> Recently, Union Pacific was in Live Oak and Gridley, dropping off wooden main line ties along the tracks in our area in anticipation of the maintenance to occur in the near future. Data provided by U.P. states that 94% of ties used are wooden, with 6% being concrete and very few made from a composite

material. There are 3,300 wooden ties in place per mile of railroad track, with a tie placed every 1.6 feet and Bolte says that a variety of equipment is used to perform the track

maintenance. Union Pacific couldn't comment on delays that the repairs would cause on its train schedule or if railroad crossings would be shut down during the maintenance, causing delays in vehicle cross traffic.

Last Thursday traffic in Gridley was backed up for almost 15 minutes while Union Pacific machinery passed through town, destined for the projects base camp in Biggs. Work on the tracks began earlier this week, starting in Live Oak and making its way up the track through Gridley and into Biggs. Union Pacific workers plan to be in the area until the 31st.

Contamination Found in Streams Following Camp Fire

Public Warned to Avoid Untreated Surface Waters for Drinking, Cooking

REDDING, CA (MPG) - State water quality officials cautioned the public not to drink or cook with untreated surface water from streams throughout the Camp Fire burn area after bacteria and other contaminants were detected in water samples.

Laboratory analyses of surface water samples found concentrations of bacteria (E.Coli), aluminum, antimony and some polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) that exceeded water quality standards for drinking water.

"Given the fire's devastating impacts, the results aren't surprising, and in fact are lower than expected," said Clint Snyder, Central Valley Water Board Assistant Executive Officer. "People

cooking."

These surface waters are not a source of drinking water for homes, with the exception of some shallow wells along Butte Creek where creek water may seep into the wells. Home owners with shallow wells along Butte Creek should review their well construction details and consider testing their well water.

Last week, the Central Valley Regional Water Quality Control Board conducted targeted sampling of surface waters at various locations throughout the Camp Fire burn area and downstream of the burn area, in coordination with Butte County, California Department of Water Resources, and the California Department of Transportation.

Although testing found elevated

in this region should not drink or use levels of aluminum, antimony and iron, these untreated surface waters for any these metals are also naturally occurring, explained Snyder. Further study will be required to determine what percentages are naturally occurring and what percentages are attributable to runoff from the burn area.

Aluminum and antimony were detected above the primary maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) for those metals at several sampling locations. Primary MCLs are drinking water standards adopted as regulations to protect public health.

Concentrations of iron exceeding secondary maximum contaminant levels were also detected in some samples. Secondary MCLs are aesthetic standards, meaning the public might notice

Polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs) are a class of chemicals that occur naturally in carbon containing substances such as coal, crude oil, and gasoline. PAHs are also produced when wood, garbage and other carbon-based substances are burned. The State Water Board analyzed samples for 22 PAHs and of those, five were detected above applicable thresholds.

When it comes to life insurance, always go with a good, 15- to 20-year level term policy. And always stay away from that return of premium garbage!

Fiber and Disease

Dear Dietitian,

I just read an article that said eating a high fiber diet helps prevent colon cancer, but other articles on this topic have said the opposite. This is frustrating and confusing! Can you help clear things up? Joe

Dear Joe,

Scientific studies are often confusing because the results are different. Before something becomes clear in science, it has to be tested several times in different cultures in different parts of the world. It must also be tested on men and women and people of different ages. The studies must reveal the same results in order to be accepted as true by the scientific community. Sometimes this takes several years.

The reason nutrition studies seem even more confusing is because nutrition is in its infancy. We have barely scratched the surface on most nutrition topics. When a new topic is studied, results often vary until the matter is "hammered out." The good news we are learning more about nutrition than other time in history.

This particular study of fiber and disease prevention was commissioned by the World Health Organization (WHO) and reported in The Lancet in January of 2018. Reynolds, Mann, et. al found a 15-30% decrease in total death, rates of heart disease, stroke and deaths related to strokes, type 2 diabetes, colorectal cancer, and deaths related to heart disease when comparing the highest dietary fiber consumers with the lowest consumers. It is important to note the study was done on fiber in food, not supplements. Also, the study included people who did not already have the before- mentioned diseases.

The target range of fiber intake is 25 - 29 grams per day. This is about twice the amount Americans eat each day. When increasing fiber, do so gradually and drink plenty of water. Otherwise, you may feel

uncomfortable, and the gas your body produces may make you unpopular.

Good sources of fiber include fruits, vegetables, and whole grains, and as always, I recommend eating foods you really enjoy. Start with a high fiber cereal, one with 5 g of fiber or more per serving. Add 3 fruits each day to increase fiber by another 12 grams. You're already up to 17 grams! Next, have 2 slices whole wheat bread on your sandwich for another 2 grams. Add ½ cup beans (7g) to your lunch. Finally, enjoy ½ cup green peas (4g) at dinner and you have 30 g total fiber for the day. Bon appétit.



SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Employers are downshifting in the hiring race as 2019 begins. One regional company is reducing workforce 2019 seven percent (7%) by more than fifty percent (50%) as tariff related contract losses impact Sacramento area employment. In direct contacts with regional employers between November 19th and December 17th, Pacific Staffing discovered fifty-six percent (56%) of compa-

Quarter of 2019. Hiring has pulled back from this same time one firms each quarter since year ago when sixty-five percent (65%) planned to hire in January, February and March. While the pace of hiring among top Sacramento regional employers has fallen throughout 2018 companies report finding applicants

and specific skilled workers remain a top challenge in the new year.

While not a single company surveyed planned first quarter layoffs in 2018, in the first three months of are reducing workforces. Staff reductions are attributed to seasonal change and slower demand for products and services. Forty-four percent (44%) of hiring in the first quarter is for attrition, or replacements, among existing workforces while employers seek just nies are hiring in the First forty-two percent (42%) for growth.

By talking to top regional 1992, Pacific Staffing has learned there are always hiring challenges for employers, regardless of economic direction. In this first quarter of the new year seventeen percent (17%) of employers also report a continuing challenge with

finding enough applicants, despite the slowdown. Others also citing increased minimum wage and hiring specific skilled trades as workplace concerns.

Sales, customer service, accounting/finance, technical, warehouse and shipping experience is in high demand through March. Drivers for route and delivery remain scarce.

The most active sector is Service companies with Manufacturers second, followed by Construction and Retail through January, February and March of 2019.


approach to the game, focus- spot on the line, it's a good time to be playing well.

Gridley Thumbs and Roots

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - It was hard to experience the full blood wolf moon eclipse (eclipses have more interesting names these days) in Gridley. The moon was veiled in a deep bank of clouds. The interest in this moon eclipse made me curious about the idea of the moon and its ability to influence the success of planting a vegetable garden.

The search for this information brought me to a lunar calendar from the Farmer's Almanac. This calendar suggested that it time to plant seeds indoors.

The following seeds can be started indoors during this moon phase time, broccoli, Brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, kale, lettuce, swiss chard, tomatoes. It is said that just as the moon influences the rise and fall of tides, so it has a gravitational effect on the moisture in plants (sap), the soil and the water table. So, with this influence it turns out to be an ideal time to plant seeds 2 days before the full moon.

As I studied on, I found

additional information for this full blood wolf moon eclipse time. It is considered by some to be a barren time. A time to kill weeds, briars, poison ivy (oak in the west), and all other pest plants. It also turns out to be a time to graft & amp; prune. If you are a biodynamic gardener it is time to spray your various concoctions made from bugs,

dung and other dead things. It turns out in the world of biodynamics that the Moon and Saturn are in opposition and this increases soil activity. spots, canyons, washes etc.

·Avoid areas already flooded, especially if the water is

flowing fast. Do not flood dangers. As a reminder, East attempt to cross flowing streams. Turn Gridley Road and Around, Don't Drown Gridley Colusa

•Road beds may be washed out under flood waters. NEVER drive through flooded roadways. Turn Around, Don't Drown. If your vehicle is suddenly caught in rising water, leave it immediately and

seek higher ground. •Do not camp or park your vehicle along streams
