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Protests Reach Gridley

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley joined the nation-wide protests for "Black Lives Matter" and the fight for awareness of racism and police brutality.

At noon on Sunday, June 7th, a group of about 80 protestors took to the Hwy 99 corridor in Gridley, marching with signs and chanting as they made their way through town and towards Rite Aid. It was there that they rejoined the rest of the group, uniting to peacefully yet passionately protest.

For over two hours, the group took over the four corners of Gridley's busiest intersection, Hwy 99 and E. Gridley Rd, expressing their outrage and calling for change. Chants of "Black Lives Matter", "This is what democracy looks like", "Say their names" and "No Justice, No Peace, No Racist Police" filled the air. Drivers of passing vehicles honked in solidarity and fists were seen raised

out of car windows in support of the cause.

Organizers Krystal Santillan and Josie Storm, both raised in Gridley and currently attending Butte College, felt that it was important for the community of Gridley to participate in the movement. They declined to comment during the event saying "this isn't about us" and kept the focus on the cause at hand. Later, the two shared some of their hopes and inspiration for the protest. Santillan said, "It just was important to us to show that our community may be small but we also support the rest of the country in the Black Lives Matter movement." Storm said, "We are simply raising awareness to look at the bigger picture." She continued, "The Black Lives Matter

movement is really not radical but it is revolutionary. Challenging long-held beliefs is okay. Small towns like Gridley can be on the right side of history."

The two young women organized the event rather quickly, using social media to spread the word. Storm says that the organization was stressful, mostly due to "threats from locals" such as "running over protestors" and

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Newsom Announces New Policing and Criminal Justice Reforms

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - After a week of engagement with civic leaders and law enforcement in the wake of the killing of George Floyd and demonstrations nationwide, Governor Newsom announced his support for new policing and criminal justice reforms. Governor Newsom will work toward a statewide standard for policing peaceful protests and ending the carotid hold. This announcement follows the work California did last year to enact the nation's strongest standard for police use of deadly force.

"We have a unique and special responsibility here in California to meet this historic moment head-on," said Governor Newsom. "We will not sit back passively as a state. I am proud that California has advanced a new conversation about broader criminal justice reform, but we have an extraordinary amount of work left to do to manifest a cultural change and a deeper understanding of what it is that we're working to advance. We will continue to lead in a direction that does justice to the message heard all across this state and nation."

Governor Newsom called for the creation of new standards for crowd control and use of force in protests. Governor Newsom committed to working with the Legislature, including the California Legislative Black Caucus, the California Latino Legislative Caucus and other legislative leaders, in consultation with national experts, community leaders, law enforcement and journalists to develop those standards – much like the collaboration that produced AB 392 last year, California's nation-leading use-of-force bill.

Additionally, he called for the end of the carotid hold and other like techniques in California, directing that the carotid hold be removed from the state police training program and state training materials. He committed to working with the Legislature on a statewide ban that would apply to all police forces across the state.

Kiley and Gallagher Comment on the Collapse of BYD Deal

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblymembers Kevin Kiley (R-Rocklin) and James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) issued the following statement in response to the failure of BYD’s N-95 masks to receive federal safety certification:
“The predictable collapse of Gov. Newsom’s secretly awarded \$1 billion BYD contract shows exactly why he must stop

acting unilaterally and start respecting our constitutional checks and balances.
“On April 7, the Governor announced the BYD deal on national television before informing the Legislature. In the ensuing weeks, he refused bipartisan requests to see the contract. We repeatedly asked the Governor for assurances about quality control, which he ignored.
“This episode bears out the risks of concentrated power: unvetted decisions where obvious problems are missed; tunnel vision where

viable alternatives are neglected; undue influence of insiders with political ties to the decision-maker; extraneous motives, such as making national news, that color decision-making; a refusal to change course if it means admitting error.”
“Despite bipartisan alarm about executive overreach, Gov. Newsom still refuses to entertain any limits on his extraordinary powers. It is time for the Legislature to move forward with ACR 196, the one tool at its disposal for reining in the Governor.” ★

Gridley Thumbs and Roots

There is a type of evergreen in the neighborhood that seems to attract Night Herons. I keep wondering why they are roosting in the middle of a town. So, I decided to research these loud raucous birds.

Black-crowned Night Herons are social birds. They roost in groups but forage singly. Their

habitat is wetlands. They are small herons with a squat, thick body. They have large flat heads and heavy pointed bills and short legs. They hang out in their roost trees during the day and forage in the evening. They are gone most of the night. Night herons eat small fish, crustaceans, frogs, aquatic insects, and small mammals. They stand still and wait to ambush their prey. Rice fields are important habitats. In areas where rice fields are available, up to 96% of the food resources of a colony are taken from the rice fields. Roosts do not have to be next to water but their feeding grounds need to be nearby (as the bird flies). They roost often in parks and other human environments.

What they want is heavy-cover, humans don't concern them.

I know for a fact that these birds forage in backyard ponds. My neighbor has a 1300-gallon Koi pond, I have a 150-gallon turtle pond with goldfish. I have seen these birds perched on the power lines looking down into my neighbor's pond. I've seen one perch on the edge of my pond and scared it away.

Thank goodness they don't roost near my home. I have compassion for the homes that do have Night Heron roosts. When I walk past these homes, the noise is daunting with many birds squawking and the poop is another story. I like seeing them I just don't want them in my backyard. ★

Dear Dietitian,

During the COVID-19 quarantine, I've gained a few pounds and wiped out all the progress I've made over the past year. How can I get back into my healthy eating routine?

~ Dan

Dear Dan,

There is a saying, "Successful people do not succeed well; they fail well." They get "back in the saddle." The same goes for a healthy change. Following are steps to help you get back on track:

1. Planning- Choose a day when you want to start your new meal plan. Plan your meals. This can be as unstructured as three moderate meals a day with nothing in-between or planning every food at each meal. Do what works for you.
2. Keep a food journal to hold yourself accountable. It will also help identify problem areas.
3. Calories Count. To lose weight, women should consume around 1400-1600 calories per day. Men should take in between 1800-2000 calories each day. This number will vary for each person. There are several websites that help you keep track of your caloric intake.
4. Eat nutritious foods. A healthy diet consists of fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins, and mostly unsaturated fats – limit fried foods and sweets. When your body is

well-nourished, you are less likely to reach for junk food.

5. Exercise most days of the week, even if it is just walking around the block. Our brains secrete endorphins during exercise, and our mood improves. When we feel better, we eat better, and vice versa.
6. Have a buddy system. The support helps keep you accountable and encourages you when you need an extra boost.
7. Do your very best for 15 days. By this time, you will start to see results. Your clothes will fit more comfortably. You'll feel better and sleep better, and you will be on your way to forming a new habit.
8. Be patient, and don't take yourself too seriously. We often want immediate results, but a stable weight loss takes time.
9. Identify problem foods. Some people have trouble with sweets. Others overeat salty snack foods like potato chips. If you can moderate your problem food, by all means, keep it in your meal plan. For example, I do not buy large bags of potato chips because I will eat the entire contents in one or two sittings. However, I can moderate with the one-ounce cans. I enjoy them, so I allow myself to indulge once in a while.
10. Identify and modify problem behaviors around food. For example, you consume more calories than you realize if you eat while cooking, eat while cleaning up the kitchen, or eat in front of the tv.

BCSO Announces Arrest of Oroville Resident for Possession of Child Pornography

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) announced the arrest of Dwayne Hansen of Oroville, 49. On May 29, Butte County Sheriff's Office deputies assigned to the Marine Unit were patrolling the area of the Monument Hill Boat Launch, Oroville. Deputies located a motorhome with expired registration parked in the Monument Hill parking lot. Deputies contacted Dwayne Hansen, the individual who was living in the motorhome. A records check indicated Hansen was required to register pursuant to the Sex Offender Registration Act. During the contact with Hansen, deputies located marijuana and methamphetamine. While searching the motorhome deputies located children's underwear. Deputies questioned Hansen about the children's underwear. Hansen told deputies he used the children's underwear while performing sexual acts. Deputies continued speaking with Hansen, at which time Hansen disclosed he had child pornography on a cell phone located inside the motorhome. After disclosing he was in possession of child pornography, Hansen stood up and attempted to run away from deputies. After a short foot pursuit, Hansen was arrested without incident. Detectives arrived and collected Hansen's electronic devices. Detectives authored a search warrant for the electronic devices, and a forensic download of the devices was conducted pursuant to the search warrant. Detectives located numerous images of child pornography on Hansen's electronic devices. Hansen was booked into the Butte County Jail for a felony count of possession of more than 600 images of child pornography, a felony count of possession of child pornography showing the intentional infliction of pain on minor victims for the purpose of sexual gratification or stimulation, a felony count of possession of a controlled substance, a felony count of possession of nunchakus, a misdemeanor count of resisting or delaying a peace officer, and a misdemeanor count of possession of narcotics paraphernalia. The Sheriff's Office is asking anyone with additional information to contact Detective Jason Miller at 530-538-7671. ★

has been a key priority of Governor Newsom's first year in office. He placed a moratorium on the death penalty, citing racial and economic disparities in how it was applied. He proposed to close the Division of Juvenile Justice and proposed closing two state prisons. In his May Revision budget, Governor Newsom proposed expanding opportunities for rehabilitation and shortening prison time for offenders participating in treatment programs, in education programs and otherwise engaging in good behavior; as well as increasing access to higher education for young people who are incarcerated. Governor Newsom acknowledged that more action is needed, and stated that additional reforms around police practices, educational equity, economic justice, health equity and more must be addressed with urgency. ★




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
