Lost in a Blaze

Historic Diamond Walnut Factory Left in Rubbles

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Last Friday, thick, black clouds of smoke rose above Live Oak, raining down large chunks of ash over the city as the Diamond Walnut Factory went up in a massive blaze.

According to reports, just before 8:00 am Friday, February 4th, the Sutter County Fire Department responded to multiple calls reporting a fire at the Diamond Walnut Factory—the multi-storied, 10,000 square foot building located to the west of Highway 99 in the heart of Live Oak. Upon arrival, Sutter County Fire crews found the large commercial structure engulfed in

flames and requested back up. Multiple firefighting agencies from surrounding counties responded to the Diamond Fire, including outside agencies such as CHP, Caltrans, Sutter County Sheriff's Department, Cal OES, and PG&E.

The quickly growing blaze shut down Highway 99 in both directions for hours, including the Union Pacific Railway, which runs parallel to the large commercial structure on its west side. Residents in the surrounding areas were immediately evacuated as the historic building,

believed to have been built in 1920, was rapidly destroyed by fire.

Live Oak Resident and photographer, Kyle Taylor, was on scene shortly after the blaze began and caught stunning images of the fire while witnessing its progression. He says that upon his arrival,

Dahle Announces His Run for Governor

"California is an amazing and beautiful state, but it is being run into the ground by Sacramento politicians. I am dedicated to restoring the California promise for ordinary families."

Caltrans Seeks Community Feedback on Proposed Hwy 70/99 Projects

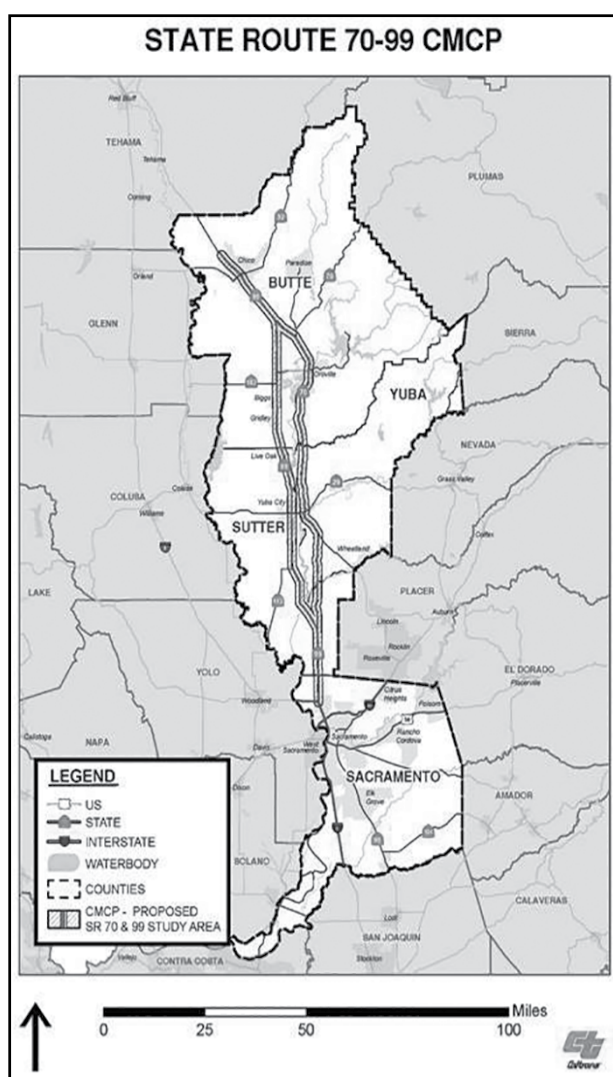

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Caltrans District 3 is once again soliciting valuable feedback from community members on proposed projects to improve travel on the State Route 70 and State Route 99 corridors between Butte and Sacramento counties.

Caltrans has been working to develop the State Routes 70-99 Comprehensive Multimodal Corridor Plan (CMCP) in coordination with corridor partners, including local governments, community groups and transportation planning agencies in Butte, Sutter, Yuba and Sacramento counties since September 2020.

Survey feedback from community members and local stakeholders gathered in September 2021 has assisted Caltrans in developing a list of 80 proposed highway improvement projects for the corridor such as new freeway interchanges, expanding park and ride capacity, designated bicycle lanes and pedestrian walkways, and additional highway lanes or turn lanes. Improvements are also proposed for State Route 149 between Chico and Oroville.

The proposed projects are aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions and improving livability in the community through operational improvements, technological advancements and increased multimodal options such as bike and pedestrian facilities, local



and express bus routes and passenger rail. Caltrans would appreciate public feedback on the list of corridor projects by February 15, 2022. Information on the plan and projects is now available for review at www.Hwy70-99CorridorPlan.com.

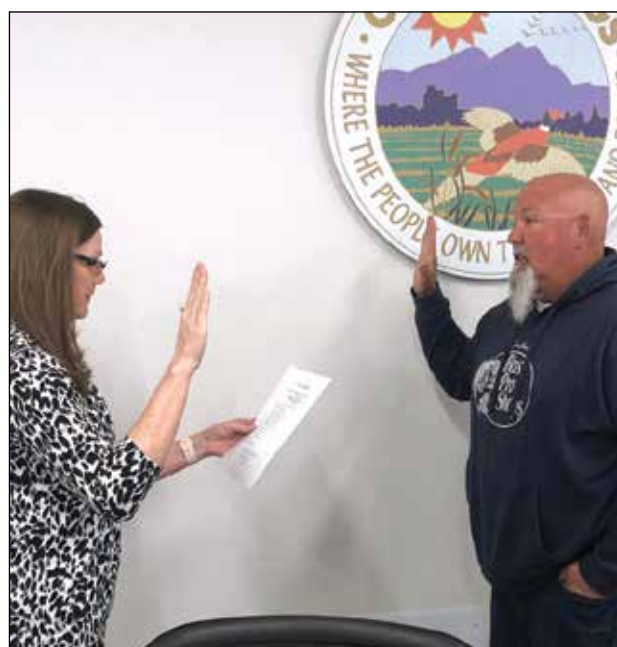

Stapleton-Spence Closes

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - According to our sources, on Friday, January 28th, employees at Stapleton-Spence Packing in Gridley were notified that the plant would permanently close immediately.

According to their website, stapleton-spence.com, “Stapleton-Spence is a family-run business, producing quality locally grown products which are packed or bottled, private labeled, and distributed at competitive prices—since 1951. Stapleton’s is known as the largest packer of private label canned prunes in the Foodservice industry, preserving prunes with heat and not chemical preservatives.”

The plant, located just north of Gridley on Highway 99, supposedly employed 75 permanent employees along with an unknown number of temporary employees. In addition to being hit hard by COVID-19, our sources allege that the

facility was grossly mis-managed and has been in continuous water pollution management violation for a decade.

We reached out to CEO of Stapleton-Spence, Ed Bidanset, for more information on the matter and he declined to comment. ★

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - According to National Geographic, in ancient Rome a pagan fertility celebration happened on the ides of February (February 15) *Lupercalia*. Goats and dogs were sacrificed and skinned by naked men. With the aid of drunkenness, the men would find women, swat them with the strips of skin to encourage fertility. This holiday *Lupercalia* was so popular that it continued for 150 years after the Roman Empire legalized Christianity.

The church and literature created a time of celebration that combined the martyr, fertility and romance in various ways. In the fifth century the church declared that a saint had been tortured and died on February 14, and thus the day became a saint's day honoring the martyrdom of St Valentine. This effort helped to give the people a holy and less raucous day of celebration. Throw into that mix a thousand years later the writing of Geoffrey

Chaucer who declared St Valentine Day a time of romantic celebration in his 1375 poem “Parliament of Fowles.” This idea came from France and England where February 14 was the beginning of the mating season for birds.

These ideas remained present for many people through the ages. Then love notes began to be exchanged that included birds, hearts, yearning and desire. This all continued in Europe in various ways. In the 18th Century it became quite common to exchange notes and tokens of affection. By the 1900s with postage being cheap in the US, Valentine cards began to be mass produced.

However, this began back in the fog of time – the sentiment of caring and love cannot be ignored. Gold Sox Legend Tommy Everidge Back in The Bigs!

MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG) - Former Yuba-Sutter Gold Sox standout Tommy Everidge was named to the major league coaching staff of the Oakland Athletics last week marking his second trip to the major leagues with the Athletics.

Everidge, who played with the Gold Sox in 2003 and 2004 was drafted by Oakland in the 10th round of the 2004 Major League Baseball draft out of Sonoma State University.

In 2009 Everidge made his MLB debut with the Athletics, a year in which he hit .224 with 2 home runs and 7 RBI in 24 games. That year Everidge, along with his former Gold Sox teammate Dallas Braden, marked the 1st time that two former Gold Sox players were on the same MLB roster.

Everidge has spent the last 8 years in the A's minor league system as a hitting coach, a role that he will continue to serve in at the

Arsonist Sentenced to Over 12 Years in State Prison

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A Robinson Mill man who had pled no contest to setting a series of fires over two days in the summer of 2021 was in Butte County Superior Court and was sentenced to over 12 years in state prison.

Guy Daniel Dalrymple, 48, of Robinson Mill had been charged with setting seven small fires over the course of two days (June 16 and 17, 2021) in the Robinson Mill area of Butte County, with an enhancement for committing those arsons while the area was under a state of emergency due to drought conditions and high fire danger.

Dalrymple pled no contest to one count of arson for each day on which he

set the fires and agreed to serve the maximum time allowed of 11 years, 4 months, in state prison for those charges. He was also ordered to serve an additional year for an earlier theft of a motor vehicle for which he was already on probation, for a total of 12 years, 4 months.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said that at approximately 3:40 a.m. on June 16, 2021, a logging truck driver spotted a 10 by 10-foot fire on the side of Forbestown Road, near Old Olive Highway. The truck driver reported the fire and was able to extinguish it. The fire was later determined to have been arson and witnesses tied Dalrymple to setting it.

Ramsey said the next day, on June 17, 2021, at approximately 11:30 p.m.,

residents in the area of Fire Camp Road reported a glow, then later a vegetation fire on both sides of Fire Camp Road. When Cal Fire personnel arrived, the fire had grown to one to two acres before they put it out. A yellow riding lawn mower, with no mower attachment, was located near the fire. Dalrymple was known to travel the area on that riding lawn mower and was seen in the area.

Ramsey credited the area residents as well as the truck driver for watching out for one another and for following the advisement “see something, say something.” The district attorney added that the community was very lucky, given the conditions those days, that the fires did not get out of control. ★



Up to 100,000 visitors Expected for Return of World AG Expo in Tulare

One of California’s premiere agricultural events will reopen to live attendance this year after being held virtually in 2021 due to the pandemic. The 54th edition of the famed World Ag Expo in Tulare County is expected to draw as many as 100,000 attendees from 60 countries. The expo takes place Feb. 8-10 at the International Agri-Center in Tulare, in the heart of a four-county region that produces \$23 billion in annual farm output. The expo will feature more than 1,200 exhibitors.

New Vineyard Rate Leveling Off After Winegrape Market Glut

California winegrape growers are expected to plant 15,000 to 18,000 acres of new vineyards in 2022. That number is about the same as what is expected to be removed from the state’s more than 500,000 acres of winegrapes. California produced more than 4 million tons of winegrapes a year between 2016 and 2019. That caused a glut in the market. Now Allied Grape Growers president Jeff Bitter characterizes the market as “stable with a chance of oversupply.”

Water Supply Cuts From Scott, Shasta Rivers Worry Farmers

Farmers and ranchers in the Scott and Shasta river watersheds say they fear for their livelihoods. The Northern California agricultural region faces state water curtailments through much of February, after a spate of December storms failed to remedy three years of extreme dry conditions. The State Water Board says it needs to regulate flows in the two rivers to protect endangered fish, including coho salmon, from extinction. Farmers say they are worried about water supplies vanishing by peak summer.

Judge Gives 180-Day Extension for Retailers Who Challenged Proposition 12

A judge is temporarily blocking enforcement of a new California law that bans the sale of pork meat from pigs that were kept in spaces under 24 square feet. Judge James Arguelles in Sacramento noted that the California Department of Food and Agriculture is more than two years late in finalizing regulations for Proposition 12, the 2018 initiative that set minimum space standards now required for pork producers. But Arguelles said he is granting a 180-day extension before grocers, restaurants and retailers are also subject to enforcement. ★

NET-5 Task Force Makes a Bust

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, January 18th, 2022, at approximately 07:00 a.m., Agents from the Yuba Sutter Narcotic and Gang Enforcement Task Force (NET-5) executed a search warrant in the 2100 block of Live Oak Blvd., in Yuba City. The target of the search warrant, Marcus Mercado (31 years old), was believed to be selling powder fentanyl out of the residence.

During the execution of the search warrant, NET-5 Agents located 15.3 grams

of powder fentanyl, 20 broken Xanax pills, packaging, and a digital scale, inside of Marcus Mercado’s bedroom. At the time of the warrant, Mercado was inside his bedroom with Kylie Torres (22 years old) of Marysville, CA. Bryan Stacey (45 years old) was also believed to be living in the residence during the search warrant and found to be in possession of approximately 136 grams of methamphetamine.

Marcus Mercado was arrested and booked into the Sutter County Jail for charges of possession for sale of fentanyl

and an outstanding felony arrest warrant out of Yuba County, CA.

Bryan Stacey was arrested and booked into the Sutter County Jail for charges of possession of methamphetamine for sale.

Kylie Torres was arrested and booked into the Sutter County Jail for two outstanding arrest warrants out of Yuba County, CA. The investigation has been sent to the Sutter County District Attorney’s Office for prosecution.

Dear Dietitian

Gastroparesis

Dear Dietitian,

I have gastroparesis, and it's causing a lot of pain. My doctor gave me a list of foods to avoid, but I still have problems. Do you have any suggestions?

Thank You Dorothy

Dear Dorothy,

I sympathize with you. While in clinical practice, I saw patients suffering from gastroparesis. It's a tough place to be. For readers who are not familiar, gastroparesis (GP) is a condition where the stomach does not empty normally. The term "gastroparesis" literally means partial paralysis of the stomach. The condition occurs when there is damage to the vagus nerve, which is the nerve that controls how food moves through the digestive tract.

Under normal circumstances, the vagus nerve signals the brain to activate muscles in the stomach and intestines to contract, a process known as peristalsis. These contractions move food from the stomach and throughout the intestines for digestion. With gastroparesis, the process is inefficient, leaving food in the stomach for prolonged periods of time.

Symptoms of GP include nausea, vomiting, bloating, and abdominal pain. In some cases, the root cause of GP is uncontrolled diabetes. If you have diabetes, your healthcare provider will help get your blood sugars under control.

Treatment for GP includes medication and diet modifications. Another relatively new treatment involves a neurostimulator that is surgically placed in the stomach. The stimulator sends electrical pulses to trigger peristalsis in the lower stomach,

thereby aiding in the digestive process.

Some general dietary guidelines for GP include small, more frequent meals and consuming foods low in fiber and low-fat. Taking in small, more frequent meals simply leaves less food for the body to process at one time. You can divide meals in half, then eat the remainder about three hours later for a snack. It's important to chew food well to alleviate some of the work for the digestive system. Drink plenty of water and non-caffeinated beverages to aid in digestion.

Foods high in soluble fiber, such as oats, apples, and beans, slow the movement of food in the GI tract. You will need to avoid these foods. Choose canned fruits and vegetables instead of fresh, and make sure vegetables are cooked until soft.

Even though insoluble fiber, like that found in whole wheat products, speeds gastric transit, it causes the GI tract to contract more frequently. The extra contractions may result in abdominal pain. Opt for white bread and pasta and avoid bran cereals.

Foods high in fat, like hamburgers, hot dogs, butter, potato chips, and sweets, move out of the stomach more slowly than carbohydrates and proteins. It is wise to limit fat. Choose lean proteins, like turkey or chicken breast, ground round beef, pork tenderloin, and whitefish. A lean protein contains three grams of fat or less per ounce.

These are some general guidelines to help control the symptoms of GP. Consult a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) for a more detailed meal plan. Most insurances will cover the cost.

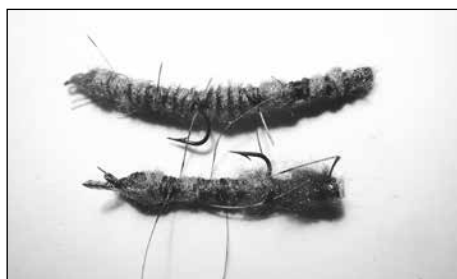
a better experience. I'm not going to mention all the bulb catalogs that come from far afield in the fall. Time to end this little wander through the Seed Catalogs.

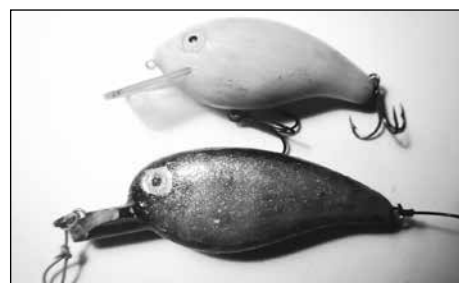

he observed what looked to be a river of molten plastic flowing from the burning of hundreds of plastic bins used to transport and store walnuts that were currently being stored on the property. According to Taylor, the hot melting plastic appeared to help spread the blaze as the fire consumed the factory.

A Facebook post by Sutter County Fire Department reported: "After an aggressive

firefight that lasted the duration of the day, crews brought the fire under control and terminated the incident around 6:00 pm. This was a collaborative effort involving help from many different agencies and resources."

It is believed that the building was unoccupied at the time of the blaze and not operational, allegedly only being used for storage. At the time of this article, the cause of the fire is still under investigation. ★

SPARKY'S CORNER

Dryer Safety

Doing laundry is most likely part of your everyday routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire.

Dryers should be properly grounded.

Check the outdoor vent flap to make sure it is not covered by debris.

Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc.

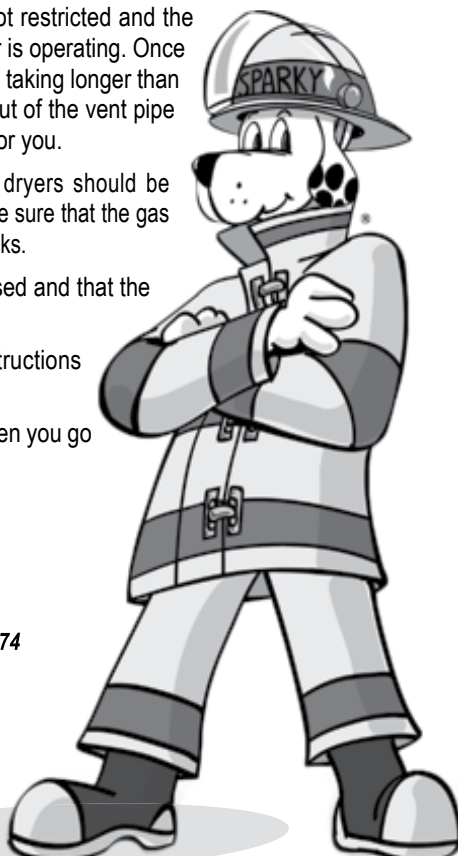
Clothes that have come in contact with flammable substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

FACT

- The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.
- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.
- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.
- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.

The Markets in the Last Few Weeks Has Been Crushing to Investor Portfolios

The carnage in the markets in the last few weeks has been crushing to investor portfolios.

January 24th and 25th start hard down only to end up relatively flat at the end of the day. That said, one day does not make a halt to the event. Or should we say two days.

Most all indexes have been brutalized in January 2022.

The Dow was down 8% off its high when I penned this article. The Nasdaq down 15%, the S&P down 10% and the Russell Small cap a whopping 19%. Investor accounts may be down more or less than those figures depending on what stocks they held.

Some individual stocks that were popular during 2021 were down 50%, 60%, 70%, or even 80% by January of this year. Take a look at the stay-at-home darling ZOOM (Symbol- ZM). Obliterated at down 74%. Like other notable stocks, it started its crash much earlier.

In fact, its erosion first lowered its ugly head in OCTOBER of 2020. Indeed, many popular stay-at-home stocks started their descent late 2020 or early 2021.

It is why the indexes may not tell the whole story on what was occurring in the overall market. Investors may be scratching their heads wondering why their 2021 balances may have lagged upward movement compared to what they saw on the evening news.

Why this all happened has been covered in previous articles and radio programs, including but not limited to supply side shortages, the Omicron variant and the response to it, inflation, and the Fed's threatening to raise interest rates. Top that off with the run up of some stocks whose valuations went into the realm of the ridiculous and we had the makings of an accident waiting to happen and it did.

The fact that January, 2022 brought investor pain is normally not a good sign for the rest of the year. It is said how January goes, so goes the year. It's called the January barometer. Not written in stone mind you, as no one can predict market movements at any time, but the saying does have some precedent. 20 of the last 24 years the January effect has been an indication of the performance for the rest of that year.

During times of market crashes, an investor's universe can be quite unpleasant. I have written about how bad it can feel before. Let's just say losing sleep, anxiety, overeating or not eating, thoughts of losing it all and more run the gamut of pain felt when savings evaporate in a market crash.

When "recovery-green" is finally seen on the screen however, the relief can feel like new found love.

Investors must be careful during and following crashes. Head fakes are common as are dead cat bounces, meaning what looks like a recovery might just be a blip in an otherwise avalanche yet to continue.

After market explosions, don't be too hasty to get back in. This is a time to be prudent and patient. Although many investors don't ever sell, I am of the opinion it's better to miss a top then take a ride to the bottom.

After all, who's to say how far and how long a

crash will go or how bad it could be?

Certainly not me or anyone else for that matter. And at least when you opt to "opt out", you can sleep a bit better knowing you made at least some decision and wont ride the train off the proverbial cliff to the poor house.

When you do sell some or all of your positions however, the buy-and-hold crowd will usually chime in and remind you the market always comes back.

Certainly looking at a chart of the markets over long periods of time, no could say that assumption is wrong.

But the fact remains no one can no one can know for sure it will always come back, hence the disclaimer "past performance is no guarantee of future results."

After all, if we knew it would always come back, why would we fret right? But we still do.

The fact is, and it IS a fact, no one can say the market will always come back.

In fact someday, it won't. Whether it be from the end of mankind, or an implosion of the U.S. dollar or economy that wipes the slate clean, it

COULD happen.

The chances are slim for sure, but they are not zero. And if that does occur, losing it all or most of it, is not an option, at least in my house.

I never know just which crash will be "THE CRASH" and neither does anyone else. Call me crazy or call me overly careful.

Whatever.

All I know is I don't know, and neither does anyone else.

For now, we keep our eyes fixed in the spring of 2022, and see what unfolds.

Be careful out there.

"Watching the markets so you don't have to."

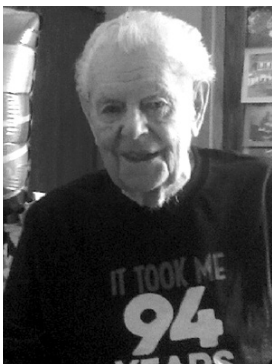

Oroville Shooting Investigation Update

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - The murder victim in this case has been identified as Karin Dalton, age 43 of Seattle, Washington. The Butte County Sheriff's Office sends sincere condolences to the family of Karin, and everyone affected by the tragic events that took place Wednesday evening.

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On Wednesday, February 2, 2022, at approximately 7:35 p.m., the Oroville Police Department (OPD) began to receive 911 calls indicating there was a Greyhound bus outside the AM/PM store, located on Oroville-Dam Blvd. and Feather River Blvd. and a shooting was taking place inside the bus. OPD Officers responded and requested BCSO deputies respond to the location as well. Upon arrival, BCSO

deputies and OPD officers located several subjects suffering from gunshot wounds. Despite lifesaving measures, one person was pronounced dead at the scene and others were transported to local hospitals.

The shooting suspect fled the scene prior to law enforcement arrival. Shortly after, the Oroville Police Department began to receive additional 911 calls with callers stating the suspect was inside Walmart, located on Cal Oak Road in Oroville. BCSO deputies, along with several allied law enforcement officers responded to Walmart and contacted the suspect and located evidence that gave them cause to believe it was the suspect involved in the shooting. The suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Butte County Jail. The investigation is ongoing, and more information will be released when it is available. ★

Chico Man in Court on Fatal DUI Charges

CHICO, CA (MPG) - A 31-year-old Chico man was in Butte County Superior Court this afternoon to face Vehicular Manslaughter while Intoxicated counts that may bring a life sentence in state prison.

Matthew Arias Moen, 31, was charged with two counts of Gross Vehicular Manslaughter while Intoxicated stemming from a high-speed collision with another car carrying two young college women in their 20's. The charges also included an allegation that Moen was previously convicted of Driving under the Influence in Nevada County in 2020.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said the charges arose from a Sunday, January 30, fatal collision next to the Neal Dow Elementary School in Chico at 4:50 p.m. Ramsey said witnesses in the area saw Moen's Volvo sedan speeding north on Neal Dow Avenue at speeds over 80 miles per hour. The posted speed limit on the roadway there is 25 mph, said Ramsey. Moen's car went through a red light at the intersection with East 5th Avenue, striking a Jeep proceeding on East 5th Avenue on a green light. Ramsey said the force of the collision drove the Jeep into the garage of a residence on the northwest corner of the intersection.

Ramsey said the occupants of the Jeep were pronounced deceased at the scene. Moen was extracted from his vehicle and transported to Enloe Hospital where he was treated and released to Butte County Jail on the manslaughter charges. Ramsey said blood samples were taken from Moen at the hospital and are pending results.

Ramsey said the occupants of the Jeep were Cassi Tejada, 22, of Visalia and Courtney Kendall, 24, of Louisiana. The young women were good friends and college students due to graduate this June. Tejada was going to Chico State University and Kendall was going to Louisiana State University. Kendall had been due to fly back to Louisiana to resume her studies after visiting with Tejada on Monday, January 31.

Ramsey said his office also received information today that Moen had been convicted of a Driving Under the Influence charge in the state of Oregon in 2016 and was wanted for failure to appear on a post-plea hearing there.

Ramsey said Superior Court Judge Michael Deems ordered Moen held without bail and continued his arraignment for entry of plea to February 3, 2022. Ramsey said that with the prior DUI conviction alleged to the charges of Gross Vehicular Manslaughter While Intoxicated, Moen faces a state prison sentence of 30 years to life. ★
