GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Gridley Lions Den was the command center for The Point in Time (PIT) survey in the Gridley area. This survey happened in California and the United States on January 25, 2023. Every county, city and town participate. The completed surveys are used to decide how to distribute federal funding directed at helping the homeless. In Gridley the survey was conducted by volunteers from the Lions Club, Gridley Police Officers, Butte County organizers and Housing Tools representatives. since the homeless in the Gridley area are generally on the outskirts of town. This approach helps the count with accuracy.

Once a survey is completed the homeless person received a \$10.00 MacDonald's or Burger King card. At the Gridley Command Center at the Lions Den, those who came there also received a meal of chili and hot dogs donated by the Lions Club. There were also bags of food and care items given out to the homeless Butte County. This was lower than previous years but it is thought that many were not found due to fewer volunteers. The results of this year's count will be available in March.

The survey consists of 18 question required by HUD (The Department of Housing and Urban Development) and an additional 16 questions required by Butte County. General information is collected, as well as, questions about what contributed to their homelessness and if they would like available services. These services can be housing, food and transportation. Butte County has seen an increase in homelessness due to the Oroville Dam spillway evacuation, the Camp Fire and the Bear Fire. ★

California Loses Population Again

California reigned for decades as the unmatched destination for people around the country. Now people can't leave fast enough. Recently released numbers from the U.S. Census Bureau indicate that between July 2021 and July 2022, California lost roughly 343,000 residents to other states. This number is a "domestic net migration" figure, meaning that 343,000 more Americans moved out of California over those 12 months than moved here from other states.

Where are they going? The number-one net migration winner over that period was Florida, which gained around 319,000 residents from other states.

It's too easy to say exclusively that Newsom is driving people out of state and Florida Governor Ron DeSantis is attracting them, but to the extent

The survey is done every odd year but in 2021 due to Covid the count did not happen so the count was done last year in 2022 and again this year in 2023. In 2022 the PIT data gave a number of 1,156 homeless in the two governors symbolize different approaches to taxation, regulation, and liberty, it holds true. People are leaving Newsomlike states and flocking to DeSantis-like states. If you want to handicap the 2024 presidential election, this is a good place to start.

The states shedding domestic population are progressive strongholds, with extensive regulatory regimens, strong public employee unions and other Democrat policy priorities. They are, simply, big government states. High tax, high cost of living states. Joining California in the top five net losers are New York, Illinois, New Jersey, and Massachusetts.

States attracting Americans are lower-cost, lower-tax, Republican strongholds. Trailing Florida in the top five net gainers are Texas, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.

And even if your individual tax burden is not too bad in California, big government, supported by high taxes (regardless of who pays them) indicates a mindset that the state should always be doing more and additional money for government is inherently good.

This bigger-is-better approach leads to government solutions in search of problems.

It's why California government seeps into every crack of your life, blocking the exercise of what you can eat, what house you build, what car you drive, how much you keep of the *Continued on page 2*

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) -Members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Gridley Post 5731 honored a police detective on Wednesday, January 25. Ed Kawasaki, David Yadon, and Noris Anderson presented Michael Aguilar with the year award. This is an annual award that is given to local law enforcement officers who demonstrate dedication and valor in the line of duty. The award with given in a small private ceremony at the Sutter County Sheriff's Office.

Aguilar grew up locally and is a graduate of Lindhurst High School as well as a Yuba College alumni. He has worked for the Sutter County Sheriff's Department for 14 years. He lives with his wife Daisy and their 13-year-old son. A new baby will soon be welcomed to the family. He is a graduate of the Police Academy at Yuba College. His credentials include being a member of the SWAT team, Special Enforcement Detail Team, and being a certified active shooter trainer. He was promoted to detective in 2021.

In addition to these credentials, Aguilar has stood out in several recent cases. One was solving a high profile vehicular manslaughter case. He was also noted for his speedy responses in providing first aid to a traffic victim and saving another person from choking by using CPR.

I met a woman last week who said she was from Gridley and her last name was Rocha. Sure enough, she knew right where the Portuguese Hall was and that it had been condemned and is no longer usable. Then like everyone who knows anything about it she started talking about "Mary" and the food and the great smells of the kitchen.

I remembered one of my favorite sports stories as the 49ers were looking for a fifth-string quarterback, because their starting third and fourth-string quarterbacks got hurt, and they

had run out of people who play the position. I started hoping that they would do like the NHL and just grab somebody out of the stands. In February 2020 the Carolina Hurricanes lost their goalie, and then their backup goalie. So they got the 42-year-old Zamboni driver, suited him up and he became the oldest goalie to record a win in the history of the national hockey association. David Ayers played in one game, allowed the first two shots on goal to go in - and then blocked six more as his team, the Carolina Hurricanes, defeated the Toronto Maple Leafs 6-2. He was paid \$500 for the game. He got to keep his jersey, number 90. The 49er's story did not end so well.

Reward for Information Leading to an Arrest for the Murder of Tyler Dickson

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On July 3, 2021, Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) deputies were dispatched to the Bidwell Canyon Campground, which is owned and operated by California State Parks, to assist with a homicide investigation. During the initial response, State Parks Peace Officers requested BCSO assume jurisdiction over the investigation.

Detectives responded and determined that 20-year-old Tyler Dickson, of San Pablo, was fatally shot while sleeping inside a tent. Detectives initiated a homicide investigation. Over the past 18 months, detectives have actively and zealously investigated this case, however it has remained unsolved.

In 2021, BCSO requested Governor Gavin Newsom's Office issue a reward

through the Governor's Reward Program to encourage those with pertinent information to come forward. After reviewing the circumstances of the case, Governor Newsom's Office issued a \$50,000 reward for information leading to an arrest and conviction for the murder of Tyler Dickson.

The Sheriff's Office is committed to solving this case. We very much want to bring closure to Tyler's family and friends and see to it that the person(s) responsible for Tyler's murder are held accountable. Our hearts go out to Tyler's family and we are hopeful that this reward will renew public interest in the case and ultimately result in justice for Tyler.

and improve transportation infrastructure throughout the state. This funding includes more than \$450 million from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA) and more than \$250 million from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road

Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

"The CTC's investments will help rebuild California's transportation infrastructure while increasing transit and active transportation options. These projects reflect the CTC and Caltrans' commitment to



safety and meeting future challenges," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares.

Projects the CTC approved include:

City of Sacramento: \$5 million in federal IIJA funding for the city's Broadway Complete Streets Project between 16th Street/Land Park Drive and 24th Street. The project includes reducing a segment of roadway from four lanes to two, constructing 6,100 feet of new buffered bicycle lanes, adding new marked pedestrian crossings and refuge islands, and making multi-modal improvements at two intersections.

State Route 65 in Wheatland, Yuba **County:** \$9.8 million in State Highway Operation and Protection Program funding, including \$680,000 in SB 1 funds, to rehabilitate the pavement from State Street to 0.3 mile north of Evergreen Drive. The City of Wheatland is contributing \$100,000 toward construction, intersection with McDevitt Drive.

State Route 32 in Chico: \$462,000 for Caltrans to develop a safety project for traffic signal and intersection improvements at Main Street and Oroville Avenue. State Route 20 in Colusa County:

> \$730,000 for Caltrans to develop а safety project to upgrade roadside signs, add flashing beacons, improve the pavement, and upgrade guardrail from east of the Lake County line to about 0.6 mile east of the State Route 16

junction.

Interstate 80 near Floriston, Nevada **County:** \$550,000 for Caltrans to develop a safety project to improve the pavement, repair drainage systems, upgrade guardrail and replace a damaged concrete barrier.

Interstate 80 in Sacramento County: \$210,000 for Caltrans to develop a project to replace current roadside vegetation and upgrade irrigation system from the State Route 51 (Capital City Freeway) junction to 0.6 mile east of Madison Avenue.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually that is shared equally between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1. 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Farm Bureau President Re-Elected Hate Crime Defendant to National Leadership Post

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson has been re-elected to a two-year term as one of six executive board members for the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Johansson, who will represent 13 western U.S. states on the executive board for the national agricultural organization, was elected during the AFBF's 104th Convention in Puerto Rico this month.

"It is an honor to continue to serve during this critical chapter for America's farmers and ranchers," Johansson said. "We are working to pass a new Farm Bill in Congress to secure our food supply and to help our family farmers at a time when more than 50% are reporting negative earnings. I am also committed to ensuring that construction begins on long-overdue federal and state water storage and conveyance projects.

"For too long, our farmers have endured devastating water supply cuts during dry years. And now, after historic storms in California, we are watching uncaptured water simply flow into the ocean due to our state's lack of resolve for completing projects voters approved years ago. We can no longer accept inaction."

The California Farm Bureau works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 29,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of 5.3 million Farm Bureau members. ★

Found Incompetent

Butte County District Attorney Press Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A Butte County Superior Court judge vesterday found the Chico man accused of committing recent hate crimes in Chico to be mentally incompetent to stand trial.

Thomas David Bona, 37, is presently in custody without bail facing vandalism, arson, and hate crime charges involving the burning and defacing of the sign of a Chico synagogue and a Chico mural. On November 16, 2022, his public defender expressed a doubt as to Bona's ability to understand the nature of the criminal proceedings against him. Bona was then evaluated by a court-appointed psychologist who opined Bona could not presently understand

the nature of the criminal proceedings or assist his counsel in the conduct of a defense in a rational manner. Based on the psychologist's report, the judge found Bona incompetent to stand trial.

Bona's vandalism charge stems from an October 7, 2022, incident where Bona was captured on surveillance video throwing a large rock through a window of a local Chico restaurant. Then, on November 2, 2022, a local synagogue's sign was found to be burned and marked with numerous swastikas.

After Bona's arrest, Chico police determined Bona was also responsible for damage to a Chico tribute mural to missing or murdered indigenous women. Similar to the synagogue's sign, the mural was marked with swastikas and hate messages.

The Butte County District Attorney's Office filed a felony count of vandalism, and two counts of felony arson each including a hate crime allegation. At the time of the current alleged offenses, Bona was on supervised release from state prison where he had been sentenced to six years for previous hate crimes. If convicted of all counts and allegations on his current cases, Bona could receive up to nine years in state prison.

The next hearing is set for February 15, 2022, when the court will determine where Bona will be placed for treatment to regain competency to stand trial. Bona remains in custody on a no-bail hold for violating the terms of his previous prison release and \$150,000 bail for his new charges. *

They thought Twitter secure, a place where government (Department of Homeland Security DHS, and FBI agents in particular), Big Tech, Big Media. New Referendum Qualified for California's November 2024 Ballot

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D. announced today that a referendum has qualified for the November 5, 2024, General Election ballot.

In order to qualify for the ballot, the referendum needed 623,212 valid petition signatures, which is equal to five percent of the total votes cast for governor in the November 2018 General Election.

The Attorney General's official title and summary of the referendum is as follows:

Referendum challenging 2022 law authorizing creation of council to set minimum wage and working standards for fast-food workers.

If the required number of registered voters sign this petition and it is timely filed, a 2022 law will not take effect unless approved at the next statewide general or special election after November 8, 2022. The challenged law:

Authorizes creation of Fast-Food Council (upon submission of 10,000 fast-food worker signatures) to set working standards and minimum wage (up to \$22/hour in 2023, with capped annual increases) at fast-food restaurants with 100+ nationwide locations.

Prohibits retaliation against fast-food workers for making certain workplace complaints.

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Scald Emergencies

With National Burn Awareness Week being in the month of February, here is some basic information on pediatric scalding emergencies.

WHAT TO DO

- Set water heater temperature to no higher than 120°F/48°C, or just below the medium setting
- Create a "no kid zone" in the kitchen around stoves, ovens and hot items
- · Keep hot drinks away from the edge of tables and counters
- · Use a travel mug with a tight fitting lid for all hot drinks
- · Place pots and pans on the back burner with handles turned away from the edge of the stove

WHAT NOT TO DO

- · Leave a child unattended in the bathtub; if you must leave, take the children with you
- · Allow young children to adjust the water temperature or sit near faucet handles
- · Set anything hot on tabletops within reach of young children who can pull them down
- · Allow appliance cords (slow cookers, deep fryers, coffeemakers) to dangle over the counter edge

Gov. Gavin Newsom often boasts that California is a "nation state" that is or should be $-a \mod for$ the nation.

However, when it comes to implementing large-scale projects and programs, California is more a model of bumbling incompetence.

The list of failures to deliver what was promised on time and on budget is endless, but here are a few obvious examples:

—A bullet train was supposed to be whisking passengers up and down the state by now, but the state is still building an initial stretch in the San Joaquin Valley that is probably a decade away from working, if ever, while cost estimates have nearly tripled.

-The reconstruction of one-third of the earthquake-damaged San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge took a quarter-century to complete and cost 25 times as much as the original estimate.

-The Oroville Dam on the Feather River nearly collapsed in 2017 when sections of its main spillway gave way and an emergency spillway eroded the base of the dam. In seeking re-licensing of the dam 12 years earlier, state officials dismissed concerns about

spillway had been poorly engineered.

Add Another to List

of California's Botched Projects

-When the COVID-19 pandemic erased the jobs of two-plus million California workers, the Employment Development Department suffered an operational meltdown in handling legitimate claims for unemployment insurance, but gave as much as \$30 billion in cash to fraudulent claimants.

-Although California is the global center of information technology, the state has run up an almost perfect record of botched projects to use it, with long delays in implementation and immense cost overruns.

Again, this is only a partial list. A book could be written about how state and local governments have spent untold billions of dollars on homelessness without making any visible headway. Another could be written about how California reduced its prison population by dumping more felons into overcrowded county jails and/or releasing them to prey upon the public.

One massive failure that developed largely under the media radar deserves a place on the list -a completely bollixed program to provide long-term care insurance to California's public employees and retirees.

In 1995, the California Public Employees Retirement System received legislative approval to provide such insurance. Thousands of public workthat premiums would remain affordable.

integrity. Later it also was actuarially unsound, determined that the main CalPERS began sharply increasing premiums, finally leading to a class action lawsuit alleging that promises were broken.

> "These people were completely, completely misled," Michael Bidart, an attorney representing the plaintiffs, told the Sacramento Bee in 2019, just before a trial was to begin.

"We raised rates to sustain the plan and we believe they were properly increased in accordance with our contract," CalPERS General Counsel Matt Jacobs told the Bee, the only media outlet that has followed the case.

Negotiations led to a tentative settlement of \$2.7 billion in payments to the plaintiffs. However, last spring CalPERS pulled out because too many individual plaintiffs rejected the deal and a new trial is scheduled later this year.

Clearly, CalPERS didn't know what it was doing. Were it a private insurer, the Department of Insurance would have probably cracked down, but CalPERS is exempt from such oversight.

Many managerial debacles have been ignored by the Legislature and the longterm care insurance is one of them. But the affected workers and retirees are now pressing the Legislature to order an investigation by the state auditor and it's sorely needed to get the bottom of a multi-billion dollar mess.

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


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

Bulldogs Strike Late to Stay Undefeated in BVL

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - The Gridley Boys' soccer team stayed undefeated in Butte View League play after they beat the Las Plumas Thunderbirds in an intense physical 1-0 victory last Thursday.

The win comfortably guarantees Gridley a second place finish in the BVL standings as three teams already have three losses in the loss column currently and four games remain for the Bulldogs in league play.

Last week could have been called the week of Las Plumas, as the Thunderbirds were the only opponents of the soccer program of the week where Gridley won 3-0 at home on January 23.

Bulldogs head coach Jesse Barajas told the Herald one of the biggest adjustments the Thunderbirds made dealt with the difference in playing surfaces.

Las Plumas plays their home soccer matches at Harrison Stadium in Oroville as the Bulldogs play on grass surfaces in Gridley.

"With the playing surface being quicker, they brought in their defense and made it tighter and put faster players on the back line," Barajas said.

He added that when two of the better offensive Thunderbird players needed a break, they would push them back to the defensive end which made it difficult for Gridley to try and make a push offensively.

The match was even with every single possible scenario between possessions, foul calls and intensity.

Barajas expressed to the Herald the Bulldogs showed a lot of grit and resilience.

"They're ready for anything you throw at them," Barajas exclaimed.

Gridley (9-3-1, 3-0-1 BVL) senior center back Hector Palafox mentioned to the Herald that the hard work they have put in throughout the year will need to continue and progress.

"We need to keep pushing, keep motivating one another and have fun doing it," Palafox said.

Gridley has only a varsity team and one of its big advantages is having a big roster. Barajas exclaimed to the Herald he aims to have seven to eight per grade level.

The biggest advantage it

has has for the Bulldogs this season is keeping their lineups on the field fresh with the possibility of subbing out multiple players at once.

Gridley has 33 players on its roster with four practice squad spots on it as well.

The consistent subbing benefited the Bulldogs against Las Plumas because they were consistently pushing the ball and able to push it wide along the sidelines to eventually open up the middle of the field for spacing to push the ball toward the goal.

Gridley had some good shots on goal in the first half and early part of the second half, but in the 74th minute, Bulldogs senior striker and captain Ricardo Ramos scored 25 yards out and put Gridley up 1-0 late in the game.

"The keeper was a little bit out of his place, so I put the ball in the bottom right of the goal," Ramos told the Herald.

He added that it felt good to keep them atop the BVL standings because their match with Orland this Thursday is going to be a physical game.

The Bulldogs tied Orland on January 17, whichever team wins the match this Thursday should be the BVL champions.

The hunger of the Gridley

team is clear and they felt their season was cut short last year when crosstown rival Live Oak beat them in the 2022 Division II Northern Section CIF semifinals of the section playoffs.

"We're trying not to have what happened last year happen this year, we're hungry to get that section," Ramos said.

Following the victory over Las Plumas, plenty of Bulldogs along with family and friends were there after a half hour of the conclusion of the match.

Barajas laughed and joked with the Herald that the game of soccer is embedded and part of their DNA because they didn't want to leave the stadium.

Barajas has been involved with the soccer program at Gridley since it began in the late 1990's with the exception of a few years of going to college. Since the 2001 season Barajas has been the head coach of the Bulldogs.

Some of his former players are his assistant coaches and he has coached two generations of players.

"It's special to have the opportunities that I have had," Barajas told the Herald.

Gridley hosted Corning on Tuesday and will travel to Orland on Thursday. \bigstar

3. Project Description: BWGWD proposes to sell during the 2023 irrigation season up to I 8,780 acre-feet ("AF") of water to participating member districts of the State Water Contractors, Ine. or other south of Delta purchasers, including Central Valley Project contractors (collectively, "Buyers"). Buyers and others are seeking up to approximately 300,000 AF of transfer water from various willing sellers in the Sacramento Valley during the 2023 irrigation season. Purchasing this water would lessen potential water supply shortages to these patilies that may occur as a result of dry hydrologic conditions and regulatory restrictions on pumping in the Delta. As a willing seller, BWGWD would make up to 18,780 AF of water available to Buyers by idling cropland (i.e., non-irrigation of farmland by voluntary participants). Water made available by crop idling within the boundaries of the BWGWD would then be retained and stored by the Department of Water Resources ("DWR") in Lake Oroville for delivery to Buyers. BWGWD's proposed transfer will comply with the most current Draft Technical Information for Preparing Water Transfer Proposals prepared by DWR and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation dated December 2019 (Draft Technical Information), as applicable to land idling transfers.

4. **Project Location:** The project area, from which the water for this transfer will be made available, is defined by the BWGWD's legal boundaries, which encompasses approximately 34,800 acres in the northern Sacramento Valley, mostly in Butte County with a small poliion of that acreage in Sutter County (Sec attached draft IS/MND). Within the BWGWD's boundaries are approximately 31,300 irrigable acres, of which approximately 22,739 acres are dedicated primarily to the production of rice.

5. Hazardous Waste Sites: The project location is not identified on any of the lists enumerated under Government Code Section 65962.5.

6. **Public Review:** A copy of the draft Initial Study and related documentation is available for public review at **www.bwgwatcr.org** and during business hours at BWGWD's office at the above address. 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Stealing is Stealing

A massive rise in retail theft is contributing to "shrinkage" at brick-and-mortar retailers, contributing to the growth of online sales.

"The National Retail Federation estimates that shrink—an industry term for loss in inventory—amounted to roughly 1.4% of retail revenue in 2021, or roughly \$94.5 billion. Most of that shrink is caused by theft, the Wall Street Journal reports.

The Globe reported on California's retail theft last May:

The escalation of organized "smash-and-grab" robberies in cities around the country has been costly. CNN reported in January that retailers across America say shoplifting is now 2% to 3% of their total sales, forcing the retailers to install new security systems, video cameras and security staff.

A 2021 survey of retailers found 65% acknowledged an increase in violence, while 37% said Organized Retail Crime gangs were much more aggressive than in the past.

With every legislative solution killed by California's Democratic supermajority, retailers and Chambers of Commerce formed Californians Against Retail and Residential Theft (CARRT), and launched a campaign to raise lawmakers' and the public's knowledge of the growing theft problem in the state. CARRT is a broad-based coalition of business associations, local groups, and victim organizations advocating for California officials to act now to undo the damage done by Proposition 47.

Not the Bee also addresses this shrinkage: the Covid lockdowns. "Whoever had the bright idea

to shut down the entire U.S.

economy, confine people to their homes indefinitely, foment open-ended hysteria about a respiratory virus, and drive inflation to sky-high record rates — congratulations, your strategy is bearing fruit," Not the Bee reported.

"Brick-and-mortar retail's indisputable edge over e-commerce is that consumers can get what they want immediately, and can touch and feel the product before buying it. Rising theft and stores' measures to prevent it — could dull that edge," WSJ said.

The National Retail Federation report also found that the vast majority (89.7%) of respondents report that their Loss Prevention department is evaluated according to inventory shrink levels – in other words, shrink reduction is part of their goals, objectives or performance measures. Just 10.3% reported that they were not.

"Retailers surveyed by the NRF said Covid-19 has worsened the risk of crime, partly because labor shortages have made it difficult to fully staff stores," WSJ said. "Moreover, supply-chain shortages made certain products more susceptible to theft because they fetched high value in secondary markets."

"Can you imagine a more predictable outcome from the pandemic policies we enacted to fight COVID-19?" Not the Bee asks. "We threw our entire way of life — our economy, our organizations, our social structures, our education — into a complete and total tailspin."

"Shrink can have a substantial impact on already thin retail margins. Target said that the rise in shrink, including theft, reduced its gross profit by more than \$400 million in the first three quarters of its fiscal year, compared with a year prior. For the full fiscal year, it estimates that its gross profit will take a \$600 million hit."

"Although shrink is a perennial problem in retail, it really took off when the pandemic hit. In the five years leading up to 2019, retail shrink grew at a compound annual growth rate of roughly 7%, according to data from the NRF," WSJ said. "In 2020, it jumped 47%, and rose another 4% on top of that huge jump in 2021. Some retailers, including Ulta Beauty and Target, have said that shrink has gotten worse again this year. 'When times get tough, shrink goes up,' Ulta Beauty Chief Financial Officer Scott Settersten said on the company's earnings call on Dec. 1. 'We've seen that in retail over a long period of time.''

And who will pay for these increasing retail costs? "Retailers will ultimately pay for shrink risk in some form or another—either on the top line if they want to keep stores completely accessible or on the bottom line if they spend heavily on labor and mitigation measures," WSJ said. "Finding the right balance will be key to preserving brick-and-mortar businesses."

And if you wonder why toothpaste, shaving cream and laundry detergent is under lock and key at many stores, it is a theft mitigation measure, according to retailers.

California's nonpartisan Public Policy Institute of California released a report that found a direct correlation between Proposition 47 and a marked increase in larceny thefts across California, despite many media reports attempting to refute the correlation, the Globe reported. As for any legislative support from the California Legislature, don't hold your breath:

The California **Assembly Public Safety Committee** heard and killed **Assembly Bill 1599** by Assemblyman Kevin Kiley (R-Granite Bay) in March, which sought to repeal Proposition 47, and "make crime illegal again."

"Retail theft losses may be the straw that breaks the camel's back," said Julian Canete, President and CEO of the California Hispanic Chambers of Commerce. "Something needs to be done before mom and pop stores are stolen from our communities." ★

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
