World Ag Expo: Sutter Buttes **Manufacturing in Top 10**

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) Gridley business, Sutter Buttes Manufacturing, was recently named among the top 10 producers of agricultural equipment at the World Ag Expo, held at the International Agri-Center in Tulare, California. The World Ag Expo was held February 12-14 this year and sees an average of 100,000 individuals from 70 countries annually. It is the largest annual agricultural show of it's kind and hosts 1,500 exhibitors displaying cuttingedge agricultural technology and equipment.

Live Oak Chamber Faces an Uncertain **Future**

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - The Live Oak Chamber of Commerce circulated a letter recently to its members and local businesses, explaining circumstances that are currently effecting the chambers operations and imploring them to attend a meeting to be held next week, on March 12th. The tone of the letter suggests that the future of the Live Oak Chamber is in peril, and that new boards members are a must if the Chamber intends to continue functioning.

Co-President of the Live Oak District Chamber of Commerce, Annette Bertolini, writes "At present the Live Oak District Chamber of Commerce is in a period of transition. All of the 2017-2018 Board of Directors completed their terms of office effective June 30, 2018. A new Board of Directors was not voted to fulfill the 2018-2019 fiscal period." She continues "Many of the fundraising events in Live Oak are presented under the Chamber's umbrella of the Live Oak Festival. A separate Board of Directors serves on the Live Oak Festival Committee." Those committee members completed the Live Oak Parade, Festival and Peach Tea Luncheon and other scheduled events for the 2018 year, but Bertolini confirms in her letter that "The outgoing Festival Committee Board of Directors and members agreed to turn over the planning and implementation of those events for the 2019 season."

The Live Oak Lions are considering the production of those events, but nothing has been con-

firmed at this time. The future of the Live Oak Chamber of Commerce looks bleak in the light of them attempting to hand off their major fundraising events to other service groups within the community. The special meeting called by the Live Oak District Chamber of Commerce may be the last opportunity for the chamber to vote in a new Board of Directors and move forward with their work in the 2019 year.

DWR Update On Drinking Water

Advisory for Del Oro Water Company Customers Affected by the Camp Fire

DWR Special Release

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Based on water sampling conducted at Del Oo Water Company and adjacent Paradise Irrigation District as a result of the Camp Fire, it is necessary to update the Jan. 11, 2019, advisory from the State Water Resources Control Board, Division of Drinking Water (Division), for Del Oro Water Company consumers. This updated advisory applies to the following affected Del Oro Water Company districts: Lime Saddle, Paradise Pines, and

The Division's Jan. 11 advisory suggested that odor could be a determining factor if benzene was present at levels above the state's standard. The un-natural odor alone is no longer sufficient for safely screening the water. As the sources of the contaminants are better understood and further testing is defining the scope and breadth of the issue, the Division is now relying on laboratory results to determine the safety of the water.

The most recent testing of standing homes and the water main lines in all three Del Oro Water Company districts has yielded no detectable benzene. Benzene is the most simple form of all aromatic compounds found in nature. It is considered a volatile

organic compound (VOC), meaning it will eventually evaporate from water. In all testing since the Camp Fire, whenever a VOC has been detected above its drinking water standard - benzene has always been above its drinking water standard as well. That means benzene has been an effective indicator of VOC contamination. If benzene is not present, results indicate that no other VOC will be above its drinking water standard. Benzene appears to be a building block for the other VOCs found in the testing.

Testing of water lines to burned homes has not yet been conducted, but is planned for the near future to determine the status of these water lines. More testing at standing homes is also planned.

Testing to date has not revealed an occurrence of organic chemical contamination within Del Oro Water Company's three districts. These test results are available on the Del Oro Water Company district websites. http://bit.ly/2SGC5oJ If further testing indicates otherwise, this message will be modified accordingly. Now '23,222 Prohibited Persons' Have Guns. This is Progress?

From the Office of Senator Nielsen

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Attorney General Xavier Becerra issued the annual report on the Armed Prohibited Persons System to remove guns from convicted felons and dangerous individuals. A proponent of the APPS program and former Chairman of the Board of Prison Terms, Senator Jim Nielsen (R-Tehama) issued the following statement:

"Known dangerous criminals must not be in possession of guns. The Attorney General and his agents are making an effort toward that goal.

"I appreciate that Attorney General Becerra is now

focused on removing guns from dangerous individuals.

"The program, however, has failed to reduce the number of guns belonging to known criminals and potentially dangerous people.

"The AG identified obsta-(APPS), a program designed cles and problems, but pointing the finger at the courts, district attorneys and local law enforcements for the delay is not acceptable.

> "In 2013, there were 20,721 names on this list. Now, there are 23,222.

"Over the years, I have asked the AG, privately and publicly, to develop a strategy to remove guns from known criminals and potentially dangerous people and keep Californians safe. I appreciate that he has come forward with a plan.

"I would like to see in the AG's plan a delegation of local law enforcement agencies to assist.

"We cannot afford to wait a year to assess this program's progress. Too much is at stake. The Legislature should receive an update in the budget hearings.'





Depression & Omega 3's

Dear Dietitian,

My cousin tells me she is taking fish oil supplements to help her with depression. Do you know of any studies on this topic?

Thank you, Andrea

Dear Andrea,

Omega-3 fatty acids, or simply omega-3s, have received a considerable amount of attention from the healthcare field and the general public. There are several omega-3s, and two in particular have been studied, DHA (Docosahexaenoic acid) and EPA

(Eicosapentaenoic acid), which are found in fish, especially fatty fish like salmon, herring, and rainbow trout. They are found in lesser amounts in seafood. Omega-3s are also sold as fish oil supplements with an estimated 19 million Americans taking them daily. EPA and

DHA are thought to have certain health benefits and have been studied for their effects on depression.

The term 'omega-3 fatty acid' is a chemical compound (think chemistry), which is named for the way it is structured. Its first double bond is 3 carbons from the omega-end; its main structure is a fatty acid, hence the name omega-3 fatty acid.

In a meta-analysis published in the Journal of the College of American Nutrition, Martins found that supplementation of omega-3 fatty acids was found to improve symptoms in those with mild to moderate depression. Symptoms were better improved when patients took a supplement with greater than 50% EPA. It is important to note that improvement was found when fish oil supplements were taken in conjunction with medication and when treating depression instead of preventing it. Some studies showed improvement in depressive symptoms when supplementing with moderate amounts of omega-3s but not high amounts. Other studies did not show a significant effect on depression when supplementing with DHA.

Although this metaanalysis shows some promise in using omega-3s to improve depressive symptoms, problems were detected in the methods used in some of the studies, which brings into question the validity of their findings. The bottom line is more studies are needed to determine whether or not omega-3s are effective in helping depression. Clinical research is a complex task that oftentimes takes years to complete.

25 Years Ago (1994)

"Gridley Faces Huge Cost" The city of Gridley is facing costs ranging from \$100,000 - \$250,000 for studies that the Butte County Local Agency Formation Commission wants in order for Gridley's to expand the City's urban growth area to the north. Planning Director Jo Shermans says she thinks the costs for meeting LAFCO's requirements would be the same if the City Council were to delete 500 acres from some other part of it's existing sphere of influence to off-set adding that much territory to the north. A city's Sphere of Influence is the territory outside it's present boundaries where LAFCO will allow future growth. After a year long joint study, the Council and Planning Commission proposed the increase in the Sphere of Influence to include the property Boeger is trying to develop, the Deniz family lands and parcels east of Hwy 99 north to Ord Ranch Road. Before embarking on the costly studies desired by LAFCO, the City Council

50 Years Ago (1969) "Grand Opening"

75 Years Ago (1944)

"Hundreds in Attendance" Between four and five hundred people attended the final rites of Dr. Leslie Freudenthal. The crowd taxed the seating capacity at the Memorial building and overflowed to the tiered seats at the sides of the hall. It was one of the largest groups ever attending any funeral services at Memorial Hall. One hundred and five cars formed the cortege which reached the cemetery before the last car had made the turn onto the highway from Sycamore street. Dr. Freudenthal, who died of injuries sustained in an automobile accident near Gridley, left an estate valued at \$50,000, which was left to his widow, Mrs. Kathryn N. Freudenthal.

100 Years Ago (1919)

"Tractor School"

The tractor school that was held in Gridley several weeks ago was not only a financial success by also equally successful in attendance, as shown by the figures submitted by Professor G.T. Kern, principal of the local high school. Average daily attendance at tractor school was 36 students, nightly attendance 42, and total days of school, 608. Students ages 16 to 64 attended the program, with the average student being 21 years old. At the last meeting of the school board of trustees, the board approved the continuation of the tractor school. The State board proposed to provide a truck and trailers which will convey necessary machinery from high school to high school, holding 4-week sessions of tractor school at each. Attendance in the sessions will be counted as regular attendance at the high schools.

125 Years Ago (1894) "Experiments"

A Washington dispatch says that the Secretary of Agriculture has decided to

conduct rice growing experiments in the low land along the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers. Currently, Professor E.J. Wickson of the University of California, is planting sugar cane for experimental purposes. Fifteen years ago, rice has been planted in the low lans along the river and was growing nicely when sheep destroyed the crop. It is believed that the area will profitably grow both rice and sugar cane. ★







ARDING AND FIRE

Do you have a person in your life who may be a hoarder? Hoarding is a condition where a person has persistent difficulty discarding personal possessions. The large amount of possessions fills the home and prevents the normal use of the space. Living space becomes cluttered. It may be unusable. Hoarding brings distress and emotional Health

WHY HOARDING INCREASES FIRE RISKS

- Cooking is unsafe if flammable items are close to the stove or oven.
- Heating units may be too close to things that can burn. They might also be placed on unstable surfaces. If a heater tips over into a pile, it can cause a fire.
- Electrical wiring may be old or worn from the weight of piles. Pests could chew on wires. Damaged wires can start fires.
- Open flames from smoking materials or candles in a home with excess clutter are very dangerous.
- Blocked pathways and exits may hinder escape from a fire.

HOW HOARDING IMPACTS FIRST RESPONDERS

- Hoarding puts first responders in harm's way.
- Firefighters cannot move swiftly through a home filled with clutter.
- Responders can be trapped in a home when exits are blocked. They can be injured by objects falling from piles.


• The weight of the stored items, especially if water is added to put out a fire, can lead to building collapse. • Fighting fires is very risky in a hoarding home. It is hard to enter the home to provide medical care. The clutter



When talking a person whohoards, focus on safety rather than the clutter. Be empathetic. Match the person's language. If they call it hoarding, then you

can call it hoarding. Help the residents make a home safety and escape plan. Stress the importance of clear pathways and exits. Practice the plan often. Exit routes may change as new items are brought into the home. Install working smoke alarms in the home. Test them at least

once a month. Reach out to community resources. Talk to members of the fire department to alert them of your concerns. They may be able to connect you with members of a hoarding task force for additional help.


