LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Area students gained some great insight on what the job of their future might be at this year's Live Oak High School Career Day. It has been a tradition now for over 15 years at Live Oak High School to host Career Day, organized by the men and women of LOHS counseling and career department. The event occurs every other year due to its sheer size. Co-organizer and LOHS counselor Joanna Alvarado says, "It's not just a college and career fair – its Kairo from the Santa Clara PD, were two big components. It's the classroom presentations and a partnership with the ROP," she explains, "And the community and career research."

Approximately 120 presenters and alumni from multiple professions were on campus to speak to over 700 students that attended the fair. Topic answering questions

Gridley City Council Updates

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - As Gridley embarks on a period of growth and increased housing development, it is essential for the city's planning commission to have all committee vacancies filled. There remains one seat open and, at the Gridley City Council meeting Monday evening, Council heard two highly qualified candidate proposals and applications for the position.

Candidates Dewsnup and Shelley Ingram are both being considered for the commission position. Dewsnup brings his experience from serving the town of Rexburg, Idaho on its planning and zoning commission and multiple local boards, such as the Orchard Hospital Board. Ingram has previous experience as a land-use planner for 5 years in Santa Barbara County, a federal grants planner in Marin County for two years and is currently working as a development specialist for CHIP housing in Chico. Both candidates agree that Gridley needs to grow but do so in a structured manner and in the right ways to preserve the spirit of the

Gridley City Council then authorized the Gridley-Biggs Police Department to do some clean up. The department has two police vehicles that have outlived their uses, have major mechanical issues, and which have been used as parts vehicles. The time has come to get rid of them, and the GBPD feels that it is best just to junk the vehicles than to try and send them to auction as they are basically worthless. Council agreed and voted

to approve the measure. Five other city vehicles have also met their limits, but are not all in total disrepair. The discussion focused mainly on the city's Freightliner which is a road patch truck. It is in need of repair but a wire harness cannot be found. Colusa is interested in purchasing the truck, which could financially benefit the City. The other four trucks in question would be sent to auction, primarily because they are too expensive to keep repairing and not worth the cost. Council voted to surplus the vehicles out.

Council then retired to closed session where they met with Gridley-Biggs Police Chief to discuss the details of the potential contract renewal with Biggs for Law Enforcement services. The resulting approved contract will be submitted to the City of Biggs for their



Senator Dahle Seeks to Stop DMV from Selling Your Private Data

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Senator Brian Dahle (R-Bieber) introduced a measure to protect driver's information col-

lected by the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV).

but to our knowledge, in a comparison of costs provided to the Biggs City Council by the City of Gridley, the black and white figures stand as this.

For a 3 -year contract with the GBPD beginning July of 2020, running through the fiscal year 2021, law enforcement services with GBPD would ultimately be cheaper than contracting with the BCSO. According to information provided by the GBPD to Biggs City Council, GBPD's proposed contract outlines that the cost for services in the year 20-21 would be \$540,488, in comparison to the \$568,062 figures proposed by BCSO for their services. That is a saving of \$27,614 to Biggs if they stay with the GBPD. But, as the 3-year contract with the GBPD continues, those figures change - ultimately increasing about \$16,173 dollars, with the ending 3-year contract totaling \$1,670,510.

Sheriff Honea did stipulate that the higher costs for the 20-21 outlined in the BCSO proposal for the 20-21 year were due to the fact that they would need to purchase two new vehicles, more than likely trucks to aid the CS Officer. While the BCSO proposal outlined their costs for future years, they only included the years 20-21 (cost = \$568,062) and 21-22 (cost)= \$487,744). The total money saved by Biggs contracting with the BCSO would information provided to us).

Briefly touching on some black and white facts provided by GBPD dispatch, GBPD currently has 1 Community Service

Officer, 10 Patrol Officers, with two more slotted to join the force after graduation from the Butte College Police Academy in June of this year. Also, Lieutenant Harr patrols about 2 days a week and of course.

Mentioning too many details of each agency's services provided in their contracts gets a little dicey and has ultimately caused some unintended tension, not to mention brewing strong reactions from area residents on social media. Regardless, both agencies have expressed considerable respect for each other and appreciate their working relationship - a relationship that both sides wish to keep good standing. Their goal remains the same, to provided excellent services to our residents, provide protection and safety during times of trouble and neither agency wishes to be in a contest to prove that one is better than the other.

Sheriff Honea reiterated at the special city council meeting during his presentation, "I also think we work great with Gridley. They do a fantastic job. If they continue to provide you law enforcement," he continues, "we are going to continue to work very, very cooperatively to support their mission – That's just the way it is." Chief Byers has expressed the same sentiments and that the decision is truly up to the City of Biggs. He supports whatever the outcome may be.

FEMA Extension Approved

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - According to Katrina Palomar, Senior Emergency Services Coordinator with the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (CalOES), the Direct Housing Extension Request for FEMA residents has been approved.

Local and state government agencies, alongside FEMA and CalOES, submitted the request for a year-long extension for FEMA housing, like the FEMA park located at Gridley's Industrial Park, early this year. The hope was that FEMA temporary housing would remain accessible for Camp Fire Victims still transitioning into long term housing but the future remained unknown until just now. The quickly approaching deadline, whereas residents would be required to vacate the premises or pay rent, May 15th 2020, has been extended until May of 2021.

At this time, according to information shared by FEMA Voluntary Agency Liaisons and CalOES representatives that work with the Gridley Relief Group, there are currently 210 households in the Gridley FEMA group site. Under the pressure of the looming deadline, seven households have transitioned out of the park in the last two weeks. Residents are required to present a list of rentals or potential housing opportunities that they have investigated to FEMA case workers on a monthly basis.

CalOES workers have been accompanying the FEMA re-certification case workers, those responsible for keeping track of the residents search for long term housing solutions, to get an idea of the progress of FEMA group site residents. With the deadline now extended for a year, it will take a little pressure off the residents but FEMA and CalOES will keep the momentum going. Palomar says that, "CalOES and FEMA will continue to work through the conditions necessary to keep the program moving forward and helping the community to find a permanent solution."

Communities, organizations and Long Term Recovery Groups, alongside groups like Gridley's Recovery Group, will wait for updates on what the next steps will be as Palomar works with the FEMA partners. ★

Vegetarian Diet

Dear Dietitian,

I've recently stumbled upon a few articles touting a return to the diets of the 1950s. They say people ate healthier. What are the pros and cons of following a typical diet from that era?

Sincerely, Rick

Dear Rick,

These days there are several ways to eat healthy, and sometimes this can be confusing for people. Recently, there has been an interest in returning to a 1950s style of eating, but did people really eat healthier back then?

There are several differences in American life today as compared to the 1950s. For starters, the median American household income was \$5,000. That means that half the population made more than \$5,000 a year, and half made less. In 2019, the median household income was \$63,000 (1). For every dollar spent on food in 1955, 25 cents went to restaurants; now it is more than half (2). Much of this includes high-calorie foods like pizza, burgers, and fries, which brings us to another big difference: portion sizes! Compare portion sizes of foods from the 1950s to today

of our diets that are actually healthier today than back then.

Vegetables were often overcooked, decreasing their nutritive value. Today we are careful to prepare vegetables al dente in order to preserve nutrition. We have also been educated to choose lean proteins, even if sometimes we prefer not to. Seldom is animal fat used as a seasoning. When I was growing up, we kept a tin of bacon grease on the stove to season vegetables and fry meats. There is no such tin in my kitchen today.

We could definitely benefit from getting back to the basics. Enjoy a home-cooked meal for dinner with fruits and vegetables filling half the plate. Eat dinner as a family; it is one of the most important activities you will share with your children. Dine out as a treat instead of a convenience. And as always, keep it simple, and be healthy!

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley High School alumni and basketball star, Maddyson Tull, had a dream during her high school years of starting a basketball program for young girls who enjoyed playing the game of basketball. She wanted to pass on her love and passion for the game to the girl basketball players in the Gridley area and came up with the idea for the Rise Up Basketball Clinic. What started as an idea, has grown into an annual event that many community members look forward to each February.

In the past two years, the program has expanded to boys and girls who have a desire to improve their basketball skills, learn about what it takes to play at a high level, and have some fun on the court. Gridley-Biggs Police Department Large Bust

Introduction by Seti Long

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - In a press release issued by GBPD Police Chief Al Byers on Monday, March 2nd, the department arrested 8 individuals after multiple-residence search warrants were issued for the sales of controlled substances. The following is the official press release:

On February 28, 2020 at approximately 0743 hours, Officers with the Gridley-Biggs Police Department (GBPD) and Detectives with the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force (BINTF) served a multiple-residence search warrant for possession of controlled substances for sales at four locations in the Gridley area.

As a result of this multiple-residence search warrant. GBPD Officers and BINTF Detectives located in excess of two (2) ounces of crystal methamphetamine, liquid heroin and liquid methamphetamine. In addition, indicia of narcotics sales (digital gram scales, packaging materials and pay/owe records) as well as narcotics paraphersmoking pipes and hypodermic syringes) were seized.

As a result of this multiple-residence search warrant, the following individuals were arrested and booked into Butte County Jail:

Jessica Rene Valdez, 42, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for sale, using a place of residence to sell controlled substances, possession of a controlled substance, possession of a specified controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia and commitout on bail.

Jason Patrick Coy, 44, was arrested for an outstanding felony arrest warrant for a parole violation.

Dawn Marie Stevens, 44, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Charles Edward Kester, 56, was arrested for possession of a controlled substance for sale, using a place of residence to sell controlled substances, possession of a controlled substance, possession of a specified controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

David Santos, 32, was arrested for an outstanding felony arrest warrant for a felon being in possession of a firearm and possession of stolen property.

Robert Richard McDonald, 37, was arrested for possession of specified controlled substance and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Sarah Marie McCarty, 34, was arrested for an outstanding misdemeanor arrest warrant for possession of drug paraphernalia, being under the influence of a controlled subnalia (methamphetamine stance and failure to appear in

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
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
