# **Gridley Explores New Housing** Incentives

GRIDLEY. CA (MPG) - With the availability of affordable housing scarce throughout California, Gridley is not exempt from the issue.

The City of Gridley has taken a serious look at how to tackle the problem. In August of 2018, Council adopted the Temporary Resident Housing Incentive Program #1 (TFHIP). Previously, the City's Development Impact Fee (DIF) rates were generated from a study conducted in January 2007 and revised in 2011. The TFHIP sought to reduce DIF fees by 75 percent for potential developers but restricted the number of permits to just 45, allotting only 15 permits to any individual developer.

With TFHIP #1 a success, the City has adopted a TFHIP #2, with a DIF reduction by 75 percent for Certificates of Occupancy issued on or before through December 31, 2022. The amount of permit allowances has increased to a total of 150, with 30 permits available for any one

A current example shows that the total of City impact fees run around \$30,000 per dwelling unit. TFHIP #2 would reduce that to around \$7,000. The 75 percent fee reduction incentive of TFHIP #2 is in accordance with bills AB 562, adopted by the State of California in October of 2013, establishing regulations dictating economic development incentives enacted by municipalities. They are also supported by AB 430, a bill adopted by the California State Legislature on September 6, 2019 to provide housing relief for Camp Fire victims.

The bill AB 430 authorizes housing developments in specific jurisdictions using a streamlined ministerial process, which allows projects to be permitted by an administrative review by the city to make sure they are consisted with the requirements. Requirements for AB 430 developments include being located in Biggs, Corning, Gridley, Live Oak, Orland, Willows or Yuba City, must be on residential or residential mixed-use zoned properties, have minimum density of 4 units per acre on a site no larger than 50 acres which is zoned for residential or residential mix-use, are consistent with current zoning standards and comply with the California Green Building Code.

Per information provided in a document by City Administrator and Financial Director Paul Eckert, City Council has "demanded a significant improvement of engineering and building inspection services." Council has also approved the development of a Senior housing project, two planning maps for two new housing tracts to begin construction this year, with two more in the works and a potential fifth

development. Council is also considering a new program to address vacant housing to increase the availability of rentals in the area.

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Overcoming trauma experienced by a loved one taking their live can be a life-long, difficult process. Personally touched by suicide, local woman Michele Wilkins has founded a support group for those dealing with loss due to suicide.

Wilkins says, "Our community has been affected by suicides of some of its young members. I felt inspired to help. My own father died by suicide when I was 19 and I remember how terribly alone I felt. Having a support group, specifically for those that remain when a loved one dies by suicide, felt incredibly relevant and much needed. Connecting with others that are hurting

after similar tragedy can bring immense healing. It's not meant to be a therapy session, but it can absolutely have therapeutic benefits." Wilkins continues, "When we open up and talk about our feelings, in a safe environment, we take those first steps to healing. Feeling like I wasn't alone helped me get through the next minute, next hour, next day, next month, and so on. If these meetings can help even one person, my mission will be accomplished."

The suicide support group meets every Monday at 7pm at the Gridley Recreation center at 194 Washington Street. Wilkins wanted to thank Gridley Parks and Recreation Director, Trina Leishman, that "so graciously offered their building to meet."



**OROVILLE, CA (MPG)** - The Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) announced on January 29, 2020

the arrest of five individuals. The arrests are the culmination of an investigation that began in January 2020. On January 18, BCSO responded to an assault with a deadly weapon call in Gridley. Deputies determined Jeremy Justeson of Gridley, age 42, was involved in an ongoing dispute with a victim. On January 18, the victim and another individual were driving a vehicle on a public roadway in the Gridley area. Justeson used his truck to purposely ram the victim's vehicle approximately two times. The force of the impact from Justeson's truck pushed the victim's vehicle through an intersection and off

morning Detectives located Justeson and a female, identified as April Petersen of Oroville, age 40, at a residence in the 1900 block of Veatch Street, Oroville. Justeson was eventually placed under arrest, and a search warrant was also obtained for the Veatch Street residence.

During a search of the Cowee Avenue address Detectives located numerous items to include ammunition, illegal assault weapons, over 80 pounds of marijuana and narcotics paraphernalia. During a search of the Veatch Street residence Detectives located methamphetamine, identification and other documents for at least 10 victims (used to commit identity theft), ammunition, and an illegal pyrotechnic device. Justeson was arrested for felony assault with a deadly weapon, felony vandalism, possession of assault weapons, possession of a controlled substance, maintaining a residence where narcotics are used/sold and possession of narcotics paraphernalia. Petersen was arrested for felony identity theft, committing a felony while released on OR/Bail, possession of an illegal pyrotechnic device, being a prohibited person in possession of ammunition, possession of a controlled substance and possession of narcotics paraphernalia. He enlisted in the Navy in 1944 and served in the South Pacific as a ship fitter, 3rd class, being discharged in 1946. He married Sybil Davis, Jan. 21, 1947. In 1954, he





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

# Dear Dietitian

# **Glycemic Index**

#### Dear Dietitian,

I have had diabetes for fifteen years and have kept it under good control. But recently, my blood sugars have been higher, around 200 during the day. My daughter thinks I should try the glycemic index diet. What do you think? - Terry

#### Dear Terry,

The glycemic index diet was introduced by Jenkins et al. in the early 1980s as a ranking system for carbohydrates based on their immediate impact on blood glucose levels (1). It was developed as a meal-planning guide for people with diabetes, with emphasis on low glycemic index foods. The premise is to choose low GI foods to help control blood sugar levels and avoid spikes. The GI concept has since expanded to include weight loss and disease prevention.

The GI system ranks foods from 0 to 100; the smaller the number, the less impact it has on your blood sugar. Glucose is given the value of 100; all other foods are ranked comparatively to glucose. The GI values are classified as low, medium, and high. Below are examples of foods in each category (2):

Low GI (0-55) - old-fashioned oats, apple, peanuts

Medium GI (56-69) – orange juice, instant oatmeal, whole wheat bread

High GI: (70 and higher) - watermelon, baked potato, corn chips

Critics of the GI classification say it is not a measure of good nutrition. For example, the GI of ice cream, a food high in calories and fat, is low while the GI of watermelon is high when it is low in calories and a good source of vitamin A.

Studies on GI and its impact on health-related outcomes have mixed results. The American Diabetes Association states that the overall amount of carbohydrates consumed is more important than GI (5). The glycemic index diet is still debated among dietitians, with this RDN not recommending it. It's a complex system when carb counting is much easier and effective.

Perhaps a simpler way of keeping track of foods that drastically raise your blood sugar is to keep a log. Then you can avoid these foods or modify them. For instance, some people complain that white rice spikes their blood sugar levels. In this case, you have three choices: avoid it, eat a smaller portion, or switch to brown rice.

The bottom line is do what works for you. Maintaining healthy glucose levels and a healthy weight are of utmost importance in diabetes management. Talk to your doctor or dietitian if your blood sugar levels remains high.

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



# **Scald Emergencies**

With National Burn Awareness Week being in the month of February, here is some basic information on pediatric scalding emergencies.

## WHAT TO DO

- Set water heater temperature to no higher than 120°F/48°C, or just below the medium setting
- · Create a "no kid zone" in the kitchen around stoves, ovens and hot items
- Keep hot drinks away from the edge of tables and counters
- Use a travel mug with a tight fitting lid for all hot drinks
- Place pots and pans on the back burner with handles turned away from the edge of the stove

## WHAT NOT TO DO

- · Leave a child unattended in the bathtub; if you must leave, take the children with you
- Allow young children to adjust the water temperature or sit near faucet handles
- Set anything hot on tabletops within reach of young children who can pull them down
- Allow appliance cords (slow cookers, deep fryers, coffeemakers) to dangle over the counter edge
