CORRECTION - In the last Pi Line column, I wrote that there is only one Biggs in the world, 5 Live Oaks, and 4 Gridleys. Upon publication, it was swiftly made known to me by a dutiful reader that there is indeed another Biggs. Biggs Junction, Oregon. Biggs was named for a local landowner, W. H. Biggs, who settled in Sherman County in 1880. **Biggs Junction is across** the Columbia River from Maryhill, Washington. Biggs Junction lost their Post Office in 1954, but the Oregon Biggs currently has one of the most massive truck stops in Oregon and handles a lot of wheat. The California Biggs (or our Biggs) was established as Biggs Station in 1871, and the name changed to Biggs in 1884. It was incorporated in 1903. Biggs is named for Maj. Marion Biggs, who first shipped grain from there. Mr. Biggs served in the State Assembly just as Mr. Durham from Durham did. So Doug LaMalfa, being elected Senator from Richvale, is not so unusual when taken in a historical electoral context. Again, thank you to the unnamed

reader for the correction; County. Go North dear of my Biggs error.

Family History is the most popular hobby in America. Doug Guild from Falcon Heights, MN is looking for anyone still living who might recall his late Aunt and Uncle Margaret and Jack Cooksie and their Cooksie's Corner restaurant. The timeframe seems to be some time in the early 50s. In this column of January 6, 1995, Mr. Burleson noted - "We remember when the Crossroads was called Cookies Corner, and later VV Cafe, Ellen's and more recently, The Roadhouse. Didn't all the restaurants along the Highway start as Chicken Shacks? Biggs Four Corners, Gridley where the Chevron Station is today, The Country Kitchen, Richvale-Oroville Wye, and Cooksie's?" If you know anything about the Cooksies, their family is doing research, you can send info to Doug at dguild@usfamily.net.

Speaking of Restaurants and traditions, the Pizza Round-Up is on the Highway in Biggs, and they have excellent Chicken wings, so the local historical tradition of Chicken Shacks on the Highway lives on (and they have Carmel Pecan Cheesecake for desert). So I am hereby declaring Pizza Round-Up a Local Important Historical Point of Interest. Perhaps the people in Live Oak can drive there for food after going to the Dutch Bros. Coffee shack. Butte County and DWR Reach Settlement On Road Repairs

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -

Butte County and the Department of Water Resources (DWR)announced that they have settled a lawsuit filed by Butte County for roadway damage resulting from the Oroville Spillways Incident in February 2017. Repair efforts by DWR resulted in heavy truck traffic on roads maintained by Butte County.

Over the course of approximately two years, DWR and Butte County discussed the effects of the

the damaged roads. DWR County with \$12 million for repairs to many of the impacted roads and emergency services.

"Butte County and DWR are pleased to have come to an agreement that will help Butte County recover from the Spillway Incident and hope to continue to work together to ensure public safety and have a positive impact on the community," stated Butte County District 4 Supervisor Steve Lambert and Ted Craddock, DWR Deputy Director, State Water Project.

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Motorists can expect significant daytime travel delays during the day later Highway 70 south of Oroville for paving work.

A contractor will be conducting reversing one-way traffic control from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Saturday at the intersection of Palermo Road/Welsh Road and

Highway 70. Flaggers will be stationed on both sides of the intersection directing traffic through the work zone. Motorists can expect delays of up to 30 minutes.

Caltrans advises motorthis weekend on State ists to use alternate routes such as Highway 99 to avoid heavy traffic congestion in the area.

The work is part of a \$48.6 million safety project to widen Highway 70 between Ophir Road and Palermo.

Weather or unexpected events may delay or prolong the work. Caltrans advises motorists to "Be Work Zone Alert." 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


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A Key Element in Getting Out of Debt

Dear Dave,

I've got about \$3,000 in credit card debt. Would it be a good idea to transfer the balance from my credit card to another one that has a much lower interest rate?

Dear Tmmi,

Lots of people who find themselves in your shoes make the switch to lowinterest rate credit cards. A lower interest rate will help you save a little money in the short-term, but the drawback is it can also make you feel like you've addressed your problem with debt when you really haven't. You've got to change the behavior

you in that situation in cut up your credit card and the first place. Besides, most low-interest, or nointerest, credit card offers are only good for a short weekends for just a little period of time. There's always a catch!

that personal finance is only about 20 percent head knowledge and 80 percent behavior. Emotion is a key element to getting out of debt and staying out of debt. You've got to get really mad at debt, the impact it has on your financial life, and attack it with a vengeance. Think about how many times debt has been a negative influence on your life. My guess is there were many occasions in the past when you could have done great stuff – I'm talking about meaningful, important things – if you hadn't had to send a bunch of money to those bozos at the credit card company every month. I want you to really think about it.

How about this? First. close the account. Then, sell some stuff and take a part-time job nights or while. You could wipe out all your debt in less than I discovered long ago a year by doing that and starting to live on a strict, written, monthly budget.

If you don't get mad about it and take a stand against debt, and become determined you're never going to fall into that trap again, you're liable to find yourself back in the same situation or worse! - Dave

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Dear Dietitian

Raw Milk

Dear Dietitian,

I have a friend who drinks raw, unpasteurized milk. She claims it has many health benefits, and that pasteurization of milk is unnecessary. What do you think?

Jim

Dear Jim,

The consumption of raw milk has gained popularity in recent years, and many people believe it is a healthier alternative to pasteurized milk. Let's take a look at what science says.

Most of us are familiar with the term pasteurization, which is the process of heating food products like milk, to a temperature high enough to kill harmful bacteria. The process was named for its inventor, Louis Pasteur, a French scientist. Pasteurization was originally created to "kill the diseases" of wine in France (1). Commercial pasteurization of milk began in the US in the early 1900s due to widespread milkborne illnesses.

In recent years, some advocacy groups claim that pasteurization of milk isn't necessary and that it kills many healthy properties inherent to milk. Claims include: vitamins

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and minerals are destroyed: good bacteria are sacrificed; and the nutritional quality of milk is compromised due to denaturing (changing of structure) of proteins. Currently, the sale of raw milk in stores is allowed in 13 states in the US, and 17 states permit raw milk to be sold on farms.

A review of studies on the safety of raw milk was performed at Johns Hopkins University in Maryland in 2014 and concluded the "relative risk of individual illness is almost 150 times greater per unit of unpasteurized dairy product, compared to pasteurized." (2) The most common disease-causing bacteria in unpasteurized milk are E. Coli, Salmonellla, Listeria, and Brucella. According to Dr. Pritish Tosh, an infectious disease specialist at the Mayo Clinic, Brucella is a drug-resistant bacterium that can cause brucellosis, an infection that can be severe and affects many areas of the body, including the bloodstream, bones, and joints (3).

Contrary to what can be found on the internet, the nutrient composition of milk is not changed by pasteurization. Milk is a significant source of calcium, protein, and vitamin B12. Vitamins A and D are added to pasteurized milk that is sold commercially. While there are some losses of B12 (<10%), vitamins A and D, as well as calcium, are heat stable and maintain their value during pasteurization. It is true that denaturing of protein occurs, but it still maintains its nutritional purpose (4).

Are good bacteria lost in pasteurized milk? The data on this issue is conflicting. At any rate, healthy bacteria can be obtained in pasteurized foods like yogurt with live and active cultures and kefir. You may also purchase probiotics but remember, research only supports improvement in digestive problems with probiotics, not overall health.

Finally, it is important to note that most health organizations recommend infants under the age of one not consume cow's milk, raw or pasteurized. Their digestive tracts cannot handle the ash in cow's milk, and if they contract an illness from bacteria in raw milk, their immune systems are not yet fully developed to fight the infection effectively. Babies should consume human breastmilk or formula.

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





Jason said, "Obviously we felt the void on the major holidays. The two girls kept us busy, but on Christmas and Thanksgiving, we felt that void. Because of where he was, we would Skype with him the day after the holiday." Deidra added, "It's a bigger deal in Jason's family. They're not used to not seeing someone for two full years. Gabe lived in a wellbuilt shack with a single solar panel on the roof. The panel powered a light bulb, a phone charger, and a fan that would get them through most of the night. Deidra said, "In Jason's family, you're raised that you support your family no matter what, whatever their decisions are." Jason added, "We're a pretty close-knit family. We're still around this area."

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Eradicated by BCSO SEU Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force **Press Release** BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) -On September 19, 2019,

on Marijuana Plants

the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) Special Enforcement Unit (SEU), along with members of the Butte Interagency Narcotics Task Force served a search warrant on an illegal marijuana grow on Black Bart Road, in Oroville.

Deputies discovered hundreds of marijuana plants growing inside two different greenhouses on the property. Deputies also located several hundred additional marijuana plants hidden in the brush around the property. In total, Deputies eradicated 457 marijuana plants from the property. No suspects were found on the propis ongoing.

On September 20, 2019, the Butte County Sheriff's Office Special Enforcement Unit, assisting Butte County Code Enforcement served a

marijuana abatement warrant on a property located on Shane Court, in Berry Creek.

Upon service of the abatement warrant, Deputies discovered an indoor illegal marijuana grow. Deputies also saw evidence of commercial processing of THC hash oil vape cartridges. Based on the evidence of a large scale marijuana cultivation site and the possession of marijuana packaged for sale, Deputies obtained their own search warrant and processed the scene.

In total, Deputies eradicated 107 marijuana plants from the outdoor grow site and an additional 248 indoor marijuana plants, for a total of 355 marijuana plants. Deputies recovered 54.19 pounds of processed marijuana erty and the investigation along with dozens of name brand THC hash oil filled vape cartridges that were being packaged for commercial sales. No suspects were found on the property and the investigation is ongoing.
