**GRIDLEY, CA (MPG)** - In honor of the organization's 100th anniversary, American Legion Posts across the nation are celebrating the centennial in various fashions. That includes Gridley's American Legion Post 210, which is hosting a Spaghetti Dinner Celebration Saturday, May 4th from 5:00-8:00 at Veterans Memorial Hall.

Post 210 has planned an evening full of good food and company, musical entertainment and possibly even a sip or two of wine to commemorate the century mark of the American Legion and its legacy of excellence.

The American Legion is the nation's largest wartime veterans service organization aimed at advocating patriotism across the United States. Historically, the American Legion has always had a hand in helping others, especially Veterans. The American Legion helped get the GI Bill passed, securing rights and protecting Veterans.

The legion has been partnered with the Boy Scouts of America programs and National Education Association, offering scholarship opportunities, while also providing disaster relief and aid throughout numerous national disasters including the Great Depression, major hurricanes and 9-11.

Gridley's South Butte Post 210 sponsors student representatives for the Boys State and Girls State programs, provides scholarships opportunities to local high school students, assists fellow veterans in need and focuses on providing color guard services for Veterans' memorial services.

Commander Owen Stiles has been with the Gridley American Legion Post for a little over 20 years and has been Commanding the post for 6 years. Post 210, he relates, was formed in 1923 after the First World War by local veterans. There were between 12-15 members listed on the original charter. Now, Post 210 boasts over 60

members, but not all actively participate in the organization's activities.

The Gridley post is hoping to recruit more active military members and Veterans with honorable discharges to their organization willing to forward their work in service to their county and fellow Veterans. Commander Stiles says that it is "an honor to fellowship with other Veterans and be of service to those in need, helping to protect veterans' rights through the American Legion." Stiles and the rest of Post 210 encourage anyone interested in joining to reach out to the post.

Although the Gridley 100th Anniversary celebration is not a fundraiser, proceeds will go towards American Legion Post 210 operations. The event is open to ticket holders with Veterans and active duty military members invited to attend for free. Tickets can be purchased for \$10.00. # Yuba City Native Propels Submarine Legacy into the Future

**YUBA CITY, CA (MPG)** - As citizens of Yuba City go about their daily lives, members of the U.S. Navy's "Silent Service" work beneath the ocean's waves, continuing a tradition that only a small fraction of military members will ever know: strategic deterrence.

Petty Officer 3rd Class Cody Cates assigned to USS West Virginia hails from Yuba City, California and is a 2009 graduate of East Nicholas High School who takes on the task to execute one of the Defense Department's most important missions of strategic deterrence.

Cates is an electronics technician, navigation, stationed at the Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, homeport to the Ohio-class ballistic-missile and guided-missile submarines.

"Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay is home to all East Coast Ohio-class submarines," said Rear Adm. Jeff Jablon, commander, Submarine Group 10. "Team Kings Bay ensures our crews are combat ready when called upon, putting our submarine forces on scene, unseen."

"I monitor and operate the navigation of the ship as well as perform maintenance on all electronics on the ship," Cates said.

Cates credits continued success in the Navy to many of the lessons learned in Yuba City.

"I learned how to navigate socially since I come from a small town and I am able to maintain relationships," Cates said.

The Navy's ballistic-missile submarines (SSBNs), often referred to as "boomers," serve as a strategic deterrent by providing an undetectable platform for submarine-launched ballistic missiles, according to Jablon. They are designed specifically for stealth, extended patrols and the precise delivery of missiles if directed by the President. The Ohio-class

design allows the submarines to operate for 15 or more years between major overhauls. On average, the submarines spend 77 days at sea followed by 35 days in port for maintenance.

Cates is part of the boat's gold crew, one of the two rotating crews, which allow the boat to be deployed on missions more often without taxing one crew too much. A typical crew on this submarine is approximately 150 officers and enlisted sailors.

The first submarine was invented by Yale graduate, David Bushnell, in 1775 and provided the colonists with a secret weapon in the form of a one-man wooden craft in an experimental submarine that was nicknamed the Turtle.

Although Bushnell's efforts were unsuccessful in attempts to blow up British vessels during the American Revolution, George Washington said of the Turtle, "I then thought, and still think, that it was an effort of genius."

U.S. submarines may not be what some have imagined. Measuring 560 feet long, 42-feet wide and weighing more than 16,500 tons, a nuclear-powered propulsion system helps push the ship through the water at more than 20 knots (23 mph).

Because of the demanding environment aboard submarines, personnel are accepted only after rigorous testing, according to Navy officials. Submariners are some of the most highly-trained and skilled people in the Navy. Regardless of their specialty, everyone has to learn how everything on the ship works

and how to respond in emergencies to become "qualified in submarines" and earn the right to wear the coveted gold or silver dolphins on their uniform.

"The command is quick to recognize success," Cates said. "There is a constant push to take ownership and take charge of certain aspects that propels you forward in your duties."

Serving in the Navy means Cates is part of a world that is taking on new importance in America's focus on rebuilding military readiness, strengthening alliances and reforming business practices in support of the National Defense Strategy.

A key element of the Navy the nation needs is tied to the fact that America is a maritime nation, and that the nation's prosperity is tied to the ability to operate freely on the world's oceans. More than 70 percent of the Earth's surface is covered by water; 80 percent of the world's population lives close to a coast; and 90 percent of all global trade by volume travels by sea.

"Our priorities center on people, capabilities and processes, and will be achieved by our focus on speed, value, results and partnerships," said Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer. "Readiness, lethality and modernization are the requirements driving these priorities."

Though there are many ways for sailors to earn distinction in their command, community, and career, Cates is most proud of receiving a Navy Achievement Medal for a consolidated casualty procedure for a shorter response time in a casualty situation.

As a member of one of the U.S. Navy's most relied upon assets, Cates and other sailors know they are part of a legacy that will last beyond their lifetimes providing the Navy the nation needs.

"Serving in the Navy gave me some stability since I just got married and it's a great way to start the future," Cates said. ★

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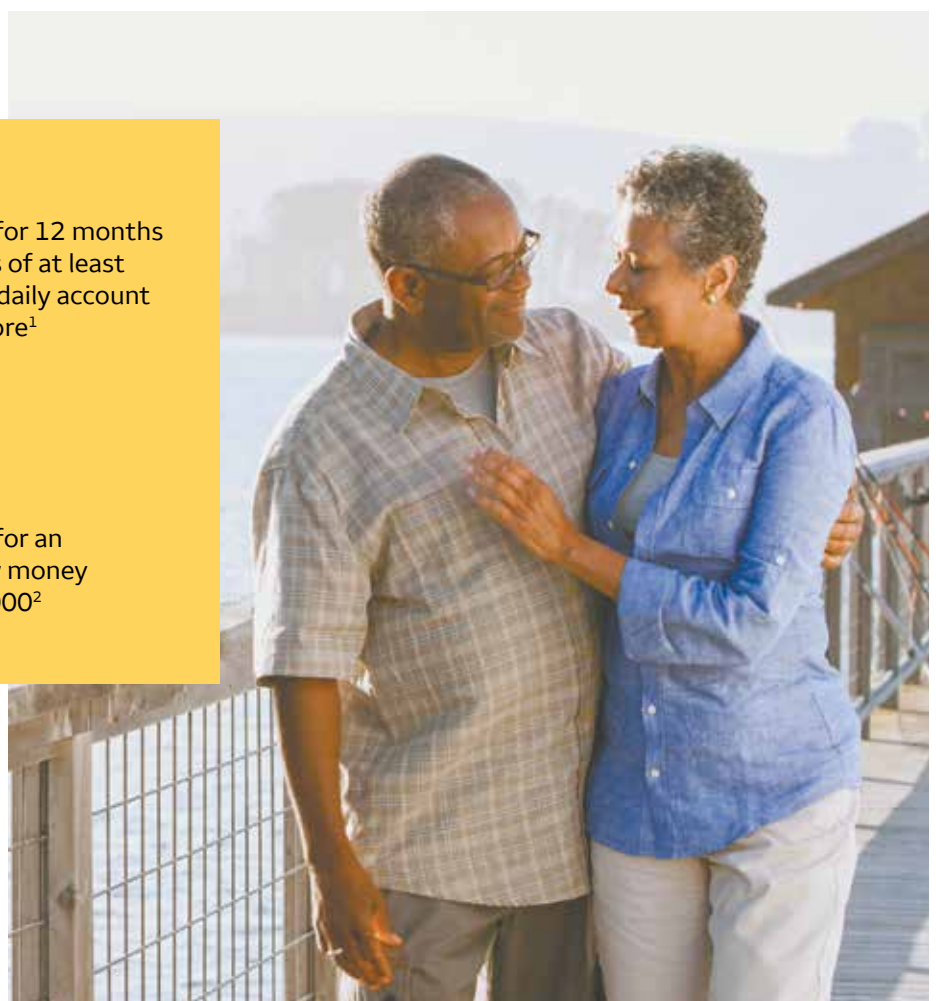
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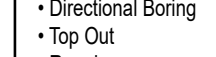
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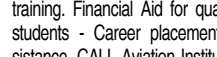
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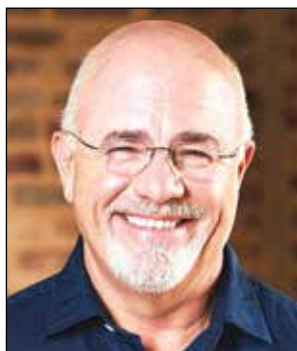
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## Dave Ramsey Says

### Paying Extra

Dear Dave, I'd like to start paying a little extra each month on my car loan, so I can get out of debt faster. Would it be a good idea to write a separate check for this extra amount? —Steve

Dear Steve,

I think that's a great idea! You can include the extra check in a separate envelope with the regular payment. In addition, write "principal only" in big, bold letters on the extra envelope and on the extra check. Make sure to

also include the account number in the notation line at the bottom. Follow these guidelines, and you'll be much less likely to run into problems as result of someone at the bank not paying attention.

Some companies use payment booklets that have a box specifically for entering any amount you want applied directly to the principal. See if this is available to you, as well. Regardless, make sure you keep an accurate, written record of the monthly and overall amounts you're designating as "principal only."

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# Looking Back

The following are stories that appeared in the Gridley Herald 25, 50, 75, 100 and 125 years ago:

### 25 Years Ago (1994)

#### "Gridley Students Work with Council"

Five Gridley High School students got hands-on experience working with the Gridley City Council as they tackled the question of whether a majestic 100-foot oak tree should be allowed to remain, despite its sickened condition. Students filled the shoes of the City Council, considering the report from arborist Meg Burin and the value of preserving large trees, such as the oak. Inevitably, the student council members decided to give the tree a year long probationary period to see if treatments designed to save the tree would work. Property owners of 761 Maine Street, where the tree is located, have agreed to help with half of the cost. City Administrator Jack Slota and City Council Members were impressed with the work of the student council members and declared the exercise a success.

### 50 Years Ago (1969)

#### "Gridley Little League Building"

Gridley Moose Lodge has offered to build a concrete block refreshment-storage building for the use of Little League and other recreational activities and Gridley City Council has accepted. The building will be about 15 feet from the bleachers built by the Lions Club and will be in the same style. It will be approximately 13-feet by 14-feet and will have secure windows and metal doors.

New point values for processed foods became effective April 30th and will be in effect until June 3rd. During war-time rationing, foods were designated specific point values. Households were issued a ration books with an allotted point total which they could use to redeem those rationed food items.

# Dear Dietitian

## Slow Weight Loss

Dear Dietitian,

As I get older, I seem to have more trouble with my weight. I know about eating healthy foods, like fruits and vegetables, and exercising, but it's hard to do with my busy schedule. I don't believe in fad diets that promise to help you lose weight fast. Many of those diets don't seem healthy or logical. What is a healthy, realistic weight loss goal each month? I have recently lost 7 pounds, but I almost always seem to plateau.

Dear Alice,

Congratulations on your new health change! I also want to commend you for being skeptical of fad diets; they only perpetuate the "yo-yo" cycle. Fad diets create a rapid weight loss in the beginning by simply inducing a water loss.

As we age, our metabolism slows down, as does our activity level, but our food intake often stays the same. The obvious result is weight gain. The healthiest way to lose weight is at a moderate rate, about 5 pounds per month. While most of us want the weight off right now, it just doesn't stay off that way. There are several advantages to losing weight more slowly, the

first being you don't have to starve yourself! We all know that in order to lose weight, you simply have to take in fewer calories than you burn. Simple but not easy.

The second advantage is that you will lose fat instead of muscle. When you lose weight quickly, your body will lose some muscle while trying to preserve fat. It's just your body's way of protecting itself. It doesn't know if you are lost in the desert for months with little access to food, so it will preserve fat since that will be needed as a long-term energy source.

Third, slow to moderate weight loss helps you change your eating habits, which is necessary to maintain weight loss. Eat smaller amounts of the foods you enjoy. Incorporate fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean proteins, and mono- and polyunsaturated fats into your diet.

You mention that you reach a plateau in weight loss. This is sometimes referred to as a set point. It's a weight that your body is comfortable with, and it is hard to get above or below it. The best defense against a plateau is exercise. With our busy lives, it is hard to fit in an exercise plan. Do something you enjoy, then you will more likely to keep it up. You may start by walking around the block every evening for a week. Slowly build up to thirty minutes of exercise at least four times a week. You will almost certainly feel better, which helps perpetuate the healthy cycle. Don't give in

to sitting on the couch and watching television.

When you exercise, you build muscle, which weighs more than fat but takes up less space. That's why you look better in your clothes when your muscles are toned. You may have heard that you burn more calories at rest when you have more muscle. These are all good reasons to go for it!

Planning ahead is key to a healthy diet. Do what works for you: three meals a day with nothing in between or plan healthy snacks. Write down meal plans at the beginning of the week. Side dishes, such as salads or mashed potatoes can be used for multiple meals, easing the task. Fresh vegetables are simple-- corn on the cob, sugar snap peas, fresh tomatoes -- delicious! In the interest of convenience, meals can be made in the slow cooker. A rotisserie chicken can be purchased at your local grocery store.

Making health changes may seem time-consuming at first. Make the effort; put in the time. After about a month to six weeks, the changes will be your new pattern and eventually, you will be able to enjoy your weight loss for a lifetime.

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## SPARKY'S CORNER

### EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS

Each year 12,000-14,000 earthquakes are reported; that's an average of 35 earthquakes a day. When earthquakes strike a populated region, they can cause extensive property damage. Buildings and bridges can collapse, and gas, water, electric and phone service can be disrupted. Earthquakes can also cause serious injuries and fatalities. Scientists cannot predict precisely when or where one will occur. It's important to know what to do before, during, and after an earthquake:

**Before...**  
Identify safe spots at home and work:

- Under sturdy tables or desks
- In structurally sound or strongly supported doorways.
- In a small room or hallway

Never take cover near windows or heavy furniture that can tip over, such as bookcases and entertainment units. Avoid poorly supported doorways, such as those with metal frames.

**Have a plan**

- Family members can become separated during an earthquake. Be prepared by creating a plan for how to reach one another. Establish an out-of-area contact (such as a relative or family friend) who can coordinate family members' locations and information should you become separated. Make sure children learn the phone numbers and addresses, and know the emergency plans.
- Prepare a family disaster supply kit. Families with children should have each child create their own personal pack.

**During...**  
Stay Calm. The precautions you should take are determined by where you are when the earthquake begins.

- If inside, take cover and if you must move for safety, take only a few steps and stay there until the shaking stops.
- If outside, stay at least 10 feet away from any building from which window glass and other debris could fall. Move away from trees, streetlights, and power lines. Crouch down and cover your head.
- If in a vehicle, park in a location away from trees, wires, buildings, bridges and overpasses. Stay where you are, with your safety belt fastened, until the earthquake is over. Never stop under or on a bridge.
- If in a coastal area, move to high ground.
- If in a mountainous area, watch for and avoid falling rocks, broken roadbeds, landslides and falling debris.

**After...**  
Earthquakes are dangerous, but the disasters they can trigger such as fires, floods, landslides, tsunamis and avalanches can be more devastating. Expect aftershocks, smaller earthquakes that can occur after a major quake. Monitor radio news reports for updates and the latest emergency information. The risk of injury increases for those who go outside too soon. If you lose electricity, use a flashlight. Never use candles because of the possibility of a gas leak and the danger of fire. When authorities say the event has ended, check your home for structural damage, gas leaks, and fire. Report any problems to the appropriate authorities. Record any damage that has resulted from the quake.

#### High Hopes for the New Traffic Signal?

Not if you live on or need to visit Hollis Lane. Yes, I do live on Hollis Lane and turning into or out of Hollis has been difficult but now I see that it will be even harder. Coming south on the highway and wanting to turn left into Hollis, the extra traffic planned for West Liberty will be filling up the northbound left turn lane and blocking the passage into Hollis. No problem, just wait in the southbound traffic lane while the accelerating traffic coming up behind you will look out for you. How about heading south on the highway from Hollis? Dive right in there where the now 2 lanes are accelerating and merging at the same place you are trying to get in, 3 lanes into 1, bumper cars for sure. One simple fix would be to make the intersection longer and move the south side of the intersection to the south side of Hollis Lane. Left turn lanes would be less restricted without interference from the opposing directions. Signal programming could be like the other signals in town: Highway has a turn both north and south bound, eastbound from West Liberty has a turn, and westbound from Hollis Lane has a turn with highway left turns as needed by traffic.
