
City Council Holds Off **On Choices**

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - Gridley City Council had hoped to fill the final vacant seat on the council at Monday night's meeting but encountered some resistance when it came time to vote. Due to strong turnout, council members had five candidate applications to process which resulted in a special meeting designed to allow the candidates to present themselves to the council.

After the interview process, council members were left with the decision to nominate the candidate that they felt would best serve Gridley. Councilman Ray Borges nominated applicant Quintin Crye for council member, the motion seconded by Mayor Johnson. The vote hit a 2-2 tie, leaving council member Zach Torres to nominate his pick, Britney Fagundes. Vice Mayor Chris Williams seconded the nomination, but again, the vote hit a 2-2 tie. Council members volleyed their support for the candidates they backed, but a decision could not be made. Also delayed until a later date was the decision to approve new playground equipment for Manuel Vierra Park. Director of Gridley Parks and Recreation, Trina Leishman, presented the council with a schematic of the new playground equipment, which would feature additional swings, a large climbing dome with a web apparatus, zip-line and more. The equipment would be an addition to the play area already in place located near the east entrance to the park. Leishman was confident that the new equipment would be a benefit to families in the area and would allow for play by children of a wider range of ages. The cost of the new equipment would include installation fee of \$61,490, in addition to the equipment cost, which the lowest bid put at \$180, 955. Council felt that while the new equipment would be an exciting addition and benefit to the community, groundwork such as park surveys and a master plan needed to be done before they could commit to such a pricey addition. Concerns for the park's long-term growth plan and parking were chief among council members. Council plans to focus on getting a survey of the park conducted and will revisit the matter of new equipment in late July. In further business, council adopted the 2019-2020 budget that had been laid out in the previous two council meetings and the resolutions to adopt obligations to reimburse the state water board for the Gridley waterline replacement project.

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


Show Your Spirit with Biggs Cheer!



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



On average 700 people die every year from bicycle accidents, while nearly 500,000 more people went to the emergency room. 90% of the people killed in bicycle accidents were no wearing a helmet. While helmets alone probably couldn't have saved everyone, if they could have saved only half those not wearing helmets, that's 315 people who could have lived.

A little over 4,000 people die from motorcycle accidents each year. While a little over 50% of motorcycle fatalities were wearing helmets, estimating that helmets could save the lives of only half those killed not wearing them that's 1,000 people killed who could have lived. All- terrain vehicles, or ATVs, are similar to motorcycles in that only about 50% of fatalities were wearing helmets.

CAL FIRE/Gridley Fire Department would like to offer these helpful tips for safe riding:

- Always wear a helmet when riding, even adults.
- Don't listen to headphones in both ears while riding.
- Ensure helmets meet safety ratings and have a CPSC, ASTM, or Snell sticker inside.
- Helmets should have a hard plastic outer shell.
- Make sure your helmet fits correctly, if not replace.
- Replace helmets that have cracks or were worn during an accident.
- Be aware of your surroundings, and others around you, because they probably are not aware of you.



CEOs for Abortion

Clarity of thought and expression about moral issues is not a core competency of CEOs.

If anyone had any doubt, look no further than the "historic" pro-abortion statement by nearly 200 CEOs that ran in a full-page ad in The New York Times. It is a festival of absurdity and euphemism, an exercise in perverse virtue-signaling to a progressive audience that believes that maintaining one of the most permissive pro-abortion regimes in the developed world is a virtue.

The CEOs define abortion as "equality" ("Don't Ban Equality") and, of course, refer to it as "comprehensive reproductive care," the ubiquitous phrase that has the advantage of sounding like the opposite of what it's describing.

The CEOs contend that health exception. abortion is central to their businesses, which might be true if all of their companies had the same business model as Planned Parenthood. But Bloomberg L.P., Amalgamated Bank

the companies whose CEOs signed the ad, are hardly dependent on abortion to thrive.

The old saw was, "What's good for General Motors is good for America." Now, according to top CEOs, what's good for abortion is good for American business. They seem to consider abortion a crucial component of GDP just like personal consumption, business investment, government spending and net exports.

They argue that "equality in the workplace" is an important business issue, and it is impossible to achieve without unrestricted access to abortion. Any restriction "threatens the health, independence and economic stability of our employees and customers."

The idea that abortion is necessary for the health of women is one of the most misleading pro-abortion cliches. Comprehensive data from Florida last year shows that only a small percentage involve a threat to the mother's life or health, and pro-life laws account for such cases -- even the sweeping Alabama law has a

The contention that restrictions put "the economy at risk" is nonsensical. Are we supposed to believe that the reduction of the abortion rate in the U.S. from its high in 1980 of Synd., Inc.

and H&M, to name three of 29.3 abortions per 1,000 women of childbearing age to its post-Roe v. Wade low of 14.6 as of 2014 has been a calamity for corporate America?

> By this standard, Utah must be a terrible place to do business since its abortion rate is so low, and the District of Columbia an enticing place to do business since its abortion rate is so high. (To the contrary, Forbes ranks Utah as the second-best state for business in the country.)

The implication is that these CEOs prefer that their employees and customers not become mothers, or if they are mothers, not have more children. It apparently hasn't occurred to them that unborn children will grow up to buy their products or perhaps work for their firms one day.

The CEO ad is another sign that the debate over abortion has entered a new phase. It isn't enough anymore to say that abortion should be safe, legal and rare, the old Bill Clinton formulation, because that implies a moral disapproval. Now, abortion is a positive good.

Pro-life laws will have to prevail against this inflamed pro-abortion sentiment -- and the swath of big business that shares it.

Processed Foods

Dear Dietitian,

My daughter is on a health kick and complains that I use too many processed, convenience foods. She insists these foods are unhealthy and claims that studies prove it. Do you agree with her?

Signed, Overworked Mom

Dear Mom,

In our very busy lives, processed, convenience foods have become popular. We often "grab and go." These foods have some benefits - longer shelf-life, lower cost, and they take less time to prepare. Along with the increase in consumption of processed foods, there has been a parallel increase in obesity rates in the US. We know that obesity increases the risk for heart disease, diabetes, and high blood pressure. The real question is, "Is it the types of foods we are eating that cause the problem or is it the simple fact that we eat too much?"

The National Institute of Health (NIH) performed a study to see

if people on an ultraprocessed foods diet consumed more calories than those on an unprocessed foods diet. In this study, the NOVA (its name, not an acronym) food classification was used, which classifies foods according to the degree of processing. Ultra-processed foods include soft drinks, sweet or savory packaged snacks, reconstituted meat products and preprepared frozen dishes. An easy way to remember this is anything that is ready-to-cook or ready-to-eat.


There were twenty people of stable weight in the study, ten men and ten women. Participants were chosen at random to follow one of two diets for two weeks, then the diets were switched for two more weeks. One group was given a diet consisting of ultra-processed foods. The other group was given unprocessed foods. Unprocessed foods include edible parts of plants and animals, including eggs and milk. Think whole foods. Both diets were matched in calories, protein, fat, carbohydrates, and fiber. The participants were allowed to eat as much or as little as they wanted. The group in the ultra-processed foods group ate an average of 500 calories more each day compared to the unprocessed food groups. The interesting part is that when the diets were switched, the

same results were found. In other words, the group who first ate the unprocessed food consumed more calories when switched to the ultra-processed food diet.

The conclusion one might draw from this study is that someone who eats a diet high in ultra-processed foods will likely eat more calories and gain weight, which puts one at greater risk of chronic illnesses such as heart disease, diabetes, and high blood pressure. To say this has been scientifically proven would be an overreach. Many, many more studies need to be done before we can make a sound recommendation concerning ultra-processed foods.

As with any study, there are limitations. The main weakness of this study was its small size. Theresults of a study of only twenty people cannot be applied to the entire population. It is a start, but only one step off the starting line. It is likely the amount of processed foods in your diet that can become a problem.

Gridley Majors Softball All-Stars Wins Thriller in Extra Innings

Kalkat again stepped up to the plate and singled up the middle to score Ratcliff on a close play at home plate to give Gridley a 12-11 lead. Kalkat advanced to third base with heads up base running during the play at the plate. Thompson then scored Kalkat with a line drive single up the middle to increase the lead 13-11. Thompson then stole second base to get into scoring position. Stevens hit a deep fly ball to

YUBA CITY, CA (MPG) - Assemblymember James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) recently joined local law enforcement and Yuba City Unified School District leaders on a tour of the Bernard Children's Center to see the impact of high-quality early care and education firsthand. During the visit, Assemblymember Gallagher, Chief Landon and Undersheriff Smallwood read to students and observed their lessons. After the tour, they met to discuss the crime-prevention and many other benefits associated with early childhood education and care.

Some of the issues they discussed include the fact that, in California, less than 14 percent of eligible infants and toddlers are getting access to state-supported care, and 1.8 million kids eligible for high-quality childcare can't access the care they need due to a lack of spaces.

Additionally, fairly compensating the childcare workforce is an integral part of bringing stability and growth to the workforce and providing consistent quality care for our youngest Californians.

The event was organized and staffed by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids, which represents more than 350 Police Chiefs, Sheriffs, District Attorneys and Victim Advocates advocating for increased investments in children and youth as a means of preventing crime and keeping children on the path toward success. \star





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
