



Jesse was born in Rexburg, Idaho. son of William Henry and Sarah Zweifel Chandler. He was the fifth of twelve children and the last living sibling.

After graduating from DuBois High School in 1934, he and his brother hitched a ride on a freight train to Westwood, California to work in the sawmills.

He served a mission from 1938-1940

for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Arizona and Southern California.

Jesse met Mary Caroline Saunders in Westwood when he returned from his mission and they married June 1, 1942 in the Logan, Utah LDS Temple. One year later he was drafted into the Navy SeaBees Division and served 30 months, mostly in England, until World War II ended.

After returning from the War, they moved to Logan, Utah where he graduated from Utah State University in 1949. They moved back to Biggs/Gridley California and worked as a carpenter for Fife and Stoddard Construction until getting a teaching job for Live Oak High School. On June 13, 1991, Jesse married Gloria Ruth Quist. During his retirement years, traveling, woodworking, and a small walnut orchard kept him busy. Gloria passed away June 4, 2010 after almost 19 years of marriage.

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - This weekend, Butte County Volunteer and Calfire firefighters could be seen standing on the corners and sometimes in the center of the roadways, holding out boots to collect donations for this year's charity, the Muscular Distrophy Association.

Gridley's Station 74 crew was out in force, with a total of 8 career firefighters and 2 volunteers posted at the busy corner of Hwy 99 and E. Gridley road. Gridley joined the BTU (Calfire Butte Unit) collection drive, with Chico and Oroville stations working on the same day.

Totals tallied, Chico brought the most in with a total of \$18,326 (not including coins), Oroville followed with \$12,836 and Gridlev raised \$4, 464. for a total of \$35,626. Not bad! With over 16K earned by BTU earlier this year, the firefighters have raised an amazing 51k this year, all for charitable organizations. Then plan to present a check to the foundation in the immediate future as 100 percent of the funds are donated to charity. Not bad!

Calfire Fire Captain, Dustin Mattos said speaking to the community "I would like to thank everyone for their generosity. I can always count on Gridley to take the time to support a good cause. I'm proud to work and live in such a great community. Also, thanks to all the engine companies from Biggs, Gridley and Richvale and volunteers for their time spent collecting donations."

Dear Bryce,

The first thing I'd advise telling him is that you and his mom aren't going to whip out the checkbook, and make his problems disappear. That may sound harsh, but he had a really good thing going until he messed it up by acting impulsively and irresponsibly with his finances. Nope, I wouldn't take care of it for him – not at his age. This young man needs to have some skin in the game.

I'd tell him to sell the over \$15,000 in credit card fancy car, and get something way cheaper to drive for a while. I'm talking about a little beater in the \$2,000 to \$3,000 range. It sounds like he'll have to get a small loan to cover the difference, but a little car debt is better than a lot of car debt. I'd also advise him to pick up a part-time job nights or weekends until he gets that credit DaveRamsey.

In other words, let him wallow in it and worry about things for a while. Then, if he's willing to accept responsibility for his actions, and starts handling money more wisely, you two might help out every so often with a little extra cash on the payments.

Here are Some Car Seat Safety Tips

Rear Facing Seat (Birth to Two Years)

- Best seat for child to use has a harness that moves with your child in an accident to cradle your child's head and neck
- All children must ride in rear facing seat until child reaches size or age requirements set by seat manufacturer.
- Switch to convertible rear-facing seat for larger infants when rear-facing infant seat is outgrown.

Forward Facing Seat (Two Years and Older)

- Has harness and tether that limits forward movement during an accident
- Keep child in forward-facing seat with a harness until age and size limits set by manufacturer are exceeded.

Booster Seat (Five Years and Older)

- A booster seat positions seat belt so it fits properly over the stronger parts of the child's body.
- Use forward-facing belt positioning booster seat until child reaches 4'9" tall, typically at age 12.

Seat Belt (Older Children and Adults)

- Keep your child in a booster seat until he or she is big enough to fit in a seat belt properly.
- The seat belt should lie across the upper thighs and be snug across the shoulder and chest to restrain the child safely in a crash.
- It should not rest on the stomach area or across the neck or face. \star


