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Church of the Barn Burns

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On January 28th, a structure known as the 'Church of the Barn' located on the 2700 block of Hwy 70, caught fire.

According to the CALFIRE/Butte County Incident Report, the call regarding the structure fire came in at approximately 5:09 pm. Crews responded within 10 minutes of dispatch. Heavy fire and smoke were reported coming from the roof of the church, which doubles as

a residence. Crews attacked the flames from both the exterior and interior of

the building, searching for residents as they attempted to contain the blaze. According to the incident report, about 50 percent of the building was engulfed and the fire was knocked down within 40 minutes. No injuries or fatalities were reported.

Responding support came in the form of 6 engine/truck companies, 3 volunteer companies, 4 overhead personnel, a breathing support unit, overall totaling 21 personnel. The cause of the fire is under investigation. ★

Caltrans, OTS Unveil New Student - Named Work Zone Safety Mascot

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) unveiled on February 6, 2023, Safety Sam as their new safety cone mascot. The name was selected in a statewide student contest and is part of the campaign to expand public safety awareness to protect highway workers throughout the state.

Huntington Christian School (Huntington Beach) student Miller Ruiz's winning name was selected from nearly 2,000 entries submitted by K-12 students across the state. In recognition of his winning suggestion, Miller will receive a laptop, a \$500 gift card, a \$500 gift card for their teacher's classroom, T-shirts, and a visit from Safety Sam. The mascot will educate Californians on the importance of moving over a lane or slowing down when they see his orange friends and highway workers.

"Caltrans makes safety priority number one, and safety cones are critical to let drivers know when and where highway workers are on the road," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares. "Including young people in our safety awareness campaigns helps us raise the awareness of both the next generation and current drivers, and we're excited to make Safety Sam the face of the important work being done to keep our highway workers and the traveling public safe."

"Educating the public on safe driving behaviors is key to helping save lives on our roadways," said OTS Director Barbara Rooney. "Safety Sam engages the public in a fun and interactive way while serving as an important reminder to be attentive when approaching work zones."

In 2020, nearly 7,000 work-zone crashes occurred on California roadways, resulting in more than 3,000 injuries and nearly 100 fatalities. Nationally, drivers and passengers account for 85% of people killed in work zones.

California's "Move Over" law requires all drivers to move over a lane if safe to do so, or if unable to do so safely, slow down when they see amber flashing lights on Caltrans vehicles, law

Thanking Lifesavers

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Two Gridley Police Officers were honored at the last Gridley City Council meeting, held February 6th, 2023.

Officers Clint Massey and Sergeant Adam Reusser each received proclamations from the City of Gridley recognizing them for their actions that resulted in saving the life of a local business owner.

According to Gridley Police Chief Rodney Harr, "On December 23, 2022, at approximately 9:30 p.m., Officer Clint Massey and Sergeant Adam Reusser responded to the King Wah Restaurant regarding an individual who was unconscious and unresponsive. Upon their arrival, it was determined that the longtime owner and Gridley resident had collapsed in the kitchen area." He continues, "Sergeant Reusser and Officer Massey did an initial assessment determined that there was no pulse and no respirations. Officer Massey

relocated the individual and began administering CPR, while Sergeant Reusser retrieved additional equipment. Sergeant Reusser returned with additional equipment and assessed that Officer Massey had successfully regained the individuals' respirations and pulse. Enloe Paramedics and Cal Fire personnel arrived on scene and transported the individual to the hospital where he was treated and

later discharged home." Chief Harr presented both Sergeant Reusser and Officer Massey with Life Saving Awards, and the two were praised by the council.

The Gridley Police Department would like to recognize Officer Massey and Sergeant Reusser for their actions during an emergency situation, which resulted in the successful saving of a human life. Chief Harr

added, "Their proper application of training and experience exemplified their dedication to duty, the preservation of life and service to the community."

In addition to the heroic actions of these two officers, the GPD also wanted to thank and recognize fellow first responders for their actions during this emergency situation, Enloe Paramedics and Cal-Fire personnel. ★

# Caltrans Seeks Rural, Tribal Volunteers for Latest ‘Road Charge’ Study

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Caltrans is recruiting volunteers who reside and travel in rural and tribal communities to participate in the latest testing phase of a “road charge” pilot. Up to 500 volunteers will participate in a seven-month simulated road charge system, which charges drivers based on the number of miles they travel rather than the amount of gas they use to support the state’s critical transportation infrastructure. There will be no cost to participate, and upon completion, volunteers will be eligible to receive an incentive of up to \$250.

“Rural and tribal communities have unique travel needs and may interact with a road charge system in different ways,” said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares. “It is essential that Caltrans understands their needs as it develops an equitable and convenient alternative to the gas tax.”

Starting in March 2023, the California Road Charge Public-Private Roads Project will explore the technical aspects of reporting mileage, as well as engage rural and tribal communities in a conversation about their communities’ priorities in a potential road charge system to fund road and highway maintenance.

This pilot will simulate how participants interact with a road charge system by reporting mileage and “paying” mock invoices. The pilot will conduct surveys to gauge participants’ preferences and experience.

As vehicles become more fuel-efficient and the state’s transition to zero-emission vehicles accelerates, Caltrans is researching

possible alternatives to the state gas tax, which California has historically relied on to build and maintain the state’s transportation system. Volatile oil prices and California’s phasing out the sale of new gas-powered cars by 2035 add increased urgency to research ways to bring long-term stability to transportation funding. For that reason, Caltrans is testing various methods to collect per-mile rather than per-gallon fees.

This demonstration is funded through a grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation’s Surface Transportation System Funding Alternatives Program and will build on Caltrans’ previous road charge pilots: California’s Road Charge Pilot in 2017, which introduced the road charge concept to Californians, and California’s Four-Phase Demonstration, which tested the road charge concept across several platforms including pay-at-the-pump and electric vehicle charging station systems, usage-based insurance, transportation network company fleets, and automated vehicles.

Participants must be California residents over the age of 18. The pilot is employing the highest standards in data protection and safeguarding, ensuring that Caltrans will not receive any sensitive information from participants.

# LaMalfa Appointed Chairman of House Agriculture Subcommittee on Forestry

**WASHINGTON, D.C. (MPG)** - On February 3, 2023, Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R – Richvale) announced that he has been selected to serve as the Chairman of the Agriculture Subcommittee on Forestry in the 118th Congress. “Forestry will be a priority during the 118th Congress and Rep. LaMalfa is a proven leader who is well-equipped to lead our new, standalone Forestry Subcommittee. Representing California’s First District, Rep. LaMalfa has been a lead advocate in the need to vastly expand active forest management and reduce the risk of catastrophic wildfires in the

Western United States. I look forward to working closely with this critical subcommittee to enhance forest health and address the challenges facing our rural communities,” said Agriculture Committee Chairman Glenn “GT” Thompson.

The subcommittee’s jurisdiction will cover, among other things:

The USDA Forest Service and private forest lands;

Active forest management, which supports forest health and restoration, rural communities, forest products, and recreation, as well as efforts to address the wildfire crisis, and;

A review of all Farm Bill authorities and programs, proposed regulations, the USFS, the 10-year wildfire strategy, and new funding and authorities provided by Congress to the Forest Service.

## Shooting Down Inflation

The U.S. military shot down the now infamous high altitude Chinese spy balloon which Beijing claimed was simply a weather balloon gone awry.

After initially delaying the action because the balloon was over land, President Biden congratulated the aviators that accomplished the task off the Eastern Seaboard.

I can't imagine that there is much challenge in shooting down a floating balloon with the supersonic AIM-9X Sidewinder missile fired from the world's most advanced fighter jet but I'm sure the pilot had fun.

I couldn't help but think how somehow this reminded me of the Federal Reserve chief Jerome Powell taking down the American consumer and the economy to accomplish his mission of bringing down inflation.

On the subject of inflation and spy balloons, one is too high and the other one used to be.

Both situations are untenable, although the solution to the balloon was to quickly bring it down to zero altitude. With inflation, the desired level is not zero, but definitely lower than it is.

Fed Chief Powell can't use a guided missile to shoot down our current inflation problem, but I bet he wish he could.

Instead of Sidewinder missiles, the Fed's weapons are interest rate hikes, Quantitative Tightening (QT) and various Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) operations.

Without getting too far into the weeds, just know that all three tools at the Fed's disposal is to remove money from the American economic system, destroy the consumers ability to buy so many gewgaws and make borrowing more expensive, all to reduce demand which will bring down inflation.

Unlike the Sidewinder however, the Fed's inflation weapons are not nearly as accurate and are highly unpredictable as to their effectiveness until way later after they're used.

What this mean is it's like firing a Sidewinder and not being told if you hit the mark until after you've landed and turned off the airplane.

Yea, the Fed's tools are kind of like that.

The combination of interest rates, QT and the FOMC operations are called Monetary Policy. Put simply, monetary equals "money", so monetary policy basically means messing with the money in our economy.

By "messing" with the money in the system, it means either putting more money INTO the economy, or withdrawing money FROM the economy. The Fed uses the three tools mentioned above to accomplish this task.

When the Feds put more money into

the economy, there's more cash sloshing around in everybody's hands and they subsequently buy more stuff, driving up prices. Lower interest rates also makes borrowing money less expensive which drives demand even higher.

When the Feds take money out of the system, the exact opposite happens. Demand falls so prices drop but so do wages, home prices and stocks. People in essence get poorer and some go broke. Unfortunately, some others are even worse off and go hungry.

In essence, when the military uses its missiles, the spy balloon is destroyed. When the Feds use their weapons, the consumer gets crushed.

Making matters worse, the Fed, nor anyone else for that matter, knows exactly how many consumers it will crush in the process until way later. Like 6-18 months later.

Unfortunately, because of the complexity of the system, monetary policy is a very broad and inaccurate sword. And in an economy the size of ours, its use is a highly unpredictable maneuver. Simply put, it is impossible to know how much is too much, and how long is too long in its implementation.

The recent downing of the spy balloon was done over water to mitigate the chance of damage to life, limb or property, and thankfully, no such damage occurred.

Unfortunately however, many argue, including this analyst, it is not so when the Fed has used its monetary weapons in the past.

Since monetary policy takes up to 6-18 months to reveal its final effect on the economy, it is impossible to know exactly when enough becomes too much.

The result then becomes on the way up, an overheating economy and massive inflation.

Sound familiar?

On the way down, which is the way they are going now, it can mean a crushing recession as the Fed overshoots in the other direction.

Only time will tell if we get a soft landing, or a devastating crash.

## Child Molest, Child Abuse, and Torture Charges Filed against Magalia Man

### Butte County DA News Release

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - A Magalia man was charged on the first week of February with multiple counts of physical and sexual child abuse, possession of child pornography, and torture stemming from several years of violence within his Magalia home.

Robert Chavez, 41, was arrested on Friday evening, January 27, 2023, after a prolonged standoff with Butte County District Attorney investigators at his Magalia home.

Butte County Sheriff's deputies had responded to the children's school the day before after being alerted to alleged reports of child abuse within the home. Butte County Children's Services Division social workers responded to the school and home, and eventually, five children ranging in ages from four to sixteen years of age were taken into protective custody. During an initial interview with one of the female minors, DA investigators learned sexual abuse was occurring in the home at the hands of Chavez. The investigators obtained an arrest warrant for Chavez and went to his home that Friday afternoon.

Two women were also contacted within the home. Amanda Johnson, 38, and Kelsey Cabrera, 34, the mothers of the five children, were involved in a polyamorous relationship with Chavez over several years. During an initial search of the home pursuant to the arrest warrant, Chavez was not initially located, but eventually, investigators discovered he was hiding in a garage attic. Chavez was eventually taken into custody with the assistance of the sheriff's office and Cal Fire.

During the next few days, DA investigators conducted multiple searches of the home and interviews and learned the

extent of the abuse occurring in the home at the hands of Chavez. There were multiple incidents of sexual abuse disclosed, as well as extreme levels of physical abuse.

On January 31, 2023, Chavez was initially arraigned on multiple charges ranging from sexual and physical abuse of minors to dissuading witnesses. He was held in custody at the Butte County Jail after a judge denied bail due to public safety concerns.

On February 3, 2023, Cabrera and Johnson were added to Chavez's criminal complaint and arraigned on one charge each of dissuading witnesses and three counts each of felony child abuse for failure to protect the children. Both women were held in the jail on \$300,000 bail each.

On the same date, and on the same criminal complaint, additional charges were added for Chavez including child pornography, torture and sex charges that can bring life in prison.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the apprehension of Chavez as well as the investigation of all three suspects was due to multi-agency cooperation between the Butte County District Attorney's Office, the Butte County Sheriff's Office, Paradise Police, CalFire, and Children's Services Division.

Ramsey noted his investigators were still actively investigating the case which includes downloading multiple computer hard drives and surveillance cameras found inside the home. He said he expects there will be additional charges as new evidence arises.

Cabrera and Johnson's next court dates are for Wednesday, February 8, 2023, at 8:30 a.m. for entry of pleas.

Chavez's next court date is scheduled for Wednesday, February 15, 2023, at 8:30 a.m. also for entry of plea. ★

## Dryer Safety

Doing laundry is most likely part of your everyday routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

Dryers should be properly grounded.



Check the outdoor vent flap to make sure it is not covered by debris.

Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.

Clothes that have come in contact with flammable substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

### FACT

- The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.
- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.

# Newsom Shuns Blame for California's Unseemly Issues

Gov. Gavin Newsom's obvious efforts to raise his national profile have taken two forms – touting California as a societal model and criticizing red states such as Florida and Texas for their supposed shortcomings.

Increasingly, Newsom employs a third tactic – shifting blame for California's less seemly aspects.

That tendency is particularly evident in something that Californians rate as one of their top concerns – its worst-in-the-nation incidence of homelessness, manifested in thousands of squalid encampments in the state's cities.

While running for governor in 2018, Newsom promised to appoint a cabinet-level official to concentrate on homelessness but later, when reporters pressed him, responded, "You want to know who's the homeless czar?" Newsom. "I'm the homeless czar in the state of California."

Despite that self-appointed role, as homelessness continued to grow, officially approaching 200,000 people but probably much higher, Newsom began shunning responsibility.

Last year, he blamed local officials for a lack of effective action, at one point suspending state funds. He later restored the money but continued to castigate them.

"If we can't clean up the

encampments and address what's happening chronically on our streets, I'm going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more," Newsom said as he introduced a new state budget in January.

Another example of Newsom's fingerpointing occurred last week as a congressional committee dominated by Republicans delved into why states – particularly California – handed out billions of dollars in unemployment insurance benefits to fraudsters.

The state auditor had issued a report citing the Employment Development Department's "poor planning and ineffective management" for shortcomings in handling unemployment insurance claims. But the current EDD director, Nancy Farias, sent the committee a four-page letter blaming Donald Trump's administration for as much as \$30 billion in fraudulent payments.

"Unfortunately, the Trump Administration expressed no interest in establishing (a) coordinated national response when these (emergency pandemic unemployment) programs were initiated in 2020, leaving states to fend for themselves against a clear pattern of sophisticated, international criminal syndicates at work," Farias' letter, which no doubt was approved by the governor's office, said.

A third example of blame-shifting also popped up last week when Fresno County District Attorney Lisa Smittcamp cited Newsom's support for lenient prison policies that allowed the alleged killer of Selma policeman Gonzalo Carrasco to be released after serving just six months of a 64-month sentence for a previous crime.

"Today, Governor Gavin Newsom, and every legislator in the state of California who supports this over-reaching phenomenon they try to disguise as legitimate criminal justice reform, has the blood of this officer on their hands," Smittcamp said.

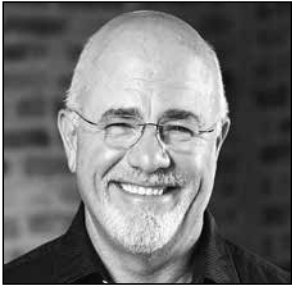
"The governor and his political allies who continue the quest to close state prisons are increasing the incidents of violence to everyone who lives in, or visits, the state of California," Smittcamp continued. "No city or county is safe from the wrath of this misguided thinking, and this mismanaged prison system."

Newsom quickly fired back, referring to the plea bargain that Smittcamp's office accepted: "She should blame herself. I've been listening to this for years from her. She has the prosecutorial discretion. Ask her what she did in terms of prosecuting that case."

Smittcamp persisted, saying, "Governor Newsom continues to demonstrate his ignorance and lack of understanding of how the criminal justice system works. His arrogant and defensive response is proof positive that he is attempting to deflect responsibility for his failed policies."

It is outrageous that the alleged killer, a self-proclaimed gang member with an extensive criminal record, was released after just six months. And it does exemplify the uber-lenient penal policies California has adopted in recent years, begun by former Gov. Jerry Brown and continued by Newsom.

Recently I went to Santa Rosa, the home of the Luther Burbank. He was a plant innovator in the same range of discovery and invention as Henry Ford and Thomas Edison. At Burbank's garden there are pictures of these three innovators together. That must have been some interesting conversation. Did they talk about plants or cars

or electricity? I'm guessing they talked of the process of invention and discovery.

I learned about Luther Burbank in school. I remember it vividly. Is he is still taught to horticulture students as the man who developed tree grafting?. Now why anyone would develop 20,000 varieties of plums I cannot tell you but he did that. It was interesting to see the grafting methods he developed so he could get many generations of fruit in a shorter period of time. The example tree in the garden had at least 25 different varieties of different fruit grafted onto it, it looked like a puffball of sticks (winter and all that). Thanks to him we

can grow fruit trees that have five or more different apples on one tree. This is boon of use of backyard space while having several types of apples. This is also done to peach, plum and nectarines. You can go to Hodge's nursery and buy a "Fruit Cocktail" tree. The only drawback I see to this is learning how and when to prune the different grafts. At the garden each type was marked with tags. It's coming up on St. Valentine's Day, so I thought I should share the love story of Coalie and Wilma, and every word is true.

Coalie was one of Sequoia-Kings Pack Trains' mules. Coal black of course, and if he should get a good shot, you could be kicked. Pack mule, not riding mule. Wilma was a little brown mule belonging to Rock Creek Pack Station out of Bishop, some 40 miles north of us.

Well, my boss, Gene Burkhardt, and Rock Creek's boss, Herb London, pastured their pack stock together each winter just outside Independence. Come June, we'd go catch our stock out of this 110,000-acre mostly desert ranch, and string them together and lead them straight up about

10 miles to a little meadow called Onion Valley, where our headquarters were. It took days to get them all up there.

Herb's packers would truck his stock more than 40 miles north, through three towns and lots of rough country, to their pack station.

It was about three days after I'd led a string of mules overnight to the pack station, including Coalie, and got ready for our season. I went out in the morning and found a little brown mare mule giving muzzle snuggles to Coalie. From the brand on her, we knew she was one of Herb's, so Gene called him and Herb drove all the way to get her.

Four days later, she was back in the mule corral making mulie smooches with her boyfriend. She had tracked Coalie from the winter pasture down 40 miles of highway 395, across five miles of desert and up nine miles of mountains. Twice.

Mules have gender, but are sterile hybrids and don't "mate" physically. They are a combination of a horse mother and a donkey dad.

Gene and Herb decided love was stronger than anything else we had around there, so Gene gave Herb a mule, and Wilma became ours. Well, Coalie's.

After that, for as long as they lived, if you took one, you had to take the other.

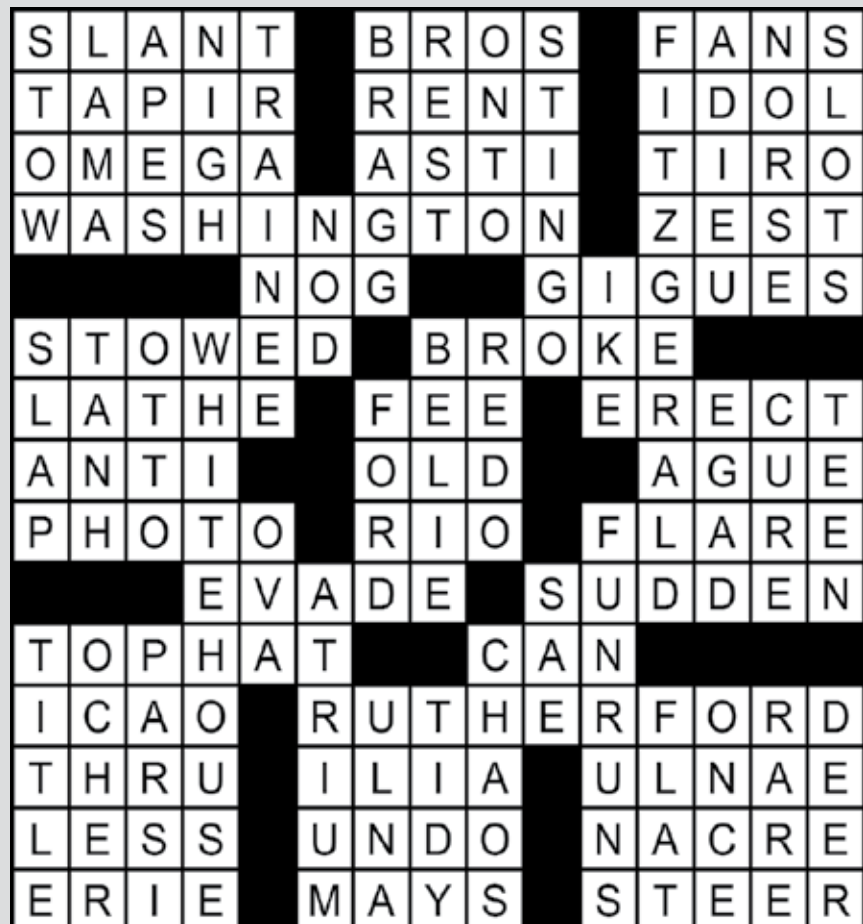

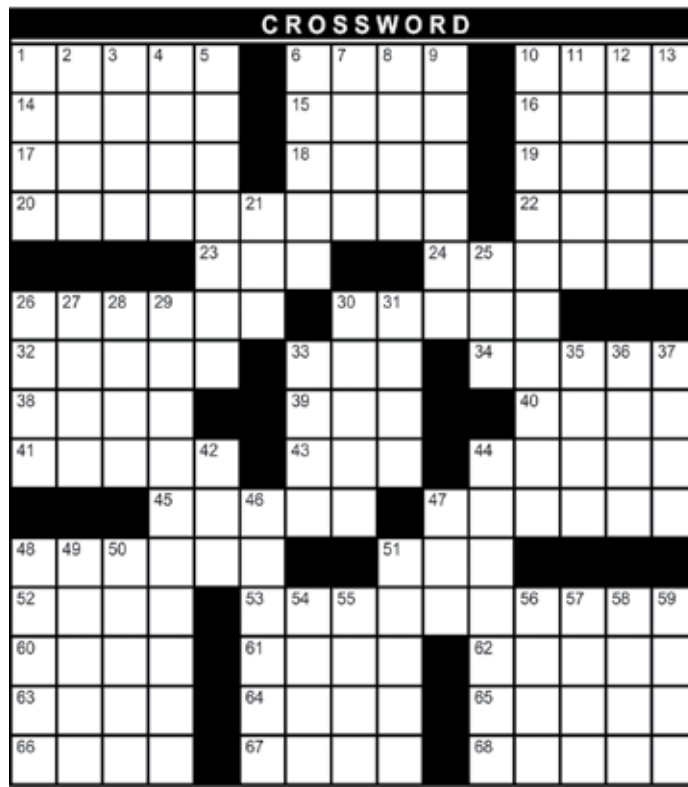

# Lady Lions Dominate RedHawks, Rematch with Winters Decides SVL Title

**LIVE OAK, CA (MPG)** - The Live Oak girls soccer team continued their dominance in the Sac Valley League with a 14-0 shut-out over the Colusa RedHawks on Tuesday, January 31.

Live Oak controlled the game from the opening kick and the outstanding team chemistry with short passes set up multiple scoring opportunities throughout the night.

Lady Lions head coach Jose Acosta expressed to the Herald all the offensive opportunities stemmed from the short crisp passes his team did throughout the game.

“Our passing game has been effective all season,” Acosta said.

He added the quick give and go mentality of the short passes is hard to defend because of the quickness of the passes.

Live Oak (12-4-1, 6-1 SVL) started the scoring rampage in the eighth minute of the game when junior defender Maya Goodson headed the ball in from a corner kick by sophomore striker Johanna Petrone to put the Lady Lions up 1-0.

Goodson added her second and final goal of the night in the 24th minute when Petrone assisted her from another corner kick.

The Lady Lions had a 7-0 lead at the end of the first half.

Petrone had a hat-trick in the first half and junior mid-fielder Mckayla Holman added two goals in the 17th and 31st minute.

The chemistry between Holman and Petrone on the field is clear as day as Petrone is the leading goal scorer for Live Oak this season as she added her 71st- 78th goal on the year while Holman added four assists to her team lead in the assist department.

Petrone exclaimed to the Herald that her and Holman are

similar players on the field. The Lady Lions are unselfish on the field as everyone is always looking ahead for the next pass.

All 14 goals in the match were assisted by a compilation of six Live Oak players, furthermore, nine different Lady Lion players have at least one assist throughout the season.

Petrone had eight goals and five assists against Colusa, while Holman had four goals and five assists.

Live Oak went on the road and devoured Willows with a 19-1 victory where Petrone had 12 goals and six assists while Holman also had seven goals and eight assists.

Petrone is now averaging 5.3 goals a game along with 2.9 assists per game while Holman is averaging 3.4 goals and 3.7 assists.

The Lady Lions have also only given up four total goals in eight SVL games including the 2-1 defeat Live Oak suffered at Winters on January 24.

Holman told the Herald that Winters had a stacked (good) defense and Petrone added they were able to pinpoint how the Lady Lions worked offensively.

Petrone expressed that the match up this Thursday will be exciting as they get to play for the league title on their home field for the chance at the SVL title.

With the SVL title on the line with the match against Winters this Thursday, Acosta told the Herald the adjustment he made between the first match up with Winters.

The Herald saw the adjustment work vividly in the game against Colusa. He added in the first match up at Winters, Live Oak had scoring opportunities, but they just didn’t go in the back of the net and that’s how the game of soccer goes.

The Lady Lions hosted Pierce on Tuesday before they host Winters on Thursday afternoon. ★

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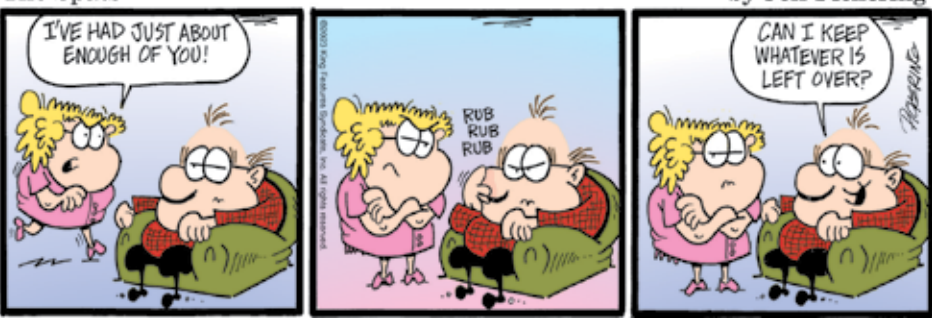

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# What Are ‘Red Flag’ Laws and How Can They Prevent Gun Violence?

California’s red flag law, which allows people to obtain gun violence restraining orders (GVROs), went into effect seven years ago. Since then, GVROs have been credited with deterring at least 58 potential mass shootings and other types of gun violence in California, including suicides. Currently, 19 states and the District of Columbia have red flag laws, also known as extreme risk protection order laws.

But what are they, and how do they work?

“Red flag laws are a tool law enforcement and others can use when somebody is clearly at high risk of doing something with a firearm, but they can’t be arrested because no crime has been committed and they don’t appear to need a mental health hold or qualify for one,” Amy Barnhorst said.

Barnhorst is a psychiatrist at UC Davis Health and an expert on violence prevention. She is vice chair of Community Mental Health and the director of the BulletPoints Project, which teaches clinicians how to prevent firearm violence. She remembers the days before California’s red flag law. “When somebody was making threats about hurting people at their school or even threats of suicide, there wasn’t much that could be done,” Barnhorst said. “Red flag laws have changed that. With the law, there is something that can be done about people who are making threats or have concerning behaviors.”

Obtaining a gun violence restraining order

Gun-related deaths remain high in the U.S. The Gun Violence Archive, which tracks firearm violence in the U.S., reports 648 mass shootings, 20,176 homicides, and 24,090 suicides in 2022.

Research has found that in

about 80% of cases, people who commit mass shootings or suicide make their intentions known in advance to family members or friends or via social media. “It’s really important that if you are concerned about a student in your school, or you’re a concerned parent, teacher, employer, or somebody who’s worried about someone, know there is a way to intervene and reduce the risk. But you need to tell someone, such as law enforcement, who can act,” Barnhorst said.

“If you’re in California, and there is someone you’re concerned about who may be at risk of firearm injury, and they have access to guns, you can go

to the Speak for Safety website. It can help walk you through how to pursue a gun violence restraining order,” Barnhorst said. The website has different tabs you can select for your relationship to the person at risk, such as employer or co-worker, family or household member, law enforcement or teacher or school employee.

The California Courts website also has information in English and Spanish about how to obtain a GVRO.

“In many cases, law enforcement can get an emergency GVRO on the scene, and they can remove any firearms from the person at risk at that time,” Barnhorst said. “If the judge

determines that the person is at risk, the judge can continue the prohibition. The guns will continue to be kept away for the duration of the order, which can be renewed after a year or longer in some cases.”

Barnhorst explains there is due process during all stages of the legal procedures. “People who have had their firearms removed can appear in court to give their side. If the judge determines they are not a danger, the prohibition can be lifted, and the firearms returned,” Barnhorst said. She notes GVROs are civil court actions. They don’t involve the criminal courts, and they don’t become part of a person’s criminal record.

Most people don’t know about GVROs

Despite the potential to reduce mass shootings and suicides, the use of GVROs in California has been limited. One of the biggest barriers appears to be the lack of awareness about them. A recent survey found that nearly two-thirds of the respondents did not know about GVROs, although 70% said they would consider using one in a high-risk situation.

“The GVRO law empowers people to play a role in preventing firearm violence among friends, family members, co-workers and classmates by providing a tool to remove firearms from crisis situations,” said Veronica Pear, an assistant professor at the Violence Prevention Research Program at UC Davis. Pear studies violence prevention and has published numerous studies about the efficacy of red flag laws. “However, the law can only save lives if it is used, and for that reason, education is key,” Pear said.
