## Training for Fire Season

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Last week, CALFIRE Butte County/Gridley Fire Department took the opportunity to orient one newer battalion member and one member finishing their specialized task book with some of their equipment.

During the exercise Engineer Kim Nolan and Truck Operator in training Perry Nunez got hands-on experience running water from a hydrant to Gridley's Ladder Truck 74.

A total of five firefighters were present during the exercise, which was conducted behind the Dollar General store in the Gridley Heritage Oak Shopping Center so that the public was not alarmed by the presence of CALFIRE equipment.

At no time was there any fire, but the exercise had Nolan and Nunez accessing a hydrant, running hose from the hydrant to Engine 74, which in this case acted as a pump, funneling a steady stream of water to

Ladder Truck 74. According to CALFIRE Butte County/Gridley Fire Department Captain Mike Conaty, the exercise, specifically running water through the Engine to the Ladder Truck, was not something that the Engineers and Truck Operators had the opportunity to experience hands-on in the academy.

**Funding Secured for Projects in the North State** California State

Assembly and Senate News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -On July 14, Republican Senator Jim Nielsen (Red Bluff) and Assembly Republican Leader James Gallagher (Yuba City) announced helping secure millions of dollars in the state budget to help fund one-time projects for the

North State. "Sometimes the Legislature gets it right when there is bipartisan cooperation. This funding is critical to help rebuild and heal the Paradise community," said Senator Nielsen.

"Every year we push for the budget to prioritize vital infrastructure needs. Though I wish the main budget bill spent your dollars more wisely, I am proud that we were able to obtain this funding for much needed projects in our region," said Assemblyman Gallagher.

A total of \$9.3 million was secured by the lawmakers for the Town of Paradise to help operate and maintain public roads. This funding will replace lost gas tax revenue caused by population losses and allow the Town to repair roads over the next eight years as it continues to grow and recover.

"With gas tax allocated by population, we knew we were in trouble after the Camp Fire. We need to be able to fix potholes, and we need our gas tax funds to pay for it" said Paradise Mayor Steve Crowder. "We are lucky to have great state legislators that really came through for us."

Additionally, Nielsen and Gallagher successfully advocated for a \$1 million allocation that will help protect residents, businesses, and prime farmland from flooding in Sutter County. The funding will help Reclamation District No. 1001 construct an important flood control facility that is critical for public safety.

James Hudson, Board of Trustees President of the Reclamation District offered the following comments, "Thank you Senator Nielsen and Assembly Republican Leader Continued on page 3

The June 24 flight (or landing) ended the wet film development process at the base; it started in 1952. So like the rest of us, photos have gone digital.

# New Competitive Stills at the Butte County Fair!

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - The Butte County Fair has added new divisions to their Competitive Stills Departments.

The additions of new divisions within the Stills Department focus on youth and family-centric entries and aims to renew interest in fair competition by broadening competitive categories. These new categories include Youth Digital Media, Generational Traditions, and a new department within the photography division called "Butte County Scenes."

The Butte County Fair website describes the new Generational Traditions Department, as "a department especially designed to give those families that are handing down family traditions and skills a place to shine!" There must be a separation between participants of at least one generation, 15 years apart in age, and the projects can include something that was worked on together or separately to make a complimentary product. For example, Grandpa and Grandson both create a candle stick separately that make a matching pair. Photos to document the project are part of the entry requirements.

Sub-Categories within this division include Original Build, Projects Upcycled, Projects Repaired, and Projects Restored. Evelyn Denk Fiscus, Competitive Stills Coordinator and Marketing Associate, shares that this is about "creating a space for people to show off their work and what they do, what their families are about." She adds that it is about highlighting and encouraging them to continue those family traditions that are so important in our area.

Also new this year is the Youth Media Department, broken into classes 18 and under and 14 and under. This new division, which has 4 sub-divisions is exclusively for youth and is designed for those creating digital art or videos. "My goal," says Denk Fiscus, "is to get kids reinvested in the tradition of fair, so you have to provide them categories with things they like to do now."

The divisions within this new department include Digital Media Instructional Videos (individual or group), Digital Media Original or Cover Live Action

Entertainment Video (individual or group), Digital Media Original or Cover Music Entertainment Video (individual or group) and Digital Arts (individual or group) – which would be anything presented in a physical form but created digitally, including a digital illustration, 3-D arts, etc. The Butte County Fair plans to showcase the video works in a specially constructed theatre. More details to come on that as the fair gets closer

A new division within the Photography Department has been added called "Butte County Scenes." Photos must be identifiable scenes from around Butte County. "We have so many parks and historic places to see and experience, and this department is tailor made to celebrate it all," says the Butte County Fair website.

Deadline for entries is approaching quickly. For the above new divisions, entries must register by midnight, Sunday, August 7th.

across the pool without tipping them over.


Overall, it was a great time for the 11

This equipment includes but is not limited to spreaders and cutters, often referred to as the 'jaws of life' and what is called 'cribbing' or bundles comprised of blocks of wood that help raise and steady objects - used frequently during emergency responses to accidents. The size of Ladder Truck 74 allows it the ability to carry both more of this life-saving

equipment and much larger versions of it, where an Engine is limited by space.

CALFIRE Butte Unit is constantly training and keeping their skills fresh, doing so through smaller exercises such as this and larger, sometimes week-long mandated trainings by the CALFIRE organization. This exercise wrapped up quickly and the unit returned to regular duty.

## **Biggs City Administrator Hired by City of Chico**

BIGGS, CA (MPG) - The City of Biggs has recently lost what many believe to have been a huge asset to their city, former Biggs City Administrator Mark Sorensen.

In a press release from the City of Chico, it says, "For the past ten years, Mark Sorensen has served as the City Administrator, Finance Director, Utility Director, and Risk Manager for the City of Biggs. Serving as the Administrator, Mark also became the CEO for an incorporated city, managing utilities which included electric, water, sewer, and solid waste. Mark brings hands-on experience with community outreach, budget management, code enforcement, streets,

parks, and intergovernmental relations."

Sorensen hails from Chico but has dedicated his skills and services to the City of Biggs while holding office. Sorensen made a statement in the City of Chico's press release, saying "My past experiences in local government have tested and proven my leadership qualities, and how I handle difficult and challenging situations. I am very well prepared and look forward to finding solutions to the challenges that lie ahead serving as the City Manager of my hometown."

Biggs City Councilman Brian Bassett publicly posted this statement about Sorensen on Facebook when it was announced that Sorensen had been selected by the City of

Chico for the position of City Manager: "Biggs has been so fortunate to have had Mark as our administrator for the last decade. Mark has been very instrumental in keeping Biggs financially solvent while other towns around us have struggled. He was also successful in securing multiple grants that have let us upgrade our parks, sewer lines, and bringing in a multimillion-dollar wastewater treatment plant. Mark's commitment and love for this City will make him very hard to replace." He continues, "we as a council are working to find a suitable interim administrator until we hire a permanent one. This is going to be a tough task for us. Mark will leave some big shoes

Continued from page 1 Gallagher for your advocacy and leadership in securing the necessary funds to help mitigate unanticipated increases in Reclamation District 1001's local cost share requirements for an auxiliary pump station that provides critical flood control functions. Reclamation District 1001 is responsible for operation and maintenance of the levees and pump facilities which provide flood protection to the residents, businesses, and farmland in Nicolaus, Verona and Rio Oso, CA. The allocated funding will allow us to move forward with the construction of the pump station, which is vital for public safety and to protect the residents, businesses, and prime

agriculture in Sutter County."

Lastly, the Senator and Assemblyman worked with Butte County Supervisor Tod Kimmelshue to obtain \$300,000 in state funding that will be used to upgrade facilities at the Butte County Fairgrounds in Gridley.

- During the early morning hours of July 7, 2022, Agents from the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force (BINTF) were conducting surveillance of Michael Alan Kunde in the City of Gridley.

Mr. Kunde, a 42-yearold Gridley resident, is currently on Searchable Probation through Sutter County Superior Court for a drug related offense.

During the surveillance, Mr. Kunde left the City of Gridley, driving northbound on Highway 99 in his vehicle. As he approached the City of Chico, he was observed to be in violation of traffic laws. Coupled with his probation status, Agents directed a Butte County Sheriff's Deputy to conduct a traffic stop on Mr. Kunde and his vehicle. The traffic stop occurred on

Highway 99 in south Chico. Pursuant to conditions of his probation, Agents searched Mr. Kunde and the vehicle he was operating. In the passenger compartment, approximately 200 suspected Fentanyl pills were arrested for Possession of Methamphetamine and Drug Paraphernalia (11377 HS; 11364 HS). 

#### **USDA News Release**

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Climate change threatens communities around the world with the promise of more floods, drought, extreme heat, hurricanes – and wildfire. As these events increase in frequency, they will add new pressures to the federal budget.

The Forest Service has already taken proactive steps to mitigate some of these impacts. The agency recently established a Wildfire Crisis Strategy to increase hazardous fuels and forest health treatments up to four times in the West. The agency estimates that a total of 50 million acres nationwide - in addition to what it currently treats each year – need similar treatments. Of those 50 million acres, 20 million are on national forests and grasslands.

Agency scientists quantified how climate change might impact the frequency and intensity of wildfires on federal lands – as well as the amount of money needed to suppress them.

The result? According to Senior Research Forester and Project Leader Jeff Prestemon, who led the Forest Service team charged with conducting the analysis, "The wildfire area burned is expected to more than triple in the next 80 years."

He also confirmed that the anticipated increase in wildfires will require more money to suppress and manage.

"Fire suppression spending will likely nearly double by the end of the censpending is projected to rise by 90% – or previously burned.


\$1.8 billion – by 2100."

Prestemon added that the projected study results are based upon assumptions that could potentially change the anticipated outcomes. "For example, our modeling accounts for how climate has changed fire and fuels management of the past," he said. "However, it doesn't take into consideration future changes in fuels management strategies by agencies."

The study results could be considered an assessment of what could happen if federal wildfire management does not change appreciably. Aggressive, proactive changes in how fuels are treated, such as those outlined in the Forest Service's Wildfire Crisis Strategy, could make a difference.

"This study revealed the importance of uncovering how changes in our wildfire management strategies could lead to overall better wildfire outcomes in America," said Prestemon. "The science could help us move our forests towards conditions where levels of wildfire and suppression spending are more ecologically and economically sustainable."

The report builds upon similar work done in 2016. As in 2016, the team developed wildfire models at regional scales based on historic climate and wildfire data. This year the team also built a set of ten climate projections to the year 2100 that included variables such as historic and projected future temperature, humidity, and precipitation. My 73-year-old mother was recently diagnosed with macular degeneration. I have read that nutrition is a part of the treatment for this condition. Can you explain more about this, please?

Thanks to developments in research, there are better ways to treat age-related macular degeneration (AMD) today than twenty years ago. Currently, about eleven million Americans suffer from AMD, and that number is expected to double to twenty-two million by the year 2050 (1). Treatment may include surgery, nutrition, and medication.

The macula is the central part of the retina in your eye. It allows 20/20 vision and the ability to see color. One of the earliest symptoms of macular degeneration is blurred vision. As AMD progresses, the macula breaks down and, if left untreated, may lead to blindness.

The top 5 risk factors for AMD include:

- Age AMD occurs more frequently in people over the age of sixty years.
- Smoking
- Family history of AMD
- Obesity Body Mass Index (BMI) of 30 or higher
- High blood pressure

While some studies suggest the consumption of leafy green vegetables and fatty fish may help prevent the disease, the most reliable research has been performed on those who already have AMD.

The Age-Related Eye Disease Studies (AREDS) and AREDS2 evaluated the effects of high doses of certain nutrients on the progression of AMD. AREDS2 modified the supplement derived from the first study and

came up with the following: 500 mg vitamin C, 400 IU vitamin E, 80 mg zinc, 2 mg copper, 10 mg lutein, and 2 mg zeaxanthin. This combination reduced the risk of advanced AMD and its associated vision loss (2).

While many of these nutrients can be obtained in your diet, consuming the amount needed daily to treat macular degeneration would be virtually impossible. Talk to your doctor and follow their instructions.

The nutrients in the following foods may help fight AMD:

- Vitamin C citrus fruits, such as oranges, grapefruit, clementines, lemons, and strawberries
- Vitamin E sunflower seeds, almonds, peanuts, and some plant oils
- Zinc oysters, beef, fortified cereal, and Alaskan King crab
- Copper shellfish, nuts, seeds, wheat bran cereal, and chocolate—yes, chocolate!!
- Lutein and zeaxanthin are antioxidants that protect the eye from damaging sunlight. They are plentiful in leafy green vegetables, such as kale, spinach, and turnip greens. Higher amounts are obtained in their cooked form simply because these vegetables cook down, and there is more food in one cup of cooked spinach versus one cup raw. Cooking also makes it easier for the body to absorb these nutrients. One more fundamental reason to eat your veggies!

Jesus allowed His life to be offered up





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## CA Assembly Requests Action by the Governor to Protect the Trucking Industry

Assembly Republicans News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, July 5, Assembly Republicans sent a letter to Governor Gavin Newsom, urging him to delay implementation of AB 5 or exempt independent truckers entirely from its employee reclassification (ABC) test. The Supreme Court declined to hear a case on June 30th that would have challenged the new law, now putting

AB 5 on the fast-track for going into effect in California.

"California's and the nation's economy in part depends on our ability to move products through our ports. The employment standards that AB 5 sets for independent truckers puts more undue stress on our economy and will increase shipping costs, driving inflation even higher. We are trying to prevent our already strained supply chain from getting worse, and if there are cuts to the trucking

workforce, this will hurt both businesses and consumers."

"The sad reality is that the devastating ramifications of this ruling will be felt most among minority truck owners - my constituents. Not only will the rollout of AB 5 hamper minority truck owners in their goal to achieve the American Dream, but it will also force our owner-operator fleets to give up their independence and

ability to work on their own terms. Many of the signatories of this letter argued strongly against AB 5 on these grounds. While I respect the Supreme Court's decision, this issue falls upon the failures of our state to prevent unintended consequences of rash policy decisions, such as AB 5."

The letter calls on Governor Newsom to use his executive powers to either delay application of AB 5 or exempt the trucking industry altogether from the ABC test, which determines whether a worker is an employee or an independent contractor. By not taking action, the Governor would be eliminating 20 percent of California's vital supply

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# Oroville Man Arraigned on 2 Separate Shootings

Butte County DA News Release

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - An Oroville man was in Butte County Superior Court on July 6 and was arraigned on two separate shootings caught on surveillance cameras in May and June of this year in the Oroville area.

Jason Allen Kraft, 36, of Oroville, was arraigned on two counts of assault with a semi-automatic handgun, two counts of possession of a firearm by a felon, and a count of causing great bodily injury with a firearm. At the request of the District Attorney, Kraft was held in Butte County Jail on \$375,000 bail pending his next arraignment date on July 13, 2022.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the June 22 shooting occurred at approximately 10:40 p.m. near the intersection of Olive Highway and Lower Wyandotte Road. Bobby Rogers, 41, of Oroville, was riding an ATV in the area when he was shot once in the back. He was taken to a local hospital where he underwent emergency surgery and was subsequently released with a bullet still in his body.

The Oroville police collected surveillance tapes from local businesses in the area and one of them was released to local media on July 1, which lead to a tip identifying Kraft as the shooter. The next day, July 2, Kraft was spotted by Oroville police in Oroville, and after a short foot pursuit was arrested for the Rogers' shooting. During a search of the pathway used by Kraft, police found a semi-automatic "ghost gun", consistent with the caliber believed used in the Rogers' shooting.

Ramsey said the investigation also led to Kraft being identified as a suspect in a May 11, 2022, shooting at approximately 8:10 p.m. at an Oroville carwash in the 3400 block of Orange Avenue. Surveillance footage of that shooting showed a car being chased by another car come into the parking lot of the carwash and attempt to hide behind the carwash. A man later identified as Kraft came out on foot from the chasing car and fired two shots at the chased car. The man then got back into the vehicle and fled the area.

Ramsey said the police are still looking for the victim of that shooting. Casings found at the carwash shooting were consistent with the caliber of the Roger's ATV shooting and with the ghost gun found near Kraft's arrest, as well as ammunition and gun supplies found in Kraft's home during a search warrant.

# Oroville Man Charged with Sexual Assault of Four-Year-Old

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - A 40-year-old Oroville man was in Butte County Superior Court on July 13th to face charges connected to the sexual assault of a four-year-old girl.

Dwayne Michael Fien, 40, of Oroville, was to be arraigned and enter a plea on two felony counts of sexual assault, but his public defender asked for a one-week continuance to next week.


Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the charges stem from the weekend of June 11, 2022 when Fien was caring for the girl at his home in Oroville, as a favor to a single mother. After the weekend ended and the child returned home with her mother, the young girl disclosed that Fien had sexually assaulted her and told her to keep it a secret.

Ramsey said the charges carry a maximum sentence of 33-years-to-life in prison. Fein remains in custody on \$1,050,000 bail pending his next court appearance.

The investigation is ongoing, and the Butte County District Attorney's Office and Sheriff's Office is asking anyone with additional information about Fien or this investigation to contact Detective Mariah Smith at 530-538-7671.



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
