No Vacancy in Gridley Planning Commission

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley City Council remedied the issue with the vacant positions on the Planning Commission at its regularly scheduled meeting, August 2nd, 2021.

Out of three applicants, Mr. Allan Cornett, Mr. Christopher Gately, and Ms. Beverly Jaimeson, Mr. Cornett and Ms. Jaimeson, attended the July 19th meeting and addressed the Council on why they desired to serve on the Planning Commission. All three potential candidates' applications and resumes were posted on the City's website under Council Agenda and are still viewable. At this most recent meeting of the Gridley City Council, a unanimous vote of the three council members in attendance (Calderon, Farr, Johnson) placed Ms. Jaimeson on the Gridley Planning Commission, with the second vacant seat going to Mr. Cornett.

Ms. Jaimeson brings with her 4 years of experience as Planning Commissioner from a small agricultural town like Gridley, 20+ years working with law enforcement, corrections, and criminal justice. To the first question on the application, "Why are you interested in serving as a volunteer in the Gridley City Planning Commission?" Ms. Jaimeson answered, "It is my desire to be a part of Gridley's future!" and goes on to express her interest in protecting farmland while facilitating development within the community. She holds Master's Degree in Safety and Security Leadership from George Washington University, Washington D.C. and a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice, with a minor in Paralegal Studies from Drury University, Springfield, MO.

Mr. Cornett brings with him years of service on the San Jacinto Valley School Board. To the same first question, Mr. Cornett answers, "After moving to Gridley and recently attending Red Suspenders Days, I realized that the future strategic development of this wonderful city is paramount to ensuring our quality of life, our agricultural roots, and positive economic and residential growth." He adds his love for this city as his reason for wanting to serve on the Planning Commission. Mr. Cornett holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in English and American

Sutter Sheriff Partners with City of Live Oak for First Motor Unit

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sutter County Sheriff's Office, in partnership with the City of Live Oak, is proud to announce the addition of our first motor unit to patrol operations. Due to the increase in city traffic and current construction projects, the addition of a motor unit is a much-needed tool for public safety in the City of Live Oak. Lt. Craig Hungrige proposed the project well over a year ago and both City Manager Aaron Palmer and Sutter County Sheriff Brandon Barnes agreed to support the project.

Caltrans statistics dating back to 2013 show during the busiest month, there was an average traffic volume of approx. 18,800 cars per day coming into Live Oak (from the south on SR99). This average increased each year, showing a daily traffic volume of 21,100 in 2017 (the most recent year for available data) during the busiest month. The traffic congestion has impacted surface streets as well,

resulting in more traffic in our neighborhoods and school zones.

The motorcycle purchased is a 2021 BMW R 1250RT-P. This motorcycle was selected, in part, for some of the safety features BMW offers. The cost, which includes the motorcycle, equipment, and safety equipment for

the deputy was approx. \$43,248.87. The motorcycle was purchased using California's Citizen Options for Public Safety (COPS) funding and will be operated by a trained Sutter County Deputy within the Live Oak City limits.

"The addition of a motor unit shows our willingness

to be innovative in how we approach community issues. Obviously, there will be some enforcement, but we will focus on education and working with the community to make our roads safer for everyone. I am confident this is a model we will be able to expand upon in the coming years," Sheriff Barnes said. ★

YUBA COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Caltrans and its partners celebrated the completion of a crucial \$54 million roadway improvement and bridge construction project on State Highway 20 in Timbuctoo.

"Safety is Caltrans' top priority. This project greatly improves safety by straightening curves, constructing a new bridge and realigning the roadway," said Caltrans District 3 Director Amarjeet S. Benipal. "I applaud our Caltrans construction team and Flatiron Construction for completing work in less than two construction seasons."

More than 8,000 vehicles and approximately 500 trucks per day use this segment of Highway 20.

"Highway 20 is an important artery and

economic link in the Yuba-Sutter region. It was vital that we improve this highway for the safety of motorists and residents," said Yuba County Supervisor Randy Fletcher.

The project provides a longer lasting, smoother roadway and improves safety by straightening curves, constructing a new bridge, widening shoulders, creating an eastbound passing lane and building standard 12-foot wide traffic lanes.

In addition, the project will also include a Timbuctoo Historical Plaza at the Yuba River vista point along Timbuctoo Place near the Parks Bar Bridge. The plaza, which will feature a monument marker, seating area and unique weathered greenstone boulders from the Yuba River, recognizes the history the original Parks

Bar Bridge and the community of Timbuctoo, a once vibrant gold rush-era town with bustling stores and a Wells Fargo stop. With only a handful of residents today, Timbuctoo staked its claim as the largest town in eastern Yuba County in the 1850s.

"Yuba County has a rich history dating back to the beginning of statehood," Benipal said. "Caltrans recognizes the importance of preserving iconic landmarks and letting residents and visitors know about Timbuctoo's past."

Caltrans District 3 maintains more than 4,385 lanes miles of state highway in 11 Sacramento Valley and Northern Sierra counties. For real-time traffic information, go to <http://quickmap.dot.ca.gov/> or download the free Caltrans QuickMap app from the App Store or Google Play. ★

COVID Dashboard to Receive Major Updates

Butte County Department of Public Health

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - As a result of large-scale data cleaning and reconciliation project, Butte County Public Health (BCPH) announced that two major updates will be made to the Butte County COVID-19 Dashboard.

The first update will impact the total number of COVID-19 cases reported to date in Butte County. The public will notice a large increase in the total number of cases - these added cases are not new cases. Instead, these cases represent those that were reported late, misclassified, transferred from other jurisdictions,

or otherwise missed. A total of 457 previous cases will be added to the dashboard.

The second update will change how cases are displayed on the dashboard to more accurately reflect transmission patterns in the county and to better align with reporting methods used by the California Department of Public Health. All new cases will now be displayed on the dashboard using the episode date instead of the date reported to BCPH. Episode date is the date of illness onset or, if illness onset date is unknown, the date the person had a positive lab specimen collected.

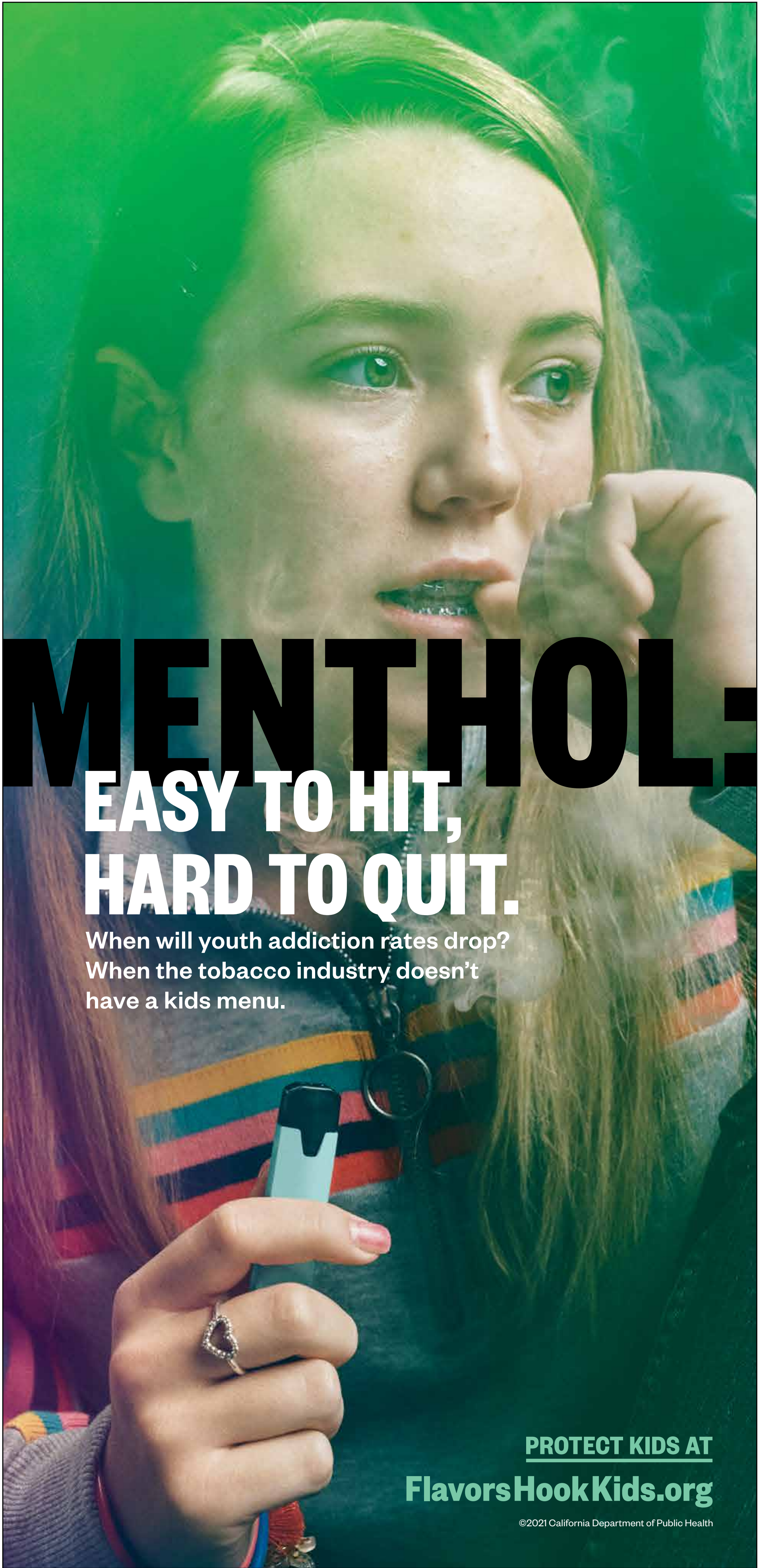

Opportunity Among Chaos: Pandemic Startups

In tough times like these, courageous entrepreneurs strike boldly ahead with innovative ideas, often finding success when the future looks bleakest. It doesn't take a historian to know that notable companies forged their legacies when times were toughest: General Electric, Disney, and IBM, to name a few.

Rather than spending extra time on "honey do" lists that now surround you 24/7, spend the time and money working on your passion project: that novel business idea you've had, that product line you've been tinkering with, or teaming up with coworkers to start a new business in a known field.

Before cashing out your savings in hopes of achieving economic and emotional wealth, two steps are needed: identify your idea and develop a plan.

Step 1: Identify your winning idea

If you are going to be successful, you can't just focus on an idea that has the best return on investment (ROI).

The founders of all successful businesses have at least one thing in common: they had a personal interest in their business. If you are curious about running a restaurant, then talk to other restaurateurs. If you have an interesting idea for a mobile phone application, learn what it takes to develop an application from start to finish. If you have always been intrigued by electronic gadgets, take some online hardware or software development classes.

You can't successfully launch a business in an industry you know nothing about. During this "Great Reset," take time to find what you truly enjoy outside of the confines of the default hamster wheel.

Step 2: The Two (or Seven) P's

Many believe that the term "entrepreneur" is synonymous with "inventor." The difference however is significant: entrepreneurs are inventors who have heeded the adage of the "7 Ps" (two of the "Ps" are planning and preparation). Many people get so tied up in the technical aspects of developing their product or service that they forget the end goal – to make money.

From a legal standpoint, the crucial part of planning and preparation are protecting yourself and your ideas. The feudal protective strategies of the past – constructing a hefty castle and moat – have been replaced by modern day acts of forming legal entities, preparing written agreements, and acquiring patents or trademark registrations.

Your first step should be building the castle that protects you

and all of your treasures. The castle is the entity you decide to form. This entity, if properly formed, selected, and operated, should protect you from liabilities that may arise in your course of business.

While it may be appealing to use one of the great multitude of low cost online providers of "legal solutions," business attorneys can give countless stories of instances where such providers have sold houses made of straw instead of brick. You should engage legal advisors that can understand the complexities of your personal situation and the liabilities of your business.

Just like inviting visitors in your house during the pandemic, you need to be attentive to those that you invite into your castle. If you plan on having business partners, the rules and expectations

need to be clear at the outset. Is the ownership going to be equal? Is the effort going to be equal? Is the compensation going to be fair? Many would-be successful businesses fail because of unclear expectations.

While it may be uncomfortable to have these discussions with your partners, and it may feel as if signing written agreements with your business partners brings an air of untrustworthiness, it is crucial to have defined roles, responsibilities, and financial expectations up front. If your product, service, or brand is unique – at the very

beginning stages - you must take steps to protect them. Patents are limited monopolies to make, use, and sell a certain product or service and are designed to restrict competition. Trademarks ensure that customers know from whom they are purchasing a product or service, and help prevent your competitors from taking sales from you. The laws to protect patents and trademarks are complex, and failure to take initial steps to protect them may foreclose protection later. Never disclose your idea to third parties without taking initial steps to protect them. Your hard work will be for naught if you don't take steps to prevent others from taking your ideas and competing with you.

Use the gift of time to contemplate taking a leap of faith and inventing and planning your future. ★

Dream Flights is focusing on WWII Veterans honoring as many World War II veterans as possible with free Dream Flights in 2021.

Of the 16 million Americans who served in WWII, only an estimated 100,000 will be alive in 2021. The youngest will be 95. September 2nd marks 76 years since the signing of the Japanese Instrument of Surrender, which effectively ended the war.

Every day, the Nation is losing the opportunity to celebrate with our WWII Veterans, so in 2021, Dream Flights is dedicating their entire Dream Flight Tour to WWII veterans. Their mission is to honor as many as possible, thanking them for

fighting for freedom.

Dream Flights is a non-profit organization established and dedicated to honoring seniors and military veterans. Through donors, community support and volunteers, the foundation provides Dream Flights in a Boeing Stearman biplane, the same aircraft used to train many military aviators in the late thirties and early forties.

California Educators Battle Over Woke Math

The modern world runs on mathematics.

From balancing a checkbook to calculating rocket trajectories, human beings rely on their ability to understand and use mathematical tools, and we expect our schools to develop those tools in their young charges.

But how and when?

For the past eight months, a philosophical war has raged in California education circles over a plan to sharply, even radically, change math instruction at all grade levels.

In January, the state Instructional Quality Commission released a draft “mathematics framework” that would shift instruction from the traditional, and somewhat linear, approach to one steeped in race and culture, or “woke” in contemporary parlance.

The draft declares that traditional math instruction, in which students progress from counting and simple arithmetic into geometry, algebra, trigonometry and eventually calculus as they advance through the grades, “has much to correct (because) the subject and community of mathematics has a history of exclusion

and filtering, rather than inclusion and welcoming.”

“There persists a mentality that some people are ‘bad in math’ (or otherwise do not belong), and this mentality pervades many sources and at many levels,” the draft continues. “Girls and Black and Brown children, notably, represent groups that more often receive messages that they are not capable of high-level mathematics, compared to their White and male counterparts.”

To counter that perceived shortcoming, the proposal would have students of all innate abilities remain together well into high school, essentially eliminating accelerated moves into higher-level mathematics, such as calculus, by those who exhibit desire and aptitude.

Moreover, math instruction would be reoriented from the linear manipulation of numbers into a tool for social justice.

“Mathematics educators have an imperative to impart upon their students the argument that mathematics is a tool that can be used to both understand and change the world,” the draft declares.

The draft generated a backlash from advocates of traditional math, including an open letter signed by hundreds of academics.

“California is on the verge of politicizing K-12 math in a potentially disastrous way,” the letter declared. “Its proposed Mathematics Curriculum Framework is presented as a step toward social justice and racial equity, but its effect would be the opposite – to rob all Californians,

especially the poorest and most vulnerable, who always suffer most when schools fail to teach their students. As textbooks and other teaching materials approved by the state would have to follow this framework and since teachers are expected to use it as a guide, its potential to steal a promising future from our children is enormous.”

Rather than reframe math in social justice terms, the critics contend, California should do a better job of teaching math skills that students will need in the real world, particularly students from disadvantaged backgrounds.

The conflict mirrors a previous dustup over an ethnic studies curriculum as well as the current nationwide debate over whether “critical race theory” should be taught in school or banned.

Advocates of the new curriculum are playing with the lives of millions of children and the state’s economic and societal future. Implicitly they are shifting blame for the state’s embarrassingly low scores in nationwide math achievement tests from themselves to the traditional way math has been taught.

How, then, do they explain why kids in other states and nations are thriving with traditional math? Can they prove that their proposal will improve real world outcomes, or are they just indulging their ideological fantasies?

Literature and Languages from Harvard University, a California Single Subject Teaching Credential From California State University, San Bernardino, and has

done graduate work in Education Leadership at Chapman College.

Mr. Cornett and Ms. Jaimeson complete Gridley’s Planning Commission, joining

Chairperson Maria Espino, Vice Chairperson Kenneth Wolfe, and fellow member Sumran Khan. The next scheduled planning commission meeting is August 18th, 2021. ★



Farmers Denied Insurance after Fires Now Eligible for New Coverage

Gov. Gavin Newsom has signed legislation to enable farmers and ranchers to use the state’s insurer of last resort. Senate Bill 11, sponsored by the California Farm Bureau, is intended to help farmers who lost insurance coverage due to wildfires. After record-setting fires, many found that obtaining new coverage was extremely costly or impossible. They can now be insured under the California FAIR plan, a fire insurance pool for high-risk properties.

California Cracks Down on Insect Harmful to Agriculture

California is imposing a quarantine against an invasive insect harmful to agriculture and natural resources. The state Department of Food and Agriculture announced the quarantine this month to prohibit entry into California of plants, materials or containers infested with the spotted lanternfly. The insects, first detected in Pennsylvania, produce a mold from feeding that can threaten grapes, apples and numerous plant and tree species.

Western Farmers, Ranchers Thin Herds, Destroy Crops Due to Drought

Farmers in California and a dozen other states are increasingly selling livestock and letting fields go fallow due to severe drought in the western U.S. According to an American Farm Bureau survey, 85 percent of ranchers reported selling off portions of livestock herds due to drought impacts on water supplies and grazing lands. Some 77 percent of growers were destroying crops due to water shortages. Nearly 80 percent of the West is in severe drought.

USDA Offering Grants to Timber Businesses Hard-Hit by Pandemic

Timber harvesting, hauling and processing businesses can now apply for grants to offset financial losses suffered during the pandemic. The U.S. Department of Agriculture is providing up to \$200 million in total relief to help timber businesses. Firms that suffered revenue losses of 10 percent or more in 2020 may apply for grants between July 22 and October 15 this year. ★

Doug LaMalfa Water Update A Unanimous Vote

For the past decade our district has faced numerous disasters and near-disasters, from the failure of Oroville Dam’s spillway to several years of drought and repeated wildfires that have destroyed towns, wreaked havoc on our environment and the morale of our people. As your Member of Congress, I am continually working to address our water storage needs and change Forest Service policies to allow the USFS to thin our overgrown forests to reduce fire risks.

I have been a leading advocate for building more water storage in California and particularly building Sites Reservoir in both Glenn and Colusa Counties. This off-stream storage facility takes water normally lost during high flows from winter floods and stores it for the summer months and dry years. In total, Sites Reservoir would create a significant amount of water - over 1.5-million-acre feet of water capacity - which is almost half of the capacity of Lake Oroville and can be used for agriculture or drinking water whenever it is needed.

In 2016, I helped pass the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation (WIIN) Act, which included a section I wrote to federally authorize several water storage projects in California. This has resulted in a \$23.7 million investment in Sites

Reservoir to finish environmental reviews, permitting, and engineering work. In November of 2018, I helped secure a \$449 million USDA low-interest loan to continue the project. Just this past week, I submitted a budget amendment for \$1 billion to complete the funding required to build the project which would be combined with \$816 million from California Proposition 1 water bond funds, and \$44 million from local stakeholders. Sites Reservoir is my top proposal to build additional water storage and protect North State water.

Unfortunately, this year is our second worst drought on record, and it is having a major impact. Yesterday, due to the State’s decision to prematurely dump water in the winter and spring, Lake Oroville measured at too low to produce electricity despite our power grid being more strained than ever. Domestic wells are starting to go dry across the district because of drought and lack of the agricultural irrigation that recharges the aquifers. I have called on the Biden Administration to accelerate the effort to get clean drinking water to our rural communities that need help. Our local counties are coordinating with California on ways to help. If your well has gone dry, please report it here.

The federal government cut off water to the Klamath Basin completely this year, including the federal wildlife refuges that use agricultural canal systems to deliver much needed water for shorebird and migratory nesting ducks. This water, which is stored in Upper Klamath Lake, is owned by the farmers in the area. The new Department of Interior has rescinded legal

opinions that would have delivered water to farmers and the refuges. I recently announced a \$15 million down payment of drought aid from the Bureau of Reclamation. Now, my colleague Representative Cliff Bentz (OR-02) and I are negotiating a bipartisan supplemental aid package in the House and Senate to help the area through this government-created disaster. I know farmers would rather farm with their water but they may need help now so they can survive until next year.

While this aid will help the community, a lack of water will result in damage to countless farms, dry wells and devastation to the ecology of the refuges. Last year, I was at the Tule Lake wildlife refuge with the California Waterfowl Association to discuss the botulism outbreak due to the lower water level and how I had been working with the previous Administration to deliver water to prevent die off of ducks. Even with the additional water I restored, over 60,000 shorebirds died from the outbreak last year and that was with Klamath Basin farmers having some water and doing everything they could to divert water to the refuge and providing habitat for the birds on their farms. This year, with no water, we could be facing far worse conditions. This is a result of species-specific management that holds water artificially high in the Upper Klamath Lake for a suckerfish and releases the rest downriver for salmon, resulting in the worst of all worlds: no water for shorebirds, no water for farms, salmon and suckerfish populations continue to plummet, and the local economy is devastated.

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - At its last July meeting, the Live Oak City Council managed to come to a vote that reversed the City shutdown - not without a lot of difficult discussion, heated comments from concerned residents, and multiple failed motions.

The major draw of the nearly 40 residents in attendance, including “non-essential” employees left without work due to the shutdown of the City of Live Oak effective midnight, July 14th, was Agenda Item 9: Adoption of the City Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22. The budget had failed multiple times, victim to a 2-2 vote standstill (Councilmen J.R. Thiara and Lakhvir Ghag voting “No”, Vice Mayor Nancy Santana and Councilman Bob Woten voting “Yes”). A two-week continuation brought the budget back to the July 21st agenda for a final vote, which if not passed, would fully shut down city operations and affect full-time staff.

After other agenda items of import continued to fail due to the voting pattern of Thiara/Ghag voting - No, and Santana/Woten – Yes (2:2 standstill): *Items 6: Resolution of the City Council of the City of Live Oak approving a Tax Collection Schedule for Fiscal year 2021-22 for Community Facilities District No. 2004-1* (explained to those in attendance as a Mello Roos tax that partially funds Police, Fire and Animal Control services); *Item 7: Resolution of the City Council of the City of Live Oak Approving a Tax Collection Schedule for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 for the Communities Facilities District No. 92-1* (explained as a tax in which 2/3 of funds is designated to the Live Oak School District and the remaining 1/3 of funds previously designated for animal control facilities); and *Item 8: Consideration of Resolution of the City Council of the City of Live Oak Calling a Special Election on November 16, 2021 and Requesting Sutter*

County Elections to Provide Elections Services (to fill the vacant and 5th seat on the Live Oak City Council); an agitated gallery of citizens prepared themselves for the vote on Item 9.

Although vetted by outside agencies as a solid budget with a \$170,000 surplus, the FY 2021-2022 Budget failed, once again, with Council voting 2:2. Community members pushed back hard on the decision, which in turn began a serious discussion between Council, City Manager Aaron Palmer and City Attorney Nicole Rosser. A motion to pass 2/12ths of the budget was brought forth for a vote, and it passed unanimously.

The passing of 2/12ths percentage of the budget approved enough funding to reverse the shutdown and allowed for the resumed operation of the Parks and Recreation Department (most notably the City Pool) and put 20 “non-essential”, or part-time employees back to work. It also prevented a full shutdown of the city and approved payroll retroactive to the original shutdown date of July 14th, 2021, according to Palmer.

It had been publicized that a potential Special Meeting of the City of Live Oak would be held July 28th to revisit the approval of least two weeks payroll to pay city employees affected by the shut down and for approval to allow Sutter County Elections office to hold a special election on behalf of the City of Live Oak to fill the vacant council seat. According to Palmer, that meeting became unnecessary due to the passing of the 2/12ths of the FY 2021-2022 Budget. The City Council had until July 30th to fill the vacancy and if unable, the responsibility would automatically default to the Sutter County Elections office to begin the special election process.

The Live Oak City Council is set to convene at its regularly scheduled meeting, August 4th, 6:00 pm at Live Oak City Hall to revisit the two tax schedule items referenced earlier (items 6 & 7) in this article and the FY 2021-2022 budget. ★

Upon his retirement after 28 years with the Chico Police Department, Commander O’Brien continued his passion to help others, becoming a police chaplain helping people deal with trauma and personal struggles. O’Brien was one of a few selected chaplains to work with Capitol Police officers after the deadly siege of the Capitol building on January 6, 2021. Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said Commander O’Brien was the clear choice to assume command of

BINTF because of his dedication to the community, his experience, and his proven leadership. BINTF was initially formed in 1986 as a multi-agency task force focused on the detection and elimination of illegal street and prescription drugs sales. BINTF utilizes specialized investigators who operate in both South and North Butte County. The BINTF Commander reports to the BINTF Board, which consists of the District Attorney, the Butte County Sheriff, Probation Department Chief and the chiefs of local police agencies and CHP. ★

Vegetarian Diet

Dear Readers,

By now, you probably know someone who has adopted a vegetarian diet. Estimates put vegetarianism at around 5% of the American population (1). That may not sound like many, but it comes to roughly 16.5 million people. People cite different reasons for converting to vegetarianism, from better health to environmental factors to better treatment of animals.

There are various types of vegetarians, but all base their diets on plant foods.

1. Vegans- eat only plant foods.
2. Lactovegetarians-do not eat red or white meat, fish, or shellfish but drink milk and consume cheese and yogurt.
3. Lacto-ovo vegetarians do not eat red or white meat, fish, or shellfish but enjoy milk, eggs, cheese, and yogurt.
4. Pescatarian-sometimes considered semi-vegetarian or flexitarian. This group eats fish and shellfish but abstains from red and white meat. Some pescatarians consume milk products and eggs, while others do not.
5. Flexitarian-these are vegetarians that cheat. No, really, these are people who are in the process of going vegetarian and, on occasion, will eat a meat product.

If you are considering vegetarianism, it may be wise to do some meal planning to get all the nutrients needed for good health. Below are some essential nutrients to consider:

1. Iron is needed to take oxygen to our cells. But have no fear; it is abundant in lentils and leafy greens. Vitamin C aids in iron absorption, so have oranges available.

2. Calcium is needed for strong bones. Our bodies stop building bone between the ages of 18-21, making it essential to obtain this nutrient in your diet every day. Plant sources include fortified soy, almond, and rice milk. Be sure to check the label, as not every product is calcium-fortified. You can also get calcium in certain vegetables, like broccoli and bok choy.

3. Vitamin D is needed to lay calcium to the bone and aids in immune health. Our bodies have to capacity to make this vitamin, but it requires consistent sunlight exposure. Keep in mind that the sun is also the leading cause of skin cancer, so choosing fortified foods may be a better option. These include plant-based milk, orange juice, and breakfast cereals.

4. Vitamin B12 is needed for the proper functioning of the nervous system and in the production of red blood cells. The most reliable source of B12 for vegans is found in fortified foods. However, it is also in dried purple laver, a type of seaweed.

In today's market, several meat substitutes are fortified with some of the nutrients mentioned above. Again, be a label reader. Of course, there are also vitamin and mineral supplements. If you choose this route, be sure to purchase a supplement with USP on the label. USP stands for United States Pharmacopeia, a non-profit group that tests supplements to be sure they contain what the label claims and can be absorbed by the body.

Gas Safety Tips

Safety is our highest priority. Follow these safety tips to keep yourself and your family safe.

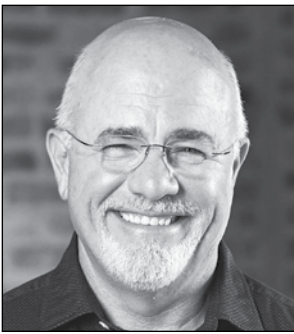
- Never use a flashlight, match or candle to look for gas leaks, and never turn electric switches on or off if you suspect a gas leak.
- Do not store flammable materials such as mops, brooms, laundry and newspapers near your water heater, furnace, oven, range or any gas appliance.
- Do not store combustible materials such as paints, solvents and gasoline in the same room as your water heater, furnace, oven, range or any gas appliance.
- Stock your kitchen with a fire extinguisher.
- If a pilot light is out, shut off the gas at the appliance gas shutoff valve. Wait five minutes to let gas disperse before trying to relight the appliance pilot light.

What to do if you suspect a gas leak

- Alert everyone nearby and leave the area immediately to an upwind location.
- Do not use anything that could be a source of ignition, including cell phones, flashlights, light switches, matches or vehicles, until you are a safe distance away.
- Call 9-1-1 for emergency assistance and then Call PG&E at 1-800-743-5000.

If you Need a Co-signer, You're Not Ready

Dear Dave,

My fiancée and I want to make an offer on a house. She has a lot of late payments and a bad credit record, though, but she is working hard to manage her money better and get out of debt. I don't make enough money to get a home loan by myself, and I have some debt to pay off, too. In order to help us out, my aunt and uncle said they are willing to co-sign a mortgage loan for us. What do you think of that idea?

Here's a simple, solid piece of advice for anyone looking to make a purchase of any kind. If you need a co-signer, you're not ready

to make that purchase – period. I'm not trying to beat you up or anything, but it's way too soon for you two to be thinking about buying a home. I mean, for starters you're just engaged right now.

When a lender requires a co-signer, it basically means they don't believe you'll pay back the money. And besides, you two don't need a house now or right after you get married. The two of you should get married, and live in a decent, inexpensive apartment for a while. During that time, you both need to work hard on paying off all your debt. After that, save up an emergency fund of three to six months of expenses. Then, start setting aside cash for a down payment on a modest home.

When it comes time to buy a home, I recommend a 15-year, fixed rate loan with a down payment of at least 10%. Twenty percent is better, because it will help you avoid having to pay PMI (private mortgage insurance). Make sure

the monthly payments on the loan are no more than 25% of your combined take home pay. Keeping the payments at 25% or below will make it easier to address other important financial issues, like saving and investing.

Your aunt and uncle are obviously generous people, Evan, but they're a little misguided in their offer. At this point, helping you two buy a house – something you obviously can't afford – would be a huge burden instead of a blessing.

The dreaded Black Widow is a messy web maker. They seem to make a big bunch of webbing that goes in and out

and round-about. To get their webs wiped out is a tough job of becoming tangled in very sticky, very resilient fiber. While swiping webs there is the thrill that one of those black shiny killers will jump out from somewhere. I have never seen one do this jumping out but it is one of those things that I'm convinced could happen.

I've met a lot of people who will do anything to stay away from spiders. This is a hard goal if you like going outside. In California alone there are 66 unique species of spiders. Others come into the state in luggage, cargo, cars, planes and trains. They come in many colors and body types. There are the wispy Daddy Longlegs

that live everywhere. The bold little wolf spiders, who tend to be jumpy. Those who make trap doors on the ground. Some webs stretch across large expanses from tree to tree and look like jewels when dew is captured in the strands. All of these spiders have venom but only a few can cause poisoning in humans.

A few types of venomous spiders can be found in California. In Northern California these spiders are the black widow spider, and the yellow sac spider. In Southern California there is a brown widow spider, also the desert recluse spider and the Chilean recluse spider SoCal can keep this record of more poisonous spiders, as far as I'm concerned. ★
