of innocent consumers are made vulneraable by thieves who have easy access to personal information from government documents. State Senator Dave Cox (R-Fair Oaks) introduced a measure to protect the public against these potential violations. Cox's bill, SB 216, would require government agencies to place only the last four digits of a person's social security number on court documents.

"As with any crime, victims can feel violated, but victims of identity theft have the added trauma of cleaning up the mess left by criminals," said Senate Senator Dave Cox (R-Fair "This legislation would

Sacramento-Each year thousands make it more difficult for criminals to obtain personal information from government documents. This added layer of protection will help shield Californians from identity thieves."

> SB 216 would change current law to require the courts to only place the last four digits of the social security number on judgment forms in family and other civil proceedings.

> Current law prohibits private companies from publicly posting social security numbers but exempts publicly recorded documents. This potentially allows anyone to walk into any county recorder's office, look at a public document and make copies of the social security number.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in the nation. In 2005, they received over 255,000 identity theft complaints which accounts for 37 percent of all fraud complaints for that year. This was up from 246,000 in 2004 and 215,000 in 2003. This cost individuals and businesses as much as \$52.6 billion in 2004.

Federal Fugitive Arrested On "Chop Shop" Charges

Sacramento, CA: The Sacramento Violent Crimes Task Force, comprised of Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) agents and Sacramento County Sheriff's Department robbery detectives, and the Rocklin Police Department, arrested federal fugitive ROBERT JAMES GUEST, age 34, at approximately 6 a.m. at his residence located at 5045 San Francisco Street, Rocklin, California. The arrest took place without incident.

On January 3, 2007, GUEST, along with nine additional subjects, was charged in a federal indictment by the United States District Court, Missoula, Montana, on conspiracy charges for his role in an extensive Montana auto theft and "chop shop" ring involving M&T Auto Body, located at 3745 Farm to Market Road, Kalispell, Montana. The theft ring allegedly stole vehicles, sold stolen vehicle parts, and tampered with vehicle identification numbers.

If convicted of this charge, GUEST faces possible penalties of 5 years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and 3 years supervised release.



May 1945. A young man hovered, shivering and terrified in a field somewhere near No-Man's land in a far corner of Belgium. He didn't know whether to run or hide. He was frozen with fright and with frostbite caused by the emergency 8,000 foot parachute decent. The buckle on his helmet would brand his cheek with a permanent reminder of his bone-freezing jump. His bare feet were cut and caked in mud. His shoes, along with his B17 bomber, disappeared when they were hit by enemy fire. Helplessly, he watched as his giant bird spiraled to earth in a powerful explosion. The entire crew escaped into the night sky but he couldn't see any of them.

As he floated silently into the dark abyss he had no idea whether he was in enemy territory or if the rest of his crew had survived. Occasionally, he noticed a flash of light in the distance. But these lights were no source of comfort for this lone soldier. The early morning light brought Belgian farmers into the field. As they escorted him to a barn, a jeep happened by. He was paralyzed with a gut-wrenching fear until the soldier pointed to a small American flag on the jeep. In that moment, this flag represented his life and his freedom. The jeep brought him to a staging area where he was miraculously reunited with four of his five crewmen.

Korea and Viet Nam. Lucky for me, he later retired to live across the street from us and he flew the American flag every day. He was proud of his country and I came to be proud of him. When I was small I would sit on his lawn under the giant willow tree and watch him toil in his rose garden. Н е taught me to trim his roses with precision. Later, he would help me fix my bike and more recently, my car. When I was five, my guinea pig "Mrs. Magee" died.

Without fanfare, Dalton took Mrs. Magee and buried her under that big willow tree. As I stood silently over the grave I asked Dalton if I could say a prayer. He nodded. I thought hard about the most important prayer I knew but I couldn't think of one. So, I just started reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Dalton

stood there dead serious and

saluted. Dalton was always a great comfort to me. As he reassured me on 9/11, he put his hand gently on my shoulder and said quietly and simply, "Don't worry son. We'll get to the bottom of this." As I watched television over the next few days, firemen at ground zero raised a huge American flag. I was proud. But I was also very nervous. I felt someone was trying to take something from me. I now understand someone was trying to take something very sacred- my freedom.

But for all its' challenges, This brave and proud freedom continues to be on man, Dalton Hudson, went the march. Today, there are on to serve our country in eighty-nine free nations in

into millions of people liberated from tyranny in just the last quarter century. Thomas Jefferson said, "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." As our freedoms are challenged daily here and abroad we must be steadfast in this quest for freedom until it needs us no more. This quest will take many forms, including education, support and protection of our global neighbors as well as here at home.

Dalton taught me to work hard, love my family and country and most of all value my freedom. Dalton died last New Year's Eve.

We must model our liberty every day and every hour just as Dalton did. We must respect the rights given to us in the First and Fourth Amendments. Sometimes it's very difficult. Chief Justice William Young of the U.S. District Court of Massachusetts, at the sentencing of the terrorist known as the "Shoe Bomber", told the defendant; "We are not afraid. We are Americans. We have been through the fire before. We do not negotiate with terrorists. We hunt them down one by one and bring them to justice". It seems terrorists hate the one thing that to us is most preciousour freedom- our freedom to live as we choose, to come and go as we choose, to believe or not to believe as

we individually choose. In America, the very winds carry freedom. It is because we prize individual freedom so much that this in our courtroom. Why? burden, pay any price to the local Post Veterans of Foreign Wars. preserve our freedoms. Pointing to the wall, the judge then said, "See that flag? That's the flag of the United States of America. That flag will fly there long after this is all forgotten."

VA Hospitals and EVet

Veterans of a certain age can remember when getting treated at a VA hospital was a nightmare of mediocre to bad care.

Fast-forward to now:

A recent Harvard study concluded that the quality of medical care in veterans' hospitals is world-class. The centralized computer record-keeping is a large part of the reason. A doctor can call up the patient's records, check test results (including Xrays), make notes and order prescriptions, all at the patient's bedside. Within

medication order, bags

seconds the computer in the pharmacy gets the

via tube into the nurse's prescriptions, station. A bar-code system matches the patient with the drug, sounding an alarm if there's an incompatibility with other medications or an allergy.

If you have a servicerelated medical condition and you haven't been to the VA, go. The VA's resources are stretched, and it's scrambling to keep all veterans covered, so you might wait months to get an appointment. Still -- go. To handle more patients quickly, the VA has 1,274 facilities, including medical clinics and mental-health centers.

If you're a VA patient with a computer, you're in luck. The VA has set up an elaborate (and expensive) computer program (EVet) that will allow you to up the drug and sends it see your records, refill

medications and medical conditions, and track your medical appointments. Not all services are available yet, but there's enough there now that it's worth taking a look, especially the library. (They're rolling out features as they're perfected.)

For security reasons, to get full access to your personal information you'll have to show up at a VA Medical Center and present ID and answer a few questions to be authenticated.

ACLJ Fights for Freedom of Speech for Churches

From the ACLJ Website January 19, 2007

(Washington, DC) – The American Center for Law and Justice (ACLJ), which specializes in constitutional law, said today it is pleased the Senate approved an amendment last night removing language that would have targeted churches and non-profit organizations by classifying them as "grassroots lobbying firms" subject to governmental regulation. The Senate vote comes as the ACLJ launched a nationwide campaign to oppose the legislation that would drastically affect the free speech of churches and non-profit organizations. The ACLJ says the focus now turns to the House where the dangerous legislation is expected to be introduced and supported by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

The ACLJ launched a nationwide petition campaign this week – via email, radio, television, and through its website - to urge Senate and House leadership to reject this legislation. In just four days, more than 54,000 people have signed on to the petition opposing the legislation.

"We are thankful for the victory in the senate but will now turn up the pressure on the House," said Sekulow. "We urge members to do the right thing - and reject this legislation that is not only unacceptable but unconstitutional as well."

Led by Chief Counsel Jay Sekulow, the American Center for Law and Justice specializes in constitutional law and focuses on religious liberty litigation. The ACLJ is based in Washington, D.C.





That loophole allowed what is, for all intents and purposes, an adult business to locate 600 feet from Twin Lakes Elementary School in Orangevale. This situation was unacceptable because of the nature of the business and its proximity to the elementary school, as well as a school bus stop and two daycare centers. I looked for ways to better address the places that such businesses can locate.

The County currently has an ordinance regulating the location of adult businesses. avoid this ordinance by market-based

Sacramento County and other items that are not specifically adult in nature. These businesses are clearly targeted at adult customers, and are absolutely adult in

Adult Businesses in

But the law is more complicated than that. I wanted to craft an ordinance that would address this situation and prevent others like it in the future, while not defining mainstream department stores as adult businesses.

The County Counsel's office researched the issue and found that, while we could not regulate materials protected by the First Amendment (adult videos, magazines, etc.), and could not define this business as adult under the zoning code, we could regulate the sale of specific adult devices (novelties or "toys") that are not protected under the Constitution.

I felt that it would be beneficial to the community However, some businesses as a whole if there were incentives

selling lingerie, oils, lotions, that would compel these businesses to consider alternative locations that are, frankly, more appropriate.

> Some have argued that this is really not the County's business. I disagree with this logic, and feel that parents have the right to decide when the time is right to discuss "the birds and the bees" with their own child. The conversation should not be forced prematurely because Mom has to explain that strange store on the way to school.

> The ordinance was approved by the Board, without dissent, on February 13 prohibits the sale of specified devices within 1000 feet of any public or private school, church, designated school bus stop, daycare center, library, or park. It does not ban the items countywide, but restricts them to areas away from child-oriented facilities. The ordinance becomes effective 30 days following adoption, or March 15, 2007.

For me, meeting a familiar face, especially one that I've lost touch with, brings a warmth and completeness to my life. A sort of "full circle" feeling, if you will. As a person of faith, I try to live my life submitting it to the will of the Lord, never really knowing what that will might be, but trusting that He knows where I need to be. It becomes even more amazing then, when these connections occur and I can look back with 20/20 hindsight and see just where He has chosen to take me.

Sometimes connections don't come from relationships, though. Sometimes the connection comes through our talent or our knowledge. Recently a parent at my children's school who works in the telecommunications industry was kind enough to bring the California Public Utilities Commission's Teleconnect Fund to my attention. Through this fund, our school (and others) has the potential to cut our phone expenses in half. This gentleman was kind enough to share his knowledge of this benefit with us. Of course, the less the school spends on phone expenses the more can be spent on students, and that

benefits us all. Myself, I happen to have a gift of artistic talent. I have used this gift both to make a living and to benefit a number of non-profit organizations. I've created advertisements, newsletters and holiday giving program materials – all at no cost to the organizations. But why?

Why would I give and expect

nothing in return? For me, the paradigm is completely different. How can I have a talent that fills a need and not share it? If I have something to add to a person or an organization that can take them to the next level of achievement and I withhold that, how could I live with myself?

In the end it turns out that what we do really does come full circle. In fact, what we do to selflessly share our talents and knowledge comes back to us in so many ways that are often undetected. Our connections to the people around us that give us that "small world" feeling will continue to surprise us. In the end, the very best we could ever hope to experience is that warm and satisfying feeling of being connected to each other.

Contract Bridge



HOIST BY HIS OWN PETARD

It is said that a little knowledge is a dangerous thing, and this deal, where South reached six clubs on the sequence shown, would certainly seem to provide support for that argument. Most players with the West hand would choose the king of diamonds as their opening lead. It simply wouldn't occur to them to make any other lead, and in the end, they would wind up defeating the slam.

In the actual case, however, West, a well-known player, led a heart. He

realized from the bidding that South almost certainly had no diamonds, and thought it might be essential to establish a heart trick for the defense before declarer could establish dummy's spades and dispose of his heart

But, alas, West's opening heart lead proved fatal. Declarer won with dummy's queen, ruffed a diamond, played the K-Q of trumps and then led the four of spades.
This presented West with an insolu-

ble problem. If he went up with the ace, South would later discard his J-8-5 of hearts on dummy's spades. And if West followed low instead, declarer would win the spade with dummy's queen and return a low spade to the jack and ace, forcing West to concede the slam whatever he did next.

If West had led a diamond originally the so-called automatic lead declarer would have gone down regardless of how he proceeded. There would have been no way for him to avoid losing a spade and a heart, assuming best defense.

Was West simply unlucky because he was smart enough to figure out that South was void of diamonds, or should he have led a diamond anyway? It's hard to say, but of one thing we're sure: A little knowledge can be a dangerous thing!

Jerry Manuel Leads Effort to Start William Jessup Baseball Program



ROCKLIN, Calif., - Jerry Manuel will once again make Shea Stadium his home base this summer. But the New York Mets bench coach will also be thinking about another brand of baseball much closer to his roots in Sacramento.

William Jessup University announced this week that Manuel will be leading the effort to establish a baseball program on its Rocklin campus. The Warriors are hoping to field an National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) team by the spring of 2009.

Manuel, 53, grew up in Rancho Cordova and played Major League Baseball for five teams during the 1970s and early '80s. He was named the American League Manager of the Year in 2000 and last year helped the Mets win the National League East

"We feel extremely fortunate to have a tremendous baseball person like Jerry Manuel heading up the effort to start our program," university President Bryce Jessup said. "Jerry is extremely knowledgeable in all facets of baseball and his deep faith makes him the ideal person to be interacting with our young Christian athletes."

Manuel, who leaves for spring training Thursday, will be involved in recruiting, establishing the program's guidelines, and fund-raising efforts for a baseball stadium on the campus grounds.

"This is an exciting opportunity for me; I will be able to set the entire program in motion," said Manuel, who managed the White Sox from 1998 to 2003. "I've always wanted to be involved in collegiate athletics and this is such a good fit for me. William Jessup is a Christian university and the environment will liberate me to do my own

After his playing career ended. Manuel became a scout with the White Sox in 1985. He was third base coach for the Montreal Expos for six years and served as bench coach when Jim Leyland guided the Florida Marlins to a World Series victory in 1997.

Manuel became the White Sox manager in 1998, taking over a struggling team. Two years later he guided Chicago

to a division title with a 95-67 record,a20-gameimprovement over the previous season. He had a 500-471 record during his six years as White Sox manager.

An El Dorado Hills resident, Manuel is looking to relocate somewhere in Placer County close to the University. He hasn't ruled out becoming William Jessup's first baseball

"I would still like to manage in the Major Leagues, but if the right opportunity doesn't come along I would love to be the first head coach at William Jessup University," Manuel said. "It would be a tremendous opportunity to impact young men at what I consider an impressionable age."

Anthony Manuel, Jerry's son, will also have a role in starting the William Jessup University program. The youngerManuel,24,iscurrently a minor league infielder in the Mets organization.




