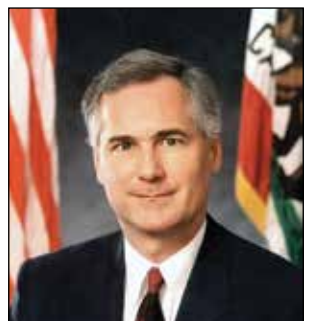
exactly what is happening today, predicted almost 11 years ago. Will the government force vaccinations for the Wuhan Virus?

The Midnight Passage of H.R. 6201

Benjamin Franklin warned that "Passion governs, and she never governs wisely." Exhibit A is H.R. 6201, the so-called "Families First Recovery Act." The House passed this bill literally minutes after it was introduced, with no analysis, no cost estimates, virtually no debate and in a general state of political panic.

For the next few weeks, new cases of Covid-19 are expected to increase. But at some point, the infection rate will peak and decline. As it does, factories will reopen, employees will get back to work and life will return to normal.

Once the public health crisis is passed, the House bill threatens to postpone the economic recovery by guaranteeing employees up to three months of paid leave under the Family Medical Leave Act. In theory, the purpose is to self-quarantine, recuperate or care for family members who are idled or afflicted, but in reality, it opens the door for anyone who wants to game the system.

The costs – which could run into hundreds of billions of dollars – are to be fronted by businesses and ultimately borne by taxpayers, leaving a massive debt to repay. The more employees who claim extended leaves, the more productivity losses the business will suffer, potentially leaving some employees no jobs to return to.

This is anything but compassionate. Remember, government cannot give a dollar to one person that it hasn't taken from another. When the health crisis passes, our economic crisis will depend on a rapid return to normalcy – not three months of mass unemployment. The strong jobs report in February tells us the American economy is fundamentally sound and should bounce back quickly as the infection abates. This bill makes the same mistakes that needlessly prolonged the recession of 2008 and cost our country a decade of economic growth.

The Produce Distribution in California is Guaranteed throughout Coronavirus Crises

LOS ANGELES, CA (MPG) - The potential coronavirus quarantine and panic buying shortages won't stop produce distribution in Southern California, according to the President of SGS Produce Carole Shandler.

SGS Produce is one of the founders of food distribution on the West Coast, operating since 1907 and guaranteeing food supply through two world wars, major natural disasters and 9/11. <http://www.sgsproduce.com>

The American produce industry is resilient and very well prepared to face such emergencies, and the USDA is being "very helpful and working fast to inspect containers and release all the supply lines coming from the US and abroad", says Carole.

While some food distributors who specialize in schools and restaurants chains are facing lower demand due to shutdowns, and exports to Asia following the same path, local grocery

retailers have immediate supply of produce available, particularly those with a shorter shelf-life such as fruits and vegetables. SGS is experiencing a low stock of just dry rice and beans and potatoes, forecasted to be back to normal levels in the next couple of days.

Produce distribution is guaranteed to reach all the regular demographics, including the low-income areas who depend on a more affordable supplying.

Besides maintaining short and long-term supply of produce in California, SGS's President says that all their employees are working with a touching sense of duty, as well as the truck drivers and the office team. "It is important right now that people have access to the food they are familiar with, in order to keep the emotional and physical comfort. That includes the ethnic varieties, which we are prepared to supply as well." At this point, Carole does not report

any concerns with labor shortage in the industry.

SGS encourages retailers to campaign on clear information about how to sanitize your produce before consuming it, as well as the importance of not excluding fresh fruit and vegetables of the daily diet in order to maintain a healthy immune system. "This is a time to work hard against consumer misconceptions and confusion"

Many industry members report that the COVID19 crisis has increased their sales, seeing the negative effects on travel and event cancellations, as well as on extra contingency meetings.

SGS is working hard with partners in the produce industry to keep the regular prices in times of uncertain demand, as well as to offer the best and fastest food distribution for the population of California.

A Special Message from Gridley Mayor Bruce Johnson Regarding the Coronavirus

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Gridley community is understandably concerned about the spread of the Novel Coronavirus, and as Mayor, I want to share the actions that the City of Gridley is currently taking, or could take if circumstances change. While this can be frightening and it's a first-of-its-kind situation for our community, we must keep calm and take reasonable, disciplined steps to protect the public health.

I need to emphasize that this is a public health crisis, and the lead agency for our area is the Butte County Public Health Department. Butte County is our authoritative source for information, advisories, facilities, equipment, personnel, and funding. That said, the City of Gridley has been, or soon will be, collaborating with a range of partners including, but not limited to: the Gridley School District, Butte County, Orchard Hospital, Enloe Hospital, neighboring cities, local businesses, and non-profits.

Last week Butte County initiated their Emergency Operations Center which provides more County-wide focus and flexibility in how we as a region can respond to this changing crisis. It's anticipated that the County will soon adopt an emergency proclamation. This proclamation helps our

regional Emergency Services personnel secure vital supplies, funding, and assistance. The State of California has already declared an emergency.

The City is also modifying some services to reduce in-person interactions. We don't take these actions lightly, and they must be weighed against the threat of this virus, along with economic and daily-life impacts. Our goal is to reduce social interactions and the opportunity for community transmission of the virus. As of today (3/16/2020), the City has closed our Recreation Center and suspended our Senior Meals Program and the Preschool held at our Recreation Center. While we will continue all routine City Hall services, starting next Monday, City Hall will be closed. Our City employees will be working full-time normal hours. Typically, we see 20 customers a day at City Hall. All utility payments will be accepted through a drop box, online, through mail, and via phone. Building services will be through appointment only. The City also anticipates suspending the Feather Flyer Dial-a-Ride service in the near future. We discourage people from attending public meetings, so for example please call, mail, drop-off, or email your comments to the City Council rather than showing up in person. City facilities are being cleaned more often, and hand sanitizer and educational posters have been posted. We expect these closures to last through early May, at a minimum.

Your personal actions and behaviors matter. Please follow county, state, and federal advice about increased personal hygiene, reducing in-person contact, and limiting non-essential travel. If you host or are a member of a social gathering, please consider delaying or cancelling events.

Finally, let's remain calm and composed and let the professionals do their jobs. Support your neighbors where appropriate and safe, share information, and encourage best practices. This is certainly a challenging situation, and an abundance of caution is warranted. You can find the latest information about the Coronavirus at:

liquidity crisis that demands a full-out monetary response from the Federal Reserve and emergency loans for small businesses. Idled employees face a liquidity crisis that demands payroll tax relief without adding to the national debt. That can be accomplished by allowing individuals to forego payroll taxes this year in exchange for

a slightly delayed retirement. Instead, H.R. 6201 actively encourages unemployment that will further damage an economy already ravaged by the coronavirus.

If America's post-coronavirus economic recovery lags behind other countries, look no farther than the House's panicked midnight passage of H.R. 6201. ★

Now That's Electric!

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley Unified School District gets ready to debut the first of four electric school buses that the district hopes to have in circulation by March of 2021.

The district took ownership of their first electric bus in February of this year and pending the outcome of a detailed inspection by California Highway Patrol, had planned to have it on the road as early as this week. The precautionary school closures dues to the COVID-29 pandemic has ultimately pushed that maiden voyage back, but the district is excited to add this green machine to its fleet.

This electric bus actually came to the district via the State and Department of Education's creation of resources for those impacted by the Camp Fire. Many may remember that a condition of temporary FEMA Camp Fire housing being located in Gridley required GUSD to be responsible for the transportation of relocated students to surrounding campuses for educational needs if they chose not to attend Gridley schools. Superintendent Jordan Reeves said that "When we had concerns with regards to influx of students coming to Gridley... They moved us to the front of the line (for resources) because of the potential needs we might have had." Of the resources available, there

was an electric bus.

Gridley Unified has also received a grant through the State in the total of \$1.6 million dollars for 3 additional buses which they anticipate adding to the fleet in February of 2021. The electric buses run \$400,000.00 a piece, but the initial cost is outweighed by the benefits of going electric. Per GUSD Mechanic Chris Woodward, the electric buses require reduced amounts of fluid for operation and he estimates that overall maintenance costs will be reduced 25 percent in comparison to the other buses in the fleet.

Director of Transportation and Maintenance for GUSD, Kim Parks, feels that the new electric bus "is really an improvement... just the green type of effect it is going to have on our environment here in Gridley is going to be fantastic."

Parks continues, "It promotes minimizing our

carbon footprint. Plus, as far as the amount of miles per electricity it uses compared to diesel it's going to be much, much less expensive." GUSD already has one charging station installed and plans to have additional terminals at the ready by February of 2021.

The Electric Blue Bird Bus is the first of Gridley's fleet to have LED lighting throughout the cabin, multiple cameras inside and out, features seatbelts and has storage areas located under the seats (at least in the front rows). It is virtually silent running, can travel 120 miles on one charge and takes a total of 8 hours to fully charge its battery from completely drained.

For a glimpse of GUSD's electric bus, keep an eye out for the mark of a green plug/bird above the driver's window and doors – but look quick because you won't hear it coming! ★

A Really "Sick" Hoax

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Early Monday afternoon, claims that 35 confirmed cases of COVID-19 went viral on local Facebook pages, in texts and calls to and from concerned family and friends.

A signed letter dated March 16th, from the Sutter County District Attorney's Office on official Sutter County letterhead was circulated to many small businesses and community members via various, yet trusted sources. The disturbing

information was put up on Facebook and consequently the misinformation spread like wildfire. It read: "Dear Employee. We are reporting that the COVID-19 is here in Sutter County. We have 35 confirmed cases in Sutter County. 20 have been confirmed in Sutter Ca, 10 in Live Oak and 5 in Yuba City. We hope you take appropriate safety. You as a Law Enforcement will be tasked with locking down Sutter County. We will be locking down the County in 24 hours. Very truly yours, Amanda L. Hopper,

District Attorney."

The letter was quickly confirmed by the District Attorney's office to be 100 percent untrue. In a statement made by the DA's Office, "There are no confirmed cases in the community and the letter is a cruel hoax, and this letter was not created or signed by the District Attorney. Furthermore, there is no "law enforcement lockdown" of Sutter County contemplated even if coronavirus is identified in this community. Please see and share only official information." ★

Dear Dietitian

Heart Disease

Dear Readers,

This past week I attended the funeral of my best friend's brother who died suddenly of a massive heart attack. He was only 49. You don't realize how many lives one life touches until you attend a funeral. The exchange of love and support between friends and family, the stories that begin with "Remember when . . .?", the laughter that softens the tears. Does the dearly departed know how much he meant to other people? I sure hope so.

Heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women in the U.S and worldwide. There are several risk factors for this illness, some of which are listed below:

High Cholesterol is defined as greater than or equal to 200 mg/dL. Your cholesterol should be monitored annually. Changes in diet and/or medication may be needed to combat elevated cholesterol.

Family History is a risk factor we cannot change, but we can be aware and be proactive. If a parent has heart disease, high blood pressure, or diabetes, this puts you at a higher risk for all these conditions.

Uncontrolled High Blood Pressure increases the workload of the heart. Blood vessels become stiff which makes it easier for plaque to build up. When there is plaque build-up, blood flow to the heart is restricted, and if left untreated, will likely lead to a heart attack.

Overweight - People with excess body fat, especially around the waist, are at increased risk for heart disease. Losing weight isn't easy and doesn't happen overnight. Get the support you need.

Stress - Perhaps the most cunning risk factor. We all have stress in our lives, but many of us do not have healthy coping mechanisms to deal with it. Some people overeat to comfort themselves. Others self-medicate with the alcohol. Both of these mechanisms provide temporary relief, but when the buzz or sugar high wears off, the stress remains.

More effective ways of dealing with stress include meditation, journaling, and if needed, counseling. There is no shame in needing help. After all, when you have a toothache, you see a dentist, so if you have difficulty with your emotions, see a therapist. We were never meant to walk this journey alone. If finances are a concern, seek a therapist whose fee is based on a sliding scale.

Diet - a diet high in fat, calories, and sugar will likely lead to extra pounds, which increases your risk for heart disease. Eat a diet rich in fruits, vegetables, and whole grains. Choose lean meats and mono- or polyunsaturated fats.

Know your risk factors and know your numbers (cholesterol, blood pressure, etc.). Education is the first step in taking care of yourself, but education without action avails little. Start today. Time may be luxury you do not have.

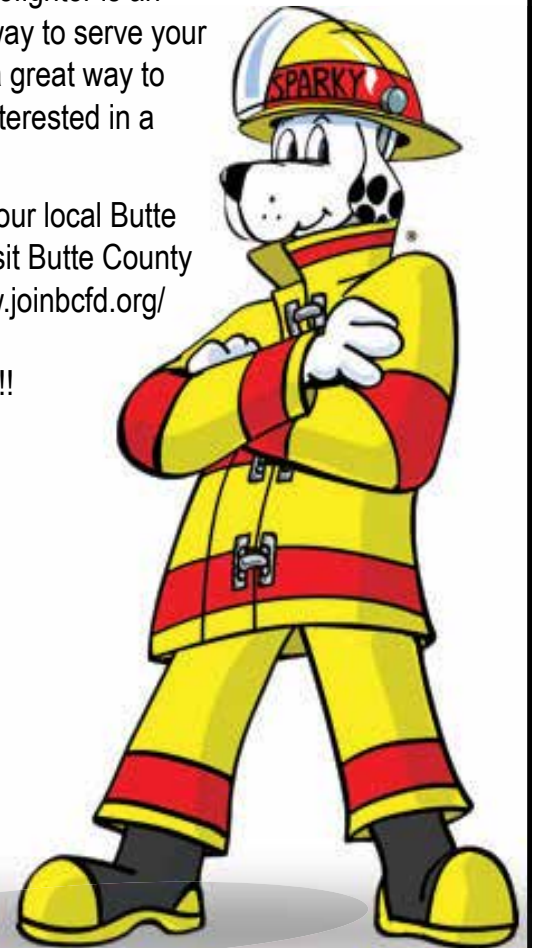

Legislature Passes Bipartisan Emergency Funding for COVID-19

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Assemblyman James Gallagher, R-Yuba City, voted in support of two funding bills that provide \$500 million and authority for up to \$1 billion to address various aspects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

“Today’s state budget action will provide critical funding to our healthcare system and local governments to make California better prepared for the impacts of this virus,” said Gallagher. “The structure of the funding provides flexibility so that we can quickly respond to whatever circumstances we are faced with in the next few weeks.”

The Legislature also approved a Resolution (ACR 189) to adjourn California’s legislative session until April 13, 2020.

“I want the residents of District 3 to be assured that my staff and I will continue to be available to the public throughout this crisis. My District Offices and Capitol Office are available to answer questions and serve the people I was elected to represent,” said Gallagher.

Gallagher concluded by stating, “I believe we need to respond to this crisis as a free society should. Remaining vigilant, while protecting fundamental freedoms. It is important that we remain calm. We will

get through this together.”

Summaries of the funding bills can be found below; the bill numbers and language are identical in both the Assembly and the Senate.

AB/SB 89: Provides \$500 million and authority for total expenditures up to \$1 billion to the State to address various aspects of the COVID-19 crisis. States intent of the Legislature to direct the Administration work with the Legislature, legislative staff, and stakeholders when determining expenditures for the 20-21 Budget regarding economic hardship mitigations for COVID-19. Includes \$84.1 million to address clean-up costs already incurred from the Camp Fire disaster. Authorizes the Governor to address the COVID-19 emergency and provides funding therefore.

AB/SB 117: Appropriates General Fund resources, authorizes continued apportionment and grant funding based on alternate attendance calculations for local educational agencies (LEAs) and after school programs, and makes various changes to existing law to alleviate specified instructional, assessment, and reporting responsibilities for Pre-K-12 Education and Child Care. Provides funding for schools related to the COVID-19 outbreak and declared state of emergency pursuant to Executive Order N-26-20. ★

BIGGS-WEST GRIDLEY WATER DISTRICT NOTICE OF INTENT TO ADOPT CEQA MITIGATED NEGATIVE DECLARATION

Pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act and CEQA Guidelines, the Biggs-West Gridley Water District (“BWGWD”) hereby provides notice of its intent to adopt a Mitigated Negative Declaration for the following project:

- Name of Project:** Biggs-West Gridley Water District 2020 Water Transfer Program.
- Project Proponent and Lead Agency:** Biggs-West Gridley Water District, 1713 West Biggs Gridley Road Gridley, California 95948; principal contact – Eugene Massa, Jr., General Manager, (530) 846-3317.
- Project Description:** BWGWD proposes to sell during the 2020 irrigation season up to 20,658 acre-feet (“AF”) of water to participating member districts of the State Water Contractors, Inc. or other south of Delta purchasers, including Central Valley Project contractors (collectively, “Buyers”). Buyers and others are seeking up to approximately 300,000 AF of transfer water from various willing sellers in the Sacramento Valley during the 2020 irrigation season. Purchasing this water would lessen potential water supply shortages to these parties that may occur as a result of dry hydrologic conditions and regulatory restrictions on pumping in the Delta. As a willing seller, BWGWD would make up to 20,658 AF of water available to Buyers by idling cropland (i.e., non-irrigation of farmland by voluntary participants). Water made available by crop idling within the boundaries of the BWGWD would then be retained and stored by the Department of Water Resources (“DWR”) for delivery to Buyers. BWGWD’s proposed transfer will comply with the most current Draft Technical Information for Preparing Water Transfer Proposals prepared by DWR and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation dated December 2019 (Draft Technical Information), as applicable to land idling transfers.
- Project Location:** The project area, from which the water for this transfer will be made available, is defined by the BWGWD’s boundaries, which encompass approximately 34,800 acres in the northern Sacramento Valley, mostly in Butte County with a small portion of that acreage in Sutter County (See attached draft IS/MND). Within the BWGWD’s boundaries are approximately 31,300 irrigable acres, of which approximately 22,739 acres are dedicated primarily to the production of rice.
- Hazardous Waste Sites:** The project location is not identified on any of the lists enumerated under Government Code Section 65962.5.
- Public Review:** A copy of the draft Initial Study and related documentation is available for public review at www.bwgwater.com and during business hours at BWGWD’s office at the above address. Public comments on this proposal to adopt a negative declaration will be received by BWGWD at the above address beginning on March 18, 2020 and ending at 5:00 p.m. on April 17, 2020. Following the review and comment period, the proposed Mitigated Negative Declaration will be on the District Board of Directors’ agenda for potential adoption at a noticed regular or special meeting to be held at a later-determined date at the District’s offices located at 1713 West Biggs Gridley Road, Gridley, California.

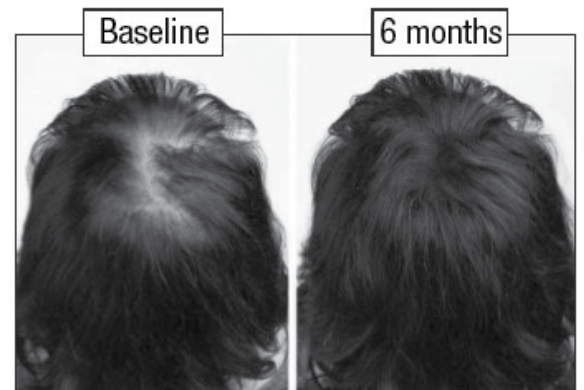
