GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - On the one-year anniversary of the Camp Fire, the Gridley Relief Group hosted a remembrance ceremony at Daddow Park in downtown Gridley for those who lost it all and for the lives taken by the blaze.

Cindy Scott introduced the first speaker, Margaret Hughes, who was responsible for the formation of

leaders of local faiths, formed just a week after the fire in an effort to coordinate the response of our community to the need of survivors.

Hughes began, "A year ago today all of paradise, really a ripple effect throughout Butte County...[was] changed, ever so violently, by the deadliest of California wildfires, the Camp Fire. Death, Destruction and devastation... and most of us here remember where we exactly were

when we heard about the fire. We have memories of it and we have imprints upon our hearts about the initial horrors of that fire. As well as the days that followed it. Today we reach out in solidarity with our neighbors to the north." She continued to share her experience over the year and the good that has come of the fire. "Here in our own town, I have seen uncommon generosity, heroism, compassion and unstinting dedication," says Hughes, as our community has worked to come to the aid of the survivors. She thanked

PG&E Gas Line Broken When Car Crashes into Gridley Home

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Monday morning at approximately 12:17 am, Gridley residents in the immediate area of a home located on Sage and Jackson streets were ordered to evacuate by Gridley-Biggs Police Department and CalFire units. The perimeter of the evacuation area spanned over a 9-block area, ranging from the northern side of Ford Avenue, the east side of Jackson St. over to the eastern side of Haskel St. near Orchard Medical Specialty Center and areas south of Spruce, almost reaching Hazel St.

The cause - an out of control vehicle had careened into the side of the home, severing its gas line. According to GBPD's Lieutenant Rodney Harr, the driver was pulling into the driveway and hit the gas pedal instead of the brake, causing the car to first go through a fence and then crash into the home.

The evacuation order went into effect immediately with emergency responders arriving on scene quickly. Calfire firefighters, with the aid of GBPD and Gridley Public works set up roadblocks to keep anyone else from entering the area. PG&E was notified, and crews were sent to shut off the gas lines and repair the damage as quickly as possible to avoid a dangerous explosion or health risks to neighboring residents.

According to Jeannie Dorehoffer, a resident of Sage Street, everyone in the area not under mandatory evacuation was instructed to stay inside their homes, close their windows and doors and remain vigilant. Some opted to evacuate regardless. She says that the accident raised quite a commotion, "Three CalFire trucks, two ambulances and cops were closing off the streets. It was scary!" Dorehoffer says that "It was awhile before PG&E got there. They began digging a big hole by the sidewalk," apparently trying to gain access to the gas line in order to shut it off.

Luckily, the incident resulted in no injuries. Calfire units remained on-scene until the arrival of PG&E, wherein the natural gas leak was stopped at its source. GBPD reported that the evacuation order was lifted at 2:26 pm Monday afternoon. ★

Live Oak's School Campus Pride Gets Reinvigorated

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - One of Live Oak Unified School Districts larger campuses, Luther Elementary school, is in the process of getting much needed addition - a brand new cafeteria.

Construction started in early September right as the school year got underway, funded in part by a \$14 million dollar bond the district first issued in 2016. According to LOUSD Superintendent Matt Gulbrandsen, as the tax base in the community grows and construction on new housing developments in the area begin, the district has been able to sell more bonds, at the issuance price of \$59.00 for every \$100,000 assessed in property value.

The 8,400 sq. foot cafeteria, which is located on the right-hand side of the school's entrance, will

those in attendance and welcomed the handful of survivors that turned out to the event saying, “We welcome you to our little town... we are a town that is pretty poor in resources, but we are a town that has a very generous heart.”

Pastor Dave Henry from the First Baptist Church then took a moment to reflect on the fire and loss: “Life is like that, we are reminded so many times, it is very fragile and it keeps moving,” sharing the spiritual message with the

group gathered. He then led the group in prayer.

At 11:08, 85 seconds of silence honored the 85 victims lost to the Camp Fire, followed by the ringing of the bells at the First Christian Church, which rang out 85 times. It was a solemn and moving moment as the community remembered our neighbors whose lives had been drastically altered a year ago. As Hughes said in her address to the group, “We want people there (Paradise) to know that we will not forget them.”

California Trucking Association Files Suit to Prevent Application of AB 5

Claims “ABC Test” Violates Supremacy and Commerce Clauses of U.S. Constitution

California Trucking Association

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Trucking Association (CTA) and two California independent owner-operator truck drivers filed an amended complaint with the U.S. Southern District Court seeking declaratory and injunctive relief against the employment test set forth in the Dynamex Operations West, Inc. v. Superior Court (Dynamex) decision, which was subsequently codified by the California Legislature in the form of Assembly Bill 5 (AB 5). AB 5, (Lorena Gonzales, D - San Diego), was passed by the California Legislature and signed into law on September 11, 2019, by Governor Gavin Newsom.

“AB 5 threatens the livelihood of more than 70,000 independent truckers,” said CTA’s CEO, Shawn Yadon. “The bill wrongfully restricts their ability to provide services as owner-operators and, therefore, runs afoul of federal law.”

In the suit, plaintiffs argue that the classification test in the Dynamex decision and codified by AB 5 is preempted by the supremacy and commerce clauses in the U.S. Constitution and is in direct conflict with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Act (FMCSA) and the Federal Aviation Administration Authorization Act of 1994 (FAAAA).

The new test denies a significant segment of the trucking industry the ability to continue operating as independent owner-operators in California, forcing them to abandon \$150,000 investments in clean trucks and the right to set their own schedule and become their own boss.

AB 5, rather than addressing the issue

of employee misclassification for all California workers, replaced a long-standing multi-factor test for determining independent contractor status with a one-size-fits-all method, consisting of highly restrictive criteria, riddled with carve-outs and exemptions for specific businesses and industries. Under the new test, independent truckers will be forced to work as employees.

“AB 5 has implications that go beyond employment classification in California,” said Robert R. Roginson, an attorney for CTA. “With more than 350,000 independent owner-operators registered in the United States, the new test imposes an impermissible burden on interstate commerce under the U.S. Constitution’s commerce clause and infringes upon decades-old congressional intent to prevent states from regulating the rates, routes and services of the trucking industry.”

For decades in California, more than 70,000 predominantly minority-owned truckers have built their businesses as independent owner-operators. These truckers have just recently invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in their vehicles to meet the nation’s strictest air quality laws.

“Independent truckers are typically experienced drivers who have previously worked as employees and have, by choice, struck out on their own. We should not deprive them of that choice. Some of the country’s most successful trucking companies were started by entrepreneurial independent truckers,” Yadon added. “We can protect workers from misclassification without infringing upon independent truckers’ right to make a living in California.”

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Gridley Community Brings Comforting Posters to Camp Fire Communities One Year Later

Paradise Receives USDA Investment to Boost Recovery Efforts

PARADISE, CA (MPG) - U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Rural Development State Director for California Kim Dolbow Vann announced a \$148,300 grant to the Town of Paradise to support the community's recovery efforts from the 2018 Camp Fire.

"Wildfire may have devastated the landscape of Paradise, but it didn't break its spirit," said Vann. "As we mark the anniversary of the Camp Fire, I am proud to celebrate the strength and resiliency of this community and its residents. As Paradise continues their recovery, USDA remains committed to help."

The Town of Paradise was gifted a building which, after renovations, will become their new Building Resiliency Center (BRC). This center will serve as a permanent home for information and resources available to residents trying to recover and rebuild from the Camp Fire. USDA Rural Development funds will support renovations with new office equipment and a generator.

USDA Rural Development's Community Facilities Grant Program. It is part of a \$150 million set-aside included in the Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Act that President Trump signed into law on June 6, 2019.

"We are grateful for the partnership we have with USDA Rural Development," said Paradise Town Manager Lauren Gill. "The BRC will be the cornerstone of our recovery from the Camp Fire and serve as the one-stop facility for residents wishing to rebuild in the Town and the Ridge at large. This grant from USDA Rural Development is critical to expedite its opening."

Disaster grants remain available to assist communities in 29 California counties and three Indian reservations recover from the devastating effects of fires, hurricanes and other natural disasters.

More than 100 types of projects are eligible for Community Facilities funding. Projects must be in eligible rural areas with a population of 20,000 or fewer. Interested applicants should contact their local Rural Development office.

In addition to the announcement, USDA Rural Development has invested a total of \$3.6 million to support recovery efforts in Paradise and surrounding communities in Butte County.

USDA Rural Development provides loans and grants to help expand economic opportunities and create jobs in rural areas. This assistance supports infrastructure improvements; business development; housing; community facilities such as schools, public safety and health care; and high-speed internet access in rural areas. 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"It has been exactly one year since California's most destructive wildfire ever, the Camp Fire, was ignited in Butte County and quickly engulfed the towns of Paradise, Magalia, Concow, Yankee Hill and the surrounding area," said Congressman Doug LaMalfa (R-Richvale). "The destruction is well-documented. Most tragically of all, 85 people lost their lives because of it. A year later, we're still working on solutions to the after effects. This USDA grant will help expedite the recovery process for many victims of the Camp Fire, and I thank Rural Development for their continued help for the recovery needs of Northern California."

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - When the Camp Fire broke out the morning of November 8, 2018 the neighboring community of Gridley, California had no idea how big of a role it would play in the relief efforts for the survivors. When the American Red Cross shelter was established at the Butte County Fairgrounds, community members from Gridley, Biggs, and Live Oak came together to volunteer their time and efforts for many countless hours. A clothing and supplies distribution center was set up at the Gridley Community Center, the livestock stables were filled, the gymnasium and Expo Hall were utilized for survivors to sleep, and various other organizations around the towns set up areas for supply

distributions. The communities really came together to help and provide wherever possible.

On the eve of November 8, 2019, almost one year later, Gridley resident, Melanie Little, organized a small group of community members who helped at the shelter the year prior, to go up to Paradise and Magalia and place encouraging posters at the schools. Little knew the Paradise and Magalia community members would wake up the morning of November 8th, feeling anxious, especially the children going to school, and she wanted to help relieve any stress with positivity and love. Signs that read, "We love you Ridgeview High", "Gridley loves you", and "We love you Cedarwood Elementary" were placed around the grounds of

each school. Other signs were placed around the outskirts of the town that read, "Thinking of you today", "Gridley loves you", and "Thank you first responders".

The posters, created by students at Gridley High School, Sycamore Middle School, Wilson Elementary School, and Manzanita Elementary School, as well as individual families, and scouts from Scout Troop 42 in Gridley, were well received by the Paradise and Magalia schools, with Paradise High School's Facebook page giving thanks for the lovely surprise.

"It was a community effort with the hope of helping (Paradise) feel so loved on this tough day. Showing kindness is what life should be all about," said Melanie Little. ★

much larger cafeteria and new stage area, Luther school's Principal Parveen Baines says, "Our teachers and students are so excited. We do have a lot of programs and it allows us to accommodate everyone," whereas the old cafeteria could not.

In addition to the cafeteria, construction of a new teacher parking area behind the complex will allot an estimated 75 additional spaces for the teaching staff, while allowing more parent and visitor parking out front in the main parking thoroughfare.

Principal Bains has some great ideas for the old facility. She is hoping that it can house Luther's afterschool program or be utilized as an indoor recreation area during the rainy season as the campus does not have a gym facility. Although the project is expected to be completed by spring of 2020, Superintendent Gulbrandsen says the school will not begin using the new cafeteria until the fall.

Superintendent Gulbrandsen shares that the bond has not only made it possible for

Luther to get its new cafeteria, but for the middle school to add its new gymnasium, completed earlier in the year, and for the High School to begin a 3-phase renovation of its stadium. Phase one of the project—new bleachers and seating -has already been completed and a new all-weather track is expected by next spring. Over the last 5 years, all three campuses in the district have been steadily improved through state funding. Some of the projects, in addition to the bond projects, include solar panel installation on all campuses, the addition of new wings at the middle school and at Luther a new track and field, blacktop, roof and paint at Luther school.

Gulbrandsen says that in the past, one of his biggest frustrations was that he felt the schools did not "physically represent the community." As the much-needed renovations, additions and upgrades continue, he says that the campuses are becoming a "source of pride" physically representing pride of the community in which they are based. ★



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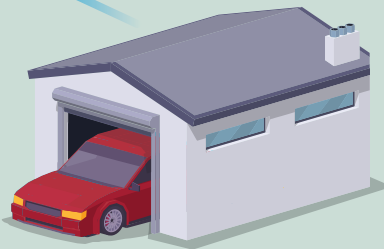


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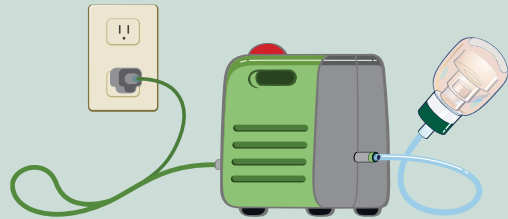
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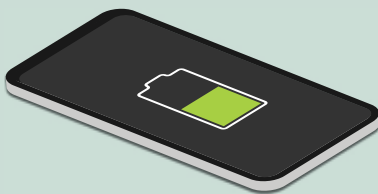

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Dear Dietitian

Small Bowel Obstruction

Dear Dietitian,

I recently had surgery to correct a small bowel obstruction. I have been following a low fiber diet, but now I've been instructed to transition to a high fiber diet. My question is how much fiber do I need and should I increase it all at once?

Betty

Dear Betty,

For readers who are not familiar, a small bowel obstruction (SBO) is just as it sounds; it's a blockage in the small intestine, and digested food cannot pass into the colon (large intestine). The obstruction is often caused by scar tissue known as adhesions. Sometimes SBOs resolve with rest and no food or drink by mouth, while others require surgery. A low fiber diet is

often prescribed after a bowel obstruction is corrected. This is because fiber passes through the GI tract unchanged and adds bulk to the stool. A low fiber diet helps the bowel rest and return to its normal function. This diet is temporary; then the patient is transitioned to a high fiber diet. We know that fiber is beneficial in keeping us regular and helps manage certain chronic conditions, such as high cholesterol and diabetes. There is some research to suggest that fiber may help protect us from certain types of cancer, but more studies are needed before a definitive statement can be made.

Fiber is found in plant foods: fruits, nuts, seeds, vegetables, beans, legumes, and whole grains. The American Heart Association suggests that we consume 25-35 grams of fiber each day, but most Americans get half that amount. The mantra to apply here is "Easy does it." Start with one to two servings of fiber-rich foods each day. Add a fruit at breakfast and a vegetable at dinner, which will give you about 8-10 grams of fiber. Then gradually increase fiber by 5-gram increments weekly until you reach the goal of at least 25 grams each

day. For a list of high fiber foods, click here. It is important to drink plenty of water and/or decaffeinated beverages while increasing fiber intake in order to prevent constipation.

If you have gas or discomfort when eating these foods, consider taking an over-the-counter enzyme with the first bite. Since the body cannot break down fiber, it is digested by bacteria in the colon, which produces gas in the process. The enzyme actually helps break down some types of fiber. You may also consult your doctor or pharmacist about taking simethicone.

Turkey Fires

Careless cooking is the number one cause of residential fires. Never leave anything unattended while cooking! Don't let an unfortunate grease fire ruin your holiday meal. With the holiday season fast approaching; here are some helpful tips and safety information to make this holiday season a memorable one, brought to you by CAL FIRE/Gridley Fire Department.

- Stay Away from the House – Set up the turkey fryer more than 10 feet away from your home and keep children and pets away. Never leave it unattended.
- Find Flat Ground – The oil must be even and steady at all times to ensure safety. Place the fryer on a flat, level surface and carefully gauge the amount of oil needed.
- Use a Thawed and Dry Turkey – Make sure your Thanksgiving turkey is completely thawed and dry. Extra water will cause the oil to bubble furiously and spill over. If oil spills from the fryer onto the burner, it can cause a fire.
- Monitor the Temp – Use caution when touching the turkey fryer. The lid and handle can cause burns. Also be sure to keep track of the oil's temperature as many fryers do not have their own thermostats.
- Be Prepared – Have a fire extinguisher (multipurpose, dry-powder) ready at all times in the event that the oil ignites.

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Gridley Inspires an Artist's Path Forward After the Camp Fire

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Rosemary Redmond hopped on a plane from Anchorage, Alaska and relocated to Paradise, familiar territory to her, just a few months before the Camp Fire leveled the town. Her brother had convinced her to return to their childhood home and she did, bringing with her a trove of art she had produced over her lifetime as an abstract artist.

Memories of the fire are still vivid for Redmond. The fire took her entire lifetime of works. Redmond’s heartbreak at losing all of her originals and records of her artwork is deep. “I will never hold back my strongest works again,” she says in regard to keeping some of her favorite pieces.

Redmond landed in Gridley and found herself sharing a home on Washington Street with her brother, who also lost all in the fire. Strangely, she found many elements of our little town reminiscent to her childhood growing up in Alaska and Paradise. In a letter to us about Gridley, she says, “On my daily walks, I found the architecture fascinating, the birds in the rice fields with the darling Sutter Buttes in the background... so many interesting and beautiful sights to see.” She fell in love with a band of wild chickens and roosters living near her home that she inherited. “I did a painting

entitled “The Feral Gang of Washington Street” in honor of these animals!

In fact, she has done a whole series of abstract paintings based on her time spent and inspired by the towns of Gridley, Biggs and Los Molinos. Redmond holds a BA in fine art from the University of Alaska, Anchorage and a master’s from the Pratt Institute in New York. She began work on her “Gridley” series in December, getting a Joan Mitchel Art Foundation grant to help her get re-started painting. Redmond shares how she truly believes that the inspiration from the farming culture of Gridley truly has helped her begin again in her own life. In fitting fashion, Redmond plans to showcase her works for the first time in the town that inspired many of them – Gridley.

Her show, which she intends to call “Gridley: An exciting little farming/ranching town with a slight rooster problem” will be held Saturday, November 16th from 5-7 pm at The Paint Locker gallery in downtown, owned by fellow artist Aaron Burks. Burks has arranged for Gridley High students to come help hang the show and Redmond is busily working to prepare to fill the gallery’s walls.

In the meantime, the Museum of Northern California Art in Chico has used a photograph of Redmond’s to advertise their show “Reflection

She says that she took the photo “shortly after moving to Gridley of an orchard where the limbs of the trees shot dramatically straight up... I identified with those trees (bare of leaves), also awaiting a new life and new beginnings.”

Redmond’s opening reception will be held Saturday, November 16th from 5:00 – 7:00 pm at The Paint Locker gallery at 548 Kentucky St., Gridley CA. ★
