Sutter County Sheriff's Department News Release

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The Sutter County Sheriff's Department has taken a suspect into custody after an eleven-hour standoff, which prompted the lockdown of two schools. At approximately 3 AM on March 17, 2023, at the Maple Park apartment complex in Live Oak, a man approached another man in his car, shot at him and missed. The victim called 911 and was able to identify the suspect, who deputies learned had gone inside one of the apartments and was alone. It was confirmed that the suspect, who was



School were notified, and both schools decided they would do a lockdown – as a precaution – after students arrived that morning.

Special Enforcement Detail (SED) and Hostage Negotiation Team (HNT) arrived and tried several non-lethal options, including negotiations, flash bangs, tear gas and having a family member try to speak to the suspect. Those efforts were unsuccessful, and eventually they went into the apartment and arrested Padilla without anyone being injured. Padilla was charged with numerous charges, including attempted homicide and felon in possession of Continued on page 3

Failed Silicon Valley Bank, the Newsoms, and Connected Friends

The Silicon Valley Bank failure and shutdown is because of "idiot bank management under an incompetent board," according to Shark Tank star Kevin O'Leary.

"O'Leary joined Fox News hosts Bill Hemmer and Dana Perino on Tuesday to discuss the Silicon Valley Bank failure and the announcement that deposits would be protected," Mediaite reported. "President Joe Biden announced this week that people's 'deposits are safe."

"O'Leary blasted the plan, arguing it will simply provide a safety net for mismanagement. Victims Identified in **Double Homicide in Rio Oso**

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On March 17, 2023, at approximately 4:07 pm, the Sutter County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to the area of Kempton Road near Brewer Road, in Rio Oso, regarding two bodies lying near a vehicle with gunshot wounds. Deputies and Detectives responded and located a female adult body inside a blue Ford Explorer and a male adult body lying outside approximately 50 yards near the Ford Explorer. Both the male and female were pronounced deceased on scene, and both had gunshot wounds.

The female and male were later

identified as 40-year-old Elk Grove resident Vicky Veovilayphone and 40-year-old Yuba County Resident Derrick James Engelman. Due to this case being under active investigation, no further information can be released at this time. Congressman LaMalfa Announces \$1.3 Million In Federal Funding for Dixie Fire Rebuilding

WASHINGTON, D.C (MPG) - On March 17, 2023, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale) announced that he obtained a \$1,353,176.61 Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant for Plumas-Sierra Rural Electric Cooperative to cover costs incurred by the 2021 Dixie Fire. This funding covers 90% of the total project's cost in backpay from restoring

Court of Appeal Sides with Farmers in Precedential Water Quality Cases

California Farm Bureau News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In a legal win for California farmers, a state appeals court rejected all arguments brought by environmental groups and sided with the California State Water Resources Control Board, the California Farm Bureau and others related to the Central Valley's Irrigated Lands Regulatory Program.

In its March 17 decision, the Third District Court of Appeal addressed three cases brought by environmental plaintiffs against the California State Water Resources Control Board in which the groups challenged the adoption of general waste discharge requirements for growers within the Eastern San Joaquin Watershed.

"The Court of Appeal's landmark decision supports reasonableness and balancing in protecting water quality, while

also maintaining our food supply and the economic viability of agriculture," said California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson. "The court's decision is precedential and applies to irrigated lands regulatory programs throughout the state."

Johansson added, "The decision upholds farmer anonymity for nitrogen application data, the use of township-level nitrate data and surface water representative monitoring."

Farm Bureau was represented in the case by Senior Counsel Kari Fisher and joined by fellow agricultural intervenors/ respondents represented by Tess Dunham of Kahn, Soares & Conway, and Jennifer Spaletta of Spaletta Law.

The California Farm Bureau works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 29,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of 5.3 million Farm Bureau members.

State Route 70 Closure Update

PLUMAS COUNTY, CA (MPG) - State Route 70 remains closed from the Greenville Wye to Jarbo Gap due to multiple slides. The most active slide is at Post Mile (PM) 15.2, which has left the roadway completely blocked.

Other slide locations include PM 0.0 (Plumas County), PM 12.38 (Plumas County), PM 15.74 (Plumas County), PM 22.7 (Plumas County), PM 25.5 (Plumas County), and PM 46.6 (Butte County).

Due to the recent stretch of inclement weather, Geotech has revisited these sites to

re-evaluate the stability of the slides following weeks of rain and snow. Additionally, our crews and contractor are waiting for a stretch of consistent dry weather in order to make progress on these slides due to the extreme danger involved with moving material when rain and snow are in the forecast.

There remains no estimated time on when State Route 70 will be reopened. We would like to thank the traveling public and local residents for their continued patience during this closure. Further updates will be provided as new information becomes available. *

Gallagher Announces Legislation to Protect Parents' Rights

Assembly Republican Caucus **News Release**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On March 14, 2023, Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (Yuba City) announced legislation to protect parents' rights by requiring schools to inform them if their child begins identifying as a different gender while at school. Assembly Bill 1314, which Gallagher joint authored with Asm. Bill Essayli (R-Corona), would require schools to notify parents within three days of their child using facilities or participating in activities such as sports that do not align with the sex listed on their birth certificate. "Parents should never be left out of their child's education and development and this outrageous policy of allowing secret gender transitions at school must end," said Gallagher.

AB 1314 comes in the wake of a lawsuit against Chico Unified School District that alleges school officials secretly transitioned an elementary school student. A recent study by University of Texas researchers found that LGBTQ+ young people with supportive parents were significantly less likely to experience depression.

Here we are the week of the Spring Equinox. It's still raining which is a good thing. People are freaked about flooding. I don't want it to flood but the rain is needed to fill the aquafer. This winter reminds me of winters in the late 70's and the 80's. I remember slipping and

as I gathered the goats for milking. I remember slipping and sliding in the car on the red mud road to get out of our place. I remember the ice and snow that turned into muck. Muck was a regular part of life at that time. There was the drought in and around 1976 when our spring went dry for the first time since the 1800's. That spring was a landmark on old maps. Then in the late 90's I remember the Pineapple Express that blew through and our pond flooded over the dam. We had to do a major siphon pipe to save the dam. A hillside across the highway slid and blocked the road, Rocks tumbled onto the highway around the lake. I think that is when Marysville flooded and the mall was underwater. It was a pain to deal with but I was much younger and it seemed like simply another thing to solve.

I've been told by old timers in Gridley that my side of the tracks has not flooded in a long time. I'm hoping this is so. In the mean time I am enjoying the rain and hoping the earth benefits. The fruit trees do not need to be watered. I'm hoping the bees have zoomed out between downpours and pollinated the fruit trees. Not many blossoms on the Aprium, we'll see. Peaches are a commercial crop around here so I have great hope for the peach trees. Happy Spring.

Gavin Newsom failed to mention that President Biden's announcement also protected his own businesses in Silicon Valley Bank."CADE, Odette, and PlumpJack, three wineries owned by Newsom, are listed as clients of SVB on the bank's website. Newsom also maintained personal accounts at SVB for years, according to a longtime former employee of Newsom's who handled his finances, and who requested anonymity to avoid professional reprisal."

Newsom also neglected to say that he and the First Partner have even deeper ties with Silicon Valley Bank - Silicon Valley Bank President of Capital John China gave \$100,000 "Behested" gift to the Newsom's nonprofit, California Partners Project, Open the Books discovered, the Globe reported.


Notably, a 2019 IRS Form 990 for Newsom's California Partner Project reports only \$50k in total gross receipts. This seems inaccurate given the new information of Newsom's behested payments. The Globe did not find any record of 2020-2021 IRS Form 990 filings on the IRS website, but did find IRS Form 990 filings with the California Office of the Attorney General Charities registry.



There's nothing wrong with giving money in a situation like this, as long as you're not enabling bad behavior by doing so. But a loan between friends or family is something I never recommend.

If they choose to hold a grudge there's really not a lot you can do, especially if you took longer than agreed upon to pay them back. It just takes more time with some people-and in some cases even parents-for those kinds of things to heal. You have to remember, in their minds there's an element of responsibility and trust involved here. But considering it's your mom and dad we're talking about, I'd say they'll lighten up and become a little easier to be

around with time.

Until that happens, though, maybe you could look for chances to mention your new approach to finances during conversations with them. Even something as simple as an off-hand remark about how much you were able to put into savings from your recent paychecks may encourage them to see things in a different light. Letting them know you're actively working to change your ways and gain control of your finances could mean a lot to them. Give it a try!


Professional Rodeo Is Coming to Stonyford

Chico Man Charged with Murder of Man Found in Shopping Cart

Butte County District Attorney Press Release

CHICO, CA (MPG) - A Chico man, already charged last week with the attempted strangulation murder of a female acquaintance, will be in Butte County Superior Court to face new murder charges involving the body found in a shopping cart just outside a Chico food supermarket on Sunday afternoon, March 12, 2023.

Timothy Wayne Wiechert, 48, was arraigned on March 20, 2023, for the murder of Daniel Niles, 61, after having been arraigned last week for the attempted murder of a 28-year-old woman acquaintance on Sunday morning, March 12, 2023.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the cases are related in that the suspect, victim, and woman were homeless together in the area of the FoodMaxx market on the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Parkway in Chico. It was Wiechert's arrest for his attempted murder of the woman that led to the murder charge for Niles, Ramsey said.

Late Sunday morning, March 12, 2023, at approximately 11:27 a.m. Chico Police were called to an address on Chandese Lane in Chico, where a resident reported she had come home to a strange truck parked in her driveway and a male, later identified as Wiechert, had a young woman down on the ground and was strangling her. The resident also reported a neighbor had come over and was attempting to get the man off the young woman by hitting him with a baseball bat, but with little success.

Ramsey said when officers arrived, they saw Wiechert still strangling the 28-yearold Chico woman, who was turning blue, and the good Samaritan neighbor still trying to stop Wiechert with a bat. The officers were able to physically restrain Wiechert and save the 28-year-old woman, who was taken to Enloe Hospital by ambulance. Wiechert was also taken to Enloe for treatment of a broken shoulder blade before being booked into Butte County Jail.

After Wiechert was arrested, officers noted that the truck in the driveway was registered to Daniel Niles. A quick search of the camper shell in the back of the truck revealed a good deal of blood and the truck was taken into custody for further forensic processing. A dog, a Labradormix named "Tank" belonging to Niles, was also found in the truck, and taken to the city pound. A search for Niles was commenced.

Later that same afternoon across

tarp, saw a body, and called 911. Chico firefighters arrived first and removed the body, later identified as Daniel Niles, from the cart's basket. It became immediately clear that Niles had been deceased for some time, having suffered several traumatic blunt-force head wounds.

Chico police detectives arrived and were told by store employees the shopping cart and its wrapped contents had been there for a few days. Detectives asked for the store's video surveillance to see who or how the cart and its contents had been brought to the store. The store's corporate offices refused to share the videos with officers.

However, a search warrant for the store videos was obtained by the detectives and the District Attorney's Office through a local judge. A later review of the videos revealed a man matching Wiechert's description, including clothing and tattoos, rolling the cart with the white-tarped large object onboard into the FoodMaxx store at approximately 6:19 a.m. on Friday, March 10. Nile's dog "Tank" could be also seen in the video following the cart.

The cart was rolled to an area near the store's bathrooms and abandoned by the man, who took the dog outside. A store employee was seen on video later that morning rolling the cart and its same contents out the door of the store where it was placed a few feet from the front entrance and remained undisturbed for the next two days – only being moved once to clear the way for a wheelchair bound customer to come into the store.

On Wednesday, March 15, the Butte County District Attorney filed an attempted murder charge against Wiechert based on the strangulation of the 28-yearold woman. In addition, the Butte County Probation Department filed a violation of probation petition against Wiechert, for cutting off his ankle monitor last month and absconding from a previously granted probation for a felony arson conviction.

At a further arraignment on the attempted murder charge on Thursday, March 16, Wiechert's public defender told the presiding judge there was a doubt about Wiechert's competency to stand trial. The judge then suspended criminal proceedings pending a psychologist's report on Wiechert's ability to stand trial, which is due on April 20, 2023.

Ramsey said Wiechert is scheduled to be arraigned on the new murder charge at 3:00 p.m. on March 20, 2023, but he expected the proceedings will most likely be suspended to determine Wiechert's competency to stand trial.

Ramsev noted the 28-year-old woman
