GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - It is one thing to support an organization, but Bill Harkey has truly dedicated himself to supporting our community and institutions, most notably our local Hospital.

Harkey has the distinction of being

the first child born in the Biggs-Gridley Memorial Hospital (BGMH), currently known as Orchard Hospital. Preceding the origins of BGMH in 1949, the Harkey family played a key role in its conception and eventual construction, specifically Harkey's grandfather, William Pinckney Harkey, who was present at the

hospital's groundbreaking ceremonies. The Harkey family is believed to have been the stakeholders in the hospital, later members of the Hospital Foundation, and throughout the years and generations, remained active in supporting the hospital through service and financial donations. This

CSEA, GUSD Come to New Agreement

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - After months of collaboration and after fighting through a declaration of impasse, the Gridley Unified School District and California Schools Employee Association negotiation teams have come to an agreement with regard to a ratified pay schedule.

On October 6th, at the regular meeting of the GUSD Board, President Eric Waterbury presented the tentative agreement between the CSEA and GUSD to the Board for a vote. The language of the tentative agreement outlines that a one time, off-salary schedule payment of \$2,000 for in-person instruction is to be prorated by FTE for the year 2020-2021 for all bargaining CSEA employees, including another one-time payment, in lieu of retroactive pay, for the year of 2020-2021 in the amount of \$2,250 to be prorated by FTE. Retroactive to July 1, of 2021, the current salary schedule will be increased by 7%. In addition to that pay increase, the negotiating parties agreed to a 2% increase to the salary schedule for the 2022-2023 school year.

The board voted 7-0 in favor of the 3-year agreement, President Eric Waterbury thanking the CSEA negotiating team for returning to the table to continue the negotiation process and make this tentative agreement a reality.

Other changes made to the salary schedule were the positions of "Bus Driver" was moved from pay-range 18 to 18.5 - an increase of \$.46 to the initial salary pay step 1, SLPA's moved from pay-range 22 to range 25 - an increase of \$3.56 to the initial salary pay step 1, and range 26 was removed completely from the salary pay schedule. As for health and welfare benefits, the parties agreed to increase the yearly health benefit cap by \$235.00, effective July 1, 2021, which raises the overall cap to \$9,240. The increase is intended for all unit members, those unit members not receiving healthcare benefits

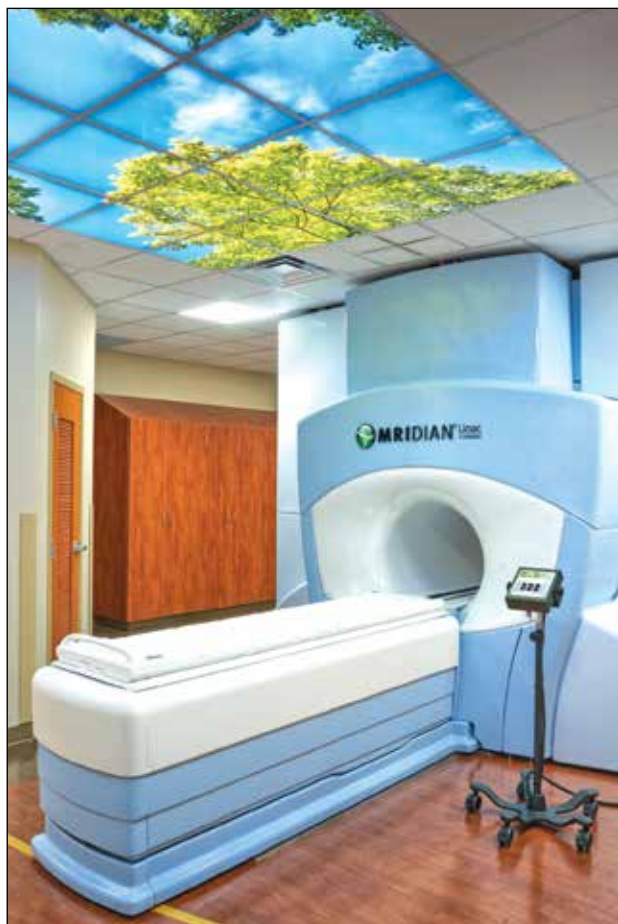
Enloe's Regional Cancer Center Announces MRIdian Linear Accelerator

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Enloe Regional Cancer Center has announced the roll-out of its latest, state-of-the-art technology in cancer treatments, the MRIdian Linear Accelerator.

The MRIdian Linear Accelerator marries the medical treatment technologies of Magnetic Resonance Imaging with that of a Linear Accelerator, used to direct radioactive rays to a designated target. In the past, combining these two technologies was thought to be an engineering impossibility, but recent advancements in the field have made that feat possible. The result, says Enloe Cancer Center's Dr. Jonathan E. Clark, Radiation Oncologist, is "cutting edge" technology that can drastically reduce the number of radiation treatments needed while treating cancerous tissues.

This pioneering technology from ViewRay, the MRIdian Linear Accelerator, allows for physicians to treat cancerous tissues with pin-point accuracy, sparing surrounding healthy tissues, and ultimately reducing the number of treatments necessary. Dr. Clark says, "the benefits of this machine is to try and deliver very high dosages in a short amount of time, and those treatments

can be as short as 3 to 5 treatments," compared to standard methods of treatment that could require as many as 25-35 treatments. Fewer treatments mean a faster recovery and less side effects. Dr. Clark says, "It is a huge leap forward for our field and that has been actually really exciting to be a part of."

Currently, there are as

few as 3 MRIdian Linear Accelerators in the State of California, with Enloe's being the only one currently operating in the north state.

Magalia Resident Arrested During Shooting Investigation

MAGALIA, CA (MPG) - On October 7, 2021, at 5:09 PM, the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) began receiving calls about a shooting that had occurred near the intersection of Dalton Way and Carnegie Road, Magalia. BCSO deputies were immediately dispatched to the area. Upon arrival deputies located evidence that a shooting had just occurred.

During a subsequent investigation, deputies and detectives determined Jose Sandoval, age 36, of Magalia drove to the intersection of Dalton Way and Carnegie Road. While at the intersection Sandoval saw a vehicle driving on Dalton Way. The vehicle was occupied by two adults and two children. Sandoval recognized one of the adults in the vehicle. After identifying one of the adults in the vehicle, Sandoval exited his vehicle and began pursuing the victim vehicle on foot.

While pursuing the vehicle, Sandoval used a semi-automatic firearm to shoot at the vehicle.

During the investigation evidence indicating Sandoval fired multiple rounds at the victim's vehicle was located. One of the rounds struck the driver's side of the victim's vehicle, near the area where one of the children was seated. The shooting was captured on video surveillance. The area where the shooting occurred was in a residential neighborhood.

During the investigation, deputies determined Sandoval resided in the 14000 block of Skyway, Magalia. Deputies and Paradise Police Officers responded to Sandoval's residence and located the vehicle Sandoval drove to the shooting parked in the driveway of the residence. After an extended amount of time, deputies were able to contact and place Sandoval under arrest.

Detectives obtained a search warrant for Sandoval's residence. During the service of the search warrant and subsequent investigation, detectives located additional evidence related to the shooting. Detectives also located evidence Sandoval is an active member of a criminal street gang.

Sandoval was arrested for numerous charges to include the following felony charges: Assault with a semi-automatic firearm, shooting at an occupied vehicle, being a prohibited person in possession of a firearm and ammunition, committing a felony while released on bail, personally using a firearm while committing a felony, and participating in a criminal street gang. This investigation is ongoing. If anyone has information about this investigation, they are encouraged to call BCSO detectives at 530-538-7671. ★

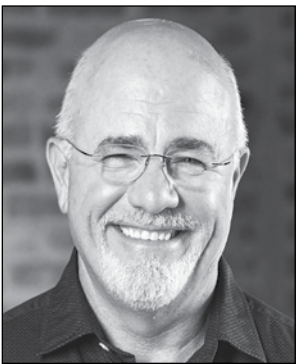

Winston Churchill once said, "Success is going from failure to failure without loss of enthusiasm." If we believe failure is here to stay, we lose enthusiasm. And that leads to an inability to re-focus on success. People often make dumb, short-term decisions when they're in financial difficulty. If you talk yourself into believing you'll never be able to save enough money to pay cash for a car, you'll lose hope and borrow the money. Debt not only robs you of the ability to build wealth, but it's also usually the result of losing hope.

Have you done something stupid or wrong in the past that you are still reliving daily? Is that memory haunting you, and stealing your hope? Remember, the past only has power over you if you let it have that power. Don't get me wrong. The past can hurt, and it can be disappointing. But you can either give in to it and let it control you, or you can learn from it and make a conscious decision to keep moving forward.

- California Budget Includes \$5.2 Billion for Emergency Drought Relief**
- California Rice Plantings Drop by 21% In 2021**
- Pistachio Harvest Nears Robust 1 Billion Pounds**
- USDA Earmarks \$100 Million to Support Loans for Meat and Poultry Processing**

California's state budget will allocate \$5.2 billion over three years to fund drought-relief projects. The money is intended to secure water supplies and implement the 2014 Sustainable Groundwater Management Act. The funding will also go to a state water efficiency program as well as to the Healthy Soils program. That effort is intended to improve carbon sequestration in the soil and build up organic matter to help retain water.
Pistachios are called an alternate-bearing crop because they produce heavier yields one year and lighter yields the next. This was supposed to be an "off" year for California orchards. But the harvest has been robust. It is expected to meet or exceed 1 billion pounds. That's just below 2020's high-yield year total of 1.05 billion pounds. Pistachios rank fourth among California's agricultural commodities, behind milk, almonds and grapes.

Rice plantings in California are at the lowest level since 1992. Farmers are expected to harvest 405,000 acres this year. That's down 21% from 2020. Medium-grain rice remains the dominant variety grown in California, with much of that coming from the Sacramento Valley. All told, California accounts for nearly 70% of the U.S. medium- and short-grain rice supply.
The U.S. Department of Agriculture is allocating another \$100 million in funding to promote community and private-sector lending to expand meat and poultry processing. The effort seeks to safeguard the food supply chain, which suffered serious disruptions during the pandemic. Overall, the Biden administration's Build Back Better Initiative plans to invest \$4 billion to strengthen the food chain and promote competition. ★

Too Much Sugar

Dear Dietitian,

I've been working hard on eating healthy this year, and I read your column regularly. I have been surprised at how much sugar is in foods that I thought were good for me. Do you have a list of these foods?

Thank you, Angela

Dear Angela,

Remember, it's the food company's job to make a product that takes good, not necessarily one that improves your health. An easy way to do that is to add sugar. The American Heart Association recommends women consume no more than six teaspoons (25 grams) of added sugar per day, and men should have a maximum of 9 teaspoons a day (38 grams) (1). However, we take in a whopping 17 teaspoons of sugar each day (2). Reducing our sugar intake to the recommended level could result in a 13-pound annual weight loss for men and an 18-pound weight loss for women! We wouldn't even have to give up sugar completely – just cut back!

Below is a list of foods you may think are healthy but actually contain a lot of sugar:

1. **Granola** - a seemingly wholesome food, but beware: granola is typically made with honey or brown sugar. To add insult to injury, a serving size is ¼ to ½ cup. Who eats ¼ cup of cereal in the morning?
2. **Yogurt**-These tasty, creamy dairy foods are often fruit-flavored and sugar-sweetened. Look out for cane sugars, as these are just like regular sugar. Luckily, there are several low-sugar varieties on the market that are just as delicious!
3. **Sports drinks**- Originally designed to get nutrients into your body quickly, sugar adds an energy rush. There are several low-calorie and sugar-free alternatives on the market.
4. **Trail mix** - a quick snack to take along

the way, they often include chocolate or sugar-coated raisins to add a touch of sweet to the salty. There is an easy fix: make your own. Measure ¼ cup of your favorite nuts and add a few raisins to sweeten. Delightful and less expensive!

5. **Breakfast cereals** - Perhaps because they are primarily marketed to children, the cereal aisle is filled with sugar! Your best bet is to buy an unsweetened cereal and add fruit to sweeten it.
6. **Flavored oatmeal** - These are often marketed for their convenience in single-pack servings that you can take on the go. Opt for the old-fashioned oatmeal that cooks in 5 minutes. Not only is it naturally without sugar, but it is also higher in fiber than the flavored packs.
7. **Protein bars** - When we think of protein, we often think of a healthy nutrient that will stay with us longer than a carbohydrate snack. Be sure to read the label; it usually comes with a considerable amount of added sugar.
8. **Coffee drinks** - there's nothing like a shot of caffeine with a shot of sugar to get you going in the morning! These drinks are insanely popular, calorie-packed, and, more often than not, sugar-laden. Make your coffee at home and take it to work. You will be surprised at how much money and calories you'll save.
9. **Nut butter mixed with chocolate** – Really? The chocolate gives it away, right?
10. **Fruit juice** - If you can enjoy a ½ cup serving of your favorite fruit juice, go ahead. But if you guzzle more, be aware that fruit juice is a concentrated source of fructose, or fruit sugar. Consider eating the whole fruit and getting a boost of fiber.

Death Investigation In Taxi Driver Assault

Butte County Sheriff's Office Press Release

CHICO, CA (MPG) - On October 03, 2021, at 3:54 AM the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) received a 9-1-1 call from the owner of a local taxi company. The caller told BCSO dispatchers that he had been assaulted by two individuals in the area of Lone Pine Avenue, Chico. BCSO deputies were immediately dispatched to the area and contacted the taxi driver. The taxi driver was injured during the assault and was immediately transported to a local hospital.

While responding to the call, BCSO dispatch began receiving multiple calls about a male prowling at residences near Lone Pine Avenue. Deputies arrived in the area, located a deceased male in the roadway on Lone

Pine Avenue, and located a second male in the backyard of a residence. The deceased male was identified as Victor Hernandez, age 28, of Chico. The male located in the backyard of a residence was identified as Jose Huerta, age 22, of Willows.

During the subsequent investigation detectives determined the taxi driver picked Hernandez and Huerta up in the Chico area and began driving them to a location in the unincorporated area of Chico. Prior to arriving at the location Hernandez produced a handgun and fired the handgun multiple times inside of the taxi. Hernandez and Huerta also assaulted the taxi driver. After the assault Hernandez and Huerta exited the taxi.

During the investigation detectives gathered evidence that gave them cause

to believe Hernandez and Huerta exited the taxi while it was moving. Detectives determined Hernandez was injured during the assault and/or while attempting to exit the taxi. An autopsy will be conducted to determine Hernandez's cause of death. During the investigation detectives also located evidence that Huerta entered a trailer located behind a residence on Lone Pine Avenue and took item(s) from the trailer.

Huerta was arrested for the following felony charges: Assault with a deadly weapon resulting in great bodily injury, violating the terms and conditions of his probation, and burglary. This investigation is on-going. If anyone has information about this investigation, they are encouraged to call BCSO detectives at 530-538-7671. ★

AMENDMENT TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE CONCERNING EXCEPTIONS TO AGRICULTURAL BUFFERS (BUTTE COUNTY CODE SECTIONS 24-83 AND 24-84); APPEAL SUBJECTS AND JURISDICTION (BUTTE COUNTY CODE SECTION 24-266); AND, THE AGRICULTURAL BUFFER IMPLEMENTATION GUIDELINES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Butte County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing on **October 26, 2021 at 11:30 a.m.** or shortly thereafter in the Butte County Board of Supervisors' Chambers, 25 County Center Drive, Oroville, California. At a public hearing held on September 23, 2021, the Butte County Planning Commission unanimously recommended adoption of the Zoning Code Amendment and Amendment to the Agricultural Buffer Guidelines to the Board of Supervisors.

SUMMARY OF TEXT AMENDMENTS TO THE ZONING ORDINANCE AND THE AGRICULTURAL BUFFER GUIDELINES

This is a County-initiated amendment to the Butte County Zoning Ordinance (Butte County Code Chapter 24) regarding Agricultural Buffer Setbacks (Butte County Code Section 24-83), Exceptions to the Agricultural Buffers (Butte County Code Section 24-84), Appeal Subjects and Jurisdiction (Butte County Code Section 24-266) and the Agriculture Buffer Guidelines. The following specific amendments are proposed:

- 1) Exceptions to the 300-foot agricultural buffer would be subject solely to ministerial projects, such as building permits. All applicability of exceptions to discretionary projects, such as subdivision, will be removed (Sections 24-83 and 24-84).
- 2) Adding in Exceptions to Agricultural Buffer Setbacks to Zoning Administrator Decisions that may be appealed to the Planning Commission (Section 24-266).
- 3) Under the Agriculture Buffers Guidelines (Resolution No. 08-166), existing roads within a private easement, or that have dedicated right-of-way to the County, or another type of undevelopable feature that lies within the buffer are now included as part of the measurement of the buffer.

The proposed amendments are in alignment with direction of the Agricultural Buffer ordinance and Guidelines provided by the Board of Supervisors workshop on February 9, 2021 and the proceeding Planning Commission hearings held on August 19, 2021 and September 23, 2021.

In compliance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3) exemption ("Common Sense"), this project is exempt from CEQA review.

Comments may be submitted in writing at any time prior to the hearing or orally at the meeting listed above or as may be continued to a later date. If you challenge the above application in court, you may be limited to raising only those issues you or someone else raised at the public hearing described in this notice or in written correspondence delivered to the Board of Supervisors at, or prior to the public hearing. For Parents:

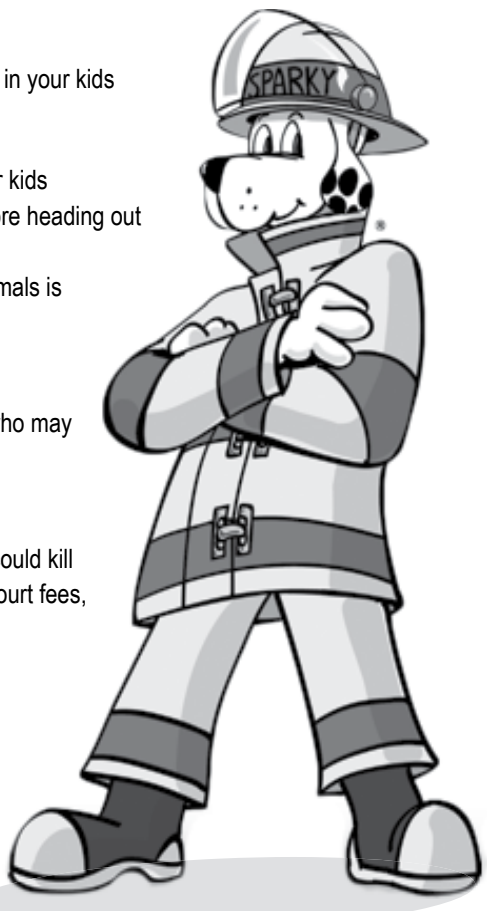
- Be aware of possible tripping hazards in your kids costumes

Woman Sentenced for Stealing from Fire Victim

Butte County Superior Court Press Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A 31-year-old Oklahoma woman was sentenced to felony probation with a 120-day suspended sentence this afternoon for embezzling over \$63,000 of Camp Fire insurance money from an elderly Camp Fire victim, who had raised the woman from the age of eleven.

Brenda Rose Asbury, 31, of Oklahoma, appeared before Butte County Superior Court Judge Michael Deems after her previously entered plea of no contest to grand theft from the 75-year-old woman she called her adoptive mother. Despite the District Attorney and Probation Department's request that Asbury be imprisoned for 120 days in county jail as part of a formal probation, the judge felt that Asbury's previously served 17 days in jail awaiting her plea, her clean record, and desire to pay back the money

to the victim deserved no further jail time.

District Attorney Mike Ramsey noted the 75-year-old Camp Fire victim had received insurance payments totaling over \$127,000 for the loss of her Paradise home in the November 2018 fire. After relocating to Lake County due to the Camp Fire, the victim had taken the defendant, Brenda Rose Asbury, 31, of Oklahoma, into her new residence to help the defendant escape a bad relationship in Oklahoma. The victim had paid travel costs so that the defendant, whom she called her "daughter", could make it to California.

Ramsey said Asbury convinced the victim to put Asbury's name on the bank account containing the victim's insurance settlement to "protect it" from any attempt by the state to recoup money used for the care of the victim's dying husband. Still distressed from the Camp Fire, the victim agreed to Asbury's

plan and put Asbury on the account, in name only, so that nothing would happen to the money, which was supposed to help the victim rebuild her life.

Ramsey said at no point was Asbury given permission to use any of the money in the account. However, Asbury drained \$63,100 from the account and fled back to Oklahoma.

At sentencing, Deputy District Attorney Dong-Jin Lee noted that "disasters can bring out the best in people, and the worst," and Asbury unfortunately chose to commit the "most despicable of crimes", by taking advantage of the person who had raised her and treated her like a daughter.

Judge Deems placed Asbury on felony probation with the conditions that she participate in a job training program, work full time, or submit proof of 10 job searches a week so she could begin paying back the \$63,100 that was embezzled. ★
