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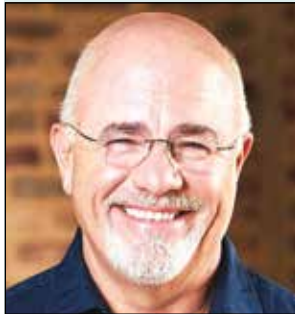

**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - What was left of Paradise in the wake of the Camp Fire, military veterans will agree, looked like a war zone. Many veterans were among those who lost it all in the blaze and have turned to Veterans Resource Center for help, FEMA and other relief agencies,

only to fall through the cracks. Compounding the problem is the issue of PTSD suffered by Veteran Camp Fire survivors, making it even more difficult to cope in the aftermath of the blaze. PTSD symptoms can interfere with basic day-to-day functioning, and last for months or years, adding a whole other level of difficulty to the recovery process of the

afflicted individual.

Local woman, Annette Boone, who was named Gridley VFW Post 5731 Community Service Volunteer of the Year for her work and service to Camp Fire survivors, has found herself fighting for a highly decorated Vietnam veteran and Camp Fire

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## Fatal Shooting in Live Oak; Gridley Man in Custody

**LIVE OAK, CA (MPG)** - In the morning hours of May 25th, a neighboring resident to a walnut orchard in the vicinity of 11074 Meyers Lane in Live Oak, discovered a gruesome scene. At approximately 8:42 a.m., Sutter County Sheriff's Office received a call from that subject, who will remain anonymous, reporting that a male subject was down and had a gunshot wound to the head. The reporting party shared that they had witnessed a blue vehicle in the area, but was not sure of its involvement in the incident.

Two Sutter County deputies responded to the scene - one located the victim with the fatal head wound while the other located a blue Honda in the area matching the identity of the one described near the scene of the crime. As the deputy attempted to make a felony traffic stop of the vehicle, the driver fled. After a short

pursuit, the driver of the blue Honda lost control of the vehicle and crashed near Pass Road and West Butte Road. After a short foot pursuit, the driver was apprehended and a shot gun was located near the Honda.

The driver has been identified as Jesus Perez, of Gridley, and was booked at the Sutter County Sheriff's Department for charges unrelated to the homicide case. Charges include: evading an officer, threatening an officer and felony possession of a firearm.

The victim has been positively identified as Paramjit Singh Randhwa, of Yuba City. Those who knew him have expressed shock at the news of his death. Under-Sheriff Smallwood expressed "On behalf of myself and Sherriff Barnes, we are saddened for Live Oak residents, and our hearts and prayers go out to the family and friends of the deceased."

Under-Sherriff Smallwood shared that the department is processing evidence from the incident and is hopeful for more detailed information by the end of the week. The homicide investigation remains ongoing. Sutter County Detectives are seeking any information regarding this incident. # The Elephant in the Room

Last year the California State Supreme Court issued a ruling on whether a person working for a company is classified as an employee or independent contractor in a case now commonly called the Dynamex decision. In the Court’s ruling, they changed the criteria for determining if a person is an employee or could be considered an independent contractor from what was called the Borello standard to an overly simplified but problematic ABC test.

The ABC test makes perfect legal sense in the simplistic way it segregates employees from independent contractors but does not consider the economic or social impact of doing so. Our “progressive” legislature likes the ABC test as a means to capture the revenue from the 2 million plus independent contractors in our state impacted by this ruling. Employee unions also like the decision as it affords them the opportunity to organize and represent greater segments of private sector employees. Through all the rhetoric and attention to the Dynamex decision, few leaders are focused or aware of an as yet, undiscussed, cost.

Our Country prides itself as a land of opportunity, a place where if you work hard, you can realize your dream of owning your own business. History is full of examples of individual success coupled with collaboration and cooperation with others. The creativity and entrepreneurial spirit these individuals exhibited continues to be held in high regard.

The State Supreme Court’s Dynamex ruling, the resulting discussion and most of the proposed solutions for the Dynamex decision threatens this entrepreneurial spirit. It also undermines our core values of opportunity and independence. Individuality, unconventionality and creative

life management are not supported by turning independent contractors into employees. Further, these values are not encouraged, usually suppressed and often punished when exhibited by employees.

Assembly Bill 5, (Gonzalez), does just that. It doesn’t make much difference if surgeons, insurance agents or other industries are selectively excluded. The Elephant in the Room is how the current approach to codifying the Dynamex decision, effectively undermines the hopes and dreams of a large class of individuals in our economy. These individuals include seniors supplementing their incomes, stay-at-home parents contributing to household finances, entrepreneurial students in college reducing student loan costs, and those who support themselves in the gig economy while developing that one amazing Idea.

For a brief moment, there was a ray of hope and redemption for our legislature, found in Senate Bill 238 (Groves). The bill proposed to use the Federal standard to define employment using criteria more definitive than the Borello standard making it difficult for the employers to game the system and retains independent contractor status for the many individuals across our economy. Unfortunately, SB 238 failed passage in the Senate Labor and Employment Committee on a partisan vote.

If AB 5 is approved in the Assembly as is anticipated, the members of the State Senate, including State Senator Richard Pan, who serves as a member of the Labor, Public Employment and Retirement Committee, will have an opportunity to fix Dynamex to benefit employers, individual Californians and the state’s economy. The lives, livelihood and economic future of hundreds of thousands of Californians who are independent contractors who want to remain so are

not being addressed in the current approach to solving the problem our State Supreme Court created with the Dynamex decision. The current way this problem is being legislated is clearly not the balanced, thoughtful, or comprehensive approach this subject matter deserves.

In the rush to implement our State Supreme Court’s decision regarding how an employee is defined in our State, our legislators haven’t created a solution; they have merely crafted an alternative definition. This alternate decision pleases some select special interests but in doing so, eviscerates our nation’s core values of opportunity, independence and creativity.

The five local chamber of commerce organizations that comprise UCAN – the United Chamber Advocacy Network, urge Senator Pan and his colleagues to amend AB 5 to include language from SB 238 and allow small businesses, start-ups and non-profits the ability to contract for work directly associated with primary business activity, allowing flexibility to manage workforce in good times and bad.

survivor, John Howell III.

Howell proudly holds the honors of two Purple Hearts and the Silver Star, the United States Armed Forces' 3rd highest decoration for valor in combat for his service in the Army. He and his wife Patricia both suffer from PTSD and have been struggling since the fire. Due to the fact that the couple was technically homeless before the disaster, they were not eligible for aid from FEMA and have been unable to obtain much help from Veterans Affairs in Chico.

Boone, working on their

behalf, has made little headway with the complicated paperwork necessary for applying for aid and working with VA reps.

Meanwhile the Howells face eviction from their current housing, can't afford to eat properly and have suffered a decline in health. Frustration setting in and desperate to find help, Boone reached out to Assemblyman Gallagher pleading their cause, "Our men and women sacrifice their lives to protect us and our country, yet we CANNOT seem to be able to take care of them. I need your help Mr. Gallagher. How can we do

this to him? Where is our government?!"

The response was immediate. Assemblyman Gallagher answered her call for aid and by the following day, May 17, Boone was notified that a Long Term Recovery Group would be contacting her regarding the Howells. Just days later, a care provider was assigned their case, to ensure their health, welfare and to help them navigate the waters to recovery.

With renewed hope that his country had not forgotten him, John Howell III attended Gridley's Memorial Day Services. The veteran found his emotions running high as he stood alongside fellow veterans and was honored for his service to our nation. Assemblyman Gallagher, who was in attendance, met and shook his hand, immediately asking him how he was fairing and what else he could do to help.

VFW Post 5731 Commander Bart, who has been an ally to Boone on her mission to help veterans and Camp Fire Survivors said, "With the Howells' situation now brought to the attention of Assemblyman Gallagher; I'm confident they will not be homeless again. Like many of us, Mr. Gallagher is a patriot with a heart." ★

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# Legislators React to Absurd Debris Removal Delays

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

Senator Jim Nielsen (R - Tehama) and Assemblyman James Gallagher (R-Yuba City) recently reacted to complaints from Camp Fire survivors about debris removal delays caused by environmental concerns.

"CalOES and other government agencies deserve kudos for how quickly they have ramped up debris operations since the weather has improved. Already removing 600,000 tons of debris from the burn area is impressive," Nielsen and Gallagher said.

"Although the overall

effort is worthy of recognition, we are very concerned to hear from constituents that frogs, birds and waterways are causing work to stop in some areas. We have reached out to officials at the highest level of state government urging them to resolve this issue immediately and get these properties cleaned up," Nielsen and Gallagher added.

Gallagher and Nielsen noted that survivors impacted are rightfully concerned that the stop work notice may cause additional delays due to debris removal crews and equipment leaving

neighborhoods where most cleanups have already been completed.

"Survivors are anxious to rebuild or move on. Our neighbors have gone through hell in this disaster, and must be the priority," the lawmakers concluded.

According to government sources, approximately 800 properties have been put on hold until state environmental regulators develop mitigation plans and permits are issued.

producing a lot yet. I was at the Butte County Master Gardener's demonstration garden at Patrick Ranch in Durham and they have an espalier aprium called Delight that is loaded with fruit. Hoping for better performance in the future from my espalier aprium Cotton Candy.

A while back in some snail talk, I mentioned getting wool pellets that are supposed to deter snails. I've never ordered them but I watched a British gardening show on Netflix called Big Dreams, Small Spaces that had an episode where a garden expert recommended using the dregs of wool from the rear end of the sheep to deter snails. Having no pellets and no poop sheep wool I'm going to experiment with

an old destroyed wool afghan by cutting it up in little pieces and putting it around snail sensitive plants. I'll keep you posted about this experiment and its level of deterrence.

I see this as a win-win experiment. No matter what, I will have colorful bits of wool scattered throughout the garden beds. Maybe the birds will use it in their nests and I'll have colorful bird nests around my house.

The backyard is going to have a lot of sunflowers growing big soon. The birds in our yard don't seem to like black sunflower seeds so they throw them out. There are baby sunflowers everywhere thanks to these birdy gardening methods. The heat is on its way. ★

Pop remembers World War II, also.

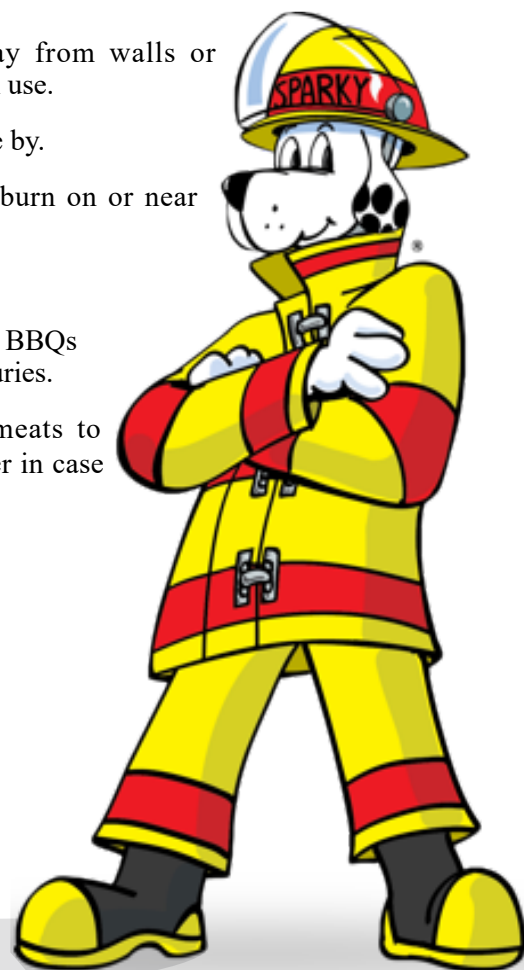

## BBQ'S AND GAS GRILL SAFETY

BBQ's and gas grills cause an average of 8,800 residential fires every year. Additionally, around 16,900 people end up in the Emergency Room from BBQ related injuries. CAL FIRE/Gridley Fire Department would like to offer these helpful tips for some safe outdoor cooking and grilling.

- Never use a BBQ or grill indoors, including a garage or shed.
- Ensure a gas grill is OFF before leaving the grill unattended.
- Use caution when lighting charcoal. Use a long lighter to light
- Pull BBQs and grills away from walls or flammable materials when in use.
- Keep a fire extinguisher close by.
- Don't store items that can burn on or near your BBQ or grill.
- Keep inside of hood clean.
- Keep children away from hot BBQs and grills to prevent burn injuries.
- Also, remember to cook meats to a safe temperature. all power in case of an emergency. ★

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# Dear Dietitian

## Nutrition Studies

Dear Dietitian,

Why are nutrition studies so confusing? One day we hear a certain food is good for us; then the next thing we know, the same thing may cause cancer. It's very frustrating!  
George D.

Dear George,

Good question. I am always skeptical when I read a new nutrition study. Take fish oil supplements, for example, which contain omega-3-fatty acids. At first, studies showed that omega-3s did everything from preventing cancer to heart disease. After further research, a special board appointed by the American Heart Association recommended NOT to take fish oil supplements if you have no prior history of heart disease or stroke because there isn't sufficient evidence that they will help prevent these events.

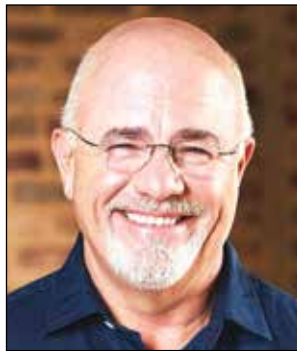
These are just three substantial contributors to the confusion:

1. Nutrition science is in its infancy. There is still a lot we don't know, especially about nutrition and disease prevention. Scientific studies have certain parameters that must be followed in order to be accepted as good research. These studies must be repeated in different areas of the world to see if the same results are reproduced. If the results can be duplicated, then we may be on to something. These studies take time.
2. Nutrition is a good story. The media reports on a nutrition study as soon as possible to be the first one with the story. Oftentimes, these studies are misreported, misunderstood, or simply, not good science. Remember, there will never be one study that changes everything we believe about nutrition.
3. Money. We live in a "buyer beware" society and many capitalize on unsound nutrition. Some charlatans claim to have a cure for diabetes when the medical community knows such a cure does not exist, at least not yet. Others say eat only vegetables, and your cancer

will be cured. Nonsense. We have all seen weight loss books. An author develops a weight loss plan that sounds convincing, then gives a fictional scientific reason to support her claim. She will probably even quote a study or two. The truth is that in order to lose weight, one must take in fewer calories than the body needs. It is also important not to reduce calories drastically so that the body can preserve muscle. Be a wise consumer. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. Consult professional associations, such as the American Heart Association (AHA) or the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics (AND). It's free. Finally, eat a diet rich in fruits and vegetables, whole grains, and lean proteins; and as always, keep it simple.

### When to Start The Process?

Dear Dave,  
My husband and I are debt-free, and we have an emergency fund of six months of expenses saved. We'd like to buy a home in the \$250,000 to \$275,000 price range in the near future, and we plan on saving \$60,000 for a down payment. It should take a little less than two years to save that much money. When should we begin the search for a good real estate agent and start the underwriting process?

Dear Sarah,  
I'm really proud of you two. You're being very intentional and goal-oriented about getting control of your finances and the home buying process.

I'd advise starting a conversation with a quality mortgage company when you're about five or six months away from your savings goal date. There's "pre-approval," but there's also something called "certified." That's a step beyond pre-approved, and it basically puts you in a

position to make an offer when you're ready for the purchase. So, getting certified as a buyer is very helpful. After that, sit down and talk with a few agents. Interview them, and decide on someone you like and trust. Find an experienced agent you're comfortable with to guide you through the real estate world, and then start outlining your search and buying strategy.

What I would *not* do is jump from agent to agent. There's a tremendous benefit in finding someone you trust and feel good about. I'm talking about a buyer's agent who's going to fight for you. This means someone who will show you several different properties, keep your wants and needs foremost in their mind, and help you get the best possible buy on your new home!

### When to Start The Process?

Dear Dave,  
My husband and I were listening to your radio show the other day. In it, you were speaking to a lady about buying a home. When you talk about mortgage payments being 25 percent or less of your take-home pay, does this figure include taxes and insurance or just principal and interest?

Dear Ann,  
That figure includes taxes and insurance, too. The

whole idea is to make sure your house payment is manageable. You don't want to have so much money going toward your mortgage every month, what I call being "house poor," that you can't take care of your other financial responsibilities or enjoy life.

It's simple. You have more money when you don't have debt. If you want to build wealth, you have to get out of the payment business. When one-third to one-half of everything you bring home is going to creditors, you have less money for other stuff—other important stuff.

Trust me, I get it. A home is a huge expense that very few people, especially those just starting out, can afford to pay for in cash. That's why I don't beat people up for getting a 15-year, fixed-rate mortgage. But that's the only kind of mortgage I recommend.

And yes, make sure the monthly payments are just 25 percent, or less, of your take-home pay!

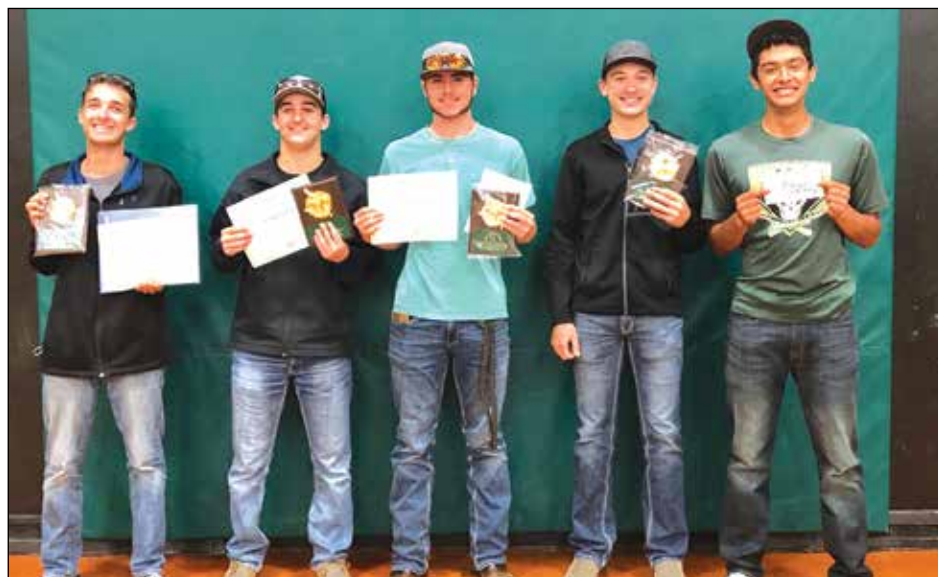

**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE LIVE OAK CEMETERY DISTRICT CONFIRMING DIAGRAM AND CONTINUED ASSESSMENT AND ORDERING THE CONTINUED LEVYING AND COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2019-2020**

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Live Oak Cemetery District, acting as the legislative body of the Live Oak Cemetery Maintenance Assessment District, has previously ordered through Resolution 96-02 and 96-05 the formation of an assessment district pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, known as the Live Oak Cemetery Assessment District, for the purpose of financing certain cemetery facility improvements as specified in the District's Master Plan and for the purpose of funding maintenance operations of those facilities; and

WHEREAS, on April 13, 2016, the Board adopted a Resolution, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code section 22585, declaring the intention to extend the annual assessment period an additional 20 years, setting a June 8, 2016 public hearing and directing the mailing of ballots to all District property owners, all in compliance with Government Code section 53753; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of the June 8, 2016 public hearing, the Board directed the Clerk to tabulate said votes; and

WHEREAS, the assessment ballots submitted, and not withdrawn, in opposition to the proposed assessment did not exceed the assessment ballots submitted, and not withdrawn, in its favor; and

WHEREAS, Streets and Highways Code Sections 22622, 22623, 22665 and 22661 authorize the preparation of an Engineer's Report on an annual basis which shall describe any proposed new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements, set forth an estimate of the costs of any improvements and maintenance, specify a diagram for the assessment district, and specify the amount to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, an Engineer's Report for fiscal year 2019-2020, as authorized and ordered by the Board of Trustees pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22622, has been presented to the Board of Trustees for its consideration and approval, which Engineer's Report generally describes the general nature, location, and extent of the new improvements or any substantial changes in existing improvements and maintenance, provides an estimate of the costs of any proposed new improvements or substantial changes in existing improvements and maintenance, sets forth a diagram for the assessment district, and specifies the amounts to be assessed upon various types of assessable lands within the assessment district; and

WHEREAS, this Engineer's Report has been approved by the Board of Trustees of the Live Oak Cemetery District pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22624; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 2019-\_\_, the Board of Trustees has declared its intent to continue to levy and collect assessments for fiscal year 2019-2020 within said district at an assessment rate of \$23.52 per year per single family residential unit, apartment unit and/or condominium, all as set forth in the Engineer's Report. This is the same rate as that of the prior fiscal year. This assessment schedule is the same as that levied in fiscal years 1996-1997 through 2018-2019. The total number of parcels to be assessed and an estimate of total annual assessment revenue is contained within the Engineer's Report; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees held a duly noticed public hearing on June 12, 2019, at 6:30 P.M., at the Board's office located at 3545 Pennington Road, Live Oak, California 95953, to hear any objections and receive any protest to the levying and collection of assessments within the assessment district for fiscal year 2019-2020. Notice of hearing was posted and published in a newspaper of general circulation pursuant to the requirements of Streets and Highways Code Sections 22625 and 22626 and Government Code Section 6601; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Streets and Highways Code Sections 22628 and 22629, an opportunity for protests has been afforded and the Board has determined that sufficient protest has not been demonstrated either orally or in writing, and that a majority protest does not exist; and

WHEREAS, said assessment is a residential parcel charge and is a valid property-related fee as defined in Article XIII D, section (b) of the California Constitution:

- (1) Revenues from the fee shall not exceed the funds required to provide the property related service: maintenance and expansion of the cemetery for exclusive use of property owners and families.
- (2) Revenue derived from the fee is not used for any purpose other than that for which the fee was imposed. The fee provides only for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery.
- (3) The amount of the fee imposed upon any parcel or person as an incident of property ownership does not exceed the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel. The fee provides only for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery.
- (4) The fee is imposed for a service that is actually used by, or immediately available to, the owner of the property in question. The charge provides for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery which is available to the persons paying the charge and not available to the general public.
- (5) The fee is not imposed for general governmental services where the service is available to the public at large in substantially the same manner as it is to property owners. The charge provides for the expansion and maintenance of the cemetery which is available to the persons paying the charge and not available to the general public.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of the Live Oak Cemetery District, hereby orders as follows:

1. That the diagram of the assessment district for fiscal year 2019-2020 is hereby confirmed pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22631.
2. The assessments for fiscal year 2019-2020 shall continue to be levied and collected at the same rates and in accordance with the same formula as assessments were collected for fiscal year 1996-97 \$23.52 per year per single family residential parcel, apartment unit and/or condominium, all as set forth in the Engineer's Report. This assessment schedule is the same as that levied in fiscal years 1996-97, 1997-98, 1998-99, 1999-2000, 2000-2001, 2001-2002, 2002-2003, 2003-2004, 2004-2005, 2005-2006, 2006-2007, 2007-2008, 2008-2009, 2009-2010, 2010-2011, 2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2013-2014, 2014-2015, 2015-2016, 2016-2017, 2017-2018 and 2018-2019.
3. The new improvements and/or any substantial changes in existing improvements and maintenance expenditures set forth in the Engineer's Report for fiscal year 2019-2020 are hereby ordered.
4. The clerk of the Board of Trustees as the legislative body of the Live Oak Cemetery is directed to file a certified copy of the diagram and assessment together with the Engineer's Report with the Auditor/Controller of Sutter County, pursuant to Streets and Highways Code Section 22641, together with a certified copy of Resolution 19-4.
5. The Auditor/Controller of Sutter County is hereby directed to place on the assessment roll of Sutter County opposite each lot or parcel of land within the assessment district the amount assessed thereon as shown in said assessment.
6. The provisions contained in California Civil Code Sections 860-870 shall be applicable to this resolution and to any action taken by the District by ordinance or resolution to determine the amount of the service charge (assessment) to any parcel and the certification of the service charge for the purpose of placing the charges on the property tax roll pursuant to the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act ("Act"). It is the express intent of the District in adopting this resolution that any legal action contesting the validity of the resolution and/or the service charges established hereunder shall be filed within 60 days from the date of the adoption of this resolution or the determination fixing and certifying the service charges in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

In the event that a court should decide that the validation provisions are not applicable to the adoption of this resolution or to the determination fixing and certifying the service charges in accordance with the Act, the District hereby separately declares its intent to and does hereby establish a statute of limitation in which any legal action, suit or proceeding may be initiated in court in which to attack, set aside, void or otherwise annul this resolution or any portion or provision hereof and the determination fixing and certifying the service charges in accordance with the provisions of the Act. Any such action shall be initiated and filed in the appropriate court within 60 days of the date of the adoption of this resolution and/or the determination fixing and certifying the service charges in accordance with the Act. Otherwise, any such suit shall be barred.

As used herein, the "date of the adoption of this resolution" shall mean the date of the vote by the Live Oak Cemetery District Board of Trustees to adopt this resolution.
