

## **Gridley City** Council Hears City's **Request for** New **Financial Software**

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) -The first item of action on the City Councils agenda at Monday night's meeting was a proclamation by Mayor Johnson declaring the month of February National Teen Dating Violence Prevention and Awareness Month. The proclamation was accepted by Erik Garcia from Catalyst Domestic Violence Services, who presented the council statistics on teen dating violence and domestic abuse among young adults. Catalyst offers support services for victims of abuse and works to educate and raise awareness about domestic violence.

Following a brief open forum, Juan Solis spoke on behalf of The City of Gridley, presenting for the councils consideration, a power point on the need for new finan-

PARADISE, CA (MPG) - SPSG Partners, a Joint Venture comprised of Sukut Construction, Pacific States Environmental Contractors and Goodfellow Bros. SPSG Partners is one of three firms to receive a contract issued by California's Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) to remove debris, contaminated soil, and hazardous material associated with the largest and most destructive fire in the state's history. To-date, it is estimated that approximately 17,000 structures were

Sukut Construction, the Joint Venture's managing partner, has more than 50 years of experience in heavy-civil and emergency response including previous work with CalRecvcle. "It is a tremendous responsibility for our Joint Venture to have been selected by the State," said Eddie Juarez, Sukut's Vice President of Environmental Services. "Our combined firms are uniquely qualified to assist in critical times like these as we help an entire community that has been displaced by the fire."

"Pacific States Environmental Contractors will leverage our extensive expertise in fire cleanup and we understand that time is of the essence with projects such as this," said Bob

Goodfellow Bros., a West Coast based civil contractor, has a nearly 100-year history assisting with natural disaster cleanup including floods, volcano, and fires. "Our efforts to help Butte County get back on its feet aligns with our organization's mission to support the communities in which we live and work," said Brian Gates, Division President of Goodfellow Bros. California. "Additionally, we hope to utilize the skills of local residents to help our cleanup efforts while providing some jobs for those

cial software. The city's current system MOM's, is almost 25 years old. cannot keep up with department requirements and lacks proper security protocols.

Over the last year, the City of Gridley financial. public works and electric department has been involved in researching financial software, narrowing down the options to the top two: Caselle and Tyler. Both Caselle and Tyler would take about a year to become operational but would allow the department to streamline their operations, reducing overtime labor hours, revenue loss and more.

Tyler, ranked the highest in functional value when evaluated by the City of Gridley's departments, and would cost \$174, 771 for set up with a yearly maintenance fee of \$44,471, with Caselle costing \$129,652 for implementation, with a yearly maintenance fee \$35, 952. Tyler's higher cost is due to full project management, which would guide and support city staff during the transition. The current systems maintenance cost is \$28, 073, and is believed to be steadily leaking revenue.

Council members took the information into consideration and will address approval for new financial software for the City of Gridley at the next Gridley City Council meeting.



## **Live Oak Child Care Center: Over 40 Years of Service**

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - The opening of the Live Oak Child Care Center in the spring of 1977 was culmination of a lengthy 5-year project set about by the Church of The Brethren to build a new church facility specifically designed to provide much needed childcare to lower income residents in Live Oak. In the years since it opened its doors to the community, enrollment at the Live Oak Child Care Center has grown from 9 students to 85, with many on the waiting list.

Rey Sasaki was born on June 9, 1942 in Sacramento and passed away peacefully on January 6, 2019 at the age of 76 in Yuba City. He was the son of the late Rev. and Mrs. Sensho Sasaki. Senrey is survived by his three children: Janelle Sasaki of Tokyo, Japan; Blake Sasaki of Campbell; Brent Sasaki of Sacramento, and 4 grandchildren. Rey was a fixture in our community for many many years. Voters who intend to return to their properties may retain the impacted residence address in order to continue to vote in their original precinct, but will need to update their temporary mailing address on their registration. Voters who do not intend to return to their impacted property address should re-register at their new permanent residence address.

is a non-profit organization and works with partner agency, United Way, to bring child care and education to children whose parents meet income eligibility and are either working part-time, attending school or unemployed. It is open year round and provides a part-day pre-school program and 2 full-day classes for students in 1st-4th grade, rotating the three programs between the common area classroom and playground area. Children are provided breakfast, lunch and a snack lovingly prepared by cook Ms. Beverley, who has worked to remove processed food from menu while meeting USDA dietary regulations.

The center runs like a well-oiled machine, thanks to its dedicated staff of

14 teachers and Director, Shannon Granger. Granger has been with the center for 5 years and has upgraded staff professionalism, obtained grants and organized fundraisers to further enhance the care centers facility, play yard and curriculum. Innovative programs designed to increase literacy invite students to check out backpacks filled with books and writing exercises to encourage fun while learning and developing skills. The staff is well-loved by their students, as evidenced by the barrage of hugs "Ms. Shannon" received as she provided a tour of the facility. Kate Hartman, mother of 4 year old Weston Hartman, a preschooler at LOCCC, commented that "The teachers are very friendly and he (Weston) looks forward to going to school. We really

love Live Oak Child Care Center."

> At the end of the day on Fridays, the central common area which serves as the main classroom is broken down and all evidence of a school-room setting is tucked away, restoring the building to its original function as a place of worship. While the Church of the Brethren Board oversees the school, absolutely no religion enters into the curriculum. It is in the tradition of service that the church has undertaken the mission to provide child care to those in need. The program has become wildly successful, with state and county officials commending the center. Enrollment for the August session begins in April, and while there is a waiting list, the school is always accepting applica-\* tions.

## **Gridley Camp Fire Community Moving Forward**

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - The City of Gridley, FEMA and Cal OES continue to work in coordination as the largest Camp Fire Group site, the Gridley Camp Fire Community (GCFC), moves closer to realization. The contract leasing the Gridley Industrial Park to FEMA was signed on January 14th, and since then, survey crews and FEMA Consultant Engineer and Contractor, MLU have been gathering data to complete the sites design and that they "anticipate few engineering by February 14th. The site contractor, of the projected residents is MLU, expected to begin much older and parents of construction at the park on February 15th, with modular housing units (MHU's) to begin arriving in late March. The site will include

350 MHU's, ranging from 30-50 feet in length and 12-14 feet wide depending on room count, with two parking stalls available for each unit. Potential reseligibility, including proof would be coming to Gridley

of at least \$14,000 worth in fire losses and must comply with park rules as part of their month to month tenancy. Residents are required to show monthly progress towards permanent housing solutions. Failure to comply with rules and expectations will result in a 15 day exit notice.

Total population of the park is not expected to exceed 1,100 and information provided to the City of Gridley states that FEMA has notified Gridley schools children as the typical age children are working to keep their children in Paradise or Chico schools." That is still an area of debate. At a meeting held on January 25th with Cal OES, FEMA, City of Gridley, Gridley Superintendent of Schools Jordan Reeves and others, Superintendent Reeves asked FEMA representaidents must meet FEMA tives how many children

via the GCFC. At that time, Superintendent Reeves said that FEMA had no answer to the number of potential students, no lists or information and that everything was being based off speculation. Federal funding for additional students remains an issue for the district.

An unexpected issue causing concern to the City of Gridley is the intended signal at Hwy 99 at roads W. Liberty and Hollis lane. Originally, CalTrans intended to realign W. Liberty and Hollis Lane and install a full-functioning traffic signal at the new intersection. CalTrans, which has been onsite, appears to be attempting to fore-go the realignment and install a temporary signal in place of what was promised. The City of Gridley is buckling down and doing it's due-diligence by seeking support from Cal OES and State Legislators to cause CalTrans to follow through on the original plan. \*

### Invest Now?

Dear Dave.

I'm almost debt-free, and I'll be finishing my master's degree soon. I'm not from this country, so I'll be returning home in the next three to five years. Considering my situation, would investing in the stock market be a good idea? I've been reading that the market is about to crash, so I wanted to get your advice before doing anything. -Rahm

Dear Rahm,

If someone could accurately predict the stock market with certainty, that person would be a multibazillionaire. Right now, there are also articles out there that say the market is about to boom. There are always "glass half-full" and "glass half-empty" articles floating around. I wouldn't avoid stock market investing based on one ridiculous article you read.

However, in your situation you may not want to invest in the stock market

### Dave Ramsey Says right now. History says you a little more money, or pay stand a fair chance of com-

ing out with less than you put in if you don't leave the money invested in the stock market alone for at least five years. The market cycles up, and the market cycles down. This really isn't a big problem if you're going to put your money in there, and leave it alone for 20 years or more. But three to five years? The historical data says you've got a reasonable chance of actually losing money.

So, I probably wouldn't invest if you're going to be gone in five years or less. Instead, when you're settled and have a career in your home country, I'd advise looking into how you can invest there. You might even want to do some research, and find out if you can begin investing there now. —Dave

> Designate a percentage

Dear Dave,

I'm debt-free except for my home, and I have a small business with revenues of around \$100,000 annually. About half of that is profit, and I typically pay myself 40 percent of the biweekly revenue. I'm in the media business, and I need to upgrade some equipment. At what point do I put back

myself a little less, to make this happen? -Luke

#### Dear Luke,

I know what you mean, man. We're in the media business, too, and around my office it seems like we buy more and newer technology every day. Really, it's like a black hole. You could throw money into it the rest of your life, because practically the very moment you open the box it's obsolete.

We finally decided to designate a percentage of our revenues to equipment replacement. Something is always being replaced, but this way we've got a limit and we've got something set aside to make our technology needs happen. It's like the envelope system. If the envelope's empty, we have to stop buying and put off whatever it is until the cash is available again. I hope this helps!

## Dear Dietician

## **Prediabetes**

#### Dear Dietitian,

My husband was just diagnosed with prediabetes. We were given a sheet of paper with information on this, but it left us with many questions. Does he need a special diet? Will he have full-blown diabetes in a few years? We need more information, please. Suzanne

Dear Suzanne,

A new diagnosis can be overwhelming, and often leaves us with many questions. You are wise to seek information. Prediabetes is when your blood sugars are high, but not high enough to be considered type 2 diabetes. This term is phasing out the former description "borderline diabetes," giving it a more direct connotation. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), about 84 million American adults have prediabetes, and of these, 90% don't know they have it.

The good news is you can prevent prediabetes from becoming type 2 diabetes by making lifestyle changes. Some estimate you can reduce the likelihood of developing type 2 diabetes by as much as 40-70%!

According to the American Diabetes Association, prediabetes is defined by one or more of the following criteria:

o An A1C level of 5.7% to 6.4%. Your A1C is a 3-month average of blood sugar levels.

o Fasting glucose level of 100 - 125 mg/dl. Fasting means you haven't eaten for at least 8 hours prior to the glucose test.

o Two-hour oral glucose tolerance test of 140-199 mg/dl. This test is used to diagnose gestational diabetes. Your risk factors for prediabetes are:

o Family history

o Being overweight o Age 45 or older

o Being physically active less than 30 minutes per week

o Having had gestational diabetes

o Having polycystic ovary syndrome


o Ethnicity- Prediabetes rates are higher in African American, Hispanic, and Native American ethnicities. Of these risk factors, there are two things you can change: weight and physical activity. If you need to lose weight, do it. While in clinical practice, I would encourage patients to try a new health plan for 30 days. This is the toughest time because you are making changes in behavior, but might not see results yet. Once you start seeing the fruits of your labor, it motivates you to carry on. Beware of food plans that are too restrictive, both in calories and food groups. A program that is too restrictive only makes us feel deprived, and who needs that? Furthermore, it sets you up for failure. You are more likely to say "To heck with it," and eat everything in sight. It's hard to get back on track after that. So much depends on our attitudes. Just this morning, someone asked me how I had lost weight so that she could do the same. After discussing my new health plan, she listed all the reasons

she couldn't lose weight. If you think you can or can't, you're right. Don't be your own worst enemy. Exercise is as important as eating healthy when it comes to prediabetes. Physical activity moves blood sugar from your extremities to your core where it can be utilized. Again, don't overdo it. If you haven't been exercising, start with a half-mile walk three times a week, then increase slowly to reach a goal of 150 minutes per week. The good thing about exercise is it makes us feel better, so we keep doing it!

Remember, what you do makes a difference. Taking care of yourself is one of life's greatest privileges; no one else can do it for you.

#### 25 Years Ago (1994)

#### "Gridley Approves Pact to Help Biggs'

A milestone in inter-city cooperation between Gridley and Biggs was reached when the Gridley City Council approved an agreement covering electric system maintenance assistance for the city of Biggs. The agreement allows Gridley Electric Department crews to help Biggs repair and rebuild it's power distribution system. This cooperative arrangement has been advocated for some time by the Northern California Power Agency, a consortium of local entities which own their electric power utilities. Bot Gridley and Biggs are NCPA members. The final agreement is the result of 6 months of negotiations between Gridley Councilman Tom Sanford and Biggs Councilman Richard Emswiler and basically boils down to both cities sharing staff and equipment. To identify costs of providing maintenance assistance to Biggs, Gridleys Electric Department budget will be divided into two categories: "Gridley only" and one for shared expenses. City Administrator Jack Slota estimated that if the agreement had been in place last year, Biggs would have paid Gridley \$69,939.00. Gridley will not help Biggs pay for expenses incurred within their municipal limits, such as equipment rental, PCB testing, Hazardous waste disposal and substation testing.

#### 50 Years Ago (1969) "City's Fire Alarm Breaks Down"

Fire Chief Earl King cautioned Gridley city councilmen not to be alarmed if they hear the fire whistle in the middle of the night, when he appeared before

them at the Monday night meeting. The whistle is normally used during the daytime, but the Plectron radio warning system is broken. Chief King has had to instruct all 21 volunteer firemen to call by telephone if they hear the Plectron siren go off in the night, to be sure that there is an actual emergency before they respond. King blames the problem on "rotten" maintenance service by Burton's of Chico and complained that if it wasn't the home sets that were acting up, it was the main siren having trouble. For the time being the city and crew would have to suffer through the false alarms until the system is able to be repaired.

#### 75 Years Ago (1944) "Big Purchase"

The local Fourth War Loan drive climbed swiftly last week when Libby, McNeil and Libby purchased a block of bonds valued at \$50,000. Drive Chairman, J. W. Jepsen, announced that the sales totaled \$270,708.00 with the Libby purchased included, just \$78,645.00 short of the district quota.

#### 100 Years Ago (1919)

"New Garage in Biggs" V.R. Ralley, owner of the livery stable at Biggs, converted his place into a garage and has been running it himself until just recently. He has leased the property and business to Alex Kestner and Paul Ruegg, two expert mechanics and automobile specialists. Ralley plans to open a vulcanizing business next door to the garage. Ralley bought the livery stable a number of years ago, and when gasoline propelled vehicles looked to overtake the livery horse, he decided to switch industries.





flooding in the fire scar rain staving off drought. areas but overall the land is absorbing the water.






The Bulldogs rallied for a 57-48 win over Wheatland in a battle of two of the better teams in the Butte View League last Friday night.

#### **Biggs Moves Forward with Stadium Renovation Plans** Story by David Vantress

BIGGS, CA (MPG) - It was more than two and a half years ago that the football stadium at Biggs High School was heavily damaged in a fire. The fire, just prior to the 2016 season, gutted the press box and home bleachers and also damaged a light standard.

Temporary bleachers were added and a makeshift press box put up. And the Wolverines were still able to play all their games on their home field. The community and the team rallied around each other, and the Wolverine football team won the 2016 CIF Northern Section Division 5 championship, advancing to the CIF state playoffs.

New lights went in last year, and now the school is moving forward with plans to fix the rest of the damaged facilities at Del Kalbach Stadium.

Biggs Superintendent/Principal Doug Kaelin said last week that the final bids have been received for the work needed, which will include new bleachers, a new press box and new restrooms/concession stand for the home side.

Kaelin said the low bid on the project came in at around \$2.5 million. Since the damage was covered by insurance, there's still some work to do with the insurance company to get its approval. The project could be on the agenda for the Biggs school board's consideration at its meeting later this month.

Once approved, the work would begin pretty quickly, Kaelin said, with a target completion date of mid-August. That would get the rebuilt stadium ready for the opening of the 2019 season.

Doing laundry is most likely part of your everyday routine. But did you know how important taking care of your clothes dryer is to the safety of your home? With a few simple safety tips you can help prevent a clothes dryer fire. Dryers should be properly grounded. Check the outdoor vent flap to make sure it is not covered by debris. Keep the area around your dryer clear of things that can burn, like boxes, cleaning supplies and clothing, etc. Clothes that have come in contact with flammable substances, like gasoline, paint thinner, or similar solvents should be laid outside to dry, then can be washed and dried as usual.

#### FACT

- The leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them.
- Have your dryer installed and serviced by a professional.
- Do not use the dryer without a lint filter.
- Make sure you clean the lint filter before or after each load of laundry. Remove lint that has collected around the drum.
- Rigid or flexible metal venting material

should be used to sustain proper air flow and drying time.

- Make sure the air exhaust vent pipe is not restricted and the outdoor vent flap will open when the dryer is operating. Once a year, or more often if you notice that it is taking longer than normal for your clothes to dry, clean lint out of the vent pipe or have a dryer lint removal service do it for you.
- Keep dryers in good working order. Gas dryers should be inspected by a qualified professional to make sure that the

gas line and connection are intact and free of leaks.

- Make sure the right plug and outlet are used and that the machine is connected properly.
- Follow the manufacturer's operating instructions and don't overload your dryer.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.




