GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Manzanita School is racing to finish their campus in the event in-person instruction will be permitted in Butte County schools in the coming weeks.

Superintendent and Principal Gary Rogers said that timing has been of the essence, and due to the fact his campus has not been ready, or safe for students due to active construction, the district had delayed application for the waiver. That is changing.

"We're preparing for October 19th" said Superintendent/Principal Rogers. If school is cleared to open, Rogers says they plan to "do a hybrid AM/ PM type situation, with small cohorts so we can meet the guidance."

Construction of Phase 1 will be complete by that point, with the rest of the construction finishing up.

The school has been the sight of a massive modernization and expansion project 8 years in the making. Initial planning began in 2013, but Manzanita, along with other area school districts such as Biggs Unified, benefited greatly from the 2016 passing of California Prop 51 which allocated \$9 billion in bonds to school facility improvements for grades K-12.

ANDE Honors Sheriff Honea

Superintendent/Principal Rogers, says that work in progress on the Manzanita campus nears the \$8 million dollar mark. Those dollars have allowed the school to retrofit old lighting, electric and AC units, make classrooms and bathrooms ADA compliant, and allowed for the expansion of restroom facilities to accommodate a larger student body. The portable classrooms have been removed, replaced by semi-permanent center comprised of three rows Continued on page 3

City Council **Hears Update** from Chief Harr

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley City Council was privy to an update from Gridley Police Chief Rodney Harr regarding the department's operations and status.

Chief Harr started his presentation with the department's new mission statement that he had brought forth. It reads: "It is the mission of the Gridley Police Department to work in partnership with the community, to serve with Integrity, Honor, Professionalism, to protect lives and property, to preserve the peace and order, to create a working environment in which we recruit, train and develop an exceptional team, and above all, to protect the Constitutional Rights of each individual in the community we serve." In addition to the new mission statement, the department logo has been revised to reflect just the community of Gridley since the department no longer contracts with the City of Biggs for Law Enforcement services. It has been changed on all vehicles, uniforms and documents.

Additionally, the GPD has completed training and has rolled out its new taser program. GPD officers are awaiting individualized training on the new body-camera program but continue to wear their old body-cams until that has been completed. Further mandatory peace officer training is currently being integrated to an online platform, which the GPD expects will save the department greatly in travel and lodging costs.

Chief Harr then presented statistics to the council regarding crime in our area. He compared the crime rate data from 2019 to the year 2020 in the seven major categories reported to the California Department of Justice: criminal homicide, rape, robbery, assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft. Overall, Chief Harr reports that crime in the area has decreased by at least 9%, with 6 out of the 7 categories seeing lower incident numbers than the previous year 2019. The exception is the category of motor vehicle theft. He states, "This data is brought forth through the algorithms that are mandated by the state that pull that information directly from our cache system." Chief Harr assuring the council the data is "reliable, concise, precise data."

in your mailbox the Pi-Line guide to state measures for 2020. Prop 14 NO - Borrows \$5.5 billion to fund stem cell research. Prop 71 in 2004 created the CA Institute for Regenerative Medicine and let the state borrow \$3 billion to do so. Money is almost exhausted, asking for more.

** Prop 15 NO Tax commercial property based on its market value, rather than the price at which it was originally purchased. This would raise property taxes on many large businesses, causing them to fire people and leave the state. Prop 13 passed in 1978, placing a cap on property taxes, this initiative would repeal tax protections only for commercial landlords with more than \$3 million in holdings.

** Prop 16 NO Ends the ban on race-based preferences, would repeal Prop 209 passed in 1996. Universities and government agencies could use someone's race, gender, or ethnicity in decisions related to benefits.

** Prop 17 NO Would allow Californians currently on parole to vote. In 1974, CA voters passed a measure giving those who've committed felonies the right to vote once they are off parole and ergo have completed their sentence.

** Prop 18 NO Allow 17-year-old U.S. citizens tovote in a primary and special election as long as they will turn 18 by the subsequent general election. 23 states currently allow 17 year-olds to vote. Proponents have tried 6 times to get this on the ballot, this is the first time it has made it.

** Prop 19 YES Allows homeowners over 55, disabled, or victims of natural disasters to take a portion of their property tax with them when they sell their home or buy a new one.

** Prop 20 YES Allow

or organized petty theft as a felony, require probation officers to seek tougher penalties for those who violate parole three times, and exclude those convicted of domestic violence and certain nonviolent crimes from early parole consideration. Basically undoing Prop 47 (2014) and Prop 57 (2016).

** Prop 21 NO Allow cities to introduce new rent control laws or expand existing ones. Defeated in 2018. Only allow new ordinances to homes at least 15 years old, exempts single-family homes owned by a landlord with no more than two properties.

** Prop 22 YES Turn app-based drivers back into independent contractors (Lyft and Uber).

** Prop 23 NO Require dialysis clinics to have at least one physician on-site at all times and to report patient infection data to CA health officials.

** Prop 24 YES Strengthen CA's consumer privacy laws and establish a CA Privacy Protection Agency. Would enhance financial penalties for violators and allow consumers to demand that personal info not be shared rather than simply not sold.

** Prop 25 NO Asks voters to either approve or strike down a law that ends bail from the CA criminal justice system. In 2018, the state legislature passed a bill ending cash bail in CA. ** Seek other opinions and sources, if you like to hear other arguments. These opinions are mine, it won't hurt my feelings if you disagree with this analysis. I hope it adds to the conversation; more conversation is a good thing in a Democratic Republic.

Gallagher Bill to Combat Homelessness in the North State Signed

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblyman James Gallagher's (R-Yuba City) Assembly Bill 2174 was signed by Governor Gavin Newsom. The new law authorizes Yuba and Sutter counties to establish a joint multidisciplinary personnel team (MDT) to combat homelessness.

'We must allow and encourage counties to work more effectively to address homelessness by permitting information sharing on their homeless populations. Homelessness does not occur in a onecounty vacuum, and counties must be able to work together to provide essential services," said Assemblyman Gallagher. "It is my hope that the Yuba-Sutter partnership can become a model for other counties and the State."

MDTs are a proven tool that allow teams from a variety of disciplines to coordinate their efforts. MDTs have been used for the past thirty years to address child abuse, allowing county service providers to work together and share case information. More recently, MDTs have been used to address homelessness. Unfortunately, current law limits the utilization of homeless MDTs to providers within a single county. AB 2174 allows Yuba and Sutter counties to form the first bi-county homeless MDT in

"Yuba and Sutter Counties have made a concentrated effort to work together to

address homeless issues as our homeless population often moves freely between our counties. AB 2174 furthers these efforts by allowing us to share information on this population," said Yuba County Administrator Kevin Mallen. "AB 2174 allows us to create a bi-county homeless engagement team that will help prevent any delays in connecting homeless individuals to housing and supportive services," added Sutter County Administrator Steve

Homeless service providers are located in both Yuba and Sutter counties. Additionally, the counties already have a bi-county health department and a bi-county homeless consortium. AB 2174 furthers this coordination amongst the counties' agencies and service providers by authorizing the formation of a joint MDT to facilitate information sharing that will support the identification, assessment, and linkage of homeless individuals to housing and supportive services. This will create cost savings and improve government efficiency by preventing duplicative efforts through better coordination, while enhancing the continuity of care for homeless individuals and families.

Farm Bureau Releases Voter Guide to November Ballot Measures

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Reiterating its strong opposition to a ballot initiative that would establish a split-roll property tax, the California Farm Bureau Federation has announced positions on the other statewide measures to be decided this fall. The CFBF Board of Directors released a Voter Guide for the Nov. 3 general election.

Farm Bureau was among the first organizations to oppose Proposition 15, which would create a split-roll property tax to reassess and raise taxes on commercial and industrial property. Although its proponents claim agriculture would be exempt, the measure would allow reassessment of agricultural facilities and improvements such as barns, dairies, orchards, vineyards and processing plants.

"In the middle of a pandemic that communities alike."

has severely disrupted our food-production system, Proposition 15 would impose a new tax burden on family farms and ranches," CFBF President Jamie Johansson said. "Ultimately, those higher costs to the food system would lead to higher food prices. Make no mistake: A tax on farms is a tax on everyone."

Among its other ballot positions, Farm Bureau emphasized public safety by supporting Proposition 20, which would increase penalties for certain theft-related crimes, and opposing Proposition 25, which would abolish the state's cash-bail system.

Theft, vandalism, trespassing and other crimes remain chronic and growing problems in rural California," Johansson said. "By passing Proposition 20 and rejecting Proposition 25, voters have an opportunity to reinforce protection for rural and urban

of classrooms, and dedicated kindergarten buildings. Manzanita School has also secured a grant to offer full-day kindergarten to its students and families.

In addition to these upgrades, the middle school will move from its previous home in the main building that houses the cafeteria to 5 of 7 new classrooms positioned at the north of campus near the gym. The additional two buildings will function as a dedicated library for the school and a science wing for the middle-schoolers.

Although construction is behind schedule due to COVID 19 and related shortages, completion of Phase 1 (modernization and kindergarten area) is expected the week of October 19th. Superintendent/Principal Rogers says, "For us, distance learning is a blessing in disguise" as it has allowed for the project to finish up before students return. Other campus construction is expected to wrap up in early November. Manzanita is confident its beautiful new campus and facilities will be ready to welcome students back when the time comes.

Three Measures Test Attitudes on Crime

Gov. Gavin Newsom said earlier this year that as the state's prison population continued to decline, he wanted to start closing down prisons.

He made good on that intention last week when the Department of Corrections Rehabilitation announced plans to shutter Deuel Vocational Institution near Tracy, which had been constructed in the 1950s as a place where young felons could be transformed into solid citizens.

"Given the need to achieve savings and the decline in the prison population since 2007, the state budget called for the closure of a prison. (Deuel Vocational Institution) was chosen for closure based on cost to operate, impact of closure on the workforce, and population housing needs, and prioritization of public safety and rehabilitation," Secretary Ralph Diaz said in a statement.

The announcement is the latest manifestation of the immense change in California's approach to criminal justice, from the lock-'em-up policies of the 1980s and 1990s - which increased the prison inmate populations eight-fold – to the "reforms" of the past

those populations by more than a third.

Some of that reduction stemmed from federal court orders to decrease the severe overcrowding that developed despite construction of dozens of new prisons. However, it mostly reflected a leftward shift in the state's political atmosphere and former Gov. Jerry Brown's desire, during his second governorship, to reverse the tough sentencing policies he had embraced during his first

Brown encouraged the Legislature's dominant Democrats to modify the state's tough sentencing laws, symbolized by the "three strikes and you're out" doctrine approved by voters in the early 1990s, and personally sponsored one of several ballot measures to go easier on those convicted of

In effect, Brown and others in the criminal justice reform movement have sought a return to the penal philosophy that California had adopted during the post-World War II era – that counseling, education, drug treatment and vocational training could convert offenders into productive members of society. It was the philosophy that led to construction of Deuel Vocational Institution in the early 1950s.

The new reformist approach, however, is not without its critics who contend that crime will increase with fewer offenders behind bars, although there's no statistical support for that, at least so far. The debate over *California newspapers*. ★

decade that have reduced whether reform is working has also found its way, as do many contentious California issues, onto the ballot via three propositions. In numerical order:

- Proposition 17, placed on the ballot by a reformminded Legislature, would allow felons who have completed their sentences, but are still on parole, to vote. It's a mostly symbolic gesture but draws ire from criminal justice hardliners who say it would dishonor victims.

- Proposition 20 is the tour of duty four decades hardliners' response to the recent spate of laws that lighten punishment, including Brown's Proposition 57, a 2016 measure that made parole easier for "nonviolent" inmates. If passed, Proposition 20 would make fewer felons eligible for parole, particularly those convicted of sex crimes, by changing the definition of "nonviolent."

- Proposition 25 is a referendum to repeal one of the Legislature's landmark criminal justice changes, a 2018 law that eliminates cash bail for criminal defendants on the assertion that bail discriminates against the poor. The bail bond industry, facing extinction, sponsored the referendum and is seeking a "no" vote to repeal the law, arguing that it allows dangerous defendants to roam freely and commit new crimes.

Together, these three measures test whether California voters endorse the criminal justice reform movement or believe that it's gone too far.

BCSO Announces Arrest Related to Biggs Unified School District Burglary

Butte County Sheriff's Office

BIGGS, CA (MPG) - In September of 2020, the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) began investigating a burglary that occurred at the Biggs Unified School District. Detectives and deputies worked with the Biggs Unified School District and obtained video surveillance which captured portions of the burglary. Deputies and detectives were able to identify Adison Mortenson, age 31, as the individual who committed the burglary.

Based on evidence located during the investigation, detectives obtained an arrest warrant for Mortenson. Detectives determined Mortenson had an additional arrest warrant which was issued in Spokane, Washington. A male, later identified as Daniel Braziel of Marysville, age 30, approached the victim. Braziel pushed the victim and used physical force to take money and other property from the victim.

Deputies and detectives worked with Gold Country Casino staff and obtained video surveillance which captured portions of the robbery. After the robbery Braziel ran to the casino





After serving the search warrant detectives contacted and placed Brito under arrest at an 530-538-7671.






BEFORE: Weak pelvic muscles due to age related hormonal changes.

Dear Dietitian

Brain Supplements

Dear Readers: One of my favorite pastimes is watching the game show "Jeopardy!". Now, I will never be a contestant on the show, but it boosts my ego when I answer five or more questions correctly. As a middle-aged Gen Xer, life has brought about education, so I have increased competence in the game. However, there are many times I know the answer, but I cannot think of it in time! You may have experienced the same. It's likely to happen to all of us at one time or another. It may get worse and likely won't get better. Sadly, it's part of the aging process, a memory that just isn't as sharp as it once was.

We can exercise, eat healthy, and have an annual physical every year, but is this enough to keep our minds sharp? Nowadays, there are a myriad of supplements on the market to help with memory. They're called nootropics, a term that comes from the Ancient Greek "noos," meaning mind, and "tropein," meaning to turn. Nootropics are substances that specifically affect the mind.

One such nootropic is apoaequorin, which is made from a protein found in jellyfish. In a small study of 218 adults aged 40-91 years, apoaequorin was found to improve cognitive function in elderly adults (1). However, the study was criticized for not using standardized methods of testing. The study was also sponsored by a company that produces the supplement, which runs the risk of bias in favor of the product.

The Federal Trade Commission charged a manufacturer of apoaequorin with false advertising. The lawsuit claims the maker misled the public and made claims, such as "clinically proven" to improve cognitive function, without the science to back such claims.

Another memory supplement is phosphatidylserine. In small studies, this nootropic was shown to improve memory in elderly participants when compared to placebo. However,

improvements lasted only a few months and were seen in people with the least severe symptoms (2).

It was my hope to bring some good news in this week's column. It's easy to see how people get confused about dietary supplements. Marketing says one thing; science says another. How is one to know what to believe? One positive note is that the FDA has taken a stronger position on supplements. Until now, the FDA did not intervene unless a dietary supplement was harmful. As of 2019, the FDA's oversight of the supplement industry includes:

- Notifying the public promptly if a dietary supplement is illegal or dangerous and should not be consumed
- Ensuring flexible regulations to evaluate safety while encouraging the development of new products
- · Creating a panel of leading scientific experts to improve safety evaluations of dietary supplements
- · Taking strong actions against makers of illegal products, manufacturers who make false claims, and companies whose products contain impurities or ingredients not listed on the label (3)

The FDA's new stand on the oversight of the dietary supplement industry is good for consumers. Anything to protect the safety and well-being (including financial) of consumers is a step in the right direction. In the meantime, remember, if it sounds too good to be true, turn around and spend your money on something more likely to do good, like a gym membership.

Amendments to the Second Units and Accessory Dwelling Units section of the Butte County Zoning Ordinance (Section 24-172) necessary to comply with State Law regarding the allowance of Accessory Dwelling Units. This section establishes standards for the location and construction of accessory dwelling units and junior accessory dwelling units in conformance with Section 65852.2 and Section 65852.22 of the California Government Code. These standards are intended to allow for accessory dwelling units as an important form of affordable housing while preserving the character and integrity of residential areas within the county and maintaining public safety. They are also intended to eliminate the existing provisions for temporary mobile homes previously referred to as "Aunt Minnies" (Section 24-174 F). The updated draft ordinance provides sections regarding Location, Site Requirements, Accessory Dwelling Unit Types and Sizes, Maximum Number Permitted, Relationship to the Primary Dwelling, Development Standards, Sewage Disposal, Setbacks, Parking, Fire Hazard Reduction, Drainage, Rental Terms, and Deed Restrictions. All Zoning Use Tables and Definitions will be amended accordingly to include the new Accessory Dwelling Units and Junior Accessory Dwelling Units Ordinance. Related amendments are proposed under Section 24-172.1, Short-Term Rentals, Subsection J. 1, indicating that accessory dwelling units may not be used as short-term rentals, and Section 24-46, Watershed Protection Overlay Zone, Subsection D. 4, removing the requirement for a conditional use permit for an accessory dwelling unit. Additional amendments are being made throughout the Zoning Ordinance to replace the term "second unit" with "accessory dwelling unit".

Amendment to the Second Units and Accessory Dwelling Units Ordinance is Statutorily Exempt under CEQA Guidelines Section 15282. The above mentioned project is on file and available for public viewing at the Butte County Department of Development Services, 7 County Center Drive, Oroville, CA 95965. 

- Our furnace has been inspected and serviced by a qualified professional during the last 12 months. (A furnace should be serviced at least once a year.)
- Our chimneys and vents have been cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional. I have checked for creosote built-up. (Not cleaning your chimney is the leading cause of chimney fires form built up creosote. This service needs to be done at least
- Our wood for our fireplace or wood stove is dry, seasoned wood.
- Our fireplace screen is metal or heat-tempered glass, in good condition and secure in its position in front of the fireplace.
- We have a covered metal container ready to use to dispose cooled ashes. (The ash container should be kept at least 10 feet from the home and any nearby buildings.)
- Our children know to stay at least 3 feet away from the fireplace, wood/pellet stove, oil stove or other space heaters.
- Our portable space heaters have an automatic shut-off. Our portable space heaters will be plugged directly into an outlet (not an extension cord) and placed at least three feet from anything that can burn; like bedding, paper, walls and even people. (Place notes throughout your home to remind you to turn off portable heaters when you leave a room or go to bed.
- We have tested our smoke alarms and made sure they are working. (You need smoke alarms on every level of the home, inside each sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. For the best protection, the smoke alarms should be interconnected so when one sounds, they all sound.)

We have tested our carbon monoxide alarms and made sure they are working. (Carbon monoxide alarms should be located outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home.




