the LEED Gold Certified Capital Area East End Complex in Sacramento and the 24-story, 863,000 square foot Elihu M. Harris

Building in downtown Oakland.

"We are very pleased to be selected as the State of California's advisor on this exciting disposition assignment," said Kevin Shannon, CBRE Vice Chairman. "This will be the largest office portfolio available for sale in the nation currently. The offering is ideally suited for what the majority of investment capital is seeking right now which is stable leased product. We will conduct an expansive global marketing campaign appropriate for this generational acquisition opportunity, and we expect to attract tremendous domestic and international interest."

DGS plans to sell the office buildings during the first half of 2010 and then enter into longterm leases with the new owners. The state will continue to maintain nearly 100 percent occupancy in all the buildings; this provides a unique opportunity for investors in a market that normally offers similar properties with an average vacancy rate of up to 20 to 30 percent.

CBRE earned the contract for the brokerage services with the state after competing alongside five other companies. Each company was scored in multiple categories including: history of sales over \$20 million over the past seven years; sales of at least \$7.5 million over the last 10 years; experience of the proposed sales team; an interview

with each bidder's sales team;


and the bidder's proposal for its percentage of sales compensation. Commissions for commercial real estate sales range from approximately one-half of one percent for high valued properties to as high as 4% for smaller valued properties. Through a very competitive process, all of the proposals received by the State were under one percent and the winning proposal was substantially less than one-half of one percent, representing a good value for the State.

The Department of General Services (www.dgs.ca.gov) serves as the business manager for the State of California, with more than 4,000 employees and a budget in excess of \$1 billion. 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The phrase "doomsday cult" entered our collective vocabulary after John Lofland published 1966 study, "Doomsday Cult: A Study of Conversion, Proselytization, and Maintenance of Faith." Lofland wrote about the Unification Church. His subject could almost as easily have been the Church of Warmism.

Its college of cardinals gathered in Copenhagen amid professions of an imminent global apocalypse that allow no room for doubt or deviation. "The clock has ticked down to zero," declared U.N. climate chief Yvo de Boer. Yes, the end is nigh, just as surely as when the Millerites gathered on Oct. 22, 1844, to witness the Second Coming, only to comfort themselves at the end of the night, "Well, maybe next year."

Copenhagen's opening session featured a video of children pleading, "Please help save the world." Had these precocious kids carefully reviewed the costs and benefits of a large-scale global carbon-rationing scheme? Of course not. They were props in the climate confab's effort to propagandize itself, in the kind of closed loop always welcomed by true believers.

This doctrinaire impulse jumps off the page of the recently disclosed e-mails from the Climatic Research Unit at the University of East Anglia, an outfit at the heart of climate science. MIT's Michael Schrage says the e-mails reveal "malice,mischiefandMachiavellian maneuverings." George Monbiot, a leading journalistic promoter of climate alarmism, wrote after the release, "I was too trusting of some of those who provided the evidence I championed."

At Copenhagen, they'll have none of it. "It's clearly an illegal attempt to create confusion," U.N. IPCC Chairman Rajendra Pachauri said of the hack -- or

leak -- of the e-mails, capturing the deeply illiberal temper of the defenders of the warmist faith. The same people who tend to put "Ouestion Authority" bumper stickers on their cars have made "skeptics" and "doubters" dirty words in the climate debate.


It's the vastness of the project "to transform the way we run the planet," in the words of The Associated Press, that makes the slightest questioning impermissible. Emissions in a developed country like the U.S., we're told, have to be 80 percent beneath 1990 levels by 2050 to avoid catastrophe. On a per capita basis, Steve Hayward of the American Enterprise Institute writes, emissions were probably never that low, "even back in colonial days when the only fuel we burned was wood. The only nations in the world today that emit at this low level are all poor developing nations, such as Belize, Mauritius, Jordan, Haiti and Somalia."

Polling shows the American public less alarmed about global warming despite the perpetual hectoring about impending doom. Not to worry. The Obama administration is preparing to take a pass on the inconvenient business of convincing elected representatives to implement costly measures to suppress carbon emissions and instead do it through fiat at the Environmental Protection Agency.

When the world is about to end, the rigors of democratic persuasion are as unwelcome as skepticism and caution. "I have such doubts!" Sister Aloysius declares at the end of the aptly named play "Doubt." For defenders of the climate faith, that's strictly forbidden.

What It Looks Like When Congress Does Its Job

If you've ever wondered what members of Congress do to earn their keep, the current health-care debate on Capitol Hill should give you a good idea. This complex legislation, placed on the congressional agenda by President Obama but shaped by the intense give-and-take of the legislative process, is a perfect window into our democracy.

Its sheer ambition — to remake one of the key drivers of our economy and to make health care both more affordable and more accessible to Americans means that it will leave hardly a person, business or organization untouched. The stakes are huge, from corporations' profitability, to how doctors practice, to the heart of families' pocketbooks. That is why so many ordinary Americans and so many lobbying groups — from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce to small businesses to health insurers to AARP and, of course, the American Medical Association — are

intent on having their say in what is taking place on Capitol Hill.

It's impossible to avoid the debate. Advertisements crowd the airwaves. Demonstrators gather on the Hill or at lawmakers' interviews, speeches, editorials and op-eds appears every day. Over coffee at their local diner. around the dinner table, at VFW and Lions Club meetings, Americans argue over the socalled "public option," mandatory health insurance, and other particulars. You can only imagine how intense things have gotten on Capitol Hill, the epicenter of it all.

In this super-heated atmosphere, 535 members of Congress have to sort out what to do. The answers might seem obvious when you're shooting the breeze with friends, but it's not so simple when you're in Congress. For no matter what vou might believe is the right approach, many of your colleagues will think differently, and some number of them will be dead set

against what you want to do. Moreover, as a member you're listening daily to lobbyists and constituents — many of whom, such as doctors and insurance agents and small-business owners — have a direct interest in what Congress produces. Sorting through their various points of view, assessing the conflicting fiscal analyses, trying to cut through the heated rhetoric, gauging the substantive merits of different proposals as well as their political impact: it all amounts to a full-time job in an institution that doesn't allow the luxury of devoting full time to any single issue.

As a measure of this importance town-hall meetings. A torrent of moves toward completion, power inevitably shifts toward a few members of the leadership and a relative handful of members and senators who - often by virtue of sitting on the fence until the end — press issues about which they care deeply.

> That is why abortion and immigration, concerns that were not especially noticeable early in the process, have become important at the end: the anticipated closeness of the vote on the floor — remember, a shift of just three votes would have doomed the House version — magnifies the importance of legislators who feel so passionately about a particular point of view that they're willing to scuttle the entire bill unless they're accommodated.

The process is designed to sort through all these conflicts. In each chamber, the legislation falls under the jurisdiction of three or four committees, each of which needs a majority to pass the bill on to the next stage. Eventually the measure reaches the floor, which means yet more debate and amendments, and another opportunity to kill the measure outright. Once both houses have passed their bills, a conference committee will come up with a final version,

which once again will have to go to a floor vote in each house. At every stage, proponents of health-care reform will have to find enough support to move the legislation on — and ultimately get the support of the President.


There are plenty of Americans who think this whole process is too complex, that President Obama should simply have submitted his own proposal and then let Congress react. Yet I would argue that the congressional debate has been healthy for this country. Every side has had a chance to be heard, all of us have learned a great deal about the strengths and weaknesses of our health-care system, every conceivable interest has been represented at the table, and members of Congress have had to look at the health-care system from multiple points of view.

I guarantee you that whatever the final measure looks like, no one will be entirely satisfied. Yet legislating is not the art of the perfect, it's the art of the possible. We have a Congress precisely in order to pursue this "dialogue of democracy," and to produce, in the end, an ambitious piece of legislation with the legitimacy to be accepted among a broad cross-section of Americans.

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California Breast Cancer Survivors and Advocates Call on State to Nix Screening Cuts

Komen Affiliates Urge State Leaders to Spare Neediest Women from Budget Cuts

Sacramento - (BUSINESS WIRE) Breast cancer survivors and advocates from all seven California Affiliates of Susan G. Komen for the Cure® signaled their alarm today (Dec 11th) at the recently announced cuts to California's Every Woman Counts program, which would effectively shut the doors to breast cancer screening services for 1.2 million lowincome and uninsured women for the first six months of 2010.

Citing budgetary concerns, the state also announced that once they begin screening new patients this summer, only women age 50 and above will be eligible – significantly reducing the number of women in the state that will have access to affordable breast cancer screenings. "We fully understand the tough

economic situation our elected leaders face and the difficult choices they must make. Yet balancing the budget on the backs of our state's neediest women is a mistake. We should not deny women who have very few options and limited resources access to screening and treatment services that may save their life," said Donna R. Sanderson, Ed. D, Founder, California Collaborative of Susan G. Komen for the Cure. Every Woman Counts (EWC)

is a joint program by the state Department of Public Health and the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program. Komen Affiliates noted that while 1.2 million women are eligible for EWC, the program only screens about 270,000 women a year, 77,000 of whom are under age 50.

The news about changes

to EWC come on the heels of new mammography screening recommendations recently unveiled by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, which generated significant controversy and confusion for women. Some have interpreted the guidelines as a recommendation against mammography for women age 40 to 49. In fact, the task force actually intended to encourage women to talk with their providers and assess their personal risk factors in deciding whether to have a mammogram. However it was intended, the potential for impediments to screening based on the guidelines exist.

"Women ages 40 to 49 must have access to mammography if they need it," said Jennifer Luray, president of the Susan G. Komen for the Cure Advocacy Alliance. "As states across the country struggle to balance their budgets, we will be watching to ensure the USPSTF recommendations are not used as a justification for slashing these critical services to women in need."

Early detection of breast cancer is a key to surviving the disease. When breast cancer is detected early, the 5-year relative survival rate is 98

percent, but declines to 84 percent for regional disease and 23 percent when cancer has metastasized or spread to other parts of the body. Unfortunately, women with low incomes who are uninsured or underinsured — like those eligible for Every Woman Counts — are more likely to skip potentially lifesaving cancer screenings, which leads to later diagnoses, larger tumors and lower survival rates.

In California alone, 21,700 women will have been diagnosed with breast cancer this year and more than 4,000 will have lost their battle with the disease.

"We know the need will continue

regardless of the ability of the state to meet it. Komen Affiliates will continue to do our part to meet the needs of underserved women; yet, these resources are extremely limited and not available in all areas. We cannot do this alone," said Sanderson. "Komen for the Cure and its Affiliates have long been concerned that one-third of women in the U.S. today — some 23 million - are already not receiving regular recommended screenings due to lack of access, education or awareness. 

Is the toy right for your child's age? Look for the nded label" sticker on toys to be sure a toy is appropriate for your child.

Is the toy too small? Toys should be bigger than a child's mouth to avoid choking. Try the "toilet paper roll" if a toy fits inside the roll, it's too small and unsafe

Is the toy in good condition? Older toys may be worn or falling apart. Check for buttons, batteries, ribbons and

Is the toy's string long? Strings longer than 12 inches can wrap around a child's neck. Remove strings and straps such as toy guitar straps, necklaces or ribbons before giving them to young children.

Does the toy have magnets? Magnets may fall out of toys and can be swallowed. Keep toys with magnets away from kids 5 and under.

Most of us believe that when we purchase a product from the market it will be fresh and have its full content nutrients...NOT SO!!!

Milk: When milk is purchased in clear plastic containers and allowed to sit under the light for four hours, you will have a 44% loss of vitamin A in low-fat and non-fatmilks. The reduction in fat content, which protects vitamin A is for the most part, absent.

Supermarkets in some areas of the country are now packaging

milk in yellow containers to shield a percentage of the light, other markets have installed "light shields" or are storing the milk under the counters to protect them and save the nutrients.

Juices: Juices have a similar problem to milk in that light might affect their nutrients, especially vitamin C. Juice containers should not be clear.

Fruits and Vegetables: Some veggies will last for weeks in the market, under the lights. exposed to the air, and washed and re-washed continually. This reduces the nutrient content and recent studies have shown that frozen fruits and veggies have more nutrients than fresh in many instances.

The latest fad is buying veggies in bags already to open and eat. Studies were conducted, and to everyone's surprise, the nutrient content was excellent, even to the point of surpassing fresh in most cases.

Pasta: Pasta packages in thin see-through plastic bags is affected by light and reduces nutrient content. Buy packages from the bottom of the stack in boxes without windows.

Oils: When oil is processed, the breakdown process is started and rancidity occurs at a slow pace, however, it can increase at



a faster pace if the oil is left under the light in a clear container. It is best to purchase oil in dark containers or tins and store in the refrigerator if the oil will not be used within 30 days. Coldpressed extra-virgin oil does not need refrigeration for 60 days.

Temperatures: Cooking Cooking temperatures are important to kill bacteria, but remember, the more you cook the meat the easier it is to digest and utilize the nutrients. Might upset some folks since most prefer meats medium or mediumrare. Medium-well is cooked sufficiently, however, but rare meat may give you digestive upsets as well as making the body work harder to break it down.

The Democratic-controlled House of Representatives led by Nancy Pelosi pushed Health Care Reform (HR 3962) through Saturday night, November 7th, 2009. "ObamaCare" is opposed by most senior organizations, Republicans and some Democrats. The Health Care Reform Bill proposes to "shave" 400 billion from Medicare over the next ten years. representatives overlooked the fact that Medicare is money our seniors have paid into the system. Another concern is that the new administration has had limited success so far in the measures they have already implemented. So that taking on a huge health care program is questionable. House Republicans stated that Washington will ultimately decide the doctors one can see, the treatment one can have and decide (the moral issue), if one is worth the cost. Republicans tout that the private sector programs are much more efficient than government ones and they feel that is why the US currently has one of the best health care systems in the world.

Most feel the need for healthcare

reform, but question the quality of health care this bill would provide.


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Remembering Christmases Past

When I see the opulence and waste at Christmas in this generation I am appalled. It is such a contrast to the Christmases I remember from the 1920's and 1930's growing up in Auburn. Many children today are so inundated with expensive gifts they can't begin to appreciate them. We cherished and cared for each toy, because we knew it had to last a long time. I still had some of mine when I was grown and married, with children of my own.

Christmas was an exciting and magical time for my two sisters and me. I was about nine years old when I discovered that Santa Claus wasn't real. Most of the children of that era believed in him much longer than the children do today. The belief kept us on our very best behavior at all times, because we didn't want to find ashes in our holiday stockings on Christmas morning. We were so young and naive.

Our home didn't have a fireplace, so our long cotton knit stockings were tacked to the wall behind the little potbellied stove in the living room. It always puzzled my sisters and me how Santa could come down the chimney, and then squeeze through the narrow stove pipe that came out of the wall, made a sharp ninety degree bend, and continued down into the stove.

Our parents tried to explain how Santa had the ability to change his shape and size to fit into the different stoves or fireplaces on his rounds. Yes, we believed them. After all, Christmas was a magical time.

We always trekked to the foothills to find the perfect tree for Daddy to cut down. Then we decorated it with a few old ornaments handed down through the ages. We also cut out strips of colored paper and glued them into rings, forming a ribboned chain that looped around the tree. We also cut out snowflakes from white paper to hang on the tree. We thought our festive tree was quite elegant.

One Christmas stands out in my mind when I was about seven years old. That Christmas

Eve my mother bundled my two sisters and me up in warm clothes for the walk down to the center of town. A large Christmas tree with all its trimmings had been erected at the intersection of Lincoln Way and High Street. There were no concrete center dividers or traffic lights back then.



Santa Claus and his helpers were there to hand out gifts to the children. We all stood in line eagerly awaiting our turn. There was no shoving or pushing. We knew Santa expected us to be on our best behavior. With a big smile and a hearty "Ho, ho, ho," he gave each child a candy cane and a gift. I was so excited I couldn't wait to get home to unwrap my gift, so I tore the wrapping off right there. In the box was a "Mary Jane" doll about ten inches high, with little roller skates on her shoes. I cherished that doll for years, and even made clothes for her.

Through the generosity of the local merchants, churches, and fraternal organizations, no child went without a toy that Christmas. For some, it was the only gift they recieved.

Another Christmas remains etched in my memory. I had always wanted a scooter, but knew it was only a dream. Occasionally a friend let me borrow hers. What a thrill it was to pretend it was mine. wheel was a bit wobbly, but my father, who was quite handy, soon had it running as good as new.

I rode that scooter up and down the hills of Auburn and all over town. My old scooter served me well for several years, until 1935, when my father found work in San Francisco, and we had to move. We didn't have a car, so we traveled by train, carrying the bare essentials in our suitcases. Our other necessities, such as bedding, dishes, and some furniture were shipped separately. There was no room for a scooter.

In recent years, the poignant memory of yet another Christmas, when I was about ten years old came to mind. A poor, but hard working widower with four sons lived in the run-down old apartment house next door to us. The three older boys were able to find an occasional odd job, such as mowing lawns or running errands to help supplement the family's meager earnings.

Just before Christmas an even poorer family with two small children moved into the basement apartment of the building where the four boys lived. As I was sitting talking to the three youngest boys one afternoon shortly after Christmas, they remarked about how poor the new family was, and how they tried to help in some way to make it a better Christmas for the small children.

"I bought them some candy", said one of the boys. "I bought them a picture book", said the oldest. The youngest boy, who was only seven of eight years old, said he gave them something, too.

"What could you give them?" the older boys asked. "You don't have any money".

"I know", said the little one. "But, I did give them something. I gave them a prayer".

Not until I was much older, and remembered that occasion, did I realize I had wittnessed the true meaning of Christmas.

ARMORED (Rated PG-13)

A heist movie always involves a criminal enterprise organized around the essential principle that money or valuables will be separated from their rightful owners. NEW TWIST ON HEIST THRILLER SETS STAGE FOR "ARMORED"

Ty seeks to play by the rules but is increasingly vulnerable to outside pressures as he copes with mounting financial problems.

At the end of his probationary period, Ty celebrates with a bunch of co-workers. Over a couple of beers, they trade anecdotes, reveal loopholes in the security system, and discuss failed robberies and successful heists. Veteran security officer Mike Cochrane (Matt Dillon) sets the stage for the perfect crime by unveiling his personal theory about an unsolved armored truck robbery. He believes the robbery could only have happened if the guards themselves staged it. Later, while driving Ty home, Mike reveals that this incident has inspired him to plan the perfect crime.

Aware that a pickup of fresh bank notes from the Federal Reserve is imminent, Mike proposes a foolproof scheme to slip away from the route, stash the money in an abandoned warehouse and call in a holdup. No one gets hurt, no bad guys are in sight, and no clues are left behind. Mike assures Ty it will be a nonviolent crime that causes no physical harm. All that is necessary is to get the cooperation of the other guards, including impulsive, hotheaded Baines (Laurence Fishburne); intense Quinn (Jean Reno); high-strung Dobbs (Skeet Ulrich); and born-again excon Palmer (Amaury Nolasco). After initial resistance to

committing any illegal acts, Ty decides to go along with Mike and the other Eagle Shield guards to hijack the big money transfer. The tipping point for Ty came after one too many notices from the bank and a visit from a social worker who threatens to place Jimmy in foster care. Nevertheless, prior to joining the plot, Ty insists that he must have assurances that no one will be harmed. By now, you will have figured out that volatile Mike's promises have about as much credibility as a politician's campaign pledges. The tension comes from guessing exactly when Ty comes face to face with reality.

On the big day, the heist goes down as smoothly as vintage Scotch. After checking in with their dispatcher, the men make the brief detour to their hiding place, a massive warehouse in a forgotten part of town. But then, not surprisingly, just as things seem to be going all too well, an unexpected interruption changes the game plan. As things fail to proceed according to the grand scheme, Ty regains the conscience he never should have lost in the first place. Of course, the situation grows increasingly volatile and explosive, as tempers flare when it appears that lives and money are at serious risk.

Remarkably, "Armored" thrives far more on its characterdriven plot than violent thrills. The crew is a colorful bunch, particularly when they start bickering about how to salvage the crumbling operation. The film also confines the majority of its action to the tight interior space of the abandoned warehouse. This serves to heighten the tension brewing within the crew, but also undermines the essential premise that a heist caper needs the conventional thrills of explosive action.

Rutherford Institute Issues Legal Guidelines for Celebrating Christmas in Public, at School or Work

The Rutherford Institute has issued its "Twelve Rules of Christmas" guidelines, which are available at www. Rutherford rutherford.org. Institute attorneys are preparing to deal with the annual onslaught of calls to their legal hotline regarding the censorship of Christmas celebrations. In years past, the Institute has been besieged by calls from parents and teachers alike complaining about schools changing their Christmas concerts to "winter holiday programs" and renaming Christmas "winter festival" or cancelling holiday celebrations altogether to avoid offending those who do not celebrate the various holidays.

staff@rutherford.org. "Political correctness should nevertrumptheFirstAmendment," said John W. Whitehead, president of The Rutherford Institute. "Schools, government officials and businesses have an opportunity to take the high road and not be relegated to playing the Grinch this Christmas. It's time for some common sense this Christmas."

Whitehead pointed to an incident that happened a few years ago in a Chicago suburb as a perfect example of Christmas celebrations being sabotaged by political correctness. Schools in Oak Hill, Ill., had decided to cancel traditional holiday celebrations, such as Christmas, under pressure from a parent. Halloween was to be renamed "fall festival," and Christmas "winter festival." However, after angry parents voiced their objections at an emergency meeting, school board officials reportedly agreed to allow traditional holiday celebrations. In years past, nativity displays, Christmas carols, Christmas trees, wreaths, candy canes and even the colors red and green have been banned as part of the effort to avoid any reference to Christmas, Christ or God. Thanksgiving has also come under fire in recent years. Several years ago, for example, Institute attorneys were contacted by a concerned parent

who remarked that whereas in previous years teachers in their school district had been told not to mention Christmas, Easter or anything relating to God, they could no longer even mention the word "Thanksgiving" because "the pilgrims offended the Indians" and "Thanksgiving was never intended to be thanks to God!" Another parent with children in the public schools was upset and concerned when she received a letter from school officials directing classroom mothers not to use plates and napkins with Thanksgiving printed on them at their children's fall parties. As she recounted, "It seems like they are worried about offending just one person and are worried about law suits. In the past, this school has gone from 'winter' parties that banned red and green cupcakes and napkins, to banning any winter party in fear that it may be mistaken for Christmas."

AN EXTRA CHANCE

The bidding: North East 1 ♥ 4 ♥ Pass Pass Opening lead queen of diamonds.

Declarer's primary responsibility at the start of play is to ascertain and then proceed with the line of play that offers the best chance to make the contract. This plan should include a provision to take advantage of any lie of the cards that may add to his chances without hurting them, even if that possibility is not particularly

Consider this case where South missed an opportunity to improve significantly on his chances of making four hearts and, as a result, went

down one. East won the opening diamond lead with the ace and returned a diamond to South's king.

Declarer promptly led the queen of

hearts and let it ride, percentagewise the correct play missing the K-x-x of the suit. East won with the king and returned a third diamond, ruffed by South. Declarer drew the missing trump and cashed his club winners before

leading the ace and another spade. When East turned up with both the king and jack, the contract was kaput. South expressed his dismay at having lost to the singleton king of hearts and later finding the K-J of spades badly placed. Nevertheless, he should have made his game. The crit-

ical play came early, when he erred by taking the heart finesse. Before doing so, he should have taken the necessary steps to protect against the possibility that East might have the singleton king.

After taking the second trick, declarer should play the K-A of clubs and then ruff dummy's remaining diamond. The advantage of this sequence of plays can be seen when South next tries the heart finesse, losing to the singleton king.

After winning the trick, East must return a club or a diamond, yielding a ruff-and-discard, or else return a spade. Either way, declarer can't lose more than one spade trick, and the contract is assured.
