

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The dew was still on the ground and the sun barely above the horizon when the first trucks started pulling into the Gridley fairgrounds. They drove down the fairway bumper to bumper, exhaust mixing with the early morning air.

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley City Council Members had the opportunity to meet newly hired and promoted employees as part of their agenda at the September 19th City Council Meeting.

Gridley Police Chief Rodney Harr opened the meeting with the introduction of three new Gridley Police Department Employees: Officer Jason Geiringer, Community Service Officer Katie Hill and newly promoted Sergeant Adam Ruesser.

The council moved through the consent agenda, approving it with a 5-0 vote. Items included the minutes from the September 6th City Council Meeting and the second reading and adoption of Ordinance 841-2022: An Ordinance to Rezone Approximately 70-Acres from Heavy Industrial (M-2) to Heavy Industrial (M-2), Open Space (OS), and Public-Quasi-Public (PQP) located in the Gridley Industrial Park Complex (APN 021-240-027, -042), by reading of title only.

Edler Estates returned to the agenda as discussion Item 3. Tabled from the September 6th agenda, public discussion on Edler Estates was left open and the item added to the September 19th agenda due to issues pertaining to the detention basin and alternatives for excessive stormwater being directed to the nearby Reclamation District 833 canal that boarders the development's site. A second issue questioned the ownership of the canal and whether Reclamation District 833 (RD 833) owned it outright or if it was an easement. After further study, recently recorded documents reviewed by the planning commission show that the property the canal lies on is in fact owned by RD 833 and is not an easement.

Future developments planned in the vicinity of the Edler Estates project would enter into a tentative agreement wherein they would use a combined detention basin and collectively discharge storm water runoff into the RD 833 canal at an appropriate rate established between the City Engineer and the Reclamation District. A second solution would be that Edler Estates dedicate one or more of its 46 lots to accommodate a retention basin that drains directly into RD 833 canals.

With that, discussion on the project moved forward. Edler Estates is a 46-lot development on 8.49 acres located west of the Gridley



Concert Brings Varied Instruments to Life | Gridley City Council Review

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - What do a cup, a typewriter, and spoons have in common? The resounding answer from the Sutter Buttes Family Orchestra is, "They make music!" The orchestra used its latest concert to demonstrate that music is all around us and can be created with things as different as a washboard, a blade of grass, and a jug.

The concert began as trumpet player Jonathan Quine played the conch shell, with David Townsend following up on the gong. Carol Brown, orchestra conductor, explained that the conch shell was used by the Aztecs, and the gong goes back to the Bronze

The Johnson Grass Band played their energetic bluegrass music with Mark Johnson and John Paul Bowers on the banjo, Jenny Johnson on the fiddle, and Brad Nelson on the guitar. They sang "Wagon Wheel (Rock Me Mama)" a song co-written by Bob Dylan.

Marysa Taylor, a music major at Chico State, sang "When I'm Gone," the cup song made famous by the movie "Pitch Perfect." Dave Townsend accompanied her with the intricate cup rhythm. Townsend also played the typewriter in the "Typewriter Concerto," as the orchestra accompanied him.

Orchestra members took turns explaining the uniqueness of their instruments, from the whistle in the percussion section to the bassoon in the woodwind section. Daniel Crispino, another music

major at Chico State, demonstrated jazz and ukulele music.

Council then considered agenda item 4: Award of Project Proposal for 2018 CDBG-DR Multifamily Housing Program – Orchard View Apartments II.

As a result of the 2018 Camp Fire and a severe shortage of affordable housing in the area, Gridley was the recipient of a \$2.3 million Community Development Block Grant (BDBG) to assist with the creation of additional family housing. The City of Gridley has been working with the organization Housing Tools to bring developments that fall within the stipulations of that grant to Gridley.

Orchard Apartments II was the only application received by the City through the partnership with Housing Tools and would be separate from Orchard View Apartments I. Orchard View II would be located adjacent to the Orchard View I development, between Evelyn and Archer Ave along Highway 99. Orchard View II's complex would be comprised of four, two-story buildings with a total of 36-units ranging from two-bedroom to four-bedroom units. The CDBG would cover the costs of the development, which currently sits at \$2,034,932.00. Council voted in favor of the proposal 5-0.

Moving on to the last agenda Item, council considered amending the cooperative agreement among groundwater sustainability agencies in the Butte subbasin. Council voted 5-0 to approve the agreement.

Council then reviewed committee assignments and went into closed session.

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

Nutrition Myths

Dear Readers,

A country song once declared, "It's easier to sell a lie than to give the truth away." I sometimes feel that way about nutrition education. There seems to be more misinformation about nutrition now than ever before. Here are some interesting nutrition myths that you may have heard in the past.

- 1. Celery has negative calories because it takes more calories to digest than the calories that are in it. While celery is low in calories, there is no food with negative calories. The calories needed to digest a portion of food are not deducted from the calories contained in the food.
- 2. Certain foods are bad for you. Ben Franklin once said, "Beer is proof that God loves us and wants us to be happy." No food is inherently bad for you. It's the amount of a particular food that may become a problem. If you eat potato chips every day, that's not good for you. We have to get out of 'black and white' thinking when it comes to food.
- 3. Sea salt is better than table salt. In a survey conducted by the American Heart Association, 61% believe sea salt is a lower sodium alternative to table salt. Both sea salt and table salt contain the same amount of sodium, about 40% by weight. The bottom line is there is no nutritional advantage to choosing sea salt over table salt.

- 4. Butter is better for you than margarine. At one time, margarine contained trans fats, but these are no longer used in the US. Butter is an animal product that contains saturated fat. A diet high in saturated fat increases cholesterol levels, increasing heart disease risk. Choose margarine.
- 5. Cheese causes constipation. This folklore has been passed down for generations. While I only found one study on this topic, cheese was not proven to affect the bowel habits of those who ate it compared to those who did not. [1]
- 6. Certain foods increase your metabolism. Research shows that while certain foods may have minor effects on your metabolism, it is not enough to affect weight loss.
- 7. Certain foods help to remove belly fat. A study discovered that soluble fiber reduced visceral fat, the fat stored in the abdominal cavity. However, it did not reduce subcutaneous fat, the fat underneath the skin. [2] Claims that certain foods reduce belly fat are often the same claims for overall weight loss. When losing weight, you simply cannot "spot-reduce."

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
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




Exit Drills in the Home





Tax-the-Rich Dynamics are Different this Time

There's a ditty that captures Californians' attitudes about taxes: "Don't tax you, don't tax me, tax the fellow behind the tree."

It explains why California voters are usually willing to impose new taxes on the state's most affluent residents and why the state has, by far, the highest income tax rates of any state, topping out at 13.3%.

In this century, the syndrome has been evident in three elections, beginning in 2004 when Darrell Steinberg, then a state legislator and now mayor of Sacramento, and mental health advocacy groups proposed boosting the tax returns. rate on incomes over \$1 million by one percentage point to expand services to the mentally ill.

Eight years later, in 2012, Gov. Jerry Brown sponsored a ballot measure that added four new tax rate brackets on incomes over \$250,000 for seven years, saying the proceeds, about \$6 billion a year, were needed to keep the state budget solvent.

Four years later, a coalition of public employee unions and program advocacy groups backed another measure to extend Brown's temporary increase until 2030.

All were successful, in people who would pay the additional taxes didn't mount any opposition campaigns.

Once again, California voters are being asked to impose more taxes on high-income taxpayers, but this time, the dynamics are markedly different.

Proposition 30, primarily sponsored by the Lyft ride service company but with support from environmental and health groups, would raise the rate on incomes of \$2 million or more by 1.75 percentage points, pushing California's top rate to just over 15%. Proceeds would support climate change resistance efforts.

This time, however, wealthy Californians are donating heavily to a campaign against the measure. At least one reason might be that under a 2017 federal tax overhaul, they can no longer deduct state and local taxes (SALT) over \$10,000 on their federal tax

In effect, that means that California's high-income taxpayers now feel the full brunt of state tax increases. The SALT cap also encourages some of the state's wealthy to leave California for low- or no-income tax states such as neighboring Nevada, Texas or Florida electric car tycoon Elon Musk most spectacularly.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and other Democratic politicians have been trying to scrap the SALT deduction limit on behalf of California and other high-tax states, such as New York, but so far have failed.

This week saw another part because the wealthy unusual wrinkle in the perpetual efforts to increase taxes on the wealthy: The campaign against Proposition 30 is broadcasting an ad in which Gov. Gavin Newsom denounces the measure, citing Lyft's sponsorship.

> "Don't be fooled. Prop 30's been advertised as a climate initiative," Newsom says. "But in reality, it was devised by a single corporation to funnel state income taxes to benefit their company. Put simply, Prop 30 is a trojan horse that puts corporate welfare above the fiscal welfare of our entire state."

> It bolsters the opposition campaign's contention that Lyft wants the new money for climate change programs because it would subsidize a state mandate that it and other ride companies convert their fleets to zero emission vehicles.

> Newsom's opposition is just one of the strange bedfellows makeup of campaigns for and against Proposition 30. His Democratic Party has endorsed the measure, as have groups that have been Newsom allies on climate change. But the California Teachers Association joins him in opposition, improbably aligned with the state Republican Party and antitax groups.

This time around, therefore, one cannot say that raising taxes on the rich will be an easy sell.



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

The Fed is Likely Far From Done

Sounding like a broken record, the markets continue to convulse over the threat of inflation and the interest rate increases the Federal Reserve is implementing to harness it.

Raising interest rates by .75% yet again last week, this is the first time in history three .75% increases have occurred in a row. Historically, three increases in rapid succession have caused markets to crater and has given rise to the "three steps and a stumble" adage.

Federal Reserve (FED) Chief Jerome Powell, besides jacking the interest rate again, also had some fairly hawkish statements about future actions by the FED to address the inflationary fires that continue to scorch consumer pocketbooks.

Powell indicated he is not going to back off the economic brakes even if it means breaking the back of the American consumer by reducing credit and withdrawing money from the economic system.

This all translates to the ugly truth that Powell must in a sense destroy the economy

One could liken it to a bad tasting medicine to cure a sickness, but what the FED has to do is more like chemo.

Yes, it's likely to be that bad.

As an analyst that has been studying economics since the early 1970's, I have witnessed many things. I must admit, there is very little I see in this whole inflation thing that gives me much solace.

Caught in a predicament mostly of their own making, the inflation were seeing today is the result of massive government deficit spending for the last 7 decades. In the last 3 years the spending has been particularly zealous. CoVid shutdowns didn't help the supply side of things

That fact remains you can't just print up trillions of paper dollars and hand them out willy-nilly and not cause inflation. And the more you do it, the higher inflation goes.

Currency created inflation is like a camp fire. Printing up money might keep the economy warm, just don't let it get out of control or there's hell to pay.

Well, welcome to hell.

Now the FED must crush consumer demand to stamp out rising prices. Crush demand and you crush inflation. Crushing demand however means crushing the consumer. Well, unfortunately, that's the point. Powell has to do exactly that to quell inflation and many elected officials like Warren don't understand that.

What Powell knows that Warren and others like her don't understand is that the hardship caused by inflation would cause much more harm if left unattended compared to the pain Powell will inflict with the economic tightening he has now undertaken. On the defensive side of the ball for the Wolverines, senior defensive lineman Johnny Williams is the team leader with three sacks on the season. Harrison is 100% committed to the community and school in Biggs.

"It's my place to make young men in the Biggs community better people," Harrison said.

He added that it's important to him that his team takes pride from where they are from.




