**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - Recently Gridley's Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 5731 had the honor of being visited by VFW dignitaries.

District 15 Commander Mike DiGiordano accompanied by State Commander, Dawn "Dusty" Napier, the 101st Commander of the VFW, installed on June 25th of this year, happened to be touring posts in the North State. Napier is a 20-year U.S. Navy retiree, highly decorated receiving 11 awards and ribbons, maintains her Bronze Legacy Life membership at VFW Post 9561 in Willow Creek, California and is also a life member of American Legion, VFW National Home for Children and Native

American Veterans Association.

As part of her State Commander Duties, Napier had the pleasure of touring and visiting VFW posts throughout the state. She says, "I don't get a chance to visit every post. ## Distracted Driving: Is It Worth It?

CHP Release

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - Every year, thousands of people are seriously injured or killed statewide in vehicle crashes caused by distracted drivers. To combat this issue, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) received the Adult Distracted Drivers (ADD) XII grant to keep California roads safe through education and enforcement.

"Distracted driving is a serious issue that is 100 percent preventable," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "We are encouraging drivers to make a conscious choice to not drive distracted. This simple decision can have a tremendous positive impact on the safety of California's roadways."

Drivers who choose to drive distracted exponentially increase the odds of being involved in a vehicle crash. According to data from the CHP's Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System, in 2019 there were nearly 19,000 crashes where driver inattention played a role. Of the 9,371 drivers involved in a fatal or injury distracted driving crash that year, nearly 10 percent cited cell phone use as the source of inattention.

Though there are numerous distractions for a driver, cell phones are the most prevalent. Handheld cell phone use while driving is not only illegal in California, it is an unsafe activity behind the wheel. In California, drivers under the age of 18 are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving for any reason, including hands-free devices.

"Driving safely requires complete attention, so it is best to stay focused on the road. Distraction behind the wheel jeopardizes your safety, your passengers' safety, and the well-being of those around you," Commissioner Ray added.

Funds from the ADD grant will help support the CHP's completion of at least 400 traffic safety presentations statewide and a minimum of 80 distracted driving enforcement operations between October 1, 2021, and September 30, 2022.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

# The New Pi-Line

First order of business - corrections. Having had several people point out an error in the last Pi-Line has caused me to take to the Macintosh (computer) and begin this column with one of the most awkward things a newspaper columnist must do - correcting an error. Newspaper tradition requires a factual faux pas of this nature to be announced with the word CORRECTION in all capital letters. So here we go. CORRECTION - In the last edition of the Pi Line, a reference was made to a Fridley-Biggs Memorial Hospital. There has never been a Fridley-Biggs Hospital. The hospital referenced in the article was Biggs-Gridley Memorial Hospital, constructed in 1949, which hospital later changed its name to Orchard Hospital. CORRECTION #2, is stylistic. It has been brought to my awareness by the former assistant editor of the Placerville El Dorado High School Cougar Newspaper (F.W. Cook) that one should spell out the words in an acronym (an abbreviation formed from the initial letters of other words and pronounced as a word) the first time it is used in a story. Last week this column made reference to how much I like Hockey and failed to utilize the proper nomenclature for the Major U.S./Canadian Hockey League. I should have elucidated - the National

Hockey League (NHL) and then used "NHL" in successive sentences. So there you have it. Journalistic integrity remains intact in Gridley/Biggs/Live Oak. Mrs. J. Roberts, the former Gridley High English and Journalism teacher, would be proud of me since she was the adviser for the Gridley High School Vantage Newspaper when I was the Assistant Editor my Junior Year of High School (the only formal training I have for this pro-bono effort each week). It is also reassuring to know that my Dad still reads this column.

Did you know that some laws can be written to go away after a certain period of time? Such is the case for Biggs California City Ordinance number 422, which modified Municipal Code section 8.15 to establish a Biggs parking permit program. Ordinance 422 inserted plain language stating that "No motor vehicle or trailer of any sort shall park or be left standing upon the city streets in any one location for a period in excess of 72 hours." The City Councilmembers Agenda Information Packet included this observation from the City Staff: "The concept of creating a parking exception was discussed at public Council meetings held on 08-13-2019, 10-8-2019, 06-09-2020, 07-14-2020, 08-11-2020 and in various committee meetings over the course of the past year." So clearly, the topic of parking on the street for more than three days was, at the time, a significant and pressing public policy issue; and the Council did indeed adopt the parking ordinance in September of 2020 after much thoughtful deliberation. Now the interesting part - included in the resolution

was this little line of code section - "Unless specifically authorized otherwise by the Biggs City Council, this Article shall be repealed, in whole, effective September 30, 2021." Perhaps the erstwhile City Manager who sat through all of these meetings saw into the future and knew this was a topic that would not be an issue in the future and should be designed to auto-repeal. This tidbit may cause you to ask - how many people purchased these Biggs parking permits after the sub-committee meetings, discussions, and drafting of ordinances to amend codes and create a parking program? The answer is only one person has paid the \$100 permit fee to park their vehicle on the street for more than 72 hours since the passage of Ordinance 422. Other local civic leaders should reflect on this series of events and consider making "sunsetting" or "auto-go-away" clauses like the one in Ordinance 422 a part of every municipal ordinance they take up for consideration.

As mentioned in previous (and error-free) Pi Lines, I love visiting and rating Hardware stores, so we dropped by the local ACE Hardware store to see if the new owners have messed it up by changing things. They have not. It is still awesome. So plan on trekking to ACE to make plans for home and/or garden improvements. Since the current proprietor worked at the Bremer's Hardware in Gridley, I hold out hope that he will bring back creaky wooden floors, which add to the historic Hardware store ambiance.

Vietnam, John Cowan's army trunk from WWII and Gary McClendon's WWII Navy Uniform - all locals who served. Uniforms have been donated to the museum by local Veterans and their families.

# Vietnam POW to be Featured in Veterans Day Parade

## Museum of The Forgotten Warriors

**MARYSVILLE, CA (MPG)** - Mike O'Connor arrived in Vietnam on August 23, 1967, he was assigned to the 1st Air Cavalry Division. On February 4, 1968, during the Tet Offensive his helicopter was shot down. Mike was the sole survivor. While being seriously injured he attempted to make it to a road where he hoped to be picked up. On Feb 5, 1968, he was captured by the North Vietnamese just north of Hue. Mike was required to walk north, eventually ending up at the Hanoi Hilton where he spent the next 5 years as a POW. Mike was in the second group of POW's to be released. O'Connor will be featured in the 2021 Veterans Day Parade in downtown Marysville, Thursday, November 11, beginning at 11:00 am Downtown Marysville, "D" Street. ★



# Gridley Thumbs and Roots

All begonias are tucked into the greenhouse, safe from chillier nights and blustery wind. Most got hair-cuts. The trimmings are in water to propagate for the May plant sale by Green Thumb Garden Club. In 2020 the plant sale was cancelled along with everything else. I gave away plants left and right. The sale helps the horticulture high school

scholarship. By starting cuttings now, the plants should be big by May. I'll be doing salvia cuttings in January. I might try to water start some of them sooner. They do much better with root hormones and soil but they can be water started. Probably try some water starting of geraniums and fuchsias. Will dig up some iris and split the Knophia, Hot Pokers and Cannas. I'll have no room left in a short time. I do it anyway because I love the magical process of taking bits of plants and making more plants. Once the begonias gave up their summer home the Cymbidiums get to come out from under the orange tree to live in their winter home next to the house where once the begonias

lived. It is the ritual of getting ready for cold weather. I've managed during 2020 to look up every container plant and label it and put its cold tolerant temperature along with its name. This is handy when deciding who gets extra protection in the winter. Sorta like making sure the plants from the tropics have enough long underwear on to make it through the winter. Many succulents do fine down to 35 degrees they simply turn a darker color. Every yard has microclimates. Learn yours and plant accordingly. I have plants I never expected to survive that do fine in a particular spot and if moved 6 inches would die. It's a fun challenge to know this about your yard. ★

# Farmers Lose Two Skirmishes in California Water War





The most important battleground in California's perpetual war over water is the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. Dozens of Northern California rivers and streams coalesce in the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, which join to form the Delta estuary and whose waters then flow into San Francisco Bay. The state's massive water infrastructure was constructed on an assumption that water left to flow to the sea was wasted. The web of reservoirs and canals diverts river and Delta water to farms in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys and domestic users as far south as San Diego. However, in recent decades environmental groups and their allies, such as Indian tribes and fishermen, have demanded reductions in diversions, arguing that they severely damage habitat for fish, such as spawning salmon, and other wildlife. The conflict has been played out in multiple arenas – the Legislature, Congress, federal and state regulatory agencies and the courts. It's been trench warfare with long periods of stalemate, occasional gains by one side or the other and periodic

attempts at armistice. A few years ago, the state Water Resources Control Board was poised to impose some limits on diversions that the agricultural industry saw as draconian – particularly since the state was also beginning to regulate farmers' ability to pump groundwater to fill gaps in surface water supplies. Govs. Jerry Brown and Gavin Newsom wanted to head off a full-fledged legal showdown by urging "voluntary agreements" on river flows acceptable to both farm water agencies and the water board and negotiations have been underway for several years. One such agreement affecting the Sacramento River and its tributaries appears headed for adoption, but this month, the draft of a second affecting the San Joaquin River hit a huge roadblock. In a letter to the river's major diverters, the Newsom administration rejected their proposal and said it would urge the water board to resume direct regulation of San Joaquin flows. Environmental Protection Secretary Jared Blumenfeld and Natural Resources Secretary Wade Crowfoot told the San Joaquin districts that "at this point it is clear that despite considerable efforts, proposed voluntary actions by water agencies on the San Joaquin River tributaries have fallen short of needed flow and habitat improvements, and viable proposals are not being offered at this time." The two administration officials added, "We will ask the State Water Board to resume all activities necessary to implement the flow objectives established by the

2018 Bay-Delta Plan for the Lower San Joaquin River and its three major tributaries, the Stanislaus, Tuolumne, and Merced rivers." Although Blumenfeld and Crowfoot said the San Joaquin agencies could re-enter the process "if they propose necessary levels of additional water flows and habitat," their rejection letter sets the stage for political and legal warfare. San Joaquin Valley farmers see the water board's pending actions as severely damaging their ability to continue operations. Dave Eggerton, executive director of the Association of California Water Agencies called the administration letter "very concerning" because of the potential for all-out legal war. However, as news of the letter spread in the water community, environmental groups celebrated. They had long viewed the "voluntary agreement" process as a tool to subvert stricter regulation necessary to protect habitat. They scored another win last week when Fresno Superior Court Judge D. Tyler Tharpe refused to validate a very controversial water supply contract that the huge Westlands Water District obtained from the Trump administration. In his ruling, Tharpe cited procedural irregularities, including violation of state open meeting laws. Thus, as drought grips California, the battles over the state's very limited supply of water seem destined to intensify. *Dan Walters has been a journalist for nearly 60 years, spending all but a few of those years working for California newspapers.* ★

## Dear Dietitian

# Cholesterol

Dear Dietitian,

Lately, my cholesterol level has gone up, and my doctor wants to put me on medication for it. I am hesitant to take medicine because of the side effects. I've read about a supplement, Citrus bergamot, that claims to lower cholesterol naturally. What do you know about this product?

Dear Kathryn,

Citrus bergamot is a fragrant citrus fruit. Its color is yellow or orange, depending on its ripeness. The fruit originated in Southeast Asia but was named for Bergamo, Italy, where it first gained popularity.

In a review of twelve studies, bergamot was associated with a significant decrease in total cholesterol (TC) and low-density lipoprotein (LDL), or bad cholesterol. The reduction in TC varied from 12%-31%, and the decline in LDL was as much as 41%. The authors pointed out that the studies had limited scientific quality (1).

In a randomized, double-blind placebo-controlled study of sixty participants, those given a bergamot supplement for thirty days showed a substantial decrease in total cholesterol and low-density lipoprotein (LDL). Total cholesterol decreased from 262 to 196, and LDL went from 175 to 116. This study was small; however, a randomized, double-blind study is the gold standard of scientific studies (2).

Garlic is an inexpensive way to treat high cholesterol, but is it effective? Studies are mixed. A study using a mixture of fresh garlic and lemon juice

showed an impressive 41-point decline in TC and a 30-point decrease in LDL. The study consisted of 112 volunteers and lasted eight weeks (3).

In another well-designed study conducted at Stanford University, garlic did not have any effect on cholesterol levels. The results were published in the Archives of Internal Medicine. In this six-month study, 192 patients who had elevated LDL levels were given a sandwich or supplements with the equivalent of 4 grams of garlic per day. Participants were closely monitored to make sure they didn't gain or lose weight, affecting cholesterol levels. At the end of six months, LDL levels were unchanged. Senior author Christopher Gardner, PhD, assistant professor of medicine at the Stanford Research Center, said, "If garlic was going to work, in one form or another, then it would have worked in our study. The lack of effect was compelling and clear."(4)

If you have high cholesterol, talk to your doctor before adding a supplement to your medicine cabinet. Supplements may produce side effects and can interact with other medications.







### Caltrans Traffic Alert

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - In a continued effort to boost motorist safety, Caltrans has installed a permanent advance warning system at the intersection of northbound State Highway 99 and Neal Road south of Chico.

Motorists will see an electronic board displaying the message "Caution Slow Traffic Ahead" when vehicle speed slows to 25 mph or less at the traffic

signal-controlled intersection. The message will stay on until vehicles resume traveling above 25 mph.

"Caltrans has worked with the California Highway Patrol and local partners to implement a series of safety measures on northbound Highway 99," said Amarjeet S. Benipal, Caltrans District 3 Director. "The new intersection advance warning system upholds our commitment to help motorists arrive safely to their destinations."

Other safety countermeasures include the installation of two traffic signal warning signs with flashing beacons and rumble stripes placed across the two northbound traffic lanes. These transverse

rumble stripes are made of thermoplastic material which, when driven over, create noticeable sound and vibrations to warn drivers of an approaching intersection where they may be required to slow down or stop.

Caltrans District 3 maintains more than 4,385 lanes miles of state highway in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties. ## Gallagher Wraps up Successful Legislative Session to Help Locals

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Assemblyman Gallagher (R-Yuba City) announced the final actions on his legislation for the 2021 legislative session. In all, Assemblyman Gallagher successfully passed five bills, including legislation to help Paradise recover from the 2018 Camp Fire, and legislation to help provide safe and affordable drinking water for the City of Willows.

AB 36 will aid the Paradise recovery by fast tracking construction of the Paradise Irrigation District (PID) water intertie and the Paradise sewer project. Specifically, the legislation authorizes the use of design-build, a cost-effective contracting method that can prevent project delays while providing more flexibility for these projects.

"AB 36 helps ensure that as the town rebuilds, it rebuilds better and more resilient to natural disasters than before by facilitating critical projects that modernize the town's infrastructure," said Gallagher.

AB 379, which restores the natural and cultural right of Native American Tribes to be stewards of conservation land, was also approved by the

Governor. The bill adds tribes to the list of entities the Department of Fish and Wildlife and the Wildlife Conservation Board may enter into agreements with for conservation purposes. The legislation will help the Mechoopda Indian Tribe of Chico Rancheria partner with Chico State to steward property currently managed by Chico State.

The Governor also signed Gallagher's AB 850, which extends the sunset date on a pilot program to encourage the voluntary consolidation of small municipal water systems to improve water services for Californians. The City of Willows, whose drinking water supply has naturally occurring Chromium VI, plans on utilizing this pilot program and supported Gallagher's legislation.

"It is critical that residents feel confident in their drinking water supply, especially in drought years, and AB 850 will help facilitate access to safe, clean and affordable drinking water for the City of Willows," said Gallagher.

In addition to AB 36, AB 379 and AB 850, the Governor signed:

-AB 232 (Gallagher) - This bill requires residents of Arizona, Idaho, Utah, and any other state that require California residents to purchase OHV permits in their state, to obtain a California out-of-state OHV permit before they could legally operate their vehicle in California. Reciprocity is a two-way street. AB 232 will make sure states that rescind OHV reciprocity do not benefit from California's reciprocity law.

Not only is this fair, but it encourages other states to keep their reciprocity laws in place.

-AB 1079 (Gallagher)- This bill, sponsored by the California Lawyers Association, clarifies which beneficiaries under a revocable trust are owed duties by the trustee in the event the settlor or other person holding the power to revoke the trust is deemed incompetent. The bill passed the Assembly and Senate with unanimous support.

Gallagher also spearheaded ACR 27 to continue the "Farm-to-Fork Corridor" into the North State by designating additional portions of SR 99 as part of the Corridor. Originally established by Gallagher in 2019, the Corridor recognizes the people of the North State who dedicate their lives to provide high quality agricultural commodities for California and the United States and helps introduce people to the area where their food is grown. Gallagher also passed ACR 19 to name the portions of Highways 20 and 70 running through the city of Marysville as part of the "Purple Heart Trail." This symbolic trail runs throughout all 50 states to commemorate and honor all men and women who have given their lives in combat while serving in the U.S. armed forces.

in the second half and limited Colusa to much smaller gains through the air and not giving up any touchdowns.



# Planting for the Future; Butte County UC Master Gardeners

**DURHAM, CA (MPG)** - Butte County Master Gardeners (BCMG) had their Fall Plant Sale October 30, at their Demonstration Garden on Patrick Ranch Farm Museum.

The BCMG sold plants propagated by their members. The sale started at 9:00 am and two thirds of the plants were sold by 9:30 am. This plant sale is a fundraiser for the BCMG. It helps them continue to develop the Demonstration Gardens which are teaching tools that give the public examples of what type of plants grow in this area. The available plants included cuttings from plants in the various gardens. Leonotis leonurds, Lion's Tail was available as well as milkweed. Other perennials and some vegetable starts were also available.

The event was well attended with plant shoppers, as well as those there to learn something new at the workshops of the day. One workshop was with Master Gardener Native Plant Expert Cindy Weiner. She explained what to expect when you use native plants in your landscape. The other workshop was with Master Gardener Tom Hansen, horticulture and bee expert, who helped participants understand how to grow grapes and berries. He is an advocate of using shade cloth on hot summer days to protect the fruit from drying out.

The BCMG is part of UC extension. It is supported by the public and agriculture-based businesses. An important service provided by the BCMG is a hotline at e-mail, [mgbutte@ucanr.edu](mailto:mgbutte@ucanr.edu) (preferred) or call: 530-538-7201 (leave a message). This serves backyard gardeners with one acre of land or less. Any type of question or problem regarding plants, trees, drip systems, mulching, composting and other garden concerns is researched, and possible solutions found.

There are three other workshops at the Demonstration Garden in November. Backyard Chickens Nov. 3rd; Espalier Fruit Trees Nov. 9th; and Cleaning Tools Dec.1st. Go to the BCMG website to register for these workshops at <https://ucanr.edu/sites/bcmg/>.
