Live Oak to Cut Rates, Tightens Budget

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - Amidst the initial phase of heavy construction work along the Hwy 99 corridor, Live Oak City Council is doing their best to cut local businesses a break. At the June 19th council meeting, council members added and amended ordinances lowering sewer rates for smalls daycares, warehouses, services stations, bars and restaurants. Reductions in charges had to be planned carefully as not to violate the rate covenant with the State Water Board, but overall commercial raters will see a \$25,000 decrease. Once the ordinances take effect, bars and restaurants can expect an average charge of \$183.21 per month, a savings of \$231.82. Small daycares, services stations (less than 2,500 sq. feet without kitchens) and warehouses can expect a

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currently lacking an honor guard.

Local Navy and Army Veteran, Sergeant Aaron Burks, U.S. Army (Retired) is reaching out to the community for help. "I am looking to start a Veteran's Honor Guard for the surrounding community for the purpose of providing professional military honors at veteran funerals," said Burks. He continued, "I am in desperate need of at least 3 people preferably 5 who are willing to participate in a military honor guard for an upcoming veteran's Funeral in Live Oak on July 8 at 1000." "If I am unable to secure an honor guard monthly rate of \$68.80.

The City of Live Oak plans to enter into an agreement with the State of California to share maintenance and some operational costs of lighting, traffic signals and other elements pertaining to the streetscaping project along Hwy 99. Traffic signals anticipated at Elm St/Hwy 99, Pennington Rd/Hwy99 and Kola St./Hwy99 would be a 50/50 split shared cost, while most other lighting costs would see the state take 66 2/3% of the cost and the city the remainder.

Among some of the numerous items on the agenda, council members approved the 2019-2020 budget. An overall tightening of the belt was seen in areas like the General Fund and Administration sections, while extra padding was added to departments such as Economic Development. Council implemented multiple changes, for example, reducing funds from the Mural Project by \$10,000, contributing those funds to the Chamber of Commerce instead. Other changes included a \$50,000 increase for traffic devices in the street lighting fund department and setting aside nearly \$798,000 for the Hwy 99 utility relocation projects.

Council heard a request from the property owner Reggie Singh of the Garden Glen Subdivision which if developed, would be the site of 170 new homes. Singh requested a mitigation fee reduction of \$7,806

One-Way Traffic Control for Highway 70 Near Oroville



Motorists can expect significant travel delays next weekend on State Highway 70 south of Oroville for roadway construction work.

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Motorists can expect significant travel delays next weekend on State Highway 70 south of Oroville for roadway construction work.

A contractor will be conducting reversing one-way traffic control around the clock at the intersection of Palermo Road/Welsh Road and Highway 70 starting at 10 p.m. Friday, July 12 and continuing through 7 a.m. Monday, July 15. Flaggers will be stationed on both sides of the intersection directing traffic through the work zone. Motorists can expect delays of up to one hour.

In addition, local residents will find Welsh Road and Palermo Road closed intermittently at Highway 70 throughout the weekend.

Caltrans advises motorists to use alternate routes such as Highway 99 to avoid the heavy traffic congestion in the area.

The work is part of a safety project to widen Highway 70 between Ophir Road and Palermo.

Weather or unexpected events may delay or prolong the work. Caltrans advises motorists to "Be Work Zone Alert." The department will issue construction updates on Twitter @ CaltransDist3 and on Facebook at CaltransDistrict3. SBA Disaster News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Low-interest federal disaster loans are now available to certain private nonprofit organizations in Yolo County following the amendment to President Trump's May 18, 2019, major disaster declaration for Public Assistance as a result of severe winter storms, flooding, landslides and mudslides that occurred Feb. 24 - March 1, 2019, announced acting Administrator Christopher M. Pilkerton of the U.S. Small Business Administration. Private nonprofits that provide essential services of a governmental nature are eligible for assistance.

These low-interest federal disaster loans are available in Amador, Butte, Colusa, Del Norte, El Dorado, Glenn, Humboldt, Lake, Marin, Mariposa, Mendocino, Monterey, Napa, Sonoma, Tehama, Trinity, Tuolumne and Yolo counties in California.

"Private nonprofit organizations should contact California Governor's Office of Emergency Services Recovery Section by calling (916) 845-8200, emailing disasterrecovery@caloes.ca.gov or visiting https://www.caloes.ca.gov/caloes-divisions/recovery/public-assistance/ applicants-briefings to obtain information about applicant briefings. At the briefings, private nonprofit representatives will need to provide information about their organization," said Director Tanya N. Garfield of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center-West.

FEMA will use the information provided to determine if the private nonprofit provides an "essential governmental service" and is a "critical facility" as defined by law. If so, FEMA may provide the private nonprofit with a Public Assistance grant for their eligible costs. If not, FEMA may refer the private nonprofit to SBA for disaster loan assistance.

SBA may lend private nonprofits up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged or destroyed real estate, machinery and equipment, inventory and other business

assets. SBA can also lend additional funds to help with the cost of improvements to protect, prevent or minimize the same type of disaster damage from occurring in the future.

For certain private nonprofit organizations of any size, SBA also offers Economic Injury Disaster Loans to help meet working capital needs caused by the disaster. Economic Injury Disaster Loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that cannot be paid because of the disaster's impact. Economic injury assistance is available regardless of whether the private nonprofit suffered any property damage.

The interest rate is 2.75 percent with terms up to 30 years. The deadline to apply for property damage is July 17, 2019. The deadline to apply for economic injury is Feb. 18, 2020.

Applicants may apply online, receive additional disaster assistance information and download applications at https:// disasterloan.sba.gov/ela. Applicants may also call SBA's Customer Service Center at (800) 659-2955 or email disastercustomerservice@sba.gov for more information on SBA disaster assistance. The public will have access to a our state agency partpedestrian lane at the top of the dam, as well as the Upper Overlook parking area, beginning Saturday, June 29.

"We look forward to returning this popular attraction back to the public this summer," said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "We also thank our sister agencies, the California Highway Patrol, California State Parks and the Butte County Sheriff's Office, for their partnership to this area."

Access to the Dam Crest Road and the Upper Overlook parking area have been closed since reconstruction of the Oroville spillways began in 2017. Pedestrians, persons with disabilities, and bicyclists will have access to the Dam Crest Road seven days a week from 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. DWR,


LIGHTNING SAFETY

Outdoor Safety

- If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance of lightning. Look for shelter inside a home, large building, or a hard-topped vehicle right away.
- Do not go under trees for shelter. There is no place outside that is safe during a thunderstorm.
- Wait at least 30 minutes after hearing the last clap of thunder before leaving your shelter.
- Stay away from windows and doors. Stay off porches.
- There is no safe place outside. Places with only a roof on sports fields, golf courses, and picnic areas are not safe during a lightning storm. Small sheds should not be used.
- If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1. Get medical help right away.

Indoor Safety

Turn off computers. Stay off corded phones, computers, and other things that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. You can use a cell or cordless phone. Do not wash your hands, bathe, take a shower, do laundry, or wash dishes.



The Madcap Caution of Donald Trump

The worry was that the Trump administration was ginning up fake intelligence about Iran blowing up oil tankers in the Strait of Hormuz to justify a war against Iran. Then the next week President Donald Trump said the Iranian attacks weren't a big deal.

The episode is another indication of the underlying modesty -- not a very Trumpian word -- of the administration.

Subtract Trump's taste for nonstop controversy and rhetorical brinkmanship, and you're left with an incrementalist center-right government that has pursued an expansionary fiscal policy and avoided foreign war, for a period of peace and prosperity that -- in any other universe -- would be at the core of a stay-the-course reelection message.

doctrine was, "Don't do stupid stuff." The Trump team has built out the doctrine to "Privately consider and

stupid stuff, but at the end of the day, don't do it (usually)."

The Mexico tariff threat was typical. If Trump had gone through with the steadily escalating tariffs, it would have been a blow to our own economy and that of an ally. Instead, he got what might prove to be meaningful concessions from Mexico.

The thing about a Trump threat is that he always controls whether he's going to go through with it or not. He's going to pull out of the North American Free Trade Agreement, actually no, he's not. He's going to impose auto tariffs on Canada, well, not really. What he's going to do is sign a new trade deal with Mexico and Canada that's a somewhat altered version of NAFTA and urge Congress to pass it.

Allies might be understandably appalled (or at times alarmed) by his habit of berating them and squeezing them for concessions, but the alliance system, a product of deeper forces than the persona of any one president, remains intact.

In the Middle East, Trump accelerated an anti-ISIS campaign that he inherited, announced a withdrawal For a while, the Obama from Syria that he didn't fully follow through on and kept troops in Afghanistan. Steady as she goes.

Pulling out of the Iran Synd., Inc.

sometimes openly threaten nuclear accord is a big deal and, given that it's not entirely clear how the administration imagines resolving the crisis, genuinely a shot in the dark (although Trump says he wants to talk).

> Another gamble is the trade war with China, a truly significant departure from the old bipartisan consensus, yet even here, Trump presumably has the off-ramp of a fig-leaf deal should he decide that he wants to take it.

At home, in terms of the economy, everything (except for the tariffs) has been geared to preserving and boosting the recovery, from the tax cuts, to the deregulation, to the lack of interest in cutting spending, to Trump's jawboning of the Federal Reserve to keep rates low.

Given the choice, you'd prefer that people believed that your administration was cautious and incremental, while it undertook far-reaching changes, rather than believe it's on the verge of careening out of control, while pursuing a fairly reasonable path.

For now, he can plausibly make a re-election pitch that, despite what you might have gathered, he's been a steward of a country enjoying markedly good times.

Dear Dietitian,

Thank you for the excellent perspective you provided on the NIH study where so much exaggeration is going on.

The NIH researchers did a nice job in designing the study, but any study has its limitations. My biggest problem is with the designation of ultraprocessed foods in the first place. It is a very broad class of at least four different categories of foods/beverages. Another problem in the study involved

fiber. The ultra-processed foods group was given a fiber supplement mixed in a sugar-free lemon drink when they could have had a high fiber cereal instead, since any ready-to-eat cereal is considered ultra-processed in the NOVA classification. If there wasn't a Registered Dietitian to help design the study, there should have been.

Most importantly, the unprocessed foods group lost two pounds over two weeks. All participants were weight stable, and an unintended weight loss can be just as unhealthy as an unintended weight gain, especially in the elderly.

Keep up the good work, Gerald

The goal of this column is to educate consumers on sound nutrition. People often hear a study was done and automatically think it must be accurate. As I've mentioned previously, scientific studies must be evaluated. More importantly, nutrition studies must produce the same results in different age groups and different cultures throughout the world before they are considered valid. This often takes years. Many, many more studies are needed before a sound recommendation can be made regarding ultraprocessed foods. Good health to you!

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Proposed Rent Control Initiative Enters Circulation

Office of California Secretary of State

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Secretary of State Alex Padilla announced the proponents of a new initiative were cleared to begin collecting petition signatures today.

The Attorney General prepares the legal title and summary that is required to appear on initiative petitions. When the official language is complete, the Attorney General forwards it to the proponents and to the Secretary of State, and the initiative may be circulated for signatures. The Secretary of State then provides calendar deadlines to the proponents and to county elections officials. The Attorney General's official title and summary for the measure is as follows:

EXPANDS LOCAL GOVERNMENTS' AUTHORITY TO ENACT RENT CONTROL ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY. INITIATIVE STATUTE. Amends state law to allow local governments to establish rent control on residential properties over 15 years old. Allows rent increases on rent-controlled properties of up to 15 percent over three years from previous tenant's rent above any increase allowed by local ordinance. Exempts individuals who own no more than two homes from new rentcontrol policies. In accordance with California law, provides that rent-control policies may not violate landlords' right to a fair financial return on their property. Summary of estimate by Legislative Analyst and Director of Finance of fiscal impact on state and local governments: Potential reduction in state and local revenues of tens of millions of dollars per year in the long term. Depending on actions by local communities, revenue losses could be less or more. (19-0001.)

The Secretary of State's tracking number for this measure is 1862 and the Attorney General's tracking number is 19-0001.

The proponents of the measure, Michael Weinstein, Cynthia Davis, Jesse Brooks, Rene Christian Moya, & Susan Hunter, must collect signatures of 623,212 registered voters (five percent of the total votes cast for Governor in the November 2018 general election) in order to qualify it for the ballot. The proponents have 180 days to circulate petitions for the measure, meaning the signatures must be submitted to county elections officials no later than December 23, 2019. CBRT Responds to New Rent Control Initiative

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Business Roundtable President Rob Lapsley issued the following statement in response to the submission of a new rent control ballot initiative that, if qualified, would appear on the November 2020 ballot:

Voters in this state overwhelmingly defeated a rent control measure just five months ago. Study after study has shown

that rent control hurts the housing market, will stop investment of new development and will only make the housing crisis worse. CBRT strongly opposes this newly proposed ballot measure and will once again work to defeat it should it qualify. It is time to come together on solutions to meet the governor's ambitious goal of 3.5 million new housing units by 2025, the only true long-term solution to the housing crisis. Statewide rent control as proposed by this new measure will only make this goal harder to achieve."

Watch for West Nile **Virus Mosquito Bites**


SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) urges all Californians to protect themselves from mosquito bites during West Nile virus (WNV) season, which extends from summer through early fall.

"West Nile virus activity in the state is increasing, so it is important to take every possible precaution to protect against mosquito bites," said State Public Health Officer and CDPH Director Dr. Karen Smith.

West Nile virus spreads to humans and animals through the bite of an infected mosquito. Late-spring rains have contributed to standing water, which serves as a breeding source for mosquitoes that can spread WNV. Hot temperatures also contribute to increasing numbers of breeding mosquitoes and an increased risk of virus transmission to humans.

Currently, WNV activity is within expected levels and is similar to activity at this time last year. The risk of disease due to WNV increases as the summer progresses, and declines in early fall as the weather cools. In 2018, there were 217 reported WNV cases in California, including 11 deaths. Since WNV was first introduced into IR3535 according to label California in 2003, there have been more than 6,000 human WNV cases and 303 WNV-related deaths across the state.

West Nile virus is influenced by many factors, including climate, the number and types of birds and

mosquitoes in an area, and the level of WNV immunity in birds. For most people, the risk of developing serious illness is low. However, some individuals – less than one percent – can develop serious neurologic illnesses such as encephalitis or meningitis. People 50 years of age and older, and individuals with diabetes or hypertension, have a higher chance of getting sick and are more likely to develop complications from WNV infection.

CDPH recommends that people protect against mosquito bites and WNV by practicing the "Three Ds":

DEET – Apply U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, or instructions. EPA-registered repellents are recommended for use because they have been tested for safety and efficacy in preventing mosquito bites. Insect repellents should not be used on children under two months of age. For more information,

visit CDPH's insect repellent toolkit.

DAWN AND DUSK -Mosquitoes that transmit WNV usually bite in the early morning and evening, so it is important to wear proper clothing and repellent if outside during these times. Make sure that your doors and windows have tight-fitting screens to keep out mosquitoes. Repair or replace screens that have tears or holes.

DRAIN – Mosquitoes lay their eggs on standing water. Eliminate all sources of standing water on your property by emptying flower pots, old car tires, buckets, and other containers. If you know of a swimming pool that is not being properly maintained, please contact your local mosquito and vector control agency.
