## In Need of Honors



Prior honor guard experience is not required and that training will be provided.

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - Typically, Gridley's American Legion and VFW Post 5731 members manage the duty of providing Honor Guard services for Veteran memorial services, town celebrations and more. Due to the increasing inability of the two organizations' members to physically perform the services, Gridley and surrounding areas are currently lacking an honor guard.

Local Navy and Army Veteran, Sergeant Aaron Burks, U.S. Army (Retired) is reaching out to the community for help. "I am looking to start a Veteran's Honor Guard for the surrounding community for the purpose of providing professional military honors at veteran funerals," said Burks. He continued, "I am in desperate need of at least 3 people preferably 5 who are willing to participate in a military honor guard for an upcoming veteran's Funeral in Live Oak on July 8 at 1000." "If I am unable to secure an honor guard the veteran may be buried without

his earned honors," he added.

Those interested in making sure this Vet receives the honors he deserves are not required to join nor be affiliated with the American Legion of the VFW. Burks is looking for Military veterans, current Armed Forces Reservists or active duty military between the ages of 18-55 who are currently physically able to wear their military dress uniform and physically capable of performing honor guard functions (rifle drill and flag folding). They must be clean shaven with regulation hair cut for the funeral services. Veterans from all branches of service are welcome and are asked to wear the following uniforms: Army: ASU (Army Service Uniform); Marines: Dress Uniform or Class A; Navy: Dress Whites; Air Force: Service Dress Uniform; Coast Guard: service Dress Uniform.

Burks stressed that prior honor guard experience is not required and that training will be provided. He hopes that enough people will come forward that training can begin

Friday, July 5th in the evening. The non-denominational Veterans Honor Guard would be responsible for providing the following services for Veteran Memorial Services throughout the area, including: Rifle team firing 3 volleys (rifles are M1 Garand), Taps (electronic bugle provided), Flag folding and the flag presentation to next of kin.

Out of respect for the family, the name of the Vet in need of an honor guard is being withheld. Memorial services are being officiated by Gridley Block Funeral Home at the Live Oak cemetery. Burks is hopeful that the new honor guard will meet at Live Oak Cemetery at 0900 to do a final run through before the arrival of the funeral party and expects that all honors be completed no later than 11:00. If they don't recruit enough members, this poor fellow will not receive his due honors!

## Live Oak to Cut Rates, Tightens Budget

**LIVE OAK, CA (MPG)** - Amidst the initial phase of heavy construction work along the Hwy 99 corridor, Live Oak City Council is doing their best to cut local businesses a break. At the June 19th council meeting, council members added and amended ordinances lowering sewer rates for smalls daycares, warehouses, services stations, bars and restaurants. Reductions in charges had to be planned carefully as not to violate the rate covenant with the State Water Board, but overall commercial raters will see a \$25,000 decrease. Once the ordinances take effect, bars and restaurants can expect an average charge of \$183.21 per month, a savings of \$231.82. Small daycares, services stations (less than 2,500 sq. feet without kitchens) and warehouses can expect a monthly rate of \$68.80.

The City of Live Oak plans to enter into an agreement with the State of California to share maintenance and some operational costs of lighting, traffic signals and other elements pertaining to the streetscaping project along Hwy 99. Traffic signals anticipated at Elm St/Hwy 99, Pennington Rd/Hwy99 and Kola St./Hwy99 would be a 50/50 split shared cost, while most other lighting costs would see the state take 66 2/3% of the cost and the city the remainder.

Among some of the numerous items on the agenda, council members approved the 2019-2020 budget. An overall tightening of the belt was seen in areas like the General Fund and Administration sections, while extra padding was added to departments such as Economic Development. Council implemented multiple changes, for example, reducing funds from the Mural Project by \$10,000, contributing those funds to the Chamber of Commerce instead. Other changes included a \$50,000 increase for traffic devices in the street lighting fund department and setting aside nearly \$798,000 for the Hwy 99 utility relocation projects.

Council heard a request from the property owner Reggie Singh of the Garden Glen Subdivision which if developed, would be the site of 170 new homes. Singh requested a mitigation fee reduction of \$7,806

# Paradise Senator Calls for Rebuilding of Camp Fire Sites

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - CAL FIRE found PG&E to be the cause of California's deadliest and most destructive fire in the state's history. Investigators determined that PG&E's electrical transmission lines caused the Camp Fire. Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama) issued the following statement:

"This finding is not a surprise. This conclusion by

CAL FIRE investigators was anticipated.

"Survivors of the Camp Fire are putting their lives back together. Six months after the fire, many continue to go through the rubble to salvage remnants of their memories. The people of Butte County are hopeful and resilient.

"Together, we must proceed to put the community back, and PG&E must be a responsible participant in this rebuild effort."

per home, to attract developers to site, referencing that the reduction would reduce the fees to be more in line to what the developer KB Homes paid per lot. Even with the reduction, Live Oak stands to

# One-Way Traffic Control for Highway 70 Near Oroville



Motorists can expect significant travel delays next weekend on State Highway 70 south of Oroville for roadway construction work.

**BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - Motorists can expect significant travel delays next weekend on State Highway 70 south of Oroville for roadway construction work. A contractor will be conducting reversing one-way traffic control around the clock at the intersection of Palermo Road/Welsh Road and Highway 70 starting at 10 p.m. Friday, July 12 and continuing through 7 a.m. Monday, July 15. Flaggers will be stationed on both sides of the intersection directing traffic through the work zone. Motorists can expect delays of up to one hour. In addition, local residents will find Welsh Road and Palermo Road closed

intermittently at Highway 70 throughout the weekend. Caltrans advises motorists to use alternate routes such as Highway 99 to avoid the heavy traffic congestion in the area. The work is part of a safety project to widen Highway 70 between Ophir Road and Palermo. Weather or unexpected events may delay or prolong the work. Caltrans advises motorists to “Be Work Zone Alert.” The department will issue construction updates on Twitter @CaltransDist3 and on Facebook at CaltransDistrict3. # SBA Disaster Assistance Available to Private Nonprofit Organizations

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Low-interest federal disaster loans are now available to certain private nonprofit organizations in Yolo County following the amendment to President Trump’s May 18, 2019, major disaster declaration for Public Assistance as a result of severe winter storms, flooding, landslides and mudslides that occurred Feb. 24 – March 1, 2019, announced acting Administrator Christopher M. Pilkerton of the U.S. Small Business Administration. Private nonprofits that provide essential services of a governmental nature are eligible for assistance. These low-interest federal disaster loans are available in Amador, Butte, Colusa, Del Norte, El Dorado, Glenn, Humboldt, Lake, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Monterey, Napa, Sonoma, Tehama, Trinity, Tuolumne and Yolo counties in California. “Private nonprofit organizations should contact California Governor’s Office of Emergency Services Recovery Section by calling (916) 845-8200, emailing disasterrecovery@caloes.ca.gov or visiting https://www.caloes.ca.gov/caloes-divisions/recovery/public-assistance/ applicants-briefings to obtain information about applicant briefings. At the briefings, private nonprofit representatives will need to provide information about their organization,” said Director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA’s Disaster Field Operations Center-West. FEMA will use the information provided to determine if the private nonprofit provides an “essential governmental service” and is a “critical facility” as defined by law. If so, FEMA may provide the private nonprofit with a Public Assistance grant for their eligible costs. If not, FEMA may refer the private nonprofit to SBA for disaster loan assistance. SBA may lend private nonprofits up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business

assets. SBA can also lend additional funds to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future. For certain private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA also offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic Injury Disaster Loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the disaster’s impact. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the private nonprofit suffered any property damage. The interest rate is 2.75 percent with terms up to 30 years. The deadline to apply for property damage is July 17, 2019. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Feb. 18, 2020. Applicants may apply online, receive additional disaster assistance information and download applications at https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela. Applicants may also call SBA’s Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. Individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing may call (800) 877-8339. Completed applications should be mailed to U.S. Small Business Administration, Processing and Disbursement Center, 14925 Kingsport Road, Fort Worth, TX 76155. # Oroville’s Dam Crest Road Reopening to Public

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The Department of Water Resources (DWR), in coordination with California State Parks and the California Highway Patrol, today announced the reopening of public access to the Dam Crest Road, or Oro Dam Boulevard, along the top of Oroville Dam. The public will have access to a pedestrian lane at the top of the dam, as well as the Upper Overlook parking area, beginning Saturday, June 29. “We look forward to returning this popular attraction back to the public this summer,” said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. “We also thank our sister agencies, the California Highway Patrol, California State Parks and the Butte County Sheriff’s Office, for their partnership to safely and securely reopen this area.” Access to the Dam Crest Road and the Upper Overlook parking area have been closed since reconstruction of the Oroville spillways began in 2017. DWR and its construction contractors reconstructed Oroville’s main spillway and rebuilt the emergency spillway over the previous two years. Pedestrians, persons with disabilities, and bicyclists will have access to the Dam Crest Road seven days a week from 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. DWR,

the California Highway Patrol and California State Parks are operating Dam Crest Road with new security measures to further ensure public safety at the facilities. “The California Highway Patrol is honored to be a part of the historic Oroville Dam Spillway repair and construction efforts, as well as its reopening for public use, and we continue to work closely with our state agency partners and law enforcement allies to help ensure various safety and security concerns affecting the public are addressed,” said Sergeant Don Pederson with California Highway Patrol. “The CHP remains committed to providing an ongoing high level of safety, service, and security to the public who wish to recreate, explore and enjoy the vast opportunities offered by the greater Oroville area.” Construction activity is ongoing in the area and construction vehicles will be using a portion of the Dam Crest Road. The public can expect slower traffic and DWR reminds drivers and pedestrians to obey all road and traffic signs. Later this summer, DWR will reopen public access to the Spillway Boat Ramp. The boat launch and parking lot areas will be accessible to the public Friday through Sunday during daylight hours beginning in early August 2019. The Spillway Boat Ramp will remain closed Monday

through Thursday to accommodate ongoing construction. The California Highway Patrol will staff new security kiosks at the south end of the Dam Crest Road and before crossing the over the main spillway vehicle bridge. New security measures before crossing the main spillway bridge may include vehicle screenings or inspections by the California Highway Patrol or other law enforcement. In addition to California Highway Patrol’s responsibility for the security of Oroville Dam, DWR has also contracted with the Butte County Sheriff’s Office for increased patrols around the Oroville-Thermalito Complex facilities. DWR is aiming to reopen public access to the Spillway Boat Ramp seven days a week by the fall of 2019 as construction winds down for the winter, however access may be restricted again in spring of 2020 as construction activities increase. In addition to restoring access to the Dam Crest Road and Spillway Boat Ramp, DWR is investing more than \$30 million on a number of recreation improvement projects to enhance visitor access and experiences at the Lake Oroville State Recreation Area. Improvement projects include permanent increases in parking, boat launching capacity and enhanced trailhead facilities. For more information go to water.ca.gov/OrovilleRecreation. ★

## RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE GRIDLEY-BIGGS CEMETERY ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

## INTENT TO LEVY AND COLLECT ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery District, acting as the legislative body of the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery Maintenance Assessment District, has previously ordered through Resolution 94-3 the formation of an assessment district pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, known as the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery Maintenance Assessment District, for the purpose of financing certain cemetery facility improvements as specified in the District's Master Plan and for the purpose of funding maintenance operations of those facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees, through Resolution 94-3, has ordered that the cemetery improvements specified in the original Engineer's Report dated April 8, 1994, be constructed, and has estimated that the cost of such proposed cemetery improvements is greater than can be raised from a single annual assessment, and has ordered that the estimated costs of these improvements, other than the costs of maintenance and servicing, be raised by an assessment levied and collected in annual installments over a period of 20 years, commencing in fiscal year 1994-95 and ending after fiscal year 2013-14; and

WHEREAS, on Wednesday, February 12, 2014, the Board adopted Resolution 14-01, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code sections 22608 and 22585 et seq., declaring the intention to extend the annual assessment period an additional 20 years, setting a public hearing for June 11, 2014 and requiring that the notice of public hearing and assessment ballots be mailed to all District property owners as shown on the equalized tax rolls; and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was duly published and mailed as required by Resolution 14-01, Streets and Highways Code sections 22585 et seq. and Government Code section 53753 and the assessment ballots were timely mailed to all owners of property within the District as shown on the equalized tax rolls; and

WHEREAS, at 7:00 AM on June 11, 2014, as set forth in Resolution 14-01, the Board held a public hearing and afforded all interested persons an opportunity to heard, closed the public hearing and directed the Clerk to tabulate the assessment ballots that had been received prior to the close of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the ballots were tabulated and there was no majority protest, the Board may proceed with this Resolution of intent to levy and collect assessments for fiscal year 2019-2020; and

WHEREAS, Streets and Highways Code Sections 22622, 22623, 22565 and 22661 authorize the preparation of an Engineer's Report on an annual basis which shall describe any proposed new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, set forth an estimate of the costs of any improvements and/or maintenance, specify a diagram for the assessment district, specify the amount to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district, and include in the estimate and the assessment for fiscal year 2019-2020 the total amount of the annual installment assessment ordered in this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, an Engineer's Report for fiscal year 2019-2020, as authorized and ordered by the Board, has been prepared, which Engineer's Report generally describes the general nature, location, and extent of the new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements and maintenance, provides an estimate of the costs of any proposed new improvements or substantial changes in existing improvements and refurbishments and maintenance, sets forth a diagram for the assessment district, specifies the amounts to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district, and sets forth the total amount of the annual installment assessment for fiscal year 2019-2020 ordered by this Board of Trustees in this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, this Engineer's Report has been approved by the Board of Trustees of the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery District pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22623, and

WHEREAS, the Board is authorized to act pursuant to Streets and Highways Code sections 22585-22595.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, FOUND DETERMINED AND ORDERED as

follows:

## Section 1. Findings. The Board finds:

a. the preceding recitals are correct;

b. compliance has been had with all requirements of the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972, including, but not limited to sections 22585-22595, and section 53753 of the Government Code;

c. the tally of the assessment ballots timely received was in favor of the assessment as set forth above;

d. the Board may proceed with the levy and collection of assessment as set forth herein; and,

e. Said assessment is a valid property-related fee as defined in Article XIII D, section 6(b) of the California Constitution:

- (1) Revenues from the fee shall not exceed the funds required to provide the property related service: maintenance and expansion of the cemetery for exclusive use of property owners and families.
- (2) Revenue derived from the fee is not used for any purpose other than that for which the fee was imposed. The fee provides only for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery.
- (3) The amount of the fee imposed upon any parcel or person as an incident of property ownership does not exceed the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel. The fee provides only for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery.
- (4) The fee is imposed for a service that is actually used by, or immediately available to, the owner of the property in question. The charge provides for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery which is available to the persons paying the charge and not available to the general public.
- (5) The fee is not imposed for general governmental services where the service is available to the public at large in substantially the same manner as it is to property owners. The charge provides for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery which is available to the persons paying the charge and not available to the general public.

## Section 2. Declaration of intent to levy and collect assessments pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22624.

a. Said assessments will be levied and collected within the boundaries of the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery Maintenance Assessment District, which comprises all that area lying within the boundaries of the Gridley-Biggs Cemetery District. A full and detailed description of the boundaries of the Assessment District and the parcels of land within the district is contained within the Engineer's Report.

b. The Board of Trustees declares its intent to continue to levy and collect assessments for fiscal year 2019-2020 within said District at a rate of \$1.50 per month or \$18.00 per year per single family residential unit, apartment unit and/or condominium, all as set forth in the Engineer's Report. This is the same rate as that of the prior fiscal year. The total number of parcels to be assessed and an estimate of total annual assessment revenue are contained within the Engineer's Report. The estimated cost of the proposed cemetery improvements specified in the Engineer's Report is greater than can be raised from a single annual assessment, and therefore, the estimated cost of these improvements, other than the cost of maintenance and servicing, will be paid for by this assessment, which will be levied and collected in annual installments over a period of 20 years commencing in fiscal year 2014-15 and ending after fiscal year 2033-34.

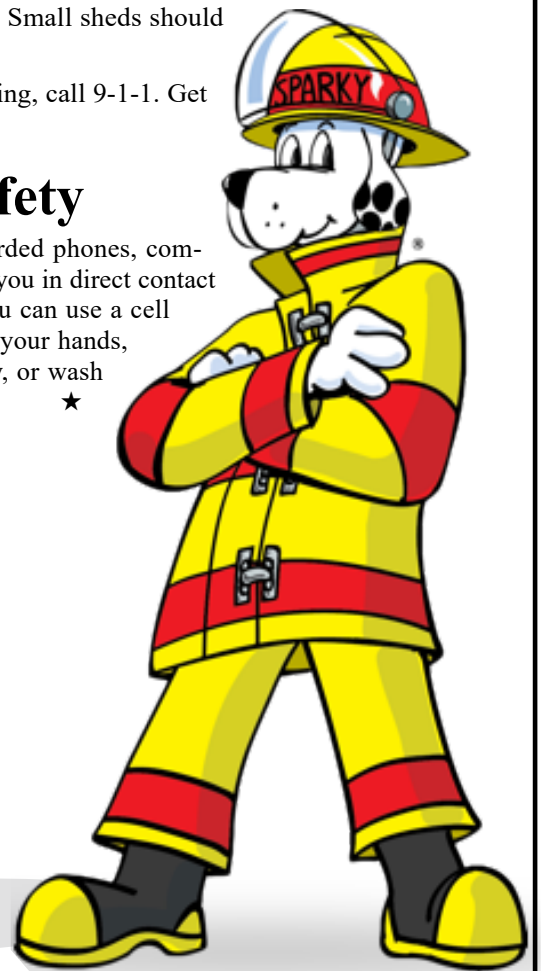
## LIGHTNING SAFETY

### Outdoor Safety

- If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- Do not go under trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- Wait at least 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- Stay away from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- There is no safe place outside. Places with only a roof on sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used.
- If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away.

### Indoor Safety

Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You can use a cell or cordless phone. Do not wash your hands, bathe, take a shower, do laundry, or wash dishes. ★







## The Madcap Caution of Donald Trump

The worry was that the Trump administration was ginning up fake intelligence about Iran blowing up oil tankers in the Strait of Hormuz to justify a war against Iran. Then the next week President Donald Trump said the Iranian attacks weren't a big deal.

The episode is another indication of the underlying modesty -- not a very Trumpian word -- of the administration.

Subtract Trump's taste for nonstop controversy and rhetorical brinkmanship, and you're left with an incrementalist center-right government that has pursued an expansionary fiscal policy and avoided foreign war, for a period of peace and prosperity that -- in any other universe -- would be at the core of a stay-the-course re-election message.

For a while, the Obama doctrine was, "Don't do stupid stuff." The Trump team has built out the doctrine to "Privately consider and

sometimes openly threaten stupid stuff, but at the end of the day, don't do it (usually)."

The Mexico tariff threat was typical. If Trump had gone through with the steadily escalating tariffs, it would have been a blow to our own economy and that of an ally. Instead, he got what might prove to be meaningful concessions from Mexico.

The thing about a Trump threat is that he always controls whether he's going to go through with it or not. He's going to pull out of the North American Free Trade Agreement, actually no, he's not. He's going to impose auto tariffs on Canada, well, not really. What he's going to do is sign a new trade deal with Mexico and Canada that's a somewhat altered version of NAFTA and urge Congress to pass it.

Allies might be understandably appalled (or at times alarmed) by his habit of berating them and squeezing them for concessions, but the alliance system, a product of deeper forces than the persona of any one president, remains intact.

In the Middle East, Trump accelerated an anti-ISIS campaign that he inherited, announced a withdrawal from Syria that he didn't fully follow through on and kept troops in Afghanistan. Steady as she goes.

Pulling out of the Iran

nuclear accord is a big deal and, given that it's not entirely clear how the administration imagines resolving the crisis, genuinely a shot in the dark (although Trump says he wants to talk).

Another gamble is the trade war with China, a truly significant departure from the old bipartisan consensus, yet even here, Trump presumably has the off-ramp of a fig-leaf deal should he decide that he wants to take it.

At home, in terms of the economy, everything (except for the tariffs) has been geared to preserving and boosting the recovery, from the tax cuts, to the deregulation, to the lack of interest in cutting spending, to Trump's jawboning of the Federal Reserve to keep rates low.

Given the choice, you'd prefer that people believed that your administration was cautious and incremental, while it undertook far-reaching changes, rather than believe it's on the verge of careening out of control, while pursuing a fairly reasonable path.

For now, he can plausibly make a re-election pitch that, despite what you might have gathered, he's been a steward of a country enjoying markedly good times.

Dear Dietitian,

Thank you for the excellent perspective you provided on the NIH study where so much exaggeration is going on.

The NIH researchers did a nice job in designing the study, but any study has its limitations. My biggest problem is with the designation of ultra-processed foods in the first place. It is a very broad class of at least four different categories of foods/beverages.

Another problem in the study involved

fiber. The ultra-processed foods group was given a fiber supplement mixed in a sugar-free lemon drink when they could have had a high fiber cereal instead, since any ready-to-eat cereal is considered ultra-processed in the NOVA classification. If there wasn't a Registered Dietitian to help design the study, there should have been.

Most importantly, the unprocessed foods group lost two pounds over two weeks. All participants were weight stable, and an unintended weight loss can be just as unhealthy as an unintended weight gain, especially in the elderly.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Secretary of State Alex Padilla announced the proponents of a new initiative were cleared to begin collecting petition signatures today.

The Attorney General prepares the legal title and summary that is required to appear on initiative petitions. When the official language is complete, the Attorney General forwards it to the proponents and to the Secretary of State, and the initiative may be circulated for signatures. The Secretary of State then provides calendar deadlines to the proponents and to county elections officials. The Attorney General's official title and summary for the measure is as follows:

EXPANDS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' AUTHORITY TO ENACT RENT CONTROL ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Amends state law to allow local governments to establish rent control on residential properties over 15 years old. Allows rent increases on rent-controlled properties of up to 15 percent over three years from previous tenant's rent above any increase allowed by local ordinance. Exempts individuals who own no more than two homes from new rent-control policies. In accordance with California law, provides that rent-control

policies may not violate landlords' right to a fair financial return on their property. Summary of estimate by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local governments: Potential reduction in state and local revenues of tens of millions of dollars per year in the long term. Depending on actions by local communities, revenue losses could be less or more. (19-0001.)

The Secretary of State's tracking number for this measure is 1862 and the Attorney General's tracking number is 19-0001.

The proponents of the measure, Michael Weinstein, Cynthia Davis, Jesse Brooks, Rene Christian Moya, & Susan Hunter, must collect signatures of 623,212 registered voters (five percent of the total votes cast for Governor in the November 2018 general election) in order to qualify it for the ballot. The proponents have 180 days to circulate petitions for the measure, meaning the signatures must be submitted to county elections officials no later than December 23, 2019. # CBRT Responds to New Rent Control Initiative

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Business Roundtable President Rob Lapsley issued the following statement in response to the submission of a new rent control ballot initiative that, if qualified, would appear on the November 2020 ballot:

"Voters in this state overwhelmingly defeated a rent control measure just five months ago. Study after study has shown

that rent control hurts the housing market, will stop investment of new development and will only make the housing crisis worse. CBRT strongly opposes this newly proposed ballot measure and will once again work to defeat it should it qualify. It is time to come together on solutions to meet the governor's ambitious goal of 3.5 million new housing units by 2025, the only true long-term solution to the housing crisis. Statewide rent control as proposed by this new measure will only make this goal harder to achieve." ★

# Watch for West Nile Virus Mosquito Bites

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) urges all Californians to protect themselves from mosquito bites during West Nile virus (WNV) season, which extends from summer through early fall.

"West Nile virus activity in the state is increasing, so it is important to take every possible precaution to protect against mosquito bites," said State Public Health Officer and CDPH Director Dr. Karen Smith.

West Nile virus spreads to humans and animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Late-spring rains have contributed to standing water, which serves as a breeding source for mosquitoes that can spread WNV. Hot temperatures also contribute to increasing numbers of breeding mosquitoes and an increased risk of virus transmission to humans.

Currently, WNV activity is within expected levels and is similar to activity at this time last year. The risk of disease due to WNV increases as the summer progresses, and declines in early fall as the weather cools. In 2018, there were 217 reported WNV cases in California, including 11 deaths. Since WNV was first introduced into California in 2003, there have been more than 6,000 human WNV cases and 303 WNV-related deaths across the state.

West Nile virus is influenced by many factors, including climate, the number and types of birds and

mosquitoes in an area, and the level of WNV immunity in birds. For most people, the risk of developing serious illness is low. However, some individuals – less than one percent – can develop serious neurologic illnesses such as encephalitis or meningitis. People 50 years of age and older, and individuals with diabetes or hypertension, have a higher chance of getting sick and are more likely to develop complications from WNV infection.

CDPH recommends that people protect against mosquito bites and WNV by practicing the "Three Ds":

**DEET** – Apply U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or IR3535 according to label instructions. EPA-registered repellents are recommended for use because they have been tested for safety and efficacy in preventing mosquito bites. Insect repellents should not be used on children under two months of age. For more information,

visit CDPH's insect repellent toolkit.

**DAWN AND DUSK** – Mosquitoes that transmit WNV usually bite in the early morning and evening, so it is important to wear proper clothing and repellent if outside during these times. Make sure that your doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep out mosquitoes. Repair or replace screens that have tears or holes.

**DRAIN** – Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water. Eliminate all sources of standing water on your property by emptying flower pots, old car tires, buckets, and other containers. If you know of a swimming pool that is not being properly maintained, please contact your local mosquito and vector control agency.
