GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Student Speaker Contest for the California Lions Clubs has happened annually throughout California for eighty-six years inviting all high school students from 9th to 12th grades to participate.

The goals of the Student Speaker Contest are to sharpen student skills in critical thinking, personal confidence, and student social connections. This is a local contest first, with a cash prize of \$100 awarded to the winner by the Gridley Lions. Three community members are asked to be judges and listen to the content of the thoughts of the speaker and how well supported those thoughts are within their speech and score them accordingly.

Governors Topics are presented by the Lion membership throughout the state and out of the thousands of suggestions, one topic of interest to the American people is selected. This year the topic is "Social Media: Connects Us or Isolates Us?"

For the first time the Gridley Lions invited students from Biggs High School to join those from Gridley to participate in the scholarship opportunity. The City of Biggs no longer has a Lions Club so Gridley Lions are opening up this Student Speaker Contest to those students.

This year five student speakers expressed their research-supported ideas on the topic. There were three students from Gridley High School: Finn Parker Grade 12, Annie Woods, Grade 10, Ellie Woods Grade 11. One student from Home Study; John

Paul Bower Grade 10. And one student from Biggs High School: Alexis Wroten Grade 10. Their ideas were expressed in a variety of thoughtful ways.

Participating students were thankful for the support of teachers from both schools. Mr. Vince Sormano from Biggs High and Ms. Amber McIntire and Ms Elizabeth Ayon of Gridley High were all involved in encouraging students to participate. They in turn were supported by their principals, Ms Rikki Buresch of Gridley and Mr. Doug Kaelin of Biggs.

Congratulations to the Winner, Annie Woods of Gridley High School. She received a check for \$100 and will move up to the Zone competition on March 15 here in

You Can Join a Trip Down Memory Lane

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Down Memory Lane Writers Group has been active for more years than matriarch, Doris Pettersen, can remember.

Now in her nineties, Pettersen somewhat leads the group as their longest standing member, one of the only original members left alive or in the area.

She tells the Herald that the group meets together to go over their writings – some are poems, short stories, or even larger pieces in the works. Pettersen herself has written hundreds of stories about her travels abroad, life experiences both here in Gridley and through history. For instance, she recounts her memories of being at the command center when the space shuttle Columbia was reentering orbit. Pettersen shared that the incoming astronauts sounded so close while communicating to NASA's command center and then suddenly, all went silent. Someone said quietly, "We lost the Columbia" – the words still resonate with her to this day.

Regardless of what is written and shared at the group, Pettersen says that writing down your memories and stories really preserves the emotions and feelings of the events, not just the facts. She shares that in her experience, "People are more willing to write if they have an audience to share their work with".

The group is open to everyone despite their level of education or experience, even artists. The ideas, stories, and artwork shared create an environment of inspiration. Many of the members have been published, including Georgie Anne Waddell who has created many books of poems, children stories and is working on a biography of local legend the "Midnight Cowboy." Others include short story author Greg Hughbanks and writer Jean Varda from Chico.

The group experienced an influx of members after the campfire. Pettersen says she believes it to be due to the fact that people needed a way to express

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - On Thursday, February 23rd, at approximately 12:41 pm, a collision shut down the intersection of Hwy 99 and Magnolia/E. Gridley

Road in Gridley. Gridley Police Department, Engines 74 and Ladder Truck 74 along with EMT's were among those that responded to the scene of what looked to be a very bad accident.

A silver-colored Honda Odyssey van had been upturned after it appeared to have been struck on the driver's side by a dark gray colored Ford F-150 pickup. The van sat resting on its roof in the center

of the intersection for quite some time as first responders attended to individuals involved in the crash.

The accident diverted north bound lanes onto E. Gridley Rd, while GPD

Butte County Supervisor Bill Connelly has taken up the Chairmanship of The California Association of Local Agency Formation Commissions or LAFCO, which stands for Local Agency Formation Commission, a regulatory agency established in each county of California to oversee changes in local government organization and boundaries. The primary function of LAFCO is to regulate the formation, expansion, and dissolution of local governmental agencies, including cities, special districts, and annexations of unincorporated areas into cities. In California, each county has its own LAFCO, composed of a board of commissioners appointed by its supervisors. The board of commissioners is responsible for reviewing and approving proposals for the formation or dissolution of local agencies and for boundary changes and service extensions. LAFCO plays a critical role in ensuring that local government agencies are organized efficiently and effectively while also considering the community's needs and the impact on the environment and neighborhoods. By regulating the formation and expansion of local agencies, LAFCO helps to prevent the duplication of services, reduce fragmentation, and promote collaboration among local governments. The role of LAFCO has evolved to include

a variety of functions related to local government organization and finance. For example, LAFCOs in California are responsible for reviewing and approving the formation of special districts, which are local government agencies that provide specific services such as water, sewer, or fire protection. LAFCOs also review and approve annexations, which involve the transfer of land from one jurisdiction to another. In addition to its regulatory functions, LAFCO is a forum for local government agencies to discuss and resolve issues (conflicts) related to service delivery, resource management, and intergovernmental cooperation. LAFCO also provides guidance and technical assistance to local agencies on budgeting, financial planning, and governance. Municipal Service Review (MSR) is a process conducted by LAFCOs in California to evaluate the need for services provided by local government agencies. The purpose of an MSR is to assess the effectiveness, efficiency, and appropriateness of existing services and to identify opportunities for consolidation, reorganization, or dissolution of local government agencies. An MSR typically involves a comprehensive analysis of a local government agency's services, including a review of the agency's governance structure, finances, and service delivery methods. The study may also assess the agency's service area, population and demographic trends, and infrastructure needs. The results of an MSR can have significant implications for local government agencies, as they may lead to changes in service delivery, organizational structure, and boundary changes. For

example, an MSR may identify opportunities for consolidating or merging services provided by multiple agencies or for transferring the provision of certain services from one agency to another. The purpose of an MSR is to ensure that local government agencies are providing services most efficiently and effectively as possible while also considering the needs and interests of the community. By identifying opportunities for consolidation, reorganization, or dissolution of local government agencies, an MSR can help to reduce costs, eliminate duplication of services, and promote collaboration among local government agencies. Ultimately, an MSR aims to improve the quality of services provided to the community while also promoting the long-term sustainability of local government agencies. So Oroville Supervisor Bill Connelly should have much to discuss at these LAFCO meetings. Back here in Butte County, there will be many questions to answer as well. Should a municipal services review for the Town of Paradise, which now has a population of roughly 7000, be completed to assess the Town's service footprint? Should the local irrigation districts that provide municipal water service be reevaluated? Are there swimming pool Service Districts that are too small? Are there Cemetery Districts with no board members and no money to operate? Should cities in the County do a better job of bringing in islands where people get no services? Bill will be in a position to bring home a lot of answers that are important to the future of communities.

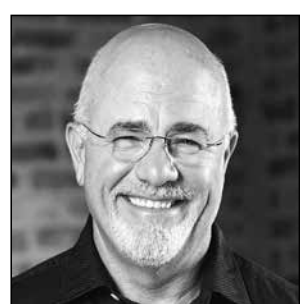

Are You Willing To Do What It Takes?

Dear Dave,

I'm an anesthesiologist, and I make between \$260,000 and \$270,000 a year. My wife is a stay-at-home mom who takes care of our preschool-age kids. We have about \$50,000 in a retirement fund, \$50,000 in consumer debt, \$220,000 in student loan debt, and we owe \$280,000 on our house, which is worth around \$500,000. We're thinking about using our retirement fund to pay off credit cards and such, then selling the house and using the money to pay off the student loans. After that, we'd live in an apartment for a while, save up 20% or more for a down payment on the next home, and do things right financially moving forward. What do you think about this game plan?

Dear Jake,

Wow, I really appreciate your motivation, man. You're willing to do whatever it takes, and that's pretty cool. Not many people have the determination to do the kinds of things you're talking about.

I almost never tell people to sell their homes. If you actually can't afford it, that's one thing—and in that case, we'd sell the house. If it's the only way to avoid bankruptcy, we'd get rid of it in a heartbeat. But in your case, things are a little different. You're in a pretty deep hole, but your income as an anesthesiologist gives you a really big shovel you can use to carve out some steps, get up out of that hole, and fill it in so you never fall in again.

Now, this is going to mean some real lifestyle changes for a few years. I'm talking about beans and rice, and no vacations. There's no more living like a rich doctor, because you're not a rich doctor—you're a broke doctor. We're going to temporarily stop adding to your

retirement fund, not cash it out, and we're going to start living on a written, monthly budget where every single dollar is given a name and a purpose.

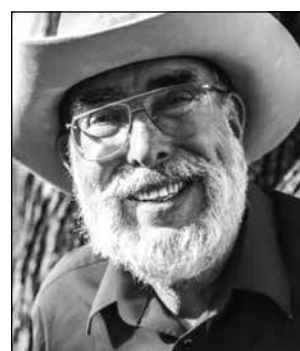
Cleaning up \$270,000 of debt sounds scary. But with a \$260,000 income and the other changes we talked about, you could put \$90,000 a year toward all this and have it completely cleaned up in just three years. That's what I'd do if I woke up in your shoes. It will set you free for the rest of your lives to invest and save.

Get on it, doc. You can do this!

SMOKE DETECTORS

CAL FIRE/ Gridley Fire Department would like to remind everyone of the importance of smoke detectors in the home. With Day Light Saving Time Starting on the 8th of March, it's time to change the batteries or replace that old detector. Smoke alarms save lives! Smoke spreads fast inside a home, smoke detectors will alert you early and give you time to get out. Having a working smoke detector cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire in half. Almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke detectors or no working smoke detectors. Working smoke detectors increase the chance of surviving a home fire by 50 percent.

Here's What Sparky Wants You To Know!

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area or hallway and on every level of your home. They should be mounted on the ceiling 4 inches from the wall away from windows and vents.
- Test your smoke alarms every month.
- Smoke detectors have a life span of 10 years, make sure to inspect your detectors to make sure they are not expired.
- Never paint over a detector and keep unit clean.
- CAL FIRE/ Gridley Fire Department recommends changing the batteries in your smoke detectors twice a year when you change your clocks.

When a smoke detector sounds, get outside and stay outside. Have a planned area the whole family knows to meet outside. Check next week's Sparky's Corner for Exit Drills In The Home (EDITH) to help you plan and practice evacuating your home in the event of an emergency.

LaMalfa and Gallagher Keep Sex Predator Out of Paradise

Office of Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On February 15, 2023, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) and Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (Yuba City) called on the Santa Cruz County Superior Court to deny the placement of Sexually Violent Predator Michael Cheek in the Town of Paradise. Cheek has multiple rape and kidnapping convictions and previously escaped from prison.

In their letter to the court, Gallagher and LaMalfa noted that state law, authored by Gallagher in 2017, requires offenders such as Cheek to be placed either in their last county of residence or a county where they have family, residential or employment ties. Michael Cheek, a resident of Santa Cruz County, has never lived in Butte County and has no ties to the area.

"Our home is not his hunting ground, and Cheek's record proves he is a risk to the entire Town of Paradise and Butte County. This

violent sexual predator has no familial, residential, or employment connections in Butte County. There is no logical reason to place Cheek over 400 miles away from his legal place of residence, other than using rural California as a dumping ground for light-on-crime urban policies. This is still an area reeling from a destructive wildfire and struggling to rebuild. I urge the Court to keep Cheek in his area of last legal residence under stringent security - or better yet, in prison," said Congressman LaMalfa.

"The Town of Paradise has been through enough. I'm not going to stand by while an out-of-county judge tries to turn it into a dumping ground for dangerous sex offenders," said Gallagher. *"Michael Cheek lived in Santa Cruz County, committed his crimes in Santa Cruz County, and should live in Santa Cruz County once he's released."*

Cheek was first convicted of kidnapping and sexually assaulting a 21-year-old woman in Santa Cruz in 1980. One year later he escaped, kidnapped a 15-year-old girl in Lake County, and raped her

at gunpoint. In 1997, when Cheek was scheduled to be released, he was declared a Sexually Violent Predator and confined to a state hospital.

The Department of State Hospitals and its contractor, Liberty Healthcare Corp., have been trying to house Cheek in Butte County since 2020, despite objections from local law enforcement, concerned residents and elected officials. The home being proposed for Cheek, located at 1550 Gate Lane in Paradise, is less than one and a half miles from an elementary school and two churches, and 150 feet from a community bike path frequented by children and families.

A town hall meeting on the issue will be held tomorrow night at the Paradise Alliance Church on Clark Road at 6:30 p.m.

LaMalfa and Gallagher urge community members to voice their opposition to Cheek's placement online or via mail to the Paradise Police Department at 5595 Black Olive Drive, Paradise, CA 95969. ★

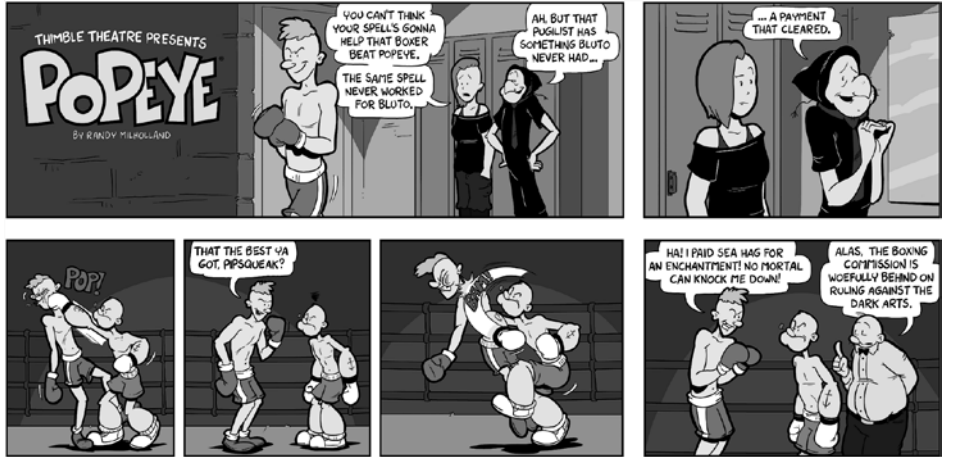

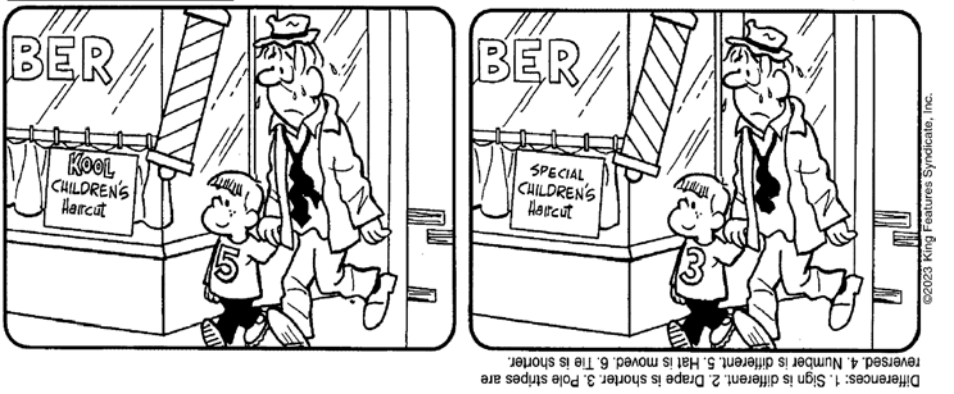

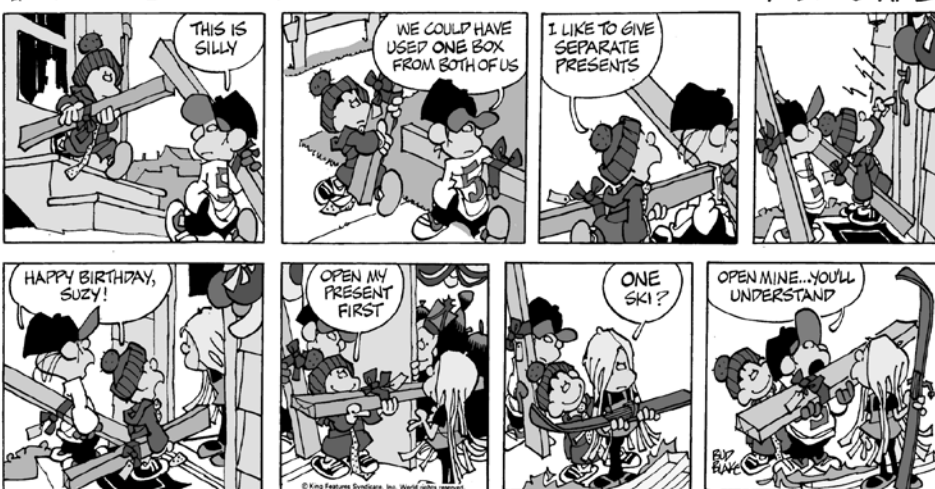

Lions Go Back-to-Back in Win Over Bulldogs

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Arostegui Field at Live Oak High School was covered in mud, had chilly weather and loud fans from Sutter and Butte counties in the Lions 2-0 win over the Gridley Bulldogs in the CIF North Section Division II Final last Saturday.

This was the first time Live Oak has hosted a section final in program history and the cities of Live Oak and Gridley showed up for both squads with enormous support.

Barajas has been involved with the Bulldogs soccer program since it began in 1989 as a player before he eventually took over as a coach a few years later.

The intensity of the championship game couldn't have had a better setting between the cross-town rivals as when you step into the stadium as both teams were hyped in warm ups.

The opening whistle blew and the game was off to a fast start. With the high intensity of the championship and both teams being rivals, Barajas and Lions head coach Luis Cibrian both expected there to be some yellow cards throughout the game.

There were a total of nine yellow cards that resulted in two total red cards in the second half and each team played 10 on 10 for the last 20 minutes of the game.

Both teams had multiple chances to score and in the 20th minute of the game, Live Oak junior center back Jesus Rivera put the Lions ahead 1-0 with a header off a free kick.

"When we got the first goal,

we wanted it more and weren't going to let them (Gridley) change anything about it," Rivera said.

Control of the ball was even between both teams for the entire game, but the Bulldogs had three great opportunities at scoring in the 34th through 36th minute, but weren't able to cash in any goals. The first half ended with the 1-0 Live Oak lead.

The second half began and then it seemed every couple of minutes the referees had to stop play to assess yellow cards. In the 50th minute a second yellow card was issued to a Live Oak player which resulted in him being out for the remainder of the match and the next match for the Lions. The red card resulted in Live Oak playing with 10 players for the rest of the game, but Gridley couldn't take advantage of the extra player as the Bulldogs had one of their players receive a double yellow card in the 59th minute and Gridley played with 10 players for the rest of the game.

"We expected cards to be used today," Cibrian exclaimed to the Herald. He added that for the match-up in the Nor-Cal regional tournament it's going to be the next man up stepping up in place of the Lions player that has to miss the next game.

Live Oak iced the game as they scored in the final minute of the game off of a break-away down the left side of the field to win the game 2-0 and celebrate as back-to-back NS Division II champions.

Lions senior midfielder Joseph Hang mentioned to the Herald that every time Gridley and Live Oak play one another in each sport, it brings the best out of each school.

Both teams qualified for the CIF Nor-Cal tournament as they both made the semifinals in the NS Division II. The Lions traveled to Marin Academy as the eighth seed in Division IV.

The Bulldogs hosted Venture Academy of Stockton in the Division V as the third seed.

Gridley senior defenseman Hector Palafox expressed to the Herald that they may have not won the section title, but they get another opportunity to play with their friends on the field. ★
