GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Hazel Street loop in front of the High School, the staging area for the Gridley-Biggs Old Glory Run, was packed with vehicles, families and flags the morning of October 17th.

Patriotic parades have become popular weekend events in our area, but the Old Glory run was the first to be held in Gridley. After being privy to a lot of community interest in the Trump Parades happening in Oroville, Marysville and Chico, organizer Suzy Snowden decided that Gridley and Biggs needed its own patriotic "run" and put together last Saturday's event.

Snowden shares that Gridley and

Biggs Run was designed to coordinate with the national "Old Glory

Run" held nationwide the same date. Although she has participated in the area "Trump Parades", she wanted to welcome the community out to show their pride in the nation. "The thing is, everyone is invited, regardless of who you're voting for, regardless of what you believe in," says Snowden "and we want to keep it that way."

Patriots of all ages gathered early, some with their colors already up, others prepping their vehicles on site and the rest enjoying the camaraderie that has grown amongst the parade goers. All available space on vehicles

was fair game to display "Old Glory" herself, the "Thin Blue Line", "Thin Green Line" and firefighter flags. Of course, a strong presence of "Trump" flags could be seen. Also strong - the turnout. Snowden's expectation of 40-50 vehicles "a good turnout for Gridley" she says was blown away by the actual 150-175 cars, trucks and motorcycles that came from as far as Orland, Chico and Marysville for the flag-flying-fun.

The parade launched from Gridley High School and made a large loop

Butte County Moves to Tier 3 (ORANGE)

**Butte County
Special Release**

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Butte County has moved from Tier 2 (red) to a less-restrictive Tier 3 (orange) of the State's COVID-19 Blueprint for a Safer Economy, a shift that allows more businesses to reopen and some that are already open to increase capacity.

This change in tiers is effective immediately for some business sectors in Butte County. The data requirements to qualify for Tier 3 include a case rate of 1-3.9 cases per 100,000 residents with a test positivity rate of 2 - 4.9% or less and 2.2 - 5.2% health equity metric.

The current Butte County COVID19 case rate is 3.5 cases per 100,000 residents with a 1.8% test positivity rate and a 1.4% health equity metric.

What is the biggest change for Tier 3? Many businesses previously allowed to open indoors at reduced capacity may now continue to be open indoors with increased capacity in Tier 3. Tier 3 also allows several business sectors to be open that have previously been closed or limited to outdoor or remote operations.

Tier 3 allows for; Bars, breweries and distilleries: open outdoors with modifications; Offices: open indoors with modifications, encourage telework; Cardrooms and Satellite Wagering: open indoors with modification, max 25% capacity.

What business sectors can open in Tier 3? To get a full understanding of which business sectors and activities may change operations in Tier 3 (orange), the public can visit the State's Blueprint for activities and business tiers: tinyurl.com/CATierFramework

What is not allowed to open in Tier 3? Concert Venues; Festivals; Live Theatre; Nightclubs; Saunas and Steam Rooms; Theme Parks.

Attention Class! *Schools Resume In-person Instruction*

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Many Gridley, Manzanita and Biggs students have not seen the inside of a classroom in 7 months, since Covid-19 shut down schools and forced distance learning. The downgrade from Tier Purple to Tier Red has allowed schools across Butte County to reopen, without submitting a waiver, and each district seems to be approaching the reopening differently.

Manzanita School District is operating on a split day schedule and reducing classroom sizes by having students in cohorts of around 15 or less. Students are attending in-person instruction on campus either in an AM or PM group, with Fridays designated as distance learning/independent

study/intervention classes all students.

Biggs, which is the only School District in our

immediate area that has an approved waiver to return to in-person instruction, is continuing its efforts in

There is a uniquely American political phrase - October Surprise. Because we have our Presidential elections in November, most truly vote changing, and at the same time, surprising storyline plot twists that affect elections usually occur in October. In 1840 (in mid-October) Federal Prosecutors announced plans to charge Whig Party operatives for committing "stupendous and atrocious fraud" by paying Pennsylvanians to cross the state line and vote for winning candidates in New York during the 1838 elections. Fast forward to 1884; Republican nominee James Blaine attended a meeting at which a Presbyterian preacher claimed that the Democrats are the party of "Rum, Romanism, and Rebellion." Blaine did not repudiate this sermon, and anti-prohibitionist, Catholic immigrant, and Southerner support evaporated - just before the election, and he lost. In 1940 president Roosevelt woke up to find that his Press Secretary, Mr. Early, had kneed a black Police Officer in the groin outside Madison Square Garden. The outrage in the Black Community was such that Roosevelt found U.S. General Benjamin Davis, one of the few African-American Generals at the time, and promptly announced the creation of the Tuskegee Airmen, a

squadron of all black aviators to make his October surprise go away. (It was a great movie, but they didn't mention that was the political reason they formed that squadron). That's how Roosevelt handled his October surprise - For 2020, we have Gridley's October Surprise. Three City Council members are on the ballot, and a high ranking City employee has made an October appearance in the prominent and historic weekly community newspaper of record: in the police blotter... under the arrests section. I have no idea what Councilmen R. Borges, Z. Torres, B. Johnson, C. Williams, and Q. Crye will do, but as a wise old man (who never lost an election in Gridley ever) once said to me, "the most important thing a Council can do is hire good people."

I've been getting a lot of pressure to say something in this column regarding the numerous candidates for City Council in Live Oak. I attribute all of this campaign season angst to the savvy candidates who put their signs along Highway 99 - where the average commuter now spends about 3.6 hours a day if they drive From Gridley to Yuba City. Additionally, these erstwhile public servants placed their political signs where people going to and from Dutch Brothers addiction facilitation center would see them while waiting for peppy, happy young people to sell them coffee or not so hot chocolate. I would bet the campaign signs have gotten more viewer hours than Netflix in the last two months with those two locations. There are three open seats, but I am all in for four of the hopeful candidates. Dale Carlson, Nancy Santana, Al "eks" Tica and, of course,

Live Oak High living legend - Lakvir Ghag.

Their systems utilize AM/PM schedules, smaller classroom sizes, and rotating “A” and “B” groups between scheduled days of in-person instructions with distance learning. According to the District Office, each Wednesday

In contrast, Gridley campuses will close for in-person instruction to receive a deep cleaning. Additionally, the district is staggering the return of grade levels to on-campus classes; Pre-K, K, 7th, 8th, special education, and high school grade students returned to school October 19. Grades 1, 2, and 6 will resume October 26th, with 3, 4, 5 joining their peers on October 29th. Because

separated throughout the day, desks facing one direction and adequately spaced out, rotating recess & break times and controlling entry, exit and traffic flow to and through the school. All teachers and students will be required to wear masks and desks/classes sanitized between classes or breaks. A Home Learning Program has been put in place for those who do not feel ready for the return to daily in-person instruction, but due to staffing, it may include multiple grades in one virtual class setting.

While a majority of parents and students are excited to return to the classrooms, some are not comfortable yet, and have been made even more so by GUSD urgency to get back to classrooms. A concerned parent who wishes to remain anonymous has expressed that herself and other parents have felt “strong-armed” by GUSD to return to in-person instruction “Full Force” and would have felt more comfortable with a paced return or hybrid-schedule. At the last GUSD Board meeting held Wednesday, October 14th, parent Jen Kramer, advocated for a hybrid model as a third option for attendance, instead of an “all or nothing” approach. When asked if that could be an option, Superintendent Reeves said that the “preference is that we return to school in a full-time model. So we return to classes as the traditional model week.”

If COVID should become an issue, both GUSD and MUSD may be required to suspend on-campus education and revert to distance learning platforms, at least temporarily. ★

through the Gridley, Manzanita and Biggs areas where people lined the streets to cheer on the caravan. Snowden says after “everything that we have been through this year, individually, and collectively...everything....it’s just really nice to get out and be with people... You kind of forget that we’re all in this

together.” She continues, “It’s just a really great way for everybody to get together, you know, and show their love for our country, show their love for the flag and what it stands for and appreciate what we have here.”

Snowden is considering organizing future events, including a Flag Run, days before Election Day wherein those interested would caravan to Oroville to drop their ballots off at the Butte County Office of Elections drive-thru drop-box. 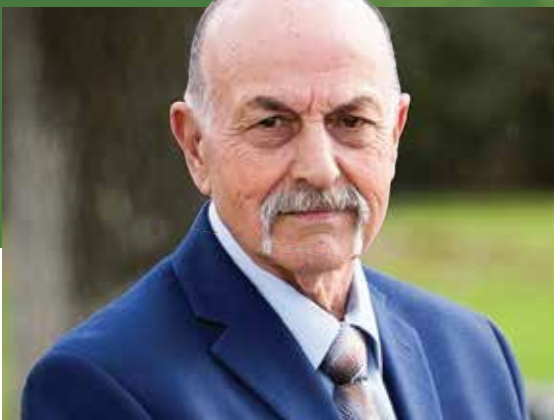

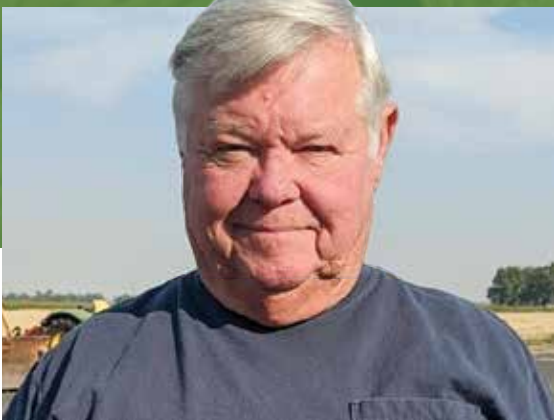

Misusing Taxpayers' Money for Campaigns

California voters are not only voting on presidential, congressional, legislative and local government offices and a dozen statewide ballot measures but deciding the fate of 234 local tax and bond measures.

The California Taxpayers Association estimates that if passed, the local tax measures would raise about \$1.5 billion a year in new revenues. The proposed bond issues, mostly for schools, total nearly \$15 billion and their passage would automatically trigger increases in property taxes to repay lenders.

These are hefty financial stakes and the local officials that placed measures on the ballot have reason to worry about their passage. Voters rejected 62% of the 239 local measures on the March 3 primary ballot — and that was before the COVID-19 pandemic struck home, the state's economy plummeted and more than two million jobs were erased.

The recession that's still raging is a two-edged sword for local government and school officials. It has cut their tax revenues sharply and also tends to make voters even more leery about

paying higher taxes.

City council members, county supervisors and school trustees are tempted, in their zeal to persuade voters to vote for new taxes and bonds, to violate a state law prohibiting them from using taxpayer funds for campaign purposes.

Government Code Section 54964 forthrightly declares, "An officer, employee, or consultant of a local agency may not expend or authorize the expenditure of any of the funds of the local agency to support or oppose the approval or rejection of a ballot measure, or the election or defeat of a candidate, by the voters."

In fact, such violations have become commonplace in recent years. Under the guise of providing "information," local officials routinely hire campaign management firms to design advertisements, mailers and other material aimed at persuading voters to pass the proposed taxes and bonds.

They have done so because they know that state and local prosecutors just as routinely refuse to prosecute violations of Section 54964 by their fellow officeholders.

The only investigative agency to interest itself in such violations is the California Fair Political Practices Commission and while the FPPC lacks authority to enforce Section 54964, it can treat agencies that step over the line dividing information from advocacy as campaign contributors.

Recently, for example, the FPPC targeted the

County of Los Angeles, which in 2017 spent a million dollars for an ill-disguised, but successful, campaign to pass Measure H, a quarter-cent increase in the sales tax. The campaign included broadcast commercials in English and Spanish that used the slogan "Real Help. Lasting Change."

County officials, without admitting liability, agreed to pay the FPPC a \$1.35 million penalty for failing to report their spending as a campaign contribution. However, that pales in comparison to the estimated \$355 million a year that Measure H's passage will generate.

Last week, the FPPC invited the public to use its "AdWATCH" program to monitor the materials local officials are using to promote their tax and bond measures and upload questionable items to the agency for examination and perhaps investigation.

"The public can play a vital role in helping our enforcement division in making sure campaigns and public agencies are following the rules and ensuring a level playing field," FPPC Chair Richard C. Miadich said in a statement.

The FPPC's efforts are welcome, despite being an indirect and relatively weak way of discouraging improper use of taxpayer funds for campaigns, but it's likely to be the only way as long as prosecutors refuse to enforce the law.

BCSO Announces Arrest Related to Shooting Investigation

OROVILLE, CA (MPG) - On October 11, 2020, the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) responded to a report of a shooting at a residence located near the 5300 block of Margo Lane, Oroville. Deputies arrived and determined a 12-year-old victim had been shot. The 12-year-old victim was transported to a local hospital, and later transferred by helicopter to a Sacramento area hospital. The 12-year-old victim is currently in stable condition.

Deputies and detectives spent the last two days conducting an investigation. Based on the investigation, detectives determined a 16-year-old juvenile shot

the 12-year-old victim. The 16-year-old juvenile was booked at the Butte County Juvenile Hall on felony charges related to the shooting. On October 12, detectives served a search warrant related to the shooting investigation at a residence located in the 300 block of Lausen Street, Oroville.

Based on the fact this is an ongoing investigation involving a juvenile victim and juvenile suspect, the Sheriff's Office is not releasing further details about the investigation at this time. The Sheriff's Office is asking anyone with additional information about this investigation to contact Detective Jason Miller or Detective Zach Price at 530-538-7671. ★

Senator Cotton to Big Tech After Censorship of Biden-Burisma Report: 'Winter Is Coming' | 16 Oct 2020 | Sen. Tom Cotton (R-AR) on Thursday warned Big Tech "oligarchs" that they will soon face regulation, after Twitter and Facebook censored reports from the *New York Post* that were unflattering to former Vice President Joe Biden and his son Hunter Biden. After the first of the series of articles published, Facebook reduced the articles' distribution and Twitter slapped a warning label on the stories and locked accounts belonging to the *Post* and those associated with the Trump campaign, claiming the stories violated their policy on hacked material... Republican senators requested subpoenas for the heads of Facebook and Twitter to testify before the Senate. "You have big tech oligarchs declaring war on Donald Trump, on the Republican Party, on conservatives across America," Cotton said on a Trump campaign press call on Thursday. "Refusing to allow people to post the url of a story, and then they just issue a mealy-mouthed apology saying that they could have communicated better...that is not exactly the standard that big tech oligarchs apply to every story about Donald Trump for the last five years," he said. "And for all of those tech oligarchs who think they can get away with this, I will simply say that winter is coming."

Rep. Ken Buck demands DOJ investigate removal of big tech protections after censoring of NYPost Biden article | 14 Oct 2020 | Rep. Ken Buck, R-Colo., sent a letter to the Department of Justice on Wednesday, asking the attorney general to look into accusations of censorship by Twitter and Facebook, after the big tech giants took steps to limit the exposure of a New York Post article critical of Hunter Biden. "I write to express my concerns regarding Twitter and Facebook's recent actions to censor a prominent American news outlet," Buck began. "These actions violate the platform's immunity under Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act and threaten to chill free speech throughout our nation." The NY Post story, entitled "Smoking-gun email reveals how Hunter Biden introduced Ukrainian businessman to VP dad," touched upon reports that the former vice president's son had unscrupulous financial and business ties to a natural gas firm in Ukraine — Burisma Holdings — and that his father later stepped in to have a probing prosecutor fired for looking into the matter.

Twitter Locks Trump Campaign Account Over Hunter Biden Post - Spokesman | 15 Oct 2020 | Trump's reelection campaign said Thursday that Twitter suspended its official account, claiming that Team Trump's post about Democratic presidential nominee Joe Biden and his son, Hunter, is a violation of its policy. "Your account has been locked," the Twitter message said. "What happened? We have determined that this account violated the Twitter Rules. Specifically, for: Violating our rules against posting private information." The account was active and posting on Twitter again hours after campaign officials first said it had been locked. The original campaign post which Trump campaign spokesman Tim Murtaugh said triggered Twitter to take action was apparently taken down. The incident came less than three weeks from the Nov. 3 election.

California wildfire that killed 4 may have been sparked by power line equipment —The Zogg Fire erupted in Shasta County in September and destroyed over 200 structures | 11 Oct 2020 | Investigators in California probing the cause of a recent wildfire that killed four people have taken possession of equipment belonging to Pacific Gas and Electric, the utility said Friday. In a filing with the California Public Utilities Commission, PG&E said investigators with the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (Cal Fire) have taken some of its equipment as part of the ongoing investigation into the Zogg Fire. The Zogg Fire erupted in Shasta County on Sept. 27 as high winds were impacting the region, quickly growing into a blaze that has consumed at least 56,338 acres. The fire killed four people in the community of Igo and later spread into neighboring Tehama County. ★

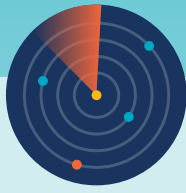

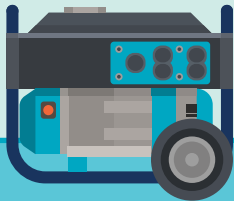

There have been some small orange bugs on our black-eyed peas. They have shown up as little piles of crawling orange bugs with longest legs. Mostly I've ignored them and brushed them off easily. I finally saw an adult leaf foot bug and wondered if the little orange bugs were their

nymphs. Sure, enough that's what all those little orange bugs were. I looked them up because I could not see damage and I wondered if they were beneficials. Sorta, kinda beneficials. They are a sucking bug and do eat some plants but not enough to cause much harm. In their orange nymph stage, they will eat scale, sometimes aphids. They are one of those mid-way between beneficial and pest bugs. Another of these types of sorta, kinda beneficials is the praying mantis. It is great to eat pest bugs but it also eats beneficial bugs like lady bugs and lacewings. I'm happy to have the leaf foot bugs they are better to have than Squash Bugs or Cucumber Beetles because

the leaf foot causes very little damage to plants.

There have been a lot of the little Skipper butterflies on the flowers recently. I always wonder when I see them if they are moths. When I was a child in the Bay Area, we called them Scotties. I looked them up and they are officially called Skipper Butterflies. Small and brown with folded wings they flit from flower to flower and are wonderful to watch. They like Dandelions and Lantana. My Lantana is a bright yellow with variegated green and yellowish leaves. When the Skippers are on this Lantana, they are easy to see in contrast with their little brown bodies. Loving the end of warm days delight. ★

Friday Evening Crash Claims Life of Gridley Woman

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - A Gridley family will not be the same after a 2-collision event that occurred during the evening hours of Friday, October 16th.

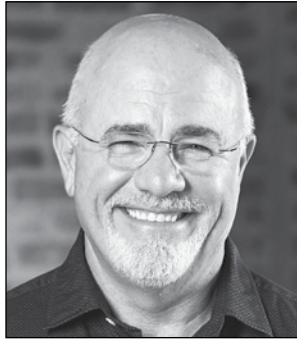
Two women from Gridley, ages 44 and 54, accompanied by two children, a 2-year-old boy and 4-year-old girl, were traveling on Live Oak Boulevard north of Yuba City when they were involved in a minor traffic collision. The women exited the disabled Chevy traverse, which had come to rest in the southbound lane just north of Eager Rd, to check on the children in the back seat.

It was at that time, a second vehicle, a Chevy Equinox traveling southbound on Live Oak Boulevard, approached the scene. The driver of that vehicle, a 77-year-old man from Yuba City, failed

to see the vehicle blocking the roadway and the two women outside of the vehicle. According to the CHP press release, the Equinox attempted to swerve to the left at the last minute but struck the vehicle and both women.

The 54-year-old woman was fatally injured, and all other parties involved, including an 84-year-old woman passenger, were transported to Adventist Rideout Hospital in Marysville for treatment. The 44-year old woman sustained major injuries, the 4-year-old female moderate injuries, and the 2-year-old boy was transferred to UC Davis. The Yuba City man and woman traveling in the Equinox were also treated for minor injuries, with the passengers' injuries not quantified.

An investigation into the incident is still on-going but drugs and alcohol do not appear to be factors in the deadly crash. ★

wisdom.

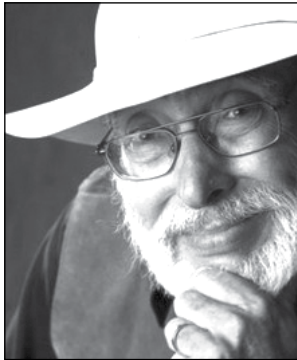

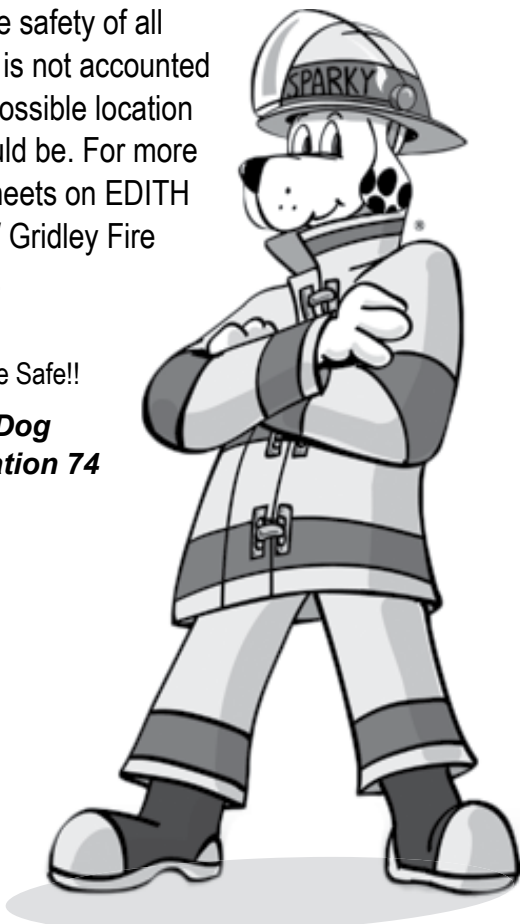

Dear Dietitian

Omega-3s

Dear Dietitian,

My father had heart disease, so I am careful about my diet. I eat right and exercise. I understand how important omega-3 fatty acids are for the heart, but I don't like salmon, and some of the other fish high in omega-3s are expensive. Do you have any recommendations?

Thank you, Teresa

Dear Teresa,

I commend you on being proactive in your healthy lifestyle. Salmon isn't one of my favorites, either. The good news is there is more than one affordable fish in the sea. Various types of fish and seafood contain omega-s, though not as much as salmon.

There are three main omega-3 fatty acids: eicosapentaenoic acid (EPA), docosahexaenoic acid (DHA), and alpha-linolenic acid (ALA). Most of the studies that link omega-3s to heart health are EPA and DHA. Small amounts of ALA (2-5%) can be converted to EPA and DHA. EPA and DHA are found in animal products, the highest amounts in fatty fish, such as salmon, trout, mackerel, and sardines. ALA is found in plant foods, like flax seeds, tofu, and plant oils, such as canola oil.

Omega-3s are being studied for their effect on several diseases, such as depression, macular degeneration, and autoimmune disorders. Still, the most compelling results have been found on their impact on preventing heart disease.

While there is no Recommended Daily Allowance (RDA) for omega-3s, many professional organizations have issued guidelines, but they vary widely. The lowest amount recommended is 250 mg/day. The American Heart Association recommends eating non-fried oily fish twice weekly to get your omega-3s (1). Another recommendation is to consume eight ounces of variable seafood each week. The following table presents the

amount of omega-3s in fish and seafood (2).

Food, 3 Ounces, Cooked	Grams Omega-3/ Serving
Herring, Atlantic	1.71
Trout, rainbow, wild	0.84
Shrimp	0.24
Salmon, Atlantic, farmed	1.83
Cod, Pacific	0.14
Oysters, eastern, wild	0.67
Tilapia	0.15
Tuna, light, canned in water	0.19

ALA is an essential nutrient, meaning our bodies need it for good health but cannot make it, so we must obtain it in our diet. Without it, a scaly rash on the skin and decreased growth in infants and children will occur. The Adequate Intake (AI) is 1.6 grams per day for men fifty-one years and older and 1.1 g per day for women in the same age range. ALA deficiencies are rare in the US but were reported in the 1970s in those receiving intravenous feedings.

Many plant foods are rich sources of ALA. These foods are also high in fiber and other vitamins and minerals. You can find creative ways to add these foods to your omega-3 profile. Chia seeds add a nice crunch to smoothies or oatmeal. Ground flax seeds bring added nutrients to your morning cereal or afternoon yogurt. Tofu is another rich source of ALA. You can use it as your protein source in stir fry or add it to your favorite fruit for ice cream. Edamame has gained popularity in recent years. It makes a healthy snack; just roast it in the oven with a pinch of salt. You can also add it to salad as a protein source or serve it as a side dish.

Research has shown that consuming fish and seafood high in omega-3 fatty acids can help reduce the risk of heart disease. That's a recipe for a happy heart.

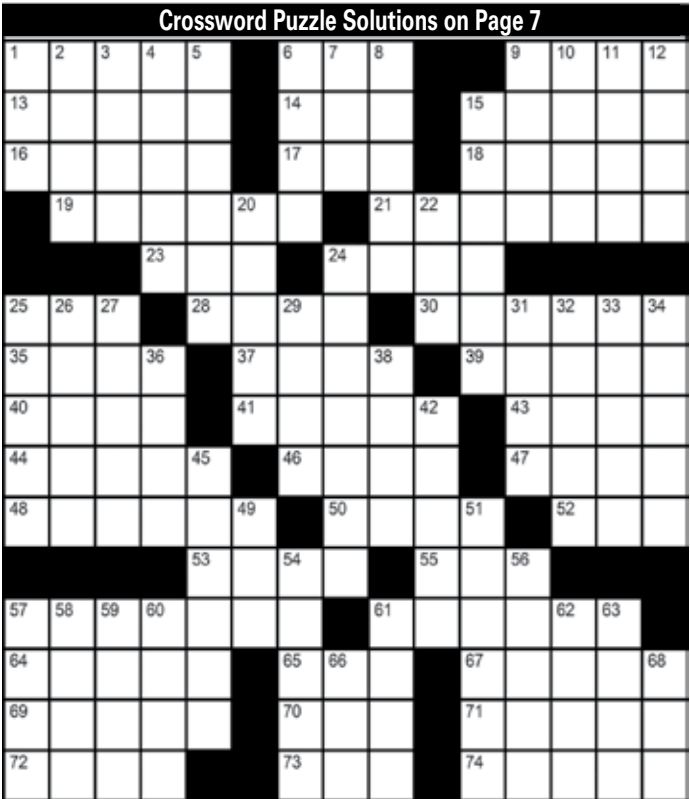

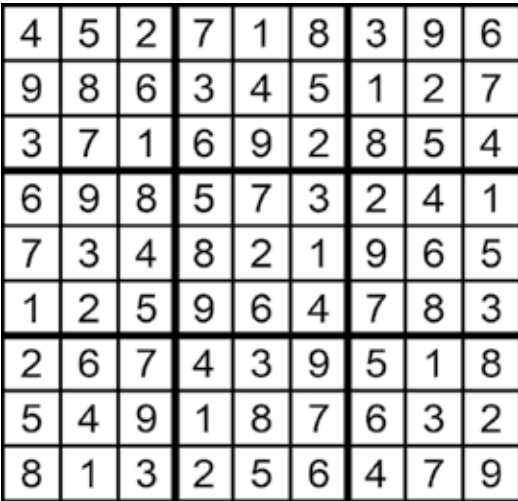
