## Live Oak Senior Project Picks

**LIVE OAK, CA (MPG)** - The seniors at LOHS have begun the famous process of picking their senior project. The process of completing a senior project is a big accomplishment, by April students will have spent 20 hours completing the physical project as well as 20 hours of community service. So far, the seniors have picked their top three ideas and have begun finding a mentor, creating a plan for how much time and money the project will require.

Students can pick anything from painting a mural in town to fixing up an old car. In just over a week the seniors will have to present their project idea to a panel of teachers, their presentation must explain how the project is a "learning stretch." The Senior project has been in place for 23 years at Live Oak and is run by the Senior English Teacher, Mr. Fredericks and the Senior Government and Economics Teacher, Mr. Anderson. The two teachers put the Senior Project program into place to teach their students the importance of making deadlines and staying organized.

At the end of the year the seniors display their projects at the annual Senior Project Fair. All are welcome to attend and see all the seniors at Live Oak have accomplished, so stop on by at the end of the year to see what the students at Live Oak High are capable of. ★

city services, labor relations and partnerships with new and expanding developments, including the construction of the required infrastructure of the city’s industrial park, funded entirely with Federal funds, Eckert leaves behind quite a project list, some realized and some still in the works.

Although he will be leaving his position with the city in just a little over a week, Eckert says that he plans to work closely with the Mayor and city staff in the future months. “I’ve provided the Mayor an extensive transition projects list with significant supporting details identifying more than 60 projects, including project leaders and timeframes. I’ve committed to helping both online and in person after I leave.”

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - This weekend, Butte County Volunteer and Calfire firefighters could be seen standing on the corners and sometimes in the center of the roadways, holding out boots to collect donations for this year's charity, the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Gridley's Station 74 crew was out in force, with a total of 8 career firefighters and 2 volunteers posted at the busy corner of Hwy 99 and E. Gridley road. Gridley joined the BTU (Calfire Butte Unit) collection drive, with Chico and Oroville stations working on the same day.

Totals tallied, Chico brought the most in with a total of \$18,326 (not including coins), Oroville followed with \$12,836 and Gridley raised \$4, 464, for a total of \$35,626. Not bad! With over 16K earned by BTU earlier this year, the firefighters have raised an amazing 51k this year, all for charitable organizations. Then plan to present a check to the foundation in the immediate future as 100 percent of the funds are donated to charity. Not bad!

Calfire Fire Captain, Dustin Mattos said speaking to the community "I would like to thank everyone for their generosity. I can always count on Gridley to take the time to support a good cause. I'm proud to work and live in such a great community. Also, thanks to all the engine companies from Biggs, Gridley and Richvale and volunteers for their time spent collecting donations." ★

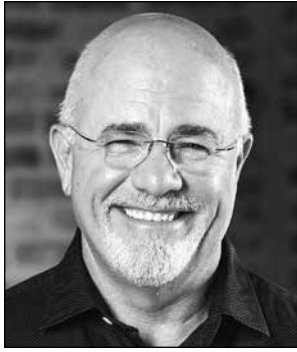

## Test His Resolve

Dear Dave,  
Our son is 27, and he has a good job making \$55,000 a year. Recently, we learned he financed an expensive car he's now upside down on. In addition, he has accumulated over \$15,000 in credit card debt. He lives in a small town, and only pays \$650 a month in rent, but he is asking for money. We taught him about living on a budget and staying out of debt when he was younger, and now it seems he didn't listen very well. How do you think we should handle this situation? — Bryce

## Dave Ramsey Says

Dear Bryce,

The first thing I'd advise telling him is that you and his mom aren't going to whip out the checkbook, and make his problems disappear. That may sound harsh, but he had a really good thing going until he messed it up by acting impulsively and irresponsibly with his finances. Nope, I wouldn't take care of it for him — not at his age. This young man needs to have some skin in the game.

I'd tell him to sell the fancy car, and get something way cheaper to drive for a while. I'm talking about a little beater in the \$2,000 to \$3,000 range. It sounds like he'll have to get a small loan to cover the difference, but a little car debt is better than a lot of car debt. I'd also advise him to pick up a part-time job nights or weekends until he gets that credit

card debt paid off.

In other words, let him wallow in it and worry about things for a while. Then, if he's willing to accept responsibility for his actions, and starts handling money more wisely, you two might help out every so often with a little extra cash on the payments.

But I'd test his resolve first. And I'd want to see proof he has learned from his mistakes! — Dave

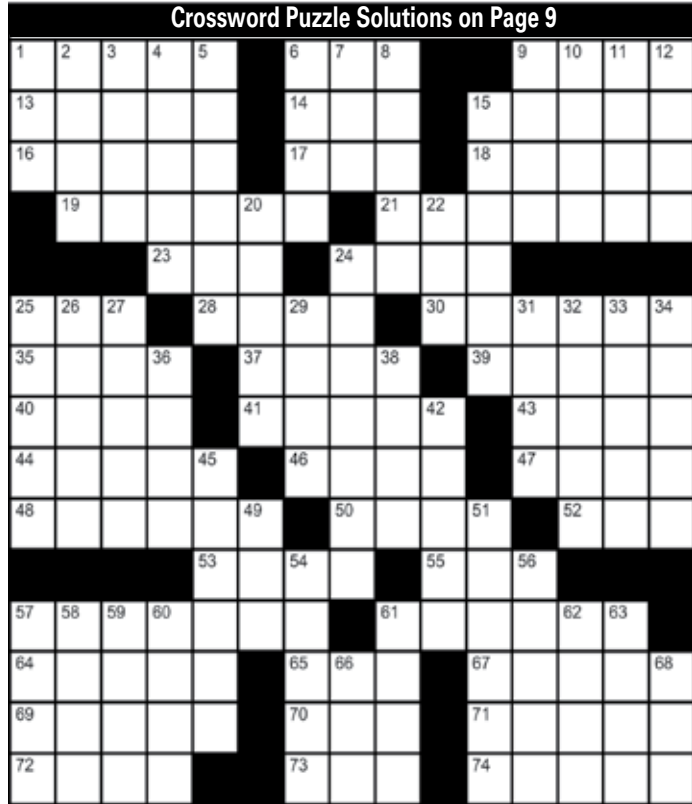

## St. Timothy's Church to Host Evening of Remembrance

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Right after Halloween is the celebration of All Saints' Day on November 1st, followed by All Souls' Day on the 2nd of November. It's during those days that the traditional Mexican observance of Día de los Muertos, or Day of the Dead, is observed. It is the custom during that observance to demonstrate love and respect for deceased family members. It is not, strictly, a religious service, although prayers may be offered. It is

more of a family event, often observed at the cemetery or in the home. Photos of the departed as well as mementos reminding the family of a relative are placed on an "ofrenda." The word "ofrenda" means offering in Spanish. Ofrendas are also called "altares" or altars, but they are not for worship.

Because the Día de los Muertos is so close to the first anniversary of the tragedy of the Camp Fire, St. Timothy's Church is sponsoring an Evening of Remembrance, to be held in St. Timothy's park-like churchyard, on Friday,

November 1st, from 6 – 8 p.m. An ofrenda will be set up and candles will be lighted. Everyone is invited to bring a photo or memento of someone they have lost. Campfire survivors are particularly invited to attend and bring their photos, mementos, and memories to share. All are encouraged to remember not only persons but also all those things lost in this tragic event. An opportunity will be offered to make luminaires to line the patio and the sidewalks. Light refreshments will be served, and the evening will be closed with a brief time for prayer and reflection. ★

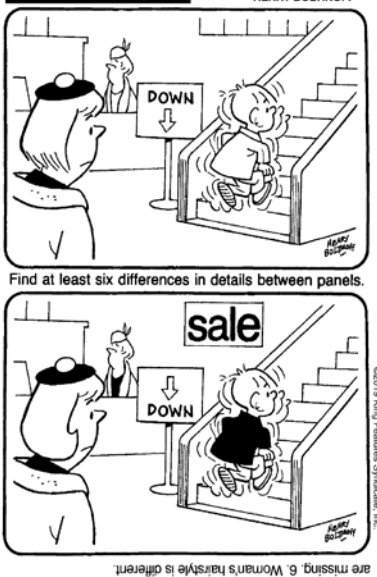

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - Homecoming night, Friday, October 18th, was filled with theatrics at the Dog Pound for the Gridley Bulldogs varsity team. With a 3-3 (0-1 league) record, the Bulldogs hosted the 0-6 (0-1 league) Las Plumas Thunderbirds. ### Child Car Seat Safety

One of the most important jobs you have as a parent is keeping your child safe when riding in a vehicle. Each year, thousands of young children are killed or injured in car crashes. Proper use of car seats helps keep children safe. But with so many different seats on the market, many parents find this overwhelming.

If you are expectant parents, give yourself enough time to learn how to properly install the car seat in your car before your baby is born to ensure a safe ride home from the hospital.

The type of seat your child needs depends on several things, including your child's age and size and the type of vehicle you have. **Here are Some Car Seat Safety Tips**

- Rear Facing Seat (Birth to Two Years)**
  - Best seat for child to use has a harness that moves with your child in an accident to cradle your child's head and neck
  - All children must ride in rear facing seat until child reaches size or age requirements set by seat manufacturer.
  - Switch to convertible rear-facing seat for larger infants when rear-facing infant seat is outgrown.
- Forward Facing Seat (Two Years and Older)**
  - Has harness and tether that limits forward movement during an accident
  - Keep child in forward-facing seat with a harness until age and size limits set by manufacturer are exceeded.
- Booster Seat (Five Years and Older)**
  - A booster seat positions seat belt so it fits properly over the stronger parts of the child's body.
  - Use forward-facing belt positioning booster seat until child reaches 4'9" tall, typically at age 12.
- Seat Belt (Older Children and Adults)**
  - Keep your child in a booster seat until he or she is big enough to fit in a seat belt properly.
  - The seat belt should lie across the upper thighs and be snug across the shoulder and chest to restrain the child safely in a crash.
  - It should not rest on the stomach area or across the neck or face.★
