GUSD Named One of State's **Most Positive**

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Recently, Gridley Unified School District was named as one of the State of California's positive outlier school districts.

A report by the Learning Policy Institute authored by A. Poldolsky, L. Darling-Hammond, C. Doss and S. Reardon, outlines what comprises a "positive outlier district." According to the report, the state of California "adopted new learning standards and assessments that require all students to engage in higher-order thinking and problem solving," in an attempt to help students with deeper learning and increase their educational skill-set necessary for success in the 21st century. The hope behind the changes was to improve the academic achievements of students from different racial or socioeconomic backgrounds, which had historically been underserved in the academic setting.

As gaps in academic achievement increased throughout the state of California school systems, some school districts are excelling at supporting the education of students of color and socioeconomic backgrounds and low-income families. These are your positive outlier school districts; which Gridley has been named one of. These 54 positive outlier school districts have been selected based on 3 years of quantitative data and study, the sample size being a district comprised of 2,000 students of different racial background, mostly African American and Hispanic, alongside their white peers. These districts have demonstrated outstanding levels of academic achievement in the areas of English Language, Arts and Math. Factors such as community and family support are also acknowledged. Most of the districts named are found in Southern California, with Gridley being one of the only districts noted in the north valley region above Sacramento. In a contrast graph, Gridley Unified School District ranked among the top 5 School Districts where Hispanic student population academic achievement outranked white student achievement, and in the top 13 with overall student achievement higher than predicted by state standards and assessments. That is exciting news for our district. Superintendent Jordan Reeves commented that, "It's pretty amazing, to be recognized with some of the top districts statewide." In addition to being a top positive outlier district, Gridley Unified School District was also recognized in early September in a program held in Sacramento for its early literacy achievements. GUSD hopes to continue this path of academic excellence. *

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

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



is lacking. Bratman cautions that just because someone adopts an alternative diet does not mean that person has orthorexia. It is when eating right becomes an obsession and affects other areas of the person's life that it becomes a problem. (2)

At this point, it is unclear if the disorder is a part of anorexia nervosa, stands alone as a disorder, or is a part of obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD). It is known to affect women more often than men, and more so in Western countries than other parts of the world. Orthorexia

may lead to nutrient deficiencies and malnutrition.

Another area of life that is impacted by orthorexia is relationships. One may socialize less frequently as these events often include dining out. They may spend less time with family and friends because they are obsessing about the foods that will be available at an out of town conference attend next week. As a result, the individual becomes to feel isolated and alone.

According to the National Eating Disorders Association, warning signs and symptoms of orthorexia include (3): · Compulsive check-

ing of ingredient lists and nutrition labels • An increase in concern about the health of ingredients

· Cutting out an increasing number of food groups (all sugar, all carbohydrates, all dairy, all meat, all animal products)

• An inability to eat anything but a narrow group of foods that are deemed 'healthy' or 'pure'

• Showing high levels of distress when 'safe' or 'healthy' foods aren't available Help is available. The optimum treatment for orthorexia includes a team composed of a psychiatrist, a physician, a psychotherapist, and a dietitian. You may start by asking your

daughter's pediatrician for a referral or contact the National Eating Disorder Association at 1-800-931.2237.

Wildland Fire Safety

Every year, wildfires burn across the U.S., and more and more people are living where wildfires are a real risk. But by working together, residents can make their own property – and their neighborhood – much safer from wildfire.

ACTION STEPS FOR AROUND YOUR HOME

- CLEAR leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches and decks. This helps prevent embers from igniting your home.
- **REMOVE** dead vegetation and other items from under your deck or porch, and within 10 feet of the house.
- SCREEN in areas below patios and decks with wire mesh to prevent debris and combustible materials from accumulating.
- REMOVE flammable materials (wood piles, propane tanks) within 30 feet of your home's foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. If it can catch fire, don't let it touch your house, deck or porch.
- Wildfire can spread to tree tops. PRUNE trees so the lowest branches are 6 to 10 feet from the ground.
- KEEP your lawn hydrated and maintained. If it is brown, cut it down to reduce fire intensity. Dry grass and shrubs are fuel for wildfire.
- Don't let debris and lawn cuttings linger. DISPOSE of these items quickly to reduce fuel for fire.
- **INSPECT** shingles or roof tiles. Replace or repair the shingles that are loose or missing to prevent ember penetration.

- COVER exterior attic vents with metal wire mesh no larger than 1/8 inch to prevent sparksfrom entering the home.
- ENCLOSE eaves and screen soffit vents using 1/8 mesh metal screening to prevent ember entry.



GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The Gridley Friends of the Library got a special treat Tuesday evening at their Don Wiley Awards Ceremony when special guest speaker, local TV anchor for Action News Now, Debbie Cobb, let it slip that she had a third book in the works.

Cobb was in attendance in support of children's literacy and to read excerpts from her two children's books, "Gracie's Big Adventure With The Misfits" published in 2007 and "Gracie's Big Adventure with Augustine the Beaver" published in 2006.
