Beware the Bite!

West Nile Virus Found in Butte County

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Fighting off swarms of mosquitoes each summer season is not new to us here in the valley. The acres of standing water in rice fields, irrigation ditches and canals, nature preserves like Gray Lodge and recreational areas such as the Afterbay and the Feather River provide the ideal breeding environment for the pests. Combine un-maintained pools, dog bowls and other man-made containers and it's the perfect storm for mosquito hoards.

According to Matt Ball, District Manager of the Butte County Mosquito Abatement, the two predominant species of mosquitoes responsible for the spread of West Nile virus breed in exactly those conditions.

To monitor and combat the spread

of potentially deadly diseases like West Nile, the mosquito abatement hangs traps in areas out of the way of the public and test pools in designated locations throughout the area for signs of West Nile. Those samples are tested for positive signs of the disease.

The first positive test for West Nile in our area was on July 16, in the Honcut area. Within a 3 week period the infestation had spread rapidly, with a total of 19 pools in our area now testing positive. In addition, tests on the department's sentinel chickens have also come back positive. Ball says, "I don't want to be a fear monger, but the public should be concerned." He urges that everyone "take the utmost and strictest precautions

at this time."

Currently, West Nile has been in located in the east Gridley area, near Manzanita school, the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery and of course, western Gridley. He stresses, "It is wide spread throughout the valley floor and throughout Butte County." Ball adds that "I would not go to a Biggs football game at the Butte County Fair without wearing repellent. Anyone going fishing, the

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Community members turned out in strong support of a Gridley Parks and Recreation effort to obtain new state-of-the-art playground equipment for Vierra Park at Monday's City Council Meeting.

Council first heard the proposal for the new

equipment at the May 20th city council meeting but held off on approval, wishing to conduct a much-needed survey of the park property and poll community support. A main concern was to be sure that developments of the beloved park could sustain the different activities and programs held there, while also accommodating

increasing parking needs for years to come.

Although City Council was in favor of the new playground equipment, there were also other projects and components of park development to consider. The City of Gridley, Council and Public Works director Daryl Dye have been addressing issues of ADA compliance and

access at the park, limited parking, installing new lighting and making overall facility improvements over the last few years. Mention had been made of redesigning the layout of some of the ballfields in order to make upgrades to the park more cost effective and user friendly. The addition of

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Tickets for the 2019 Butte County Fair are on sale. The Butte County Fair returns August 22 through August 25 with four days of classic fair favorites as well as exciting new additions for the whole family to enjoy.

This year, the Butte County Fair is bringing back the fun, food and rides. Favorites from past years will be present, such as Midway of Fun Carnival, Rawhide Express Fun Train, Exotic Birds & Reptiles, Mud Bogging and Tuff Trucks, and Demolition Derby, featuring the RV Demolition Derby. Plus, the Fair presents several new experiences throughout the weekend including the Maker's Experience, Vex IQ Grit & Grind BCOE Robotics competition, marching band competition and a free concert by Skynnyn Lynnyrd on Sunday.

The Fair opened at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday August 22, kicking off the weekend-long activities with Local Team Roping at 7:30 p.m. On Friday August 23, the Fair opens at 3:00 p.m. with Mud Boggs and Tuff Trucks in the arena at 7:00 p.m., sponsored by RCI General Engineering. The Fair will open at 12:00 p.m. on Saturday August 24, featuring the marching band competition followed by a parade through the fairgrounds starting at 4:30 p.m. The Destruction Derby takes over the arena, starting at 7:00 p.m. with an all-new RV Demolition Derby grand finale. On Sunday August 25, the final day of the Butte County Fair will open at 12:00 p.m. The Skynnyn Lynnyrd concert starts at 7:00 p.m. on the Arena Stage, and a family-friendly black-light puppet show by Spread The Light Puppet Ministry begins at 9:00 p.m. on the Courtyard Stage. The Fair remains open until 11:00 p.m. Sunday night.

Each day of the Butte County Fair will feature new events, such as the Maker's Experience. In cooperation with Wide Awake Geeks from Marysville, visitors will be able to check out 3D printing exhibits, robotics, and hand-crafted creations. Also appearing will be the Artisans on the Ridge, various live musical acts, stills exhibits, mutton busting, big wheel races, food, fun, and much more.

new FEMA people and ridge folks new to your area need to protect themselves."

Ball informs that as the climate continues to change and become warmer, more and more mosquitoes are traveling farther from the equator, bringing with them diseases that have not been seen in years. "It's not just West Nile the public should be concerned about," he says. Mosquitoes carry multiple forms of encephalitis, malaria and recently Zika; Dengue fever and yellow fever have been making a comeback. "Those would make West Nile look like the common cold," says Balls.

According to Ball, West Nile arrived on scene in our area in 2004. Some people infected can be asymptomatic and show no symptoms, but others are not so lucky. Symptoms include headache, fever, body aches, vomiting, diarrhea, fatigue, and skin rash. There is no vaccine or anti-viral treatment for the virus. Since its arrival in

2004, 245 residents have become ill with the virus and 9 have lost their lives. All from a single mosquito bite.

The mosquito abatement currently uses multiple tactics to reduce the mosquito population. Those include the use of larvicide and mosquito fish to treat water environments and aerial and truck fogging in the evenings. "The fogging is really our last resort," says Ball. He suggests that the public use bug repellents with high levels of DEET to protect against the bite.

With summer activities still in full swing, school starting back up, the Butte County Fair and various sport practices taking place in the evenings, it is imperative that the public take the necessary precautions for protection. Again, Ball stresses that one bite can change your life forever and that the threat of West Nile in our area is real. He concludes, "The only way to prevent West Nile is to prevent the bite of the mosquito." ★

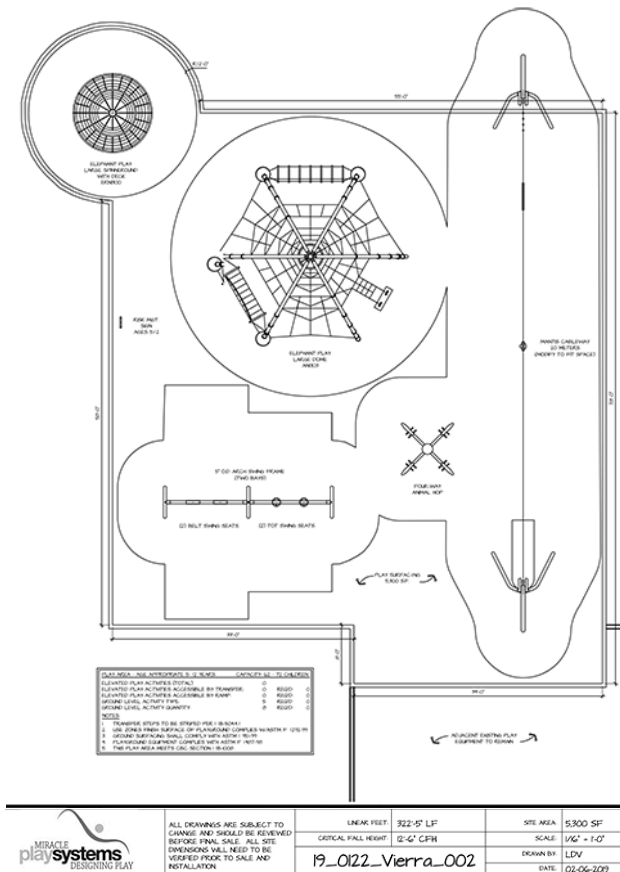

new play equipment would need to be planned carefully and Council agreed to revisit the issue at later date.

On Monday, Parks and Recreation Director, Trina Leishman, brought the proposal back to the council once again, this time with a pressing deadline for approval and backed with major community support. Sentiments throughout the Gridley community showed many residents in favor of the equipment, despite the nearly \$200,000 dollar price tag.

Thankfully, Leishman knows what she is doing. Not only has she procured a \$25,000 grant from the North Valley Community Foundation, she has also worked with the equipment manufacturer, Miracle Playsystems, to get discounts on installation. Unfortunately, those discounts expire at the end of August, necessitating the urgency for approval. Professional installation by the manufacturer includes warranties on the play structures' components and reduces liability issues for the City of Gridley, saving money in the long run.

Members of the Camp Fire Relief Group were in attendance at the meeting, voicing their support for the project alongside members of the Lions Club, Rotary and Orchard Hospital representatives. Steve Stark, Orchard Hospital CEO and Margaret Hughes, of Rotary, both pledged personal monetary donations towards the project. Both Stark and Hughes plan to ask their respective groups, Hospital Board and Rotary Club, for contributions.



With our community poised to grow and the addition of incoming FEMA residents, including many school-aged children, the addition on new playground equipment was believed by all present to be a benefit to the community and worthwhile expenditure.

Council members were forced to take vote on the issue but were hesitant missing two of its members – Councilman Borges and Vice Mayor Williams were not in attendance. Councilmember Zach Torres stated that "the concern isn't whether to do the project, but doing it right the first time." Ultimately, the new playground equipment was approved.

Installation of the new equipment will not impact any existing trees, and it will be a seamless addition

to the current equipment located on the north end of the park near the picnic tables and splash pad. The new equipment will feature a range of play structures to encourage children of older ages to engage in playtime. Children of all ages can look forward to additional swings, a zip-line, large dome with a web-like rope climbing system, and a spinning, swinging tree-shaped climbing structure.

During the installation of the new equipment the rubber tire chips currently at the park will be removed as studies have shown that the material is alleged to be toxic and can be a choking hazard for young children.

The new play area will no doubt be an exciting addition to Vierra Park and is anticipated to be in place by spring of 2020.. ★

Gridley Camp Fire Relief Group Goes to Work

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - In anticipation of the arrival of our new neighbors at the FEMA Camp Fire village, an unofficial committee has formed to help ease their transition into the Gridley community.

Working closely with CalOes and FEMA volunteer agency liaisons (VALS) to aid in the long term recovery effort of Paradise Camp Fire survivors, the Camp Fire Relief Group has been working diligently over the past few months organizing resources, materials, donations and volunteer time. The group has coordinated with service groups throughout the community, such as St. Vincent De Pauls food closet, Quota, Lions and Rotary Clubs, Orchard Hospital, multiple churches and more to welcome families into our community and educated them on services available here.

Recently the group made up welcome bags including information on medical services & centers, food bank locations, transportation services, social welfare and counseling services, coupons to local businesses, laundromat services, the Gridley Herald Business Card Directory and Map & Guide, and more. Basic toiletries and essentials were also added to package as many of the incoming families don't have much in the way of belongings and the FEMA units they are moving into are furnished with the bare minimum—beds, basic linens, a simple kitchen table and chairs. It is up to the families to furnish their new homes however possible.

Volunteers from the

Camp Fire Relief Group, Chamber of Commerce, Orchard Hospital and more have taken the welcome bags out to the village, but intercepting the families as they move into the park has created a challenge. There currently is no centralized distribution point, community center or facility at the park that can be used to easily bridge our communities together.

The group has handed the welcome kits out to those they could reach, but the rest of them are being distributed from the Camp Fire Distribution Center in downtown Gridley. The Camp Fire Distribution Center, located at 893 Hazel St., has been an incredible resource for incoming families, providing access to food, clothing, gift cards and helping families procure larger furniture items. As of now, it is only open for a brief window Tuesdays from 10-1. The Camp Fire Relief group is working to extend those hours and add additional days to the schedule, looking for groups willing to staff and man the center.

At the last meeting of the Camp Fire Relief Group, FEMA VALS informed those in attendance that a total of 90 families had been licensed into the village, with approximately 40 school-aged children among them. The Camp Fire Relief Group plans to continue their mission to ease the transition of these families through compassionate and attentive service, further coordination between community resources and help from FEMA and other resource organizations. ★

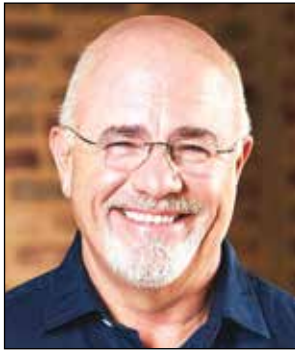

The way you end up with more money is by investing more money. You can argue all you want that using things like these create extra money. Yeah, but not really. The returns are still micro. An app doesn't make two dollars turn into twenty dollars.

It's okay to use apps like that. I'm not mad at them, and I don't think they're a rip-off. What worries me about these kinds of things, in an investing sense, is they give the illusion that you've done something significant with your money. – Dave

Dear Dietitian

Precision Nutrition (PN)

Dear Readers

You may have heard about an innovative approach to dietary intervention known as precision nutrition (PN). This approach includes individualized meal planning based on your DNA. It is more than what you eat, as it includes physical activity, sleep habits, family medical history, and your microbiome. Your microbiome is the collection of microorganisms (bacteria, fungi, viruses, and parasites) living in certain areas of your body, mostly in your intestines. The purpose of the microbiome is to help control digestion, stimulate the immune system and protect us from disease.

The premise of precision nutrition is to better manage a chronic illness, such as diabetes or heart disease. Instead of a one-size-fits-all approach, it can more specifically tell you how your body will respond to certain foods. For instance, it may reveal that you have a high tendency to gain weight from consuming

saturated fat (animal fat). Or It may show that your body is deficient in vitamin B12, and you need to eat an egg every day.

In the future, PN may help prevent certain diseases or at least delay their onset. For example say that type 2 diabetes runs in your family. Of course, you are concerned about developing the disease, and at age twenty, you visit a Registered Dietitian for instruction in precision nutrition. Your special diet and health plan will probably stave off diabetes for fifteen years, but remember there are no guarantees in life and health. Would you follow this diet?

A very interesting concept, but not without challenges. The first and most obvious challenge is cost. Currently, the cost of DNA analysis is \$1,000, which is cost-prohibitive to most Americans, and insurance does not cover it. This is only the beginning of the process and does not include the cost of nutrition education and implementing the diet. Another challenge with PN is human behavior. We live in a society that seems to almost worship food, and many of us equate eating with happiness. Obesity rates in the US continue to rise with no relief in sight. A paradigm shift is needed where we live our diets as an avenue to good health and consistent well-being.

Precision nutrition is in its infancy, and more studies are needed to determine if it has applications across all populations. Dr. Frank Hu, Professor and Chair of the Department of Nutrition at Harvard states, "To address major public health problems like diabetes, we need to combine public health strategies with precision nutrition technologies."

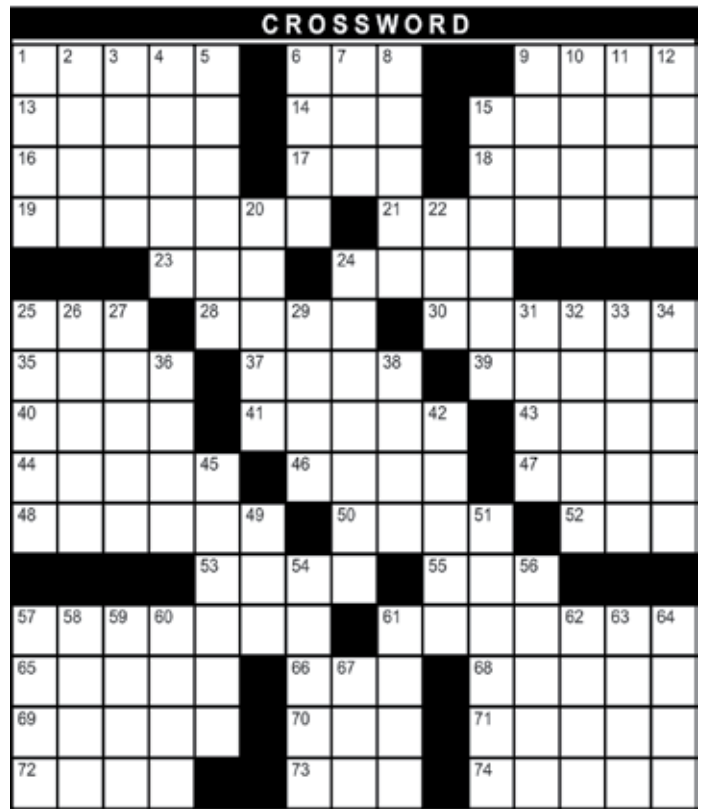

Ron Sullenger Seeks Re-Election to Sutter County Board of Supervisors

Sutter County Supervisor Press Release

SUTTER COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Ron Sullenger will seek re-election to the Sutter County Board of Supervisors First District, representing the northern portion of the county, including all the city of Live Oak and portions of north Yuba City.

Ron, who is seeking his third term, said the Board of Supervisors has established clear goals and objectives and the Board needs to continue to “move the ball down the field” toward those goals.

It is important that as the goals are pursued the taxpayer is protected, he said.

“For instance, we’re making sure we do everything we can to

help the Sutter Pointe development in south county, which will produce new jobs and wealth through commercial development and add critical housing stock near our border with Sacramento. At the same time, we’re protecting the taxpayer by making sure the development pays for itself.”

A lifelong Sutter County resident, Ron Sullenger and his wife, Susan, reside on a 70-acre peach orchard outside of Live Oak. Active in his family’s farm his entire life, Ron approaches local government from the standpoint of a business man. He founded two successful local businesses, Circle R Irrigation and Four Seasons Travel.

Ron lists among his accomplishments on the Board championing a change in the operation at the

Sutter County Airport that allows a pilot’s association, rather than county staff, to operate the facility at far less cost than it was costing taxpayers.

He also helped arrange grant funding for Live Oak’s new Sheriff and Fire Station, along with \$500,000 for a water main expansion that is needed to provide adequate protection.

Ron advocated that the City of Yuba City write a panhandling ordinance to deal with aggressive panhandling by vagrants that has gone unchallenged for years.

Ron also was instrumental in the Board’s decision to overturn Planning Commission approval of a large solar farm at the end of Broadway on Nuestro Road that would have replaced a 260-acre

walnut orchard.

He was the driving force behind a new four-way stop sign that has improved traffic safety at Tierra Buena and Pease Roads.

Of the top five priorities established by the Board of Supervisors, implementing a long-term homeless management plan is absorbing a lot of community attention and county staff time.

“Our community is reaching the point of compassion fatigue, and we need to approach this with intelligence,” he said, “As we provide the shelter space necessary to enforce no-camping laws in public rights of way, we need to make sure services are provided at the shelters and coordinated entry locations, not on the river or at unauthorized homeless encampments.”

“There is no need to make it easy to remain homeless by providing meals and clothes and services on the sides of the road or in the river bottoms. Let’s help those who want it, not coddle those who don’t want the help, but want to live free off public lands everyone should have the right to enjoy free of fear,” he stated.

The County recently completed a jail expansion project and is working on a plan to consolidate more than 20 existing county locations into only a handful, including renovation of the former commercial space at 850 Gray Avenue for Health and Human Services. Ron said this is important work that will save the County a great deal of money in the long run.

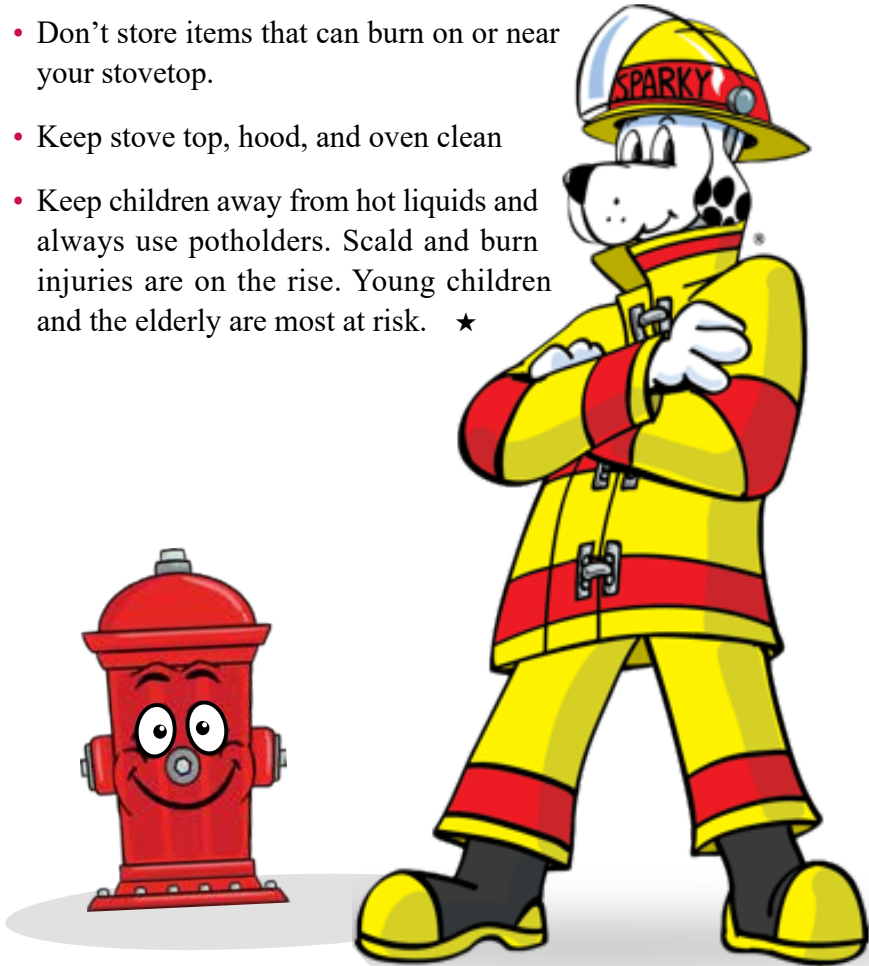

- Never put water on a grease fire. Close the oven door, turn off the stove, or put a lid over the pan ... when it is safe to do so, CALL 911.
- Keep a fire extinguisher close by, preferably within 10 feet from the stove next to the exit of the kitchen.
- Don’t store items that can burn on or near your stovetop.
- Keep stove top, hood, and oven clean
- Keep children away from hot liquids and always use potholders. Scald and burn injuries are on the rise. Young children and the elderly are most at risk. ★

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara visited communities experiencing an upsurge in insurance non-renewals and other issues in the wake of the 2017 and 2018 fires, which caused nearly 150 deaths and \$25 billion in property losses.

Commissioner Lara announced the formation of a Department of Insurance Strike Team to visit affected communities in the coming weeks and months. The Strike Team will connect residents to resources and assist local governments in assessing and responding to insurance issues.

Commissioner Lara met with community leaders and local officials in Butte, Placer and Nevada Counties to share their

concerns about insurance availability and affordability in the wake of the fires. County leaders have recently contacted the Department of Insurance over how wildfire insurance issues are affecting residents. He told them that complaints to the Department of Insurance related to non-renewals are up nearly 600% since 2010 in areas with increased wildfire risk.

"Insurance issues are a reality for many across our state, and I am deploying Department of Insurance strike teams to some of our hardest-hit areas," said Commissioner Lara. "With non-renewals on the rise, I will work with local leaders on statewide policies that reduce risk to make sure we keep insurance available and affordable. My staff at the Department has already begun requesting more detailed insurer data in order to increase transparency." ★

Lookout for the Asian Citrus Psyllid

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Butte County is known for its delicious citrus. Mandarins are grown commercially in our “banana belt” foothills, and residents in the valley can enjoy citrus grown in their own gardens. However, a tiny flying insect the size of an aphid poses a grave threat to our local citrus.

This insect is the Asian citrus psyllid (ACP), a vector for a dangerous and fatal bacterium (*Candidatus Liberibacter asiaticus*) that causes Huanglongbing (HLB) disease, previously known as Citrus Greening disease. HLB has devastated the Florida citrus industry and has been found in Southern California. Recently the Asian citrus psyllid itself (but not HLB) was found in Sacramento, just 100 miles south.

The Asian citrus psyllid and HLB originated in eastern Asia or in the Indian subcontinent and has spread rapidly throughout the world. In 1998 the psyllid along with HLB disease was found in Florida. Within 3 years HLB had infected most citrus-growing regions in Florida. This infection was traced to an infested shipment of orange jasmine (*Murraya paniculata*) in the family Rutaceae, the same family as citrus.

Other susceptible ornamentals in this family include Indian curry leaf, calamondin and mock orange.

ACP was first detected in Southern California in 2008, followed by HLB detection in 2012. The psyllid has expanded into the Central Valley, the Central Coast

and as far north as the Bay Area and Sacramento. So far there has been no detection of HLB disease outside of Southern California.

There is no cure for HLB, which can kill a tree in 5 to 8 years. Because HLB can only be spread via the ACP, the key to prevent HLB is monitoring for, and controlling, the psyllid.

Identification of the Asian Citrus Psyllid (ACP): The winged adult ACP is about the size of an aphid. It has a pointy front end, red eyes, and short antennae. It feeds at a unique 45-degree angle, with its head down and its back end in the air.

Adults only live for a few months but can lay several hundred tiny, yellow-orange, almond-shaped eggs in fresh new citrus growth. The tiny wingless nymphs hatch from the eggs and are yellow, orange or brown. They molt 4 times, increasing in size each time.

ACP nymphs only feed

on new citrus shoots and leaves. As they feed, a toxin is injected causing leaves to twist and curl, sometimes killing new shoots. Nymphs also produce excess sap or honeydew which promotes the growth of sooty mold. To direct the honeydew away from their bodies, they produce waxy, white tubules. The tubules are unique to the nymphs and are easily identified.

Other insects such as aphids can cause these same symptoms, but they do not produce tubules nor are they a vector for the bacterium causing HLB.

Symptoms of HLB Disease. Early symptoms of HLB cause the leaves to yellow on a particular limb or section of the tree. The yellowing appears asymmetrical and blotchy or mottled. (Although nitrogen or zinc deficiencies can also cause yellowing, they follow a symmetrical yellowing pattern). Over time, fruit on an HLB-infected

tree becomes smaller and juice becomes bitter. The citrus fruit itself may stay partially green, which is why HLB was first called “citrus greening disease.” Fruit may also appear misshapen. The foliage becomes sparser with twig and limb dieback, and the tree eventually dies. Even though infected, symptoms may be undetected for a few years, allowing ACP to spread the disease unless the insect is controlled.

Now that the ACP is firmly established in California, the Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) is tracking its distribution through the use of yellow sticky traps in commercial and residential areas.

ACP quarantine zones are being used to restrict the transport of citrus trees and the spread of the psyllid. Biological controls using predators and parasites that feed on the ACP are being used to help control (but not

eradicate) the ACP.

How you can help. Monitoring citrus for the presence of the ACP and symptoms of HLB are the keys for controlling this fatal disease. Inspect your citrus any time there is a flush of newly developing leaves; especially in springtime, and later on the fall flush. Like aphids, psyllids feed on new, developing leaves. Look for evidence of the ACP in new growth by checking for:

Adult psyllids feeding, head down and rear end in the air (a 45 degree angle); Twisted or notched leaves in new growth; Sticky

honeydew and black sooty mold; Nymphs that produce waxy, white tubules; Tiny, yellow, almond-shaped eggs.

If possible, use a magnifying hand lens or take a photo and then enlarge it to help identify the tiny eggs, nymphs and psyllids. Yellow sticky traps for monitoring the presence of psyllids can also be purchased.

Control ants that like to “farm” the psyllid honeydew to feed their young. Ants will protect the psyllids from their natural enemies such as parasites and other predators. Only purchase citrus trees from reputable sources and DO NOT transport citrus trees, fruit, or cuttings from areas known to harbor the psyllid.
